Young Confederate Captain
BAXTER CLEGG CLEMENT

Dr. Baxter Clegg Clement was born on the old Clement homestead in Mocksville in 1841. He was the second son and child of Jesse A. and Malinda Clement. His father owned Negro slaves, operated a sawmill, two plantations and did a large business in manufactured plug tobacco, cotton, and wheat which was shipped by wagon train to Columbia and points south.

Dr. Clement was third generation in the family of a German emigrant who registered in Philadelphia, Oct. 31, 1765, and sailed on the ship "Betsy" from Rotterdam. His family had been known in the Palatinate since the year 1050. A facsimile copy of his signature is in the County Library. He wrote a very beautiful and in strong contrast to most of the others who came over on the same ship. With a German ancestry of thrift and industry, his father dabbling in so many Enterprises. Dr. Clement's boyhood was anything but one of leisure. He worked in the fields with the Negro slaves and at every task his father found need to impose. He was in charge of a covered wagon train in Florida when war was declared in the states.

Returning home he found that his father, now past 50, had raised a company of volunteers from Davie, Forsyth and other counties. They were called the "Grays." There was enough of them to fight for another company. They had their own leader and he was little more than a boy . . . just 20 years old. Baxter Clegg Clement became cap-

tain of Company E of the 75th Regiment.

In April before the surrender he and 16 of his command, one of whom was his 17 year old brother, Jesse Lee Clement, were taken prisoners. Captain Clement was sent to the famous officers prison on Johnson's Island near Sanduskey, Ohio, where he remained until after the surrender.

His brother, Dr. William Clement, an honor graduate of Jefferson Medical College, was practicing medicine in Rover, Arkansas, when war was declared. Because of a badly crippled hand, he could not volunteer as a surgeon in the Confederate Army. With a young wife, he came to Mocksville to be with his mother who had given her husband and sons to the army. He practiced medicine here for the duration of the hostilities. When he returned to his former practice, his brother, Captain "Bax" accompanied him for the purpose of studying medicine. There were no pre-med courses in medical colleges of that era and studying under someone was a custom adhered to by medical aspirants. It was called "reading medicine."

From this apprenticeship, Captain Clement attended the University of Louisiana for his medical training. He returned to Arkansas at its completion and was associated with his brother practicing over a wide area bordering on the Ozark Mountains. His brother, with his varied pioneer interests in that undeveloped area, needed an assistant for he was a Grand Master in Masonry, unlicensed Methodist preacher, educator, legislator serving more than 12 years in the General Assembly of that state, speaker of the House, Lieutenant governor, and at the time of his accidental death he was an unopposed candidate for Governor of Arkansas.

Around the year 1880, Dr. Clement returned to North Carolina and estab-

lished a practice in Rowan County. Three years later he married Miss Lina Barber who was 20 years his junior. He moved to Mocksville for the practice of his profession. A dedicated man, like others of his era, he gave himself to the unselfish service of mankind. He was deeply religious and was a steward in the First Methodist Church for a number of years. Whether or not these country doctors of that long ago era took the Hippocratic oath, they truly lived up to all its context. The jingle of coins in their pockets was not what attracted them to the profession.

These doctors carried locked in their secrecy family skeletons of unhappy family relations, often underlying contributions of illness. They treated souls as well as bodies. And what did they receive in compensation? Five dollars for the delivery of a baby. Often their pay was in produce gunny sacks of sweet potatoes, peanuts, pop corn, dried fruits. Sometimes a woman patient would pay her bill with a quilt she had put together or she would knit stockings for her doctor's children.

Dr. Clement died at the Clement homestead in which he was born, in 1886. For 15 years he had been an invalid. He is buried in the Clement Cemetery where also rests for other officers and two privates of the "Lost Cause."

SUBSCRIBERS ENTITLED ANNUAL LISTING

Subscribers are entitled an annual listing of 25 lines in this section, plus their name and address. Each line consists of either or the date and location of a vital factor, birth, marriage, or death. Subscribers desiring additional space, and non-subscribers purchase space at the rate of 15c per line. Non-subscribers are subject to a \$2.00 minimum fee.

DON'T LET THE FOLLOWING POINTS CONFUSE YOU

In some instances there are more than one No. 1 subject. This procedure is allowable only with the No. 1 chart position, only if the subjects are full siblings. All numbered individuals from No. 2 on up are direct ancestors of No. 1.

The abbreviation s. is found only with the charts subject as, quite obviously, the mates of all others have their own key. If you wish you may record vital data on the subject's spouse, but NEVER, list ancestors of the spouse, as this would separate chart.

COUNT ONLY NAMES AND VITAL FACTORS IN YOUR TOTAL LINE COUNT

In making your final count of lines you needn't concern yourself with their width. In the event that a line consists of ex city, county, and state names, we will be forced to drop down to the next line to fit our technical requirements. But, that's a problem, not yours.

All other abbreviations found in charts are the common abbreviations for names of states

HANDY RULE OF THUMB

Fathers have a number twice that of their offspring, mothers double, plus one.

All charts submitted for publication must be either typewritten or legibly printed. Surnames should be in capitol letters and precede given names. List the date before the locality. Also, the day should always precede the month in genealogical records.

HOW TO LIST UNVERIFIED MATERIAL

When information has been gained from an unverified source it should be followed by a question mark and an parenthesis. EXAMPLE — You have proof that a certain ancestress had the given name of Amanda but only an unverified support your belief that her maiden name was Higgins. She would be listed thusly: (HIGGINS?) Amanda. If both names unproven then — (HIGGINS, Amanda?). The same principal applies to dates and locations.
