



COAT OF ARMS: Of the 21 Crawford/Craufurd/Crawfurd families listed in Burke's The General Armory of England, Scotland and Males, 16 incorporate "Gules, a fess engine" in their coats of arms, with or without quartering or other variations.

Gules is red, and is designated by vertical lines. A fess is the horizontal band occupying the center onethird of the shield. Ermine, an armorial fur, is white with black "spots,

The 12 crests on the left and bottom sides of the cover represent 23 of the 33 Crewford families listed in Fairbairn's Crests of the Leading Families in Great Britain and Ireland. While crests are generally unique to a specific family, the coat of arms shown here can probably be considered "generic" for the name Crawford.

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EDITOR'S PAGE

"Two Crawford Lines in the Waxhaw -- First Sequel" (v10n3p57) gave a mandate to rewrite the previous article, "Two Crawford Lines in the Waxhaw" (v10n2pp25-30). "Crawfords in the Waxhaws Are a Problem for Some" in this issue follows from that mandate.

Available evidence now indicates that the "two lines" were really of one progenitor, the oft-published "Col. **John Crawford** who came direct from Ayrshire to Pennsylvania." "Crawfords in the Waxhaws Are a Problem for Some" identifies

a hitherto unknown progeny of Col. John Crawford; and

announces that EXCHANGE-member Mary Veach has conclusively identified two, unrelated, senior James Crawfords in the Waxhaw.

Publication of a rewrite of "Two Crawford Lines in the Waxhaw" will now be left to Veach in her forthcoming book, Sorting the Waxhaw Crawfords. Veach will delineate the lines of all the Waxhaw Crawfords.

But this issue and Veach's book together will not answer all questions that arise concerning the Waxhaw Crawfords. For example:

Did Col. John Crawford come to PA direct from Ayrshire, or from Ireland?

Were Col. John Crawford's sons, Robert, Joseph, and James, born in PA as Robert supposedly claimed, or were they all born in Ireland as evidence indicates? Or were they born in Scotland and emigrated to Ireland before coming to America?

Did Col. **John Crawford**'s son, **James Crawford** (c1720-c1780), come to the Waxhaw separately, or with the Andrew **Jackson** family?

Did the Andrew Jackson family and James Crawford (c1720-c1780) come to the Waxhaw via PA (as generaly reported) or did James come "from County Down, Ireland, with the Jacksons in 1765, in a vessel belonging to Dan Jackson (Andrew Jackson Sr's brother) who was a seaman.--They set sail from Carrickfergus and landed at Charleston, S.C., going, immediately to the Waxhaw settlement . . "? [cx287p5 per DAR Lineage No. 114530 application]

All enlightenment will be welcome.

CRAWFORDS IN THE WAXHAMS ARE A PROBLEM FOR SOME 1,2

A multiplicity of Crawford³ families in a given region can frustrate any researcher. To such multiplicity, add the many versions of family heritage that have been passed about for some of the Crawfords in the Waxhaws and you have exasperation.

For some historians, this study may add an entirely new version of the heritage of these Crawfords. The conclusions reached are likely to meet with doubt among some and possibly outright disagreement among others. Proof for any conclusions other than -- or in addition to -- those made here will be welcome.


Of the several problems researchers have encountered with Crawfords in the Waxhaws, only two are focused on in this study. These two problems derive from a Crawford relationship with former President Andrew Jackson, son of Andrew Jackson and Elizabeth Hutchinson. President Jackson's parents arrived in the Waxhaws in 1765, two years before the birth of son Andrew and the death of the elder Andrew. Elizabeth's sister, Jennet Hutchinson, was the wife of Waxhaw resident, James Crawford. Thus James Crawford was an uncle by marriage of the future President. Although controversy still exists as to whether young Andrew was born in the SC home of his uncle James Crawford or the NC home of his uncle George McKemey, historians do agree that young Andrew grew up in his uncle James Crawford's home. Andrew's widowed mother took over the responsibilities for running the household of her disabled sister, Jennet.

2. Waxhaw Creek is a tributary of the Catawba River near the border between NC and SC. See page 12. Only about 15 miles in length, Waxhaw Creek heads in NC and empties into the Catawba River in SC. Today, the Waxhaws or the Waxhaw Settlement is most likely interpreted to be an area near Waxhaw Creek and lying mostly in today's Lancaster Co., SC, and Union Co., NC. Before 1772, when a NC-SC border dispute was settled, Waxhaw settlers considered much of Waxhaw Creek to be in NC's Bladen Co. 1734-1750, Anson Co. 1750-1762, and Mecklenburg Co. 1762-1772. However, at that time the Waxhaws actually referred to an area inhabited by the Waxhaw Indians and did not coincide with any polictical boundaries. Early settlers in the region along Waxhaw Creek probably considered themselves as the Waxhaw Settlement, and early settlers on the west banks of the Catawba may have considered themselves as an extension of the Waxhaw Settlement.

3. Variant spellings of Crawford were plentiful in colonial times and some exist even today. The most common contemporary spelling, Crawford, will be used here irrespective of the different spellings that appeared in the various documents relied on for this study. Be aware, however, that in the documents used for this study, there were variations in the spelling of several names. Readers should be aware also that the same person may be referred to by two or more given names. This applies particularly to Agnes and Nancy, and to Jennet, Jane, Jean, and Janet.




CRAWFORDS IN THE WAXHAWS c1780

PROBLEM ONE

Problem one evolves from the existence of two senior James Crawfords in the Waxhaws. Many researchers trace their ancestry to a James Crawford in the Waxhaws. On learning that President Andrew Jackson was born in the Waxhaws, possibly in the home of his uncle James Crawford, and, for certain, grew up in that home, some researchers may have a tendency to lay claim to this James Crawford and his wife, Jennet Hutchinson, as their ancestors. The home of this James Crawford was located near Waxhaw Creek and is now in Lancaster Co., SC. See the map on page 12. The Robert Crawford that lived nearby is generally accepted as having been a brother of James.

Research also leads many to the 1776-will of self-identified "James Crafford of the Waxhaws South Carolina Craven County." His son, also James Crafford, was living on the land bequeathed to him by the will. That land lies on the west bank of the Catawba River about ten miles down-river from the mouth of Waxhaw Creek and now lies in Chester Co., SC, which was formed in 1785.

Many researchers have allowed for only one senior **James Crawford** of the Waxhaws. They surmised (problem one) that in his later years he went to live with his son James who already occupied the down-river property. That assumption has now been found to be fallacious.

The up-river, Waxhaw Creek James Crawford is generally recognized as being the uncle by marriage of President Andrew Jackson. Mary Veach, member of THE CRAWFORD EXCHANGE, has convincingly proved that the west-bank, down-river "James Crafford of the Waxhaws" is a second senior James Crawford in the Waxhaws and has not been identified as related to the up-river, Waxhaw Creek Crawfords. The presentation of the documentary proof and associated exposition for her findings are too extensive to publish in THE CRAWFORD EXCHANGE. For the proof itself and for genealogies of other Waxhaw Crawfords, I must refer you to Mary Veach's to-be-announced book, Sorting the Waxhaw Crawfords.

PROBLEM TWO

Some descendants of a **John Crawford** from the Waxhaws who immigrated c1781 and settled in what is now York Co., SC, "know" that their **John Crawford** was related to a Waxhaw **James Crawford** who was a first cousin of President Andrew **Jackson**. They "know" also (problem two) that their **John Crawford** was a cousin of the Andrew **Jackson** who became President.

However, according to a memorandum in the family Bible that belonged to John's

grandchildren, James S. Crawford and his wife, Agnes Sabina Hanna, 1 John Crawford was not a cousin of President Jackson. Thus, many descendants of this John Crawford believe that the memorandum is in error, possibly that a generation was omitted.

The following is a verbatim transcript of the memorandum, except for the underlinings and use of boldface print,

Our Ancestors

Great grandfather

John Crawford and Hannah Anderson
his wife, were Scots who resided in County
Antrim Ireland, were linen manufacturers
owned property there and were in affluent
circumstances. Two sons, James and John, came
to America and Settled in the South. Also two
brothers came to America and Settled in the south.

brothers came to America and Settled in the south.

Grandfather Francis Glass and Agnes Ramsey his wife

Emigrated from County Tyrone Ireland to
America, Settled in North Carolina, from which
they moved to South Carolina, from thence to Illinois

Grand Father John Crawford junior, from County

Antrim Ireland, married Agnes Glass junior
from Tyrone County Ireland, Settled in York
County, South Carolina, emigrated in
1804 to East Tennisee, in 1805 came to
Pope County Illinois, where, their daughter
Agnes Crawford, married George H. Hanna
who, also, was of Scotch Irish descent,
whose Father was John Hanna and
whose mother was Margaret Hamilton
who emigrated to Illinois from East

Tennisee.

NOTE: Underlined portions are those in the memorandum that appear to have been insertions, possibly as editing by the writer at the time of writing or later, or by someone else. However, the handwriting of the underlined portions does appear to be that of the writer of the memorandum. The format and punctuation are as perceived (not always reliable) from the photocopy of the memorandum.

After studying and analyzing the memorandum and transcripts of six other

1. James S[tevens] Crawford and Agnes Sabina Hanna were first cousins. Agnes Sabina was a daughter of Agnes Crawford, daughter of John Crawford and the second wife of George Hamilton Hanna. James S. was the son of William R[amsey?] Crawford, son of John Crawford and brother of Agnes Crawford.

pertinent documents and other publications, your editor's opinion is that

the memorandum is not in error, and

the **John Crawford** in contention -- Grandfather **John Crawford junior** from County Antrim --

was not a cousin of President Andrew Jackson, although he was a first cousin of the James Crawford who was a first cousin of President Jackson; and thereby John Crawford

may have been referred to as cousin by the Crawfords and close friends, a common occurrence at that time.

"Our Ancestors" Memorandum Confirmed By Six Documents

An analysis of six documents confirms the Bible-memorandum, "Our Ancestors," of **John Crawford**'s grandson and granddaughter, **James S. Crawford** and **Agnes Sabena Hanna.** The documents are:

"Autobiographical Sketches" of JCH (John Calvin Hanna (1814-1887), grandson of James Crawford and Christianna White). Written in 1869 and 1870, the sketches were discovered in 1902 among JCH's papers by his daughter, Mrs. S. Isabell Thompson, and typewritten in 1920 by JCH's son, John Calvin Hanna (1855-?), one of four persons living in 1869 bearing that name. [cx633]

"Frontier Life," an unknown-date article written by Rev. **John Crawford** (1804-1878), son of **John Crawford and Agness Glass**, and published in the Golconda, IL, Herald-Enterprise newspaper. [cx373j]

"The Crawford Family," an unpublished, 1905 manuscript by J.E.Y. Hanna (1837-?), grandson of John Crawford and Agnes Glass. [cx373k]

"Estate of **John Crawford**, a document recorded 16 August 1833 in Pope Co., IL. Deed Book A, p. 500. [cx325p5/14]

Bible record of Agnes S. Crawford (1831-1930), nee Hanna. [v10n2p28/cx1085]


"John Crawford 1761-1833." a biography published c1870 in a Presbyterian Church paper, probably written by John's son, the Rev. John Crawford. [cx287]

The pertinent Crawford-Hanna relationships recorded in these six documents and the Bible memorandum are shown on the chart opposite.

From "Autobiographical Sketches of JCH (John Calvin Hanna (1814-1887), the most significant items of information are:

Col. John Crawford

emigrated from Scotland(?) to PA



Since John Crawford (c1761-1833) and James Crawford (c1755-1816) were first cousins and their mothers were not sisters, it follows that they had the same Crawford grandfathers.

Robert, Joseph, and James Crawford were sons of Col. John Crawford according to several published versions of the heritage of these Crawfords. The version shown here, the earliest known, is from Jos. G. Wardlaw's 1910-compilation of the <u>Genealogy of the Witherspoon Family</u> in which Wardlaw states:

This branch of the Crawford family did not move to the Northern part of Ireland and sail from some port in that country, but remained in their native land until they came direct from Scotland to Pennsylvania. . . . Robert, James and Joseph, sons of Col. Crawford, of Pennsylvania, moved to the Waxhaws, now Lancaster County, S. C., about 1760, where the two former lived and died. Joseph is supposed to be the same as Joel, who settled first in Edgefield, SC, and then moved to Georgia and became the father of the great William H. Crawford, so distinguished in the affairs of Georgia.

Wardlaw's supposition that Joseph is the Joel of Edgefield, SC, and then of GA, is surely in error. That Joel was a descendant of John Crawford, c1643 immigrant to VA. See THE CRAWFORD EXCHANGE v9n1p4 per the 1883 publication, Laurus Crafurdania, by Robert Leighton Crawford (1841-7).

Wardlaw claims that Robert Crawford was born in PA (Witherspoon Genealogy, p. 53). But Wardlaw then states that in the opinion of Judge George McCottry Witherspoon (1812–1898) (husband of Robert's granddaughter, Eliza Jane Crawford (1820–1909)) Col. John Crawford "came from Ireland, and that Major Robert was born in Ireland." All of the documentary evidences used for this article confirm that opinion.

Little credence is given to the claim that James Crawford, uncle of President Jackson, was born in NC and was the New River, NC, James Crawford. See <u>National Genealogical Society Quarterly</u>, Dec. 1965, p. 251.

FOUR SONS OF COL. JOHN CRAWFORD FROM AYRSHIRE

James Crawford, grandfather of JCH,

was born in Ireland 1755-1758 and came to NC when a young man;

married Christianna White shortly before commencement of the War of Independence;

was a nephew of Elizabeth Jackson, nee Hutchinson, mother of Andrew Jackson, junior; and thereby

was a first cousin of the Andrew **Jackson** who became General and President of the United States.;

was befriended in the Revolutionary War by a British soldier who recognized him as a previous acquaintance in Ireland;

had three sons and six daughters; namely, Col. William White Crawford, Lt. James Lesley Crawford, Rev. Andrew Jackson Crawford, Jane/Jennie Crawford, Sarah/Sallie Crawford, Margaret/Peggy Crawford, Isabella/Ibbie Crawford, Elizabeth/Betsey Crawford, and Henrietta/Harriet Crawford;

had settled in Wilson Co., TN, by 1810;

was the father of **Margaret Crawford**, who in 1810 married George Hamilton **Hanna** (1787-1868) in Wilson Co., TN, and died there in March 1816 after bearing two children, Selina Christianna **Hanna** and JCH;

died in Wilson Co., TN, in March, 1816, during the same week that his wife, Christianna White, and daughter, Margaret Crawford Hanna, died; and

was a first cousin of **John Crawford**, who was the father of **Nancy Crawford**, second wife of JCH's father.

NOTE: JCH mentions that upon the death of James Crawford's aunt, Elizabeth Jackson, that James Crawford was appointed guardian of young Andrew Jackson. Surely the guardian James Crawford was the uncle by marriage of Andrew; that is, the husband of Jennet Hutchinson and father of Andrew's cousin, James Crawford.

NOTE: JCH never gives the name of his sister in his autobiography.

White, Jr., of Rock Hill, SC, writes: Members of the Roddey family, a very prominent family in this area since the early days of the 19th century, descend from one David Roddey. David was a British soldier who served in the Waxhaws during the Revolutionary War. He liked the people and the land of the Waxhaws so much that he returned there after the Revolution. Could David be the British soldier who befriended James Crawford?

John Crawford, first cousin of the above James Crawford,

was born in Ireland;

had seven sons and six daughters;

was the father of **Nancy Crawford**, who was a second cousin of JCH's mother, **Margaret Crawford**, and who also was the second wife of JCH's father, George Hamilton **Hanna**, in Pope Co., IL; and

was the father of William R. Crawford who married (2) JCH's sister, Selina Christianna Hanna in Pope Co., IL.

Agnes Sabina Hanna, oldest daughter of the above George Hamilton Hanna and Nancy Crawford, married a James Crawford and lived in IL.

NOTE: This is the Agnes Hanna and James Crawford whose Bible memorandum, "Our Ancestors," is cited on page 15.

From "Frontier Life by Rev. John Crawford, son of John Crawford, we find that:

Rev. John "was born in South Carolina on the 31st day of January, 1804."

"My father, with his family, left that state in the fall of the same year and struck tent on the bank of the Ohio River, on the Kentucky shore, some two miles below the present site of Carrsville, in the fall of 1805."

". . . my father was an emigrant from Ireland when fully grown. His habits and views being matured. . . . "

"In the Spring of 1808 we left the Kentucky shore and landed on the Illinois side of the Ohio at the mouth of Grand Pierre Creek, some five miles above the present site of Golconda."

In Agnes S. (Hanna) Crawford's Bible we learn:

Agnes S. Hanna was born 22 October 1831.

James S. Crawford was born 15 February 1836.

The Rite of Holy Matrimony was celebrated between **James S. Crawford** of Gallatin Co., IL, and **Agnes S. Hanna** of Pope Co., IL, on the 30th day of July 1861 at the house of G. H. **Hanna** by the Rev. William **Sims** of Golconda, IL.

James S. Crawford died 19 March 1904, aged 68 years and one month.

Agnes S. Crawford died 19 July 1930.

From "The Crawford Family" manuscript of J.E.Y. Hanna's

we read, at the end, (with corrections of misspellings):

The above notes of the Crawford family I obtained the first part from my mother. The second part from church records and from monuments in cemeteries. The third from correspondence with persons who were supposed to know, but whom I could not see personally. Prominent among these was Evelyn Farris, a daughter of George Crawford. The remaining portion I was personally acquainted with the persons and the incidents named in the sketch. I consider each correct so far as written. But the reader will have observed the absence of many dates and of some names who are mentioned. This was written by J.E.Y. Hamma, at Ridgway, Ill. in the year 1905.

The material was copied from the original hand-written notes in the possession of Miss Margaret Hanna, granddaughter of J.E.Y. Hanna, on 1 August 1978, in Pontiac, Illinois by John and Mary Ellen Young.

NOTE: J.E.Y. Hanna's mother was Agnes/Nancy Crawford, daughter of John Crawford and Agnes Glass. George Crawford was a son of John Crawford and Agnes Glass.

Significant observations from "The Crawford Family" memorandum are:

John Crawford, a young man of Scotch descent and weaver by trade, emigrated in the latter half of the 18th century from County Down in the North of Ireland and located in that part of SC known as the Waxhaw settlement.

John Crawford married Agnes Glass and had daughter Agnes, the same name as that of her mother and grandmother.

Daughter Agnes Crawford became the second wife of Geo. H. Hanna, and the writer was the first born of the children.

In the first decade of the 19th century Frances **Glass** with most of his family and his son-in-law, **John Crawford**, moved from SC, and after stopping two years in TN, and one year in KY, reached IL, and located in Pope Co. near the the Ohio River.

John Crawford settled where Grand Pierre Creek empties its waters into the Ohio River, lived there, and raised a large family.

Agnes (Glass) Crawford died in 1832. John Crawford then went to Gallatin Co., IL, to live with his son, Rev. John Crawford. John Crawford died there and was buried in what was known as the Dillard Burying Ground. Agnes was buried in the Glass burying ground. Neither grave can be identified.

John and Agnes Crawford had seven sons and five daughters; namely, James, Francis, John, George, William, Robert, Joseph, Martha, Agnes, Hannah, Mary, and Isabella.

All of the sons of John and Agnes Crawford lived in Gallatin Co., IL, except Francis and George Crawford who lived in KY.

John Crawford, son of John and Agnes Crawford, was an ordained minister and founder of the C.P. Church of Ridgway [IL]. John lies in the Crawford Cemetery which he had laid out on or near where the old Church building stood.

William R. Crawford, son of John and Agnes Crawford, was born 29 June 1800, married (1) Martha Stevens 2 September 1823 and had four daughters and three sons. Martha died 10 June 1851.

William, R. Crawford on 18 September 1852 married (2) Selina C. Hanna, daughter of George H. Hanna. There were no children by Selina.

James Stevens Crawford, sixth child of William Crawford and Martha Stevens, married Agnes Sabina Hanna and lived on a farm in Pope Co., IL.

The "Estate of John Crawford" document reads

On 16 August 1833 ". . . that George Crawford of Livingston County and State of Kentucky, William R. Crawford, John Crawford, Robert S. Crawford, Joseph Crawford, John Bennett, Hannah Bennett, his wife, William Davis and Polly Davis his wife, Isaac N. Hanna and Elenor Hanna his wife of Gallatin county and State of Illinois, Agnes Hanna of Pope County and State aforesaid: And William Mathis and Isabel Mathis his wife of Johnson County and State of Illinois . . . " appoint "our brothers" Francis Crawford of Livingston Co., KY, James Crawford of Gallatin Co., IL, and George H. Hanna of Pope Co., IL, as our attorneys for the estate "of our deceased father, John Crawford . . . "

"John Crawford 1761-1833", a biography, states:

John Crawford was born in County Antrim, North Ireland, c1761 of Scotch parentage.

He emigrated to America in 1782, when but twenty-one years of age, and settled in what is now known as the Waxhaw settlement in South Carolina.

In 1785, he married **Agnes/Nancy Glass**, daughter of Francis **Glass**, with whom he lived for more than fifty [sic] years.

In 1801, he left SC, stopped one year in TN, and moved in 1803 to the East Bank of the Ohio River, about three miles above Golconda, IL.

In 1803 he crossed the river and settled at the mouth of Grand Pierre Creek, which was his home for 26 years.

Of his 12 children, one son and four daughters survive him.

Agnes Hanna, the venerable widow of the late George H. Hanna, has resided in Pope Co. more than 60 years and is the oldest surviving child of the respected pioneer.

ANALYSIS OF THE EVIDENCE

In analyzing the information found in the six documents, one observes that:

Each of the six documents was written at a different point in time by a different person, each of whom would have had a close acquaintance with **John Crawford** junior of County Antrim, Ireland.

Although minor differences may be found in the dates for some events recorded by JCH, J.E.Y. Hanna, Rev. John Crawford, Agnes (Crawford) Hanna, James Stevens Crawford, and Agnes Sabina (Hanna) Crawford, there are no differences of significant facts.

Seemingly valid conclusions to be drawn from the evidence are:

John Crawford, husband of Agnes Glass,

was born in Ireland c1761;

emigrated to SC c1782;

was first cousin of James Crawford, husband of Christianna White;

was a son of **John Crawford and Hannah Anderson** of Ireland and was one of two of their sons who came to America and settled in the South; and

was not a first cousin of President Andrew **Jackson** in strict sense, but at that time may very likely have been called "cousin" by other Waxhaw Crawfords.

James Crawford, husband of Christianna White,

was born in Ireland c1755-1758;

was a son of James Crawford and Jennet Hutchinson, the latter a sister of Elizabeth Jackson, nee Hutchinson;

was a first cousin of President Andrew Jackson;

was a first cousin of **John Crawford** junior of County Antrim, Ireland; and therefore

was a nephew of John Crawford and Hannah Anderson of Ireland.

Thus the Bible memorandum of **James S. Crawford** and his wife, **Agnes Sabina Hanna** is confirmed. No generation was skipped and grandfather **John Crawford** was not a cousin of President Andrew **Jackson**.

ACCOUNTING FOR UNACCOUNTED CRAWFORDS

Of the two sons and two brothers of "great-grandfather John Crawford" mentioned in the Bible memorandum as having come "to America and settled in the south," only one is specifically identified among the six documents; namely, son "grandfather John Crawford junior of County Antrim, Ireland." No clue was found as to the second son, James Crawford, named in the memorandum.

As for the two unnamed brothers of "great-grandfather **John Crawford**," we can only speculate how **James S. Crawford** and **Agnes Sabena Hanna** knew of those facts and why they stated that only two came rather than three.

Only two likely ways come to mind for how the Bible-information would have been passed down to James S. and Agnes Sabena. One is by the Crawford-Hanna relationship -- JCH's parents, Margaret Crawford and George H. Hanna. The second, more likely, is from "grandfather John Crawford to his children William R. Crawford and Agnes Crawford, respective parents of James Stevens Crawford and Agnes Sabena Hanna.

Events that we are aware of are:

brothers Robert and Joseph arrived by 1763 and acquired Waxhaw lands;² brother James reportedly did not arrive in thw Waxhaw until 1765;³ and brother Joseph probably either died or moved away by 1768 when brother James acquired title to Joseph's land.⁴

Brothers Robert and James were "knowns" to "grandfather John." When John arrived in the Waxhaw c1782, uncle Robert was there. Uncle James may have been deceased but John may have been involved in settling the estate. Uncle Joseph, however, was a possible unknown. He left Ireland either before John was born (c1761) or before John was old enough to have remembered him. When John arrived in the Waxhaw, Joseph was either deceased or had moved away. Robert and James are probably the two brothers referred to in the Bible.

However, regardless of who the two brothers were, the validity of the Bible memorandum is sustained.

Thus the Hannas probably had no acquaintance with Robert, Joseph, nor JCH's own great-grandparents, James Crawford and Jennet Hutchinson, none of whom are mentioned in Hanna documents.

HUGH CRAWFORD, FRONTIERSMAN1

Hugh Crawford's trading on the frontiers began in 1739. After that he was seldom in one place. For three decades Hugh was merchant, traveler, warrior in General Forbe army, counselor, prisoner, and rescuer of himself from French and Indian hands. In KY in 1751 he turned over two mastodon's teeth discovered along Big Bone Lick to Gist, surveyor for the Onio Co. of VA. He was at Pickawillany on the Big Miami [River] in 1748 and at the Lower Shawnee Town (Chillicothe, OH, today) in 1752.

The first settler to have a warrant for a tract near the Standing Stone on the Juniata near Huntingdon, PA, Hugh conveyed that tract to Croghan in 1760. In 1767 he was an invaluable aid to Mason and Dixon as they surveyed the PA-MD boundary. At death in 1770, he bequeathed a tract of land called "Crawford's Sleeping Place, on Youghiogheny River, twenty miles above Fort Pitt."

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


COVER DESIGN: By Jean Dougherty Whisler

COAT OF ARMS: Of the 21 Crawford/Craufurd/Crawfurd families listed in Burke's The General Armory of England. Scotland and Wales. 16 incorporate "Gules, a fess ermine" in their coats of arms, with or without quartering or other variations.

Gules is red, and is designated by vertical lines. A fess is the horizontal band occupying the center one-third of the shield. Ermine, an armorfal fur. is white with black "spots."

The 12 creats on the left and bottom sides of the cover represent 23 of the 33 Crawford families listed in Fairbairn's Creats of the Leading Families in Great Britain and Ireland. While creats are generally unique to a specific family, the coat of arms as represented here can probably be considered "generic" for the name Crawford.

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EDITOR'S PAGE

Thanks to voluminous contributions of CRAWFORD materials by some EXCHANGE members, your curiosity will not be piqued in this issue by ahnentafels. I apologize for not defining the term in the previous issue. Ahnentafel is the German word for ancestor table (ahnen-tafel). I have seen the term in other publications and thought it was in our English dictionary. But when the inquiries started coming in, I checked again, only to find that I had used our German-English dictionary. Anyway, now you know that an ahnentafel is only another form of the conventional pedigree chart. The advantage of the ahnentafel is possible conservation of space. Space can be conserved in three ways: first by more compact arrangement of data; second, by omission of data that are extraneous to CRAWFORD interests; and third, by not using a preprinted form that will have blank space whenever the information is unknown.

Thanks also to all who returned the survey enclosed with the previous issue. Liking "all of it" was the most common comment on what was 'liked best.' Consequently, there were essentially no responses on what was 'least helpful.' Suggestions to make the EXCHANGE more useful were spotty. On specific 'likes', lineages were listed twice as often as the next most liked categories; namely, bio-abstracts and queries. Book reviews, ahnentafels, and 'documentation' were a close third. The expanded content, even at the higher subcription rate, was favored 15 to 1. So the size of this issue will be the new norm—it can be mailed first class without an envelope for 39¢ postage when bulk mail cannot be used. Also note the corresponding price changes on the inside front cover. However, new subscribers that are prompt can still take advantage of the old rate by returning the accompanying enclosure with payment postmarked by January 15, 1988.

For those who suggested more family group sheets and pedigree charts, please evaluate these two items versus the <u>lineage</u>, <u>bio-abstract</u>, and the <u>family</u> articles. I think you will find articles of this format give you as much information (often more), and use less space than either family group sheets or pedigree charts. Then there was the amusing one: Don't be too "legal" and spoil a good hobby. Touche! But please treat thy peers kindly and, whenever possible, provide the sources of the information you submit, and, do be as complete as you can on places, dates, etc.

Some respondents expressed a desire to include a broader geographic area. I, too, would like to include coverage of Ireland and Canada, but I fear the dilution factor may be too great for a periodical of such limited size and frequency as the EXCHANGE is. Perhaps a companion Canadian EXCHANGE would be a better solution. However, I will continue to include all known Canadian/Irish/Scottish/whatever background information for Crawfords that immigrated to the U.S. before 1900.

Limited size and frequency of publication also hinder including much "how to" as some suggested. Perhaps this need can be partially met by editor's notes such as the one with Moses Crawford on page 27. More extensive dissertation might be included on the back cover when space permits and the information is

The previous issue of THE CRAWFORD EXCHANGE gave one lineage of the John CRAWFORD who immigrated c1643 to Virginia from Scotland. Helen Boswell has submitted information to Gayle Blakenship on the ancestry of John back to one of the Barons that forced King John to meet in 1215 to redress their grievances. At that historical meeting on the fields of Runnymede, "the great document of human liberty, the Magna Charta, was forced from King John."

Gayle has submitted information which gives source documentation that a Sarah CRAWFORD was the daughter of David CRAWFORD of New Kent Co., VA, and son of John; that David was a member of the House of Burgesses; that Sarah married (1) Thomas Poindexter and (2) James Brechin; and that Sarah's sister, Elizabeth, married Nicholas Meriwether.

Sources of the information are given in <u>Poingdestre-Poindexter/A Norman Family</u> by John Poindexter Landers (Library of Congress #77-9057), p. 94-95. Sources given are: <u>Journal</u> of the Virginia House of Burgess, pp. 14 <u>et seq.</u> [Ed.: Presumably the journal of 1692-3]; Will Books of Louisa County, Virginia, 1753; and deposition recorded in 1765 suit of Snead vs. Poindexter (Thomas Poindexter, Jr., son of Thomas Poindexter, and Sarah CRAWFORD). In the summer of 1767 while surveying the Mason and Dixon line, Mr. Hugh CRAWFORD came as interpreter with "fourteen Indians who were deputized by the Chiefs of the Six Nations to accompany the surveyors along the line to see to it that no entry for survey was made upon lands reserved. . . The line was continued without remarkable incident until the Monongahela was reached . . ." [Ed. note: The location for the Indians and Hugh joining the survey party is mentioned as being along the southern boundary of what is now Fulton Co., PA.]

JOSIAH CRAWFORD, PETITIONER²

"To the Honorable the Representatives of the Freemen of the State of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met July Sessions 1784. The Petition of the Inhabitants of the Western end of Cumberland County Honorably Showeth..." Signed: Josiah CRAWFORD et al

EDWARD CRAWFORD, COUNTY PROTHONOTARY³

Edward CRAWFORD submitted papers August 29, 1782 to the President of the Supreme Executive in application for the new county's Prothonotary office "when the movement to create the new county took shape, and two years before the division was actually accomplished . . . " Edward's papers were received two months after those of the other influential applicant, Colonel James Chambers. "Both of these papers are interesting historical documents, as they recite somewhat in detail the military services performed by the writers." "Both were "men of marked prominence in State and county affairs . . . "General Washington had shown himself a friend to Colonel Chambers . . . Lieut. Crawford, on the other hand, was particularly fortunate in having General Anthony Wayne espouse his cause in the application for the office. Crawford lived in Philadelphia at the time . . . was successful in being chosen for the office . . . He proved a good officer, and his master hand is most manifest in the shaping up of the early records of the county."

JACOB AND GEORGE C. CRAWFORD4

Jacob CRAWFORD, a native of Virginia, came to Zanesville, OH, in 1804. In 1807 he settled at Rushville in Fairfield Co. where he followed the occupation of millwright and built a number of mills. His family consisted of 9 children. He died 1858 in Licking Co., OH.

With more information on Samuel's descendants, we might clear up uncertainties about other Crawfords who passed through or stayed. Can anyone help?]

thought to have broad interest. Where possible, joining a local genealogical society and/or attending local seminars will probably be of greater benefit. Joining a society in the geographical area in which you need to research can often be helpful. If interested, see the July-August issue of the Genealogy Helper for world-wide listings of genealogy societies, libraries, and periodicals.

If you are a beginner and do not have access to a genealogical society, you could send me specific questions on how to solve a research problem. Jean teaches classes in genealogy, and she can probably help. Tell us what you have done and what you have found so far. We will do our best, but don't be impatient if we seem slow in responding. Be sure to enclose an SASE.

One thought has occurred to me. Why can't we perform local research for each other? Some people have more time available or have access to better research facilities than others, but perhaps an EXCHANGE member in Kentucky would be willing to do research in their locale for a California member or vice versa. The membership may have to grow some to have a really effective networking system, but membership is growing, and I'm still working to expand it. Right now there are members in 26 states. Those 26 states are divided almost equally among four regions: eastern seaboard, Applachians to the Mississippi River, the Mississippi to the Rocky Mountains, and the Rockies to the Pacific Ocean. Any one interested? Let me know what you will do with a statement of terms (expenses only, expenses plus fee, negotiable, free, or whatever) and it will be announced in future issues.

Even though several contributions of CRAWFORD materials were everything I could ask -- Suzanne Graves CRAWFORD included CRAWFORD marriage records she copied from her local courthouse -- I am not yet overwhelmed with material for upcoming issues. So keep the CRAWFORD materials flowing and please realize that I cannot thank each of you individually.

The 1862 Historical Atlas of Clinton County, PA has been published by the Clinton County Genealogical Society. While most PA counties had atlases published in the 1860s-1870s, this was not done in Clinton County. The only surviving comparable map from this era was an 1862 wall map, of which only a few known copies are known to exist. The map shows the county as it existed in 1862. Settlements are defined and each individual house, shop, store, and church is identified with names of residents and business persons. The map is a gold mine of genealogical data, showing where individuals lived in proximity to each other, locations of mills and other outbuildings, mining information, and the course of old roads, canals, railroads and more. The current Atlas is printed from this 1862 wall map, divided into sections for each township. In addition, a history of each township, borough, and village up to 1862 is included, comprising many names of early settlers and fascinating events of old Although the maps were resized and enhanced, an accurate scale and compass orientation was included for almost every individual map. Members have compiled an everyname index for the individuals listed on each page in the maps and the histories. Additionally, a subject index has been compiled and includes mills, stores, churches, roads, waterways, topography, and much more, arranged in a topical format. The township maps are supplemented with maps of Clinton County, past and present; maps of PA from 1860 to 1876; and much more. The 1862 Historical Atlas of Clinton County, PA has 100 ledger-size pages and is available for \$40.00, plus \$2 S&H and 6% PA Sales Tax for PA residents only (a total of \$44.52 for PA residents). The Crawfords of Prairie Grove

Dear Mr. Lemke:

As a historian of the Cherokee Nation, a wide field of research is open, but as a member of the Washington County Historical Society, I cannot resist the temptation offered by the very interesting history of Washington County, Arkansas. Your FLASHBACKS are a gem in historical reporting and I feel that I am a part of the early history of that area. To be a good historian, you have to live the part and feel the things that the pioneers felt.

Mrs. Carselowey and I were in Fayetteville recently, where she attended a meeting on Mt. Sequoyah. Needless to say, I couldn't pass the Prairie Grove cemetery without stopping. I returned to Fayetteville on Sunday to bring Mrs. Carselowey home, but again I got in some research at Prairie Grove.

You may or may not have some of the data I found there. If you don't I think your readers will enjoy it.

I found the grave of Hay Crawford, born 1799, died Sept.14, 1838. I am of the opinion that his wife, Susan Harris Crawford, 1802-1877, is buried by his side on the north. At this place is a sandstone marker, with no names or dates that I could see. Hay's stone is a very old sandstone, round top, about 2 feet high, very dim lettering.

Susan Harris Crawford, 1802-1877, wife of Hay Crawford, was the daughter of James and Susan Harris. I found the grave of Susan Harris, which reads "Susan, wife of James Harris", located about 10 feet southwest of Hay Crawford's grave. Hay Crawford, 1799-1838 (Sept. 14, 1838 on the stone - FLASHBACK gives 1839, which is apparently in error if we rely on the tombstone date of 1838) was the son of John Crawford, 1775-1847, and Margaret Buchanan.

Hay Crawford and Susan Harris, his wife, had a daughter, Susan Amelia Crawford, 1833-1879, who married Jacob Preston Carnahan, 1832-1912.

Hay Crawford and Susan Harris had another daughter, Mary Ann Crawford, born Dec. 22, 1822; died July 1, 1824. If I read this stone right, then Mary Ann Crawford who died July 1, 1824 precedes "Priscilla (Percilla) Inman - "died in the spring time 1831. First grave in Prairie Grove" by seven years. Mary Ann Crawford's grave is south of Hay Crawford's grave. Susan Harris, mother-in-law of Hay Crawford, is almost due west, about 10 feet from Mary Ann's grave.

Hay Crawford died in 1838; his wife Susan Harris Crawford died 1877. Thus she lived about 39 years after her husband's death and never remarried, as shown by the following: From FLASHBACK, December 1955, page 7 "Carnahan Memorabilia", which says -- Contract for making one set of marble grave stones, headstone 2 ft high, to be delivered and set up at Prairie Grove 1872. Price #18.00. Maker, C. C. Middleton. Signed, Susan Crawford. The stone was for Mary Ann, daughter of H and S Crawford."

GENERALUGIUME SUULE!

This stone, above mentioned, bought in 1872, can be seen in the Prairie Grove cemetery. The inscription says, "Mary Ann, dau of H and S Crawford, born Dec 22, 1822, died July 1, 1824." Thus we see that Mary Ann was 11 years older than her sister, Susan Amelia Crawford, 1833-1879, who married Jacob Preston Carnahan, 1832-1912. We also see that Susan Crawford, 1802-1877, was age 70 when she contracted for the tombstone for Mary Ann in 1872. This was five years before her death in 1877. By this document it would appear that Susan Harris Crawford never re-married after the death of Hay Crawford in 1838. This is interesting historical data of a prominent family. The grave stone of Susan, wife of James Harris, has no dates. They were the parents of Susan Harris Crawford, 1802-1877, who signed the contract above mentioned.

(Editor's note: At Mr. Carselowey's request, I checked the Mary Ann Crawford gravestone at PrairieGrove. He is right — the death date is July 1, 1824. I made a rubbing of the in-

scription and the 1824 shows up clearly.

(Since there were no Crawfords nor any other settlers at Prairie Grove in 1824, this date presents a mystery. Either the gravestone maker made an error in the date, or, more probable, the mother, at age 70, wanted a memorial marker for her first child who had died before the family came to Arkansas. We would be interested to hear from any of the Crawford descendants. -- WJL

Who Were the Hendrys?

Our Society has received a collection of correspondence that we are unable to identify. Three small envelopes carrying social invitations are addressed to Miss Mary Hendry. One is dated Feb. 25, 1865. The others are undated.

There are two letters, franked with British stamps and dated Aberdeen 1879 and 1880. They are addressed to Mrs. John Clancy, Fayetteville, Arkansas. Both letters begin "My dear Niece" and are signed "Janet Hendry." The letters tell of hard times in Scotland.

Two letters, signed Leila G., were written at Planterville, May 26, 1885 and Hope, Ark., Feb. 15, 1893. One is addressed to "Mrs. Clancy, My Dear Friend" and the other "My dear Miss Mollie." There is no clue to the identity of "Leila G." except that she was teaching school in south Arkansas and planning to get married July 8, 1885. The letters suggest that she was writing to her old teacher in Fayetteville. Names mentioned include Ben Perry, Ida Perry Patton, Julia Ryan, Ellie, and others.

If any of our readers can give us information about the Hendry and Clancy families, we will be grateful.
