My grandmother was McCartha Maybelle Dalton, daughter of Zebulon Vance Dalton and Julie Evelyn Elliott. The name DALTON always intrigued me because of the mystique of the Dalton Gang of the Old West. In fact, the older family members used to claim kin with those infamous outlaws.

Long before I realized the importance of DOCUMENTING MY SOURCES, I came into possession of a two page paper, handwritten entitled THE DALTON OUTLAWS. I wish I could credit the writing to someone but cannot. I share the paper with you.

Dalton Outlaws

Frank was murdered by Whiskey runners on Sunday morning in November 1887. He was a marshal working for Judge Isaac Parker in the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations of what would become Oklahoma. He was a real good officer. He was a Hero.

Gratton Dalton joined after Frank was murdered.

Emmett Dalton was sworn in at age 16 for peace officer.

Bob and Gratton were shot dead in 1892. Bill was gunned down by a marshall's posse in 1894.

Emmett went to prison in 1892.

All the notorious boys were killed except Emmett he went to prison. Then Bill decided to get him a Gang of young men and make another outllaw Gang. He was gunned down by a posse in

1894. Emmett wrote a book on the Outlaw Gang. He wrote it just like it happened and used cuss words and vulgar words too. The name of the book is THE DESPERADOES.

[Note: this is the end of the two page handwritten paper about the Dalton Gang. I often wondered if there were not some connection to my Daltons because of the name of one of the children: Littleton Dalton. The name Littleton was one used in the family and was unusual enough to be significant.]

By using GENFORUM I learned the names of the children and the maiden name of the mother. In a posting dated 17 Aug 1998, Rhonda Dalton Parker suggested that one go to the Kansas State site and click on outlaws. It gives a history of the Daltons. She says that James Lewis Dalton was the son of Benjamin Dalton and Nancy Rabourn. Nancy's father was Henry Rabourn. Benjamin was one of five brothers living in Virginia who all went separate directions. James Lewis Dalton married Adeline Younger. [Was she related to the Younger Gang of outlaws?] They had 15 children: Benjamin, Littleton, Gratton, William, Franklin, Charles, Eva, Leona, Henry, Nannie, Robert, Emmett, Simon and two other unidentified daughters.

In an article written by Joe DePriest for the SHELBY DAILY STAR dated 19 Jan 1981, Joe interviewed Fannie Laughter of Spindale concerning the 'outlaws hanging on her family tree.' Mrs. Fannie Laughter was the daughter of W. C. Dalton of the Bill's Creek area of Rutherford County, NC. All her life she had heard stores of those outlaws. They were descended from the Missouri branch of the family. Mrs. Laughter used to live in Oklahoma and had visited the den of the outlaws. She even talked to a woman who fed the gang when they were in the area. Fannie planned to visit her brother Guy Dalton who lived in Quinton, OK. [I wonder if she ever did?]

Joe gave a little more information about Emmett, the last of the original gang. He changed from being an outlaw to being a respectful contractor in California. He died there in 1937. Mr. DePriest recommended that anyone interested in that era of the Old West read the book: THE AUTHENTIC WILD WEST: THE OUTLAWS by historian James Horan.

As I stated earlier, my great grandfather was Zebulon Vance Dalton. Zeb was the son of Alfred Anderson Dalton and Mary Catherine 'Owenby' Murphy. I put Owenby in apostrophes because the story is that she was not the daughter of W. A. B. Murphy, but that he was paid to marry her mother Zilla Owenby when Zilla discovered she was in the family way by a married man named 'Squire' Tom Ledbetter. How much of this is true, I do not know. It was told and retold throughout the family. W. A. B. Murphy was supposed to have had a son by another woman. The boy was named James Fagan. So Zilla and W. A. B. started off married life with children by someone other than their spouse. Hummm!

Zeb's sister Dora Adelia Dalton wrote a short 2 ½ page memoir of some of the Daltons. This memoir came to me from the son of my grandmother's sister Letty Frady of Bills Creek.

Memories of Dara Dalton Owenby

92 on Sep 5 1966

"Alfred and Mary Dalton moved from Cedar Creek Rutherford Co., NC to Bald Mountain in March 1882. Their daughter Jane Dalton Nanney lived in the old Dalton Homestead a few years. Zeb Dalton being single at that time stayed on with them. Zeb married Julie Elliott that year 1882. The Nanneys moved to Bald Mountain the next year 1883. Zeb lived on at the Old Homestead where Charlie Dalton was born. Charlie being the second child. The first born dying at birth and buried at Stone Mountain church yard.

"Zeb Dalton moved to Bald Mountain in the fall of 1884 and settled in the Old Log house at the Old Mill and Shoal where Lewis Davis now owns. Here Carrie Dalton Hall was born. Later Zeb moved back to Cedar Creek living one year on his Father in Law (Jonse Elliotts) place.

"He moved back to Bald Mountain the next year living in a house a few hundred feet from the Bald Mountain Church or where it now stands. Here Lettie and Odie were born. Here Charlie had a little black dog named "Punches" he thought the world off. A big old cur dog belonging to a neighbor killed Little "Punches". Charlie was heart broken. He built a pen out of Chestnut rails around his grave which was there over 25 years later. Zeb then bought the place over near Bobs Gap still known as the "Zeb Place". Here Winnie was born (1900). Here Zeb's wife Julie died (1901). Later Zeb sold this place to his mother Mary C. Dalton (Granny Kate) and in the fall of 1906 moved to Purkins Town (Chimney Rock). Charlie having married moved some time earlier that year to Chimney Rock. Zeb went to work at Black Mountain in 1907 working different jobs and here while waiting for a train to go to a job, Lost his life by being struck by a shifting engine. This happened Sep 17, 1907. By coincidence his wife Julia died six years before on Sep 17 1901."

Zeb owned a violin which belonged to W. A. B. Murphy. Family tradition says that W. A. B. joined the navy at age 15 and served 10 years. While he was serving in the Navy an officer gave Brutus the violin. Zeb learned to play it from an old German man in the area who wanted Zeb's parents to send him to Europe to study music. He could play all kinds of music. The violin descended through Zeb's oldest child..

Alfred Anderson Dalton was the son of David and Rutha Davis Dalton. David was the son of Thomas and Elizabeth Morris Dalton. Thomas was the son of David Dalton, Sr. and an unknown spouse. Rutha Davis was the daughter of Meshack and Lydia Bentley Davis. Elizabeth Morris was the daughter of John and Martha Powell Morris. John Morris may have been killed at the battle of Kings Mountain.

Alfred Anderson Dalton was born 30 Jan 1828 in Burke co., NC and died 21 Feb 1898 on Bald Mountain. He married Mary Catherine Owenby Murphy on 22 May 1853 in McDowell co., NC. She was born 5 Mar 1836 in Burke co., NC and died 10 Oct 1922 in Chimney Rock, NC. Alfred

and Mary Kate are both buried in the Bald Mountain Baptist Church cemetery. They had thirteen children:

1. Infant Son who died at birth and is buried on the lower end of Logan Mountain.
2. Nancy Elmira 'Molly' Dalton born 5 Jun 1845, died 3 Feb 1911. She married John Smart Lytle 8 Oct 1876 in McDowell co., NC. They had 9 children.
3. William Hensley Dalton born 27 Mar 1853; died 10 Oct 1863 in a cane mill accident.
4. Zilla Louisa Dalton born 8 Jan 1856; died 25 Nov 1933. Married James Davis and had 7 children.
5. William Dalton was born Dec 1858 and married Nancy J. Davis. Nothing more is known.
6. Martha "Matt" Marilda Dalton was born 10 Mar 1859 and died 12 Aug 1954. She married William L. Davis and had 11 children.
7. Zebulon Vance Dalton born 27 Jul 1862 and died 17 Sep 1907 married Julie Evelyn Elliott and had 5 children.
8. Maudy Amanda Jane Dalton born 1 Feb 1865; died 23 Jan 1926; married Benjamin Logan Nanney and had 5 children.
9. Sarah Ruth Ann "Coot" Dalton was born 10 Apr 1867 and died 1 Dec 1935. She married William H. Hudgins and had one daughter.
10. Christopher Columbus Charles Dalton born 6 Dec 1868; died 10 Jan 1962; married Sarah Ann Early and had 14 children.
11. John W. Dalton was born 10 May 1872; died 22 Oct 1953; married Carrie M. L. L. Wilson and had 9 children.
12. Dara Adelia Dalton born 5 Sep 1874; died 29 May 1970; married Oscar Lee Owenby and had 4 children.
13. Thomas S. Dalton born Oct 1879 and died May 1880. He is buried on Cedar Creek.

Zebulon Vance and Julie Elliott Dalton's children were:

1. Charles Maryland Dalton (1883-1959) married Daisy Dacy Marlow and had 10 children.
2. McCartha Maybelle Dalton (1886-1979) married James Alexander Hall and had 10 children.
3. Lois Lettie Dalton (1891-1976) married Lon Elijah Frady and had 5 children.
4. Laura Oda Dalton (1894-1995) was unmarried, but rumor has it that she had one son.
5. Winnie Belle Dalton (1900-1994) was also unmarried. She lived with the family of Coot and William Hudgins because her father died so soon. Coot and Bill had only one daughter Ida. Winnie and Ida lived together all their lives.

Thomas DALTON of Rutherford of the State of North Carolina who was a private in the company commanded by Captain Hampton of the Reg't commanded by Col. Porter in the North Carolina Line for 12 months – private.

Inscribed on the Roll of North Carolina at the rate of 40 Dollars 00 Cents per annum to commence on the 4th day of March 1831.

Certificate of Pension issued the 22nd day of October 1835 and sent to T. F. Birchett, Rutherfordton.

State of North Carolina { On this 16th day of July ---- 1834 personally appeared in open Rutherford County } court before the Justices of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions now Sitting Thomas Dalton aged 73 years a Resident of the United States in the County of Rutherford and State of North Carolina who being duly Sworn According to law doth on his Oath make the following Declaration in Order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed the 7th of June 1832 Sayeth that he entered the Service of the United States and served under the following named Officers and Served as herein Stated.

In the year 1789 my Mother and family moved from Albemarl County State of Virginia to Rutherford County N. Carolina. I was then in my 17th year of Age. My Brothers all engaged in the War of the Revolution. I soon after our landing Joined a Volunteer company ^ of Cavalry under the command of Capt. Adam Hampton early in the Spring of 1780. I served a Tower of 3 months under Capt. Adam Hampton and Col. Andrew Hampton. I was kept owt as one of the Spys on the lines to guard the fronteers against the Indians. I was Discharged and Returned home but when I came there Ferguson and his Army was Stationed within 2 Miles of my Mothers. The Company was kept together to Annoy his Army. We followed his Rear and cut of his Straglers on to the head of Cane Creek where they had a Scrimage with the Burke Troops. They then from that place Retreatedback. We was in the Rear but Now changed to the front. We parlied before them we Annoyed them and Scattered there Out posts and Foraging parties and Took from them our Support This Service lasted at least 3 months before i got home when I came in the Neighbourhood of my Mothers all was confusion. Capt. McClain was beating up for volunteers to guard the Frontiers. I Joined him and Served 3 months. We was kept on the out post and Fronteers and had work Differently with the Indians and Tories after our Time was Out we Returned home soon after my Return I was a volunteer under Capt McClain and Served 3 months at Waddle and russells Forts and on the lines as an Indian Spy. I then returned home we was principally under the Orders of Col. Hampton and Col. McDowell the last Service Col. Miller

had the command. This Service was performed in the Years of 1780 and 1781. I cannot State the precise months but I will Remember the years. I know I did not Serve less than the four Towers [tours] mentioned above and not less than 3 months at each Time which maked 12 months that I Served During the Revolutionary War and for which Service I claim a pension. I hereby relinquish every claim to a Pension except the present and Declares that his name is not on the Pension roll of the Agency of any States whatsoever.

Question 1st by the courts Where and in what year were you born?

Answer from Information I was born in Albemarl County State of Virginia in the year 1763.

Question 2nd Have you any record of your age and if so where it is?

Answer The Record of the Ages of the family was kept by one of my Sisters after the Death of my Mother.

Question 3rd Where were you living when called into Service where have you lived Since the Revolutionary War and Where do you live now?

Answer I was living in Rutherford County N Carolina at the Time I Entered the Service where I have Resided ever Since.

Question 4th How were you called into Service were you Drafted did you Volunteer or were you a Substitute and if a substitute for whom?

Answer I was a Volunteer and Served at every call as above Stated.

Question 5 State the Names of Some of the Regular Officers who were with the Troops where you Served such as continental and Militia Ridgments as you can Recollect and the General circumstances as you can Recollect.

Answer I have given as full a Detail of my Service above as my memory will Justify...

Question 6th Did you ever Receive a discharge and if so by whom was it Signed?

Answer I do not Recollect that I was ever Discharge from the Service. I was attached to Volunteer companies alway ready and very seldom got leave to Return home when we thought our time was Out.

Question 7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighbourhood and who can Testify as to your charactor for veracity and good behaviour your Services as a Revolutionary soldier.

Answer The Reveerend Hamptons Patterson and Johnston Ledbetter, Esqr.

Amended declaration Thomas Dalton a soldier in the War of the Revolution.

This declarant states now, as in his original declaration (accompanying) that he removed in 1780 with his Mother and family from Virginia to rutherford County. Upon reaching this county, then but a lad, he found himself in a community, a large portion of whom were adherets

to the British Cause openly, and [illegible] covertly, waiting only for the approach of the British army to act out their preference, on the one hand, and on the other, the Cherokee Indians seperated [illeg.] by the Blue ridge, distant only about 18 or twenty miles from my residence. In this situation, it became necessary to attach myself to the one or the other part at once. The vicinity of the Indians and the expectation of the approach of the British gave Spirit to the Tories as they were then called, and brought into action almost the entire physical force of the Country. I attached myself after the example of my brothers to the Whig side, and joined a company of Horsemen under the command of Capt. Adam Hampton of the regular Militia of this state and thing, whose commission was afterwards taken by the British under Fergerson amongst other plunder from the house of Capt Alexr. McFaddens, which they threatened to burn, he at the time being in it in bed sick, Capt Hamptons Company under the superior Command of col. Andrew Hampton was stationed or garrisoned at Pott's Station, Russells Station, and Waddleton's Station all in this county. At the last of which I was at the time it was attacked by a body of Indians and Tories; we made good our defence and the enemy withdrew, but being of two Superior force we did not dare to follow them out for battle.--- I served a tour of three months in the service and was discharged, without any written evidence of it however, and came home to my Mothers. Upon arriving at home [illeg.] confusion and alarm existed in the county, occasioned by the arrival of Ferguson who was then encamped in two miles of my mothers with his army. The company of Capt Hampton was immediately raised and called on again to assist in the distraction of Fergusons army. We followed on his rear cutting off his scouts and foraging parties till information was received of the approach of assistance from the west; we then passed Fergusons army and marched to meet our expected help which we did not do until we marched over the Yellow Mountain where we met a considerable force under Command of Col. Sevier. The army then marched on toward this county to meet Fergerson who, in the mean time had been met near the borders of Burke County by probably some troops from that county, and after a sharp skirmish had returned or retreated back towards South Carolina; Upon reaching my neighborhood, my time being expired I have over the pursuit and stopped; after a Service of three months, which as well as I can recollect was in the month of September 1780 on reaching home I found much confusion produced by the energy of the Tories and Indians who had become both on account of the presence and half which they relied upon from Ferguson and his army. Capt. John McClain an officer of this state and a valuable man and Whig, was indeavoring to raise a force under the command and order of his superior officers Col. Robert Porter to attack and dispose them. I joined him as a volunteer and served a tour of three months at the stations above named and had much difficulty with the Indians — this service terminated sometime in January or February 1781. I cannot distinctly give the day, but remember well of being in the garrison at Waddletons when information came there of the defeat of Tarleton at Cowpens by Morgan.

Not being able to state the time when my last tour expired [illeg] I am unable to state of what day My fourth [illeg] at tour comminced, but am certain that it was very close upon the end of the third tour. The Indians, the open and known ally of the British, aided by the Tories yet seeking the ?wattery? of the country it was indespensible to prevent it, to keep constantly on foot, an adequate organized force. Captain McClain therefore, under command of Col. James Miller

was endeavoring to raise a Company. I being young and ardent, and as in all my past service, disdaining to be called out by the compulsory process of a draft, and still [illeg] to loss of the [illeg] of my Country, against volunteers for these months, q large portion of which time I spend in garrison at Waddletons (miscalled Waddles Fort in my original declaration) and Russell's station, and was once marched out to the line of So. Carolina and back, the object of which if I then knew, I have now forgotten.--- This service, four tours of three months each, makes all together twelve months, though I served a longer time, for which I ask a pension ---- it was performed in 1781 and 1782.

The Revolutionary warfare of this portion of the Country was peculiar in its circumstances. Immediately in the vicinity of the British Indian ally, having a large portion of the whites disaffected to the Whig cause, it was necessary to keep the Whigs in almost constant action, and gives to the history of their services something of a vagrant or desultory character — owing as before stated to the fact that it was at home and amongst our own people that our services were performed and required by [illeg] the superior officers of the State, who were then in active service.

That her husband the afore said Thomas Dalton died on the nineteenth of February eighteen hundred and forty one, that she was married to him prior to his having the service, that the marriage took place prior to the first of January of seventeen hundred and ninety four at the time above stated.

Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim W.6983 it appears that Thomas Dalton was born in Albemarle County, VA and early in 1780 moved with his mother, name not given, to Rutherford County, NC. He was born in 1763.

While a resident of Rutherford County, NC, he enlisted in the spring of 1780 and served six months as a spy in Captain Adam Hampton's Company, Col. Andrew Hampton's and McDowell's NC Regiment.

He enlisted again in 1780 and served three months as spy in Captain John McClain's Company, Colonel Robert Porter's NC Regiment.

He enlisted in 1781 and served three months in Captain John McClain's Company, Colonel James Miller's NC Regiment. He was in the battles of Cane Creek and Waddleton's Station.

He was allowed pension on his application executed July 16, 1834 while a resident of Rutherford County, NC where he had lived ever since the revolution. He died February 19, 1841.

Soldier married February 27, 1789 in Rutherford County, NC, Elizabeth Morris. She was allowed pension on her application executed August 9, 1843 while a resident of Rutherford Co., NC aged seventy-three years. No children referred to.

Herewith is returned your money order for one dollar drawn to the order of the War Department. No charge is made for this service.

The above history is that of the only soldier named Thomas Dalton found on the Rev. War records of this Bureau, Except that of Thomas Valentine Dalton, whose history was furnished you.

5.1. Jacob Manni/Manny. According to the Jacob Manni/Mauney entry on page 293 of *German Speaking People*, Jacob Manny died March 18, 1725, at Diedendorf Reformed Church in Alsace, and he was from Dotzigan, Canton Bern, Switzerland. *Eighteenth Century Emigrants from the Northern Alsace*, by Annette K. Burgert, is the source of this information, including information from Diedendorf Reformed Church records. All we really know about Jacob Manni/Manny is that he appears to be the father of Hans Jacob Manni. Manny is the German spelling of the family name, while Manni is the French spelling. Since he died in Alsace, where French is the dominant language, I have elected to show Manni as the dominant spelling of his family name and Manny as the alternative.

According to my 1968 edition of the *Encyclopedia American*, Alsace was a province of France until it was divided into the departments of Bas-Rhin, Haut-Rhin, and the Territory of Belfort. It is situated between the Vosges Mountains on the west and the Rhine River on the east. The long border with Germany along the Rhine and on the north was often the scene of conflict between France and Germany. Canton Bern is one of the largest cantons (states) in Switzerland, while the city of Bern is the capital of Switzerland.

According to my *Encyclopedia American*, the Reformation began in Germany through the work of Martin Luther, who became an Augustinian monk and practiced all the austerities of the order. Through his study of the New Testament, he came to the belief that a man is justified by faith in Jesus Christ. He became a professor at the University of Wittenberg and preached in that city. On October 31, 1517, he posted his 95 theses and challenged the indulgence seller, Tetzel, to a debate. This brought him into conflict with papal authorities. After he was excommunicated, he became the leading spirit in the German Reformation. He also married. The feelings between Catholics and Lutherans became so bitter that war broke out. The war was settled by the Peace of Augsburg in 1555, which settled the ecclesiastical question in Germany for nearly a hundred years.

Meanwhile a similar movement was going on in Switzerland under the leadership of Ulrich Zwingli. The Lutheran and Swiss reformatory views were similar, and their leaders had a conference at Marburg in 1529. They agreed on all points except on the Lord's Supper. The followers of Zwingli looked on it as a memorial, while the Lutherans insisted upon the literal sense of the words, "This is my body." The great growth of Protestantism in France came after the Frenchman, John Calvin, became master of Geneva and made that city the center of the Reformed Branch of Protestantism. Frenchmen went to Geneva and returned to their homeland to distribute copies of the New Testament and to preach, knowing they risked their lives by doing so. The persecuted Christians were organized into churches under the direction of Calvin. The Presbyterian system was established and, even in the days of persecution, a national organization was effected.

Presbyterian refers to a form of church government as well as the group of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches. Presbyterian as a form of representative church government consisted of church elders (officers) including pastors, teachers, elders, and deacons that governed individual churches and consistories that governed groups of churches. In Geneva the consistory consisted of the ministers (teaching elders) and 12 elders chosen by the civil magistrates from among their own number to

THE DALTON BROTHERS OF EARLY AZUSA, CALIFORNIA

by Wendy L. Elliott, C.G.

Two of the earliest English settlers in the Los Angeles Basin were two sons of Winall DALTON from London, Middlesex County. (1) Deeds on file in Los Angeles County, California, show that Henry DALTON purchased land as early as 1846, (2) before the state was admitted to the Union.

He continued buying and selling land over the next forty years. He owned property on Spring, Main, and Third streets in present-day downtown Los Angeles, but the majority of his holdings was in the area of present-day Azusa. Before he died "at Los Angeles City" on 21 January 1884, he owned over 12,000 acres. (3) Henry had problems preserving the rights to some of his land, and at the time of his death two law suits were pending. The first was with the State of California and the second was with the Republic of Mexico.

Even after his death there was contention over his property. Several suits were filed in the Superior Court of Los Angeles as his off-spring and their heirs contested the handling of his estate by the executrix, their mother, Maria Guadalupe Zamorana de DALTON. Guadalupe handled the inherited property through 1909 when matters were finally settled. Among the various documents included in the probate package was a copy of the Azusa city taxes paid by Guadalupe in 1909. (4)

The will of Henry DALTON, filed in Los Angeles, 18 February 1884, reads as follows: (5)

In the name of God, Amen.

Henry's brother, George Dalton, Senior, died on 9 January 1892 also at Los Angeles. His estate was filed for probate in Los Angeles on 2 February 1892; the case closed on 1 June 1894.(6) When the inventory was taken, 4 February 1892, it was shown that George has real estate valued at \$20,000, personal property valued at \$4,000 (located in several banks), and household goods valued at \$1,050.

George's will was filed on 2 February 1892 in Los Angeles and reads as follows:

In the name of God, Amen! I, George Dalton, Senior, of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, do hereby make and publish this my last will and testament, in the manner following, to wit:

---First---

I do hereby revoke any and all wills and codicils by me heretofore made.

---Second---

I do declare that I have the following children and none other, to wit: Elizabeth, wife of Wm. H. Perry; Mary A. Crum, wife of Joseph D. Crum; Josephine S., wife of Charles Victor Hall; George J. Dalton; Wimall (sic) T. Dalton; Edwin H. Dalton; Mattias M. Dalton

---Third---

The said George J. Dalton, Wimall (sic) T. Dalton; Edwin H. Dalton and Mattias M. Dalton, having already received what I consider their just proportion of my estate, take nothing under this will, and are to have no part of my estate.

---Fourth---

WISCONSIN STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY LIBRARY

The State Historical Society Library has one of the better genealogical collections in the country. Nearly one-fifth of the entire collection, now more than a million items, deals with family or local history. Books and pamphlets concerned with the history of every state in the Union as well as collective and individual American genealogies are included. These latter range alphabetically from the name Aaken to that of Zuber. The library also holds a very extensive collection of Wisconsin newspapers, all of which are on microfilm and available for inter-library loan.

To request a book or microfilm, contact your local library. If it is a member of the inter-library loan program, it will request the item from the Wisconsin State Historical Library. The Historical Society Library does not charge for this service, but a local library may or may not charge a fee.

The Wisconsin materials are more extensively catalogued than are those relating to other states. Many biographical sketches in the histories of towns and counties are indexed as well as thousands of selected obituaries.

Complementing these indexes are those to the federal censuses of 1820-1870 for the area that is now Wisconsin. The 1820-1840 records list only the heads of household by name. All others are reported as only males or females.

The 1850 census was the first to list all persons by name and report age, occupation, and place of birth. The same pattern was followed in the later censuses. If the parent of the person listed in the 1870 schedule was of foreign birth, this fact was indicated. The 1850-1870 censuses of Wisconsin, on microfilm, are available on inter-library loan, as are the indexes to these censuses.

The Library owns a microfilm copy of the 1880 population schedule of the federal census of Wisconsin. This has only been partially indexed by a soundex system for households with a ten-year old child or younger. The 1880 Wisconsin population schedule are available for inter-library loan; the index, however, does not circulate. This census is especially interesting to genealogists because the relationship of the various members of the household to the head of the household is recorded, i.e., grandmother, uncle, mother, etc., as well as the place of birth of the parents of all individuals listed.

Over the years the Library has acquired on microfilm a complete file of all the schedules of the 1790-1880 federal censuses for all states. The censuses are not available on inter-library, but are available to research workers visiting the Library. The existing population schedules from the 1890 census as well as the special schedules of this census reporting Union veterans and widows of such living in Wisconsin are also available to researchers.

The State Archivist, with offices in the Historical Society building, holds manuscript copies of the state censuses of 1836, 1838, 1842, 1846, 1847, 1855, 1875, 1885, 1895, and an abstract of the 1865. These are similar to the early federal ones, they list only the head of household by name and summarize the number of other persons as so many males and females. Only the territorial censuses, 1836-1847, are available on microfilm for inter-library loan.

The 1905 state census, the first to list all of a household by name, is held by the Office of the Wisconsin Secretary of State, 244 West Washington Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin 53702. The Library also holds a microfilm copy of this census and this may be borrowed.

The state censuses are not indexed except for a partial index to the 1905 census of Milwaukee County, in the Archives/Manuscripts Division.

OBITUARIES From Christian Advocate:

SARAH ANN, widow of ANDREW J. DALTON, was born April 4, 1827; embraced religion and joined the M. E. Church in 1843, and died, Dec. 21, 1854, in hope of an endless life in heaven. In her last words she declared to her friends her entire resignation to the

will of God, and that she was fully prepared for "that rest that remains to the people of God." Christian Advocate (Nashville), May 1, 1856, p. 4.

Died, Nov. 10, in Troy, Obion county, Tenn., in the full triumph of a blessed immortality beyond the grave, Sister SARAH DALTON. She was born on the 19th of May, 1779, in Stoke county, N.C., and in early life was married. In August, 1809, she professed religion, and joined the M. E. Church. Soon after, she, with her husband, emigrated to Middle Tennessee, and afterwards to Obion county, where in a few years, her husband died, leaving her to meet the toils and trials of frontier life, and to bring up her daughters alone. Mother DALTON has been a devoted landmarks, and preachers' friend, and delighted in the class-room. Her last words were, "I am not afraid to die." W. H. Frost. Christian Advocate (Nashville), January 7, 1858, p. 4.

MISSISSIPPI BAPTIST PREACHER - J. M. DALTON

"J. M. DALTON was born in Lawrence county, Tenn. He professed religion in 1850; united with Bethany Baptist church and was baptized in 1852 by Rev. Jacob Bryant. The duty of preaching the gospel was strongly impressed on his mind from the time of his conversion, and, although having no peace of mind on the subject he determined not to yield. At length, however, he realized that God's people are a willing people in the day of His power and yielded to the strong impressions of duty. He moved to Chickasaw county, Miss., in 1856 and in 1859 united with Prairie Creek church. He served as church clerk until 1862, when he was liberated to preach, and entered at once upon active labor. He was called to ordination by Double Springs church, and served that church for three years. He was also chosen to preach for a community in which was what was called an "arm" of Double Springs church. He was pastor of Double Springs church, preaching monthly, and of Spring Valley church, preaching monthly.

During the first year of his pastorate he baptized one hundred and twenty-five persons. The presbytery ordained him consisted of Revs. W. W. Finley, William Gordon and John Powell. The following are the churches he has served as pastor and the duration of the pastorates, remembering that all the while four pastorates are cotemporaneous: Double Springs, seven years in all; Big Creek, three years; Spring Valley, seven years; Hebron, three years; Montpelier, nine years; Wakeforest, three years; County Line, three years; Four Mile, four years; Spring Hill, two years; Sun Creek, three years; Mount Moriah, two years. These churches are in the Louisville, Zion and Columbus Associations. In 1882 he was pastor of Fellowship, Berea, and Mount Olivet churches, in the Louisville Association. Of the churches mentioned above, these were constituted through his labors: Big Cree, Montpeiler, County Line, Spring Valley, and Four Mile.

He says: "I have passed through many precious revivals, and, as nearly as I can estimate, have baptized for my churches between six and seven hundred persons. In general, I have been poorly compensated for my labors in a pecuniary way, but I feel that I have been richly rewarded by divine blessings, for which let God be praised. When I realize how little I have done for the Master it causes me much regret." In 1893 Rev. Mr. Dalton was stilling living at his home in Dido, Choctaw county, where he has lived for a number of years." (Source: Mississippi Baptist Preachers, page 183-4, by L. S. Foster, published 1894).

JOHN HANBY'S WILL - Pittsylvania County, Virginia

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter and will was sent by O. Norris Smith, 202 West Bessemer Ave., Greensboro, N. C. 27401. Although Dr. Smith sent this in April 1980, it like many other items, has taken its turn waiting in the stack of DNL items.

Dear HANBY-DALTON Fellow-searchers:

On a recent visit to the Pittsylvania County Clerk of Court's office in Chatham, I was thumbing through the first volume of Court records and 'caught' the notation that JOHN HANBY'S will has been exhibited, proved and ordered recorded. A Deputy Clerk referred me to 'File Box 1', which has two packets of fragile folded originals, but before finding the one I wanted, she produced Deed Book 29, where photostat copies of both sides had been recorded a century or more later on pages 127-128. I am delighted to share this treasure with you.

It is clear that John's wife was named Susanna, and that Jonathan and David Hanby were his son's (which [the late] George Clower had not been able to prove), that daughter Hannah was the 1st wife of George Carter, whose 70tr. old son William (later to marry Jonathan's daughter Susannah -- my wife's line), and Jonathan Jenings, small son of daughter Susanna who married a Jenings, were left their grandfather's land on Russell's Creek -- now southeast of Stuart in Patrick County. Since we know that Jonathan was born in 1741, probably the eldest child, John and Susanna were married in 1740 or a little before, placing John's birthdate about 1715, in my opinion, at the age of 38-40, he could well have been the Rowan County Justice in 1753-1755, moving to Pittsylvania County near the Roanoke River (where Hannah met George Carter and William was born) to become a Justice, and again moving 'west' to the Russell's Creek area, where he died in 1768. If any of you can decipher the words which baffle me, please make it know. Sincerely yours, /signed/ O. Norris Smith.

THE WILL

(At the Nov. 28, 1768, meeting of the Pittsylvania County, VA., Court -- Record Book 1, p. 89 -- "The last will and testament of John Hanby, deceased, was exhibited in Court and proved by the oaths of the subscribing witnesses thereto to be the act and deed of the said John, and the same is ordered to be recorded." Lacking the Clerk's Certificate, it was placed in a file-box and was not, at that time, recorded in the Deed & Will Book nor in the Index of Wills, but eventually was recorded in Deed Book 29, p. 127-128, in photostat form.)

Estate When Divided. /signed/ John Hanby (Seal). Signed, Seald and Delivered In the Presents of us George Carter, James Lyon.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Dr. Smith, you will note I filled in the few words that you were unable to read -- hope they help.

ADDITIONAL NOTE: At the same Nov. 28, 1768 Court: "Jonathan Hanby, producing a commission from His Honor, the President, appointing him Lieutenant under Captain James Lyon, took the usual oath to his Majesty's person and Government, and repeated and subscribed the test."

The offer goes on to say, "I have spent thousand of dollars and months of work to research through 70 million families and have located almost every Dalton Family in these United States." Again one is led to 'think' that the research of those 70 million families would be those of past generations and give one something about ones Dalton heritage and ancestry -- NOT SO!!! The 70 million families are those (by many different surnames, not just Dalton) listed in telephone books, with utility companies and other such listings.

J. A. DALTON - MISSISSIPPI BAPTIST PREACHER

J. A. DALTON was born in Halifax county, Tenn., March 5, 1858. He moved with his parents to Mississippi in 1860. Later than this he suffered the great misfortune of losing his father who died in 1862, and in his boyhood was confronted with many adverse circumstances. Still he plodded along, assisting his widowed mother the best he could, until, leaving her provided for, he left the parental roof and cast his lot in Texas. While there he led a wild life upon the plains following herds of cattle and ponies. But God met with him. While in the "Lone Star State" he heard the renowned evangelist, Maj. W. E. Penn while holding one of his meetings at Weatherford, Texas, in 1881. He became greatly interested while the evangelist was preaching upon the subject of the "Judgment." The impression wore off. He came back to Mississippi in 1881. He was never made to feel any further religious concern until 1883, when he heard a local Methodist preacher named W. R. Perry, in a series of meetings. After a few days he was led to trust in Christ and fix a purpose to serve Him and abide in this faith for life. But after this profession he acknowledges being tossed about by the strong worldly currents of pleasure. There were worldly amusements which, like many others, he felt it impossible to give up. Over these, however, he at length became victorious and united with the Spring Creek Baptist church near Cumberland, Webster county, Miss., in 1886. He served the church as clerk until 1889. In 1891 he was licensed by the church to preach, and in 1893 was ordained to the full work of the gospel ministry. Since that time he has been actively engaged in the work of the ministry, "with a determined mind, by the help of God, to save souls for Christ."

BOOK REVIEW: Hidden Village - The History of Port Royal, Virginia, 1651-1981 by Ralph E. Fall

HIDDEN VILLAGE - The History of Port Royal, Virginia, 1651-1981, by Ralph E. Fall, Hard cover; 400 pp; 60 photographs, index; town plat. Order from: The Rev. Ralph E. Fall, 7308 Three Chopt Road, Richmond, VA 23226. PRICE: \$20.00.

Here is the first publication of the 300-year history behind this Colonial town, first settled in 1651 and founded in 1744. Hundreds of families who lived here and nearby are described, as well as their homes, shops, schools, and churches. The volume was researched for 20 years and identifies the earliest Indians before 1700, the first white settlers, the town's forms of government, its shipping (sail & steamboat) at its port on the Rappahannock River 90 miles from Chesapeake Bay, its base as the Union Army Depot in the Civil War, its various occupations over 300 years, and the capture & death of John Wilkes Booth (Lincoln's assassin). As one of the oldest continuous post offices in America (since 1766), the town's postal history is reported. The town continues to occupy the original 84 on-half acre lots with structures remaining from the 18th and 19th centuries. A detailed listing of owners & occupants of these 84 lots is given for a period since 1744. The town was the first in Virginia (in 1969) to be placed on the Virginia Landmarks Register. Here is a valuable documented record for genealogists, sociologists, and those interested in Virginia town-history.

This book is the result of 30 years of research on my Blue Ridge Mountain ancestors of Patrick, Floyd and Carroll Counties, VA., and their descendants and connections who are scattered over the U.S.

Chapter 1 traces many descendants of Jeremiah Burnett (b. ca 1741, d. after 1815) emigrated to Wayne Co., Ky. from Patrick Co. VA. in 1803. Chapter 2 traces descent from Richard Branscombe who made an affidavit in Brunswick Co., VA. in 1750, stating that he 'imported himself from Great Britain into the Province of Maryland about 14 or 15 years ago and from thence into this colony (Virginia).' Chapter 3 traces descendants of Matthew Cox (1735-1804) who served from 1754 to 1756 in the French and Indian War under Col. George Washington and lived in what is now Floyd Co., VA., and in Wilkes Co., N.C. Chapter 4 traces descendants of Elijah Hylton, born ca 1740, died 1798 in Montgomery Co., VA., the section that is now Floyd County. There is a chapter on Charles Mabry (Mayberry), b. ca 1768, died 1840, Carroll Co., VA., giving descendants and tracing his own descent from Francis Mabry (1650-1712). A Slaughter chapter deals with Ezekial of Halifax, VA., & with brosl Dandridge, John, Ezekial & William of Hanover & Patrick Countis, VA. A Hughes chapter gives the ancestry and children of Blackmore Hughes who d. 1786 in Henry Co., VA., and of his son, Beveridge Hughes who died 1808 in Patrick Co. Also included is a short chapter of my husband's family lines back into Sweden. The Peterson Chapter traces the ancestry and descendants of Carl John Peterson, b. 1835, Sweden, died 1905, Pittsburgh, PA. The Olson Chapter traces the ancestry of Olof Ersson (Erickson) (1828-1917) of Sweden and his descendants in the U.S. and Sweden.

Fall has been busy again getting a new book on Virginia into the hands of those who enjoy Virginia history. By the time I had finished this latest creation of his, I was sure wishing that some of my ancestors had lived in Port Royal, Virginia. Beautifully done and most information.

Grayson Co., Virginia Deed - 1812 (James Parish to JOHN DALTON)

The following deed was found by Linda C. Vernon, Rt. 4, Box 179, Stoneville, NC 27048, recently, while she was in the NC State Archives in Raleigh. This deed was in the "Private Manuscripts Collection" of the JOHN DALTON PHILLIPS COLLECTION. The collection, containing 46 items, concerned the DALTON family of Stokes Co., NC and she cannot explain why this particular deed to JOHN DALTON of Grayson Co., VA., was in the collection. At anyrate I have gone back to look at the Grayson Co., VA. Deed Index which was published in Vol. III, 1977, p. 74 of the DNL. This deed was not among those recorded in Grayson Co., according to the index, however the deed record is marked Recorded and Examined Book No.2, page 223. It may be that this is the court order were it was examined and ordered to be recorded and perhaps never taken to be recorded in the deed book.

In referring back to the Deed Index (mentioned above for Grayson Co.) it appears this piece of property is the same as that mentioned as follows: Book 4, p. 539 - LEWIS DALTON, Trustee from JOHN DALTON, deed of trust, included 100 acres on Buck Fork), dated May 1820. Also: Book 5, p. 13 - JOHN & LEWIS DALTON, Trustees to ISAAC DALTON, included 100 acres (was it on Buck Fork?), dated March 1824. Perhaps there may have been more than one 100 acre parcel on Buck Fork, but the deed record found in the above mention collection, definately seems to belong with the wheeling and dealing of the land of LEWIS, JOHN & ISAAC.

The Deed:

This indenture maid this sixt day October in the year of our Lord 1812[or it may be 3?] Betwen James Parish__ of the County of Grayson and State of Virginia of the one part and JOHN DALTON of the County and State aforesaid of the other part witnesseth that the said James Parish__ for and in consideration of the sum of fifty pounds current money of Virginia to him in hand paid the Receipt Where of he doath acknowledge him self fully satafied hath granted Bargined sold and confirmed unto the said JOHN DALTON his heirs or signs a certain Track or parcell of Land lying and Being in the County of Grayson on the waters of Burk's fork and Bounded as followeth to wit beginning on spanish oak and two Chesnutt Thomas Jessups corner S40 E92 poles to a white oak and Red oak S 10 west 36 poles to white oak S 72 West 54 poles to a large white oak S 80 E24 poles to a Red oak N65 N187 poles to a black oak and White oak Bennits corner N68(?) E20 poles to a white oak by the side of a path N42 E56 poles to a Chesnut N82 E36(?) poles to three Chesnuts N67 E24 poles to the beginning one hundred Acres be it mor or less to have and to hold to the sd track or parcell of Land with its appertainnuses unto the said JOHN DALTON his heirs and assigns for Ever and the said James Parish Doath bind him Self his hears and Excturs and administrators the sd James Parish do warrant and __[word illegible] for ever defend the wright and title of they sd Land to the sd DALTON his hears and assigns and to warrend and defend agains the wright and title of all pearson what so Ever in witness I do her unto set my hand and seal this date above writen signed seald delivered in the presents of us SHADRICK COLLIER, JOHN COOK, TIMOTHY DALTON J., JAMES DALTON.

George Herndon who lived in Pittsylvania Co., Virginia, ca 1750-1800 witnessed many legal papers involving the Goad family. Does anyone have any information on this man such as who he married, etc. COMMENT: I am beginning to think one of the Pittsylvania/Bedford County Goads may have married a DALTON long before the Grayson County Goads married DALTONS. Benjamin Tarrant whose wife was Mary Goad witnessed many Goad legal papers along with the above George Herndon. We have about ten Goads born 1700-1750 who lived in Pittsylvania & Bedford Counties and we know the names of the wives for NONE.

Does anyone know any information about TIMOTHY DALTON found in the 1850 census of Grainger Co., Tennessee? He was 40 years old and his wife's name was DELPHI. His children listed were MINERVA, ALLEY, WILLIAM GSOM(may be ISOM), COLBY and EMILINE. His daughter, MINERVA, married Pleasant Holt in 1854, and married 2nd in 1870 to James M. Brewer in Jackson Co., Kentucky and had a son named Landon born 1873 in Clay Co., Kentucky.

I have just received a beautiful antique adding machine labeled "DALTON, Cincinnati, Ohio, U.S.A.". Do any of my fellow readers know anything of the manufacturers?

Seeking any information on EDMOND DALTON, born 24 Aug. 1834, Missouri(also told he was born in Ireland), died 10 June 1903, Carter, Beckham Co., Oklahoma. He married Pricilla Cecil, born 4 Feb. 1840, Arkansas, died 1912, Carter, Oklahoma. Children: TINVIL WASHINGTON 'Wash' DALTON, born 29 Jan. 1867, Arkansas, died 31 July 1926, Carter, Oklahoma; WILLIAM J. 'BUD' DALTON, born 20 Sept. 1862, died 28 April 1936, Carter, Oklahoma; REBECCA 'BECKY' DALTON married a Mr. Reel; MARTHA 'MATTIE' DALTON, married Tom Rogers. TINVIL WASHINGTON DALTON married on 25 Dec. 1892, place unknown to Martha Palistine Rowell, born 22 Sept. 1876(or 1879), Milam Co., Texas, died 13 July 1905, Carter, Oklahoma.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Have you located EDMOND on any census records 1850-1900? Surely some of these census will show his place of birth, as well as the 1880 and 1900 should give the state (or country) where his parents were born. Death records usually ask for the birthplace of the father and mother of the deceased. Have you checked for the death records for ALL his children to see if any show this?

I am interested in trying to determine the parents of

MARTHA ANN DALTON, born 7 June 1830, Georgia, married 31 Aug. 1848, Dooly Co., Georgia to Mathew Benjamin Floyd. Matthew Benjamin Floyd, born 2 April 1829, Georgia. They moved to Gadsden County, Florida. Matthew is buried in the Salem Cemetery, Havanah, Florida and MARTHA is buried in the Eastern Cemetery, Quincy, Florida. Their daughter Elizabeth Delphia Floyd married John Lanier McIver, and their daughter, Alice Viola McIver married William Holmes Floyd, and their daughter Bernice Alice Floyd married Harold Orson Drody (my mother and father). Because there were DALTONS at the estate sale of the family MARTHA married into, I am wondering if WILLIAM DALTON of Irwin Co., Georgia on 1840 census could be a lead to her parentage. There was also a BURRELL DALTON at the sale. Census records show father of MARTHA born in Virginia and her mother in South Carolina.

I am searching for the parents of my grandmother MARIAH JANE DALTON. She was born 16 Dec. 1844, daughter of JOHN and LAVINIA SMITH DALTON, Mt. Healthy, Ohio. She married James Glenn Clark in Acton, Indiana, 31 Oct. 1867 and died 25 March 1922, Connorsville, Indiana. I have a note that JOHN worked in a buggy factory in Mt. Carmel, Indiana.

EDITOR'S NOTE: I'm a bit confused as to what you are searching for. In your opening sentence you stated you were searching for the parents of MARIAH JANE DALTON and in your next sentence you stated she was the daughter of JOHN & LAVINIA SMITH DALTON. Perhaps you are seeking the parents of JOHN DALTON, yes? I have not been able to locate a Mt. Carmel, Indiana, however there is a Mt. Carmel, Ohio in Clarlmont County, which is next to Hamilton County where you state MARIAH JANE DALTON was born 1844 in Mt. Healthy. Have you searched the Clarlmont County records?

7-82: Ruth McAllister, 102 Woodbine Ct., Williamsburg, VA 23185.
Seeking the parents of JAMES W. DAULTON and Sally A. Pike,
married 16 May 1860, Stokes Co., NC. Residing in Wythe Co.,
VA., 1870 census with children: JOHN ROBERT, GEORGE W.,
LOUVINA, FRANCES B., etc. Stated they were both born in
Virginia. COMMENT BY RUTH McALLISTER: My DALTONS said
in the census records that they were born in Virginia, so
I have been looking and looking all around the Southwest
area for the marriage. George (my husband) and I were in
Richmond in January and after another fruitless day I told
him I thought I'd better check Stokes County, N.C. because
so many referred to it. That Sunday I decided to re-read
my "DALTON NEWSLETTERS" just to check the Stokes County
material and there it was!!! JAMES W. DAULTON to SALLY
ANN PIKE, 16 May 1860.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Ruth, I hope others will do what you did and that is to go back and RE-READ the DNL. You mentioned in your letter that there are some differences from the newsletter - spellings of DALTON/DAULTON and SALLY/SALLEY, also that the register is just Sally A., not Ann, as the newsletter has it listed. Also that the register is typed and not handwritten and that you would like to know where the researcher copied the list for the newsletter. Off hand I would say that it was probably copied from microfilm through L.D.S., but don't hold me to that since that list appeared several years ago in the DNL. Of course the person who typed the register up may

not copied the name in full and the person who read the handwritten record may have merely written down the usual spelling of DALTON. At anyrate you found the marriage and that's what counts, regardless of the spelling.

In his manuscript titled, MANY YEARS AFTER, by D. Graham Copeland, he says that Benjamin Tarrant, Sr., married MARTHA DALTON in Pittsylvania Co., Virginia about 1765, but no documentation is given. It is pointed out that SOLOMON DALTON witnessed the will of Benjamin Tarrant, Sr., in Greenville Co., SC. This is strong evidence that a relationship existed between the DALTON and Tarrant families, but it is not PROOF. I would like to see proof of the connection.

JOHN DALTON, born 1848, Ireland, son of PATRICK & ELLEN DALTON, emigrated to Hoboken, NJ., married BRIDGET DOYLE 21 July 1872. JOHN died 1882, Jersey City, NJ. Children: MARY FRANCES b. 23 Dec. 1872; PATRICK b. 10 Feb. 1874; ELLEN b. 24 Aug. 1875; JOHN b. 24 June 1878 (my grandfather), BRIDGET b. 9 March 1880; CORNELIUS b. 29 Aug. 1881. If anyone is working on this line of DALTONS, I would be overjoyed to hear from you.

- 10-82: Mrs. Helen Rolfe, 2925 5th Ave., Council Bluffs, IA 51501.

Need all information on ancestors of NANCY LUNICA DALTON, b. ca 1805 Virginia (probably Albemarle Co.), married 10 Jan. 1824 Kentucky to Elias Epperson. Her parents were: NATHAN ISOM DALTON, b. ca 1775 Virginia, d. 1820 Kentucky, married Elizabeth Walters, b. 1780 Scotland.

- 11-82: Geneva Wallace, Rt. 1, White City, KS. 66872.

DANIEL DALTON, son of NATHAN, born ca 1826 Pickaway, Benton Co., Iowa, married NANCY Emerind or Eberline who was said to have been $\frac{1}{2}$ Ute Indian. DANIAL and his father were in the Wagon making business in Iowa. DANIEL was living in Andrew Co., Missouri in 1893. Children: GEORGE WASHINGTON, BOB, MERVE, GARY, HARRY and a daughter. BOB, MERVE and GARY worked in the gold mines in Cripple Creek, Colorado. GEORGE WASHINGTON DALTON married 1st ____; 2nd Sarah Alice Fiddler (dau. of Wm. Fiddler and Rebecca Lyon). Children of GEORGE W. by 1st marriage: WILLIAM PEARL. Children by 2nd marriage: FLOYD, HAZEL, LENA, LAURA, GEORGE, ELLA, EVA and LENORE. In 1906, Colorado Springs, Colorado, WILLIAM PEARL accidentally killed a man and the prosecution tried to prove 'bad blood' by saying that WILLIAM'S grandfather, DANIEL DALTON was a brother to JAMES LEWIS DALTON, father of the DALTON gang. Help!

EDITOR'S NOTE: You refer to DANIEL being ca 1826, Benton Co., Iowa. This is rather doubtful, have you checked the census records? Iowa became a Territory in 1838 and it was about five years prior to this time that the first influx of white settlers came to Iowa. From 1824-1834 it had been unorganized territory. Benton Co. was not formed until 1837 out of the Indian Land Purchase. It's possible that he came there as a young boy and just always thought he was born in that place. Have you checked the depository that would have the Indian records for that area, or read the Indian Rolls that may be available. As far as DANIEL being the brother of JAMES LEWIS DALTON,

there is no way, wrong family, time period and place.

- 12-82: Virginia L. Petersen, Rt. 1, Box 94, Lincoln, KS 67455. Who were the parents of CARTER JACKSON 'Jack' DALTON, born ca 1815, died after 1880, where he appeared on the census. He married Mary Coffee, 1833, TIMOTHY DALTON signed the bond. Who were the parents of CARTER JACKSON DALTON and what was his relationship to TIMOTHY DALTON?

EDITOR'S NOTE: Virginia, I am sure you have probably checked the wills for Grainger Co., but have you checked the probate records for settlement of an estate, even if there was no will, often there will be an estate settlement. Also the deed records will often reveal a division of property among the heirs of the deceased, or sale of the property by the heirs. All of the heirs will not necessarily be in the grantor index, but often found signing the deed of sale, with only one being in the index. Would suggest you read all the deeds for the county in search of a 'buried' name. The index to Grainger Co. (1796-1853) published in DNL Vol.2,#5, 1976, however I would further suggest these and later deeds be checked since a division or sale of property can often occur many years after a person has died. Yes, I know reading deeds are time consuming, but what they reveal is worth the trouble.

Also, I would like to see the "Rucker Family" book by Edythe Rucker Whitley. Anyone having knowledge of how I may obtain a copy of these books, your assistance will be appreciated.
- 14-82: Mrs. Conrad P. Harland, Rt.1, Box 112A, Richmond, VA 23231. William McCraw, b. 5 Nov. 1782, Surry Co., VA., died 11 May 1828, Surry Co., was son of Jacob McCraw and Elizabeth Waller. He married SARAH DALTON HANBY, b. Patrick Co., VA., d. 22 July 1842, Mt. Carmel, TN., the daughter of Capt. Jonathan Hanby and SARAH DALTON. Who are the parents of SARAH DALTON? Jonathan Hardin McCraw (son of William and SARAH DALTON HANBY McCraw, born 26 Feb. 1820, d. 3 Dec. 1892, married 1st Mary Bythenia Jackson, born 17 April 1825, Fayette Co., TN., daughter of Robert Henry Jackson and SUSANNA DALTON. Who are the parents of SUSANNA DALTON, how are they related to JONATHAN'S grandmother SARAH DALTON? Jacob A. McCraw married ELIZABETH DALTON, 31 March 1836, Henry Co., VA. This couple on the 1850 Tennessee census. Who is ELIZABETH DALTON and who were her parents?

EDITOR'S NOTE: SARAH DALTON (1754-1841) the daughter of SAMUEL DALTON, SR. She married Jonathan Hanby 24 March 1769, Pittsylvania Co., VA. Proof of father: Deed of gift of SAMUEL DALTON, Sr., dated 24 Nov. 1803, filed 1807, Stokes Co., NC. Robert Henry Jackson married SUSANNA DALTON, 4 June 1822, Williamson Co., TN. Abstract of Stokes Co. wills reveal the following: JONATHAN DALTON, dec'd 1821, mentions MADISON DALTON, SUSAN DALTON (inter-married with Robert Jackson), JOANNA DALTON, WILLIAM DALTON and JULIANNA DALTON.

- 15-82: Louise Irwin, 3837 Jackson, #2, Memphis, TN 38128. Thomas STONE and wife CHARLOTTE DALTON, had nine issues,

one of which is my Great-grandfather, Granville P. Stone (also found listed as Greenville P./George P.). The will of G.P., dated 4 April 1851, Fayette Co., TN. uses "Geo. P. Stone", as well as "I, Granville P. Stone." What does the stand for? Edward Stone, b. 27 Aug. 1812, d. 28 Oct. 1858, buried Paris Cemetery, Bourbon Co., KY. Is this the brother mentioned in the will of Thomas Stone, who died 1841, Sumner Co., TN.? Does anyone have a copy of the will of SALLY DALTON Hubbard/Hubbert, 1831, Sumner Co., TN., which mentions her nephew, "Granville P. Stone"? I will gladly pay for copy.

MOTT or MOTON DALTON (possibly MARTIN if assessor was a Southerner), b. ____, d. ca 1895, buried Gravel Hill, MO. or AR., lived next to his bro. Dr. TIMOTHY DALTON, at Chalk Bluff, Green Co., AR., Bradshaw Twp., which later fell into Clay Co., AR. He was well known in Campbell, MO. area. Children of MOTT: BARBARA ANNA DALTON, b. 2 Jan. 1852, m. Dr. Elisha B. Headlee/Headley, b. Maury Co., TN 11 Jan. 1819, later lived in Greene Co., MO. BARBARA d. 24 June 1884/5, both buried Clay Co., AR.; TIMOTHY called 'Tite' lived Chalk Bluff, AR., moved to Kennett, MO. in 1903 and died there.; JAMES MONROE DALTON called Jim or Mon died Hollywood, MO. 1938.; TOM DALTON; CLAUDE DALTON; JASPER DALTON; LOU(?); JACK (son by 3rd wife), d. 23 Oct. 1962. Who were the parents of MOTT DALTON? Where is Gravel Hill, which state and county?

- 17-82: Mrs. Linda L. Reynolds, 801 N.E. 126th St., Vancouver, WA 98665.
My Grandfather was WILLIAM HENRY DALTON, b. 23 May 1865, Billstown(?), Adams Co., OH. His father was JOHN DALTON b. 15 Feb. 1834/34 VA., m. 1st Betsy Booster 15 Sept. 1858, m. 2nd America Collinsworth 29 June 1864, Lawrence Co., OH. 1 child by 1st marriage, JAMES DALTON b. 5 Dec. 1861, 9 children by 2nd marriage: WILLIAM HENRY (above), ISAAC b. 15 Sept. 1867, NANCY b. 12 March 1869, GEORGE b. 1 Oct. 1871, ELIJAH b. 28 Jan. 1874, LEWIS b. 3 Jan. 1876, FRANK b. 24 Sept. 1879, JENNIE BELL b. 16 April 1881, and JOHN b. 24 Sept. 1886. The father of JOHN DALTON, b. 1834/35 was WILLIAM DALTON and his wife Maria Schroeder. Where in Virginia was this family from and who were the parents of WILLIAM DALTON? EDITOR'S NOTE: Have you obtained the death record for JOHN DALTON, d. 1912? Perhaps this will give the name of the cemetery, as death records often do. Also you might check the deed records to see if they mention a family cemetery on any property the family may have owned in Otway as the newspaper articles sounds as if the cemetery may have been a private cemetery. Even if the deeds do not mention a cemetery, but there was one on the property, you would know its location. You might also check for any cemetery records that have been published on that area.
