

(Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky Families)

In the year 1769, Augusta County, Virginia was divided, all territory south of the Marys River and to the west as far as Virginia extended, was included in the new county of Botetourt. The county seat of the new county was Fincastle. At this time, the settlers of this portion were Scotch Irish, Dutch, German and Swiss with a few English coming from the East and South of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

The first permanent settlement by white people in the section of country which became Augusta County and later Botetourt was made by natives of Germany in 1726 on the Shenandoah River, a few miles below the present village of Port Republic. Also, a smaller settlement of German settlers from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania made their home in this section.

Between 1769 and the beginning of the American Revolution found great progress in the settlement and development of southwestern Virginia. The opening guns of the Revolution found this section in possession of people that might properly be termed the bravest, heartiest of the races, most fearless and determined patriots and advocates of liberty to be found in America.

The first settlers were people seeking refuge from political and religious persecution. Educated to unusual degree at the time, these people were lovers of religious and political liberty, ready at all times to stake their lives and fortunes to attain these objects.

The little town of Fincastle lies in a large valley, surrounded in the distance by huge, rolling mountains, blanketed with a canopy of forest trees. During the early days of the Revolution, George Dame, pioneer who is said by his descendants to have come from Germany to America served his new country in the field of battle. Revolutionary record is not available although there is recorded one John Dame from Virginia who served as a private in Captain Hill's company, 7th Virginia Regiment commanded by Colonel Alexander McClenachan. His name is first borne on the company muster roll dated May 20, 1777 and he was discharged February 2, 1778. The county in which he resided is not shown, although it is known that Col. Alexander McClenachan was a native of Botetourt County which places John Dame in the same general locality. The collection of Revolutionary War records in the United States War Department in Washington is far from complete and it is possible that George Dame fought also in those same ranks. The John Dame on record may have been a brother, or there could even be a mistake in the given name in the records.

It has not been possible to trace the exact home of this early family onewn to have lived in or about Fincastle inasmuch as early land surveys of Botetourt County were burned during the Civil War.

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George Dame was doubtless of English descent, his family having fled into Germany from English religious persecution and thence sailed to the new world where religious freedom was assured. Nothing is known of his wife although the name of Margaret Dame appears in 1810 Census records, Botetourt County, Virginia, age 45 or over and head of household. It is entirely possible that she was then the widow of George Dame. Jacob Dame's name also appears in this same record.

George Dame was by trade a brick and stone mason, an ardent Whig in his political views and was a very earnest and consistent Christian man whose membership was probably in the Methodist church. He was the father of John born in 1785 and George Jacob, born 1786. These are the only known children although there is record of David Dame having married Margaret Cressir, daughter of Matthias Cressir in Botetourt County, Virginia in the year 1802. This David Dame was probably another brother, inasmuch as the name David has followed through both families of John and George Jacob. Both of these brothers learned the tanners trade in Fincastle.

Shortly before the War of 1812 John had married Elizabeth Oyler of Franklin County, Virginia and George Jacob had married Elizabeth Kittinger. The latter couple had four children, Thomas b. 1809; George b. 1811, John b. 1812 and Katie b. 1813, all in Virginia. It is said that these brothers heard the tales sent back by a friend about the Paradise that was called Kentucky territory. George Jacob, in his eagerness to find this Paradise, left a large Virginia farm, never returning to claim it. So the little group of the two Dame brothers and their families, probably accompanied by their close Virginia friends, the Moores and Johnsons who settled near the Kentucky family later, set out from their Botebourt County, Virginia home, through the wilderness, crossing the rugged mountains, doubtless through the Cumberland Gap, in quest of a new home in the West where land was plentiful, forests abounded with wild game and furnished logs for the early pioneer homes.

John and his wife found the Sequatchie Valley in Tennessee to their liking and stopped off there for their future home. During the War of 1812 John entered the service of his country and fought in the Southland under Andrew Jackson. On the close of hostilities, he walked from Mobile, Alabama to his home. Later he removed with his family to Kentucky but not liking that state as well as Tennessee he returned to the Sequatchie Valley where his descendants live today.

George Jacob, know later through his life as Jacob Dame although buried by the name George J. Dame, and his little family pressed further into the West after leaving his brother in Tennessee and continued until they reached Northwest Kentucky, settling in what later became Muhlenberg Jounty, Kentucky. Shortly after settling in their newly adopted home, Elizabeth (Kittinger) Dame passed away, leaving her husband and four small children. Elizabeth's grave is said to be in what is McLean County


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now as Muhlenberg County was later divided and part of it becoming McLean. Several of the older members of the Kentucky family remember having seen her grave but younger ones have failed to find it and it is feared the marker may have been removed from the spot.

On March 27, 1817 George Jacob married Sarah Musgrave or Musgrove, W. Henderson performing the marriage rites as recorded by the Kentucky Historical Society. Early U.S. Census reports show that Sarah Musgrave or Musgrove was born in North Carolina.

Following are accounts of the two brothers John and Elizabeth (Oyler) Dame of Tennessee and Jacob and Elizabeth (Kittinger) 1, and Sarah (Musgrove) 2 Dame of Kentucky and their descendants.

The following biography of George W. Dame was published in 1898 by Geo. A. Ogle Co. and is furnished by his grandson, Mr. George W. Dame of Comfort, Tennessee:

"George W. Dame has spent his entire life in the neighborhood which is now his home and is one of its most valued representatives. He was born Dec. 10, 1825 and is a son of John and Elizabeth (Oyler) Dame, both of whom were natives of Virginia. The family is of German origin and the grandfather, George Dame, who was born in Germany, came to the new world in colonial days and served through the war of the Revolution. By trade he was a brick and stone mason and was a very earnest and consistent christian man whose membership was probably in the Methodist Episcopal Church. His death occurred in Virginia.

"John Dame, father of our subject was born in Botetourt County, Virginia and his wife in Franklin County, that state. At an early day they came to Tennessee, locating in the Sequatchie Valley and when the War of 1812 came on the father entered the service of his country. On the close of hostilities he walked from Mobile, Alabama to his home. Later he removed with his family to Kentucky but not liking that state he returned to Tennessee. The Indians were living in lower part of Sequatchie Valley when they first came to this state and the region was wild and unimproved. The father learned the tanner's trade in Fincastle in his early life and was following that pursuit at the time of his death which occurred on the homestead farm in 1867. He had reached the age of eighty-two years and his wife passed away several years later at the age of eighty-five. In his political views he was a Whig and his sympathies were with the Union cause. Both he and his wife held membership in the Methodist Episcopal Church and were people of highest respectability, having the warm regard of all who knew them. Their family numbered twelve children, only three of whom are now living: Elizabeth, widow of E. Ridley and a resident of Jackson County, Alabama; Sallie, widow of S.A. Rogers, a resident of Marion County, Tennessee and George W. Dame. Those who have passed away are Valentine who died in Polk County, Missouri; John who died in Marion County, Tennessee; Polly who was the wife of Isaac Kersey and died in this county; Melinda, who was the wife of Saunders Walker and died in Stoddard County, Missouri; Lucinda who married Isaac Kersey and died in Marion County; Andrew who died within a mile of his birthplace; Frederick who was accidentally drowned when a boy; David who died within a short distance of his birthplace and Daniel who was drowned in the Sequatchie River.

"George W. Dame acquired his education in the neighborhood of his home. One of his earliest recollections is of picking peach blossoms for the

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little girl that charmed his boyish fancy and who in later years became his wife. They attended the same school, lived in the same neighborhood and on the 9th of October, 1845 the marriage was celebrated which united the destinies of George W. Dame and Elizabeth T. Rogers. She was the daughter of George Rogers and was born in November, 1827 within a half mile of her present home. Her entire life has been passed in this locality and for more than half a century she has been to her husband a faithful companion and helpmate. He entered upon his business career as an employee in a tan yard but during the greater part of his life he has carried on farming and stock raising. His career has been one of industry, enterprise and unflagging perseverance and in all matters of business his reputation is unassailable. He is a recognized leader in matters of public interest and his influence and counsel have been important factors in molding the public progress to goodly ends. During the muster of the Militia he served both as Sergeant and Captain. For the long period of twenty-five years he filled the office of Justice of the Peace, discharging his duties with marked fairness, promptness and impartiality. He was also Chairman of the County Court for many years and in 1868-9 he represented his district in the State Legislature. His political support was given to the Whig party in early life when the War came on he strongly sympathized with the Union cause and became an advocate of Republican principles. He has since voted for the men and measures of that party nd on political questions is well informed. Socially he is a member of the Masonic Lodge in Jasper and both he and his wife are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church with which they have been identified for more than half a century. Their upright and useful lives exemplify their belief and their good deeds have won them the love and confidence of all. His career has been characterized by devotion to all the duties of public and private life. He is a man of high intellectuality, broad human sympathies and honorable purpose; honor and integrity are synonymous with his name and he enjoys the respect, confidence and high regard of the entire community. Although he has passed the Psalmist's span of three score years and ten, his is a useful old age and when he shall have been called to his reward, he will leave to his descendants that priceless heritage of the good name which is rather to be chosen than great riches. They had a family of twelve children, eleven of whom reached mature years and were married: David W., Sarah E., Minerva, John W., Mary A., Martha M, Nancy J., Alex, James B., Laura, Kate, and Estelle."

<u>GEORGE DAME</u> lived in Botetourt County, Virginia where he was a brick and stone mason. He is said to have served in the Revolutionary War and died in Virginia. His wife's name is unknown. There are two known sons John and George Jacob. Both of these sons were born in Virginia.

(2nd Generation)

JOHN DAME son of George Dame of Colonial Virginia, was born in Botetourt County, Virginia in the year 1785. He married Elizabeth Oyler of Franklin County, Virginia. John Dame learned the tanner's trade which he followed all of his life. Shortly before the War of 1812 he and his wife accompanied by his brother George Jacob and possibly others left their Virginia homes and with a two-wheeled ox cart pushed their way westward. John and Elizabeth (Oyler) Dame settled in the Sequatchie Valley, Tennessee. During the War of 1812 John Dame fought under Andrew Jackson in the Southland and at the close of hostilities walked from Mobile, Alabama to his Tennessee home. He died at the age of 82 in 1867. His widow passed away several years later at the age of 85. They had children:

(1st Generation)

GEORGE DAME lived in Botetourt County, Virginia in Colonial days where he was a brick and stone mason. He is said to have served in the Revolutionary War and died in Virginia. His wife's name is not known. In addition to this information supplied by the Tennessee descendants, the Kentucky descendants agree that he was German, one recalling that his birthplace was Hanover, Germany. Furthermore, they have heard that he came to this country as a stowaway on an American bound ship and was put off in Charleston, Carolina harbor. There he worked out his passage for a carpenter, later marrying the carpenter's daughter. Kentucky tradition has it that George Dame's three sons left their Virginia home, John settling in Sequatchie Valley, Tennessee; Jacob in Muhlenberg County, Kentucky and a third about whom there is controversy as to whether he settled somewhere in Tennessee or Illinois. Name of the third brother is not known.

(2nd Generation)

GEORGE JACOB DAME or JACOB DAME as he was known during his lifetime, son of George Dame of Virginia and brother of John Dame who settled in -Sequatchie Valley, Tenn. was born in Botetourt County, Virginia in 1786. He married there Elizabeth Kittinger and his name appears in 1810 Botetourt County, Virginia Census. Before leaving Virginia they had four children: 1. Thomas, born 1809; 2. George, born 1811; 3. John, born 1812 and 4. Katie, born 1813. This small family, accompanied by brother John, his wife Elizabeth and probably their Virginia neighbors and good friends the Moores and Johnsons started their long journey westward in search of new homes. John and his wife stopped in the Sequatchie Valley, Tennessee, to establish themselves there but Jacob and his family pressed on with their two wheel ox cart to northwestern Kentucky into Muhlenbert County where they settled down. Jacob's wife Elizabeth died shortly after arriving in their new Kentucky home. Her grave is remebered by some of the older members of the family but younger ones who have tried to find it were unable to do so and it is feared the stone marker that once indicated her resting place may have been carried away.

March 27, 1817 Jacob Dame married Sarah Musgrave or Musgrove, W. Henderson performing the rites as recorded in the Marriage records of Muhlenberg County. She was born July 17, 1799 in North Carolina but names of her parents are unknown.

The site of Jacob and Sarah Dame's home stands majestically atop a beautifully wooded hill a bit back from the passing road as if to meditate a while longer over the eventful lives that were lived upon this ground.

The foundation of the dwelling that once sheltered this early pioneer family is still in evidence. A small grave marked by a pile of plain stones is the final resting place of little Betty. She was a much loved little daughter that passed away in childhood. In early days each family made its own supply of candles. Great care was taken that none might fall from the hands as there was a superstition that a broken candle meant the death of a member of the family before the year's supply of candles was used. Once some member let a candle fall and that year little Betty passed away.

It was into this home that Jacob Dame brought little Susan Dame, and it is said that he rode horseback into Illinois upon the death of her parents in order to give her a home with his family. Some of the descendants consider that this brother of Jacob's lived in Illinois when he died but another remembers that Susan always contended that she was born in Tennessee and was living there when her parents died. She recalled that after the death of her parents she was taken by some friends who were moving to Shawneetown, Illinois and it was there her Uncle came to get her. She remembered how she did not at first want to accompany min because he was a stranger to her but afterward she was very happy that she had gone with him. All went well with her until she was old enough to have company, when Jacob's daughter Katie became very jealous of her. At the age of seventeen she met William McLaughlin who asked her to marry him, so after studying it over, she decided that since she and Katie could not get along it would be best for her to marry him which she did. Later her daughter Fatima Catherine McLaughlin married David, son of Jacob and Sarah (Musgrove) Dame.

Jacob Dame is remebered to have had a mighty good name in the neighborhood where he was known. It is said that he had unusual ability to carry on in those early days, cared deeply about his everyday work and had considerable pride in all that he did. He was a devout man being a leader in Old Bethel Church where he took his family each Sunday to worship. With his own hands he built two long church pews, one on the side where sat the female members of his family and the other on the other side of the chruch where sat the males. One of these benches is kept and cared for in the neighborhood.

Nearby is a little plot of ground which was given by Jacob Dame for the erection of a new chruch and although a church has never been built upon the ground, he gave for the purpose, the spot is still set apart and can be used should the occasion ever arise.

Jacob Dame was an excellent provider and together with a well stocked granary and cellar of food, there was always put in each Fall kegs of whiskey and brandy. He was a great hunter and one can imagine the winter's supply of wild game, cured bacon, and hams. If anyone who has ever tasted a ham prepared in the manner that the Kentucky Dames use, they know that there is nothing quite so delicious in the whole world.

Sarah Dame was famed for her excellent management of the home, her well prepared food and her brandied peaches. She is remebered by her grandson Jacob Andrew Dame of Island, Kentucky as a very small, hardworking woman who weighed not over 90 or 95 pounds. After the death of her husband she made her home with her son Benjamin Dame who lived near the home of Jacob Andrew, so he remembers his grandmother vividly. Like so many of the pioneer women she was fond of smoking and often had her grandson make her a new corncob pipe. Her brother Nathan Musgrove removed to Indiana at an early day and later returned to visit his sister Sarah. He had acquired considerable means and brought her a very handsome black silk dress. Her grandson considers it must have been of taffeta as he recalls how it rustled when she moved about. Nathan Musgrove attempted to persuade his sister to return with him to his Indiana home which he considered very fine but Sarah chose to remain among her own children where she was happiest and was well cared for.

His cousin Laura (see David line) told the writer in 1932 that she remembered when she was a little girl six or seven years old, Andrew Dame came back from Indiana to visit his family. She remembered this because he brought her some cheese which she liked so much that she ate too much and made herself very ill. Andrew returned to live in Indiana as he preferred to take his chances in the newer settlement where there were greater opportunities for him to get ahead. Also, already in his mind was that question of slavery that was arousing more and more bitter feelings between the Northern and Southern sections.

He married, Sarah Gray November 3, 1847 and to this union were born seven children, five of them growing to maturity. By the time the seventh child was born, in the year 1862, Andrew Dame's mind was definitely made to engage in the struggle to help save the Union. Naming the youngest child Oliver Perry Morton for Indiana's Civil War Governor who had already rendered valuable service to the Federal Government during the War, Andrew Dame enlisted and was mustered into service September 4, 1862 in what is now Indianapolis State Fair Grounds. His regiment was hurried on to Cincinnati to help Lew Wallace defend that city, September 20. They continued on to Louisville by steamboat and thence to Nashville. It is told by the Kentucky cousins that while marching through Kentucky, Andrew Dame's regiment encountered a Southern regiment in which his own brother Elisha Dame and his brother-in-law (Bradford Worthington, sister Margaret's husband) were members. They met in the conflict and so bitter were their feelings that they turned their backs on one another. By strange twist of fate, Bradford Worthington and Elisha Dame were captured and taken to a Northern prison in Indianapolis where Elisha Dame died. Andrew Dame's regiment continued on and met in skirmish Morgan's men at Stone River where 2/3 of the Union soldiers were lost. After six month stay in Murfreeboro the regiment marched on to Chickamauga September 19 and on that first day Andrew Dame was captured, taken first to prison at Richmond, Virginia and then to Andersonville Prison where he was confined for one year and died October 6, 1864. He is buried there under the name of Andrew Dane, Company I, 36th Indiana Infantry, Grave No. 10435, Andersonville National Cemetery.
