James Dobbin born Derry or Dover County, Ireland circa 1712. He came to the colonies with his brothers, Alexander and John; and his sisters, Jane and Rosanna. In his 36th year in January of 1748 he married Anna Skiles in Pennsylvania. Ann Skiles was the daughter of Henry and Catharine Skiles Sr. of Leacock Township, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. Catharine outlived her husband Henry Skiles Senior. In Henry Skiles Sr.'s will dated April 19th, 1750 mention is made of Ann Elizabeth Dobbin his daughter. In 1750 we find James Dobbin, his wife Ann, and two of their sons James and Alexander Dobbin living 8 miles west of Salisbury on East Bank of Second Creek, South Yadkin River in Rowan County, North Carolina. James Dobbin received a land grant from John, Earl of Granville, December 21, 1761. Then on the 28th of August, 1762. These lands being situate in the Parish of St. Luke's in the county of Rowan, lying on both sides of Second Creek. Joining Malcolm Hamilton, Alexander Dobbin, and William Porter. Said land containing in the whole 555 acres in all. James Dobbin organized the congregation of thyatira Presbyterian Church, Rowan County, North Carolina, and was chosen directing elder and aided in the building of the church.

Thyatira is one of the oldest Presbyterian churches west of the Yadkin River, if not the very oldest. In fact, it is one of the oldest Presbyterian churches in North Carolina. It is located in Rowan County, ten miles west of Salisbury on Highway 150, in the Millbridge community.

The deed for the land on which the church and cemetery are located was made on January 17, 1753, and is registered in the Courthouse in Salisbury. A duplicate was made on January 18, 1753, the original of which is to be seen in the vestibule of the church, it beginning as

follows:

THIS INDENTURE, made the Eighteenth day of January in ye year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Fifty Three, Between Jno Lynn of ye County of Anson in the Province of North Carolina, of the one part, And the Congregation known by Ye Congregation belonging to ye Lower meeting house between ye yadkin river & the Cataho Do, adhering to a Minister licensed from or by a Presbytery Belonging to & the old synod of Philadelphia.

Note that Rowan was still a part of Anson County when the deed was made, Rowan being set off as a separate county on March 27, 1753. The deed indicates that there was a Presbyterian congregation in this community prior to the making of the deed. We learn, too, that its first name was "Lower Meeting House", which was changed by December, 1755, to "Cathey's Meeting House", named after the Catheys, a prominent family of the community. The word "church" was reserved for the Anglican, or Episcopal Church which was the State Church prior to the Revolutionary War.

James Dobbin was on the jury in 1769, on grand jury in 1771, petty jury in 1771, and grand in 1772. James and Alexander Dobbin put in claims for venirey tickets in 1769. James Dobbin and John Murdoch were among those to lay out a road from Robert Murdoch's to John Frohook's Mill in 1770. James Dobbin is among many of the Statesville Settlement to lay out a road from William McGraze on the north side of the south fork of the Yadkin River to Salisbury in 1772. James Dobbin is guardian of Ann Porter, orphan, under 100 pound bond in February of 1772.

James Dobbin was unable to take an active part in the American Revolution having been lamed by a fall from his horse. James Dobbin died on February 8, 1788 in Rowan County, North Carolina.

JAMES DOBBINS' WILL, PAGE 1: WillBook C, page 76 made February 5, 1788, probated in 1791, sick and weak. Wife is Anna. Son John to get the plantation but must reserve portion for his mother; Alexander and Hugh to get five shillings. Daughters:

Mary (wife of John Scholes (Skiles)); Anna, (wife of David Cowan); Rosanna (wife of Richard Graham); Elizabeth; Cathrine; Margaret and Rebecca. Has some land on Beaver Dam Branch. Executors: sons John and Alexander and son-in-law, John Scholes. Witnesses: James McCarley (?), Anna Thomson, and Samuel Young.

Ann Elizabeth Skiles Dobbin, born in Pennsylvania (Lancaster County); the wife of James Dobbin, born in Ireland, died in November of 1789 in Rowan County, North Carolina. The only record that we find for Anna Skiles in Pennsylvania is mention of her in her father's will whereby he gives her twenty shillings which the executors are not obliged to pay until five years after her father's death.

Henry Skyles, Leacock Township, sig. April 19, 1750 proof June 1, 1750, and again: June 14, 1757. (Book J/1/238) wit: Isaac Richardson, John Moore, Thomas Henderson. Wife: Catharine "if she not give herself the liberty of being drunk" Children: William Jr; Henry; Petter; Harman; Elizabeth Rutter; Catherine Cowen; Ann Elizabeth Dobbins; yngst s. James (minor); yngst da. Margaret (minor) son: John, executor with Edward Barwick, Esq.

It is very likely that Ann Elizabeth Dobbin Skiles, sister Catherine Cowen and her husband accompanied the Dobbin family to Rowan County, North Carolina as we find the Cowans in Rowan County, North Carolina at the same time in the same location.

There were thirteen known children born to James and Anna (Skiles) Dobbin. Mrs ----- Griggs of Jefferson, Ashe County, North Carolina claims as her ancestor James Dobbin and submitted the following dates of birth and death for these children. Information on all of this can be found in the McCubbins File, Public Library, Salisbury, Rowan County, North Carolina.

I. John Dobbin Jr. First son of James Dobbin and Ann Elizabeth (Skiles) Dobbin. Born on October 19, 1748 in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. John was a blacksmith.

In November of 1772 Barnabeth Baker, age 14, the orphan of Henry Baker is apprenticed until 21 years of age, to John Dobbins to learn "The Art and History of a Blacksmith****the Said Jno Dobbins to give sd: Apprentice a pair of new Bellows, a Sledge & set of Hammers". (the most prominent people of that day kept blacksmith shops or taverns).

John Dobbin, son of James and Anna, died on December 31, 1817. His will dated on October 20, 1817 was proved in the February term of 1818. This was in Rowan County, North Carolina. No records exist to show a marriage for John Dobbin Jr. His will is as follows:

My nephew: Jacob D. Skiles, giving him, among other things 400 acres adjoining lands of heirs of Hugh Dobbins, dec'd.In consideration of his mother Catherine Dobbins my sister.....Sister: Elizabeth Dobbins and her three daughters, Elizabeth, Ruth, and Frencilla. Nephew: Abel McBroon. Sisters: Jane McBroon, Anne Cowan, Rosannah Graham, Elizabeth Dobbins, Catherine Dobbins, Margaret Cowan, and Rebecca Cowan (some are living with him.) Executors: Jacob D. Skiles, William Chunn(?). Text: William Barber, Thomas Chunn. (signed) John Dobbins.

Deed of land from James Dobbin to son John Dobbin:--James Dobbins, August 28, 1762; land grant from John, Earl of Granville, 500 acres. (Book 5, p. 141) and John Dobbins (Book D, p. 61) lets John Dobbins have it on Upper End and the waters of Beaver Dam Branch, South Yedkin River.

Book 12 page 585: On March 5, 1792, Alexander Dobbins the elder (no wife signs) lets John (son of Alexander Dobbins of Rowan County) have 226 acres next John Dobbins (the son of James), Jannette McBroon & William Neven for 100 pounds, witnessed by M. Stokes & D. Cowan & proved by Esq. Montfort Stokes in May term of 1792. (This is part of grant #909 going from the State on November 4, 1784) of 623 acres). Book 10 page 258 P Nov. 4 1784. The state grants (#909 at 50 shillings the 100 acres) to Alexander Dobbin 623 acres on both sides Second Creek next Alexander Long. ---Cowan, ---Marlin, ---Hamilton, James Dobbin & John Skiles.

21. Alexander Dobbin Jr. Born on November 30, 1749 in Pennsylvania. Alexander Dobbin Jr. married Nancy Irwin. Died December 11, 1828 (Will Book H, p. 447). Rowan County, North Carolina. Three children: A. Joseph Dobbin
B. Alexander Dobbin
C. Polly Dobbin

Book B, p. 155: on March 1, 1787. James Dobbin gives to his son, Alexander Dobbin (both of Rowan County, North Carolina) 400 acres on

both sides of Beaver Dam Branch. Next said Alexander Dobbin, Henry Hughey, John Cowan, John Lawrence, for love etc. witnessed by Hugh and John Dobbin and proved by the latter on February 9, 1793. (This is part of 700 acres granted by Earl Granville on December 21, 1761.

The will of Alexander Dobbins (Book H, P. 447) made on April 20, 1827 in perfect health. Sons: Joseph, (part of the plantation where James Graham now lives, with the house, field, and part of the low ground on Beaver Dam Creek) and Alexander (my mansion house, etc.) Daughter: Polly. Executors: my two sons Joseph and Alexander. Witnesses: John S. Graham, Richard Graham, and J. E. Dobbins.

As Nancy (Irwin) Dobbin--wife of Alexander is not mentioned in the will of Her husband Alexander Dobbin--it is apparent that she is already deceased.

A.-A. Joseph Dobbin, the son of Alexander and Nancy Irwin, never married. He was born and died in Rowan County, North Carolina. Joseph Dobbin purchased land as shown in the following deeds:

Book 20, P. 121: June 8, 1808. Charles McKenzie, no wife signs, lets Joseph Dobbins, (both of Rowan County, N. C.) have 50 acres on both sides of the main road from Salisbury to Charlotte on a branch of Cold Water Creek, next Col. Martin Phifer and crossing a small branch for \$800.00 witnessed by James Dobbins and Joseph E. Todd and proved by the latter in May, 1809.

Book 20, P. 260; August 13, 1811. Joseph E. Dobbins,--no wife signs--lets George Savitz (both of Rowan County, North Carolina) have fifty acres on both sides of the main road from Salisbury to Charlotte on a branch of Cold Water Creek next Col. Martin Phifer, for \$850.00, witnessed by M. Braly and Locker Partee and proved by the latter in August of 1811. (Charles McKenzie let said Dobbins have this).

Book 28, p. 200: May 16, 1825; Esq. John Beard as high sheriff of Rowan County, North Carolina (on an execution against John W. and Elezner Robison for \$189.98 recovered by John Fraeleigh with an order to sell land which he did on April 26, 1821) lets Joseph E. Dobbins of Rowan, have 76 acres on the east side of Beaver Dam Branch next----Fulton, Lot # 1, and heirs of William Robinson on down the creek to Second Creek on the south side of the creek next Thomas Ghens, for \$500.00.

The will of Joseph Dobbin (Book I., P. 124) made while "sick and weak" on December 18, 1841 and probated in February of 1842. Brother Alexander (my rights in land willed by my deceased father, Alexander Dobbin, on Witherows Creek and both sides Beaver Dam; also two tracts adjoining these but which he and I bought since his death--one from Thomas

Matthews and the other from Thomas G. Polk, but he must let sister Polly live on the Matthews tract or as much of it as her son, Hezekiah M. can cultivate.) Daniel I. Webb. Executors: brother Alexander and Joseph Cowan. Witnesses: John Dobbin and Joseph Graham.

B.-B. Alexander Dobbin was the second son of Alexander Dobbin Jr. and his wife Nancy Irwin. Records are needed for this son.

C.-C. Polly Dobbin was the only daughter of Alexander Dobbin Jr. and his wife Nancy Irwin. We know that Polly was married as she has a son Hezekiah.

1. Hezekiah--

Nothing further is known. Records are known for this family.

III. Henry Dobbin was the third son of James and Anna (Skiles)

and was born in Rowan County, North Carolina on January 11, 1751.

Henry Dobbin died on June 9th, 1783 in Rowan County, North Carolina.

Henry Dobbin, son of James and Anna (Skiles) Dobbin. August 5, 1783, administration of estate to John Dobbin, 1200 specie for security.

IV. James Dobbin Jr. is the fourth son of James and Anna (Skiles)

Dobbin. He was born in Rowan County, North Carolina on February 5th,

1753. James Dobbin Jr. died on October 2nd, 1785.

James Dobbin is next to David Caldwell on May 6, 1778, see entry #765, where David Caldwell gets 640 acres next him, Timothy McGuire, James Erwin, and including Flagg Swamp next Robert Simington, John Archibald, and Margaret Johnston.

V. Jane (Jean-Jeanette) Dobbin--the fifth child and the first daughter of James and Ann (Skiles) Dobbin was born on July 19th,

1754 in Rowan County, North Carolina. Jane married James McBreem.

The marriage bond was dated January 17, 17---. It was witnessed by

Hugh Dobbin. One child was born to Jane (Dobbin) McBreem and

James McBreem.

1. Abel McBreem,

VI. Mary Dobbin--the sixth child and the second daughter of James

and Ann (Elizabeth Skiles) Dobbin and was born in Rowan County, North

Carolina on January 27, 1756.

VI. Mary Dobbin married her cousin John W. Skiles who was born in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania and came to Rowan County, North Carolina and settled on 320 acres on the south side of Sills Creek. The said land having been deeded to John W. Skiles by his parents Henry (son of Henry and Catharine Skiles of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania) and Rosannah Skiles of Leacock Township in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.

At the same time another son James Skiles and his wife, Margaret Devers, settled on 320 acres on the south side of Sills Creek, said land given to son James out of affection from his parents Henry and Rosanna Skiles.

James and Margaret (Devers) Skiles did not choose to remain in Rowan County, North Carolina and sold their land as follows and returned to Pennsylvania. James Skiles served in the Revolutionary War.

Book 8 page 142: December 21, 1773, James Skiles & wife Margaret 1st let Benjamin Cowan--all of Rowan County, North Carolina--have 320 acres on the south side of Sills Creek, for 250 pounds, witnessed by William Cowan Jr. & Hugh Jenkins & proved by the latter in May of 1774. (This is part of the 640 acres which Earl Granville let James Hill have on May 25, 1752 in Anson County, now Rowan County, and he let Henry Skiles have on August 22, 1752 who let his son, the above James Skiles have 320 acres of it on June 12, 1771---and see book 7 page). It begins at a stake and goes 148 poles to a white oak, east 347 poles to a hickory, north 148 poles to a stake, then west 347 poles to the beginning.

SEE MRS. BEVERLY STERCULA'S RECORDS ON THE JAMES SKILES FAMILY AND HIS LINE OF KIN.

Mary Dobbin Skile's husband, John W. Skiles, was a wagon-maker. The 1790 census of Rowan County, North Carolina for John Skiles shows two males over 16. Four females. Three slaves.

The two males are John Skiles and a son Jacob Skiles.

A. Jacob Skiles married Nellie ? Jacob is probably deceased before 1820. We find no 1820 census for Jacob Skiles in North Carolina.

The four females listed in the 1790 census of John Skiles are his wife Mary (Dobbin) Skiles and their three daughters.

- B. Anna Skiles.
- C. Jane Skiles.
- D. Elizabeth Skiles.

B.--B. Anna Skiles married Charles Dailley who was the son of William Dailley of New Jersey. Anna married Charles Dailley on October 16th, 1797 in Rowan County, North Carolina. The bondsman was John B. Palmer and the witness was John Rogers.

Two children were born to Anna Skiles and Charles Dailley.

- 1. John Dailley
- 2. Jane W. Dailley

We believe that Anna Skiles may have been deceased before her father John Skiles made his will in 1806 as Anna Skiles Dailley is not mentioned. The will of Mary Skiles does list her two grandchildren: John and Jane W. Dailley.

C.--C. Jane Skiles married Joseph Graham in Rowan, North Carolina. Marriage bond on the 24 of February in 1796. The bondsman was Richard Gillespie.

Jane Skiles and Joseph Graham had three children.

- 1. John Skiles Graham.
- 2. Richard Graham.
- 3. Jane Graham.

Jane Skiles Graham died shortly after the birth of her daughter Jane.

D.--D. Elizabeth Skiles married her brother-in-law Joseph Graham. Joseph Graham was the husband of her deceased sister Jane. Elizabeth

Skiles married Joseph Graham on December 20th, 1803 in Rowan County, North Carolina. John McBroom was the bondsman and the witness was A. L. Osborn. The only known child born to Elizabeth and Joseph Graham was Polly Graham.

1. Polly Graham.

On August 10, 1813 Joseph Graham was appointed guardian of John Skiles Graham and Richard Graham--his sons by his first wife, Jane Skiles.

THE ENTIRE HISTORY OF THE SKILES AND GRAHAMS OF ROWAN COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA, WILL APPEAR AS A SEPARATE CHAPTER.

John W. Skiles died in the year of 1815 and his wife, Mary Dobbin Skiles, died in 1818. Both left wills mentioning their heirs.

VII. Hugh Dobbin was the seventh child of James and Ann (Skiles) Dobbin. He was born in Rowan County, North Carolina on May 25, 1757. Following is a deed to land given to Hugh by his father James Dobbin.

James Dobbins (Book 11, Page 34, May 8, 1787) a yeoman, out of love for his son Hugh Dobbin, a wagon maker, gives him 440 acres on Second Creek next to George Robison, Francis Lear, John Skells (Skiles), and Alexander Dobbin. (Book 36, Page 133, December 24, 1811) States grants (#3022) 601/2 acres on Second Creek next to John Skiles.

Hugh married GRIZZY IRWIN. They had six children.

- A. Joseph Dobbin.
- B. James Dobbin.
- C. John Dobbin.
- D. Nancy Dobbin.
- E. Polly Dobbin.
- F. Elizabeth Dobbin.

All are listed in the will of their father, Hugh Dobbin, dated March 12, 1811. Hugh Dobbin died on May 3, 1811.

A.-1. Joseph E. Dobbin was the first son of Hugh and Grizzy (Irwin) Dobbin. Joseph E. Dobbin may have had two wives as there is quite a span in the age of the first children mentioned in the 1850 census of Naomi M. Dobbin and the younger children mentioned in the 1850 census.

Naomi M. Dobbin was born in Tennessee in 1799. She is a widow as shown in the 1850 census for Rowan County, North Carolina.

The following children listed with her are all born in North Carolina.

1. Jennina A. Dobbin who was born in 1814. Jennina married John Blackwell on February 26, 1857.
2. Emily G. Dobbin who was born in 1819. (I believe the above two children to be the daughters of Joseph E. Dobbin from a first marriage.)
3. Nancy E. Dobbin was born in 1833. Nancy married Richard F. Graham on October 27, 1852. This family will be given in full in the chapters on Skiles-Graham.
4. Joseph E. Dobbin was born in 1835.
5. Naomi M. Dobbin was born in 1837. Naomi married Julius A. Elliott on July 19, 1860. Witness was Joe. E. Dobbin, her brother.

All marriages are in Rowan County, North Carolina. The division of the estate of Joseph E. Dobbin Sr. did not take place until February 20, 1855. Much research has proven those named in the division of his estate are his wife, his children, his nephews, and his sister.

The Division of the Estate of Joseph E. Dobbins (Page 129) February 20, 1855 lists without relationship the following persons: H. M. Dobbin, Emily G. Dobbin, Grizzy E. Graham, wife of Joseph Graham, the following full age Dobbins: Hugh A., Emily G., Mirrod M., and the minors Joseph E. and Naomi M.; Richard F. Graham and wife Nancy E., Polly Dobbin, John Freese, and John S. (Skiles) Graham.

B.-2. James Dobbin was the second son of Hugh and Grizzy (Irwin) Dobbin. James' wife is unknown and they had two children.

1. Grizzy E. Dobbin married Joseph C. Graham in the 19th of September in 1849. The witness was H. M. Dobbin.
2. Hugh A. Dobbin married Laura M. Verble on the 9th of February in 1843. Laura Marie Verble, the wife of Hugh

Dobbin was born on January 23, 1826 and died on December 19, 1843. Her age was 15 years 5 months, and 26 days. She was buried in Salisbury Lutheran Church.

B. Hugh A. Dobbin married next Margaret A. Lippard on the 31st of January in 1849.

C.-G. John Dobbin, the son of Hugh, got the middle portion of his father's land. No other information.

D.-P. Nancy Dobbin has a will. It is in Book E, P. 92, in the year of 1849. It lists her nephew, Hugh A. Dobbin (son of her brother James) and also her niece Elizabeth (daughter of her sister Polly).

E.-E. Polly Dobbin has a daughter named Elizabeth.

F.-F. Elizabeth Dobbin was the last child of Hugh and Grissy (Irwin) Dobbin. Has a will:

The will of Elizabeth Dobbins, Book E, Pages 40-41, made 19 September 1846, signed Betsy Dobbin, and proved November Session 1846 names nephew Hugh and niece Grissy (children of James Dobbins) his sister Nancy, sister Polly, and Mary Elizabeth (relationship not given).

VIII. Anna Dobbin Jr. This was the eighth child of James and Anna (Skiles) Dobbin. She was born on January 28, 1759 and she married David Cowan of Mecklinburg County, North Carolina. The marriage bond has the date missing. It was witnessed by Alexander Dobbin.

IX. Rosanna Dobbin Jr. This was the ninth child of James and Anna (Skiles) Dobbin. She was born on October 6, 1760 in Rowan County, North Carolina. Rosanna married Richard Graham of Tennessee.

X. Elizabeth Dobbin was the tenth child born to James and Anna (Skiles) Dobbin on July 21, 1762 in Rowan County, North Carolina. She died on January 21st, 1829. Elizabeth married a Dobbin (first name unknown). They had three children.

XI. Catharine Dobbin was born on March 16, 1764 in Rowan County, North Carolina and was the tenth child of James and Anna Skiles Dobbin. In the will of John Dobbin her brother dated in 1817 John Dobbin gives to Jacob D. Skiles 400 acres of land in consideration of his mother Catharine Dobbin (called Ann).

May 10, 1788: "Jacob Skiles gave Bond with John Cowan Security in the sum of 1200.00 to keep the County indemnified & fulfill such orders of court as may be made respecting a Bastard Child begot on the Body of Ann Dobbins of which he is the reputed Father. And it is now Ordered that said Jacob SKILES pay ten Pounds to the said Ann for Nursing etc. the first Year".

Nov. 10, 1791: "Ordered that Jacob Skiles pay to Alexander Dobbins twenty nine pounds, for four Years keeping a Bastard child of which said Skiles is the reputed father, this including the Order of May, 1788 not satisfied." Feb. 11, 1792: Another order that John Skiles (bail of Jacob Skiles) pay Ann Dobbins, & that Alexander Dobbins bring the bastard of said Jacob Skiles to the next court.

Jacob Skiles Sr. was the son of John W. Skiles and his wife Mary Dobbin Skiles. Mary was the sister of Catharine Dobbin. Whether Jacob married Catharine (Ann) Dobbin is not known. He may have absconded or died as no further records can be found in North Carolina to fit Jacob Skiles Sr. He was the son of John Skiles of Rowan County, North Carolina. Catharine died on November 25, 1842 or 1843. This was in North Carolina. This line of the above Jacob D. Skiles will be carried completely in the chapter on Skiles-Graham.

XII. Margaret Dobbin was born on September 16, 1766, Rowan County, North Carolina. She married William Cowan of Rowan County, North Carolina. She died on October 1, 18--.

XIII. Rebecca Dobbin was born on October 8, 1786 in Rowan County, North Carolina. She married David Cowan of Rowan County and the marriage bond was dated 23 August 1792, probably same as from Mecklenburg County, both Marriage Bonds in Rowan County. Died on February 2, 1822.

Apparently David Cowan married two sisters, and possibly a third. The first Marriage Bond in Rowan County on David Cowan is 23 August 1792 to Rebekah Dobbins, witnessed by

John Dobbin. The second is to Anna Dobbins, no date, witnessed by Alexander Dobbins. Actually, the second space was pencilled in from a will that lists Anna as Anna Cowan. Then enters a mystery. There is a will of a David Cowan (Rowan County Book 8, page 236) with a wife and children not named. We know that Margaret Dobbins married a Cowan. There is a will of a David Cowan (Book 1, Pages 26-29) November Session 1837 that lists wife Margaret and children David F. Cowan, Mary Graham, and Elizabeth Hyde.
