My dear Miss Visscher:

I am deeply grateful to you for having gone to all the trouble you did in looking up information for me on the name DOOLEY. It is very helpful. Four of the marriages you give are those of the four sons of SAMUEL DOOLEY - viz., Samuel, Squire, Robert, and John, all of whom later moved to Deane County, Indiana, where many of the descendants still live and where I was born and raised.

I have written out in brief outline form an account of SAMUEL DOOLEY and his descendants through three generations, thinking it may be of interest for your files or the Register. Recently I discovered in a list of early Mercer County marriages that of SAMUEL DOOLEY and MARY KELSO, on Dec. 24, 1787. I do not yet know the names of the parents of either, and if you can help me in any way to push the lines further back, I shall indeed appreciate it. If you have the old Mercer County marriage bonds, the Dooley-Kelso bond might give parents' names, at least the father of the bride, place of residence, etc. There was an ANDREW KELSO in Mercer about that time and I have suspected that he might have been Mary's father.

I have other ancestors who came to Indiana via Kentucky - LAMBERT LANE, who died in Shelby County in 1804, father of Samuel; CORNELIUS McCARTY, of Meade County, father of Margaret who married Samuel Lane; AUGUSTINE SHELBURNE, who died in Shelby County in 1819, and whose daughter Nancy married THOMAS STODGHILL, of Shelby, whose daughter JANE in 1836 married Squire Dooley. I will be glad to send you accounts of the family of these Kentuckians when I can write them out if you care for them.

LAMBERT LAINE and AUGUSTINE SHELBURNE were both Revolutionary soldiers, and THOMAS STODGHILL was in the War of 1812.

I am also seeking the name of the father of Thomas Stodghill who was born in Spotsylvania County, Virginia, May 29, 1782, and came to Kentucky about 1805 with two brothers John and James and two sisters, names not known, but possibly Catherine Stodghill who in Shelby County married Abraham Jamison on Jan 18, 1815 was one. Howard W. Stodghill, business manager of the Louisville Courier-Journal and Times is a descendant of Thomas Stodghill. I think Thomas may have been a son of JAMES STODGHILL, who died in Essex County, Va., in 1788. His will mentions son JOHN and brothers and sisters not specified by name.

AUGUSTINE SHELBURNE by family tradition descends from a Thomas Shelburne who came to Jamestown, Va., in 1607 with John Smith. I have not found proof of the ancestry of Augustine of Shelby Co. back of his grandfather, also named Augustine, who lived in James City Co., Va. An uncle of Augustine of Ky was the Rev James Shelburne, a famous Baptist preacher of Lunenburg County, Va. Some descendants of Augustine Shelburne still live in Shelby and Spencer Counties, I believe.

Should you have any further suggestions to help me, particularly in regard to the Dooleys and Kelsos, I shall indeed appreciate hearing from you. And I thank you sincerely for the information you have already sent.

P.S. - I am somewhat puzzled over the service of Samuel Duly indicated in his certificate. It appears that he served under General George Rogers Clark against the Wabash Indians, but the date of the certificate is 1787; does this apply to service in Clark's expedition of the summer of 1786 to Vincennes, before Clark was superseded by Gen. Josiah Harmer in 1787?

Also I note in the marriage record of James Duley in 1796 the "P. Samuel". Does this mean that James had father Samuel? If so, this latter Samuel could not, of course, be Samuel born 1766. But it does open up the possibility that there was an older Samuel Dooley, father of James and also father of my ancestor Samuel, b 1766, who married Mary Kelso in 1787. Can you throw any further light on this point for me?

PPS - Also I noted a Samuel Doble in ^{K.S.} the list of Military Certificates. Will you also.

Those who glance through the pages which follow will be disappointed to find so little of the things that make a people come to life again. This is natural because what is included here is only the skeleton of several families of Dooleys that have lived and are living today in many parts of the United States.

When I became interested over twenty-five years ago in who these Dooleys were, I would have laughed at anyone who might have suggested that I would some day try to run down the origin of not one but several Dooley families. Yet as I learned a little, I became eager to learn more. The job has become huge.

I find that I cannot learn much about these people without the help and cooperation of many, many people. Help from all sources is welcomed. In fact I plead for assistance from anyone who reads this as to dates, places, names, relationships, and details that will assist in making this set of incomplete skeletons come to life. If possible, I would like to develop the interrelationship between these five groups. You hold part of the key to success in all this effort.

No doubt you too want to know where the Dooleys came from. I can go back only to about 1770 with absolute certainty. Nearly all of the Dooleys of these families were then living in Virginia; no group had gone to Georgia from a part of North Carolina that is very close to the area in Virginia where most of these Dooleys lived. It is relatively certain that these Dooleys came to America via Philadelphia or Charleston, South Carolina. They probably came as servants indentured to Englishmen or as tenants of Englishmen brought in to populate and preserve land grants made to such Englishmen on the condition that they settle a certain number of families on such grants.

The principal reason for displeasure with their abode in the British Isles was religious. They were Presbyterian and nearly as unpopular with the "established church" (The Church of England - Anglican) as were the Roman Catholics. Compared to the Dooleys of Cromwell's time and of the time of the Restoration, the American Negro today is a privileged character. Until the Toleration Act was passed, Presbyterians had practically no stature either civil, political or religious. The Toleration Act provided scant relief from second class citizenship status.

Some who are not descendants of the Moses Dooley who was born about 1750 will think it presumptuous on my part to include his family line at the forefront of this historical record. But, I knew that group first and best and only got into other groups as they appeared to hold the key to pushing back the curtain of time.

The family groups mentioned herein are these:

Several basic premises will assist any one who attempts to delve into these family histories:

1. I don't believe any Roman Catholic Dooleys came to America until about the time of the Irish potato famine in 1845. Therefore it is relatively easy (by checking date of entry in America) to tell whether a Dooley is one of us or one of these from South Ireland. I think all the Dooleys who came prior to 1800 sprang from a common family group of which we are apart. Many Dooleys now belong to other faiths than Presbyterian, of course.
2. The translation of the cumbersome Irish name O'Dublhaide into an English version simple enough not to be ridiculed by the ruling English Politicians, magistrates, and tax collectors must have taxed the ingenuity of these rather simple and relatively unlettered early Dooleys. It is no surprise to find several spellings.
3. People were not too careful about the spelling of their names. Andrew Jackson said the man who could spell his name only one way was a pretty excuse for a man.
4. There were a number of virtues in remaining anonymous as possible. The church couldn't get you to extract the parish tax, the landlord from whom you'd run away couldn't find you, and besides who ever heard of a real woodsman writing books and records about himself or his ancestors. Englishmen did that. And anything English was pretty well despised. Log cabins and lean-to's didn't have much space for libraries and who wanted to move a library when one trekked a long distance to a new frontier.
5. Very probably Dooleys, Doolys, Dulys and Dulas all sprang from the same source. The Dooleys are the most numerous. Dulas are the most numerous in North Carolina and Cincinnati. Doolys predominate in Georgia.
6. Fewer Dooleys than normal for other families appear to have gotten into business and professions where they owned or ran their own enterprises, except farming. This is the occupation still followed by the greatest number of Dooleys. Those who are presidents of colleges, vice-presidents of industrial firms, heads of insurance companies, etc. are definitely the exception. Quite a number are physicians. Only one of the people named in the attached sheets was ever listed in Who's Who in America.
7. These generalities are of course subject to challenge and correction as are all data shown herein. Again, I urge you to help me in filling in the missing parts of the skeleton. I intend to continue until I can write a history that will be suitable for cataloging in such libraries as the Newberry Library, Chicago; in Free Library of Philadelphia; and the best repository of such data in the State of Virginia. Having indexed information on file in a reputable library should assist others in carrying on this endless task which has thus far only been started.

SAMUEL DOOLEY, PIONEER OF KENTUCKY AND INDIANA

His Life and Descendants

- 0 -

Samuel Dooley, said by himself to have been of English descent despite his Irish name, was born in Virginia in October 1736. His connection with the Dooleys of Bedford and other counties of Colonial Virginia has not yet been established, and no clues to his parentage appear in a small privately printed history of his descendants issued in 1893. According to this history, Samuel Dooley grew up on the frontier, apparently in friendship with the Indians with whom he had frequent wrestling matches. He had several brothers, but only the name ^{of} Thomas, his youngest brother, is given by the family historian. Thomas lived in southern Indiana in the 1840's, had a son Uriah, and moved to the state of Missouri about 1850.

Samuel Dooley appears first in the records as Samuel Daly, when on August 10, 1787, he received a Certificate of Military Service from the state of Kentucky. He had been a member of General George Rogers Clark's expedition against the Wabash Indians, and was allowed one pound, sixteen shillings, four pence, or \$6.06 for his service. According to his grandson, the historian, he was in service against the Indians for many years, often as a scout, suffering many privations and narrow escapes.

On December 24, 1787, according to the Mercer County, Ky., records, Samuel Dooley married Mary Kolse. They had four children, all sons- John, Samuel, Jr., Robert, and Squire. Samuel appears on the first tax list of Shelby County in 1792, but a few years later moved to Ohio, as his second son, Samuel, Jr., was born in Ohio in 1799. Back in Kentucky before 1802 when his third son Robert was born, Samuel Dooley lived in Shelby County until the fall of 1836 when he went to Boone County, Indiana,



with his two youngest sons, Robert and Squire. There the Dooleys settled among the hills of the eastern part of the county, between Eagle Creek and Mount's Run, the vicinity to which the older son, Samuel, Jr., had come the previous year. The Dooleys became early members of the Mount's Run Baptist Church, all being highly devout and intense believers in the Scripture.

Samuel Dooley, Sr., spent his declining years in the homes of his sons, dying at the advanced age of 89 years, on March 29, 1855. His wife had died in Kentucky.

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1. JOHN DOOLEY, oldest son of Samuel Dooley, was born in Kentucky, June 23, 1788. As a youth he acquired enough education to teach school. Later he studied surveying, and for a period of 26 years he was Surveyor of Shelby County. On ~~February 14~~ ^(Jan. 21) 1811, he married Lydia Collings (or Collins), daughter of William Collings, of Shelby County. They had twelve children, eight of whom grew to maturity. In 1839 John Dooley and his younger children moved to Parke County, Indiana, where he was elected Justice of the Peace. About 1855 he moved to Boone County, where he died February 27, 1861, just thirteen days after the celebration of his golden wedding anniversary. His children included:

1. NEWTON DOOLEY, born in Ky., April 22, 1815. He married Jane B. Hunter, daughter of Henry Hunter, of Shelby County, on September 5, 1835, and shortly thereafter moved to Boone County, Ind. He had four sons and three daughters: (1) Fernolia F., m. Reed; (2) Orthusa, m. Deas; John H., Captain of 40th Infantry in Civil War, lost right arm in battle of Mission Ridge, served two terms as County Treasurer of Boone County, died Oct 13, 1872, um.; Alvah H., soldier in Civil War, newspaper writer and editor, died at Atlanta, Ga., June 22, 1903; William H., wounded as soldier in Civil War, served as township Trustee in Boone County; Jasper H., r Indianapolis.

2. ELIZABETH DOOLEY, born in Ky., in 1819. She married Edward H. Figg, Feb 28, 1839, and had 7 children. She died in Aug., 1855. One son, John, was in the Union army in the Civil War.

3. MARY ANN DOOLEY, born in Ky., in 1821. She married Falcon Johnson March 31, 1842, and had 8 children. She died in April 1862. Her oldest son William was in the Union army in the Civil War.

4. LUCINDA DOOLEY, born in Ky., in 1823. She married Jeremiah Rush, March 25, 1841, and had three sons and four daughters. She died in 1888. Her oldest son, John A. Rush, was in the Union army.

5. WILLIAM DOOLEY, born in Ky., in 1825. He married Elizabeth P. Cannon, of Parke Co., Ind., June 20, 1844. He moved to Boone Co. in 1847, and then to Kansas in 1857. From 1852 to 1865 he and his oldest son Thomas were in the Union army. After the war he moved to Missouri, where his wife died in 1869, leaving six children. He married a second time, had a daughter who died aged 12. William Dooley died Jan. 16, 1894, having spent part of the later years of his life as a Missionary Baptist preacher.

6. ALVAH H. DOOLEY, born in Ky., April 26, 1829. He married Mary T. Connolly on April 8, 1852, in Parke Co., Ind., and two years later moved to Boone Co. In 1857 he became a preacher in the Baptist church. He died Nov 8, 1908, without issue.

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II. SAMUEL DOOLEY, JR., second son of Samuel and Mary Polco Dooley, was born in Ohio, January 8, 1799. As a boy of only sixteen he enlisted from Shelby County, Ky., in the War of 1812, later receiving for his services a land warrant for 100 acres and a pension. He began to teach school at the age of 17, and on May 2, 1831, he married Linnio Allen, one of his pupils, daughter of John Allen. In 1835 he migrated with his family to Boone County, Indiana, settling on a tract of forest land 9 miles east of Lebanon which he bought from the government. He had no more than built his log cabin and cleared a few acres than his wife died, in 1837, leaving him with three sons and two daughters, the youngest son but a few months old. In 1839 Samuel Dooley married Flooy Stevens, and to them were born three sons and two daughters.

For several years Samuel Dooley taught subscription schools. He was elected Justice of the Peace of his township as a Whig in a Democratic township. Then in the 1840's he was elected one of the associate judges of Boone County. He was one of the founder of the Mount's Run Regular Baptist Church, serving as its clerk until 1853 when he and many of his neighbors moved to Scott County, Minn., taking up a farm near Shakopee. In Minnesota Judge Dooley served as probate judge of Scott County two years, as state senator two years, as state legislator one term, and as county superintendent for several years. He died in 1872, survived by his wife, nine children, and 36 grandchildren. His wife died in Texas aged 81.

1. JOHN A. DOOLEY, born in Ky. in 1823. He was married twice in Boone Co., Ind.: (1) Rebecca Sullivan; (2) America Peters. In 1855 he moved to Minn., in 1865 to Iowa. He died at Dexter, Ia., in 1899. He had 11 children; Samuel P. by his first wife, and by the second wife, James P., John W., Andrew J., Dick, Harriet, Mary L., Elizabeth F., Addie, Dora A., and Carrie.

2. ELIZABETH DOOLEY, born in Ky., in 1826. She married John O. Fallon in Boone Co., Ind., in 1852. Next year they moved to Minn., then after the husband's death, she moved to Missouri, when she died 1890. She had 3 children: John E. Fallon, Mary E. Fallon, and Samuel Fallon.

3. MARY JANE DOOLEY, born in Ky. in 1828. She married Thos. J. Peters in Boone Co., Ind., and later moved to Topoka, Kans. They had 7 children: Alonzo, James S., Casius, Emma, Mary, Sophia, and Linnie.

4. SAMUEL K. DOOLEY, born in Ky. in 1831, died in 1850, um.

5. ANDREW J. DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., in 1837. He married in Scott Co., Minn., Mary Beer and had 11 children. Andrew was a Union soldier in the Civil War, and moved many times, said to have lived in more states than any other Dooley. His children: Charles, r Scott's Bluff, Neb., m. with 2 boys; Albert, r Oakland, Cal., um.; Fred, r Scott's Bluff, Neb., um.; Paul, r Neb., um.; Moses, r Askerville, Ind., m. with 2 girls; Laura, m Springer, r West Plains, Mo.; Josie, m Garding r Garding, Neb.; Lydia, m Hawk, r Portland, Ore.; Cora, m Hanson, r Wheaton, Ill.; Clara, m Emerson.

6. WILLIAM H. H. DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., in 1849. He was a Union soldier from Minn., and married Rosa A. Crochen. He died Apr 14, 1903. He had 6 children: Frank, Archie, William, Stollia, Julia.

7. HANCY DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., in 1842. She was married in Scott Co., Minn., to Peter Bandy. She died in 1904 in Missouri. She had 5 children: William, Linnie, Nora, Joseph, and one d. infancy.

8. ISAAC NEWTON DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., in 1847. He went from Minn. to Texas as a young man, married and died there.

9. JULIA A3 DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., in 1845. She married in Scott Co., Minn., Joseph Varnor and had 4 children.

10. MADISON H. DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., in 1849. He was twice married and had 9 children. He moved from Scott Co., Minn., to Kans, where he died in 1902.

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III. ROBERT DOOLEY, third son of Samuel and Mary Kolso Dooley, was born in Kentucky November 12, 1802. Before he was 18 he married in Shelby County, Julia Ann Shelburne, daughter of Augustino Shelburne, on August 21, 1820. After several years as a tenant farmer, he bought a small farm on Salt river, Spencer County, which he sold in 1836 to migrate with his brother Squire and others to Boone County, Indiana. He bought a farm near Mount's Run Baptist Church, of which he and his wife became early members. His wife died in 1849, and he died five years later, on December 30, 1854, father of 13 children.

1. MARY JANE DOOLEY, born in Ky. Dec 20, 1821. In 1849 she married Uriah Hand who was killed in 1851. She married in 1854 Thomas Taurman. She died in 1862 in Missouri, without issue.

2. FRANCES DOOLEY, born in Ky. about 1823, died in infancy.

3. SARAH ANN DOOLEY, born in Ky. Apr 12, 1825. She married Thomas H. Lane in Boone Co., Ind., Apr 10, 1846. She died July 5, 1887, leaving two sons, Jasper H. Lane and Squire Marion Lane, and a daughter: Cordelia Lane, who married a Boeler.

4. REITER DOOLEY, born in Ky. Aug 7, 1826. She married Elmer Cragan in Boone Co., Ind., Aug 18, 1842. He died in 1864, and in 1863 she married John Bowers, of Marion Co., Ind. She had 9 children: Mary Ann, b 1845, d 1849; Josephine, b 1849, m Sylvester C. Fetters; Rebekah-Monster, b 1847, m Sarah Brock, had 7 children, d 1885; Melvina, b 1850, m John A. St Clair, had 8 children; George L. C., b 1855, m Emma Williams, (2) Mamie McCoy, had 6 children; Elmer H., b 1854, m Melvina Stark, had 6 children; Strango H., b 1857, m Adolaid H. Bocher, had 5 children; Lorenzo Dow, b about 1860, m Ella Johns; Columbus P., b 1862, d 1866.

5. LUCINDA DOOLEY, born in Ky. Dec 30, 1823. She married James L. Pratt in Boone Co., Ind., Mar 13, 1851, and in 1856 moved to Ill. In 1883 they moved to Wichita Co., Texas, and in 1901 to San Bernardino, Cal., where she died in 1902. She had 11 children: Orlando T., Julia A., Mary V., Sarah J., Frances Reitor, Clarissa A., Elvena Bell, Laura Ellen, Donto, Isaac, and Lucinda Dooley Pratt.

6. SQUIRE WASHINGTON DOOLEY, born in Ky. March 17, 1831. He married Delilah Shirloy in Boone Co., Ind., Oct 27, 1853. He had 9 children, and lived in Boone County all his life, a school teacher, merchant, and farmer. His children: Lavina O., b 1854, m Perry Williams, had 2 sons; Elsie B., b 1856, m Mary E. Skelton, had 6 children, Bertie, Sara Ethel, Florence Edith, Elma Olive, Edna Opal, Julia Myrtle; Emily P., b 1859, d 1880; George W., b 1862, d 1863; Mandana, b 1865, m John Barnes, d 1897; Willie Paschal, b 1868, m Jessie Smith, had son Squire Kenneth and dau. Marion Grace, he was M.D. r Iowa Park, Texas; Pleasant Monroe, b 1872, m Emma Berryhill, had dau Helen, r Lebanon, Ind.; Carrie, b 1877, m Dayton R. Barnes, had 2 dau. Mary D. and Boulah B.

7. JOHN K. DOOLEY, born in Ky. June 30, 1832. He married Eliza Jane Shirloy in Boone Co., Ind., Dec 19, 1854. In 1865 he moved to Ill. He served in 30th Ind. Inf. in Civil War. Had 8 children: Lucilius, b & d 1863; Mary Lydia, b 1857, m David F. Good, had 2 children, d 1893; Benjamin F., b 1860, m (1) Mary McCloud, (2) Rebecca Williams, had Lemuel Robert and Virgil Olive; Josephine, b 1863, m John C. Dick, had 2 children; Wilfred Angus, b 1866, m Adel Smith, had Clarence Kelco, Clarineta, Virgil May, Leslie Vernon, Sylva Hazel, Irma Olive, Tressie Opal, Iven Wilfred; Laura May, b 1869, m Wm. A. Skelton, had 5 daughters; James Oliphant, b 1871, m Goldie Hager, had Alva Monroe, Elspa Ellen, Isolla; Cassius Milligan, b 1874, m Crissie Yenkel, had Orville Roderic, Viren Ruth.

8. THOMAS WILLIAM DOOLEY, born in Ky. Aug 15, 1834. Became a school teacher in Boone Co., Ind. He married Nancy F. Dulin Mar 31, 1859 and had 7 children. She died 1873, and in 1876 he married Sarah J. Danodell. His children: Alice V., b 1860, m Millard F. Carr, had 4 children; James Judson, b 1861, d 1863; Clara May, b 1864, m Benjamin C. Bocher, had 5 children; Emma Eldora, b 1865, d 1896; Reiter M., b 1869, m Albert F. Sanders, had 9 children; John Elmore, b 1867, m Arlie M. Robertson, had Gladdys and Myrtle; Mary Addaline, b 1871, unm.

9. SAMUEL BUSH DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., Nov 6, 1836. Served in 14th Ill. Inf. in Civil War, 1861 to 1865, pvt., corp., sgt., and lieut. Was in Andersonville prison several months. He married Elizabeth Wilkins in Coldwater, Mich., May 25, 1865. He had 4 children: Effie Myrtle, Minnie A., Orla Eugene, and Burdett Bush. Samuel B. Dooley died in Colorado.

10. LOUISEA DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., June 1, 1800. She married James Anderson Oct 11, 1800, lived in Boone Co. all her life. She had 7 children: Amanda Alice, Clarissa Adriens, Martha Melvina, Jesse Franklin, Nancy Ann, Cora Lucotte, and Stolla Maude.

11. CLARISSA DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., May 4, 1812. She married Joseph T. Hurst in Edgar Co., Ill., Mar 26, 1860. She had 11 children, including W. Lewis, U. Sherman, Eura Dooley, Joseph T., Elza, Carrie, Dirdie R.

12. JAMES ROBERT DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., Oct 6, 1841. Died in 1864 in Andersonville Prison as Union soldier.

13. ELKANIA A. DOOLEY, died in childhood.

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IV. SQUIRE DOOLEY, youngest son of Samuel and Mary Kelso Dooley, was born in Kentucky November 5, 1808. He was married March 11, 1836, to Jane Stodghill, daughter of Thomas and Nancy (Sholburne) Stodghill. That fall Squire and Jane Dooley moved to Boone County, Indiana, and settled on a small farm near the Mount's Run Baptist Church, of which they were charter members. They had five children. Jane Dooley died Aug 29, 1883, and Squire Dooley died July 27, 1884. Both were buried in Mount's Run cemetery.

1. THOMAS S. DOOLEY, born in Boone Co., Ind., Jan 28, 1857. He married Mildred J. Dulin on Feb 25, 1858, lived for several years in Ill. and Minn., but returned to Boone Co., where he died. He served in 4th Ill. Inf. in Civil War. He had 4 children: Corilla E., b 1860, m Wm. H.H. Stark, had Charles W. and Lydia H.; Eleanor E., b 1862, m Geo. H.
