There appears to be some difference of opinion among my sources as t the identity of our common progenitor. In crediting Edward with the distinction I have followed the majority; however, there are some who fee that his father Joseph, who reportedly came to this country either with Edward in 1670 or soon thereafter, should be regarded as the real progeni tor. I do not know what the genealogical rule is that governs a case like this, but I suspect that Edward should be considered the true founder o his line here, since he was the first to marry and beget children in America

Finally, I wish to apologize in advance for any errors that my reader may detect, whether committed by me or my sources. It is almost inevi table that at least a few mistakes will creep into records made by such a host of people working for so many, many years.

SOME BRANCHES OF THE DORR FAMILY TREE

by James Bryan Dorr

First Generation

Edward Dorr, progenitor of nearly all the Dorrs in the United States except those of German descent, was born in 1648 in the western part of England, possibly in Dorsetshire. He came to America in 1670 or thereabouts at the age of 22, settled in Boston, Massachusetts, and later moved to Roxbury, now part of Boston. He lived for a time in Pemaguid, Maine. Some records state that his father, Joseph, came over with him.

In numerous transactions in Roxbury real estate recorded in Suffolk County deeds between 1677 and 1728 Edward is usually styled "shopkeeper", but in one deed dated 1702 he is called "mariner". Since most of the early inhabitants of Pemaguid were seafaring men, he probably acpuired this latter title while there. The Rawson Family Memorial (Mary Rawson married Joseph, one of Edward's sons) states as follows: "When the colony of Massachusetts Bay organized the County of Devon at Pemaguid, near the mouth of the Kennebec in Maine, Edward Dorr was there and with other inhabitants took the oath of fidelity on July 22, 1674".

Between 1677 and 1683 Edward purchased several acres of land in Roxbury in the vicinity of what later became Washington and High Streets. On a portion of this estate he built a dwelling house, mill house and tannery, the last of which he gave to his son, Ebenezer, at the time of the latter's marriage in 1710. An unofficial record in the family of Lester Moses Dorr of Boston indicates that Edward owned at one time a part of what is now Boston Common. He became prominent in the civil and ecclesiastical affairs of Roxbury, was elected a selectman and held other offices of importance and trust. He died in 1734 and was buried in Eustis Street Cemetery. His tombstone reads, "Here lies buried ye body of Mr. Edward Dorr. He died February 9th, 1734 in ye 86th year of his age." Rawson Memorial).

At some time prior to 1680 Edward married Elizabeth Hawley, daughter of Thomas Hawley of Roxbury, who was killed by the Indians at Sudbury in 1676. Elizabeth was the widow of Thomas Lamb, who came over with Winthrop and others in 1630. Elizabeth and Edward had twelve children, six of whom died in infancy. After her death in 1719 he married Mrs. Elizabeth (Dickerson) Clapp, who died in 1733 leaving no children.

Our distinguished progenitor founded a vigorous family whose numerous branches have flourished and multiplied, spreading over the entire United States and even into foreign lands. Many of his descendants have remained in the New England area and have prominently and honorably represented our family there for the past three centuries.

Second Generation

Our ancestor in the second generation was Edmund, the third surviving son of Edward, Edmund was born at Roxbury on October 19, 1692, and on September 14, 1719 he married Mary Griswold, daughter of Matthew

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Griswold and Phoebe Hyde. They settled at Lyme, Connecticut, where he conducted a business as clothier or cloth dresser. He is reported to have been a man of strong mind and indomitable perseverance. Along with a tew other members of the First Congregational Society of Lyme he carried on an ecclesiastical controversy with the church's pastor, Reverend Jonathan Parsons, the husband of his wife's niece. During this dispute he came to be known as "Servant Dorr", a title he retained the rest of his life.

Edmund died at Lyme, date unknown. His widow died at North Lyme February 21, 1776 and was buried in the old cemetery there. Of their seven children, three sons and three daughters lived to maturity.

Third Generation

The youngest of Edmund's three sons was Matthew, born at Lyme June 14, 1725. He settled at North Lyme, where he carried on and expanded the business of manufacturing and dressing of cloth founded by his father.

On November 7, 1747 Matthew married Elizabeth Palmer, daughter of Oliver Palmer of Stonington, Connecticut. According to the lineage book of the Daughters of the American Revolution, he had a distinguished war record, having served as Captain of the Sixth Company, or "Train Band", in 1775. He also commanded a company in Colonel Janathan Lattimer's regiment of militia, a unit praised by General Gates for excellent performonce at the Battle of Saratoga. It was as a result of this military service that he became generally known as Captain Matthew. Many of his female descendants have been admitted to membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution on the basis of his military record.

After bearing him ten children, Matthew's wife, Elizabeth, died about 1775. In 1776 he married Mrs. Lydia (Wood) McLean, and it was at about that time, also, that he moved from Lyme to East Haddam, Connecticut, where he established a flour mill. By his second wife Matthew had five children, all barn in East Haddam.

About 1793 he began an arduous journey with Lydia and her children to Athens, Ohio. On the way they were delayed a year in Pennsylvania by news of Indian depredations in Ohio. Upan finally reaching the Ohio Rive they were forced by renewed outbreaks to take shelter in the stockade of Marietta, where they remained until peace was established. Matthew dief at Athens, September 8, 1801 and Lydia on December 8, 1814.

Capt. Matthew and both of his wives were evidently people of sterlin character and outstanding ability, judging from the splendid records of their 15 children, all of whom reached maturity and married. Available records show that Matthew had at least 93 grandchildren who lived to maturity.

His oldest brother George, a lawyer of Lyme, was King's Attorney fo Connecticut Colony for more than 20 years before the Revolution. His other brother Edward, a Yale graduate and pastor of the First Church c Christ in Hartford, married the daughter of Governor Joseph Talcott d Connecticut. His sister, Elizabeth, married Dr. Elisha Tracy, a dist tinguished physician and surgeon of Narwich, Connecticut.

The arrival of Capt. Matthew and his second family in Ohio marked the Some of my most delightful memories as a boy of 10 or 12 are of occasionbeginning of another prolific Dorr family tree that grew and prospered from all visits to "The Maples", as my grandparents' home was called, in its

roots that spread throughout the Ohio-Indiana-Iowa area and other parts of the Midwest. However, attempts to trace the numerous members of these branches are beyond the scope of the current project.

Fourth Generation

The tenth and last child of Capt. Matthew Dorr by his first wife was Russell, born April 20, 1771 in Lyme, Connecticut. In 1801 he married a young lady with the unlikely name of Polsapianna Bull, daughter of Isaac Bull of Hoosick Falls, N.Y. He and his wife settled at Chatham, N.Y., where he built up an extensive practice as a physician and surgeon. He was an able writer and a mechanic of considerable skill. Not only did he made notable improvements in a machine invented by his brother Samuel for the shearing of cloth, but he was also the inventor of the original threshing machine. In 1824 he was called to Burlington, N.Y. to attend some of his near relatives who had become ill with typhus fever, and died there on March 30, having himself contracted that disease.

Dr. Russell's older brother Joseph had previously married Polsapianna Bull's older sister Sarah and settled at Hoosick Falls. He is given principal credit for the subsequent rapid growth of that town through his establishment of various mills which created employment and increased trade. He was at various times town supervisor, justice of the peace, county judge, colonel of militia in the War of 1812 and, finally, president of the village. His tombstone bare the epitaph, "A Loss to the Poor".

Fifth Generation

Like his father, Matthew, Dr. Russell Dorr also had ten children, continuing the custom of those times of rearing large families. The last son in Dr. Russell's family of faur sons and six daughters was my grandfather, Seneca Milo Dorr. He was born August 14, 1820 at Chatham Center, N.Y. He later maved to Rutland, Vermont, where he practiced law and where, in 1847, he married Julia Caroline Ripley, daughter of William Young Ripley, a prominent banker of Rutland and a pioneer in the great Vermant marble industry. Mr. Ripley was the great-great-grandson of Hannah Bradford, granddaughter of William Bradford, Governor of the Plymouth Colony and a Mayflower passenger. Julia's mather, Mr. Ripley's first wife, was Zulma Caroline Thomas (pronounced Toe-mah), only child of a young French Huguenot couple who had emigrated to America and settled in Charleston, South Carolina.

Grandmather Julia became well known throughout New England by virtue of her many beautiful poems, particularly her sonnets, many of which were outstanding examples of classic form and lyric expression. She was also author of travel essays and other works and a frequent contributor to Atlantic Monthly and other periodicals of her day.

During the first ten years of their marriage Seneca and Julia lived in Ghent, N.Y., where their first three children were born. In 1857 they moved to Rutland and the following year built a handsome white frame home on extensive grounds just outside town on the south bank of Otter Creek. Some of my most delightful memories as a boy of 10 or 12 are of occasional visits to "The Maples", as my grandparents' home was called, in its

charming setting in the Vermont countryside, with its lovely view of Mount Killington of the Green Mountains not too far distant. Grandfather Seneca had passed away in 1884, long before I was born, but I still recall Grandmother Julia, white haired and queenly, as she presided over household affairs. After her death in 1913 "The Maples" regrettably passed out of family hands, as her survivors were by then widely scattered. I am told that the old house still stands today, though in somewhat altered form and in some disrepair under later owners.

са Н Seneca and Julia Dorr had five children, of whom the eldest was my father, Russell Ripley. Their only daughter, Zulma De Lacy, married William H. Steele. Aunt Zulma was a talented artist, especially in water colors, and once painted an oil portrait of me as a boy which I still cherish.

Of Seneca's other three sons, one died in infancy and the remaining two, William and Henry, passed away either before or shortly after my arrival on the scene, so that I recall nothing of these uncles, of whom the family records are, unfortunately, scanty. I am now the only surviving grandson of Seneca and Julia, which explains why I am anxious to set down all these interesting facts for the benefit of my children and their cousins of the next generation.

Here I should like to digress for a moment to tell about some of Aunt Zulma's descendants who have gained distinction for their artistic skills. Her son, Frederic Dorr Steele, was a noted illustrator earlier in this century, and Fred's daughter, Anne Steele Marsh, who married the older brother of Reginald Marsh, the well known painter, is a noted wood engraver now living in Pittstown, New Jersey. She is active in art circles and her work appears in many of the leading art museums. Her youngest son, Peter, is a fine concert violinist and organizer of the Lenox String Quartet.

My father, Russell Ripley, was born in Ghent, N.Y. November 1, 1847. I know little about his early education other than the fact that in 1861 he was attending school in Schenectady while living with his Uncle John and Aunt Maria Newman. Reverend Newman was professor of Latin and Mathe matics at Union College there. As I write this I am looking over Father's diary of that year, neatly written in a surprisingly legible pen-and-ink script, occasionally beautifully embellished, and with the grim warning or the front cover, "This concerns no one but myself!" This precious docu ment, now more than a century old, water damaged and falling to pieces, tells of his boyish exploits with his cousin and chum, George Newman and mentions many of the military actions participated in by Vermont units during the early Civil War.

As a young man Russell returned to Schenectady and graduated from Union College. While a student there he was a member of Chi Psi fraterni ty and at this moment 1 am sitting in the sturdy old captain's chair he owned then, with his own name and that of each of his fraternity brothers carved on its seat around the large Greek letters symbolizing the organ ization's name.

On October 2, 1873 my father married Sarah Louise Bryan, daughter of Reverend James Rogers Bryan, a Methodist clergyman in Plainfield, N.J.

(she later dropped the "Sarah"). After a few years in Burlington, lowa, they moved to St. Paul, Minnesota, where Father engaged in the insurance business and his wife became very active in musical affairs and women's clubs. In 1881 the young couple suffered their first tragedy with the loss of their first child, Roy, of diphtheria at the age of seven. Two years later they and their little son, Bryan, moved into the beautiful home they had built on the heights known as Crocus Hill overlooking the Mississippi River. Here were born the next two sons, Henry ("Harry") and Louis, the latter to die as a year-old baby, the victim of morphine administered through a terrible mistake by the family physician. Several years later I came along, the last of the five sons.

Meanwhile, my parents had suffered financial reverses and had lost their home in St. Paul. After several rather unsuccessful business ventures my father acquired some acreage in southern Washington near the Columbia River and opposite the famous Hood River Valley apple growing country in Oregon. He organized the Columbia River Orchard Company and with the help of his son, Bryan, who owned a small lumber mill nearby, cleared and planted the land to apples. With high hopes he put virtually all of his limited resources into this project and in 1913 moved Mother and me to a home in Portland. However, he fell ill shortly thereafter and in January, 1915 died of heart failure just as the young orchard was beginning to bear fruit.

As I contemplate the lives of my parents, I am struck by the disparity of their temperaments and the rather opposite nature of their interests, despite their obvious devotion to each other. My father, a handsome man, was quiet, reserved and somewhat introspective by nature, fond of his home life and caring little for social or musical activities. He loved the out-of-doors, but had scant opportunity to enjoy it, so harassed was he throughout most of his life by his struggles to earn a living for his family. One of the few really happy interludes in his life must have been the trip he, Mother and little Bryan made to Europe in 1886 on the steamer Baltic. I have two large leather bound volumes containing a day-to-day account of their journeys in Father's beautiful script and profusely illustrated with fine photographs purchased along the way as they visited the British Isles and Western Europe.

My Mother, on the other hand, was enthusiastic, energetic and highly outgoing in temperament. A great "mixer", she had a host of friends and was beloved by all. She was a capable musician by training in voice, piano and organ, adding substantially to the family income for many years by teaching piano and holding various posts as church organist and choir director. In St. Paul she helped organize the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra under Conductor Emil Oberhoffer, and was a leading member of the Schubert Club, an influential musical organization of women. It was at that time in her career that I was born and became known among the ladies of the club as the "Schubert Club baby". She was one of the founders and subsequently president of the National Federation of Music Clubs.

Even during her last years, when she was living at my brother Harry's home in Ocean Grove, N.J. and was in failing health, she continued her activity as historian of the National Federation of Music Clubs. She conducted a lively and voluminous correspondence with a host of friends and relatives, writing ably and fluently in her own handwriting until almost the a farmer, and they settled at Chatham, where he d about 1803.
