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## OCCGS REFERENCE ONLY

The original and each copy of an application for a passport must have attached to it a copy of the applicant's photograph. A lone signed photograph of the applicant must accompany the application. The photographs must be on thin paper, should have a light background, and be not over three inches in size.

This blank must be completely filled out in ink or type of other dollars in exchange for metal money, and the applicant's signature or initials. Do not stamp across the application. The user should be especially read before mailing the application to the Department of State, Division of Passport Control, Washington, D. C.

The total cost of a passport is \$10.00. It is unnecessary to pay any other fee in any person in connection with the filling out or execution of this application or for the issuance of a passport. ### AFFIDAVIT TO EXPLAIN PROTRACTED FOREIGN RESIDENCE AND TO OVERCOME PRESUMPTION OF NONCITIZENSHIP.

#### FOR NATIVE AND NATURALIZED CITIZENS.

An American citizen who has resided abroad for seven years is required, when making application for consular registration or a Departmental Emergency pass post, to sign an affidavit stating the cause of his protracted foreign residence; his present ties of family, property, or business with the United States; how often he has made visits to the United States; whether he pays the American Income Tax, if subject thereto; and what intention he has of returning to the United States permanently to reside.

A naturalized citizen may overcome the presumption that he has ceased to be an American citizen by presenting satisfactory evidence establishing the following facts: (a) That his residence should be solely or principally as a representative of American trade and commerce, and that he intends eventually in return to the United States permanently to reside; (b) that his residence abroad is in good faith for reasons of health or for education, and that he intends eventually to return to the United States to reside; or (c) that some unforeseen and controlling exigency beyond his power to foresee has prevented him from going out a bona fide intention to return to the United States within the time limited by law, and that it is his intention to return to the United States immediately upon the removal of the controlling cause; or (d) that he is residing abroad as an American missionary representing a recognized American ecclesiastical organization and is subject to the orders of such organization.

I, Frank Duschanek, a [naturalized] and loyal American citizen, do solemnly swear that I ceased to reside in the United States on or about the 14th day of April, 1925; that I have since resided temporarily Charlottenbrunn, Germany; and that I arrived in Charlottenbrunn, where I am now temporarily residing, on the ----- day of July, 1923, my reason for such residence being as follows:

Being a great sufferer from rheumatism, which forced me to give up business several years ago, I returned to Charlottenbrunn, my birthplace, to take the rheumatism cure, for which this place is noted. My condition is improving and it is my desire to return to my family in the United States as soon as possible, which it is hoped will be within a year or less. I still have business interests in the United States besides my family.

Since establishing a residence abroad I have made the following visits to the United States:

None. Have not been in Germany less than one year.

I have not since my naturalization as an American citizen been naturalized, taken an oath of allegiance, or voted as a foreign citizen or subject, or in any way held myself out as such.

I maintain the following ties of family, business, and property with the United States:

I intend to return to the United States permanently to reside within one month or when my health permits.
