The total fee of nine dollars is necessary to pay any other fee in connection with the filling out or execution of this application or for obtaining the passport. The clerk of each of Passport Agent Offices where this application is executed will give the applicant all necessary information and guidance.

Hartford Court of Common Pleas at Hartford, Connecticut on November 3, 1902, as shown by the Certificate of Naturalization presented herewith; that I am the identical person described in said certificate; that I have resided outside the United States since my naturalization at the following places for the following period:

from to and that I am domiciled in the United States, my permanent residence being at Hartford in the State of Connecticut, where I follow the occupation of Real Estate Broker. My last passport was obtained from to on to and was to. I am about to go abroad temporarily, and intend to return to to within six months with the purpose of residing and performing the duties of citizenship therein; and I desire a passport for use in visiting the countries hereinafter named for the following purpose:

All Countries, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, France Health and rest.

I intend to leave the United States from the port of New York sailing on board the S.S. Wisconsin on July 22, 1924.

AFFIDAVIT TO EXPLAIN PROTRACTED FOREIGN RESIDENCE AND TO
OVERCOME PRESUMPTION OF NONCITIZENSHIP.

FOR NATIVE AND NATURALIZED CITIZENS.

An American citizen who has resided abroad for more years is required, when making application for consular registration or a Departmental or Emergency passport, to sign an affidavit stating the cause of his protracted foreign residence, his present ties of family, property, or business with the United States, how often he has made visits to the United States, whether he pays the American Income Tax, if subject thereto, and what intention he has of returning to the United States permanently to reside.

A naturalized citizen may overcome the presumption that he has ceased to be an American citizen by presenting satisfactory evidence establishing the following facts: (a) That his residence abroad is solely or principally as a representative of American trade and commerce, and that he intends eventually to return to the United States permanently to reside; or (b) that his residence abroad is in good faith for reasons of health or for education, and that he intends eventually to return to the United States to reside; or (c) that some unforeseen and controlling emergency beyond his power to remove has prevented his carrying out a bona fide intention to return to the United States within the time limited by law, and that it is his intention to return to the United States immediately upon the removal of the controlling cause; or (d) that he is residing abroad as an American missionary representing a recognized American ecclesiastical organization and is subject to the orders of such organization.

I, Frank Duschaneck, a ^(born)~~(naturalized)~~ and loyal American citizen, do solemnly swear that I ceased to reside in the United States on or about the 14th day of April, 1925; that I have since resided temporarily at Charlottenbrunn, Germany; and that I arrived in Charlottenbrunn, where I am now temporarily residing, on the ----- day of July, 1925, my reasons for such residence being as follows:

Being a great sufferer from rheumatism, which forced me to give up business several years ago, I returned to Charlottenbrunn, my birthplace, to take the rheumatism cure, for which this place is noted. My condition is improving and it is my desire to return to my family in the United States as soon as possible, which it is hoped will be within a year or less. I still have business interests in the United States besides my family.

Since establishing a residence abroad I have made the following visits to the United States:
None. Have not been in Jersey less than 90% year.

I have ^(not since) my naturalization as an American citizen been naturalized, taken an oath of allegiance, or voted as a foreign citizen or subject, or in any way held myself out as such.
