

The Joshua Fuller Family of Nunda, New York

The peregrinations of Edward Fuller, his family, and his descendants did not end with the 1620 Fuller *Mayflower* emigration from England to North America. Edward Fuller's son, Samuel, left Plymouth first for Scituate (1633) and later to Barnstable (1641). Succeeding generations of Edward Fuller's descendants migrated to the Massachusetts Bay colony communities of Colchester, Ludlow, and Monson. Joshua Fuller, an eighth generation descendant of Edward Fuller, departed Massachusetts for Nunda, New York in 1833.

Nunda, New York, situated in the southwest corner of Livingston County in the Holland Land Purchase in western New York, covers an area of 22,291 acres primarily devoted to the cultivation of cereals, particularly wheat, although the Cashaqua Creek would later be harnessed to power saw and grist mills. Nunda, an Indian word meaning "the meeting of the hills," described the Indian method used to cultivate tubers (potatoes). An Indian village, located on the present site of Nunda, was abandoned at the beginning of the Revolutionary War.

The town of Nunda was organized March 11, 1808. Its early settlers who came from New England, New Jersey, and Cayuga County New York, traveled by oxen and sleds or horse teams while a few traveled the Erie Canal to Rochester, N.Y. and then overland to Nunda when the Holland Land Purchase was opened to farmers who could pay the \$7 per acre. Nunda's settlers worked long hours clearing land, building log-hewed homes, and dressed themselves in homespun clothing. Survival depended on both perseverance and self-denial whether or not a Nunda resident farmed, made shingles, or worked a saw mill.

Pilgrim descendant Joshua Fuller's 1833 arrival with his large, maturing family followed the typical pattern of land acquisition and crop cultivation. However, Nunda soon could not support all the children of its pioneering families. There was only so much land to go around. Within a generation Fuller family members were leaving Nunda in search of economic success in other parts of New York State and even further west in Michigan and Wisconsin.

Through three generations and almost 100 years, from Joshua Fuller's arrival in 1833 until his grandson Frederick Fuller's death in 1932, the Fuller family's history mirrored that of other Nunda and New York state farming families seeking religious renewal, economic success, and a stable family life. The accompanying genealogy chronicles the Joshua Fuller family and is based on all currently known records. Nunda's vital statistics records, church and cemetery records, and other documents were the 19th century victim of frequent fires

at the offices or homes of the record keepers. Therefore, what is known will always be an incomplete record. Joshua Fuller's descendants long ago departed Nunda seeking the urban, industrial opportunities agrarian life no longer afforded. Shunned by railroads and later New York state's major highways, Nunda, New York has become a footnote on the agrarian highway to the "American Dream."

1. **Joshua Fuller**⁸ (Elisha⁷, Joshua⁶, Young⁵, Matthew⁴, Samuel³, Samuel², Edward¹), b. 4 April 1778/79 Ludlow, MA, d. 28 March 1871 Nunda, NY; m. (1) 1799 Polly Brewer, b. 1778 in MA, d. 1801; m. (2) 1801 Mercy (Marcy) Pease, b. 20 December 1782, d. 1869/70 Nunda, NY.

Joshua Fuller was the third of 14 children of Revolutionary War soldier Elisha Fuller. Joshua Fuller came to Nunda from Massachusetts in 1833 and farmed property where Nunda's present Protestant Methodist Church stands. Joshua Fuller helped organize on 12 September 1840 and along with his wife, Mercy, was among the first members of the First Universalist Church of Nunda. Joshua Fuller later served the Church as both a deacon and trustee.

The 1840 United States Census identifies four children living with Joshua and Mercy Fuller: a male between the ages of 20-30 (probably son William C.), a male between the ages of 15-20 (probably son George), and two females between the ages of 10-15 (one of whom was probably daughter Maria). The 1850 United States Census found the Fullers living alone, but the 1860 United States Census identifies a Daniel Townsend, wife Melissa, and son Fred residing with Joshua and Mercy Fuller. No relationship is identified.

The birth order and number of children of Joshua Fuller differs depending upon the source used. William H. Fuller's history on the descendants of Edward Fuller indicates there was an unnamed daughter born after the youngest son George who married into the Carrier family rather than the oldest daughter, Polly. The existence of another daughter may explain the second female between the ages of 10-15 in the Joshua Fuller household recorded in the 1840 census. At his death Joshua Fuller was described as a "thoroughly good man and a typical New Englander." Joshua and Mercy Fuller are buried in Nunda's Oakwood Cemetery. A marker is in evidence.

2. **Pliny Brewer Fuller**⁹, b. 3 December 1800 Ludlow, MA, d. December 1863 Humphrey, NY at age 63; m. 1829 probably Ludlow, MA Rebecca Cowing, b. Oneida Co., NY 4 August 1805, d. 4 April 1871 Humphrey, NY at age 66. It appears that Pliny Fuller lived in Jefferson County, NY in the 1840 federal census, but he apparently moved to Pennsylvania where several of his children were born before relocating to a farm valued at \$21,000 in Humphrey, NY. There is no grave marker in evidence for either Pliny or Rebecca Fuller.

4. **Clarissa Fuller**⁹, b. 25 November 1803 Monson, MA, d. after 1860 but before 1870 Nunda, NY; m. Alfred Goldthwait 18 October 1832, recorded at Granby, MA, b. 1802, d. 11 November 1875 at age 72 years, 6 months, 21 days Nunda, NY. Alfred Goldthwait was a farmer. He apparently remarried to his wife's sister, Caroline Fuller. There is a marker in Oakwood Cemetery for Alfred Goldthwait but none in evidence for either wife.

6. **Sophie Barton Fuller**⁹, b. 12 July 1810 Ludlow, MA, d. 27 December 1891 in Madison, WI; m. Dr. Chittenden 6 April 1834 in Nunda, NY, b.a. 1806, death date not known in Madison, WI. The Chittendens resided on East Street in Nunda until they moved to Wisconsin just prior to the Civil War and before the 1860 census. Dr. Chittenden was a highly respected dentist and a teacher of vocal music. His office was near the parsonage for Nunda's Methodist Church.

7. **Caroline Fuller**⁹, b. 1812, d. February 11, 1888 Nunda, NY; m. Alfred Goldthwait, her brother-in-law, sometime between 1860 and 1870. In the 1880

United States Census Caroline Goldthwait was a widow residing with her step-daughter, Helen Goldthwait Fuller Breen. It is possible that Caroline Fuller was married before her marriage to Alfred Goldthwait but further information is not available. A Nunda historian lists Caroline's birthdate as 1812 while the 1880 census gave her age as 74 with a birthdate of 1806.

8. **William C. Fuller**⁹, b. 7 February 1819 Ludlow, MA, d. 4 July 1904 Nunda, NY from old age after a 30 day illness; m. (1) 1 January 1842 Nunda, NY Louisa C. Guy, b. 22 July 1825 Cayuga Co., NY, d. 28 May 1895 Nunda, NY; m. (2) 1895 Nunda, NY Mrs. Joel (Jane L.) Brewer, b. July 1832, d. after 1908.

William C. Fuller was a farmer, In 1868 he purchased a 54 acre farm in Nunda Township. During his lifetime William Fuller served Nunda as its deputy sheriff (1861-70), tax collector (1868 and 1879), and town constable. A life-long Republican, William Fuller was appointed Postmaster of Nunda in 1872 by President Grant. He held the position until 1881. While his father, Joshua Fuller, founded the First Universalist Church in Nunda, William Fuller was a member of Nunda's Baptist Church.

Louisa Guy was the daughter of Alexander and Aurelia Guy of Mt. Morris, NY. She and her husband are buried in Nunda's Oakwood Cemetery in the Joshua Fuller lot. A marker is in evidence. William Fuller's second wife moved to Rochester, NY after his 1904 death to live with her only surviving child from her first marriage.

9. **Maria Fuller**⁹, b.a. 1824, d. between 1850 and 1860 Nunda, NY; m. Porter Warren, b. 11 December 1818 Otsego Co., NY, d. 12 May 1910 from partial lung congestion and convulsions Dalton NY. Porter Warren was the son of Noah and Ursula Warren and moved to Nunda in 1819 making the Warrens one of Nunda's

pioneer families. Porter Warren was a life-long farmer. In the 1860 census Porter Warren had remarried to Mrs. Caroline Scoville who brought two children to the marriage. Porter Warren's second wife died and he remarried in 1865 to Ruth Parker, born May 1830. In 1900 Porter and Ruth Warren resided with his daughter Julia Warren Parker. Ruth Warren died before the 1910 census. In 1910 Porter Warren still resided with his daughter, Julia. Ruth and Porter Warren had no children. Porter Warren is buried in Dalton's Union Cemetery.

10. **James Fuller**⁹, b. between 1810 and 1820; married and moved to Lansing, Michigan before the 1850 census. In the 1840 United States Census, James Fuller was a farmer with two sons. James Fuller's birth order is listed in Fuller genealogies and in Nunda histories after his sister Maria which contradicts the 1840 census.

11. **George Fuller**⁹, b. between 1815 and 1820, allegedly moved to Philadelphia and had a son, Edward. Family papers belonging to Pliny Brewer Fuller indicated that his half-brother George went to sea and was never heard from again. A George Washington Fuller born in 1832 claimed to be this son of Joshua Fuller but this writer is skeptical. A George W. Fuller is listed in the 1860 United States Census for Nunda, was married, and fathered two daughters. Given this information, why do the Nunda histories and Historian's notes fail to recognize this George Fuller as the son of Joshua Fuller?

12. **George Pliny Fuller**¹⁰, b. 21. Nov 1834 Italy, NY; d. 10 Apr 1901 Kalamazoo, MI; m. Nancy Jane Webb 10 Feb 1856 Limestone, NY, b. 18 July

1832 Limestone, NY, d. 27 May 1905 Kalamazoo, MI. In the 1870 federal census George Fuller resided in Humphrey, NY next to his mother's farm where he served as the patent right's agent. Because George Fuller is not listed on the 1880 New York State soundex, I surmise he moved to Wisconsin or elsewhere because he is not listed on the Michigan soundex for 1880. George Fuller is listed as living in Kalamazoo in the 1900 federal census.

In the 1870 federal census Owen and Orpha Fuller resided with his mother in Humphrey, NY where Owen worked the Fuller farm. By 1880 Owen Fuller moved his family to near-by Olean, NY where he was employed as a wagon maker and resided on Thompkins Street. Owen Fuller and his family are not listed in the 1900 federal census for New York or Michigan.

19. **Milo Starkey Goldthwait**¹⁰, b. 1841 Nunda, NY, d. 1922 Nunda, NY; m. Elizabeth Mills, b. 1850, d. 1942. Milo S. Goldthwait enlisted during the Civil War at age 20 on 13 August 1862 in the 1st New York Dragoons, Company I. He was promoted to commissary on 3 January 1865 and was mustered out in 1865 as a corporal. Milo Goldthwait was Nunda's town clerk from 1870-71 and resided at 199 Walnut Street. He was a dry goods salesman in a career that began in 1870 and continued to 1910. Both Mr. and Mrs. Goldthwait are buried in Nunda's Oakwood Cemetery.

29. **Henry F. Fuller**¹⁰, b. 6 July 1843 Nunda, NY, d. 10 March 1875 Nunda, NY from consumption after a long and painful illness at age 32 years and four months; m. 11 June 1864 Esther A. Barker, b. 16 November 1843 Nunda, NY, d. 6 December 1880 Oneida, Kansas at age 37 years and 19 days from pleura-pneumonia.

Henry Fuller was a veteran of the Civil War. He served in the 33rd New York Volunteers. Esther Fuller was the daughter of Newton and Jane Bradley Barker of Nunda. In the 1880 census the widowed Esther Fuller lived in Portage, NY with her two sons. She must have moved to Kansas sometime after the census was taken on June 11, 1880 where she died. Both are buried in Nunda's Oakwood Cemetery in the Joshua Fuller lot and markers are in evidence. Neither is listed in the 1870 census for Nunda.

30. **Mary S. Fuller**¹⁰, b. August 1846 Nunda, NY, d. date unknown; m. (1) John Paine, b. 1838, d. 6 March 1870; m. (2) Edward Slater; m. (3) 1 January 1881 Charles Rolison, divorced; m. (4?) Harrison Hagadorn.

Published sources and United States Census records refer to this daughter of William C. Fuller as either Mary S. Fuller or May or Mary L. Fuller. Birth dates and placement in birth order also varies depending upon which first name and middle initial is used.

Mary Fuller's first husband, John Paine, served in the Civil War, Company F, 33rd Regulars, New York Volunteers. He was killed after the war in an explosion at nearby Dalton (Nunda Station) and is buried in the Joshua Fuller lot in Nunda's Oakwood Cemetery. A marker is in evidence.

At the time of the 1870 United States Census, Mary had remarried to Edward Slater, a Nunda farmer. What happened to Edward Slater is unknown. In the 1880 census Mary lived with her father and her children from both marriages. In the 1900 census Mary Slater lived with Harrison Hagadorn and was his housekeeper. The 1900 census recorded that Mary had been married for 27 years and had three living children. In the 1904 obituary of Mary's father, William C. Fuller, she was listed as Mary Slater and resided in Tuscarora, NY. Beginning in 1915 Mary is no longer identified as surviving in the obituaries of her siblings and cannot be located in the 1910 or 1920 federal census for New York. No death record can be found in the township, village, or cemetery records for Nunda and Mt. Morris.

However, the Nunda historian's notes and several published books on the Fullers and Nunda indicate that Mary remarried twice more. Her third husband, Charles Rolison, in 1900 lived in Nunda with his mother, sister, and son, and was divorced. The Nunda historian's notes said that he and Mary wed 1 January 1881. That is now confirmed by the January 15, 1881 issue of the *Nunda News*. The marriage was performed by Rev. N.H. Bell of the Nunda Presbyterian Church. Charles Rolison remarried to a woman named Emma by the 1910 census. This was his second marriage. Charles Rolison died in 1921 in Nunda, a widower living with his sister. In the 1900 census Harrison Hagadorn was also divorced, resided in Mt. Morris, NY and lived with his unmarried sister and housekeeper, Mary Slater. In the 1910 federal census he was living alone. Rolison family members do not know who Harry Rolison's mother was. There seems to be some mystery about his birth; even claims he was adopted. Harry Rolison never talked about his parentage to family members.

Drury, b.a. 1850 Nunda, NY, d. 24 August 1889 Minneapolis, MN from pneumonia; m. (2) John C. Cragin 21 May 1891 Kalamazoo, MI, b.a. 1839, d. between 1910 and 1920 United States censuses.

Samuel J. Drury was the son of Samuel and Margaret Drury of Nunda. Martha and Samuel Drury married after the 1870 census and moved to Kalamazoo. The reason is unknown, but Samuel Drury was a carpenter by profession and he may have gone looking for better employment. Samuel Drury's body was returned from Minneapolis to Kalamazoo for burial in Riverside Cemetery, Section F, lot 6. Martha Cragin resided at 908 N. Church Street in Kalamazoo. She is buried next to her first husband in Riverside Cemetery.

Also buried in the Drury lot are a young girl, Maggie Drury, who died 18 July 1872 at age 3½ years and a George Drury who died 17 October 1922 at age 53. It appears unlikely that these were the children of Martha and Samuel Drury because each was born 1870. In the 1870 census Martha Fuller and Samuel Drury were living with their respective parents. Martha had no children or grandchildren listed in obituary notices at the time of her death.

It is known that Rose Fuller remarried to an attorney by the last name of Evans and moved to Athens, PA. Arthur Fuller is buried in the Joshua Fuller lot in Nunda's Oakwood Cemetery. A marker is in evidence.

It is not known when George Fuller moved to Kalamazoo but sometime after the 1880 census since he was still single and living in Nunda, NY. Some sources claim that George Fuller lived for a time in California but this cannot be confirmed. In 1895 he had remarried and was living in Kalamazoo. In 1910 George and Ida Fuller lived on W. Frank Street. George was a carpenter at Smith and Pomeroy. Ida Fuller lived with her sister-in-law, Martha Fuller Cragin, after her husband's death and until her own. Ida Fuller was married only once and had no children. George and Ida Fuller are buried in Kalamazoo's Riverside Cemetery. A Rose Fuller is also buried in this same lot. She died in 1885 at the age of 22 years. Could this woman have been George Fuller's first wife?

Charles Fuller was regarded as a kind neighbor, an esteemed citizen, and a kind husband and father. Charles and Hattie Fuller are buried in

Nunda's Oakwood Cemetery across from the Joshua Fuller lot. Markers are in evidence.

Edith Carter was the daughter of Daniel Carter and Mary Elizabeth Adams Carter of Nunda. It is not known when the Fullers separated. In the 1900 census Edith Carter and her children resided in Olean, NY, but she was still listed as married. Edith remarried to L.D. Stalker and is buried in Johnson City, NY's Floral Park Cemetery. The Fullers were separated when Nancy committed suicide. Lula May Fuller was the daughter of Joseph and Florence Bailey. She resided in Kalamazoo since 1927 and was employed at the Pioneer Paper Company. After the death of Albert Fuller she remarried to Chester V. Hyde who survived her. Albert and Lula May are buried together in Riverside Cemetery, Kalamazoo.

Albert Fuller was employed at various times as a machinist, teamster, real estate salesman, flagman for the New York Central railroad, and a salesman for the C.H. Palmer Company. His last residence was 617 W. North Street in Kalamazoo.

FRED N. FULLER ANSWERS FINAL SUMMONS THURSDAY

Well Known Pioneer Died Suddenly at Rapid City Thursday Morning—Funeral Held Monday by the Masonic Order—Interment in Pine Slope Cemetery

Fred N. Fuller, a pioneer of the Black Hills and one of the best liked men who ever lived, passed away suddenly last Thursday morning at the Deaconess hospital in Rapid City, where he was taken the day before for treatment. Postmaster S. G. Mortimer went to Rapid City Friday and accompanied the body to Belle Fourche Saturday. The body lay in the Masonic home from Saturday until Monday when the funeral services were held. Interment was made in Pine Slope cemetery.

Mr. Fuller had been in poor health for some time suffering from gall stones. Wednesday of last week he was taken to Rapid City where he underwent an operation early Thursday morning. He never came out from under the anesthetic, passing away while on the operating table.

The sudden death of Mr. Fuller came as a shock to his many friends here and the family in Santa Monica, Calif. He was a man among men. His word was as good as gold. Being one of the earliest settlers in this part of the country he grew up with the west and was a true westerner in every respect. In his passing the family lose a wonderful father and Belle Fourche a worthy citizen.

Fred Fuller was born July 14, 1859, at Iowa Falls, Iowa. When a young man, in the year 1883, he came to Belle Fourche, and was employed on the Bullock ranch. He was made foreman of the ranch, which position he held for about ten years.

In October, 1898, he was united in marriage to Effie Andre. To this union two daughters were born, Martha and Irene. In November the same year he was elected county treasurer of Butte county. He held

this office for two terms. After the completion of his two terms in office he moved onto the Harrison ranch east of town, where he engaged in farming and raising of livestock. The farm occupied about a section of land and Mr. Fuller built the place up to one of the finest ranches in this section of the country. He was making his home here when he was called by death.

Mrs. Fuller and the two daughters have been making their home in California for the past few years, as he former has been in very poor health. The deceased is survived by his wife and two daughters, Martha and Irene, of Santa Monica, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. Katie Cananaugh of Eagle Rock, Calif.; a cousin, Mrs. Geo. Scott of Los Angeles, and another cousin, George Craft, formerly of Belle Fourche, but now of Seattle, Wash. Martha was here to attend the funeral, but Irene had to remain with her mother, who was unable to come.

Funeral services were held at the Masonic home here Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and were conducted by Rev. D. W. Tracy and the Masonic order of which Mr. Fuller was a member for a number of years. The pall bearers were R. E. Hall, David Broomfield, D. R. Evans, Frank Cock and W. B. Penfold. Following the services at the Masonic home the body was taken to Pine Slope cemetery where the Masons conducted their grave services.

Following is the Masonic record of Fred N. Fuller:

He was initiated in Cedar Lodge No. 124, A. F. & A. M. on October 21, 1898. He was passed to the degree of fellowcraft December 21, 1900. On January 18, 1901, he was

raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason. He was made a Work Master Mason in Japeth Chapter February 9, 1908. He was a past and most excellent master February 17, 1908, and was also made a Royal Arch Mason on February 24, 1908. On July 12, 1923, he was made a Knight Templar in the Spearfish Commandary.

Selling in the neighborhood of \$7,000 worth of live stock and general farm equipment in four hours and thirty minutes was the record made by Col. R. H. Maltby at the F. N. Fuller Estate public sale Saturday of last week. Ten head of cows averaged \$148.70 each; twenty-one head, including 10 cows, 6 yearlings, 5 baby calves, averaged \$87.50; 1 team of mules brought \$300, horses sold as high as \$150. The sale attracted a large crowd as it was known the live stock was of exceptional quality, and the farm equipment was the best. Mr. Fuller had been many years improving his live stock, and equipping the ranch with machinery that meant saving of labor and increased profits. Coming to the Black Hills as a young man in 1883, Mr. Fuller worked as foreman on the SB horse ranch, was foreman of the Mike Elmore stock ranch at Alliance, Nebr., then bought the D. T. Harrison irrigated ranch 3 miles east of Belle Fourche, and has since been engaged in farming, stock raising, and running a band of sheep on the range. He knew the farming and live stock business, and the quality of the live stock and other things sold at the sale proved it.

FULLER DEATH IS SURPRISE TO MANY FRIENDS

Prominent Rancher Dies Suddenly on
Operating Table After Short
Illness.

Fred N. Fuller, for forty-four years one of the well-known ranchmen of the Belle Fourche country, died on the operating table at the Rapid City hospital shortly before noon Thursday of last week. The body was brought to Belle Fourche Friday. Funeral service was conducted at the Masonic Temple Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and burial was in Pine Slope cemetery that afternoon.

Mr. Fuller first complained of not feeling well Monday. Tuesday night he was restless, and early that morning his condition became such that a physician was called. Wednesday he was taken to Rapid City for X-ray examination, the pictures showing an affection of the bladder. It was deemed best to operate at once, but his condition was such that he could not stand the shock.

Word of his death was a surprise to his many friends in Belle Fourche, as it was not generally known that he had been ill, as he was around on the streets and assisting with the work at his ranch, three miles east of town, up to the day he was taken to Rapid City.

Mrs. Fuller, who has been in poor health, and the two daughters, Martha and Irene, have made their home in Santa Monica, Calif. Mrs. Fuller's health would not permit her to come to the funeral, and the younger daughter, Irene, remained with the mother. Miss Martha arrived in Belle Fourche Sunday.

The funeral, the first to be held in the new Masonic Temple, was conducted by Rev. D. W. Tracy, Master of the lodge. Miss Mary Craig sang two solos, and two selections were given by a quartette. At the grave, D. C. Barr conducted the impressive Masonic burial service.

Fred Norman Fuller was born Jan. 14, 1883, at Iowa Falls, Iowa, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Fuller. There Fuller spent his boyhood. At the age of twenty-four or in 1907, he came with his parents to the Black Hills,

locating on the Star & Bullock ranch, just east across Redwater from where Belle Fourche now stands. His father came to take charge of the breeding and raising of thoroughbred trotting horses, then one of the principal activities on that ranch. Mr. Fuller's father being an expert horseman. In the fall of that year Fred Fuller was made foreman of the Star & Bullock ranch, known as the SB ranch. He remained in that position for the following ten years. In 1898 he moved to Belle Fourche and with his brother, George, operated the Bullock feed and sales barn, located about where Arthur Adams barns now stand. They also conducted a dairy in connection with the barn. A few years later the brothers erected the Fuller Bros. feed and sales stables, now occupied as a garage by John Pearson. In 1898 he was elected as county treasurer of Butte county, serving in that capacity for four years. At the close of his two terms as county treasurer, he went to Alliance, Neb., where for two years he was foreman of the Mike Elmore stock ranch, one of the large ranches of northwestern Nebraska. Returning to Belle Fourche he bought the D. T. Harrison irrigated ranch,

three miles east of Belle Fourche to which he devoted his time up to the time of his death. In connection with this ranch he also engaged in the sheep business, at one time being in partnership with James T. Craig in a bunch of sheep that were ranged in the Moreau river country.

In October, 1898, Mr. Fuller was united in marriage to Miss Effie Andre of Belle Fourche. To this union two children, Martha and Irene, were born, who, with the mother, one sister, Katherine, who lives in California, survive. One sister, Susie, died a number of years ago, and a brother, George, died in Colorado three years ago.

When a man lives in one locality for over forty years, and at the end of that time can name practically every man, woman and child, as a friend, it is pretty good evidence that his life has been well spent. Such a man was Fred Fuller. As a young man he had the confidence of his employers, when he embarked in business for himself he had the confidence of the business men of the community, and this confidence he retained until his death. Industrious, scrupulously honest, and a man who gave close attention to his business, made him a success in his ventures. In the passing of Mr. Fuller this section of the country loses a

man whose death will be generally mourned.

Mr. Fuller was a member of Cedar Lodge, A. F. & A. M., No. 124, receiving his Master Mason degree on January 18, 1901; a member of Japheth Chapter, R. A. M., taking his Royal Arch degree on February 29, 1908; a member of Black Hills Commandery No. 23, taking these degrees in July, 1920, and a member of the A. O. U. W.

An escort of Commandery members commanded by Walter Harkness of Spearfish was present at the funeral, as was also an escort of members of the A. O. U. W. Pall bearers were R. Cock, W. B. Penfold, R. E. Hall, C. P. Cleveland, Dave Broomfield, D. R. Evans.



The Petition of Chancy W. Fuller of Middlebury
County of Addison and State of Vermont, humbly sheweth

That your Petitioner was in the Service of
The United States in the War of A.D. 1812 between
The United States and Great Britain; That he Enlisted
into such Service on the 15th day of June A.D. 1812
at Middlebury aforesaid into Captain Brattins Company
of the Second Regiment of Light Dragoons, that in
a few days thereafter, he in Company with others proceeded to
Burlington Vermont where he was enrolled into the
Service, that his Company sometime in the Fall of the
same year went with the Army under the Command of
General Dearborn to Champlain in the State of New
York and back again with said Army, that in the
first part of February of the same year I was selected
and sent to Greenbush in the State of New York for the
purpose of military drill, where I remained until the
latter part of the Month of March A.D. 1813, when I proce-
ded to Danville Caladonia County Vermont
where Captains Hall and Brattins Companies lay in
Winter Quarters, and when I commenced drilling said
Companies in Military Discipline, that sometime in the
latter part of April of that year I proceeded in connection
with a part of said Companies to Derby Line in Vermont and
in the Month of June returned to Burlington, that in the
latter part of September we proceeded under the Command of
Major General Hampton through a portion of the State of
New York into Canada, I performing in the mean time the
Office of orderly to General Hampton, that sometime in the
first part of December I returned to Burlington Vermont

from which place I was ordered to Plattsburgh in February A.D. 1814
from thence we proceeded under the command of General Wilkinson
to Cole's Mills where we had a short engagement with the Enemy
in which engagement I participated. that I returned to Plattsburgh
for the course of a month. that in the month of July follow-
ing we proceeded under the command of General Spauld
to Chasse and Champlain in said State. During which time I
acted as Drill Master, returned to Plattsburgh in the rear
of General Spauld's Army some time in the latter part of August
when I remained acting as Sergeant to the Men under the
command of General MacComb, most of the time engaged
in riding on the Piquette until the 6th of September, on the morning
of which day I was ordered by General MacComb to accompany
him to Bittern town to meet the Enemy at that place where we had
an engagement. During the fight I was ordered by the General to take
a Man and go onto the Dead Creek Road so called and to report if the
British came in upon that Road. on which road I proceeded somewhat
over a mile, the Enemy having taken Bittern town Road so called which
was a parallel road to the one on which I was leading, to Plattsburgh
to which place I continued my course and when I arrived at
Lakes Point so called upon Plattsburgh Bay I found that the
Enemy had reached the Town before me and that the Bridge, across the
Saratoga, which communicated with our Army was torn up, and the
Enemy between me and it. that in order to join General MacComb
I was compelled to descend a steep Bank and swim my horse across the
river in doing which I was discovered by the British some thirty or
forty of whom near by rushed towards me and fired upon me
while I was in the water calling out to me at the same time to
surrender which I did not choose to do, when they again fired
upon me repeating their demand which I discarded, the balls
fell thickly around me cutting off my Mail straps and Bridal reins
and when I reached the opposite shore I found that I was severely
wounded in my right leg near the thigh or groin, General MacComb
who saw me when I reach the shore ordered me to the Hospital and
a Surgeon Dr. Mann, since deceased, to dress my wounds.

Before the wound was healed, at the request of General
McCarr I attempted to do light duty in the discharge
of which getting thoroughly wet by being out in a heavy
rain I took cold in the wound and was again confin-
ed with it for some six weeks, when I was appointed Provost
Marshal, in which office I continued until after the cancella-
tion of the Peace Establishment, ^{at the close of the war A.D. 1815} when I was transferred to
to the Corps of Artillery Captain Churchill's Company
of which Company I was orderly Sergeant, that in the
early part of the Summer of A.D. 1816 we went to Governors
Island in New York where I was discharged, ^{in the month of October of that year} that during
all which time I was more or less troubled with the wound
above mentioned and from the time of my discharge to the
present it has continued to afflict me more and more until I
am not able now to do any labor by which I can earn
a livelihood and have to depend upon my friends for
support, that aside from the above named wound I
have had no casualty or sickness of any kind what soever
by which I have become disabled, that heretofore I have
filed an application and papers in the Pension Office for
the purpose of obtaining a Pension under the Act of Congress
granting Pensions to invalid Soldiers and that said applica-
tion has been rejected by the Commissioners of Pensions on
the grounds alleged in a letter addressed to the late
Hon James Buchanan at that time Member of Congress
a copy of which letter is herewith transmitted with other
papers relating to the case. That for other papers and
proofs relating to the same your Honorable Body is
referred to those on file in the Pension Office in
the Department of the Interior.

That your Petitioner therefore prays your Honorable
Body to grant him such relief in the premises as may
appear just and reasonable

I Samuel Elbridge of Middlebury in the County of Addison in the State of Vermont now sixty three years of age having been duly sworn, on oath say, that I have known Chauncy W. Fuller for more than forty years and that we have during all that time resided in the same town of Middlebury and in the same neighborhood, excepting while the said Fuller was in the United States service as hereinafter stated, that said Fuller, in the month of June A.D. 1812 at said Middlebury enlisted into the army of the United States, and was first enrolled or placed in the company of Capt. John Butler in the second Regiment of Light Dragoons commanded by Col. Burns, and remained in the service of the United States until after the close of the war with Great Britain, that I volunteered to go from Vermont to the Battle of Plattsburgh, and arrived at Plattsburgh on Monday the 12th day of September 1814, the day after that battle, and soon after my arrival there, I was informed that said Fuller had been wounded in that engagement, I very soon went to his quarters to see him and found him with the thigh of his right leg bandaged, and he was suffering and very lame from a wound in said thigh. He told me that while our troops were skirmishing with the English at Buckamantown he had been sent by General Macomb to watch the motions of the enemy on the East or Lake road, so called, and give information if the enemy approached by that road, and while he was engaged on that service our troops had retreated and crossed the bridge over the Saranac, and that when he the said Fuller returned he found the enemy between him and the bridge and the bridge torn up, and he had no way to join our troops but to swim the mouth of the river, which the

did, and while he was crossing the river by swim-
ming his horse he was discovered by the enemy
and fired upon by them, and in that way re-
ceived the wound in his thigh from a musket
ball. I remained at Milledburg three days
and was with Fuller much of the time, and
saw his wound dressed. It was very much
inflamed, and he has ever since been lame in
consequence of that wound. I saw at Milled-
burg David Staples and several others who
all confirmed the statement of said Fuller as
to the manner in which he received said wound.
I have ever since Mr. Fuller's return to Middle-
burg lived near neighbors to him, and know
that this wound has given him much trouble,
and his lameness is increasing, and he has
uniformly stated that he received the wound
as above stated in the United States service

Personal records of the Chauncey Fuller (1791-1851) family of Wickliffe, Lake County, Ohio, ^(Show that Chauncey Fuller) Married at Cleveland, Ohio, ~~Feb 26~~ ^{17 Oct} 1820, to Maria Freeman daughter of Nathan Freeman and Cynthia Shepard, that Maria was born in the state of New York and came to Ohio from Rutland, Vermont. She was a sister of Theron Freeman of Euclid, Ohio who married Esther daughter of Judge John Harris Strong of Euclid and that Nathan Freeman their father saw service in the Revolutionary army.

Van Alstyne "Born, married, and died in Sharon, Connecticut" shows that Nathan Freeman married Cynthia Shepard at Amenia, N. Y., November 28, 1784, the same record shows that Samuel Shepard married Sarah Cook at Sharon, Connecticut, November 6, 1754. Theron Freeman, the first child of Nathan and Cynthia, born 1785, married at Euclid, Ohio, March 14, 1814, Esther Strong, who had come to Ohio from Connecticut with her father. Theron, named his first child, a son, Samuel Shepard Freeman and his first daughter Sarah Freeman after his Shepard grandparents (Strong genealogy).

The Federal Census of 1790 shows Nathan Freeman living at ^{Amenia, N. Y.} as the head of a family with one male child under 6 years of age and three females in the family, wife Cynthia and two daughters. The census of 1800 shows Nathan living at Granville, N. Vermont, with two male children under 10, one 16 and under 26 (Theron) and one female child 10 and under 16 years (Maria) Nathan's age given as 45 and upward that of his wife as 26 and under 45. We have no further record of Nathan and his wife nor of any of their children other than Theron and Maria both of whom lived and died in northern Ohio and are buried in the cemetery at Wickliffe, Lake County, Ohio, adjacent to the old Fuller Tavern on the main road from Buffalo to Cleveland. Just when they came to Ohio we do not know. Theron is supposed to have come during the period 1811 to 1814. It is possible that Maria came at the same time.

This record was compiled long after those who could have furnished this information had passed on.

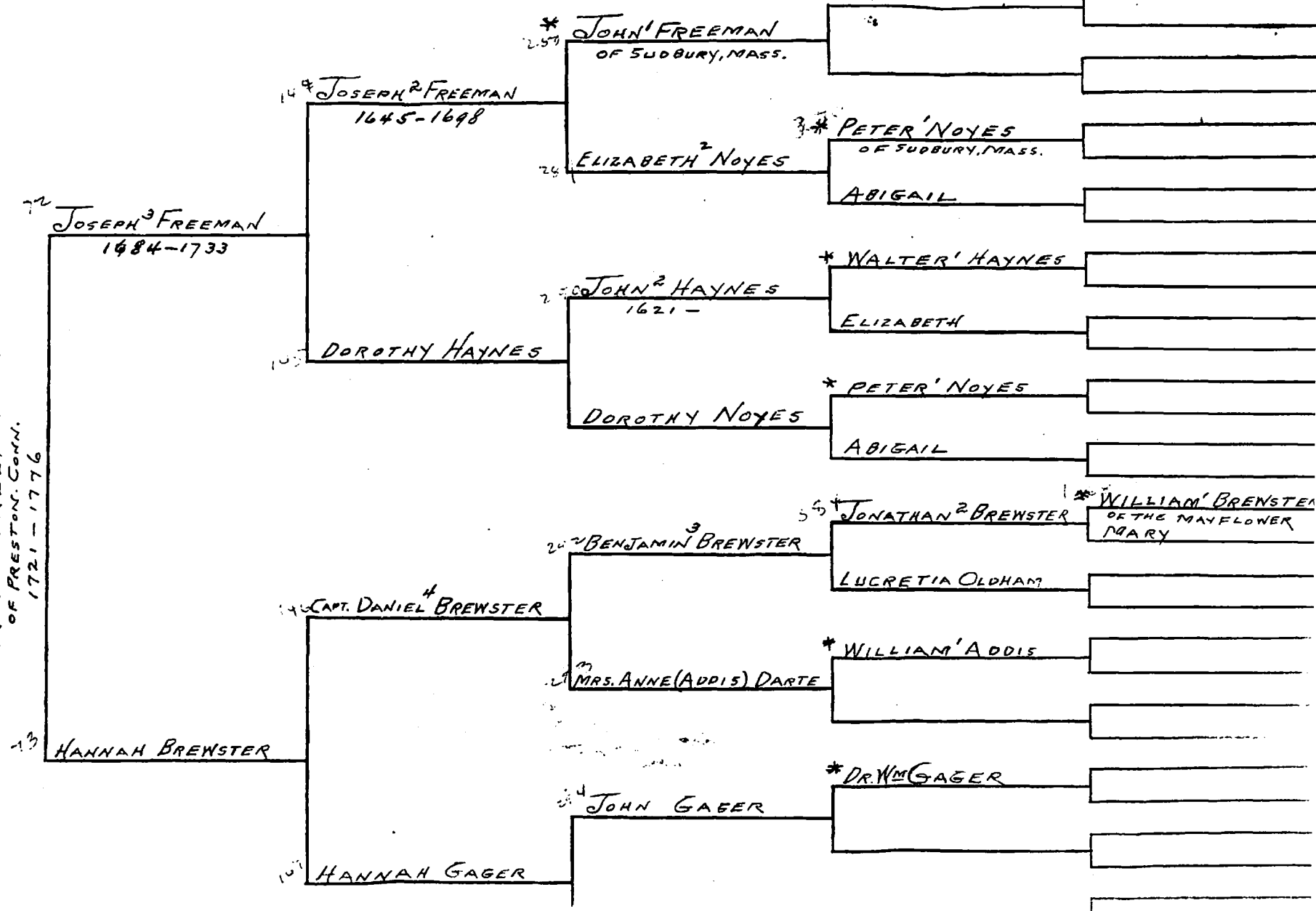

AMERICAN FULLER GENEALOGY.

CAPTAIN MATTHEW FULLER LINE.

MATTHEW¹ FULLER, b. — in England; d. in Barnstable, Aug., 1678; m. —, Frances —; b. —, in England; d. — in Barnstable.

MATTHEW¹ FULLER probably b. 1603 in Redenhall Parish, in Harleston, Norfolk Co., England, came to America and settled in Plymouth, in 1640.

At this time he was married, and a parent. Of his early history, little is known, but he was doubtless acquiring the knowledge of surgery and military affairs which he afterwards put to good use. In April, 1642, ten acres of land were granted him in Plymouth, and in the same year he was juryman and propounded freeman of the Colony, but was not sworn and admitted until June 7, 1653. In 1643, he was appointed sergeant in the military company of the Colony, of which Miles Standish was captain. About 1650, he removed to Barnstable. In 1653, he represented that town in the Colony Court, and was already lieutenant of the militia there. June 20, 1654, he was appointed lieutenant under Capt. Standish of the Company of fifty men, the quota of Plymouth Colony, in the proposed expedition against the Dutch at Manhattan. All preparations had been made, when news of peace arrived and further service became unnecessary. Oct. 2, 1658, he was elected one of the Council of War, and in 1671 its chairman, and one of the magistrates of the Colony, and in the same year lieutenant of the forces to be sent against the Saconet Indians. Dec. 17, 1673, he was appointed Surgeon-General of the Colony troops, and also of those of Massachusetts, if that Colony approved. For this service he was allowed 4 shillings a day. In King Phillip's War he was captain of the Plymouth forces. In the Quaker controversy, Capt. Fuller took a noble stand in favor of religious toleration. He lived near neighbors to some of the most prominent of the Quakers, and was connected by marriage alliances with some who felt the severity of the laws passed against the sect. He went so far as to censure this law in strong terms in public. For this he was fined by the magistrates. Though indiscreet in speech, the court continued to confer offices of

trust and honor upon him,—a most unusual course which shows that his honor and bravery were never doubted. In his public and private life he was a man of sound judgment, of good understanding, faithful in performance of duty, liberal in politics, tolerant in religion. Captain Fuller was also the first regular physician settled in Barnstable. His homestead was in the northwest corner of Barnstable, at Scorton Neck. He also possessed large tracts in Falmouth and Middleboro, granted for the eminent services he had rendered the Colony. His will was dated July 25, 1678, and was proved Oct. 30th following. His estate was appraised at £1667,04,06, a very large amount for those times. Among the items is the following: "Pearls, precious stones and diamonds, at a guess, £200."

WILL OF CAPTAIN MATTHEW FULLER.

This will is recorded in volume three, page 127 of the Plymouth Colony wills and inventories. A verbatim copy is found in a volume in the registry of Probate at Barnstable, from which this is copied.

"The five and twentieth day of July in the yeere of our Lord one thousand six hundred seaventy and eight, I Matthew Fuller of the Towne of Barnstable in the Collonie of New Plymouth, Being sicke of body, but of Good and perfect memory, thanks be unto almighty God; and Calling to Remembrance the uncertaine state of this transitory life and that all Flesh must yield unto Death, when it shall please God to Call, doe make Constitute and ordaine and declare this my last will and Testament, In manor and forme following, Revoking and Anulling by these presencc all and every testament and Testaments will and wills heertofores by mee made and declared either by word or writing; and this to be taken onely

for my last will and Testament; and none other; and first being penitent and sorry from the bottom of my heart for my sins past, most humbly desiring forgiveness for the same.

I Give and Comitt my soyle upto almighty God my Savior and Redeemer, in whom and by the Meretts of Jesus Christ I trust and believe assuredly to be saved, and my body to be buried in such place as my executors heerafter named shall appoint, and Now for the Settling of my temporall estate and such Goods Chattels and debts as it hath pleased God farr above my desires (?deserts) to bestowe on mee. I doe order Give and dispose the same in manor and forme following. That is to say

first I will that all those debts and duties as I ow in Right or Conscience to any manner of person or persons whatsoever shal be well and truly contented or ordained to be payed within Convenient time after my decease by my executors heerafter Named.

Item. I Give and bequeath unto Shubael Jones my grandchild the Reputed son of Ralph Jones the angle lott of marsh meddow which I formerly bought of his father Ralph Jones after Frances my wifes decease.

I give and bequeath the one halfe of all my Lands and meddow I have in the Townshipp of Barnstable or elsewhere in America To my welbeloved son John Fuller after Frances my wifes decease.

I give and bequeath unto the naturall sonnes of my son Samuel Fuller deceased, Thomas Fuller, Jabez Fuller, Matthias Fuller and Samuel Fuller The other halfe of all the lands and meddows I have in the Townshipp of Barnstable or elsewhere in America after my wifes decease.

I give and bequeath to Samuell Fuller the son of Samuell Fuller my eldest son deceased my now dwelling house with all the land and meddow belonging to the homestead where I now live, after my wifes decease and if it hapen that hee shoyld die without issue That then it shall Goe to the Rest of them brethren that do survive.

It is my will that if my son John Fuller die without issue that then the lands and meddowes I have already Given to him Bethyah the wife John Fuller shall enjoy the full benefitt and use of themm to her dieling day, and then Goe to the Rest of my children begotten of my owne body.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Jones the wife of Ralph Jones Ten pounds in mony.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Ann Fuller The now wife of Samuell Fuller ten pounds in mony.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Elizabeth Rowley the wife of Moses Rowley ten pounds in mony.

Item. I give and bequeath unto Sarah Rowley the daughter of Moses Rowley all my sheep and by these presents I doe appoint Jedediah Jones to oversee the sheep That they be Employed wholly for the use of the said Sarah.

Item. I give and bequeath ten poynds to Jedediah Jones, the son of Ralph Jones in Mony.

Item. I give and bequeath to every one of my male Grandchildren half a Crowne a peece in old England mony.

Item. I give to every one of my severall Grandchildren twelve pence a peece in old England mony.

Item. I give to Ralph Jones, Samuell Fuller Junr and Moses Rowley Senr my sonnes-in-law, five shillings a peece in mony.

I Give and bequeath unto my onely beloved son John Fuller twenty ponds in silver mony and to his wife Bethya twenty shillings in Gould.

I Give to Mary Fuller the late wife of my son Samuell Fuller deceased five shillings in Mony.

I give and bequeath unto Robert Marshall the Scotsman a peece of Cloth intended to make mee a suite off.

Item. I Give and bequeath to Jasper Tayler two Rayzers.

I Give and bequeath to Francis my deare and welbeloved wife who by

these presents I doe ordaine and declare to be the sole executrix of this my last Will and Testament the use and Improvement of all my housing lands and meddows during her Naturall life, as alsoe all my Moveables, house-hold stuffe Cattle horse kind swine whatsoever else Can be Named and disposed of to be att her dispose forever.

In witness whereof I have heer unto sett my hand and seal the day and year above said.

Matthew Fuller and a seal.

Signed and sealed in the presence of
Joseph Laythorpe
John Hawes

Lieut. Joseph Laythorpe and John hawes made onth to the truth of the Will above written viz. That they did see Capt Mathew Fuller above said signe and seale and declare this aforesaid Will to be his Last Will and Testament before the Court holden att Plymouth the 30th of October 1678.

SECOND GENERATION.

4. SAMUEL² FULLER, (*Matthew*¹), b. — in England; d. March 25, 1676 at Rehoboth, killed in the Indian attack upon that place; m. — Mary —, who survived him. A widow Mary Fuller, probably this one, was a member of the West Barnstable Church in 1683.

In 1670 he was a member of the Colony Committee appointed to view the injury done to the Indians, by the cattle of the English, and assess damages. He was also a town officer. He resided at Barnstable. He was a lieutenant in King Phillip's war, and was killed at Rehoboth, March 25, 1676. He must not be confounded with Capt. Samuel Fuller, killed at Rehoboth, Aug. 15, 1676, who was son of Robert Fuller, of Salem, and whose wife was Mary Ide.

The will of Lieut. Samuel Fuller of Barnstable, dated Aug. 2, 1675, proved June 7, 1676 is found in the probate records at Plymouth. A copy of it is also to be seen at the probate office in Barnstable. The names of his children are known from the will only, the youngest being posthumous.

April 9, 1750, he bought of John Fuller of East Haddam, Ct., 51 acres of land situated on the east side of the Ct. River, in Middletown, now Chatham, two rods from the Haddam line. In this deed he is called "of Haddam," and had probably resided in the same locality, now known as "Haddam Neck" for some years before.

July 11, 1760, he transferred this land to his son Abijah and perhaps died not long after. Malatiah, wife of Samuel Fuller, joined Cong. Church at Middle Haddam, Nov. 24, 1751.

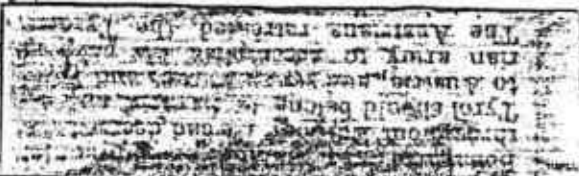
