DESCENDANTS OF WALTER HAYNES AND PETER NOYES, OF SUDBURY, MASS.

THE following facts were obtained for the greater part from a copy of an old manuscript, the original of which was written by John Haynes (b. 1684) describing the families of his great grandparents Walter Haynes and Peter Noyes, who came to this country together and located in Sudbury. This was written later than 1772, since it gives that date, and was probably prepared when the writer of the original was nearly 90 years of age. The manuscript was found among the papers of his grandson Samuel Haynes (b. 1737) by the latter's grandson Wm. F. Haynes, and a copy was made by his cousin Clark Lewis Haynes (b. 1807) the grandfather of the present writer, Frederick Haynes Newell.

Savage's Genealogical Dictionary gives many of the more important of these names and dates, and a comparison shows a remarkably close agreement in details. The old manuscript, however, gives much information of the fourth generation and children succeeding—facts not otherwise recorded so far as has been ascertained. For historical narrative concerning Walter Haynes, Peter Noyes and their sons, reference should be made to the History of Sudbury, Mass., by Alfred Serano Hudson, published by the town in 1889.

1. WALTER¹ HAYNES was born in England in 1583, in the town of Sutton, Mandeville, county of Wilts.* He also owned a house and out-buildings in the village of Shaston, situated in the island of Purbeck, in the south-eastern portion of Dorsetshire. He, with family and servants, arrived in Boston in 1638, in ship Confidence (see Savage, also REGISTER vol. ii. p. 108). In the same ship came Peter Noyes, yeoman, of Penton, county of Southampton, with children and servants.

Walter Haynes was a linen weaver, and was 55 years of age when he came to this country. About a year after his arrival, he with others removed from Watertown, having obtained a grant for a township named Sudbury, where they settled Dec. 22, 1639. He was made freeman 1640, was representative in the years 1641, 1644, 1648 and 1651, and was one of the Selectmen of Sudbury for ten years. He died Feb. 14, 1665, aged 82. (See Whitman's History of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, 1842, p. 97.)

Ann Stokeley; Henry Towles (2) 1670-1734 m. Hannah Therriotte; Stokeley Towles (3) 1711-1765 m. Elizabeth Martin Henry Towles (4) 1738-1799 m. JUDITH HAYNES; etc.-----Written consent of Elizabeth Martin Towles to the marriage of her son Henry Towles to JUDITH HAYNES, dated May 15, 1760... Lancaster Co., Va... Written consent of WILLIAM DYMER (not sure of spelling); it could be Grymer - guardian of JUDITH HAYNES to her marrying Henry Towles Dated May 16, 1760----Lancaster Co., Va. marriage Records May 19, 1760...  Note: Robert Terrell will 1786, Orange Co., Va. "Item: I desire that the land I now live on containing 231 acres, also the land I hold in Culpeper Co. which I purchased of CHARLES GRAYMER containing by estimation 500 acres, etc. etc.

These families were so tied up... I am particularly interested in connecting up this JUDITH HAYNES of Lancaster Co., Va. to my JASPER HAYNES, since he was tied up with all of these families. Also, his daughter, ANN HAYNES, married JOSEPH CLARK, son of WILLIAM CLARK of Orange Co., Va. (b. Culpeper, 1716) who m. 1st, Ann James, and 2nd, MARTHA FOSTER (the latter being mother of Joseph). Mr. Newman, the genealogist, in his article on the "TOWLES & CLARK FAMILIES" says that the children of Stokeley Towles (1690-1751) and those of William Clark intermarried to such an extent that the lines were "practically identical". He also claims that MARTHA FOSTER (wife of Wm. Clark) was "a cousin of the Terrills who married into the family of Stokeley Towles" which would mean the New Kent Co. Fosters, though there is

some relationship to Anthony Foster as well.

Mrs. Irene M. Strieby is most interested in the AMBROSE POWELL of Augusta Co., Va. who d. ca. 1773 & left legacy to sister SARAH HAINES & children DICKY & STEPHEN HAINES. She went to Aug. Co. but could find no box of papers connected with estate settlement. Wants to know if she was related to the Ambrose Powell of the Thos. Walker (Ky.) expedition in 1750 - & which is the Ambrose Powell mentioned in Kegley's Va. Frontier, p. 277, "Order of Montgomery Co. Va. Court - 2000 a. Ambrose Powell (staff Officer from 1755)?"

The Haines book of Mr. John W. Haines, 134 "poche Trail, Medford Lakes, N.J. has been published. Would like to have a copy, but hospital and medical expenses for both myself and my daughter during the last few months have been so terrific, that I have been forced to forget all unessential expenses. He intended putting in something about the family in England and including the Va. branches at least briefly. If anyone has seen the book, would appreciate knowing just what he has to say of the family in England and in Va. He tells me that Mrs. A. L. Feltenberger of Waxahachie, Texas is interested in the Haynes family of Dauphin Co., Pa., before going to N.C. "Pioneer Women of the West" is about this family.

Mr. Felix W. Haynes of Forayth, Mont., is also interested in this family. Sometimes the earliest ancestor is given as JOSEPH and sometimes as CHRISTOPHER. One son was BARTHOLOMEW, and there was a Bartholomew Hains in New York. No apparent connection.

Mrs. G. Haynes Grant, Sr., 2370 Olga Place, Jacksonville 5, Fla. writes as follows: "WILLIAM HAYNES interested me for this reason: in the old inventory dated 1773-4 an orphan of FRANCIS BITHELL HAYNES who d. Halifax Co. N.C. 1770, the guardian is named CHRISTOPHER HAYNES ...we presume he is an uncle of the orphans named: BITHELL, CHRISTOPHER THOMAS, FRANCIS, MARY, LUCY, HANNAH. However, not long after the inventory was dated-apparently the estate of said FRANCIS BITHELL HAYNES was settled: in the settlement (according to Mr. Boddie) WILLIAM HAYNES was named, but HANNAH and FRANCIS were not named as having rec'd their portion of estate. We feel a WILLIAM HAYNES was a half-brother.....Our Haynes tradition has beought down to us that our Haynes were of the same family in England as Gov. John Haynes of Conn. & Mass - not necessarily his direct line, which according to tradition, the Haynes (ours) were closely related to those of the LANDON HAYNES line, which began with a CHRISTOPHER HAYNES, interpreter to Gen. Milinburg in 1647 in Phila. - as far back as it has been worked out, according to Miss Grace Haynes, dau. of Landon Carter Haynes (named for the 1st Landon Carter Haynes).

"Frances Davenport, head of Hist. & Gen. section, Conn. State Library, Hartford, Conn. says that "Gov. Jno. Haynes had 5 sons & 3 daus; of the sons, ROBERT & HEEZELIAN were by 1st wife and remained in England. ROBERT died without issue. JOHN, the old. son by the Gov's 2nd wife also went to live in Eng. while ROGER died early on a voyage thence. The 5th son, JOSEPH, was a minister in Hartford, m. Sarah Lord and had as only son JOHN. This John, b. 1668, m. Mary Glover of Springfield, Mass. and had JOSEPH, SARAH, JARED and MARY. Only MARY had issue and the statement is made "with the death of his (John's) sons the male line of this Haynes family in America became extinct."

"Therefore our conclusion is that our Haynes may not be of Jno. Haynes

direct line, but a really stem from the same family in England.

"The Am. Gen. Index lists a FRANCIS HAYNES as "father's refugee also a FRANCIS A. HAYNES with a connection to Balch family (many of these in Robeson Co. N.C. where our BYTHEL HAYNES was living before moving to Whiteville N.C. (later Columbus Co.). I had thought the FRANCIS HAYNES who was in Norfolk when Norfolk burned was possibly our line, but I see you identify him in your line..but many of these listed as losing their homes in Norfolk were names shown in connect with the Haynes who left N.C. for Miss. The will of JOHN HAYNES of Copford Hall, Essex, son of GEN. HEZEKIAH HAYNES, dated 5 Sept. 1691, states "by settlement aforesaid have assured the said farm called Newers, also also the Hill farm with the appurts. in Copford, Much Birch, Little Birch and Tannaway Co. Essex, to son JNO. HAYNES, after the decease of my said wife and to his heirs and in default to HEZEKIAH HAYNES his heirs and in default I give same Hill farm and appurts. to my loving sister Ann Cox (through her the "Harrisons obtained Copford Hall which they now possess) Her daughter m. Rev. Jno. Harrison.

"P. 349, New Eng. Antiquarian Reg. Vol. 1) Gen. of HAYNES Family communicated by Guy C. Haynes Esq. of E. Boston at a meeting of the Hist. & Gen. Soc. in Boston July 11, 1855. Mr. Haynes, a member, exhibited a cane given to him by his grandfather THOMAS HAYNES of Haverhill on his liberation as a reward for his good conduct by an Indian chief to whom he had been captive. Mr. Haynes made statement in regard to his ancestry from which it appeared that he was the 4th gen. from the emigrant, JONATHAN HAYNES who was b. Eng. 1616; that was b. when his father was 71 yrs. old and that his father was b. when his father (gr gr-father of Mr. Haynes) was 64 yrs. of age; or of Mr. Haynes's sisters was upwards of 50 yrs. older than he (state entered in records of Gen. Soc.) JONATHAN HAYNES b. Eng. 1616 tradition says came to this country 1633-35. Tradition says he was bro. of JONATHAN HAYNES of Conn. who emigrated 1635. These are circumstances which make it appear probable that WILLIAM HAYNES of Salem who was made freeman in 1648 was a brother of JONATHAN. Jonathon Haynes removed with family from Newbury to Haverhill. His children were: MARY, THOMAS, JONATHAN & JOSEPH. They were taken by the Indians in his field near Bradley Mills. One party of Indians took THOMAS his father to Maine, where they escaped later. The other party to MARY, JONATHAN & JOSEPH and went to Canada and sold them to the French. MARY was redeemed; JONATHAN and Samuel Ladd were killed by the Indians.

"A note from Antiquarian Register states HARRIS HAYNES b. 10 1780 m. 1793 Mary Nichols pg. 351.

"Data left by Rev. J.H. Haynes to a desc. Mary Margaret Haynes mentions a JASPER HAYNES....marriages in Ga. show PARNELL HAYNES, JASPER HAYNES &.

"...Mr. Huddle had set our Haynes up as stemming from ANTHONY "Anthony Jr. went to Ga.....Miriam Gainer (1798-1800) in Va. "HAYNES (1797-1864).....it may be our line stems

THOMAS HAYNES, son of FRANCIS BITHELL HAYNES. Mr. Boddie, however, felt that the will of one THOMAS HAYNES in N.C. was our THOMAS, and apparently he was a bachelor...in his last Vol. IV. on Southern Families he has a few things listed that we know are incorrect....

"I found a Haynes Bible at Fair Bluff, N.C....however the lady said her ancestor was FRANCIS LAWRENCE HAYNES, who had son FRANK HAYNES & Frankhas ALEXANDER HAYNES...not a single Bythel or Bithell Haynes.

"There was intermarriage in N.C. with our Bythel Haynes' children and some Powells. - from John Powell of Johnson Co. N.C.

".....Bithell Haynes who went to Miss. Territory a. 1810 evidently m. 1st at Armistead and 2nd. a Bridwin. His will however, does not name a wife, so both must have predecd. him in death....FRANCIS LAWRENCE HAYNES was in Edgecombe Co. N.C. - exor of Jno. Higge will...WILLIAM & MELTON HAYNES listed in early Ky. grants; they rec'd some joint grants ...some in our line think our Bythel Haynes' father may have been a MELTON (MILTON) - and if he left N.C. for Ky., never returned. This Bythel & his sister were raised by others in family. Apparently they had no bro. or sisters, as we have no knowledge or infr. on them.

Va. Hist. Mag. FRANCIS HAYNES pgs. 93-94 (Vol. no. not given) - Gen. of BRENT FAMILY. Chanc. Proceedings 1814-88 - 1823 - BRENT vs. LUM Bill filed Nov. 1720 by Robert Brent, Gent., long deceased, versus FRANCIS HAYNES & Elizabeth Lum. The plaintiff is son of George and heir of ad. Geor. s, the f ther who was seized in tail male of considerable freehold and copyhold estate, in Bedford, worth £ 100 yearly and upwards. He d. leaving his son Geo. since dec'd, who d. leaving issue of only 3 sons, viz. Geo. Nicholas & Robt, the two former being both since dec. without issue. Plaintiff's father and 2 bros. happening to be out of the Kingdom in Stafford Co., Va. in America, - one Robt. Brent, son of Richard Brent, Esq. dec'd bro. of Geo., the grandfather - taking advantage of their absence, entered into the premises and got into possession all of the evidence etc. The ad. Robt intending to go into France after the late King James II a de a deed pretending to convey the premises to one HAYNES of Worcester, linen-draper since deceased, father of FRANCIS HAYNES of Worcester - haberdasher, who after Francis' death entered thereupon whilst plaintiff was beyond the sea. The said FRANCIS made a lease to Elizabeth Lum of Bedford, widow, who is now in possession of the premises. HAYNES has several times been asked to give up the premises and has promised to come to an agreement with the plaintiff or his agent here in London, in the plaintiff's behalf as if the plaintiff were here in person but they still (Haynes & Lum) refuse to come to any account or to deliver up the premises....Plaintiff was and is beyond the seas and his witnesses all gone to places remote. The property is described in the answer of Elizabeth Lum who holds a lease from Haines, his mother and sister for her life with re remainder to her son, Robert Lum. She did not know the George Brent, the grandfather nor that that the plaintiff derives his pedigree from her. (O old Lum be "Lum" "Land"?)

"When Norfolk burned 1774-1776..FRANCIS HAYNES, JOHN GRIFFIN etc. listed as property owners. ...our Haynes have tradition that they tie in with the "andon Haynes line and the Griffin family....Francis Haynes loaned much money to one JOHN GRIFFIN. since this Griffin family gave their children names like Francis, Bythell, Hannah...may be a connection. There may have been two Francis Haynes.

"A Rev. J.E. Haynes, Bapt. Minister, left some info. to a de co. Mary Margaret Haynes. Deems J.W. Haynes' son, Mid Haynes of Ozark, Ark. furnished info. b. 1823: This old gentleman said his gr-gr-father was b. & raised in Va. - his name was WILLIAM HAYNES, and he was in Rev. War - survived the war. My grandfather was also named WILLIAM - was b. & raised in Va. b. 1762 d. 1846, aged 84 yrs; he m. SARAH HILL. To them were b. 10 ch. My uncles were JOHN, WILLIAM, EPHRAIM (and father HENRY, a Baptist preacher). JAMES d. a young man, age 1 EPHRAIM and JONHON had large families. EPHRAIM d. 1857 in E. Tenn. Jno. & Wm. d. in W.C. Will try to send more data on my own HAYNES line - that of JASPER HAYNES (d. Culpeper Co. Va. 1782 - wife ELIZABETH (nees or SCOTTS) want data on these.

and he declared the same which is above written, which Mr. Brewen aforesaid tooke from his mouth and owned by him in presents of the Rest, namely, that his daughter should have one third Part and his wife should have two third parts of his estate. Then it was asked him whome he would choose for his executors and he Said they were in his minde but he could not express it. Then they named some fewe to him, & when Leiftent Smith was named he chose him, and when Ensigne Avery was named he made choyce of him for another. He was asked about Legasies and he refused to yeald to give any: and further the motion was made for him to Set his hand to ye writing, and he answered in the hearing of William Hough there was no need, there was witnesses enough. Mr. Buckley also heard the same words spoken "there was Witnesses enough," but did not minde the party speaking.

Will dated 27 July, 1646: Whereas I, John Haynes of Hartford, upon the River & within the Colony of Connecticut in New England, and by the Good Providence of the Lord called to the Undertaking of a voyage into my native Country of England, and duly weaghing according to my measure the difficulties and Hardness I am liable and exposed to therein, especially in the declining days of mine, when my sun cannot be far from setting, I do make this my last Will & Testament:

Inprimis: I give unto my beloved wife Mabel all that my Mansion House in Hartford together with the Outhouses, Barns, Stables, Orchards & Gardens, with all the Appurtenances, with my Meadow inclosed in the little Meadow, also all my Meadow & Swamp in the South Meadow between my Ox pasture, together with all other Divisions of Lands belonging unto me on this side of the Great River, also 16 acres of Meadow in

Hoccanum. I give the sd. houses & Land during the term of her natural life only, and after her decease I give the sd. houses & Lands afore mentioned to my Eldest son John by my wife Mabel Haynes, and to his heirs forever. I do further give to my wife all that my Houses and Farms on the East side of the Great River commonly called Hoccanum, with all the Lands thereunto belonging (except before excepted), viz., the Close of Upland in ye Close by the Barn, with my Upland Lotts adjoining the Meadow I purchased of Nathaniel Ward, and Swamp Ground inclosed, as also the Swamp without the Fence adjoining to Hoccanum that belongs to me, also the Meadow in Hoccanum that now is in the Tenure of James Northam and his partner for a term of years, during her life only. I do moreover give my sd. wife all that my Houses & Farm at Tunxes Sepes, or else Farmington, in the Tenure of Thomas Judd and his Brothers, for the term of her natural life only, and after her decease I give the sd. Farm to my youngest son Joseph. Whereas I am indebted to Mr. Will Tanner of Gophall in England, payable to him by Bill sent into England to my son Mr. Nathaniel Eldred, I do give to my wife all that my house & Land in Windsor in the Tenure of Mr. George Hull, with liberty to make Sale thereof toward the payment of Debts to Mr. Eldred and Mr. Tanner in Case they be not otherwise discharged. And my Will is that my wife possess and enjoy the sd. Houseing and Lands during life, and after her decease to be equally divided betwixt my 2 daughters Ruth & Mabel. Also I give to the poor Brethren of the Congregation £5; to Mr. Hopkins, 20 Shillings; to Mr. Hooker, Pastore, £5; to Mr. Stone, £4; to John White, 10 Shillings; to every one of the Children of my first wife, 20 Shillings. I desire Mr. Hopkins, Mr. Hooker, Mr. Stone and Mr. John White to be Overseers to this my Will.

Court Record, Page 125—(Vol. III) 5 September, 1672: Mr. Wyllys requests this Court to rule on the Construction of the Will of Mr. Haynes—whether the Estate not willed to particular persons doth belong to all the Children or those only which he had by Mrs. Mabel his last wife. This Court decides in this Case such Estate belongs to the children of Mrs. Mabel Haynes his last wife, so those Grants of Land by the Court made to Mr. Haynes, whether at Pawcatuck or elsewhere, doe only belong to the Children of Mrs. Mabel Haynes.

Invt. £2280-17-00. Exhibited in Court 4 December, 1679. Will dated 26 February, 1676.

I Joseph Haynes of Hartford, in the Colony of Connecticut, perceiving the Shaddows of the Evening to bee upon mee, beeing weak in body but () true and good memory, Doe in the fear of God and in Obedience to wholsom Rules of Righteousnes for the Setting of my house in order, make this my Last Will and disposition: In the first place, as the main matter, I do desire utterly to renounce myself and to have all my dependance upon the sovereign mercy of God and the alone precious righteousness of the son of God, hoping that though my sins have been before him, yet he will graciously behold mee in the face of his Anointed. So also in the second place, I do thus dispose of what God hath graciously given mee in manner and form as followeth: Whereas, by an engagement made to my Loveing wife Sarah Haynes sometimes before our marriage, I did promise to make her a joynture of my Lands at Farmingtown, as also to give her three hundred pounds or the third part of my Estate, I doe by this my Will Joynture my said Loveing wife in all the rents and proffitts of the said Lands at Farmingtown during her natural life, as also my Will is that shee bee paid Three hundred pounds out of my other Estate, which three hundred pounds shall bee paid within two years after my decease, or within one year if my wife desire it. Also I do give unto my said Wife the use and all the benefitts of my whole Estate till my children come in age to receive their several portions, for the bringing upp and Education of my children. And I do make my said Wife Sole Executrix of this my Last will and Testament. Also my Will and mind is that when my son John Haynes hath Attained to the age of 23 years, or bee married, that my mansion house at Hartford, with the Barnes, out houses, homested garden and yards, together with all my little meadow before my house, as also all my Grass Ground and plow Land in the South meadow, together with my oxpasture which is inclosed, both pasture Land and plow Land, and my wood lott not farr off the oxpasture, as also all my right in that Land in the woods that Lately hath been laid out as is to bee seen in the town book, with all the rights and priviledges whatsoever to any of those Lands beforementioned do any wayes belong, to remain to him and his heirs for ever. Allso I give him all my books and manuscripts that any wayes concern Learneing, only my mind is that if my wife shall remain in her Widdowhood, that the Parlor and the Studdy shall bee for her dwelling, and all needful use of the Celler and Kitchen. My will further is that after the decease of my wife that my whole farme at Farmingtowne with my pasture thereunto belonging, in the occupation of Thomas Nowell, together with all other priviledges of Land, divided or undivided, in the Precincts of that towne, bee divided equally between my two daughters Mabel Haynes and Sarah Haynes, to them and their heirs forever. Also I give all my undivided Lands and grants of Court to bee equally divided amongst my Children and their

heirs forever. My mind also is that if my wife bee now with Child and that the Lord in mercy give the Life of it, that the £180 that was given by my mother Lord to my wife and her children as is thereby exprest in her Will, should bee to that child. I do also give to that child all my part of that Land that is in the hands of John Babcock, in narragansett, near Pacatuck. Also, if that redundant £40 mentioned in my mother Lord's Will do come, I do give that to this Child. And if by virtue of my mother Lord's will my other children doe receive or recover any part of the mony given by my said mother, then they shall each of them allow to this Child as much out of their portions each of them as they have out of the said mony bequeathed by my mother. My mind is that the £30 in mony of myne in the Hands of my Brother Mr. James Russell, and £20 in mony now in the house, be left in the hands of my wife, by her to be improved towards the bringing upp my son John in Learning (mainly abroad). I give unto my (only) sister Mrs. Ruth Willys £5, and to all her children 20s apeice. Also I give to each of the children of my sister Mrs. Mabel Russell 20s apeice. I give to my cousin Richard Lord, son of my Brother Richard Lord, fourty shillings. I desire that my honoured and my intimate friends, my Brother Mr. Samuel Willys, My Brother Mr. Richard Lord, and the Reverend Mr. Gershom Bulkeley, to be Supervisors of this my Last will & Testament, and doe order them thirty shillings apeice for their care and Love.

For the Establishing of all which I have hereunto put my hand and seal this 26 February, 1676.

And Widow Hayward farther sayth that her son Ephraim had the possession of the Sayd Land before her husband's death.
