MARQUIS HINKLEY AND HIS SON WILLIAM C. HINKLEY
OF DIMOCK TOWNSHIP, THIS COUNTY, SOLDIERS
IN THE CIVIL WAR

MARQUIS HINKLEY of Company B enlisted under Captain Donahue (according to his pension application) in the Seventeenth Regiment, Pennsylvania Cavalry, mustered in at Montrose, this county, 14 October 1861, Lieutenant W. A. Larue, recruiting officer. Later he served under Captain David E. Whitney of Gibson Township, this county. Many Susquehanna County men were enrolled in this regiment. The enlistment of Marquis Hinkley states that his term of service was three years. The papers show that he was born in Delaware County, New York, in 1813; he was five feet five inches tall, of medium complexion, light blue eyes, grey mixed hair, occupation a farmer. [See the history of this regiment in Stocker's History, pages 243-246].

Marquis Hinkley sustained a serious injury when he fell from his horse on 1 June 1863 in the discharge of his duties. He was hospitalized for a month, then was transferred to the Convalescent Camp in Virginia where he was discharged 14 August 1863. The reasons for his medical discharge were given as: rheumatism; fall from his horse since enlistment and consequent infirmities; and old age (he was fifty years old!). He was unfit for the Invalid Corp. of the U. S. Army. Discharge signed by Lieut. R. P. Cramford, commanding and Lt. Col. McKelsey, chief surgeon. After his honorable discharge, Marquis Hinkley returned to his home and family in Dimock Township and was an invalid for the remainder of his life.

WILLIAM C. HINCKLEY, son of Marquis, enlisted 15 September 1862, to serve for nine months under Captain George L. Stone, in Company A, One Hundred Fifty-first Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers, Infantry. He served time of enlistment but died in the U. S. Army Hospital in Harrisburg, PA. 8 August 1863 of chronic diarrhea. He is buried in the Dimock Cemetery and was unmarried.

This Hinkley family is descended from Samuel Hinckley, who came to New England in 1635 and settled in Barnstable, Massachusetts. Savage says of him [Gen. Dict. vol. 2 p. 424] that "Samuel Hinckley came from Tenterden, in County of Kent, England, in the ship Hercules, with his wife, Sarah, and four children. He died in Barnstable, 31 October 1662. He left a great many descendants."

The church records in Harrietsham, Hawkhurst, County of Kent, show the baptism of Samuel Hinckley which occurred on 25 May 1589. He married Sarah Soole on 17 May 1617, who died in Barnstable, 18 August 1656. They had four children: Thomas, Susannah, Mary and Sarah Hinckley. Samuel Hinckley was a son of Robert Hinckley who was born about 1537 in Harrietsham, Kent; grandson of John Hinckley



who died in Harrietsham in 1577. It is probable for two earlier generations or more in the same location. [See the research of Elizabeth French in NEHGR 1911, 314-319; 1914, 186-189; 1921, 238].

2. Governor Thomas Hinckley, son of Sarah and Samuel Hinckley, was born about 1618 in Hawkhurst, Kent. He came with his parents to Barnstable where he spent his life. He was Representative to the Massachusetts Colony Assembly in 1647. He married 4 December 1641, Mary Richards and had eight children. She died 24 June 1659. Thomas Hinckley was governor of the Colony of Massachusetts from 1681 to 1692. During his administration the new Massachusetts Charter absorbed the old Colonial Charter, which was during the time of Andros' power over the colonies. Thomas Hinckley died in 1706, aged 88 years, and was the father of seventeen children by two marriages.

3. Samuel Hinckley, son of the Governor and Mary Richards, was born in Barnstable, 14 February 1652/3, and died there 19 March 1698, leaving eleven children. He was married 13 November 1676 to Sarah Pope.

4. Thomas Hinckley, son of Sarah Pope and Samuel Hinckley, was born in Barnstable, 19 March 1681. He was married about 1706 to Mercy -----.

5. Joshua Hinckley was born 29 March 1707 in Harwick, Barnstable County, Massachusetts. He married 31 March 1726, Lydia Snow.

6. Josiah Hinckley was born 5 May 1730 in Harwick. He was married there 4 October 1730 to Anna Ryder.

7. John Hinckley was born about 1753 in Oblong, Dutchess County, New York. He married Delightful Burch. Among their children were: Nathan, Burch, Abijah, John Jr., and many other, including:

8. Josiah Hinkley born in 1774 in Patterson, Dutchess County, New York, Patterson being on the county line with Putnam County. Later he lived in Roxbury, Delaware County. His wife was Betsey Molineaux. He with his family of eight children came, in 1817, to Abington Township, now Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania, and a deed for his purchase of land is on record in the Luzerne County court house. There is nothing on record to show how or when he disposed of this property. In 1831, the family moved to Lenox Township, this county, where it was said that he stayed the rest of his life. Family members speculate that he died on the farm in Lenox Township, where his two grandsons John and Ernest Hinckley, lived later. There is no gravestone for him or his wife in this area. Josiah and Betsey Hinkley do not appear in the 1850 census in any location found thus far. Possibly they died with children who lived out of the Lenox area. [See the C.B.R. page 388 for a list of their eleven children.] [See also the books by E. Charles Hinkley entitled "Hinckley Heritage and History" which gives a lot

more information on the early generations than is given here, published some fifty yers ago.]

9. **MARQUIS HINKLEY**, son of Betsey and Hosiah Hinkley, was born in Vega Valley, now Roxbury, Delaware County, New York, 23 February 1813. He stated that he was four years old when the family moved to Abington Township and eighteen years old when the family moved to Lenox Township. In the Civil War, he was injured in the retreat from Chancelorsville and was no longer fit for services. He was a partial invalid thereafter and suffered intense pain for more than a dozen years. He died in Dimock Township, 22 December 1876, aged 63-9-30, buried in Dimock Cemetery. His gravestone is inscribed:

MARQUIS HINKLEY
DIED
December 22d, 1876
aged
63 yrs. 10 mos.
Volunteer of the
17th Reg. Pa. Cav.
He sleeps in Jesus
Adieu my dear companion
Rest in the Lord.

Marquis Hinkley left a will on file in Susq. Co. court house (W.B. 4 P. 111) and left all his property to his wife.

Marquis Hinkley was married 25 December 1838 to **MARY L. MARYOTT**, in Lenox Township (in the home of his father) by Rev. William Brand. (Susquehanna County newspaper item) [Elder William Brand settled in Jessup Township, this county, in 1832 as a farmer. His abilities were soon recognized and he became pastor of the Baptist Church in Rush, in 1834. Later he was pastor of the Middletown Baptist Church at Birchardville, where he remained seven years and during his tenure there the church building was erected. He became pastor of the Liberty Strict Baptist Church in Lawsville. Eventually he left the area moving westward to do more pastoral work.]

Mary Lanphere Maryott was a daughter of Rebeckah Lanphere and William Saunders Maryott, early settlers of Brooklyn Township, this county. She was born 18 November 1816 in Brooklyn Township and died 9 November 1905 in Dimock Township, aged 88-11-21, buried in the Dimock Cemetery. She and Marquis Hinkley were parents of fourteen children: (from the family bible record)

a. Almira Roselia Hinkley born 17 November 1839 in Lenox Township. She lived in Williamsport, PA for many years where she was in business as a milliner and dressmaker. Later she returned to Dimock to care for her mother, where Almira died. Her gravestone on her father's cemetery lot has disappeared. She was unmarried.

b. William Champlin Hinckley (he used the original spelling of

the surname) was born in Lenox, 28 April 1841 and died 8 August 1863 at the East Walnut Street, U. S. Army hospital, Harrisburg, PA, aged 22-3-10. He was unmarried and buried in Dimock Cemetery.

c. Harriet Asenath Hinkley was born in Lenox, 7 July 1842 and died 15 September 1868 in Williamsport, PA., aged 26-2-8. She was married 25 December 1860 by Rev. J. C. Boomer to Lewis F. Greiff of Lycoming County, PA. They lived for a time in Philadelphia, PA.

d. Sarah Susannah Hinkley (called Susan) was born 31 July 1844 in Brooklyn Township and died there 26 January 1917, aged 62-11-26, buried in the West Brooklyn Cemetery on Meshoppen Creek. She was married 12 April 1861 by the Rev. G. B. Rogers in Brooklyn, to Israel Reynolds of Dimock, PA.

e. Alma Emegene Hinkley born 25 November 1846 in Brooklyn Township, and died there 21 July 1851, aged 5-7-26. (Her mother added in the family bible these words; a Happy Child!)

f. Curtis Marquis Hinkley was born in Lathrop Township, 12 August 1847 and died in Dimock Township 1916. (He was probably born in that section of Brooklyn Township, which in 1846 became Lathrop Township). C. M. Hinkley was married in Dimock Township, 29 March 1870, by the Rev. Calvin V. Arnold (he was always spoken of in Methodist congregations in endearing terms such as "God bless Brother Arnold") to Julia A. Tyndle, born in Northampton County, PA, 8 July 1851, a daughter of Sarah Ralston and John Tyndle of New Jersey. She died in Brooklyn Township, 14 August 1910, aged 59-1-6. Both are buried in the Dimock Cemetery. They had only one child: Adelbert Hinkley born 14 January 1871 and died 5 February 1892, aged 21-0-20, buried Dimock Cemetery. C. M. Hinkley eventually lived on the farm where his father had lived. He was a deacon and a very prominent member, with his wife, of the Dimock Baptist Church.

g. Olive Olevia Hinkley was born in Dimock, 21 January 1849. She was married to Charles Moore of Susquehanna, PA.

h. Little Sister -Rebeckah- was born 16 September 1850 in Dimock and died in infancy.

i. Mary Emegene Hinkley (called Emma) was born in Dimock, 25 November 1851, married Daniel Crossen of Bridgewater Township, this county. (See her poem following). She died 31 May 1926.

j. George Washington Hinkley (called Wash Hinkley) was born 10 October 1853 in Dimock, and died in Gibson Township, this county, 28 September 1926, aged 71-11-12, buried Jersey Hill Cemetery. He was a farmer in Dimock, Lenox, and Jessup Townships, this county, and in Nicholson Township, Wyoming County (where he lived on the farm of Alden D. L. Johnson) and at his death he was a resident of Clarks Summit Borough. His will is on record in Lackawanna County court house (W.B. 13. p. 667). He was married three times. His five children were all by his first wife, Sarah, who died 6 January

1895, aged 42-11-0, buried in Jersey Hill Cemetery. Their children were: Maude, a school teacher for many years, Fred G. and Glenn L. lived in Lackawanna County, Nellie H., wife of A. W. Frost, lived in Berwick, PA, and Cecile F. (Hinkley) Barnum. Wash Hinkley was murdered in Gibson Township by Ernest Plew, a demented man who Wash had befriended. The Susquehanna Transcript (newspaper) states that "Plew was not considered insane, he was just a half-wit." Plew put poison in a cup of tea and Wash drank it not knowing its contents. Plew testified in court that he did it to see how much money Wash had on his person. The details of the murder make very gruesome reading. The trial was held in Montrose.

k. Fayette Orlando Hinkley was born in Dimock, 20 February 1856. He was a blacksmith and lived in Bradford, McKean County, PA.

l. Effa Odora Hinkley born in Dimock, 11 June 1858. She married first Samuel Moore and second Alfred Benjamin. Latterly she lived in Scranton, PA.

m. Jessie Ethelene Hinkley born in Dimock, 18 February 1860 and died there in 1866.

n. Fremont Josiah Hinkley born in Dimock, 9 August 1862. He lived for many years in Pittsburgh, PA.

Mrs. Mary L. (Maryott) Hinkley was a superior woman. Besides being the mother of fourteen children, during the Civil War when her husband and oldest son had responded to President Abraham Lincoln's urgent call for Volunteers, and she was bereft of the main superintendants to manage their farm, she willingly assumed the role, even though there were infants in the house who needed tender care and children who had to have food and clothing. In addition to this she sent packages of necessities to her soldier husband and son at the front to keep them fed, well clothed and healthy.

Mrs. Hinkley was well fortified spiritually and her family prayed often for those she loved at the scene of battle. Her five brothers were all Baptist ministers, pastors in charge of churches in this county, and in each of their congregations there were those who had become volunteers to preserve the Union and who needed prayer and provisions.

Mrs. Hinkley had a remarkable memory. She was certainly the source of information for the article on the Hinkley family in the C.B.R. p. 388. She had known all of them and had survived all of the eleven children of Betsey and Josiah Hinkley. She knew who they were and where they lived, who they married and when they died. Without this listing of the children's names and other pertinent information, genealogists would have been terrible handicapped. She also knew that the Hinkley family had descended from Samuel Hinckley of Kent, England. This has been very beneficial to us in our Hinkley research.

Mrs. Hinkley knew her own lineage of descent from pioneers of the Colonial days. We assisted the late Frank McKinley Maryott of Westfield, PA in the preparation of a manuscript on the Maryott Family entitled: "Maryott Family in Newport and Hopkinton, Rhode Island." The line begins with:

1. Samuel Maryott born about 1685 in Newport, Rhode Island. He married before 1719, Margaret Smith.

2. Samuel Maryott junior born in March 1720. He joined the Seventh Day Baptist Church in Newport, 23 August 1741. He died in July 1809; his will names his wife, Judith, and his children. His first wife was Elizabeth Sabin and his second wife was Ann Hawkins.

3. Henry Maryott was born in Newport, 11 January 1754 and died in Hopkinton, Rhode Island, 23 December 1819. He was a corporal in the American Revolution. He married Mary Saunders in 1775, daughter to Prudence Babcock and William Saunders junior.

4. William Saunders Maryott was born 10 April 1783 in Hopkinton, Rhode Island, and died in Brooklyn, this county, 27 September 1852, aged 69-5-17, buried in the Old Cemetery, Brooklyn. He was married 21 December 1806 in Hopkinton, Rhode Island, by Elder Matthew Stillman of the First Hopkinton Seventh Day Baptist Church, to Rebeckah Lanphere, daughter of Rebeckah Babcock and Champlin Lanphere of Westerly, Rhode Island.

Rebeckah and William Maryott had eight sons and five daughters. Five of the eight sons were clergymen, they were: Ichabod Bruman Maryott, David Pendleton Maryott, Preston Tiffany Maryott, Anson Archibald Maryott, and Stephen Lanphere Maryott.

5. Mary L. (Maryott) Hinkley was born 18 November 1816 in Brooklyn. Her parents left Hopkinton, Rhode Island, and lived briefly in Lisbon, Connecticut, and in 1812 settled in Brooklyn, PA where they died. Mrs. Hinkley's grandfathers were soldiers in the American Revolution: Henry Maryott was a Corporal; Champlin Lanphere was a Lieutenant; and her great grandfather, William Saunders junior was a private and patriot. Many descendants have joined patriotic societies on these lines.

Marquis Hinkley received a pension from the War Department in Washington, D.C. for his disabilities soon after he returned home. His rate was four dollars per month. Mary Hinkley was granted a pension 30 June 1877 under the claim as the widow of Marquis Hinkley, certificate number 184,465. She was given six dollars per month.

Mrs. Daniel Crossen (Emma Hinkley Crossen) wrote the following poem and dedicated it to her father and brother. It was read by her at the meeting of the Veteran's Association held in Montrose, Friday, August 11th. (It was found in an old scrapbook, the year not given.)

"I am a soldier's daughter--
My father and brother went to fight
For liberty we now enjoy
For honor truth and right.

Full many a danger they had to share
Hunger, cold and wet,
But the worst they had to bear--
They must their own forget.

They left us homeless, little ones
To fare the best we could.
We missed them, but I'm glad they went
I would have gone if I'd been a man
For all should something do or dare
To save a land so dear.

They did their part by fighting there--
We ours by suffering here,
We bore our wants with patient hearts
And prayed morning, noon and night
That God would bid our foes depart
And justice speed and right.

Ah! my soldier friends, your youth is gone
And all your hopes have fled
And you alone must journey on
To join your kindred dead.

The joy and comfort of your lives--
Your children in their bloom,
Your tender and beloved ones
Are most all in yonder tomb.

In manhood's morn you left your home
To fight your country's foe
Mid death and danger longer rule
And taste a soldier's woe.

Ah! yes, my friends for you they fought--
For you the boon of freedom brought
Whence all but they had fled
Then let those brave, old soldiers share
A goodly portion of your love--
These soldiers are hastening on
To join their comrades above.

These remarkable citizens of a former generation deserve a moment of our thoughts for their commendable contribution to our way of performance. They were part of the vast numbers of patriotic and dedicated personages who helped to make our country great. Their immortality must be preserved by us as a noble example of enriched living.

Letter from William C. Hinckley to his sister Harriet

Dear Sister, Harriet:

I received your kind letter on the first. I was glad to hear you are well and not that you had the tooth ache. You let the old turn key on it and it will cure the tooth ache. I don't like to instruct on human nature but that is the best way to cure the tooth ache.

I am well and hearty as I ever was, I think, for what I know now. Write as soon as you can. Excuse this short letter from your ever affectionat and loving brother. My love to you and kiss all the little boys and girls for me at home. Write soon from your affectionate brother Wm. C. H.

Dear Sister Olive:

I received your letter and was glad to hear from you and that you were well and more so that you were going to bake cakes. I would like to be there and help you eat them. Not but what I have enough to eat here but I would like a change. I have bread, crackers, meat, rice, coffee, tea, sugar.

Hug and kiss all the little ones for me. Write soon.

Letter from William C. Hinckley to his mother:

February 7th A.D. 1863 Saturday

Dear Mother:

I now take my pen in hand and make my head work to write a few lines to you to inform you that I am well and received you letter on the first. I was glad to hear from you all and that you were well and happy.

I don't think I can send you any money home until the last of May, until I come home. We don't think we will get any pay until our time is out, then go to Washington and get our pay, and then return home. But if Curtis comes down as I spoke of, I will get or have a hundred dollars down here. If you don't get any money any other way, you can tell Whipple to wait until the last of May.

Now I am going to tell you about our house here. It is seven by eight and ten feet high. The tent is made out of the same kind of stuff that our bags are at home, which answers a good purpose. Our stove is made of an old car top which the Rebels burnt. It keeps us warm. Our beds are two bunks, one right above the other, laid with staves, one oilcloth, one blanket, one pillow, and one chair. Serves us as a good bed only when we are out on picket duty, then we have our oilcloths to put on if it should rain or storm.

Write and let me know, this is whether he can come down or not. My love to you, so good day from your loving son.

Dear Ms. Bessinger,

Please accept my humble apologies for not replying to your letter before this. I work part time each day and got wrapped up in the holiday preparations so put all correspondence aside not realizing how much time was elapsing.

I have, indeed, been collecting data on the Hinckley-Hinkley family in hopes of someday publishing it. I did not find anything to shed any light on your Arrathusa, however. There is a book published by E. Charles Hinckley (I have his first edition - there have been others), last known to be at 6049 Wrigley Way, Fort Worth, Texas 76133. He charges a very small amount for his books. In the first edition, Seth Hinckley, b. 1730 in Harwich, Mass., m. Sarah (Berry) and had, among others, Seth, b. 1759, in Harwich, who m. (1) Lydia (Berry, 1782, and m. (2) Nancy (Walcott). No mention is made of their children.

If you have not checked further on the Harwich, Mass., Vital Records, it might be wise to do so. Perhaps you could locate a marriage record for your Arrathusa and find out who she married and then perhaps records of children's birth to see if she then had a daughter of the same name. It is such an uncommon name that it seems likely she would connect.

Also, have you been able to check on probate records to see if Seth Hinckley, who died Apr. 30, 1851, left a Will which would list his children and possibly grandchildren? Naturally, it is likely he left no Will which will not help at all.

I am sorry not to have been of any more help but perhaps E. Charles Hinckley might have some leads for you.

Seth b 1759 (#7011) had a dau Arathusa b 5 Nov 1786 & m 27 Apr 1806 to Harmon Chamberlain. This is the only Arathusa Hinckley I have in HHH2, but the mother died in 1805 and he m a second time (Seth's that is).

Then in 4) I do not find a Geroge S. Hinckley in HHH2. I will keep this Census of 1855 data for future use, however.

Hinckley, but still no luckk.

I was out in CA (Berkeley) in May 22 to Jun 3 to visit my brother and his wife and to learn about his personal computer. CORBALEY (kor' b' lē), Kate Alaska Hincley Hooper, scenario editor, was born aboard the steamship "Alaska" out of Mazatlan, Mexico, bound for San Francisco, Calif., Sept. 1, 1878, daughter of William Wheeler Irving and Mary (Caldwell) Hincley, and a descendant of Samuel Hincley, who came to America from England in 1635 and settled first at Scituate and later at Barnstable, Mass. From Samuel and his first wife Sarah —, the line was through Thomas (twice

terminated in a divorce, leaving her with four young daughters to support, and she began writing magazine fiction as a means of livelihood. In 1916 she became head of the story department of the Palmer Photoplay Corp., which conducted a screen playwriting school, remaining with the company for four years. In 1918, with a scenario entitled "Real Folks," she won a film play contest sponsored by the Triangle Film Co. Her work attracted increasingly favorable attention in the Hollywood (Calif.) motion picture circles and in 1920 she became an assistant producer in the studios of Thomas H. Ince. After his death she was associated in a similar capacity with Hunt Stromberg and, when he joined the Metro-Goldwyn Mayer Corp. as a producer in 1925, she continued with him as his assistant. At the Metro-Goldwyn Mayer studios her genius as a judge of motion picture values won prompt recognition and in 1928 she was authorized to organize the corporation's first story department, which she conducted until her death. Mrs. Corbaley was considered the ablest story critic in Hollywood. Her judgment of the popular appeal in a play submitted for possible production was almost unerring and could not be swayed by the opinions of others. As a result, the executives of the company relied wholly on her decisions. One of the film capital's most colorful and popular figures, she was a woman of strict integrity, dignity, independence, humor, kindness and human sympathy and was devoted to her home, her family, her friends and her work. She was a charter member of the Screen Writers' Guild and a member of St. John's Episcopal Church, Los Angeles. She was married at San Bernardino, Calif., Feb. 8, 1905, to Charles William Corbaley, a civil engineer, of Los Angeles, and they had four daughters: Mary, wife of Douglass Brill Perry; Catharine, wife of William Harold Bucher; Gertrude, wife of John Lawton Hall, and Helen Beatrice Corbaley. She died in Los Angeles, Calif., Sept. 23, 1938.

STEPHEN HOPKINS OF THE MAYFLOWER

HINCKLEY, Thomas, governor of Plymouth colony (1680-92), was born in England about 1618. He came to America with his parents in 1635, and settling first at Scituate, removed to Barnstable four years later. Immediately becoming active in the affairs of Plymouth colony, he was elected a deputy in 1645, a representative in 1647, and an assistant in 1658, holding this office twenty-two years. Upon the death of Gov. Josias Winslow, in 1680, he succeeded to the office of governor, and administered the affairs of the colony continuously, except during the four years of Andros' rule (1687-91), until its union with Massachusetts bay under the charter of William and Mary in 1692. From 1673 to 1692 he was also a member of the central board of the two colonies, and, at the close of his term of office, became a councillor of the united government. Gov. Hinckley was a man of studious tastes and habits. Like many of his contemporaries, he kept a diary of his life, and also collected many papers of value in relation to the affairs of Plymouth, etc. Three volumes of these were among the Old South collection of Rev. Thomas Prince, and were, in 1866, deposited in the Boston public library. Gov. Hinckley died in Barnstable, Mass., Apr. 25, 1706.

George and Helena Hinckley Greenleaf and family left Maine in 1849.They settled in Clark County, Missouri.They lived for a time near Kahoka,Mo.,at Waterloo,Mo., then a thriving town.Only a cemetery and records of the location now exist. Later they lived in Kahoka,Mo.,and in Alexandria,Mo.,on the Mississippi River, south of Des Moines,Iowa.Alexandria was a very important shipping center about this time,but was destroyed by floods and greater developments to the north.This area was the scene of much trouble during the Civil War period.Within 20 years most of the family had left the area,few records are available because of the destruction prevalent during that time,by Guerillas;by armies of the North;by armies of the South.It is known tha Eric H.Greenleaf taught school;was elected Treasurer of Clark County,served 4 years;was a Mason and influential citizen. Only the family of Eric H.and Mary E.Sweet Greenleaf have continuing records available to me.Members of the family went to California and took records with them.Only one of their children reached maturity,married and had children.
