

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

INTRODUCTION

This book was undertaken to leave a record of the Huffman family and it's descendents. It was compiled through the assistance of current day Huffman family members and official records from county court houses, census records, and state archives.

This family history will concentrate on the following line of Huffman descendents. John "Hoofman", Sr. born circa 1765 in Pennsylvania or Virginia; next to his son, Joseph Huffman, born circa 1803 in Kentucky; next to his son, Andrew Jackson Huffman, born in 1828 in Illinois; next to Henry Clay Huffman, born December 9, 1860 in Clark County, Arkansas; and on to his immediate descendents.

Throughout this book, the authors will mark their direct lineage by the use of astericks (*).

The writer has made every attempt to verify all the information listed about the Huffman family. Where possible all sources have been double-checked with other genealogists or official records. There are some gaps in the information that do not allow one to verify the authenticity of some of the information given. The writers would appreciate hearing from those who might be able to add to or clarify any of the material used in this book.

SPELLING THE FAMILY NAME

One problem which presents itself in researching the Huffman family history is the numerous spellings of the family name. Census records and other early records of the family carry many different spellings. Among the varities found in this research of the family are the following:

HOFMAN HOFMANN HOFFMAN HOOFMAN HUFF HUFMAN HOOPMAN HUFFMAN

Where official records carry a different spelling of the family name, the writers have made no change.

COLONIAL HUFFMANS

The earliest recorded ancestry to whom most American HUFFMAN families trace back to is JOHN HOOFMAN, Sr. One descendent, a daughter, stated that the Huffmans came to the American Colonies from England. Many immigrants that came to the American Colonies, passed through Pennsylvania before starting their travels around the country.

In an 1880 census, taken in Arkansas, a son of John Sr., stated his parents were both born in Pennsylvania. Our ancestor, John Hoofman, Sr., is believed to have been born around 1765, either in Pennsylvania or Virginia.

In 1792, a portion of Virginia received consent for Statehood and was admitted to the Union as the State of Kentucky. The first official census of that new State (1800) listed ten Huffmans, including two Henry's, one Jacob and James, two John Huffmans, two John Sr.'s, as well as William and a John Hufman. As can be seen from this census listing, the given name as well as the surname was popular, thus making it difficult to identify one from the other. Hence, the reason this Huffman lineage begins at Colonial Virginia with the number of names and the lack of records, it would be very difficult to carry it back to the European origins, and our John Hoofman, Sr., parents and his siblings. Therefore, the beginning of this family lineage begins with JOHN HOOFMAN (HUFFMAN) circa 1765 in Virginia.

By 1810, the number of Huffmans in Kentucky had increased dramatically. By the various spellings, the families listed by census records were as follows:

In tracing this family line, it has been found that the same given names were used over and over with several in each generation bearing the same names. Several brothers in a generation would name sons and daughters the same given names. Especially prevalent in our Huffman family are: John, Jacob, William, George, Henry, Daniel, and Leroy for the boys. In the female line they were: Molly, Polly, Elizabeth, Mary, Margaret, Catherine, and Nancy Jane. The surname spelling differences was often due to the way the record-taker thought it should be spelled (Hoofman, Hufman, Hoffman, Hofman, Huffman), and some to distinguish themselves from their kin. The authors believe that since the first and second generations could not read or write that the name differences were the result of census-takers' spellings. Records of the first and second Huffman generations were signed with an "X".

From early census records, we find that the Huffmans had large families. We even speculate that our John Sr., had numerous siblings. It is therefore possible that the preceding Hufman, Hoffman, Huffman, etc., families were all related to John Sr., or his children.

HARDIN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

A William Felix paid John Hoffman, \$200.00 for blacksmith tools and horses, September 10, 1811. According to the 1810 census a John Hoffman was listed in Hardin County, Kentucky at that time.

MOVING WESTWARD

John Hoffman migrated from Kentucky to Missouri. He then lived briefly in Illinois and afterward moved on to Arkansas. Typically, when one family moved, several others joined them. It is believed that several Hoffman, Huffman families moved westward in search of cheap land and opportunities of ownership on the American frontier.

ARKANSAS

What is now Arkansas became part of the Missouri territory in 1812. In 1819, Missouri applied for Statehood, and the U.S. Congress created the Arkansas teritory. (Which included what is now Oklahoma).

Arkansas land records reflect that several Hoofman families received land bounty grants during the 1820-1830's, including the following:

We speculate that the land grants to Joseph and Jacob Huffman were to the sons of John, Sr; the other Huffmans' listed were likely relatives.

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In 1829, our ancestor, John "Hoofman" and two sons, Jacob and Joseph, were listed on the Sheriff's census in Clark County, Arkansas. The next year, John Hoofman's entire family was listed in the 1830 Arkansas census as follows:

THE JOHN HOOFMAN FAMILY:

From the census records and other pieces of information, we believe the John Hoofman family totaled twelve individuals. This family was composed of the following:

HOOFMAN, Sr., JOHN, born circa 1765, Pa./Va(?). Died on November 27, 1844 in Clark County, Arkansas.

HOOFMAN, MARY M. born circa 1775, Pa. She was on the 1829 Sheriff census and the 1830 Arkansas census. She was not on the 1840 Arkansas census, therefore we assume that she died in the mid-1830's. They had 10 children (2-1 through 2-10) following:

Ms. Mary Gail Tutt (McGehee, Arkansas,) indicates that John & Mary M. (Margaret ?) Hoofman, were charter members of the Antioch Church of Christ in 1833. At that time, the church was a "community church" prior to it's affiliation with the Church of Christ.

From the Clark County Historical Journal, 1883: "Old man Hoffman was a German Dunkard. The only one I think in the county." The Southern Standard February 15, 1889, defines Dunkard/Dunker as the German Baptist Brethren. According to historical records, many Dunkards moved into Germantown, Pennsylvania in 1719. There were also a number of Dunkards to be found in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.

The John Hoofman family is also mentioned in the scrapbook of one Dr. Willis Smith. Dr. Smith in approximately 1850 wrote the following entry:

> "From Clear Springs I wandered to the grounds where the beautiful and fast growing village of Okolona now is situated. Not a mark or ox plow was to be seen, very sparsley inhabited by settlers, a few I will mention...Hoofman, Stuarts."

Another of Dr. Smith's entries mention the following:

"Summoned by Sheriff of Clark County as guard to keep said Mosley (State of Arkansas <u>vs.</u> John H. Mosley) secure day and night, as jail was not secure having been made of logs, and the county site being at Greenville was then sparsley inhabited; the county was new and not settled much at the time. The guard was on half duty at the time while other half resting...Bozeman, Joseph Hoofman, Elias Hoofman,Jessie Hoofman...".

As of the year 1847, the above named children are believed to have been living in Adams County, Illinois. This assumption was taken from a Power of Attorney given in their behalf concerning probate papers regarding the settlement of the John Hoofman estate, (Sr.)

- 2-2 MOLLY HOOFMAN (Huffman) B. c 1793 Pennsylvania. Died after 1850 in Adams County, Illinois. Molly married Adam CLINGLESMITH a brother to Henry Clinglesmith. Last known place they lived was in Cape Girardeau County, Missouri. It is believed that they had 8 children (3-1 through 3-8), although we have only the last two of this family.
 - 3-7 Solomon Clinglesmith B. 1822 Cape Girardeau Co. Missouri. He married Margaret Clinglesmith his first cousin in 1850.
 3-8 Mahala Clinglesmith B. 1829 Cape Girardeau Co. Missouri.

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In 1847, a Power of Attorney was given to Henry Clinglesmith to act as lawful attorney for both Barbary & Molly's children for their part of an inheritence in the estate of their Grandfather, John Hoofman, Sr., Henry, also was given Power of Attorney for Aldean Miller, Francis Huffman, Charles Gallihar, David Bixby, and Polly Clinglesmith in the same settlement.

CLINGLESMITH CONNECTIONS:

The Clinglesmiths arrived in America in 1738, living in Burks, Bucks, and Northhampton Counties, Pennsylvania. They next moved to Maryland, south of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. In the 1770's, they were in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. Some Clinglesmith's went to Kentucky around 1800. It is believed that the Father was named Daniel Clinglesmith of the lineage that married into theHoofman-Huffman line. Henry and Adam Clinglesmith were Brothers. There is a great possibility that the Clinglesmiths and Hoofmans migrated together, since there are two intermarriages between the families. Plus we have found that in 1820 in Missouri, Cape Girardeau County, that they had combined land and property (1821-1823) John Hoofman, Adam, Daniel, Henry and Jacob Clinglesmith.

2-3 ELIZABETH HOOFMAN (Huffman) B. c 1798 (?), M. 1st Sanford Babbit, B. 1798, D. August 1842, in Clark County, Arkansas.
M. 2nd. David Bixby in December 1845, in Clark County, The only child we have record of is a Son named Babbit. (3-1)

3-1 John Babbit B. April/May 1834

From a Arkansas property deed dated 1834, we found additional information on these descendents. From this deed the following is stated:

"On the 19th of May 1834, John Hoofman gave his (three week old) Grandson, John Babbit, Son of Elizabeth Hoofman, who intermarried with Sanford Babbit, for and in consideration of the natural love and affection for the sum of one dollar, one bay mare eight years old, fourteen hands and one half high, two cows and calves. If the said John Babbit should die without issue, then all of the above to revert back to John Hoofman." (Deed Bk. Pg. 94, Clark County, Arkansas.)

2-4 JACOB HOOFMAN (Huffman) B. c 1800 Kentucky. Died before Oct. 16, 1871, Clark County, Arkansas. M. 1st Agnes ?, M. 2nd. Catherine Moore, June 3, 1860, Clark County Arkansas. Both wives died before Jacob. Catherine is believed to have died in 1868. We have located 9 children, all by Agnes.(3-1 through 3-9)

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Jacob Huffman died prior to October 16, 1871, in Clark County, Arkansas. Joseph Harris was appointed as Administrator of the estate. Inventory was taken December 23, 1871, examined by John Johnston and T.J. Clark. The value of his estate was \$227.44 and the appraisement bill was made by J.J. Huffman, T.T. Huffman, Rebecca J. Hanley, H.J. Huffman, A.R. Huffman, and M.A. Huffman.

* 2-5 JOSEPH HOOFMAN (Huffman) B. c 1803, Kentucky. Died August 12, 1861 in Clark County, Arkansas. Buried in Clear Springs Cemetery in Clark County. M. Jamima Thornton November 23, 1826, in Clark County, Arkansas. B. 1809 Tennesee. D. April 15, 1897, buried also at Clear Springs. Her parents were William and Mary Thornton of Clark County, Arkansas. They had eleven children. (3-1 through 3-11) * 3-1 Andrew Jackson Huffman B. 1828, Illinois. D. March 28, 1863 at Camp Douglas, Illinois. as a Prisoner of War. He was captured at Arkansas Post, January 11, 1863. On May 26, 1847, he married Emily Hudson in Clark County. Arkansas. He was 19 years old, She was 17 years old. They had eight children. (4-1 through 4-8) After A.J. died, Emily moved most of her children to Texas. We believe this to be in the late 1860's. We have located all of their children but two in Texas. Abner and Mary, are believed to have remained in Arkansas. Emily Hudson Huffman was born June 24, 1830 Va./Mo.(?) She died on February 8, 1891 in Erath County, Texas, and is buried in what became the family plot in Mt. Zion Cemetery. Their children are as follows:

All that is known about Mary Hoofman (Huffman) is that she died prior to her father's probate settlement. In the final settlement of the estate in 1855, it was divided into 10 equal shares with Nancy & Wm. Williams paid \$155.55. At this time they were living in Jefferson County, Arkansas.

Mrs. Imogene Gill has extensively researched several family lines tied into the Huffmans. From her notes, several interesting remarks are made, about the Huffmans during this time period.

> "The Huffmans lived in Southfork Township during the 1860's. Their neighbors, (the Praters) and the Huffmans are to meet and become my ancestors. The Huffmans are originaly from England. They, as well as the Praters, live in fine hilly country. They raise their own food and catch fish from the creeks and the nearby rivers. The Huffmans are slave owners and are wealthy for their time. There was a Jacob and Elias who were brothers of John Huffman. John has about \$2400.00 worth of property - while his neighbors have about \$400.00 worth. There are also other Huffmans in Elkins and one family in Terre Noir County."

The Civil War certainly took it's toll on the overall Huffman family and seems to have generated the moves of several Huffman families around the State of Arkansas and outside this State as well. We find in 1870, that a number of the Huffmans have moved to other locations in Arkansas as shown below.

Joseph, son of John Hoofman Sr., moved with his family to Missouri, Kentucky, Illinois and finaly to Arkansas. After Joseph and Jemima married they lived for 4-5 years in Illinois, where their first two children were born, afterwards they returned to Clark County, Arkansas.

This was all of Andrew Jackson and Emily's children, except for the twins born December 9, 1860. (Andrew J. Jr., and Henry C. Huffman)

With the beginning of the American Civil War, a number of the Huffman boys joined the Army of the Confederate States of America. Their were in fact two Andrew J. Huffmans who enlisted in Arkansas Confederacy Units, one joining company A, 19th Ark., Infantry (Dawson's Infantry), and the other joining Co., C, 9th Ark., Infantry. From rather extensive research, we believe our ancestor joined Dawson's Infantry on June 1862. It is possible that several of his brothers, all sons of Joseph Huffman joined the same unit.

NINTEENTH (DAWSON'S) ARKANSAS INFANTRY :

Two Arkansas units bore the numerical designation of the Nineteenth. To distinguish one from the other, each is generally shown with the name of the unit's commanding officer in parenthesis after the number.

Organized by Colonel C.L. Dawson in late 1862, some members of the regiment had been recruited in the counties of Sebastian, Crawford, Polk, Yell and Clark. Like most all Civil War Units, the Nineteenth Arkansas Infantry was frequently known by an alternate designation derived from the units commanding officer. Unofficial, alternate names of this type identified as having been used by or for the regiment are listed below.

ON TO TEXAS

From census records, we have concluded that several Huffmans moved from Clark County, Arkansas, to the Erath County, Texas, in the late 1860's or early 1870's. This was a daring move as Texas was still a frontier state at the time and settlers were in danger from wandering bands of Indians.

The widow of Andrew Jackson Huffman, Emily, and her children with other family members, probably moved to Erath County, Texas in a wagon train with other settlers from Arkansas. Travel was probably by Ox driven wagons and the trip was a slow and difficult one.

The first official record involving this family in Erath County deals with marriage. On October 30, 1877, a marriage was entered into the official records between William F. Huffman and Miss Melissa Ewing.

Between 1876 and 1879, five land transactions involving Huffmans were entered at the Erath County Court House, Stephenville, Texas. They all involved Joseph Huffman and wife Julia B. Huffman. We have been unable to definitely link them with the other Huffman family members already listed.

The 1880 Census of Erath County lists a Joseph Huffman, age 33, who was born in Texas. The Huffman family lines we have examined thus far were all born outside the State of Texas. (Perhaps another family line had preceded our line-hence the reason for other Huffmans to move to Erath County.) We, therefore cannot determine for certainty who this early Huffman landowner was. He lived in Erath County, as early as November, 1876 and made several land transactions as follows:

Located deep in the basement of the Erath County Courthouse, the writers were able to find several old tax records of early Huffman family members. In 1878, only Joseph Huffman was listed in the Tax Records. This is the same one as mentioned earlier as a land owner in Erath County, and we've been unable to determine his relationship to the rest of our family. Again he could have been an older cousin from the other Huffman lines.

In 1879, William F. Huffman is listed on the tax rolls. He was A.J. Sr's 2nd son. At that time he was living on the old M. Ashworth place comprised of 160 acres, valued at \$400.00. He owned three horses and mules, valued at \$60.00, in addition he had 15 head of cattle, valued at \$80.00, and 18 hogs worth a total of \$18.00. His total estate that year was estimated at \$558.00, of which he was assessed a tax of \$9.81.

The other children of Andrew and Emily Huffman are in the 1880 census records of Texas. The oldest Abner is believed to have stayed in Arkansas, perhaps he already had a family started there. The three Huffman daughters are not living with their mother at this census. Catherine and Nancy J. Huffman had married, but we have been unable to locate Mary in Arkansas or Texas census records.

* 4-8 HENRY CLAY HUFFMAN, Born December 9, 1860, Terre Noir, Arkansas. He was a twin to A.J. Jr. Henry C. Married Mary Etta Miller, July 20, 1882 in Erath County, Texas. She was born October 28, 1865, Died July 31, 1920. Mary Etta's parents died when she was young and she was raised by an Uncle Pat Bowen. Henry C. Died September 19, 1932, in Erath County, Texas. Both are buried at Mt. Zion Cemetery. They had 12 children. (5-1 through 5-12) Henry was between 5 to 8 years old when His Mother Emily came to Texas with most of her children. It is believed that she came in a group, as they generally did at that time.

Although not much has been passed down about Henry's youth, we do know that times were very hard and difficult. The Civil War had taken it's toll on the overall Huffman clan in Arkansas. It is believed that was one of the main reasons behind their move was to begin a new life in Texas.

We do know that Henry C. was a farmer and a hard working, very frugal man. At the time of Mary Etta's death, he was farming/ranching on nearly a thousand acres. They purchased what became known as the "Old Rock House". Early in life we have found some legal transactions made between his Brothers, William and A.J. Jr. Huffman. (His Twin). They purchased land from each other and with each other.

We were told by Mary A. Huffman - Foye, that after her Mother died in 1920, her Dad married again to a woman who had a daughter about her age. The woman thought her Dad was a wealthy farmer and made many changes inside the rock house in furnishings <u>etc.</u> She stated the marriage didn't last long due to her Dad being such a frugal person. We have found no record of this marriage.

We have not traced the Bowen lines but it is known that Mary Etta was raised by her Uncle Pat Bowen, this was after the death of her natural parents. The Bowens are presumed to be her relatives from her Mother's side of the family. Her Mother's maiden name was Ella Bowen.


The first recorded tax assessment on Henry C. Huffman, took place in 1883. At that time he declared the following personal property.

He paid taxes of \$53.00 on the total estate that year.

Also found in the basement of the Court House were two land transactions involving H.C. Huffman, W.F. Huffman, and his twin Brother A.J. Huffman. According to the land deed, dated December 28, 1885, H.C. and his wife M.E. Huffman, sold 53 acres of land to W.F. Huffman, his brother. This land was located on the Paluxy Creek, northeast of the city of Stephenville, Texas. On older maps, a town by the name Immermere was there. (We believe this is the area now known as Chalk Mountain). The same day, W.F. Huffman and his wife sold 100 acres of land to A.J. Huffman and H.C. Huffman jointly. Located on Armstrong Creek, this land was adjacent to the "Old Rock House" area. ANDREW JACKSON HUFFMAN Jr., (Known as Jackson) was a twin to Henry Clay Huffman. He is listed with his mother on the 1880 Erath County Census. He married a Miss Paralee Roberts on August 11, 1884, according to Erath County Marriage Records. They were married by one A.M. Chandler, listed as "E "Elder".

Other than the land transactions, and the 1880 census, and the marriage record, we have lost contact with this family member.

The H.C. Huffman family was enumerated by the census taker in Precinct #8 of Erath County. Using the census data and adding information provided by Huffman family members, we are able to give a rather complete listing of this family. Rather than reproduce again here, we chose to put the complete breakdown of H.C.'s family members on page 11. beginning with 4-8, H.C. Huffman.

1904 TAX RECORDS - ERATH COUNTY, TEXAS

In this year, Henry C. and his family were living on the old Moses Ashworth place, but also owned property granted from the Erath County School District. At that time, Mr. Huffman was farming and ranching on a total of 769 acres, assessed at a taxable value of \$3100.00. The tax office listed his other assets at that time as follows:

Living nearby the Henry Huffman family was his brother W.F. Huffman. He was ranching and farming a total of 414 acres, originally purchased from F. Smith, Erath County District and D. Blankenship. His taxable assets included one buggy, 3 horses, and eight cattle.

Also listed in the 1904 tax records was G.W. Huffman who was living at Chalk Mountain in Erath County. From County records, this appears to be the same person who married Mrs. A.E. Weldon on January 6, 1891. This could be W.F.'s son by his age and the location of land purchased close to Immerene, Texas.

MARY ETTA HUFFMAN

Records of death were erratically recorded until the mid-1920's. Fortunately for us, we have found Mary Etta's death record. Her place of birth is listed as Lavarria County, Texas. (Note: We have found no record of "Lavarria County and feel this should have been Navarro County or LaFeria County, Texas.)

TIDBITS FROM THE NEWSPAPER!

Copies of the Stephenville newspaper don't mention much about the Huffman family during the 1880-1900 period. The nearby community of Dublin also had a newspaper at that time but the writer was unable to locate microfilm copies of early newspaper editions to research.

The Stephenville paper does give some interesting information about life and the times in Erath County during the 1880's. From the front page of Saturday's edition, June 27, 1885, the following is quoted:

"FREE BATHS: Reeder, the bath man, is now giving free shower baths..that is, he furnishes the water free, but charges 10¢ for the use of the room. We tried one on credit this week, and must say, without hesitation, that they are the boss. Then, there are no crawfish, water moccasins, tadpoles, etc. to make life uncertain, as is the case when you go to the Bosque and wallow in its muddy channel. In another column Mr. Reeder offers to furnish baths without any cost whatever to the ladies."

From the Stephenville newspaper dated May 22, 1886, this article appeared:

> "Nearly 2500 people attended the baptizing at Wright's tank last Sunday evening in Comanche County. One hundred and five persons were baptized in less than forty minutes."

On June 12, 1886, the following items appeared:

"For sluggish bowels, torpid liver, indigestion, bad breath, flatulence, and sick headache, Ayer's Cathartic Pills are the remedy. By land or at sea, out on the prarie, or in the crowded city, they are the best pills for purgative purposes, everywhere alike convienient, efficacious, and safe."

"Dallas, like Stephenville, has just had a mad dog sensation. When the dog made his appearance an army of young senegablans was soon out, armed with stones, clubs, pistols, rusty shotguns, and pitchforks, all yelling lustily 'whar is he ?', "dar he is." "Don't you see him gwine under dat house? Ladies on the street fled precipitately into the nearest yard, and there was a general slamming of doors and letting down windows. Finally the dog was 'treed' under a house, and under a shower of stones and two pistol shots, died as peacefully as a dog could under the circumstances.''

DEATH OF EMILY HUFFMAN:

The widow of Andrew Jackson Huffman, Emily, was one of the first Huffmans to be buried in Erath County. At the age of 60, she died on Febuary 8, 1891. She was buried in what became a family plot at Mount Zion Cemetery, near the old Huffman properties. It is approximately 10 miles from Lingleville, Texas. Ultimately, her son H.C. and his wife Mary Etta Huffman, plus others would be buried in this cemetery.

We visited this cemetery in the late 1970's and found it still well maintained. A barbed wire fence surrounds the cemetery and on it a sign which announces an "annual cemetery working date". Surrounded by pasture land, the cemetery is still used for burials on an infrequent basis.

Mrs Juanita Yardley - Gauntt, a grandaughter of Mary Etta's described her grandmother as follows:

> "She was a very fine christian woman. She died of cancer and suffered tremendously before her death finally came."

Mary Huffman - Foye, the youngest child of H.C. & Mary Etta's described in a letter her memories of childhood.

"My memories of the old rock house are limited. I don't know what year we moved to Lingleville, but I started to school there (around 1918) I only went to school one year in Lingleville; we moved back to the rock house and I went to school at Pleasant Home my second year. I'd say it was probably 3 miles away. If the weather turned real cold, raining or snowed, Fred would come by on horseback and take me to school. That summer, I can remember Emma (Yardley) Huffman coming by on Saturdays and taking cream and eggs to town to sell. Willie got the cream and butter money and I got the egg money because I gathered up the eggs.



Topaz was listed as the birthplace of most of Henry & Mary Etta's children. During it's time, this little town had a country store, Post Office, Blacksmith Shop, and a small cluster of buildings and houses. Today, the site of this little town is a vacant field used as pasture land.


Topaz, was located in the Moses Ashworth section, Erath County. It was at the corner of what used to be H.C. Huffman place called the "Old Rock House".

"OLD ROCK HOUSE"


Henry C. Huffman and his family moved considerably during their early years, including one move to the Paluxy in nearby Navarro, County, Texas. (Note: This is now situated in what is called Hood County now- the counties split up., now Navarro County, is located up by Corsicana, Texas.) However, most of their moves were in or around Lingleville. Texas - Topaz area.

The most impressive residence of this family, came to be known as "The Old Rock House ". It was built by another family around the turn of the century, but was bought shortly after completion by H.C. Huffman. Numerous old family pictures depict scenes of part of the old house. The exact dates they lived there have not been established entirely. We do know that it was occupied by them until Mary Etta died in 1920, and for a few years therafter by his family or other members of his family.

The home today is owned by Claud Bays and his wife, who cheerfully have permitted the Huffman descendents to visit and take pictures of this beautiful old home. While many improvements such as extra rooms and barns have been added over the years, it stands as a lasting memory of the Huffmans early days in this area.



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

My Mom lived a very busy life on the farm. She was always busy doing all the things she loved doing: sewing clothes bought from money she earned by selling cream, turkeys, eggs, and fryers. Every Saturday was a special day because we dressed up and headed out to Dublin for a big time. Daddy would give us a quarter and we would take in a movie and even a bag of popcorn. Our Sundays always were spent in Sunday School and Church. Usually the Preacher came home with us for dinner. We didn't blame him for coming home with us because Mom was a good cook and always had a big meal which was enjoyed by all.

We had someone that lived with us alot of the time - Aunt Willie was her name; she was Mom's crippled sister. She stayed with us a month at a time and then would go to some of the other brothers or sisters. Then there was Belton Yardley who was Daddy's brother's son. He came to live with us and fit right in and helped out with farm chores.

Mom always had a cellar full of home - canned vegetables and fruit. We use to pick 2 or 3 bushels of blackeyed peas at a time and would shell them together. To this day I still love to shell peas.

I always looked forward to the first cold spell of the winter because Daddy would say it was time to kill a hog. Gee, how I loved Mom's homemade sausage; it was the best ever. I had mixed emotions when Daddy & Mom sold the farm and moved to Stephenville. It was necessary, however, because Daddy's health began to go bad. He enjoyed city-life and having a garden as long as he was able to work. Mom took care of him a long time and he died at home. Heaven had to be a sweeter place with him in the Lord's presence.

Mom continued thereafter to stay busy, with church work, friends and alot of T.V. She lived alone until her death at age 83. We surprised her on that birthday when brothers, sisters, and lots of other kinfolks and friends dropped by to say "Happy Birthday", "We love you". She loved her Pastor, Brother Becker and he came by often to chat with her. He always left saying that she cheered him up! She loved the Lord and never failed to let you know He had sustained her through the death of a husband and 2 sons. She sacrificed so to see that we went to college and to raise us in a Christian manner. We miss her very much for she was truly a wonderful Mother, Wife, and person. We were blessed by all the things she did for and meant to us! TRIBUTE TO PAST YEARS - Joe & Minnie Huffman written by Shirley (Sue) Shields

During the approximately 58 years of marriage, Ma & Pa, as they called each other...more or less lived, raised their children and died within a 15-20 mile radius, of what became known as the old farm place to their children and grandchildren.

There is a somewhat deeper - double meaning to this 360 acres, of land, that came to be their home. In the year 1906, Minnie's father, T.J. Fair, purchased this piece of land to raise his own family on. Minnie, was between 11-12 years of age, when she moveed to this property. They came from the Lowell community not far from there, where her father had a general merchantile store. It is at this new home, where she met and married Joe Huffman.

After they married in 1917, Joe served in WW1 in France for a time and she stayed with her parents and their first child was born at this old homeplace, as were others over the years. After Joe's return from the service, they lived in or around this general area at other farm sites. When they had been married between 7/8 years, they returned to the old farm, living there with Minnie's parents, and this is where they stayed until it was sold in 1972, and they moved into town.

When they moved as a family to the farm, Minnie's parents let them have the larger home place and they moved into a smaller one on the property. This was around 1926. This land and home was purchased from Minnie's brothers and sisters after her parents deaths, beginning in the years 1935.

Throughout the years, the old home was added to and changed an awful lot - all to suit the needs of the family. From my earliest remembrance, I was always told that the main room was an old Log Cabin that had been built around. I never knew for sure when this was done or if it was done by Minnie's parents...?, but onto this main room, to the left side was added a small room - entry or parlor, and to the left of this was a bedroom. To the right of the main room was a old fashioned country kitchen. To the front of the main room was another bedroom...very small, with a closet. On the front and back of the house was long porches. (See picture in this book, where it states that W. Fair opened it up, speaking of the entry or parlor area and Joe closed it up. There was an old barn with a hayloft, a well house, smoke house, and assorted chicken and cattle pens and barns. A garage was added later - detached.

Somewhere in the 50's, a part of the back porch was closed in to add a bathroom. It wasn't fancy - but compared to the outhouse it was a great modern improvement. It also beat taking a bath in the kitchen in a tub routine..

For all the years they lived in the old house, they never had

any hot water in the kitchen, which meant Grandma had to heat all she needed for day to day living. She washed her dishes in three old washpans on a counter top. The kitchen table was a large sheet of wood (plywood or?) set with legs. In fact, there was nothing they had in the furniture line that came very close to being called modern. Everything they had was a necessity for living.

After I married in 1962, and started to raise my own family, they added a hookup for Grandma to have a washing machine in the bathroom. It never worked very well due to the old water lines, their having to carry water to help fill the tub, etc. But again, it was a far cry from doing the wash outside over a fire.

In today's modern times, it would be considered a very meager existence, to live that way. I used to feel sorry for Grandma and Grandpa, and all they didn't have of the modern ways. I couldn't understand how they could manage it. I knew even then they had a inner strength - but what's funny to me, they never quite saw themselves that way. They were more comfortable with the old than with the new. The changes they accepted were a very slow process to the new ways, like the bathroom and the washing machine, etc. They rarely traveled farther than to town on Saturday's, to see them you generally had to go their way, except for very few occasions, and even then almost as soon as they arrived, they headed back to the farm.

I have often thought, despite all the hardships that there generation faced, somewhere in this change-over, we the modern generation have lost more than we gained in conveniences of course. we lost the hard day-to-day living and making do with what you could produce etc.. but they acquired a toughness within themselves from living this way. Much closeness in families and neighbors changed, at their time of living close bonds were made as they needed each other. Now, our generations are so mobile, many of these close family ties have gone with the times. Back in those days, your word was your bond more or less. Yes, it was just plain hard work for survival, no modern appliances, no quick travel to get away for a weekend, no quick food place to stop by and obtain the nights meal. At this time and place, you produced the majority of your food, clothes and any other daily need. Your day began before sunrise and generally ended shortly after sundown. This strong work ethic produced some strong individuals, such as my Grandparents.

In today's modern rush-rush way of living, it is difficult to see the same security, commitment and stability in mankind, as seen in past generations. I don't think the majority living today appreciate the difference of modern times as they should. Life was definitely hard as far as work and survival on the day-to day basis, but it also was a very simple and peaceful way of living. You knew what had to be done each day, you didn't have nineteen things pulling at the few hours of your day, which modern man has to contend with daily. But they had a peace about them that you don't see in many today. It is difficult to put into words the simplicity of their day-to-day living, and yet at the same time almost unbearable hard work loads they carried daily. Modern man tries to obtain the same inner peace and enjoyment by purchasing boats, vacations or something new that they can escape the rush-rush world we live in, yet we can't find the same peace about life as they had. They may never have had too much materially, but they sure did emotionally.

I remember asking my Grandparent's at one time, just how they ever managed to raise their family with so little. At that time I had two small children, and thought I would go crazy with the endless work load I had, even with more modern conveniences such as a washer for the diapers, being able to purchase food at a store, etc., I'll never forget their response. To them, our lives were too complicated for them, and they felt amazement at our ability to do it all, in the same manner that I had looked on their living. To begin with, they had no need for the numerous amount of clothes we required, rarely did they ever have more than two changes, plus a Sunday outfit at a time. They didn't have many school meetings, or places they had to be at regularly that is expected in today's world. Life centered around your life, family and home - and producing what was needed for the same. Needless to say, Grandma and Granpa were comfortable living in their own time setting.

I wrote this as a Tribute to my Grandparents and their way of life and times. I feel each generation should have a place in history remembered for their way of living. I feel our modern generation could learn much from those who have lived before us. They seemed to naturally know what was important in this life and what was wasted effort.

I know that they would have been pleased to know that they were remembered. All they endured through these times speak of their own inner strength, coupled with their belief in God and their fellow man. I only regret that neither lived to see this in print. Following, are some special memories of how life was like on the farm during my childhood days.

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MEMORIES:

I REMEMBER...how cold that old house was in the winter, and how warm the 5-7 homemade quilts felt.

I REMEMBER...how the days began before dawn, with grandma in the kitchen preparing breakfast, while grandpa was out milking the cows.

I REMEMBER...how grandpa would bring the milk in, pouring it in an old crock on the counter to let the cream rise for butter.

I REMEMBER... making homemade butter with that cream and how very good it tasted on cold biscuits or saltine crackers.

I REMEMBER... the canning seasons, three meals a day cooking from scratch and grandma over a washpot set over a fire.

I REMEMBER...grandma & grandpa working the gardens and the fields to produce the needed supplies for the family.

I REMEMBER...grandma and her bonnets, all girls were suppose to wear one.

I REMEMBER...grandma's patience in teaching me to crochet as a child. Nearly every day after lunch and the kitchen cleaned up, you could find her in her chair, crocheting, quilting or sewing for her family

I REMEMBER... the treat on a summer night was eating a fresh from the field watermelon on the front porch.

I REMEMBER... the games the aunts and uncle played when time or energy was left over from the day.

I REMEMBER...playing in the fields and the creek behind the old house, pretending to be cowboys and Indians, sometimes Daniel Boone or other great hero of the past.

I REMEMBER... walking to the mailbox about 1 mile away and waiting on the postman to come.

I REMEMBER... the old church that had a pastor from a seminary if they could get one, the wooden benches.

I REMEMBER... grandpa leading the singing, the oldtime hymns and always before church he'd be eating on a lemon to clear his throat for the job. I especially remember learing about Our Lord in this little out of the way church building.

I REMEMBER... the domino games grandpa played, very rarely did he ever lose a game, he could tell you what was in your hand after only a few plays. I REMEMBER... trips to town on Saturdays, to sell eggs and to purchase any needed basics for the week ahead. On these trips, it was common to stop at their married childrens homes with fresh grown produce. Visits were always short ordered, the farm called. I REMEMBER...sleeping on the front porch and the fresh smells of country and especially the peace felt in this atmosphere. I REMEMBER ... the old washpot over the fire that Grandma used to wash clothes in each week.

I REMEMBER...fall and hog killing time, all the work and preparation it took, but especially the ham & red-eye gravy over biscuits for breakfast. The cracklin cornbread was so good. At this time Grandma usually made her Lye Soap for washing also.

I REMEMBER... the aunts and uncle still at home, and the special feeling of having others around.

I REMEMBER the good..but I also see and can compare how very hard life was in those days. The world changing constantly to more modern times even then, but for some reason grandma and grandpa never seemed to grab onto the modern world around them, they were comfortable with their life as it was...I often yearn for this simpler life and a return to it, despite it all.

Being one of the older grandchildren. I had the opportunity of getting to see into the past 'ways of life' that the younger ones never experienced. While I was growing up, Grandma & Grandpa still had three of their own children at home and in school. You could see the old..old ways through Grandma and Grandpa, the newer through their children's, then my own...all three, yet somehow all tied together by a common bond of love. Many of the younger grandchildren don't remember the outhouse, or Grandma washing over a fire, the gardening and harvesting seasons, the old smoke house, the old fashioned barn with it's hayloft, etc. By their time much of this had changed and was not the day-to-day operations of the farm. I would say that Grandma and Grandpa grew gracefully into their retirement years - no changes were very quick, yet times were changing and you knew it. Today, when we see changes it generally means to more modern ways - this wasn't the case in their life, when changes occured it generally meant that it wasn't needed any longer for day-to-day living, therefore it just stopped being used.

I'm grateful for being allowed this view into times past' and I realize my view is different from that of their children's view.




