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GEORGE HULL AND SOME OF HIS DESCEND-ANTS.

BY CLINTON T. HULL.

William Hull, born in Somersetshire, England, 1574, graduated from St. Mary's Hall, Oxford, and was instituted vicar of Colyton, in Devonshire, 1611, under the patronage of the dean and chapter of Exeter, and as the immediate successor of the Rev. John Eedes, one of the translators of King James's Bible, who had married Alice, daughter of Henry Hull, Esq., of Exeter.

William Hull died childless, 1627, leaving a will dated May 20, and proved June 19, 1627, in which he names

his brothers, George, John, and Joseph.

JOHN HULL has not been positively identified, but may have been the John Hull made freeman August 7, 1632, and mentioned in Dorchester Records: "John Hull to have 16 acres," and 1635, "John Hull to have 2 acres of meadow."

Joseph Hull, apparently the youngest brother, matriculated at St. Mary's Hall, Oxford, May 12, 1612, aged 17 years; took his first degree of A. B., November 14, 1614, and was instituted rector of Northleigh, diocese of Exeter, Devonshire, April 14, 1621. He resigned in 1632, and, March 20, 1635, sailed from Weymouth with his second wife, Agnes, seven children, three servants, and a colony of over one hundred persons. They arrived in Boston harbor, May 6th, and settled at Wessaguscus, which they named Weymouth. Some of his descendants settled along the coast of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and New York, and were captains of sailing-vessels, and some of them eminent members and ministers of the Society of Friends, or Quaker church.

Two or three of his children moved to Maine, where he died, at Isles of Shoals, November 19, 1665.

1. George Hull, the second brother, a surveyor by profession, sailed from Plymouth, Devonshire, March 30, 1629, in the ship Mary and John, Captain Squeb; settled at Dorchester; was made freeman, March 4, 1632, and a representative for the town to the first great and general court held in the colony, May 14, 1634. He was a member of the first board of selectmen of Dorchester, and in 1633 and 1634 was "appointed to fix the rate."

"It is agreed that a doble rayle fence, with mortises in the posts, of 10 foote distance one from the other shall be set up in the marish [marsh] from the corner of Richard Phelps, his pole eastward to the creeke by the owners of the Cowes under named, p'portional y 20 foote to every Cowe. . . . Mr. Hull 3 c. 60 ft."*

"The early settlers of Dorchester came from the counties of Devon, Dorset, and Somersetshire. They were a religious people, and many of them were persons of note and figure, being dignified with the title of Mr., which was given to but few persons in those days." †

The "Common" appears to have been divided, or allotted to the settlers, as we have seen that sixteen acres was allotted to John Hull, and we find, "George Hull [one of the officers of the plantation] to have 2 acres," and "It is ordered that George Hull shall have the meadow that lyes before his doore, where he now dwells, to Henry Weyes, down to the Sea, making a sufficient passidge that way."

He moved to Windsor, Connecticut, 1636, and surveyed that place. He also surveyed Wethersfield. He was a representative to the general court which met at Hartford in 1637, which declared war on the Pequot Indians.

"Committees: — Mr. Whytinge, Mr. Webster, Mr. Williams, Mr. Hull, Mr. Chaplin, Mr. Talcott, Mr. Hosford, Mr. Mychell, Mr. Sherman.

"It is ordered, that there shal be an offensive warr agt. the Pequitt."

This brief declaration of war was caused by the murder of three women and six men, at Wethersfield, April 23, 1637, and the capture of two young girls, by a band of Pequots under Nepaupuck, also called Messatunck, the party having been murdered as they were going to work in the meadows.

"From May, 1637, to April, 1640, the popular branch of the general court, or general assembly, was composed of committees. Mr. Hull was one of these committees." *

"There is hardly a man now living, whose descent can be traced to the early planters of Connecticut, who will not be found to be derived, through one branch of his pedigree or another, from those families who helped frame the British constitution, who elaborated by slow degrees the common law, who advocated the doctrines of both with their tongues and pens, or defended them with their swords." †

His first wife, the mother of all his children, is supposed to have been Elizabeth, daughter of Henry Russell, who made his will January 28, 1640, which was proved October, 1640, in which he names his "wife, Jane, and only child, Elizabeth Hull." She died about 1646, after which George Hull moved to Fairfield, and, after 1654, married (2) Sarah, widow of David Phippen, of Boston. He was a representative to the general court of Connecticut a great many terms.

"George Hull was the personal friend and political adherent of Governor Roger Ludlow. He came from England in the same ship, with him moved to Windsor, Connecticut, and jointly with him obtained, from the general court of 1638, a monopoly of the beaver trade on the Connecticut River. When Ludlow moved to Fairfield, George Hull soon followed him, and was selected by the general court as his assistant in 1649; and 1651, 1653, and 1654, he was appointed by the governor as associate magistrate for the towns by the seaside. He died 1659, aged about 70 years. He was public-spirited, active, and intelligent, and as legislator and magistrate was instrumental in establishing two of the free and enlightened commonwealths of New England, — Massachusetts and Connecticut. Cotton Mather distinguished him with a place in his great book, and also places his brother Joseph in his First Classis, or list of First Good Men. Mr. Trumbull, the historian of Connecticut, groups him with those whose names are worthy of perpetuation, and Mr. Stiles, in his history of Windsor, tells us that he was a citizen of worth and distinction."

The inventory of his estate and that of his widow, Sarah Hull, were presented on the same day, August 25, 1659. His will was admitted to probate, October 20, 1659, in which he names his children:—

- Josiah,³ b. in England; came to America with his parents, 1629; d. Nov. 16, 1675; m., at Windsor, Conn., May 20, 1641, Elizabeth, daughter of Joseph Loomis. He was deputy to the general court, 1659, 1660, 1662, 1667, 1674. He moved to Killingworth, Conn., 1662, and was a member of the grand jury and lieutenant of the trained band. Prof. Elias Loomis, of Yale, published in 1880 the Female Branches of the Loomis Family, in two volumes, which contains 1,175 names of the descendants of Josiah and Elizabeth (Loomis) Hull.

Cornelius² Hull (George¹), born in England about 1626; came with his parents to Dorchester, Massachusetts, 1629; to Windsor, Connecticut, 1636; to Fairfield, Connecticut, 1646; married, November 19, 1653, Rebecca Jones, born in England, 1633, daughter of Rev. John Jones, who was born in Wales, ordained in England, came to Massachusetts

in 1635 in the ship Defense, and was ordained pastor of the church at Concord, Massachusetts, April 6, 1637, of which Peter Buckley was teacher. The Rev. John Jones moved with many of his parish to Fairfield, Connecticut, September, 1644, and was pastor of the first church organized in Fairfield.

"Nov. 24, 1653. Granted to Cornelius Hull from the Town, one home lot, being in quantity three acres more or less, bounded on the south-east with the high-way, on the south west with Nehemiah Umstead [Olmstead?], on the north west with a high-way, on the north east with the land of George Hull."*

"Nov. 29, 1653. George Hull hath given to his son Cornelius Hull on his marriage with Rebecca Jones these several parcels of land following, to be to him and his heirs forever." (There

were nine parcels, making a total of forty acres.)+

He was a deputy to the general court eight terms (1658-67). He was made lieutenant for Fairfield County, May, 1661, and lieutenant of the Hon. Major Treat's Life Guard, February 25, 1675. This was the crack corps of the Connecticut levies. He was ordered, October 26, 1675, by the governor and council, "to take two men, and make such discovery of the enemy as you may, and to post to us with all speed what intelligence you can of the enemies motions, also what you can gain of the motions of our army.";

There were no "war correspondents" in those days to write glowing descriptions of battles they never saw, but the old land records at Fairfield disclose the fact that his fellow-citizens and comrades in arms gave him a substantial reward for his services.

"The first house in Hull's Farms stood on the long lot which runs northward from Mr. John H. Hull's house. The grant of this long lot is recorded in the first volume of land records of the town of Fairfield, and reads as follows: 'Granted to Cornelius Hull by ye town of Fayerfeild a parsell of Land lying in ye woods

Called his Long Lott, bounded on ye Northeast with ye land of Steven Hedges deceased, on ye Southwest with ye land of John Burr, on ye Northwest with ye wildarness at ye farther end of ye town bounds, and on ye Southeast with ye half mill Common. —Recorded this 23 of Feb. 1686/7. and is in bredth twenty eight rods, resarvin to ye towne necessary highways.''

Cornelius Hull was a surveyor and a large landholder, there being thirty-one entries of his land purchases in volume A.

"Oct. 13, 1692. Lieut. Cornelius Hull was appointed by the General Court with Ensign Nathan Gold and Mr. John Wakeman to lay out grants of land to John and Jehu Burr." †

Cornelius Hull died between September 16 and October 7, 1695. His will, dated September 16, and proved October 7, 1695, names his children:—

"Cornelius Hull Jr. and wife, Sarah, were admitted to full communion, April 20 1701." ±

Greenfield Hill was made a parish in 1725, and Cornelius Hull's name heads the list of members. He was elected constable of Fairfield, which office he held four years.

"He died May 7, 1740, when the village that he had founded was bright with the beauty of springtime. He was buried in Greenfield Hill, where lie all the generations that have succeeded him, and the handsome stone that marks his resting-place is

still unbroken. His best monument is the village which bears his name. He was the first who had a farm there; so it was called Hull's Farms." *

His will, dated January 21, 1734/5, names his children:—

 George, b. 1686; d. 1769; m. Martha, daughter of Samuel Gregory, of Stratfield, Conn. George Hull was moderator of the first meeting called to organize a church in Redding, Conn., and was one of the first deacons.

"We place his name with the name of his father, Cornelius Hull, the founder of Hull's Farms, with the name of his grandfather, Cornelius Hull, who was a lieutenant in King Philip's War, and a representative to the general court for many years, and with the name of his great-grandfather, George Hull, the friend and assistant of Roger Ludlow. From them was inherited the ability which has distinguished the Hull family for nearly two hundred years. Always restless, always pressing forward; coming from England to help found Dorchester, going from Dorchester to help found Windsor, going from Windsor to help found Fairfield, going from Fairfield to found Hull's Farms, going from Hull's Farms to help found Redding, and going from Redding westward with the march of civilization, they have left a name behind them of which their descendants may well be proud."+

Editor's Note: On the 7th of November, 1996, the Nathan Rees Hull farm was awarded a certificate for being the oldest centennial family farm in Boone County, Iowa. The farm was located in the northwest quarter of Section 34, Township 83, Range 26, and was first entered by Nathan Rees Hull on 07 September 1849 from the United States government. The sequence of owners of this land will be found within the article. We are very grateful to HFA member #305 Lorraine (Blomgren) Van Dolah, a descendant of Jackson Hull, the half-brother of Nathan Rees Hull, for contributing the detailed land abstract information on the Nathan Rees Hull Centennial Farm. Her niece, HFA #923 Kimberly (Blomgren) Krog, is also a member of the HFA. We have or have had at least seventeen HFA members who descend from George Hull, father of Nathan Rees Hull.

Nathan Rees Hull, the third son of George Hull and Hannah Rees, was born 04 June 1816, probably in Licking County, Ohio. Nathan's grandparents were Samuel Hull and Martha Glover who married on 02 May 1758 in Morris County, New Jersey. The Hull family had removed to Harrison County, West Virginia, by 1788 and about 1808 the family migrated to Licking County, Ohio.

Nathan Rees Hull's parents, George Hull and Hannah Rees, married 07 June 1804 in Harrison County, Virginia (now West Virginia). George served as a Lieutenant in the War of 1812 from Ohio. He and his family left Licking County at the close of the War of 1812 and moved to Muskingum County, remaining there for several years.

They then migrated to Fulton County, Illinois, where George married his second wife Mrs. Lucy Ferris/Farris Roberts on 28 May 1836. Hannah Rees had died on 06 April 1834 in Illinois. The George Hull family later removed to Schuyler County, Missouri and lived there until 1848 when they moved to Worth

Township, Boone County, Iowa. George Hull died 04 February 1855.

His daughter Sophrona Eighmy to have and hold 16 and 3/7 acres, the said share of his said daughter to be taken from the East side of the above tract of land except 2 acres in northeast corner of tract, the length of said 2 acres being North and South.

His son Wm. R. Hull to have and hold 3 and 3/7 acres to be taken from northwest corner of above described premises, the said share of 3 and 3/7 acres to join his share of 13 acres on the South, to be equal in length to the width of the said 13 acres and of sufficient width to make the said 3 and 3/7 acres.

Hannah J. Zenor to have and hold 3 and 3/7 acres from the West side of the above tract.

The rest and residue of said tract to be divided and share and share alike between his four daughters Eveline, Etta E., Sylva [sic] C. and Hellena [sic] M., save and except 1 acre now known as the graveyard.

Jackson Hull named as Executor and also as Guardian of his minor children.

Codicil to the above Will made by testator September 24th, 1877. Said Codicil revokes the bequest made in his Will to Wm. R. Hull of 13 acres and 3 and 3/7 acres and gives the said land to his two grandsons, Thomas N. Hull and Herbert B. Hull, sons of said Wm. R. Hull, share and share alike.

Wm. R. Hull named as Executor to act with Jackson Hull, formerly named.

The above Will and Codicil signed in the presence of two subscribing witnesses and admitted to probate in the Circuit Court of Boone County, Iowa on the 20th day of March 1878 as and for the last Will and Testament of Nathan R. Hull, deceased.

Probate Minute Book No. 2, p. 10, shows Nathan R. Hull died November 12th 1877 and Jackson Hull and Wm. R. Hull were appointed Executors.

Bond filed and approved and Letters issued. Final report filed September 27th 1879.

Probate Index shows appointment of Jackson Hull as Guardian of Eveline Hull, Etta E. Hull, Sylva [sic] C. Hull and Helena M. Hull, minor heirs of N. R. Hull deceased.

October 13th 1886 Guardian's report filed and approved and he is discharged.

End of the Settlement of the Nathan Rees Hull Probate

After the Nathan Rees Hull probate was settled in 1886, his land went through approximately 108 separate title transactions, beginning in 1890 and ending in 1967. Each transaction involved a member of the Hull family, even though the land passed out of the hands of Nathan R. Hull's direct descendants.

Before Nathan Hull died, his half-brother, Jackson Hull, began acquiring some of this land, and purchased more of it from Nathan's heirs after Nathan's death.³ Before his death in 1927, Jackson Hull ceded some of this land to his son Frank and daughter Ida Zenor (Mrs. Porter H. Zenor). The majority of the land stayed in the hands of the Jackson Hull descendants. Frank Hull died in 1952, leaving heirs Everett Boone Hull and Mabel (Hull) Blomgren, who married Lloyd Blomgren.

Comments by Lorraine Van Dolah on the final settlement of the Nathan Rees Hull land:

After my grandmother, Minnie (Boone) Hull, died in 1965, her children owned the land and my sister and her husband lived there and did all of the farming.

Sometime in the 1970s my mother, Mabel Blomgren, bought her brother, Everett Hull's, share of the estate, so she owned 200 acres—all of the original Nathan Hull farm plus some additional bits.

After Mother died on Oct 18, 1987, her four children inherited the farm, but no specific acres because they were so diverse. Our sister had lived there most of her life, so my brothers and I decided to give her all of the pasture/timber-land—about 65 acres—for her share of the estate. Then my youngest brother, Donald L. Blomgren, and I sold our share to our brother, Robert L. Blomgren. That left me with 25 acres that had been used to even up the inheritance.

In the 1990s, I sold the 25 acres to my sister-inlaw, as brother, Bob, died on June 1, 1991. My goal was to get all of the farmable land back to one owner. In about 1999, my sister, Marian A. Bauman (her first husband had died), donated some land in her pasture to the Hull Cemetery. The township made the road and some friends, who have no burials there, put in the fence to make a driveway from the main road back to the cemetery. Now people can visit the cemetery without opening the big iron gate and then watching for the bull and cows or the overly zealous horses in the pasture.

Here ends the land transactions for the Nathan Rees Hull land. A copy of the 1996 certificate awarded to the Nathan Hull Farm, for being the oldest centennial family farm in Boone County, Iowa, appears following this article.



Comments by Lorraine Van Dolah Regarding the Original House on the Nathan Rees Hull Farm

In about 1878, Nathan Hull gave his half-brother, Jackson, about an acre of land where Jackson and the neighbors built the big house, in view of the cemetery. Jackson and my grandfather, Frank, put a fence around it to keep the wild animals out. Part of

the house is still there internally.

When my father remodeled the house in the 1970s, he put in new windows, siding, and a furnace, leaving a large amount of the original house. The house was put together with square nails and pegs. In fact, the stairways had only pegs, all hand made. They used a lot of pegs—probably nails were very expensive. The house had lots of narrow windows, as glass was also expensive.

Actually, my father just took off the kitchen and dining room and left the upstairs, living room, parlor and two bedrooms downstairs. They removed the front porch and made the main entrance on the south instead of the east. The original house had a small cellar so that was made larger to accommodate a furnace, hot water tank, and storage. The big pantry was made into a bathroom.

For all of the years that I can remember, the house had a lot of home-made furnishings—a kitchen cabinet with work table, a "pie saver" cabinet, some chairs, and other tables. There were two fancy tables with marble tops which my brother's family now have. I think my sister's grandson got Jackson Hull's Civil War gun. My brother and I shared the books from Jackson's library which I have passed on to my daughter. Most had been given to Jackson by his

sisters and brothers and his children. They were popular books for that time: Silas Marner, Tobacco Road, Grapes of Wrath, Cass Timberlane, Strawberry Acres, and Uncle Tom's Cabin. My sister Marian's family lived in the house, beginning in the 1970s, and today her son is raising his family there.

Editor's Note: This fascinating memoir of Peter and Wealthy (Hull) Gideon was apparently first published in a Minnesota newspaper, perhaps in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area. At some later date, the memoir was deposited in the Hennepin History Museum, Hennepin County Historical Society, Minneapolis, Minnesota. They have graciously allowed us permission to republish the memoir in this issue of the HFA Journal. We are retaining the original spelling in the article. We are very grateful to HFA member Mark R. Gideon for sending us these Gideon-Hull reminiscences, along with the lovely photograph of Wealthy (Hull) Gideon.

Newspaper Editor's Note: This story of a pioneer Minnetonka family is so forthright and unaffected that editing it seems impertinent. Better offer it almost without a touch, with its quaint, lucid style, its plain story-telling unspoiled, just as it came from the pen of Peter Gideon's daughter. No marks have been ventured in the manuscript except such as she would have made had she been preparing the story for printing—a verb or adjective shifted, a few punctuation marks substituted, an obvious intention adopted. Florence Elaine Gideon, youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Gideon, originator of the celebrated Wealthy apple—named for his wife, Wealthy Hull—was born June 2, 1864, was married to Charles H. Webster, August 18, 1897.

I At Home With Children

I realize the unsatisfactoriness of my references to my mother. You see that was a period when women were more behind the scenes. Their influence felt indirectly. This markedly so in my mother's life. My parents did not even belong to the one little church, or two later. Hence no "Ladies Aid." That cut off much that might have brightened up hard experiences. On the other hand might have created more. I think my mother realized both possibilities. She was social, but not too selfrevealing. Dignity in the best

sense, reserved, and, on occasion, somewhat taciturn. She was always young, at home with children. All through her life as a pioneer woman, and later in easier days she was a fine wielder of needle and thread, a maker of "tops" biscuits, a creator of home comforts. With us children whatever she did was superlative. Sewing, cooking, even the fire she lit was cosier than other fires.

During the last years of her life she was in delicate health and her days of hardship and of happiness came to a close, leaving us who were dear, a blessed memory. As in my childhood I have stood at the site of the Wealthy apple tree as by a shrine to my treasured mother.

My mother was one of the two youngest of a large family, the other a playmate brother. Her parents were prosperous Illinois farmers. In after years her mother and her father were to be understanding and admiring in-laws. His own mother had been less in sympathy with his non-conforming spirit.

Evidently little Miss Wealthy Hull had a plucky disposition. Coming home from school when a child, she was tormented by mosquitos. At last she flung

John A. Hull, 78, prominent long-time resident of Boone, died Sunday afternoon about 4:30 o'clock at his home, 122 S. Story Street. He had been in failing health for the past year and a half, and only a year ago resigned from the office of postmaster here which he had held for 15 years.

An attorney here for 50 years, Mr. Hull was one of a family long associated with the practice of law in the county. He was a graduate of the Iowa law school in the year 1894, and received a medal as an alumnus in 1944. He was a member of the Boone County Bar Association, as well as the Iowa and National Bar Associations.

Mr. Hull became postmaster in Boone on Sept. 1, 1933, and held office until his retirement on Sept. 1, 1948. During his years in Boone, Mr. Hull gave generously of his time for the

betterment of the community, and had a wide acquaintance of friends throughout the county and the state.

Surviving are his wife, and three children. One son, John A. Hull Jr., resides in Cleveland, Ohio: a son, Dwight S. Hull lives in Kansas City; and a daughter, Mrs. [Thirza] Don T. Hibner, is a resident of Palo Alto, Calif.

Memorial services will be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church in Boone.

land. Eventually, he purchased a tract, near what now is Four-Mile school house, east of Potwin and by reason of the hardest work and sacrifices, he added another quarter section to his original purchase about five years later. It is of interest that, in 1920 he sold the original, or home place for which he had paid \$3800, receiving \$65 an acre, one of the highest considerations ever paid for an upland Butler County farm. In 1908, the family moved to Winfield [Cowley County] to enroll the older children in Southwestern college. Two years later, they traded the Winfield property to S. T. McIntosh, present Mayor of El Dorado, for the farm, immediately north of town and what now is Hull addition. A portion of this is directly opposite Forest park, which is thickly populated with modest but modern homes. He still retains the old residence on the hill with its adjoining 14 acres. In religion, he is a Methodist, having been a steward of the Potwin church for many years. Politically, he is a Republican.

...He is the son of Samuel B. and Elvira Ann (Jones) Hull, the former born in Virginia, [now West Virginia] in 1825, and who died in 1861. Samuel B. Hull's father [Jacob] (grandfather of T. A. Hull) also was a native of Virginia,⁴ and was born July 4, 1776, the date of the Declaration of Independence and the birth of this Republic. Jacob married Frances [Robinson], native of Virginia⁵ and died in 1872 at the age of 97 years....

T. A. Hull's mother, Elvira Ann (Jones) Hull, born October 23, 1829, died in May, 1922, was the great-granddaughter of Jacob and Dinah Jones, of Morgantown, West Virginia. Her grandfather was John Jones, born in Morgantown in 1764, and who, with his sister,

• • • • •

Mary Jones, was captured by the Wyandotte Indians, near Fort Statler, Virginia, July 14, 1774. He escaped three years later while the tribe was in the wilderness of the far Northwest territory (now Michigan), made his way to the settlement at what now is Detroit, then Fort Pontchartrain, where he eventually became a physician. The sister, Mary, remained with the Indians until 20 years of age when she was rescued by British troops, near what is now Grosse Isle, Michigan, and later married Peter Malott, dying in 1845 and buried at Kingsville, Ontario, Canada.

On June 17, 1882, T. A. Hull was united in marriage to Miss Christenia Ullum. She is a native of Winchester, Indiana, and was born October 28, 1859. Her parents were Luke and Mary Ann (Bolinger) Ullum, the former born, February 6, 1830, in Greenville, Ohio, and the mother in Winchester, October 23, 1833. Luke Ullum died January 26, 1901, and his wife died at Potwin, September 4, 1923. They were married in Winchester, December 12, 1851, and came to Kansas, settling in Butler County, in the fall of 1881. The father of Luke Ullum was of German descent and an early Indiana pioneer. On the maternal side, Mrs. Hull's grandfather was George Bolinger, born in Germany and his wife was Christina (Haubic) Bolinger, both natives of Germany and Indiana settlers. The former died in Indiana; the latter in Haverhill, Butler County, and is buried in West cemetery, El Dorado.

Eight children have been born of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Hull, five of whom are living and one of whom, Oscar Clayton Hull, of Detroit, Michigan, has attained to more than ordinary success in the profession of law. He now is a practicing attorney of that city with a wealthy individual and corporate clientele; president of the Michigan State Bar Association; member of the board of directors of the American Judicature Society; member of the

Judicial Council of Michigan; the faculty of the Detroit City Law School; and a member from Wayne County (Detroit) in the Michigan State Legislature. He formerly was a member (1927–28) of the executive committee of the American Bar Association; an instructor in law (1912–14) in the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor; and acted as government official agent during the recent World War. He is a graduate cum laude, of the law schools of both the University of Kansas, 1909, and the University of Michigan, 1913. Mr. Hull's law firm is Oxtoby, Robinson, and Hull. Among their clients are some of the largest and most responsible business organizations of Detroit.

Oscar Clayton Hull was married in 1917 to Miss Erna Zuterman of Great Bend, Kansas, of a prominent pioneer family of Barton County. She lived but one year after their marriage, dying in 1918. Six years later, Mr. Hull was married to Fredericka Sims Alden, a talented singer and well known in Detroit musical circles. They have two children, Mary and Frederick.

The other children [of Thomas Alonzo and Christenia (Ullum) Hull] are Daisy Bell, wife of the Rev. Harry W. Smith, El Dorado; Mary Elvira, born in 1886 and died in infancy; Harriet M., who married Russell H. Fisher, Wilmington, North Carolina; Emerson Ray, World War veteran with commission of sergeant, now a rancher, Fort Morgan, Colorado, married Jennie Dickerson of Fort Morgan; Olive Blanche, born in 1895; died 1918; Alonzo Jr., born 1897, died in infancy; and Mabelle Edna, at home.

Emerson Ray Hull, the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Hull, was killed in a motor car accident December 18, 1934, while returning to his home in Fort Morgan, Colorado, from Boulder, where he operated a gold mine. Mr. Hull, who was forty-two years old at the time of his death, was born in Butler County on June 26, 1892. He was graduated from El Dorado High School in 1914, and attended Kansas State College at Manhattan. In June 1917, he enlisted in the army and served as a sergeant in the 89th Division of the ambulance corps in the World War. He was married to Jennie Dickerson at Denver, Colorado, October 1, 1920. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and of the American Legion and Masonic Lodge at Fort Morgan. He is survived by Mrs. Hull and one daughter, Frances Marie, eleven years old.

Harriet M. Fisher, widow of Russell H. Fisher, newspaperman and author, is a teacher of exceptional ability. She was formerly principal of grades in the Wilmington, North Carolina schools and more recently is on the faculty of El Dorado school.



Hull Family Association Journal, Autumn 1997 and Spring 1998:

Who Was Tennis Star Helen Hull Jacob's Mother?

On page 32 of our previous update to this article, we noted that the parents of Helen Hull Jacobs were Eula Hull and Roland Jacobs. We have since located a genealogy entitled Montgomery-Hull and Related Families by Edna Montgomery Hull, 1954. In her genealogy, Mrs. Hull discusses the ancestors of Helen Hull Jacobs, giving the parents of Eula (Hull) Jacobs as Samuel Thompson Hull and Mary Bruce Edwards, of Middlegrove, Monroe County, Missouri, and Kirksville, Adair County, Missouri.

Eula's grandparents are given as Chauncey Hull and Margaret Enoch of Kentucky and Pike and Monroe County, Missouri. Mrs. Hull continues this line back to Killingworth, Middlesex County, Connecticut, but it is believed that she erred when she attached this line to a HFAm #300 Abel Hull, of the George Hull, immigrant line, who lived both in Killingworth and Oxford, New Haven County, Connecticut. This Abel Hull had a son John C. Hull, but he is not identical to above Chauncey Hull, for he married Hannah Chatfield and they remained in New Haven County, Connecticut, where they raised their family.

In Helen Hull Jacob's autobiography Beyond the Game, she mentions her uncle Gilbert Hull. Mrs. Edna Montgomery Hull's genealogy does not mention such a man. Miss Jacob's autobiography also stated that her mother, Eula (Hull) Jacobs, "considered herself a Southerner by right of Kentuckian and Virginian parentage and ancestry." Therefore, this does not conform to a New England heritage through her mother, as stated in Edna Montgomery Hull's family history. Nevertheless, Mrs. Hull's genealogy

has given us two more generations back of Helen Hull Jacobs and her parents. [See also our Bible Record article on this family in this issue of the Hull Family Association Journal.]

Mrs. Susan Springer Hull

Was Her Maiden Name Springer? How a Research Problem Was Solved by HFA member #1281 David Braithwaite

The certificate¹ for the marriage of Bradford Hull to Susan Springer on 28 January 1880 in Van Wert County, Ohio, clearly shows in the certification statement by the justice of the peace that Susan was Mrs. Susan Springer who married Bradford Hull. Is this true? If this is true, what was Susan's maiden name? As a consequence, in looking for Susan's ancestors, were we tracing the wrong family in looking for Springers rather than another name?

The following article will show my research on this question and give evidence that Susan Springer Hull's maiden name was most likely Springer and that she probably had not been previously married.

My great grandmother, Susan Springer Hull, was born June 19, 1852 in Van Wert County, Ohio. She is believed to be the Susan Springer who married Bradford Hull at the age of 28, he being under the age of 21 and marrying with the consent of his mother.

In the 1860 Census of Harrison Township, Van Wert County, Ohio², there was recorded the family of Henry Springer with wife Elizabeth and children Samuel, Susan, age 8, David, Filmore and Amos Springer. In the 1870 Census³, Henry Springer appeared with the same family, plus a new addition, Parnetta. Susan Springer was now reported to be 18 years of age.

On 14 December 1896, Filmore Springer filed an application to probate the will of Henry Springer⁴, who died 01 December 1896 in Harrison Township. Besides his widow, Elizabeth, the next of kin listed Samuel, son; Susan Hull, daughter; David, son; Filmore, son; Amos, son; and Parnetta Balyeat, daughter. All were in Wren, Van Wert County, Ohio, except Parnetta who was in Ohio City, also Van Wert County.

On 05 March 2003, Pamm S. Kill,

Micrographics Department, Van Wert County Court of Common Pleas⁵, responded to my request for information regarding the marriage record of Bradford Hull and Susan Springer, by providing copies of the above referenced documents, which included the following remarks:

"As for verification if she was married before, I believe somehow that this could be a mistake OD the marriage record when they listed her as Mrs. Springer ... I cannot find anywhere where was married before in any of our records. This could been have misprint."

So, what are we presently able to prove? We believe that we do have the correct Springer family. We know Susan, at the age of 18, was in Harrison Township in the 1870 census, living with her father, Henry, and mother, Elizabeth. Her father's will of 1896 confirms that she married a Hull and the marriage certificate stated that she married Bradford Hull in 1880 in Van Wert County.

What we cannot prove is whether Susan had previously married and was widowed or divorced between 1870 and 1880. It is possible that she married previously, but there is no evidence of any other marriage in the Van Wert County records. Susan's first child was born nine months after her marriage to Bradford Hull. Therefore, if she had been married previously, there likely would have been children born to that marriage. She might have gone to another county, gotten married there,

had no children, was widowed or divorced, and returned to Van Wert County before 1880. It was there that she met and married Bradford Hull. Or it's possible that she might have previously married another Springer, perhaps a cousin. However, personally, I do not believe that!

I believe that Susan Springer, the eldest daughter of Henry Springer, was a spinster when she married Bradford Hull on 28 January 1880. I believe that the "Mrs." notation was the result of sloppy work or the poor memory of the JP when four days later, on 01 February 1880, he certified and recorded the matrimony, listing Susan as Mrs. Susan Springer.

Unless a marriage record can be found for Susan Springer and a male Springer, I believe that the census records, along with the will of Susan's father, prove that her maiden name was Springer and that she married only once—to Bradford Hull.

Bradford Hull

Bradford Hull was born and raised in Indiana in Blue Creek and St. Mary's Townships, Adams County. His father, Phineas Hull, had left his father and brothers in Morrow County, Ohio about 1845 to settle in Indiana. Bradford, the 12th child of Phineas, was born May 13, 1861.

Bradford's wife, Susan Springer, was born in Van Wert County, Ohio and that is where they were married on January 28, 1880. However, the 1880 census⁶ shows Bradford and his wife Susan living with his mother in St Mary's Township, Adams County, Indiana; they must have moved there right after the wedding. At the time of the census Susan was well pregnant with their first child, Delorna, who was born October 10, 1880 and unfortunately died less

than a year later. Cary, their second child and first male, was born March 1, 1882 in Van Wert County, Ohio. Susan had gone home for that birth.

Susan bore Bradford five children in all, the last three being Bertha, born in 1884, and the twins, Homer and Henry, born on February 9, 1886. These last three children were born in De Kalb County, Missouri. Bradford likely was influenced to go to Missouri around 1883 by his uncle, Cary, who lived in Maysville City, De Kalb County. He must have had his father, Phineas's, sense of adventure when he moved his family there.


I have not researched Bradford's life to know what he did in Missouri. However, the family did not remain there long and returned to Ohio where they appeared in the 1900 Census⁷ of Paulding County, Paulding Township, Cary, the eldest son likely named after his great uncle, married and started his family in Paulding County, Ohio. Cary's first child, Harold, was born in 1905. He had three additional children in Ohio before moving to Cement City, Jackson County, Michigan about 1913.

In 1910 Bradford shows up in the Woodward Township, Woodward County, Oklahoma census⁸ as head of household living with his brother Stewart. Bradford's marital status is shown as divorced.

The 1920 Census⁹ shows Bradford, Cary and Henry as separate families all on page 10A in Columbia Township, Jackson County, Michigan. The northern side of Cement City is in Columbia Township. Bradford is listed on the last line of the page as head of a family and "unmarried" but the next page 10B does not show anyone else living with him.

Cary Hull had four more children in Cement City, Michigan. My mother, Onda, being next to the last, was born in 1919. She and her younger sister, Edna, born in 1921, both have vague memories of Bradford Hull, their grandfather. He came to live with Cary

and his family in Cement City before 1920, probably upon his return from Oklahoma. The great depression of 1929 severely impacted Cary and his family. They lost the family farm and hence became tenant, sharecropping farmers.

From Cement City the family moved west to Addison, Lenawee County, then further west to North Adams, Hillsdale County, back to Cement City and finally north to Williamston, Ingham County, where they lived on several farms. Bradford continued to live with the family throughout this time in a separate little house that they moved from place to place.


My mother's first comment to me about Bradford, as we were looking at family pictures, was "He was mean." She had likely been around him for ten or twelve years since she was about five or six years of age. She did not like him and was apparently afraid of him. She was twentyone and married with children of her own when Bradford died.

The words most fitting to describe Bradford in his later years when the young sisters, Onda and Edna, knew him are "ornery" and "cantankerous." In Addison, Lenawee County, Michigan, which is the farthest back my mother can remember, Bradford first lived in a room off the living room of the house. On one occasion when the family had a church group in the home they started singing hymns. Bradford did not like music and so he started banging

on the stovepipe in his room until he broke it.

It was in Addison that he later occupied the small house in which he lived the rest of his life. It was this house that was moved from location to location as the family moved. Bradford came to the main home to eat meals with the family. When he wanted something passed to him, he would start banging his plate with his fork or banging his glass on the table and continued doing so, never speaking a word, until the correct item was passed to him. His granddaughter Edna once saw a calendar inside the door of his house that had "pancakes" written on every day. At the bottom of the page was written, "Pancakes are killing me." She interpreted this to mean he did not like having pancakes everyday. Edna also remembers being allowed to sit on Bradford's lap in his house because he seemed to like her.

Bradford hated cats and didn't much like dogs either. He apparently had no hobbies and did not do any recreational reading. He did not have a garden nor did he do any handyman work that the sisters can remember. He did sometimes whittle things. I have a doll bed my Mom gave to me some years ago that Bradford made for Edna and her. It is engraved with his name. On the inside of the foot of the bed in a series of

dots is "BB HULL" "DEC 1925." On the inside of one of the side rails a wooden plaque is attached displaying the same dots that read "EDNA AND ONDA." This tells me a couple of things. First it supports the statement that he was a carpenter as well as a farmer. Also, Onda is older than Edna and, because Edna is listed first, I believe it supports Edna's statement that Bradford liked her

Bradford was baptized at an evangelist meeting in either a lake or river. On that occasion he spontaneously walked into the water, fully clothed with his wallet and all other pocket contents in place. Everything was soaked during the baptism.

Edna recalled a day in Williamston when her brother Clayton was in the garden picking tomatoes. Bradford walked into the garden some distance away from Clayton, picked up a crate, held it in front of his face and said to Clayton, "I bet you can't hit this" or words to that effect. Clayton threw a ripe tomato hitting the crate squarely and splattering tomato all over Bradford and the crate. I had the impression as Edna

told the story that, because of Bradford's stern nature, she had expected some repercussion from the event, but apparently nothing happened.

Bradford died of bronchial pneumonia in Williamston, Michigan on March 30, 1940 at the age of 78 years¹⁰, without any money or other worldly possessions. He seemed to have no friends other than the family. He was buried in Roseland Memorial Gardens, Jackson, Jackson County, Michigan in a plot purchased by

his son Henry. His wife is not buried there. Susan Springer Hull is buried in Live Oak Cemetery in Paulding Village, Paulding County, Ohio, in the same cemetery as her son Homer, the twin of Henry 11.

My great grandfather, Bradford Hull, a man whom I never met, was married at age eighteen to a woman nine years older than himself. He was impressed enough with his uncle to name his firstborn son, Cary, after him. Bradford seems to have been a driven, independent and stern man, a farmer and carpenter10, who may have intimidated the young children in son Cary's family. There were stories within the family that reflected poorly on Bradford's treatment of his wife and of his support of her with the children. In any case, the only living memory of him today is that of an "ornery, cantankerous old man." We don't know his motive to live separately from them in a little moveable house. It could have been compassion for the family so as not to impose his presence. It could have been a forced solution to a problem or it might have been so Bradford would have a refuge from the commotion of a family with eight children living at home. I will leave this for you to decide.

Events in the Lives of the Milton Bloise Hull Family 1828-1870 Excerpts from a Biography of Milton Bloise Hull and Emily Riley Hull

Milton Bloise Hull was a great grandson of the above Samuel Hull and Martha Glover Hull

Historical background material has been italicized.

Ohio and Illinois Years Milton Bloise Hull was born to John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull, in Muskingum County, Ohio. 35 His 01 November 1828: Civil War discharge papers¹¹ state that he was born near Zanesville, Muskingum County, which borders Licking County on the east. The family, however, is thought to have been living in Licking County at the time of Milton's birth. 34,35,36,37 1830: Milton B. Hull, age two, appeared on the 1830 Bowling Green Township, Licking County, Ohio census with his parents John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull. 35,38 1840: Milton B. Hull, age twelve, appeared on the 1840 Fulton County, Illinois U.S. census with his parents John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull. 12 Milton B. Hull, age twenty-two, appeared on the 1850 Cass Township, Fulton County, Illinois U.S. census 1850: with his parents John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull. 13 Emily Riley, age thirteen, appeared on the 1850 Bureau County, Illinois U.S. census with her parents Paul 1850: Riley/Ryland and Elizabeth Loughrey Riley. 14,16,41 1854: Senator Stephen A. Douglas of Illinois pushed through Congress the Kansas-Nebraska Act, which established two new territories—a measure proposed to settle the slavery question, by letting the territorial legislatures decide whether these areas should allow slavery. This act made it legally possible for slavery to exist in these territories where it formerly had been barred. Milton B. Hull and Emily Riley married in Neponset, Bureau County, Illinois. 17 16 August 1855: 1856 & 1858: Two children, Thomas W. and Ida Josephine "Phene," were born, both in Bureau County. 19 Milton and Emily Hull removed to Allen County, Kansas Territory, with Milton's parents John and Mary Ca. 1859: Wright Hull. 16,19,22 Both opponents and supporters of slavery had poured into Kansas, clashing in armed conflicts. Kansas was known during this period as "bleeding Kansas." Milton and Emily Hull, with two children, appeared on the census in the Territory of Kansas, Allen 1860: County, in the same household as Milton's parents, John G. and Mary Wright Hull. Also in this same household were Milton's two sisters, Minerva Ruth, Christina Jane, and a nephew, Hiram M. Hull. The sisters were listed as "Ladies."19 Son William Hull was born in Allen County, Kansas. 19 August 1860: 06 November 1860: Abraham Lincoln was elected President. Civil War Years Confederate troops attacked Fort Sumter, in Charleston Harbor, South Carolina. Three days later 12 April 1861: President Lincoln issued a call for troops. 20 May 1862: Passage of the Homestead Act, which was a program of public land grants to small farmers. Milton B. Hull went back to Bureau County, Illinois to enlist in the Civil War. 10,11 while his father John G. 14 August 1862: Hull remained in Allen County, Kansas, to serve in the Civil War in that state. 10 Milton B. Hull served as a Private in Company H, 93rd Regiment, Illinois Volunteers. Company H. was September-October 1862: called the "Bureau Co. Tigers," stationed at Camp Douglass, Chicago, Illinois. Here Hull endured a severe attack of stomach and bowel trouble. 11 Hull's regiment was sent to Memphis, Tennessee.11 November 1862: December 1862: Hull's regiment went on the Holly Springs March, but Hull was left at camp because of illness. 11 Hull rejoined his regiment near Oxford, Mississippi. 11 Last of December 1862: President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, to free the slaves. 01 January 1863: Hull's regiment went south with General Grant on the Yazoo Expedition.¹¹ 13 March 1863: Hull was absent, having been wounded in the leg while supporting a battery in action in the Rifle Pits near May-June 1863: Vicksburg.11 Hull was sent home to Bureau County, Illinois, on furlough for twenty days. 11 It is believed that my great 18 June 1863: aunt, Mary Ellen "Ella" Hull, was conceived during that furlough, for she was born 05 March 1864. Hull was promoted to Corporal. 11 01 August 1863:

07 June 1864:

A Board of Examiners Report¹¹ was held. Hull was given an average grade of 2:

£10. On March 20th and 21th of this same year, Samuel and Martha Hull sold 69, 97, and 55 acres of this same

land to their sons, John, Charles, and David Hull for £10 each.⁴⁴

The court records show three separate lawsuits involving Samuel involving John McDaniel, Benjamin Robinson. and George Arnold from 1791 to 1799 in Harrison County. On September 19, 1796, Samuel was fined for not serving on a petit jury, and on January 23, 1797, it was ordered that he be exempted from the payment of county and parish levies.45

On August 9, 1799 Samuel Hull sold 75 and 1/4 acres of land for £100 to his son, William, being the land that he and Martha were then living on. Six days later on August 15, Samuel leased from his son William, the improvements, houses, and all other buildings on this same land for one bushel of India corn.


This agreement was to take place during the natural life of Martha, his wife, and they were to have peaceable possession of these properties.⁴⁴

In 1800 five of the Hull sons: Uriah, Charles, James, John, and George appeared on the Harrison County tax list. 47 Samuel's name did not appear on this same list, indicating that he now had divested himself of all of his property, having deeded it to his sons, except for the lease of his home plantation from his son. On July 20, 1807, for £100, Samuel deeded back to his son, William, the same tract of land that William had heretofore conveyed by lease to Samuel Hull. 44

This 1807 land transaction signaled that a change was about to take place in the Hull family, for in this same year or soon after, Samuel and Martha Glover Hull, with five of their sons, John, Uriah, Charles, William, George, and several daughters, migrated west to Licking (then Fairfield) County, Ohio, where they first settled in Franklin and Hopewell Townships. 248,18,23,24,34,35,37,36,43

The Hull family may not all have traveled to Ohio together, but most probably they journeyed to the new state of Ohio on the same trail, which by 1811, was known as the great National Pike and later as the Cumberland or National Road. The reason for this move has not been definitely established, but losing a son in Harrison County, and the need for more farming land for the remaining sons, probably contributed to this westward migration.

The opening of the Ohio lands for settlement and an established route for travel, even if primitive at this time, were convenient events in history that helped to relieve the economic plight of the Harrison County, West Virginia Hulls and their growing families....



During the Civil War years, it is obvious that my great grandmother, Emily Riley Hull, also went back to Bureau County, Illinois, to live near her parents, as her daughter, Mary Ellen, was born there. Emily wrote a ghost story, which I now have in my possession, about being in Illinois at the time of the Civil War.

*** * ***

Post-Civil War Years in Illinois and Nebraska

After the Civil War, the Hulls continued to live in Bureau County, Illinois, where they had two more daughters: my grandmother Emma Loretta, in 1871, and Grace Christine, in 1877. ^{26,27}

In 1879 the Hulls migrated to Hamilton County, Nebraska, where Milton worked as a carpenter. Here they lived for the next six years, until 1885, 10,26,27 when they removed to Keith County in western Nebraskawhich was to become Perkins County in 1887.28 Once again they moved westward to take advantage of unoccupied homestead land³⁰ in a treeless country, where there was still some evidence of occasional Indians inhabiting these sagebrush plains.³⁹ Emily Riley Hull wrote a descriptive account of an Indian Scare that they experienced while living in a tent on their western Nebraska homestead land in June of 1885.9

My grandmother, Emma Hull, then only fourteen years old, later wrote about this same experience:

My people came out here in 1885 to file on their land. They went back to Aurora [Nebraska] to spend the winter. I was going to school there. Early in the spring they returned to Perkins County to make their improvements. After school was out, I came on the train to Ogallala [Nebraska]. My people were camped in Ogallala having gone there because of the Indian scare. I never will forget the first night. I could hear the Indians crossing the bridge all night. After two weeks we started back to our home. I think we passed only one house from Ogallala out to our claim and that belonged to some old friends of ours from Illinois.9

In 1885 Milton Hull wrote a regular newspaper column for the *Keith County News* in Ogallala, entitled "Homesteader's Department." His writings were quite political and even

described by some as "radical," with a "biting pen." He discussed the Farmer's Convention, nominees for county offices, and the general interests of "an intelligent class of farmers for the purpose of taxing the railroad land, securing school land for the homesteaders, and opposing court house bonds." ²⁹


Two years later people were demanding local government and, on November 8, 1887, a general election was held. The vote favored that the southern area, where the Hulls were living, would separate from Keith County and form a new county called Perkins, named for Charles E. Perkins, the President of the C.B.&Q. railroad.³⁹ The village of Grant, named in honor of Ulysses S. Grant, the Union Civil War Commander-in-Chief and later President of the United States, became the new county seat.³⁹

The last leg of the Texas Trail, a cattle drive from Texas to the Union Pacific Railroad loading chutes in Ogallala, crossed through Perkins County in those early days. The final great drive occurred in the Spring of 1886, 39 which then opened the area for more farming land in this sparsely

settled country. Despite having been described by Stephen Long as "The Great American Desert," this semi-arid region possessed grassland soil that was a deep, dark loam, quite fertile, and well suited for growing crops, such as corn, wheat, and, in the earliest days, many vegetables for the homesteaders'

family tables. In the severe drought years, however, poor crops prevailed and prairie fires remained a constant threat in the long, hot, dusty summers.

The South Platte River flows through Keith County, which lies just above the northern border of Perkins County.

Ogallala, not depicted on this map, lies on the river twenty miles to the north of Grant, in Keith County.

The Texas Cattle Trail passed through Perkins County just east of Madrid.

The Hull homestead was about five miles southwest of Grant.

Many of the earliest settlers built one-, two-, or three-room "soddies"—sod houses with walls cut like bricks from the prairie ground. The more prosperous built small frame houses with lumber that had to be shipped in by railroad, for there were no trees with which to build an entire house. Only an occasional cottonwood tree served as a pole for support in the soddies.

With no running water in the county, deep wells had to be dug or water had to be hauled by wagon from a few natural springs. My grandmother used to remark, somewhat proudly, "We have not one bridge in Perkins County!"

The Platte River in Keith County was twenty miles to the north; the Hulls first obtained their water from this distant river. The general description of the Platte, among the early settlers, was

"Too thick to drink; too thin to plow—a mile wide and an inch deep." It ran through country as flat as its French name implied. To the south these plains extended for miles and miles, with only an occasional sand hill to interrupt the level landscape.

In 1881 Milton Hull applied for a pension for his Civil War service and, in his affidavit, he listed that he was incapacitated for manual labor because of:

- a gunshot wound to the calf of his right leg
- · disease of the stomach and bowels
- angina pectoralis [sic] with palpitation of the heart and nervous prostration.

Clinton P. Logan certified and signed Milton's invalid [disability] pension declaration.¹¹ The pension depositions revealed that most of the farm work had been done by Milton's sons, because of Milton's disabilities due to his injury

and illnesses while in the war. At one point, he testified that he weighed only 112 pounds and the normal weight for his five-foot, eight-inch frame was 140 pounds.

In June of 1889, my grandmother, Emma L. Hull, married Clinton P. Logan, how was the second lawyer to act as Grant's village attorney and who later served as the county attorney. He was a leader of the Populist political party, have a was his father-in-law, Milton Hull, who became one of the first Perkins County Judges. Homestead land and were now living in Grant. Preview of The Enhanced 1850 Census: The South

Part I: The South by Phyllis J. Hughes HFA Genealogist Hypr. C

As noted in the announcement on the front page, the HFA will be featuring Hulls who appeared in the 1850 census by presenting an enhanced version of this census. This enhanced census will first cover the southern states in two installments, which will include the two enlarged issues this year, in place of our usual three-issue HFA Journals. The following articles contain some summaries, in various categories, taken from the 1850 census reports for the southern states. The complete enhanced census for the South will appear in these publications during 2005.

Update on HFA Database

In our last report we stated that as of November 17, 2004, we had hit a grand total of 16,798 family group sheets in the HFA database, after ten years of input. We are using the FileMaker Pro database program, which allows us to conduct searches for people in about twenty-one different fields.

As of April 1, 2005, we are happy to report a new grand total of 17,355 family group sheets in the HFA database.

We are still busy inputting Hull marriages from all states into the database. These have been gleaned from many different sources and are all in the holdings of the HFA Genealogist. Our last count for Hull marriages was approximately 5364 marriages in the marriage field for the head of the family and 2,683 marriages for the children in these families, but which dates have not yet all been entered.

Our new totals are: 6226 marriages in the marriage field for the head of the family

3064 marriages for the children in these families

We have now completed the marriage records for 44 states.

The sources for the database entries are from (1) the material sent to me from our HFA members, which is periodically listed in each HFA Newsletter, and (2) the material which I personally have researched, collected, and analyzed from libraries and archives throughout the entire country. I now have over 300 2-inch and 3-inch wide notebooks, which hold these Hull/Holl/Hohl/Hole pages, all encased in acid-free plastic sheets. This genealogical material, along with the Hull lineages submitted by our HFA members, form the basis for most of our HFA Journal articles.

A special thanks goes to Ruth S. Ratliff, of Boulder, Colorado, who assists me in typing these records into the database. Also I extend my grateful thanks to the Hull Family Association, who from the beginning has contributed yearly funding to support this project.

We still would welcome receiving family group sheets from all of those HFA members who have not yet turned these in.

Brother Bill likes blueberries too, but for me; there is hardly anything that I like better than blueberries. And this vignette is about eating blueberries amid a critical moment in time.

Our dad was put into Waterbury State in Washington County, Hospital Vermont with a mental illness that occasionally plagued the Hull family. mainly due to a chemical imbalance. It was very disruptive in our lives, although Cone Automatic Machine Company, through their Human Resources Department and his health insurance company, stood steadfastly by his side, and he utilized their personnel policy health benefits for the longest time. Brother Marc took a job as a prison guard at Windsor State Prison during his senior year in college to help Mother and Dad financially. Marc actually graduated from the University of Vermont only one year after I completed my five-year degree from Northeastern, though he went through a four-year program.

We were at the Hull Family Reunion near Fletcher, Vermont when Dad stood up and started praying, with Cousin Ray Hull gently trying to calm him down. He must have been acting strangely all day. Ray's sister, Christine, had been committed to the state hospital earlier, so he had some experience with this. After some discussion, it was decided that Mother should stop at Waterbury State Hospital to consult with them. While there, and with all our family present, they decided Dad should be hospitalized. Wow! I recall Dad resisting, and it took four men to subdue him. He was extremely strong and always stayed that way. Dad remained and we all went home, subdued ourselves, sad, and fearful for the future. It took Dad about a decade to stabilize and get back to normal functioning.

In August, I drove up to Waterbury with Brother Bill, still in grade school, in tow. I was a freshman at Northeastern but was home for summer break. We were planning to hike Camel's Hump in Waterbury, up the Long Trail, stay in one of the shelters,

and visit Dad both before we hiked and afterwards, before returning home to Hartland, Vermont.

After visiting Dad for an hour in the morning, Bill and I traveled along the dirt road by the Winooski River until we found where the Long Trail was marked at the base of Camel's Hump. Up the mountain trail we went, sometimes scaling rocks, wet and slippery. We often had to help each other scamper up abrupt crevices. For hours it seemed, we climbed upwards, deep into the woods, slightly cool since we were not in the sunlight.

We wondered whether we were on the right trail, and it seemed we were getting no closer to the Long Trail marker for the next cabin shelter. We finally emerged into bright sunshine. with plenty of low shrubbery on a rocky plateau, long before the actual hump from which Camel's Hump gets its name. We were so relieved. Before us, there was a blue hue, almost a haze, as far as we could see. Looking closer, we could see big, ripe, low-bush blueberries, and thousands of them because it had been so damp this particular summer.

We picked fistfuls of berries. This plateau was close to heaven, about 3200 feet, although Camel's Hump, at its summit, is about 4300 feet high. Now this blueberry heaven, often found on mountaintops, was a very pleasant and unexpected surprise which cheered us after having visited Dad in the mental hospital in the valley below. Bill and I spent hours grazing our way toward the Hump, but not very fast. I probably ate three quarts of blueberries before forcing myself to stop eating them while continuing our hike. If I were a betting man, I bet we ate more than five quarts of these juicy blueberries between us.

Later on after it was cold black, we wandered into the Long Trail shelter, slightly below the summit of Camel's Hump. We were abundantly full of blueberries but eager to bed down for the night. We warmed cans of baked beans, ate Milky Way bars, drank

stream water, unrolled the sleeping bags, and soon we were asleep.

Early the next morning, after washing in a nearby brook and chatting with two or three other campers, Bill and I headed up to the summit of Camel's Hump. Once there, we could look all around from Mount Mansfield and **Bolton** Mountain to the north. Burlington, Lake Champlain, and the Adirondack Mountains to the west. Barre and Montpelier to the east, and Addison County to the south. What a beautiful and spectacular view! Camel's Hump is all rock; no trees and we could view the Long Trail as it wound to the south for quite a few miles. What a memorable scene and so very much worth the long hike up the mountain.

Slowly, we returned from our trek, down the mountain but first across the plateau full of blueberries. For another few hours we made our way slowly, clutching handful after handful of blueberries. Bill and I chatted about the world, politics, high school courses and teachers at Hartford High School, which Bill was about to enter, and where Marc and I had just graduated, and also discussed stories about growing up with Mom and Dad.

But mainly we just ate blueberries. They were so abundant, big and juicy, just waiting to be picked. We did not see any bears, but we imagined them eating these big blueberries, too, in preparation for a long winter. Raccoons and other rodents were evident too. Never have I seen a blueberry field so filled with blueberries, so wanting to be picked, and we able to fill our big bellies for free.

Finally, Bill and I headed down the forested woods on Camel's Hump, over trails well marked down to the river's edge and to our car. Off to visit Dad again for an hour at Waterbury State Hospital. We had two quarts full of Camel's Hump blueberries to share with him and as well as stories of our adventure. He enjoyed it and, as a former Scoutmaster, he knew his work was paying big blue dividends to us.



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



farmer, apparently they settled near his uncle George William Hull and aunt Ann Hull Jeanes.

George and Mary are known to have brought at least two children across the ocean with them: Mary Hull, their oldest known child, and William Silas Hull.

Mary Hull was born in 1845 in Leigh; in 1869 in Tyrone, she was married to William George Waring, who had been born in 1847 in Cedar Creek. William George Waring was a mining engineer and mine owner. As a result the couple lived in such towns as Deming and Silver City, New Mexico, and Webb City, Missouri. In Silver City, William George designed and participated in the building of a church, and served on its board for a number of years. They had 4 children, only one of whom lived into adulthood. William George Waring died in 1935 in Webb City, Missouri, near a lead mine he owned; Mary died in 1912 in Tyrone.

William Silas Hull was born in 1847 in Leigh. Although he is known to have crossed the ocean, he is not listed with his parents in the 1850 census for Stormstown; his fate is unknown.

George Crocker and Mary (Jeanes) Hull's first child born in America was Joseph G. Hull, born in 1849 in Stormstown. In 1873 Joseph G. married his second cousin, Sarah Jane Rider, daughter of Samuel Rider and Ann Hull, mentioned above. Joseph and Sarah had nine children; Joseph G. Hull died in Tyrone, in 1928.

Joseph's obituary said that at the time of his death he was one of the oldest and longest-standing mail carriers in Pennsylvania. He supposedly entered on that duty at the age of 13 years before the rails passed through Tyrone. Mail was then carried by stagecoach or on horseback.

George and Mary's second American child was George W. Hull, born in 1857 in Stormstown. George W. married Nancy Ann Stroup in 1885; they also lived in Tyrone and had five children. George W. died in 1933 in Tyrone.

Janet Hull was the first of four children born to George Crocker and Mary after their move to Tyrone. Janet, was born in 1860, married Milton Miller, a mining entrepreneur from Iowa, in her sister's home in Silver City, New Mexico, in in1889. Janet and Milton had two children; Janet died in San Francisco on 10 Sep 1955.

At first, George Crocker is listed as a laborer in the 1860 and 1870 census, and then in the 1880 census he is listed as an drayman. Family history says he opened a harness shop, and that grew to be a livery stable. The other children born in Tyrone were Sarah J., Charles Andrews, and Ella Elizabeth. Today's descendants of George Crocker and Mary are spread across the U.S.

In 1850 Joseph Hull, innkeeper in Leigh and sixth child

of Joseph Hull and Mary Andrews, along with his wife Mary Crocker and the seven remaining of their 12 children came to America, four having died young in England before they had left. They first stopped in Stormstown to see their son George Crocker Hull and his family, then continued on to settle in the Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, area, where Joseph's wife Mary died suddenly late in 1850. In later years their children moved on and settled in many areas: Kansas, Texas, Oregon, Arkansas, New Mexico, Michigan, Missouri, to name a few.

Among other Centre County pioneer Hull families are two John Hulls who apparently served in the War of 1812. One, born around 1794, filed a Bounty Land Claim in Centre County in 1877 for his service in Captain Joseph Kleckner's unit in September, October and November of 1812.

A John Lewis Hull, born in 1795, married a Mary McCullough in 1814, and had four children born in Centre County from 1816 to 1824. He moved to Ohio in 1829 and died in Hamilton County, Ohio, in 1841. He supposedly was involved in the Battle on Lake Erie, and although not wounded had bullet holes in his clothing to prove how close he was to the action. The government of pennsylvania apparently gave him a Bronze Medal for his service which was in the possession of John Gance, son of Mary Jane Hull Nance.

Another gallant military servie man was Private Fred Hull who was killed in action south of malancourt during World War I. He was in the 314th Infantry, and his mother's name was Mrs. Henry C. Baney. It is not clear if or how he might be related to the other Hulls.

In addition to John Bornholdt, who furnished much of the information within the following register, there are three others in CCGS who are following Hull lines, but it is not clear if any of their Hull ancestors were actually in Centre County. They are Pat Stover Fair, Sheri Graves and Linda Russell.

issaries to try to work things out. The Scotch-Irish kept the pressure on the Quakers about the deprecations on the frontier and in 1776 this pressure along with the Revolution brought the Quakers to their knees and they created 13 new seats in the Assembly of Pennsylvania for Scotch-Irishmen in Western Pennsylvania.

From that point on there was no stopping them and by the end of 1776 the Scotch-Irish controlled the Assembly. By 1778 the President of Pennsylvania was a Scotch-Irishman who was dedicated to the Revolution which wasn't unusual since they loved to fight and especially anytime their liberty or freedom was threatened.

By the end of the Revolution the greatest number of troops in the Continental Army in and around Pennsylvania were Scotch-Irishmen. The Scotch-Irish also harbored an animosity for the British from the old country and were more than happy to take the opportunity to even the score.

Most of the Scotch-Irish moved westward with the exception of people like the Boals who started Boal Mansion.

Lowe said the mansion is truly one of the most important historic sites one could go to, with the Pennsylvania history, the Scotch-Irish history, the touchstones on world history at the Columbus chapel and the largest group of Columbus artifacts known to the world housed at the mansion.

The Boals lived as true Scotch-Irishmen, Lowe said. "They never threw anything away, it's all still at the mansion."

Other Scotch-Irishmen Lowe mentioned were the Jacks who were involved in the mercantile business.

One of the other principal industries of the Scotch-Irish was the distillation of whiskey. By the time of the Whiskey Rebellion in the western counties alone there were 570 distilleries, 270 were in Washington County.

The Centre County area had 6 distilleries for a population of about 1500 people. In 1817, Lowe determined from a store account book that the per capita consumption of whiskey including women was 68 quarts, with a quart of whiskey costing 25 cents.

One of the things the Scotch-Irish never got involved with was the iron business. Things had to be brought overland from Pittsburgh or Philadelphia and they were more than willing to pay the price to have these things brought in.

Certainly, by the end of the Revolution the Scotch-Irish in Pennsylvania were the dominant force in politics, in the economy, and in military aspects.

Their influence is still here today.

Lowe fielded a couple of questions from the audience.

When asked about what was the primary reason the Scotch-Irish came to America, Lowe noted that for one

thing immigration from Scotland to the United States had become so dramatic that by 1720 the British stopped immigration from Scotland. The Scotch-Irish on the other hand were in Ireland and the British couldn't be happier to get rid of as many Irishmen as possible.

Another thing was the religious factor since the British were with the Church of England and they didn't particularly like the Irish Presbyterians.

Another reason they came was for economic reasons. There was a collapse of their primary industries such as wool, and at the same time rents were being raised which didn't help.

When asked if the Scotch-Irish notation meant folks merely passed through Ireland before they came to America, Lowe said yes, in a way. The Scots never really went deep into Ireland. The English ceded them, the chieftains who remained loyal to England, huge amounts of land in the northern part of Ireland. The British being British it didn't take long for them to antagonize the Scots who had moved to Ireland. They were soon as upset with the British as the Irish.

But, in the end, Lowe noted that he had never heard of a Scotch-Irishman who was Irish. λ

Madisonburg Church Records Featured in State Magazine

Early Madisonburg Union Church records have been translated from German into English and appear in the Spring/Summer 2002 issue of the *Penn*sylvania Genealogical Magazine, which is published by the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania.

Dating from the 1820s through 1851, the Union Church register includes records from Madisonburg's founding Reformed minister, the Rev. Peter Fischer, and his Lutheran counterpart, the Rev. J. F. Abele.

Centre Pioneers: The HULLs

Many families carrying the Hull name could be considered amongst Centre County's pioneers, and it's not altogether clear on whether or not they are all related on this side of the ocean outside of the four lines linked in the register that follows this article.

Joseph Hull "of Richcole, a hamlett (sic) in the parish of Yetminster," Dorset, England, married Mary Andrews in Leigh, Dorset, on May 18, 1779. Joseph and Mary had 10 children, of whom three, and one grandson, came to Centre County by the mid-1800s.

First to arrive here was their eighth child, son William George Hull, born in 1795 in Leigh, Dorset. He married Amelia Milbroo in England; Amelia was born in 1787 in England, died in 1865 and is buried in the cemetery of what is now the Ross United Methodist Church in Marengo. In the U.S., William George used his names in reverse order: George William Hull.

In his petition to the Centre County court for U.S. citizenship, George William stated that he and his family had left Liverpool on April 4, 1830, and arrived in Philadelphia on June 6, 1830. They can be found in National Archives records listed among passenger arrivals at Philadelphia on June 7, 1830, aboard the ship "John Wells." Travelling with them were their two daughters, Mary Ann and Lydia. George William Hull was a leader of the Ross Methodist Episcopal Church in 1846, was deeded 106 acres in Half Moon Township by John Rowin, was listed as a farmer in both the 1850 and 1860 census for Ferguson Township, died in 1867 and is buried in the Ross Church cemetery.

George William's oldest daughter, Mary Ann Hull, was born in 1822, and married Samuel Rider in Pennsylvania. Samuel Rider was born in 1819 and is listed as a farmer in the 1850, 1860, and 1870 census for Ferguson Township. He died in 1882 and is buried in Ross Church cemetery. Mary Ann and Samuel had 9 children: Amelia, Sarah Jane, James, Barbara, John A. Collins, William Clintock, Franklin and S. Kitty.

An 1887 issue of the Tyrone Herald claimed that "Mrs. Mary Ann Rider has the best grain in Marengo valley." Mary Ann died in 1911 and is buried in the Ross Church cemetery.

George William's second daughter, Lydia Hull, was born in 1826. She married David Ray in Pennsylvania; David was born about 1821. He is listed as a collier in the 1860 census for Ferguson Township. Lydia and David had eight children: William, Angeline, Frances M., Amelia A., George W., Lydia, Emaline, and Sarah E. Lydia died in 1867 and is buried in Ross Church cemetery.

The second Hull family to imigrate to the U.S. from Yetminster parish in Dorset was Joseph and Mary (Andrews) Hull's third oldest child, Ann Hull. Ann was born in nearby Chetnole, Dorset, in 1785, and in1816 in Leigh, Dorset. Ann married Mark Jeanes. Mark was born about 1788 in Somersetshire, England.

According to Mark's 1843 Petition for U.S. citizenship, they left Liverpool, England on March 4, 1842, and arrived in New York City on May 16, 1842. Mark and Ann are listed in the 1850 Federal census for Half Moon Township, and again in the 1860 census, with Mark's occupation shown as a farmer. With them in the 1850 census is Lott Jeanes, age 8 years, born in England. In the 1860 census for Half Moon Township Lott is listed separately, as "Lott James," age 20 years, born in Pennsylvania, and married to Mary A., age 19 years. Lott is too young to be Mark's and Ann's child. Is he a nephew? No record of him has been found after the 1860 census to help answer this and other questions.

Ann died in 1867 and is buried in the Ross Church Cemetery in Marengo. Mark is listed in the 1870 census for Half Moon Township, living with Henry Dunning. Whether Mark and Henry were related is unknown. Family legend has it that Mark moved on to Clearfield County, but documentation of this has never been found, nor has any gravestone been found with his name on it.

The third Hull family to immigrate into the U.S. was that of George Crocker Hull, grandson of Joseph and Mary (Andrews) Hull, and the son of Joseph and Mary (Crocker) Hull, who also came to America as described later in this article. George Crocker Hull was born in 1818 in Leigh; in 1845 in Yetminster he was married to Mary Jeanes. Mary Jeanes was born about 1821 in Leigh, and was the niece of Mark Jeanes, who had married Ann Hull, mentioned above.

Accounts vary as to the number of children George and Mary had, from 13 to 16. Similarly, there are differing stories regarding stillborn children in England and possibly a child who died at sea. The family is said to have crossed the Atlantic in 27 days in 1849, from Liverpool to Philadelphia. Although records of this have not been found, it is consistent with records of births of their children. They settled in Stormstown, as George had been a prosperous butcher in England and was not a

Builders of Our Nation

Hulls: One Notable Colonial Military Family

(Editor's Note: According to Weygant's HULL FAMILY IN AMERICA, DES-CENDANTS OF RICHARD HULL, and records of Phyllis Hughes, HFA #390, Lt. Joseph Hull, 1750-1825, was a farmer, Revolutionary War soldier and mariner. He was the son of #182 Capt. Joseph and Eliza Clark Hull and was married, first to Sarah Bennett, the daughter of David Bennett; second to Lucy Smith (1754-1817), the widow of the elder Joseph Wheeler; and third to Freelove Nichols, the widow of Silas Nichols and mother of the Rev. Charles Nichols. His seven children included #782 Commodore Isaac Hull, captain of the USS Constitution ("Old Ironsides") in the War of 1812. Quoting from Weygant, "The following is condensed from an interesting sketch of his life given in Mrs. Puella Follett Hull Mason's book: 'Lieut. Joseph Hull, born in Derby, CT, entered the Continental Army and, in 1776, was commissioned lieutenant of the Artillery. Before the end of the year he was captured by the British when Ft. Washington, at the mouth of the Hudson, fell into their hands. He was held prisoner until 1778. In 1779, he commanded a flotilla on Long Island Sound which consisted of several old whale boats which had been fitted out with the purpose of annoying the enemy as opportunity offered. With one of the old whale boats Hull surprised, boarded and captured an armed British schooner which lay at anchor in the Sound, and forcing her defenders below, fastened the hatches, hoisted her anchors and sailed her in triumph to Derby.' After the War he was engaged, for a considerable period, in whale-fishing in the Sound in open boats, and was noted for his skill and presence of mind." The following military record is taken from HISTORY OF MARITIME CONNECTICUT DURING THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, 1775-1783, by Louis F. Middlebrook, Volume II, published by The Essex Institute, Salem, Massachusetts, 1925.

Joseph Hull of Derby, commander, (of the Armed Boat, ROVER) duly commissioned by Governor Trumbull, is recorded in the New Haven Maritime Court records as having taken a schooner commanded by one Thomas Bird, prize-master of a British vessel, en route to New York for Admiralty Court proceedings. The recaptured prize, with prisoners, was sent into New Haven for libel, April 6, 1783, and favorable decree awarded libelant June 10, 1783.

On Dec. 3, 1782, Captain Hull captured a British vessel named Bethesba, with a cargo of provisions, in Long Island Sound, and received favorable decree Jan. 2, 1783, in New Haven.

On March 29, 1783, he captured a boat with British cargo, commanded by one Barlow, and was

granted favorable judgment in New Haven, June 10, 1783.

Captain Hull was the son of Joseph Hull, 3d, born at Derby, 1750. In early life he was engaged in the West India trade and was a seaman in 1779, when he was appointed to the command of a flotilia on Long Island Sound, consisting of armed boats fitted out to annoy the enemy. On one occasion a British armed schooner was lying in the Sound, being engaged in transporting provisions from the country to New York, where the British Army was then stationed. On the evening appointed, he and his crew embarked and captured the prize, taking her to Derby for libel. Captain Hull owned and occupied what was known as the Bennett farm, a large tract on the west side of the Housatonic River. He married Sarah, daughter of Daniel Bennett of Huntington.

(Editor's Note: This Bible record is part of a compilation of the Genealogical Records Committee, Mrs. John M. Marlin, Chairman, Daughters of the American Revolution, Illinois State Society, Mrs. Paul G. Meyer, State Regent, 1971–1972. Material was contributed by the Governor Bradford Chapter, Danville. The Johnston Bible record, on pp.113–115 of the above reference, was contributed by Mrs. Jack Rewerts (Harriet Johnston), 1401 Lape St, Danville, IL. The Bible was in the possession of her brother at the time of publication. Phyllis Hughes, our HFA genealogist, states that even though this Bible is called the "Johnston Bible", the father and mother of this family appear to be Justus G. 

Hull-Peterson House in Is A New York Landmark

(Editor's Note: Material for this article was provided by Barbara C. Kager (HFA #370) of Williamsville, NY. Our thanks to her for her thoughtfulness in providing both information and a photograph of this landmark house to Phyllis Hughes, who forwarded copies to me. Although Barbara is not a direct descendant of this Warren Hull, her third great grandfather (Edmond Charles Hull, b. 1771, m. Ann Gilbert) was his brother. Information came from an information sheet prepared by the Landmark Society of the Niagara Frontier, Lancaster, NY; an article, "Group Hopes to Save Hull-Peterson House", "Group Hopes to Save Hull-Peterson House", BUFFALO NEWS, 29 November 1988; and ERIE COUNTY'S ARCHITECTURAL LEGACY, Austin M. Fox, editor, published by The Erie County Preservation Board, 1983.)

The Hull-Peterson House was built in about 1810 by Warren Hull (#611 in Weygant's HULL FAMILY IN AMERICA, The Descendants of George Hull), a Revolutionary War soldier who came to the Holland Land Purchase in 1804. It is located at 5976 Genesee Street in Lancaster, Erie County, NY, is one of the finest of only a few Federal era houses to have survived to the present day on the Niagara Frontier, and is the oldest continuously lived-in house in Erie County. Warren Hull is buried in a small family plot behind the house.

The limestone, two-story dwelling still contains an extraordinary amount of original features including doors, doorways, window treatments, wainscot and mantel-The house rises to three stories at the rear where one enters the basement level. There are six working fireplaces including the basement kitchen facility, which features a wrought iron crane and beehive bake oven. Outside, a pyramidally tiered set of stone steps leads to the front entrance. The original six-panel door and side-lights are crowned by an elliptical stone archway, or fanlight, with a keystone over the main entrance.

The house has been owned by a long succession of occupants including Alanston Eggleston, the first settler to come to the Town of Lancaster, and John and Catherine Winspear, who used the house and nearby barn to hide and feed escaped slaves moving along the Underground Railroad prior to and during the Civil War. In 1988 the current owner, Gordon L. Peterson, was attempting to give the historic structure to the Landmark Society of the Niagara Frontier for restoration and use as a museum, displaying artifacts relating to domestic life in the early 1800s.

OFFICERS: Officers are elected for a two year term and comprise the HFA Executive Board. Current officers serving until elections at the 1993 annual meeting are:



Early Missouri Marriage Records

Our HFA genealogist purchased the following from SQS Enterprises, 215 Longfellow Dr., Colorado Springs, CO 80910; they consulted a number of sources which were not linked to individuals in their print-out. Thus, HFA members wishing to verify a given record may wish to contact SQS Enterprises to determine in which original source to search. When possible, Mrs. Hughes has notations identifying certain Hulls in this list. If the individual was included in Weygant's *Hull Family in America*, the unique number appears after the name: [HFA #xxx]; if the individual is not in Weygant's book but is named in David Boatman's *Hull Family Register*, "HFR" appears with the number. If the individual in the marriage record is listed in Robert Hull Taylor's *Hulls in 1850*, that reference is given as: [1850-followed by the county in which they were residing at the time of the census]. Mrs. Hughes states that she has found descendents of the Rev. Joseph Hull in Harrison, Platte, and Worth Counties, MO, and the line of the German immigrant, Peter Thomas Hull, in Franklin and Osage Counties. But, many of these Hulls remain unidentified by her. Member help in providing identification would be most welcome.)

shown on the Muster-in Roll. Also Wilmot's account omits the five months Norman was in service before his disability discharge. Norman's sister, Harriet Frances, only six years younger than he was, told me the story of that second enlistment. She said that although the "quick consumption" persisted he made several attempts to re-enlist. Finally, on September 1, 1864, he took several young men with him. They offered to enlist also, but only if the recruiters would take Norman also. All were accepted.

The official records include the certificates of enlistment and discharge, and the company muster-rolls, usually every two months. All facts pertinent to the first enlistment are in the Disability Discharge, and I quote it.

"Private N. A. Hull of Capt. C. L. Watroll Company (D) of the 76th Regt. of New York Volunteers was enlisted by W. C. Gridley (sutler) of the 76th Regt. of N. Y. Volunteers, at Cortland, N. Y. on the 15th day of December 1861 to serve three years. He was born in Candor in the State of New York, is 18 years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, light complexion, blue eyes, brown hair and his occupation when enlisted a farmer. During the last two months said soldier has been unfit for duty sixty days."

Signed J. C. (illegible), Asst. Surgeon, U. S. A., Patent Office Hosp. and "Station: Washington, D. C. Date May 20, 1862.

"I certify that I have carefully examined the said N. A. Hull of Capt. C. L. Watross Company and find him incapable of performing the duties of a soldier because of <u>haemoptisis</u>" The signature is also illegible, but includes Surg. Pat. Office Hosp. *(bleeding from the lungs.)

The Company muster-roll bears the notation "Discharged May 24, 1862 at Indiana Hospital, Washington, D. C." The old Patent Office building was probably on Indiana Ave., hence the difference in name used.

Norman was with the Army of the Potomac, camped in tents in mid-winter during the period when the Union Army was still poorly supplied and further disorganized by the illness, with typhoid, of

General McClellan. My impression is that Norman was gravely, almost fatally, ill with pneumonia for several weeks; that one lung had collapsed; and he was not expected to live when sent home. When Ernest learned that the place of enlistment had been Cortland, in an adjoining county, he wrote: "I understand that Dad ran away to enlist with only a pocket of corn, parched the night before—but 35 miles—before the days of hitch-hiking!"

Norman's innately strong constitution and his mother's care restored his health to a point where he was accepted for service as a private in Co. H, First Regt, N. Y. Veteran Cavalry at Owego, New York, on Sept. 1, 1864. It was at a time when the north was in critical need of men, and admission standards were low. The affidavit from neighbors indicated that his health was still gravely impaired at the time of the second enlistment, but the certificate of enlistment for one year in 1864 stated "free from all bodily defects and mental infirmity and further that he was "entirely sober when enlisted and of lawful age." His height was five feet, nine inches. He had grown two inches between enlistments. The most interesting part of the document is the oath of allegiance, signed in Norman's own handwriting.

The Company Muster-roll shows Norman present, Dec. 20, 1864, Loup Creek, West Va., and the muster-out roll, dated June 8, 1865, shows that he was mustered out at Camp Piatt, West Va., "according with order No. 83 of the Adjutant General's Office. The war was over.

Wilmot tells the story of Norman's return. "My oldest brother, Norman, returned from the Civil War. He was idolized by all the members of the family. He was the pride of his father and mother. Of good habits, industrious, self-reliant, kindly by nature, his keen mind quick to perceive the right course to pursue to obtain his objectives, it is small wonder that our parents doted on their first-born. To us youngsters he was the personification of greatness. He was of good physique, tall and handsome—and a hero. . .I admired him and loved him, and until his death in 1918 he proved himself a wise counselor, a man of prudent action, sagacious advice and a loyal brother."

Some Virginia Hulls in 1800

(Editor's Note: The following information was forwarded from **Patricia Hull Fulton** (HFA #347) who came upon it while conducting research in Salt Lake City. The source is VIRGINIANS IN 1800: COUNTIES OF WEST VIRGINIA, by Steven A. Bridges, 1987 (Call No. F240 .BF4, 198F). She notes that this volume is an abstraction of 1800 Personal Property Tax Lists for thirteen Virginia counties, which later became West Virginia. Since the 1790 and (except for Accomack County) the 1800 Virginia censuses have both been lost, these tax lists are one of the best remaining sources of genealogical information. We are indebted to Patt for thinking of all of us. Researchers should use the original tax lists for additional information about their particular ancestor.)

were together in friendly converse. when Trout playfully pulled a gun from Hull's hands, pulling the muzzle towards him. The gun went off, killing Trout instantly. An inquest was held and Peter Hull was completely exonerated. The following interesting account of this deplorable accident is thus given in the Augusta County Court records.

Original Petitions and Papers Inn or Tavern. filed in County Court. 1753 - 54, Part I.

Inquisition on body of Nicholaus Grout (Trout) July 17th, 1753. Jurors do say that the said Nicholaus Trout in simplicity, and without malice, playing with Peter Hull, and seizing a gun from said Hull's hands and pulling its muzzle towards him, she accidently went off without any act or knowledge of the said Hull, and discharged herself with a ball and two great shots into ye breast of said Trout of which he dies immediately on ye spot, and quit ye gun wherewith the same was done, was entirely in fault for not keeping her bounds, but going off without force or consent. In teste: Peter Scholl, coroner, John Stevenson, Ledwick Francesco, John McMichael, James Bruster, Thomas Wats, Thomas Crawford, Patrick Millican, John Wilson, Jacob Harman, Niklas Holl (Noll), Hennery Daly, Jacob Nicholas (Records, Augusta County, VA, Volume I, page 440.)

The wife of Peter Hull was Susanna Margaret, whose surname is unknown. (ed: of course, we now know her family name was Diefen-bach.) She joined her husband in a deed, under date of May 13, 1758, wherein they sold to Charles Rush, for the sum of £22, two hundred and ten acres of the larger tract purchased of Francisco. (Records, Augusta County, VA, Volume III, page

351, original recorded Deed Book 20, page 8, Staunton, VA.) Again on June 9, 1764, Peter and Susanna parted with an additional part of the same tract, the consideraton being £60 current money.

This plantation was situated in what was known as Crab Tree Bottom, in that part of Augusta County, which later became Pendleton County, and here he owned an He died between November 28, 1775 and March 10, 1776, the date and probate of his will. In this will, which was written in German, he bequeathed to his wife Susannah Margaret the Pennsylvania Mare and other of the live stock, and one third of the estate. To each of his three eldest daughters, whose names are not given, he gives £20 and the same to the youngest daughters when they come of age, and to this eldest son Peter, all the rest of his estate. He mentions three different tracts of land, the one on Jackson River to be sold by his executors, his wife Susanna and son Peter, who were to educate the younger children and bring them up in a Christian-like manner, so long as they behave dutifully, otherwise they were to be bound out. The will was probated March 19,1776.

On August 16, 1780, there was recorded the vendue bill of Peter Hole's estate. (Records, Augusta County, VA, Volume III, page 158.) Various articles were sold to Peter Hole, Paul Summers, Neckless Harper, Dunwiddy, William George Henry Fletcher, Joseph Ham, John Feris, William McAlly, Bernard Lance, Enees Hole, Elias Painter, George Cowger, Captain Parsons, Leonard Summons, Peter Segerfeet, Mike Mannen, Widow Gregory, Roger Patton, Leasy Hole, James and Thomas Parsons, Conrad Lance and Miss Hole. The estate was settled by Peter Hole, the executor, August 16, 1780. (Records, Augusta County, VA,

gen of Ebernberg, Pfalz, died at Schallodenbach, Pfalz by July 22, 1704. His daughter, Anna Elisabeth Spiess, married Johann Martin Diefenbacher."

> (A.B. Savage (HFA #320) is descended from Peter Tomas's son George Hohl(Hull) b.15 Oct 1757 in Rockingham Co., VA, and d.1850 in Greenbrier Co., VA. Mr. Savage writes about that generation, too.)

"George Hohl (Hull) was a soldier in the Revolution, serving as an Indian spy. His residence during the war was in Augusta, Co, VA. He married, first, Hannah Keister, whose father, Frederic was a lst Lt. in the VA troops and commanded a band of Indian spies. George married, second, Hannah Dyer, whose father Roger was murdered by Indians in 1758 at Fort Seybert, VA."

> (The following story of Peter Thomas Hull is from an undated manuscript, author unknown, entitled "Hull". Which is now housed at The Hist. Soc. of PA in Philadelphia as a part of their manuscript file. Only minor editorial changes have been made; corrections and footnote references from the manuscript have been inserted parenthetically at the appropriate location.)

PETER HOLL, a native of Germany, came to Pennsylvania on the ship "Frances and Ann", Thomas Coatman (Coatam), Master, sailing from Rotterdam and landing in Philadelphia in May, 1741. On the 30th of that month he with his fellow passengers took the Oath of Allegiance to the King of Great Britain and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. (Pennsylvania Archives, Second Series, Volume page 207.)

He did not linger long in Pennsylvania, for some time prior to July

2, 1752, he with others of his friends and neighbors had found his way down the Shenandoah Valley, into what was then known as Augusta County, Virginia.

In 1745, all that portion of the colony of Virginia which lay west of the Blue Ridge Mountains, was erected into a County named Augusta. The bounds of the new county were North by Fairfax's Northern Neck Grant and boundaries of Maryland and Pennsylvania to the Westward of Fairfax, on the East by Blue Ridge Mountains, on South by the Carolina line, West its territory untraced all soil held by Britain without limit. For 12 years Augusta County was the only one within that district. From that time other counties were erected. original constitution embraced Its all Virginia West of Blue Ridge (excepting Northern Neck Grant. whose Southern boundary was in the present county of Shenandoah, and Western thru the counties of Hardy, Hampshire, and Northward to Potomac) the whole of present state of Virginia; a portion of Western Pennsylvania, including Pittsburg, which was the seat of County Court, and the lands on the waters of the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers.

On July 2, 1752, Christophel Francisco, by Stephel Francisco, his son and attorney, sold to Peter Hull, a tract of 230 acres being part of 5000 acres which was on the Shenandoah River, bounded by a corner of Nicholas Trout's line. Part of this tract was delivered to Nicholas Trout, January 3, 1753. (Records of Augusta County, Virginia, Volume III, page 305. Original recorded in Deed Book 4, page 406, Staunton, Virginia.)

Nicholas Trout was a friend and neighbor of Peter Hull. Not long after the above property had been transferred to him, the two men

The abstract is from a compilation "Ulster County, NY will abstracts, Liber C". Phyllis Hughes provided the following note to me, which is quoted in its entirety for the information and possible help of the membership. "There were three Nathaniel Hulls who lived in Ulster County, NY, at approximately the same time: (1) Weygant's #164 [George Hull line] Nathaniel Hull, Sr. who married Abigail Platt; (2) Weygant's #408 [George Hull line] Nathaniel Hull, Jr. who married Susanna O'Harra and who was a son of the first Nathaniel; and (3) an unidentified Nathaniel Hull who married Sarah — and left the will abstracted below. The first two Nathaniel Hulls (Sr. and Jr.) probably served in the Revolutionary War and/or contributed to the war effort in some respect. Did the third Nathaniel Hull (the subject of this will) also serve in the Revolutionary War? Can anyone identify this man/provide details of his parentage?")

Exts: said wife and friends Nehemiah L. Smith and Samuel Carpenter. Wits: Benjamin Ely, Barnabas Benton and Lylo Reeder, of Marlborough, spinster. Pro: 5 July 1803. pp 412-414.

from Rotterdam by way of St. Christopher, Leeward Islands, in the ship 'Frances and Ann', Thomas Coatam, master.

"He married his second wife, Susannah Margaretha Diefenbach, in the Trinity Lutheran Church at Lancaster, PA, (Nov. 25, 1750, according to church records of Trinity Church) where he had been a miller on the Susquehanna River. They went to Rockingham County, VA, in 1752, and Peter Tomas died in 1776 in Crabbottom, Highland Co., VA. Their children included Peter, who married Barbara Keith; Adam, who married Esther Keister; William; George, who married Hannah Keister; Henry; Mary Hull, who married Abraham Burner; Margaret Hull, who married Peter Zickafoose; David; John; and two other girls.

"Heinrich Diefenbach was born in the Pfalz in 1633. He died Jan. 25, 1706 at Schmittweiler, Pfalz. His son, Johann Martin Diefenbach, born Aug. 15, 1679 at Schmittweiler, married Anna Elisabeth Spiess on July 22, 1704 at Callbach, Pfalz, and they lived in Meisenheim. Their daughter, Susannah Margaretha Diefenbach, born in Meisenheim was to be the second wife of Peter Tomas Hohl. Johann Martin Diefenbacher came to Philadelphia, PA, October 15, 1737 from Amsterdam by way of Cowes, Isle of Wight, in the ship 'Townsend', Thomas Thompson, master, with 231 immigrants from the Pfalz. They went to Lancaster, PA.

(Editor's Note: In a letter dated 23 July 1987 to the Hull Family Association, Albert B. Savage (HFA #320) provided important information concerning the German origins of Peter Tomas, which apparently has never been published. Mr. Savage's letter is quoted as a part of these notes for the information of the entire membership and especially those members directly descended from Peter Tomas Hohl/Hull.)

"The family originated in the Rhineland Palatinate, known in German as the Pfalz. The only permanent evidence of the family is a stone in the choir of St. Stephanskirche parish church, about ten miles from Worms, inscribed in German: 'Here lies or rests Peter Thomas Hohl, pastor of the Lutheran church, born May 3, 1681, died July 15, 1770, and his wife Anastasia Maria von Ebrmark, born Sept. 9, 1690, died March 23, 1763. The stone is said to have been placed by American relatives. He was a brother of Johannes Hohl, the earliest ancestor of record. Earlier records were destroyed by the French.

"Johannes Hohl was born about 1695 and died about 1746. He married Anna Christine ____. Lutheran records show that in 1730 he had a wife, two sons, Johann Tobias and Peter Tomas, and an unnamed daughter. Records show his wife a widow Jan. 6, 1747. In 1748 the family went with Johann Tobias Hohl from Bad Kreuznach to Meisenheim am Glan, and (descendants are) still living there.

"Bad Kreuznach was a fortified city on the Nahe River, a left bank tributary of the Rhine, and a radium spa, the 'city of wine and roses'.

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Johannes Hohl was a burger (citizen) and a 'commissariat-rider'. duty was to ride into the countryside to find supplies for the city in time of trouble.

"Peter Tomas Hohl, son of and Johannes Hohl was born in Bad Kreuznach, Pfalz, in 1716. His first wife, name unknown, died in the Pfalz. They had at least one son. He perhaps met his future second wife in nearby Meisenheim am Glan, a right bank tributary of the Nahe, the name meaning 'home of the titmouse', a bird. He arrived in Philadelphia, PA, May 30, 1741,

Using Land Records in Genealogical Research

This article is an excerpt from the handout for a Land Records Workshop to be given at our annual HFA meeting in Buffalo, New York, in September. The actual handout will be eleven pages and much more detailed. It will include (1) a glossary for land record terms, (2) how to obtain and abstract land records, and (3) references for land records in specific states and the National Archives. Below are some of the highlights of useful information abstracted from this land records handout.

Land records reveal kinships, time periods, and localities. They put ancestors in a specific place at a specific time.



Tobias Sechler Hull Jr. and Emma Virginia Hanna Hull Family Group Record

Tobias Sechler Hull Jr.³ (Tobias Sechler Sr.², Thomas¹) was born 03 February 1825. He was the son of Tobias Sechler Hull Sr. and Salllie (probably Sarah) Decker. Tobias was a teacher, farmer, and also possibly a circuitriding preacher. He married (1) Nancy Hanna, the daughter of John Hanna. She was born 16 March 1821 and died 04 October 1884. He married (2) Emma Virginia Hanna, the daughter of Annie Davis and Thomas Hanna, who was killed in the Civil War. Emma, a niece of Tobias' first wife, Nancy, was born 08 March 1859 in Pennsylvania, and died 13 December 1927. Tobias died 12 March 1892 and was buried in Laurel Hill Furnace Cemetery, St. Clair Township, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. Emma was buried in East Union Cemetery, Buffington Township, Indiana County, Pennsylvania.

Children of Tobias Sechler Hull Jr. and Emma Virginia Hanna:

- i. Gertrude Hanna, 4, NOTE 1 born ca. 1878; married P. C. Richards.
- ii. Jennie Jelma Hull, ^{4, NOTE 2} born 15 March 1885; died 1940; married Gomer Smith, 1912.
- iii. Thomas Neal Hull, ^{4, NOTE 2} born 08 June 1887; married Laura [—?—].
- iv. Pearlie A. Hull,^{4, NOTE 3} born ca. 1890, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania; died 05 August 1893, Buffington Township, Indiana County, Pennsylvania; buried Laurel Hill Furnace Cemetery, St. Clair Township, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania; unmarried.
- v. Tobias Elbert (aka "Bert") Hull, born 16 September 1892; died October 1971, Hawthorne, Westchester County, New York; married Eva B. [—?—].

Notes & Sources:

No documentation exists for Tobias' middle name; it may have been spelled Seckler.

NOTE 1: Gertrude, the illegitimate daughter of a Mr. McWherter and Emma V. Hanna, was taken in after Emma's marriage to Tobias Hull and raised as a Hull.

NOTE 2: Birthdates for Jennie, Thomas, and Tobias Elbert Hull were reckoned from the Appointment of Guardian record from the Westmoreland County, PA Courthouse, dated February 1899.

NOTE 3: Pearl Hull mentioned as a child who died at age 3 or 4 in letter from Muriel Hostetler (daughter of Jennie Jelma Hull); also found a death record on Treasures of the Past from Indiana County listing "A. Pearl Hull" who died on 05 Aug 1893 in Buffington Twp, Indiana County, PA, daughter of Tobias and Emma V. Hull, listing age of 3 years; place of birth as Westmoreland Co.; death attributed to whooping cough of 2 weeks duration and listing above cemetery and burial date.

In Muriel Hostetler's letter, she says her mother's given name was Zelma Jane Hull, but the name on the Appointment of Guardianship clearly says Jennie Jelma Hull. Also in Muriel's letter, she said that Tobias' first wife, Nancy, was so ill that he hired young Emma Hanna as his housekeeper.

After Tobias' death, Gertrude was old enough to do house work so she helped contribute to the family income. Emma kept Tom and Bert, but Jennie went to live with "the Grahams" (her grandparents??). (Muriel Hostetler letter)

When Jennie was 12, she was invited to live with a Rebecca Graham who was married to William Sides; they were in their 60s and had four grown children; they raised her and educated her to be a teacher. (Muriel Hostetler letter)

White with the Sides family, Jennie attended a rural Presbyterian church where she met a man named Gomer J. Smith, whom she later married in 1912. (Muriel Hostetler letter)

Gomer J. Smith (1885-1955) and Jennie Hull (1887-1940). (Muriel Hostetler letter)

Tobias appeared in the 1850 Federal Census, Fairfield Township, Westmoreland County, PA with his father's family, Tobias Jr. was age 24 and his occupation was "Teacher."

Tobias listed alone on the 1870 Federal Census, St. Clair Township, Westmoreland County, PA, living in same household as John Whistler, Tobias' age listed as 45 and occupation was "farmer."

1880 St. Clair Township, Westmoreland County, PA Census lists, in dwelling 35/36, Tobias Hull, Jr. (age 55, head, farming), Nancy (age 57, wife, with some ailment), Emma Hanna (age 21, niece, keeps house), and Gertrude Hanna (age 2, niece).

1900 Fairfield Township, Westmoreland County, PA Census (ED 81) lists Emma V. Hull, age 41, widowed, b. Mar 1859, 5 children, 4 living, and a housekeeper along with son, Tobias E. Hull, age 7, b. Sep 1892, keeping house for Scott Cameron.

Bert T. Hull, age 27, appeared in 1920 census (place not noted), with wife Eva B., age 24. The record is extremely faded and very difficult to read.

Bert T. Hull, age 37, appeared in 1930 Westchester County, NY census with wife, Eva B., age 34. Age at first marriage was 25 and 22 respectively. Bert's occupation listed as importer.

World War I draft registration card found on ancestry.com for Thomas Neal Hull, b. 08 Jun 1888 in New Florence, PA; registered for the draft in Curry County, Oregon.

SSDI record for an Elbert Hull, born on 16 Sep 1892 and died Oct 1971 in Hawthorne, Westchester Co, NY; SSN 115-14-5512.

Nancy Hanna listed in 1850 Federal Census, Fairfield Township, Westmoreland County, PA, living with father; last name spelled Hannah; Nancy is 28 years old; her father, John, is 68; brother Thomas 19, sisters Eliza 17, and Sarah 14.

Nancy Hanna listed in 1860 Federal Census, Fairfield Township, Westmoreland County, PA; living with father; last name spelled Hanah; Nancy is 34 years old; her father, John, is 82.

Documents held: Appointment of Guardian, Letters of Admin for Tobias, Jr., Death Record for Pearlie Hull, Transcriptions of Laurel Hill Furnace and West Fairfield Cemeteries.

Sophia "Sophie" Hull (1799–1866) married Eber Dudley Howe in June of 1822, after a six-year courtship. Both were children of New England Revolutionary War veterans, Sophia's father being Warren Hull, of the famed Hull House in Lancaster, Erie County, New York. Eber Howe also served in the War of 1812, first as a cook to the regimental and staff officers and later as an assistant to his father, a surgeon who was in charge of the British prisoners hospital in Buffalo, Erie County, New York.

Eber Howe was a newspaperman who later moved to Cleveland, Ohio, where he started the Cleveland Herald, with no initial subscribers. In 1822, he started the Painesville Telegraph in Lake County, Ohio, as well as two other later newspapers, and he lived long enough to be culogized as a "pioneer printer." When he ended his publishing career, he became a manufacturer and merchandiser of woolen goods, in partnership with his son-in-law, Franklin Rogers, the husband of his daughter Minerva Howe.

The Howes were also important political figures in Ohio, and when Eber Howe wrote about his wife in his autobiography after her death in 1866, he claimed forty-three years of "connubial felicity" and praised his wife's political activism. Her first sympathies were for the Greeks in their struggle for independence in 1825–26. Later Sophia Hull Howe was among the first to join the anti-slavery movement. The Howes kept a station on what the slaveholders called "the underground railroad," and they worked equally to assist the fugitives from bondage.

Sophia Hull Howe is identified as HFAm #1,534, daughter of Warren Hull and Polly Gillett.

Information on Some of the Descendants of Warren Hull and Polly (Gillette) Hull

This group of related Hulls, Charles Crosby, James Pearson, and Ralph Erskine Hull, had their own printing and publishing firm known as Hull & Brother, on Third Street, between Market and Jefferson, in Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky. They printed impartially the True Catholic and the Free Mason. In 1848 they were publishing the Presbyterian Herald, edited by the Rev. William W. Hill, from a new location at 43 Third Street, between Main and Water. Gustavus A. Hull had then joined the firm and was listed as a printer.

In 1852, it was Hull & Brother who printed Ben Casseday's History of Louisville. In 1854 the firm had expanded its list of publications to include, in addition to the Presbyterian Herald, the weekly Western Oriental and Chinese Advocate, and the South-Western School Journal. One of their 1855 printing jobs was the anonymous booklet Testimony as to the Origin of the Riots in the City of Louisville....

A few years later, Charles and Gustavus Hull were the proprietors, with other family members in the office or shop, and the firm had moved once again to 497 Main Street.

These Hulls are from the George Hull, immigrant, line and are the sons of *HFAm* #1529, James Hull and Betsey Crosby, who is the son of Warren Hull and Polly Gillett. Sources: *The Filson Club History Quarterly*, Vol. XL, 1966, pp. 321, 322, 331.

Gustavus Adolphus Hull (1823–1891), son of James Hull and Betsy Crosby, married (1) Harriet Post and (2) Salina "Sallie" Peaceley. He had four children. He served in the Civil War as a military storekeeper and was commissioned a Captain in 1866 and retained in the same department until 1891 when he died. He lived in Jefferson County, Kentucky, Clark County, Indiana, and Morgan County, Illinois.

Clara Peaceley Hull (1853 or 1855–1939) was a painter. She was a member of the San Francisco Art Association, where she lived from 1880 through at least 1900. In the 1910–1930 census she is found in Los Angeles, California. Part of that time she was living with her sister Nora Creina Hull. Apparently neither sister ever married.

One source states that Clara P. Hull was born in Indiana in 1855 and another source says she was born in Kentucky.

Clara P. Hull died March 23, 1939 in Los Angeles, California. She is identified as *HFAm* #9,425, George Hull, immigrant, line. She was the daughter of the above Gustavus Adolphus Hull, *HFAm* #3815-G.

Hull House is purported to be the oldest substantial stone dwelling in Eric County.

In 1992, it was listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The text below is a passage from "The Warren and Polly Hull House Historic Structure Report" by John H. Conlin, 1998

In order to induce settlers to come into western New York an anonymous pamphlet called "The Genesee Country" was published in Maryland touting the fertile lands and opportunities for settlement of the whole area west of the Genesee.

Warren Hull and his family were at that time already in the Genesee Country, in Livingston County. However Joseph Ellicott mounted an advertising campaign in 1803 and 1804, investing company money in newspaper ads, handbills and maps, promoting settlement in the company's lands. According to Wykoff "Ellicott's most ambitious single advertising effort occurred in the fall of 1803. In September, Ellicott employed a Canandaigua printer to produce six hundred handbills."

Perhaps Warren Hull responded to this campaign, for although the majority of the first settlers into this area were "Yankees," the statistics indicate that they were already settled In New York State, west of the Mohawk Valley. Only a small percentage of settlers before 1808 came directly from New England.



The Children of Warren and Polly (Gillette) Hull

Polly Hull, who married Daniel Lewis, lived in the family home after the death of Warren and Polly Hull; she had six children and had been widowed in 1830.

Rebecca Hull, above, married a man named William Tyler, who bought land adjoining the Hull property. Her other husbands were Elihu Mighills, and Daniel Smalley.

James Hull married Betsy Crosby, and they settled in the Fredonia, Chautauqua County, New York area with their five children where he was a newspaper publisher. James Hull, (1789–1867), the newspaper publisher, was of also Cleveland & Cuyahoga Counties, Ohio and Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky.

Anna Hull married William H. Godfrey, had one child and was widowed.

Maria Hull married (1) Ezra Sheldon, whose family owned land east of the Hull property. She married (2) a Mr. Walling.

Edmund Hull married Eliza Garrett, had six children, and was a lawyer who represented Erie County as a legislator in Albany. He also assisted his brother, James Hull, in editing the *Chautauqua Gazette*, the first paper printed in the county. He married a second time to Aravilla/Ervilla/Arvilla Churchill.

Justus G. Hull, a brick maker, married Harriet Bivens,

had eight children, lived in Buffalo, and acquired land in Knox County, Illinois in 1841. He went to Grant County, Wisconsin in 1846, but is found in Knox County, Illinois in the 1850 census. He also lived in Fulton County, Illinois.

Sophia Hull married Eber Howe, a printer/publisher; they moved to Ohio where they demonstrated their commitment to the abolitionist movement.

Miranda Hull married her sister Vilera's widower, William Conley, after Vilera's death in 1835; she raised her own son and Vilera's two children on property across the road from the Hull house.


Vilera Hull is buried in the family cemetery with her parents. She married William R./H. Conley.

Minerva Hull died at age 26, unmarried and childless.

Aurilla Hull married twice, first to Mr. Reid, and had seven children in all. Aurilla, with her second husband, Robert Upton Wheelock, purchased the Hull house from her sister, Polly, in 1849. Several Wheelock family members are buried in the Hull Family Cemetery.

Several of the Hull children lived and died in the Lancaster area. However, their offspring were part of the westward movement, and many of them settled in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Wisconsin.

In 1944 the council bought a 115-acre hay farm in Hilltown, Bucks County, he wrote, and converted it into an airfield, from which the group's pilots for decades have flown their gliders.

Typically, propeller-driven planes tow gliders to a height where the towline is released and the gliders soar on their own.

But early on, he wrote, "launching was by towing behind a car with a rope. Low-speed ground tows were used to teach balancing the aircraft.

"...With this skill mastered, the student was towed a few feet above the ground, and then progressed to higher and higher tows."

One of his memorable trips, his son said, was when "he flew 10,000 feet above the top of Pike's Peak" in Colorado, using an oxygen mask.

Born in Scranton, Mr. Hull graduated from Phillips Exeter Academy in 1934 and earned a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering at Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1938.

Mr. Hull was exempted from military service

during World War II, his son said, because he was working on a secret military program.

A 2011 publication of the Foundation for Free Enterprise Education stated that Mr. Hull had been a board member of that agency for more than 30 years. The foundation sponsors business education programs.

He was a board member of Goodwill Industries and a member of the Soaring Society of America, the Churchville Rotary Club, and the Heritage Conservancy, among other organizations. An Eagle Scout, he earned the Boy Scouts' Silver Beaver Award.

Besides his son Stephen, Mr. Hull is survived by another son, Arthur; daughters Martha Halvonik and Rebecca Hull; two grandchildren; three greatgrandchildren; and two step-grandchildren. His wife, Margaret, died in 2008.

A memorial service was held Sunday, March 4, at the North and Southampton Reformed Church, 1380 Bristol Rd., Churchville, Pennsylvania.



Note: COL Robert L. Hull (HFA member #0184) has been appointed by our President Dan Hull to the office of Comptroller which Lewis W. Hull had faithfully fulfilled for many years.

The last leg of the Texas Trail, a cattle drive from Texas to the Union Pacific Railroad loading chutes in Ogallala, crossed through Perkins County in those early days. The final great drive occurred in the Spring of 1886, 39 which then opened the area for more farming land in this sparsely

settled country. Despite having been described by Stephen Long as "The Great American Desert," this semi-arid region possessed grassland soil that was a deep, dark loam, quite fertile, and well suited for growing crops, such as corn, wheat, and, in the earliest days, many vegetables for the homesteaders'

family tables. In the severe drought years, however, poor crops prevailed and prairie fires remained a constant threat in the long, hot, dusty summers.

The South Platte River flows through Keith County, which lies just above the northern border of Perkins County.

Ogallala, not depicted on this map, lies on the river twenty miles to the north of Grant, in Keith County.

The Texas Cattle Trail passed through Perkins County just east of Madrid.

The Hull homestead was about five miles southwest of Grant.

Many of the earliest settlers built one-, two-, or three-room "soddies"—sod houses with walls cut like bricks from the prairie ground. The more prosperous built small frame houses with lumber that had to be shipped in by railroad, for there were no trees with which to build an entire house. Only an occasional cottonwood tree served as a pole for support in the soddies.

With no running water in the county, deep wells had to be dug or water had to be hauled by wagon from a few natural springs. My grandmother used to remark, somewhat proudly, "We have not one bridge in Perkins County!"

The Platte River in Keith County was twenty miles to the north; the Hulls first obtained their water from this distant river. The general description of the Platte, among the early settlers, was "Too thick to drink; too thin to plow—a mile wide and an inch deep." It ran through country as flat as its French name implied. To the south these plains extended for miles and miles, with only an occasional sand hill to interrupt the level landscape.

In 1881 Milton Hull applied for a pension for his Civil War service and, in his affidavit, he listed that he was incapacitated for manual labor because of:

- a gunshot wound to the calf of his right leg
- disease of the stomach and bowels
- angina pectoralis [sic] with palpitation of the heart and nervous prostration.¹¹

Clinton P. Logan certified and signed Milton's invalid [disability] pension declaration.¹¹ The pension depositions revealed that most of the farm work had been done by Milton's sons, because of Milton's disabilities due to his injury

and illnesses while in the war. At one point, he testified that he weighed only 112 pounds and the normal weight for his five-foot, eight-inch frame was 140 pounds.

In June of 1889, my grandmother, Emma L. Hull, married Clinton P. Logan, ³¹ who was the second lawyer to act as Grant's village attorney and who later served as the county attorney. [†] He was a leader of the Populist political party, ^{32,39} as was his father-in-law, Milton Hull, who became one of the first Perkins County Judges. ^{29,32,39} By this time, the Hulls had vacated their homestead land and were now living in Grant. Milton and Emily's oldest son,

During the Civil War years, it is obvious that my great grandmother, Emily Riley Hull, also went back to Bureau County, Illinois, to live near her parents, as her daughter, Mary Ellen, was born there. Emily wrote a ghost story, which I now have in my possession, about being in Illinois at the time of the Civil War.

Post-Civil War Years in Illinois and Nebraska

After the Civil War, the Hulls continued to live in Bureau County, Illinois, where they had two more daughters: my grandmother Emma Loretta, in 1871, and Grace Christine, in 1877. ^{26,27}

In 1879 the Hulls migrated to Hamilton County, Nebraska, where Milton worked as a carpenter. Here they lived for the next six years, until 1885, 10,26,27 when they removed to Keith County in western Nebraskawhich was to become Perkins County in 1887.28 Once again they moved westward to take advantage of unoccupied homestead land30 in a treeless country, where there was still some evidence of occasional Indians inhabiting these sagebrush plains, 39 Emily Riley Hull wrote a descriptive account of an Indian Scare that they experienced while living in a tent on their western Nebraska homestead land in June of 1885.5

My grandmother, Emma Hull, then only fourteen years old, later wrote about this same experience:

My people came out here in 1885 to file on their land. They went back to Aurora [Nebraska] to spend the winter. I was going to school there. Early in the spring they returned to Perkins County to make their improvements. After school was out, I came on the train to Ogallala [Nebraska]. My people were camped in Ogallala having gone there because of the Indian scare. I never will forget the first night. I could hear the Indians crossing the bridge all night. After two weeks we started back to our home. I think we passed only one house from Ogallala out to our claim and that belonged to some old friends of ours from Illinois.9

In 1885 Milton Hull wrote a regular newspaper column for the Keith County News in Ogallala, entitled "Homesteader's Department." His writings were quite political and even described by some as "radical," with a "biting pen." He discussed the Farmer's Convention, nominees for county offices, and the general interests of "an intelligent class of farmers for the purpose of taxing the railroad land, securing school land for the homesteaders, and opposing court house bonds." 29

Two years later people were demanding local government and, on November 8, 1887, a general election was held. The vote favored that the southern area, where the Hulls were living, would separate from Keith County and form a new county called Perkins, named for Charles E. Perkins, the President of the C.B.&Q. railroad. The village of Grant, named in honor of Ulysses S. Grant, the Union Civil War Commander-in-Chief and later President of the United States, became the new county seat.

Events in the Lives of the Milton Bloise Hull Family 1828–1870 Excerpts from a Biography of Milton Bloise Hull and Emily Riley Hull

Milton Bloise Hull was a great grandson of the above Samuel Hull and Martha Glover Hull

Historical background material has been italicized.

Ohio and Illinois Years

01 November 1828: Milton Bloise Hull was born to John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull, in Muskingum County. Ohio. 35 His Civil War discharge papers11 state that he was born near Zanesville, Muskingum County, which borders Licking County on the east. The family, however, is thought to have been living in Licking County at the time of Milton's birth. 34,35,36,37 Milton B. Hull, age two, appeared on the 1830 Bowling Green Township, Licking County, Ohio census with his parents John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull. 35,38 1830: 1840: Milton B. Hull, age twelve, appeared on the 1840 Fulton County, Illinois U.S. census with his parents John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull. 12 1850: Milton B. Hull, age twenty-two, appeared on the 1850 Cass Township, Fulton County, Illinois U.S. census with his parents John G. Hull and Mary T. Wright Hull. 13 Emily Riley, age thirteen, appeared on the 1850 Bureau County, Illinois U.S. census with her parents Paul 1850: Riley/Ryland and Elizabeth Loughrey Riley. 14,16,41 1854: Senator Stephen A. Douglas of Illinois pushed through Congress the Kansas-Nebraska Act, which established two new territories—a measure proposed to settle the slavery question, by letting the territorial legislatures decide whether these areas should allow slavery. This act made it legally possible for slavery to exist in these territories where it formerly had been barred. Milton B. Hull and Emily Riley married in Neponset, Bureau County, Illinois. 17 16 August 1855: 1856 & 1858: Two children, Thomas W. and Ida Josephine "Phene." were born, both in Bureau County. 19 Ca. 1859: Milton and Emily Hull removed to Allen County, Kansas Territory, with Milton's parents John and Mary Wright Hull. 16,19,22 Both opponents and supporters of slavery had poured into Kansas, clashing in armed conflicts. Kansas was known during this period as "bleeding Kansas." 1860: Milton and Emily Hull, with two children, appeared on the census in the Territory of Kansas, Allen County, in the same household as Milton's parents, John G. and Mary Wright Hull. Also in this same household were Milton's two sisters, Minerva Ruth, Christina Jane, and a nephew, Hiram M. Hull. The sisters were listed as "Ladies." 19 August 1860: Son William Hull was born in Allen County, Kansas. 19 06 November 1860: Abraham Lincoln was elected President. Civil War Years Confederate troops attacked Fort Sumter, in Charleston Harbor, South Carolina. Three days later 12 April 1861: President Lincoln issued a call for troops. 20 May 1862: Passage of the Homestead Act, which was a program of public land grants to small farmers. Milton B. Hull went back to Bureau County, Illinois to enlist in the Civil War, 10,11 while his father John G. 14 August 1862: Hull remained in Allen County, Kansas, to serve in the Civil War in that state. 10 Milton B. Hull served as a Private in Company H, 93rd Regiment, Illinois Volunteers. Company H. was September-October 1862: called the "Bureau Co. Tigers," stationed at Camp Douglass, Chicago, Illinois. Here Hull endured a severe attack of stomach and bowel trouble.11 Hull's regiment was sent to Memphis, Tennessee. 11 November 1862: Hull's regiment went on the Holly Springs March, but Hull was left at camp because of illness.11 December 1862: Hull rejoined his regiment near Oxford, Mississippi. 11 Last of December 1862: President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, to free the slaves. 01 January 1863: Hull's regiment went south with General Grant on the Yazoo Expedition. 11 13 March 1863:

May-June 1863: Hull was absent, having been wounded in the leg while supporting a battery in action in the Rifle Pits near

Vicksburg.11

18 June 1863: Hull was sent home to Bureau County, Illinois, on furlough for twenty days. 11 It is believed that my great

aunt, Mary Ellen "Ella" Hull, was conceived during that furlough, for she was born 05 March 1864.

01 August 1863: Hull was promoted to Corporal. 11

07 June 1864: A Board of Examiners Report¹¹ was held. Hull was given an average grade of 2:

show three The court records separate lawsuits involving Samuel involving John McDaniel. Robinson, and George Benjamin Arnold from 1791 to 1799 in Harrison County. On September 19, 1796, Samuel was fined for not serving on a petit jury, and on January 23, 1797, it was ordered that he be exempted from the payment of county and parish levies.

On August 9, 1799 Samuel Hull sold 75 and 1/4 acres of land for £100 to his son, William, being the land that he and Martha were then living on. Six days later on August 15, Samuel leased from his son William, the improvements, houses, and all other buildings on this same land for one bushel of India corn.

This agreement was to take place during the natural life of Martha, his wife, and they were to have peaceable possession of these properties.⁴⁴


In 1800 five of the Hull sons: Uriah, Charles, James, John, and George appeared on the Harrison County tax list. ⁴⁷ Samuel's name did not appear on this same list, indicating that he now had divested himself of all of his property, having deeded it to his sons, except for the lease of his home plantation from his son. On July 20, 1807, for £100, Samuel deeded back to his son, William, the same tract of land that William had heretofore conveyed by lease to Samuel Hull. ⁴⁴

This 1807 land transaction signaled that a change was about to take place in the Hull family, for in this same year or soon after, Samuel and Martha Glover Hull, with five of their sons, John, Uriah, Charles, William, George, and several daughters, migrated west to

Licking (then Fairfield) County, Ohio, where they first settled in Franklin and Hopewell Townships. 2,4,8,18,23,24,34,35,37,36,43

The Hull family may not all have traveled to Ohio together, but most probably they journeyed to the new state of Ohio on the same trail, which by 1811, was known as the great National Pike and later as the Cumberland or National Road. The reason for this move has not been definitely established, but losing a son in Harrison County, and the need for more farming land for the remaining sons, probably contributed to this westward migration.

The opening of the Ohio lands for settlement and an established route for travel, even if primitive at this time, were convenient events in history that helped to relieve the economic plight of the Harrison County, West Virginia Hulls and their growing families....

The Great Fire of 1900

A Disastrous Start to the 20th Century in Ottawa

On Thursday, April 26, 1900, catastrophe and destruction struck Ottawa's main industrial area. It started as a small house fire in Hull, but quickly became an inferno that covered the region. Thirty mile per hour winds carried the fire across the Ottawa River by the wooden bridge at Chaudière Falls, all the way to Dow's Lake. Smoke from the fire was visible as far away as Kingston, Ont.

And the next day's headlines read: "Large portion of Ottawa destroyed" and "Hull to all intents wiped out."

"Just after 10 a.m.,...a spark flew out of the chimney of (a)...wood-frame house in Hull and ignited a fire...The fire grew out of control and by noon had consumed most of downtown Hull...Embers borne by strong northerly winds ignited lumber yards on the Ontario shore...at 12:18 p.m. the alarm was sounded in Ottawa. At 3 p.m., buglers were sent...to call out the militia...explosions filled the air, as dynamite and industrial chemicals blew up. A power plant was burned, cutting electricity to whole sections of the city. Streetlights were off for five nights. Thousands of people filled the streets, anxious for news...By the time the fire burned itself out around midnight, Ottawa's industrial heart was gone."

Though over 14,000 were left homeless, amazingly, only seven people died in the fire. (More people died of disease in the densely packed, unsanitary tent cities where the homeless were forced to live afterwards.)

The scale of the fire was enormous. Over 3,000 homes were destroyed. Property loss was estimated to be greater than \$100,000,000. The Canadian Pacific Union Station and freight sheds on Lebreton Flats were completely destroyed (valued at \$40,000), while the value of Canadian Pacific freight lost was estimated at \$30,000.

"Lumber King" J.R. Booth lost his mansion and 50 million board feet of lumber. The resulting shortage of lumber forced Canada Atlantic Railway car shops in Ottawa East to cease building new freight cars temporarily.

And the calamity made news around the world. Donations and expressions of sympathy poured into Ottawa from as far away as Chile.

"Even before the flames had died out, relief work had started...homeless people were accommodated at the Exhibition Grounds until the middle of June...a committee of women presided over by Lady Minto...wife of the governor general, distributed food and clothing daily to 3,000 people, until May 19.

"Officials feared that many of the homeless would move away, depriving Ottawa of valuable manpower. Swift compensation was arranged to prevent that: nearly \$1 million was paid out, much of it in August."

The rebuilding of Ottawa began immediately, resulting in 750 new buildings by the end of the year.





Update on HFA Database

In our last report in the *HFA Newsletter* we stated that as of September 20, 2006, we had a grand total of **18,755** family group sheets in the HFA database, after thirteen years of input. We are using the FileMaker Pro database program, which allows us to conduct searches for people in about twenty-one different fields.

As of January 11, 2007, we are happy to report a new grand total of 18,891 family group sheets in the HFA database.

We are still busy inputting Hull marriages and other data from all states into the database. These have been gleaned from many different sources and are all in the holdings of the HFA Genealogist. Our last count for Hull marriages was approximately 6499 marriages in the marriage field for the head of the family and 3435 marriages for the children in these families, but which dates have not yet all been entered.

Our new totals are:

- 6536 marriages in the marriage field for the head of the family
- 3490 marriages for the children in these families
- We have now completed entering the marriage records for 43 states.

The sources for the database entries are from (1) the material sent to me from our HFA members, which is periodically listed in each *HFA Newsletter*, and (2) the material which I personally have researched, collected, and analyzed from libraries and archives throughout the entire country.

I now have over 425 2-inch and 3-inch wide notebooks, which hold these Hull/Holl/Hohl/Hole pages, all encased in acid-free plastic sheets. This genealogical material, along with the Hull lineages submitted by our HFA members, form the basis for most of our *HFA Journal* articles.

A special thanks goes to Ruth S. Ratliff, of Boulder, Colorado, who assists me in typing these records into the database. Also I extend my grateful thanks to the Hull Family Association, who from the beginning has contributed yearly funding to support this project.

Family Group Sheets

We are able to send out by e-mail as many as three Hull/Holl/Hohl family group sheets at a time to our members. I just returned from a 500-mile trip today and have attached photos of the David R. Hull, Edward S. Hull, and Isabella C. Hull gravestones. All three stones are located in Perkinsville Cemetery, approximately eight miles east of Louisville, Winston County, Mississippi, on Highway 14. I had to take some back roads off of Highway 14. The GPS Coordinates for the cemetery are:

I've managed to accumulate some more information on the David Reed Hull line and would welcome an update article in the HFA Journal. 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




Photo of David R. Hull Grave BORN April 21, 1812 DIED April 28, 1889

Update on HFA Database

In our last report in the *HFA Newsletter* we stated that as of September 20, 2006, we had a grand total of **18,755** family group sheets in the HFA database, after thirteen years of input. We are using the FileMaker Pro database program, which allows us to conduct searches for people in about twenty-one different fields.

As of January 11, 2007, we are happy to report a new grand total of 18,891 family group sheets in the HFA database.

We are still busy inputting Hull marriages and other data from all states into the database. These have been gleaned from many different sources and are all in the holdings of the HFA Genealogist. Our last count for Hull marriages was approximately 6499 marriages in the marriage field for the head of the family and 3435 marriages for the children in these families, but which dates have not yet all been entered.

Our new totals are:

- 6536 marriages in the marriage field for the head of the family
- 3490 marriages for the children in these families
- We have now completed entering the marriage records for 43 states.

The sources for the database entries are from (1) the material sent to me from our HFA members, which is periodically listed in each *HFA Newsletter*, and (2) the material which I personally have researched, collected, and analyzed from libraries and archives throughout the entire country.

I now have over 425 2-inch and 3-inch wide notebooks, which hold these Hull/Holl/Hohl/Hole pages, all encased in acid-free plastic sheets. This genealogical material, along with the Hull lineages submitted by our HFA members, form the basis for most of our *HFA Journal* articles.

A special thanks goes to Ruth S. Ratliff, of Boulder, Colorado, who assists me in typing these records into the database. Also I extend my grateful thanks to the Hull Family Association, who from the beginning has contributed yearly funding to support this project.
