## Introduction

The family of Hussey, according to George T. Little (Genealogical and Family History of the State of Maine, 1909, p 435), "came into England with William the Conqueror, in 1066, and can be traced back to Hugh Heese of the year 1014. He married a daughter of the third Duke of Normandy. His name became changed from the German form to the French De Hosey, and this has been anglicized to Hussey." The Hussey noble who came to England with William was granted high office and considerable possessions. One of his descendants, Sir Hugh Hussey, went to Ireland in 1316 and established the Hussey line there.

The Husseys of New England are descended from various immigrant ancestors, among whom are the following:

Christopher Hussey, landed in Boston in 1632; Hampton, N.H., 1638.  
Robert Hussey, of Duxbury, Mass., 1643. Probably died there in 1667.  
William Hussey (Hazzey), May 3, 1665, in list of Freemen, Boston.  
Robert Hussey, May 15, 1690, in list of Freemen, Boston.  
Robert Hussey, of Dover, N.H., on the tax list, 1659.  
Richard Hussey, of Dover, N.H., on the tax list, 1690.  
(From Little and The New England Historical and Genealogical Register, vols 3 & 4.)

There is doubt about the history of Richard Hussey. Charles W. Tibbetts states (New Hampshire Genealogical Record, 1904), "It is certain that Richard was not a descendent of Christopher, of Hampton; it is doubtful that he was a son of Robert, of Dover; he was the emigrant according to tradition." Ezra S. Stearns asserts (Genealogical and Family History of the State of New Hampshire, 1908), "the records fail to show what if any relation any of the other settlers bore to Richard." These conclusions were accepted by Little, 1909, and by Henry S. Webster (N.H.G. Record, 1909). E. H. Hussey, whose "History of the Richard Hussey Family," 1954, forms the basis for my own history, follows Webster in stating that Richard "probably emigrated from England or Ireland."

A different conclusion was reached by Rev. Alonzo H. Quint, D.D., of Dover, N.H. Writing on "The Hussey Ancestry of the Poet Whittier," (N.E.H. & G. Reg. vol. 50, (1896), p 295), Rev. Quint states, "The records are ample which show that Whittier's mother, Abigail Hussey, was descended in a direct line, not from Christopher Hussey, of Hampton, (as Whittier had claimed), but from Robert Hussey, who was of Dover as early as 1659."

"Between Christopher Hussey and Robert Hussey, no wills, deeds, or any other papers, and no similarity of Christian names, have ever suggested any connection in the slightest degree."

"Some years ago, in my work upon Dover history, and also from my warm love toward the poet, I made a thorough investigation of the mother's ancestry. She was born in old Dover. I found her father's will, and traced back the pedigree in its every step by public and Friends' records. To my surprise I found that the family ancestor was Robert Hussey."

"Two or three years ago, I found in the Boston Transcript



(Mar.3,1894, Query No.70), a complete and elaborate statement of the pedigree, with full names and dates, made by a gentleman of the Whittier name and blood. He had gone over the same ground which I had traversed, although entirely ignorant of my own labor: and our results, equally elaborate and complete, were exactly alike".

Rev. Quint had previously contributed a family record of Robert Hussey, in which Richard Hussey was listed as a son. (N.E.H.&G. Reg.7:157).

Another Richard Hussey has recently been added to the above list of Hussey ancestors. The Daughters of the American Revolution, in their book, "Mt. Hope Cemetery Records, Maine, D.A.R., Bangor, Maine".(1961), have the following record on pages 1&3 of the section, "Hussey and Allied Lines, Albion Branch":  
Richard Hussey, born about 1644. To Dover,N.H.,1690. Resided Dover,N.H., in 1695. Weaver. Died 1710. Wife died 1729.

The first genealogy of the Richard Hussey Family was by Henry S. Webster, of Gardiner, Maine, which was published in N.H.G.Record, Vols. 6&7,1909. This record covered families of the first three generations. It was not completed because publication of that quarterly magazine was abruptly ended. Data collected by Mr.Webster was used by Mr.E.H.Hussey in his "History of the Richard Hussey Family". Mr.Hussey also used additional data which was furnished by Mrs.Frank Holmes and by himself. This book is in the Maine Historical Society library in Portland, Maine.

Tracing my Maternal ancestors was easy. My mother was a Batchelder; her mother was a Peabody; her mother was a Bradstreet, and Simon Bradstreet, the immigrant, married Anne Dudley. Their families settled here in Essex County and their family histories have all been published. I consulted these histories at the Essex Institute in Salem, Mass.

This history is limited to my branch of the families involved and several collateral branches that contain a special interest. I have omitted the full pedigree of many families, showing only the direct lines of descent. This work was begun several years ago when my daughter Louise asked me about our family history. I recalled that, many years ago, my mother told us children that there were Governors of early Massachusetts in her family tree. These ancestors are now revealed as Governors Thomas Dudley and Simon Bradstreet, of Massachusetts Bay Colony. It was interesting to discover that John Greenleaf Whittier's mother was Abigail Hussey; that Nathaniel Hawthorne married Sophia Amelia Peabody; that Ruth Hussey, the movie actress, is another cousin; and that Anne Dudley, the first American poet of either sex, was a direct ancestor.

George Peabody is probably the most illustrious member of the Peabody family. He was born in South Danvers, Mass., which was renamed Peabody in his honor shortly before his death. He achieved fortune and fame as a merchant in this country and as a banker in London. His philanthropic benefactions were unequalled in his time, totaling more than eight million dollars. Some of his many gifts were to the Peabody Museum in Salem, Peabody Institutes in Peabody, Danvers, Georgetown, Baltimore and Peabody Museums at Harvard and Yale Universities. He gave millions of dollars to aid the poor in the South and to provide better housing for the poor of London. For his generosity he was honored by Queen Victoria.

George Peabody died in London. A special funeral service was held for him in Westminster Abbey, as for a lord of the realm, and a ship of the Royal Navy brought his body back to his native land. His body lies buried beside his parents in Harmony Grove Cemetery, Salem, Mass.

I made frequent visits to the Peabody Institute Library in Danvers during my high school days. (I graduated from Danvers High School in 1906.)

## APPENDIX B

## Anne Dudley Bradstreet

Anne Dudley Bradstreet was born under very favorable circumstances. Her father, Thomas Dudley, who had fought for Queen Elizabeth against Philip II, was chief steward for the young Earl of Lincoln on his vast estates in Lincolnshire in the east of England. Anne took advantage of the Earl's large library, in her love of books, and absorbed the writings and ideas of many of the modern writers of the day. She was thus well prepared, amidst her duties as a housewife in a new land to "write a book that would be the sensation of its own age and one of the delights of ours."

Anne's first volume of poems was published in London in 1650. She was the mother of eight children, of whom she wrote in 1656:

"I had eight birds hatcht in one nest,  
Four Cocks there were, and Hens the rest,  
I nurst them up with pain and care,  
Nor cost, nor labour did I spare,  
Tell at the last they felt their wing,  
Mounted the Trees, and learn'd to sing;  
Chief of the Brood then took his flight,  
To Regions far, and left me quite:  
My mournful chirps I after send,  
Till he return, or I do end,

(Dr. Samuel)

Leave not thy nest, thy Dam and Sire,  
Fly back and sing amidst this Quire.  
My second bird did take her flight,  
And with her mate flew out of sight;  
Southward they both their course did bend,  
And Seasons twain they there did spend:  
Till after blown by Southern gales,  
They Norward steer'd with filled sayles.  
A prettier bird was no where seen,  
Along the Beach among the treen.

Anne's husband, Simon Bradstreet, was one of the founders of Harvard College in 1636, the first college in America. It is not suprising, therefore, that many of their children graduated from Harvard College.

Charles Clifford Fetter. b July 4, 1922; d Feb. 15, 1977. He was born in Warsaw, New York, and was named Charles Clifford Daly, by his parents. His mother divorced her husband and later married Howard Fetter. Charles lived with them. His name was changed to Charles Clifford Fetter in 1942, by court order in Bergen County, New Jersey.

Frederick Hurd Puls. b Feb. 10, 1923; d Jan. 23, 1977. He was born in Mill Shoals, Illinois, and was named Lawrence Henry Griffith, by his parents. He was placed in the Illinois Soldier's Orphan's Home, Normal, Illinois, Jan. 7, 1926, with one sister, Etta, and one brother, Thomas. Sometime later Lawrence was placed in the Chicago Cradle. On Dec. 7, 1928, he was adopted in County Court of Cook County, Illinois, by Dr. and Mrs. Frederick William Puls of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, and given the name Frederick Hurd Puls. He died in Mount Prospect, Cook County, Illinois.

that town, daughter of Charles Rufus and Eliza (Miller) Ellis. The former was born August 29, 1843, in Otsego county, New York, and served as a private in Company D, Fifty-seventh Regiment of State Volunteers from October 16, 1861, to December 31, 1863. He was enrolled as corporal of the company, January 1, 1864, by re-enlistment, and served until discharged December 20, 1865. He was subsequently a merchant and farmer and died at Yellow Springs, Ohio, April 29, 1880. He was the father of a daughter and a son, namely: Carrie May Ellis, and Charles Herbert Ellis, born May 29, 1873.

This is an ancient English **HUSSEY** family which came into England with William the Conqueror, in 1066, and can be traced back to Hugh Hoesse of the year 1014. He married a daughter of the third Duke of Normandy, and his name became changed from its German form to the French, De Hosey, and this has been anglicized to Hussey. Very soon after its arrival in this country the family became identified with the Society of Friends or Quakers, and most of its members have ever since continued in that affiliation. In England it is represented by Sir George Alfred Ernest Hussey, who was mayor of Southampton from 1898 to 1901. In this country, William J. Hussey, an astronomer of note, is the author of many scientific works and professor at the University of Michigan. It is supposed that all the Husseys in this country, who can trace their ancestry through several generations, are descended from Christopher Hussey, of Hampton, New Hampshire. This New England family dates its history in America from the year 1630 and is descended from the still older English family of the same name which in the last half of the sixteenth century was seated in Dorking, Surrey. The first authentic account we have of the family here under consideration is the record of marriage of John Hussey and Mary Wood, December 5, 1593, when they both were of Dorking, and were persons of good position and of moderate estate in lands. John Hussey died in England, leaving a widow and children. Of the latter the records are meagre, but there is known to have been a son John, who died young, a son Christopher and one or more daughters, of whom we have no authentic account.

(1) Christopher Hussey, immigrant, founder of the family of his surname in America, is presumed to have been a son of John and

Mary (Wood) Hussey, of Dorking, and while there is nothing to rebut this presumption there are many circumstances which sustain it, as will be seen from what is hereinafter mentioned. He was born in Dorking, Surrey, England, February 18, 1599. He doubtless was among the parishioners of Rev. Stephen Bachilor, and went to Holland with others of the pastor's flock in order to escape religious persecutions to which they were subjected in England; and it was only on his promise to emigrate to this country that Mr. Bachilor consented to give his daughter Theodate in marriage to Captain Hussey. The marriage took place in England, but whether before or after the exodus to Holland is not certain. However, Christopher Hussey and his wife sailed from Southampton in the "William and Francis" in May, 1630, and landed at Charlestown, New England, about July 23 of the same year. They took up their abode in Saugus (then Lynn), where Rev. Mr. Bachilor joined them two years later, and became the first minister of that town. While living there Christopher Hussey's eldest child Stephen was born, the second white child born in the town. Subsequently he was one of the prominent men of Newbury, but he appears to have figured still more prominently as one of the proprietors of Hampton, New Hampshire, for it is written in the history of that town that "Christo" Hussey and a widow, Mary Hussey, were among the grantees of Hampton. She is presumed to have been the widow of John Hussey, of Dorking, and mother of Christopher Hussey, the immigrant; and that she came over in the same ship with her son and the others of Mr. Bachilor's flock. In Hampton their lots were on opposite sides of the Meeting-house Green, the widow's five acre houselot being about where the town house now stands. In 1650 "ould mistress husse and her dafter husse" were assigned seats in the meeting-house, and while there is no record elsewhere of such "dafter" it is probable that this mention has reference to the wife or daughter of the widow's son.

Captain Hussey was a man of considerable prominence in Hampton and was chosen to several important offices, first deacon of the church, magistrate, captain of militia, town clerk, selectman and representative to the assembly. When New Hampshire was made a royal province he was one of the commissioners mentioned in the charter. In 1650 he sold all his lands in what now is Hampton and moved to the "Falls Side" (Hampton Falls). In 1659 he was one of the purchasers of Nan-
