HARRY E. SNYDER was born May 12, 1872, in Ralpho township, Northumberland county, was reared upon the farm and received his education in the public schools of the home locality. For two years he was engaged in the milk business at Weigh Scales, his next location being at Seven Points, in Rockefeller township, where he carried on a mercantile business for one year. In 1906 he bought the old Amandus Miller homestead in Shamokin township, consisting of seventy-four acres, where he devoted himself to farming until his removal to Shamokin, in April, 1911; he resides at No. 623 West Pine Street. He is a young man of energetic disposition, intelligent in his work and enterprising in his methods, and his farm showed the effect of good management. He had good buildings and kept his property in excellent condition.

In 1901 Mr. Snyder married Lulu V. Miller, daughter of Amandus Miller, late of Shamokin township, and they have four children: Ernest M., R. Merrill, Mary H. and Rosella F. Mr. Snyder is a member of the Oak Grove Methodist Church in Ralpho township, and socially belongs to the P. O. S. of A. In political matters he votes independently.

JARID C. IRWIN, a venerable citizen of Sunbury, has had a long and useful life, one of unusual activity, and few residents of the borough are any better known in the community. For many years he was identified with its public affairs, having served several years in the borough council, as member of the school board for the remarkable period of twenty-one years, during which time he was never absent from a meeting of the board, and was chairman of the building committee who superintended the erection of the present high school building, as justice of the peace, and from 1892 to 1897 as postmaster of the borough.

Mr. Irwin is a son of Martin Irwin, who came to Sunbury early in 1830 from Chester county, Pa., where he was born April 1, 1804. He followed shoemaking throughout his working years, and was an industrious and intelligent man, one who had the respect and confidence of all who knew him. For some years he served as court crier, and in 1848 he was elected to the office of register and recorder of Northumberland county, which he was filling at the time of his death, June 13, 1849, in Sunbury. He was a Democrat, and quite active in politics. Mr. Irwin married Rachel Irwin, who was born in 1808 in Lancaster county, Pa., daughter of James Irwin, a native of Chester county, where he is buried: he lived to the age of ninety-three. James Irwin had the following sons: George, James, Samuel, Joseph, Jarid and Fenius. Nine children were born to Mr. and Mrs.

Martin Irwin; Jarid C., born March 13, 1830; James P., born in 1832; Mary, born in 1834, who married Charles D. Wharton; S. Elizabeth, born in 1836, who married Dr. Daniel Shindel; Isabella, born in 1838, who married Joseph Bright; Amelia Alice, born in 1842, who married John Olson; R. Marian, born in 1843, who died young; Jane P., born in 1846, who married Edward Israel; and Samuel P., born in 1849, who married Miss Val Elexander, and died in 1908. The parents of this family are buried at Sunbury, in the lower (Fourth street) cemetery. They were Episcopalians in religious connection and active in church life. After the father's death the mother married (second) Frederick Lazarus, whom she also survived, her death occurring in 1895.

Jarid C. Irwin was born March 13, 1830, in Sunbury, where he grew to manhood, and there he has always made his home. He learned shoemaking with his father, with whom he worked from an early age, beginning the trade in the days when custom work was the rule; when the work was all done by hand: and when shoes were made on straight lasts, not rights and lefts as at present, and worn on either foot, being changed about daily to keep heels and soles from becoming crooked. Mr. Irwin followed this business throughout his active years, and prospered. It is his public career, however, that has brought him into special prominence, his services having covered many years, during which he filled various offices with ability, showing conscientious devotion to the duties intrusted to him. He was a member of the borough council for two terms. For twenty-one years he served on the school board, for a longer period than any other one man in Sunbury, and in all that time never missed a meeting of the board, was secretary of that body for twelve years, treasurer four years, and president for a time, and always known as one of the most effective workers in the borough in the cause of public education. On April 14, 1890, he was appointed justice of the peace by Governor Beaver, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of A. N. Brice. At the close of his appointive term, first Monday in May, 1891, he was elected for five years, but in 1892 resigned his office, having been in the meantime appointed postmaster, when Hon. John Wanamaker was postmaster general. He held that office until 1897.

Mr. Irwin has always been a staunch Republican, and he served in the Union army during the Civil war under three enlistments. In 1861 he became a private of Company F, 11th Pennsylvania Regiment, with which he served three months, in Maryland and Virginia, taking part in the first fight at Falling Waters, Va.: his second term of service was as a private in the 45th Pennsylvania Regiment, with which he remained a little over a year, during that time taking part in the battles

of James Island (S. C.), Antietam and South Mountain; later he served a year as a private of Company C, 47th Pennsylvania Regiment. He is a leading member of William A. Brunner Post, No. 335, G. A. R., of Sunbury, which he helped to organize, being one of the charter members, and is a past commander. For the past fourteen years Mr. Irwin has acted for the county commissioners in the matter of looking after indigent Civil war veterans, seeing that decent burial is provided for such as die without sufficient means and that headstones are erected to mark their graves properly. For many years he was a member of the Knights of Pythias. In religion, like his parents, he is an Episcopalian.

Mr. Irwin can look back over a most interesting period of Sunbury's development, and he has embodied his memories in a book of Reminiscences, which he completed and published in 1910, when past the age of eighty. The edition of three hundred copies was intended chiefly for distribution among his friends, but it is a substantial and valuable addition to the history of the borough and of Northumberland county, though the author himself claimed no such distinction for it. The work was a labor of love, accomplished in his leisure hours, and the accuracy of his recollections, together with the care and thought which he bestowed upon this collection of "fugitive facts" concerning the early days in which all are interested, not only evidence the remarkable clearness and vigor of mind which this octogenarian has retained, but show a true gift for the grasping of those things most characteristic of the times he depicts and a faculty for presenting them which entitles the book to more than local recognition. The cold facts of history stand in little danger of being lost in these days of daily records, and the increasing appreciation of the value of statistics. It is the doings and incidents typical of the early days of the borough which may too readily slip into oblivion unless rescued in time by the hand of one who has the necessary knowledge and opportunity to record them. The book contains so many entertaining recitals of life and conditions in the early days of the borough that it might furnish "local color" for many other works, incidents of all kinds being set forth in most attractive and readable form, and with a regard for facts that enhances the worth of the volume appreciably. The people who have known and loved Sunbury feel a personal sense of gratitude toward him for the occurrences he has perpetuated in this work. The customs and practices of Sunbury people sixty and more years ago he recounts from his personal experiences and recollections. Beginning with a brief reference to the founding of the borough, a little before his time, he gives two quotations from an old newspaper, which present in sharp contrast with the present the days when Sunbury

had no communication with the outside world except by means of the turnpike and canal. One notes the return, April 3, 1835, of the canal boat "Angusta" from Philadelphia; the other the arrival of two cars of coal from Shamokin in 1836, the year the railroad between Sunbury and Shamokin was completed. At this time there were eight hotels or taverns, as they were then called, in the town, some of them on sites still occupied by hotels. In 1842 the population was only 1,108, and at that time there was not a house in sight north of Race street, or south of Spruce, or east of what is now known as Spring Run. In 1848 the entire tax levy of the borough amounted to \$1,294.63. The public schools were opened in 1834, and the school tax for the first year was \$554.938; the first building especially erected for school purposes in Sunbury was opened in December, 1837.

Of interesting facts concerning the changes in the physical features of the town there are many, some scarcely comprehensible to the present generation. The present site of the Reading railroad depot was an old basin which was a favorite resort of skaters in the winter season; Shamokin creek was once a "fisherman's paradise"; the part of town extending from the upper basin to beyond the Philadelphia & Erie shops was practically a swamp, covered with a dense wild growth of shrubs, bushes and vines; and allusion is made to the old picnic ground, "which was a dense growth of trees, south of the eastern extension of Walnut street, and east of Spring run, extending along Shamokin creek, quite up to the old town mill." In these days a boy could not earn more than twenty-five cents a day, a levy, or twelve and a half cents, being the average, and fifty cents daily was the regular price paid for a man's labor. There was little opportunity for girls to make money.

To the social pleasures of the day and humorous happenings, many of which have become historic, Mr. Irwin devotes considerable space. He tells of the annual training days, when the militia met at Sunbury for drill: of the fights and festivities which marked these occasions; the hucksters busily engaged in the sale of the ginger cakes, root beer and other refreshments in popular demand; and the dancing, usually at the "Black Horse Hotel," the "Ferry House" and the "Cross Keys." One of the most amusing incidents related was the expedition made by the Sunbury Grays to oust a negro family squatted on an island in the river. One day, the drum corps being short of a fife, a celebrated whistler in the town agreed to furnish the music for the parade, and kept his word. The horse races so keenly enjoyed in the early days, the feud between the Sunbury and Northumberland boys, and numerous other things recalled with

zest by most of the older inhabitants, have been set down with a pen moved by the spirit of the times, and the volume has been received with delight. A number of illustrations accompany the text.

On Feb. 15, 1851, Mr. Irwin married in Danville, Pa., Ann S. Kiehl, who was born in 1833, daughter of George W. Kiehl, of Sunbury, at one time sheriff of Northumberland county. She died March 9, 1910. Mr. and Mrs. Irwin had four children, namely: Marian, who died young; Georgia Anna, who married Sharon Stephen, of Harrisburg, where she died, leaving two children, Fred H. and Bessie; William, who died young, and Martin, who died young.

REV. A. H. BLEISTEIN has been pastor of St. Patrick's Catholic Church at Trevorton, Northumberland county, since 1902, and the church and its work have prospered steadily under his wise and efficient administration. He was born March 6, 1874, at Lebanon, Pa., where his father, John Bleistein, a native of Germany, settled upon coming to this country. The father was a furnaceman and employed as such throughout his active years. He died at Lebanon May 20, 1874. His widow, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Host, is now living with her son, Father Bleistein, at Trevorton. She is a native of Wurtemberg, Germany. Nine children were born to Mr. and Mrs. John Bleistein, namely: Frank, who died young; Joseph, a resident of Lebanon; Carl, who died young; John; William, of Lebanon; Charles, living at Chester, Pa.; Philip, a resident of Lebanon; Mary, deceased; and A. H.

A. H. Bleistein received his early education in the parochial schools at Lebanon, and in Vincent College, located at Latrobe, Westmoreland Co., Pa. In 1892 he entered Mount Saint Mary's College, at Emmitsburg, Md., from which institution he was graduated in 1897. For the next two years he pursued the theological course there, and for one year was a student at St. Charles Seminary (the Philadelphia Theological Seminary of St. Charles Borromeo), at Overbrook, Pa., after which he began his work as assistant to Father Christ, of St. Joseph's Church, at Lancaster, Pa. His next location was at New Freedom, York Co., Pa., where he remained for one year, from June, 1901, to June, 1902, at which time he was transferred to Trevorton. Here he has since had charge of St. Patrick's Church. He has been very successful throughout his pastorate, and the affairs of the congregation are in a thriving condition.

St. Patrick's Church was founded soon after the opening of the coal mines at Trevorton. A large proportion of the Irish and German miners were members of the Catholic Church, and Rev. Michael Sheridan, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, at Dan-

ville, was requested to pay them a visit. He celebrated the first mass at the house of a Mr. Compton, and the first baptism and marriage recorded in the church records by Father Sheridan are dated Oct. 1, 1854. It is very probable he commenced visiting the town about that time. In 1857 he was succeeded by Rev. George Gosten-schnigg, pastor at Milton, who organized the congregation and at once commenced collecting money for the erection of a church edifice. Father George, as he was familiarly known, continued his collections over the county until May, 1859, when the contract was let for the church building, a white sandstone structure 35 by 65 feet in dimensions, still in use. The edifice was completed in May, 1860, and was dedicated on the 20th of that month by Bishop Neuman, of Philadelphia, and placed under the patronage of St. Patrick. A large assemblage was present at the services, but the pastor who had worked so hard to accomplish all this had not lived to see the ceremony. While making preparations for the event Father Gosten-schnigg became overheated, and he died at Milton May 2, 1860, and was buried in St. Joseph's parochial lot at that place. His successor, Rev. M. Muhlberger, served until 1861, when Rev. Emil Stenzel became pastor. In 1862 he was succeeded by Rev. Edward Murray, and in November, 1863, Rev. J. J. Koch, pastor of St. Joseph's Church at Milton, was transferred to this charge. In 1866 Father Koch was appointed first resident pastor of St. Edward's Church at Shamokin, but also continued to minister to St. Patrick's until 1878, during which time he enlarged the church building, had the interior frescoed, paid off the debts, and placed the affairs of the congregation on a sound financial basis. For four years after Father Koch's pastorate Rev. August Schlue-ter, formerly of Locust Gap, was in charge at Trevorton, he being followed by Rev. Henry Relt, the first resident pastor. Father Relt built a two-story parochial residence in 1882. In 1889 Rev. Francis L. Breckel was placed over this charge, which he continued to serve until the fall of 1900, when Father George Seubert came hither from St. Anthony's church in Lancaster, Pa. In the spring of 1901 the present church site was purchased, and preparations made to build. The first services in the new structure were held in the basement Christmas Day, 1901. Father Seubert continued in charge until the present pastor, Rev. A. H. Bleistein, was transferred hither in June, 1902. Many changes have taken place in the membership of the church, which decreased for a time as the suspension of the coal business caused many families to move from the vicinity. The congregation now numbers about one hundred families, principally German, and there is a flourishing Sunday school.

The Irwin family are of Scotch origin and perhaps the first of the family

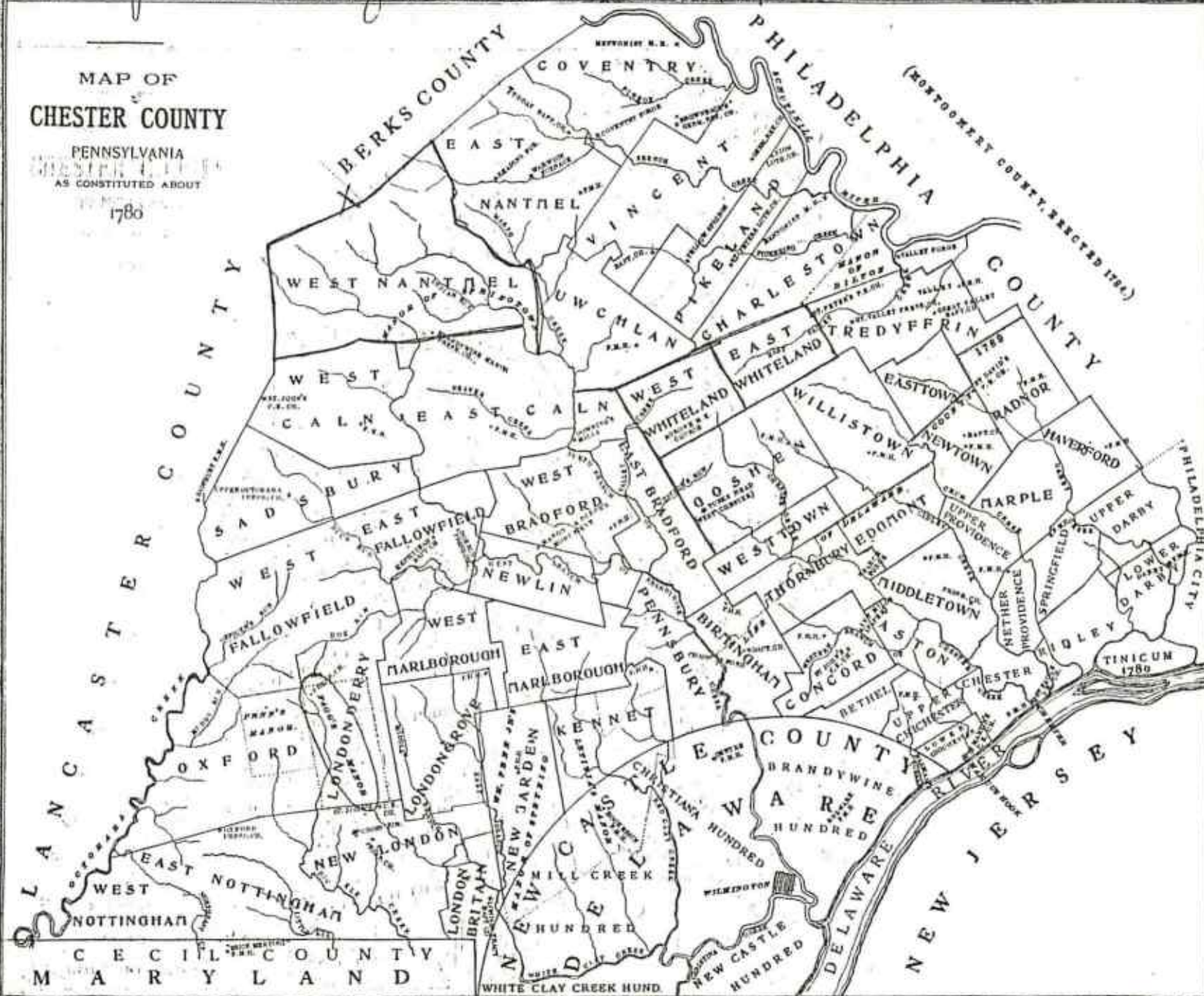

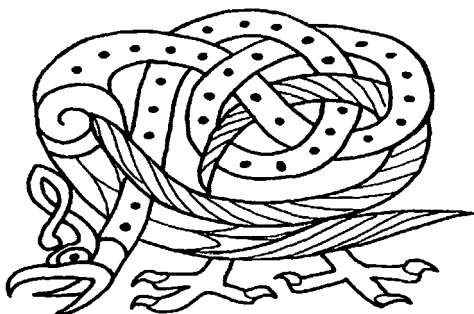

It is gray blue limestone and the walls are almost two feet thick. There are two stories and an attic. Each story being twelve feet high, unusual in a Pennsylvania farm house. The main part of the house, 36x33 feet, was built first, but a kitchen wing was added, 18x33. Each room has its own fireplace. The last owners were William and Dorothy Bowers. They are deceased and the property was recently sold (1997).

IRWIN, James (S-9743)

Butler Co OH, Oct 18 1832

James **IRWIN**, aged 74 years, a resident of Butler Co OH, said he was drafted under Capt. William **GRAHAM**, served 2 months.

In 1788, he was drafted, served for 2 months under Capt. David **BOAL**. In 1780, he was again drafted into the same company for another 2 months.

The only ones who he knows who can prove his service are James **SMALL**, a resident of Greene Co OH, and Robert **IRWIN**, who cannot come into court due to age.

Deposition of William **MITCHELL** taken at the same time and place, in which William stated he knew Andrew **IRVIN** and Elizabeth **MITCHELL** before and after their marriage; he witnessed the loss of the papers of Andrew **IRVIN** while the latter was crossing the Clinch River on his way into KY.

Meetings were held the second Sunday of each month and this abstract does not record those regular sessions where services were held without special business. The transcription has been made without corrections of original spelling, but with commas to separate series of names in certain portion.

of chamber pipes (i.e. those that operate via the use of bellows rather than the traditional bag as a reservoir). Examples of different forms of such chamber pipes can be found throughout Ireland, France and England. The Northumbrian region of England has been a "hotbed" for bagpipe evolution. It has not only witnessed the emergence of its indigenous shuttle pipes, but also its own small pipes, half longs and great war/gathering pipes. Likewise, Ireland has experienced the evolution of its own Uilleann (chamber/bellows pipe) and war pipe (Brian Boru). The evidence exists to substantiate the belief that pipes may have been common throughout the remainder of Britain prior to their emergence upon the Scottish landscape.

Nevertheless, there is no question that the Bagpipe was very popular throughout England. Middle Ages Pre-Reformation churches reveal carvings of bagpipes. Chaucer refers to the Miller playing pipes in "The Miller's Tale." Documents from the Lord High Treasurer of Scotland (1489 and 1506) refer to payments to the "Drone of a Lincolnshire Bagpipe." The Irish are believed to have played pipes for Edward I. In fact, both Henry VII and Henry VIII are believed to have enjoyed pipers.

Questions remain as to when and where the first, second and third drones were added to the "piob-mhor" along with the questions as to when and where the bagpipe entered Scotland. However, the fact remains that this is an instrument whose growth and movement parallel civilizations and early history. It is a musical instrument which not only reflects our early history, but also the evolution of culture through history.

Kansas For Years

Thomas Irwin died at his home, 421 South Eleventh street, last night at 10:05 o'clock at the advanced age of 82 years. Mr. Irwin was born in Ironton, West Virginia, in 1820. A few years later he moved with his parents to Powellsville, Ohio. In 1850 he joined the Masonic lodge at that place which order he was a faithful member until his death. In 1852 Mr. Irwin left Powellsville and journeyed west to St. Joe on horseback. In St. Joe he purchased six yoke of oxen and crossing the river struck off across the plains for the California coast.

Four months after leaving St. Joe he drove through the streets of San Francisco then a city of tents. Soon after arriving in San Francisco he continued his journey to Placerville, California, a small mining town a short distance from San Francisco.

He mined and prospected for nearly two years. Returning to San Francisco in 1855 he boarded a ship bound for the isthmus, crossing the isthmus embarked for New York City and arrived home about six months after leaving San Francisco. In the sixties he came to Kansas

City and traveled overland from there to Salina where he has since resided.

Mr. Irwin leaves six children, three sons and three daughters. The funeral will be held in the M. E. church tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock under the auspices of the Masons.

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.

Thomas Irwin Died At the Age of 82 Years

Thomas Irwin, an old and highly respected Saline County pioneer, died at his home on South Eleventh Street at ten o'clock last night. The deceased had been failing for some time past and was reported dying three days ago. The deceased was 82 years of age and leaves several children. His wife died about a year ago and since then he has been failing in health. The deceased was a native of Pennsylvania and came here in the early seventies. He was a farmer in Elm Creek township up to three years ago when he retired. Thomas Irwin was one of the earliest settlers of this county and his loss is keenly felt. He moved with his family in June, 1877, and issued the initial number of the *New Ern*, at West Union, Ohio, on the 6th day of July of the same year. Three children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. Irwin: Ettie Catharine, August 4, 1870; McArthur Wright, January 1, 1873; and Ralph Waldo, April 24, 1877, all of whom are now living.

Irwin Encampment, No. 196, I.O.O.F. This encampment was originally chartered May 16, 1870, but was rechartered after the fire, April 2, 1873.

The Irwin Cornet Band, of which Will Leigh is leader and B.M. McWilliams teacher, consists of 18 pieces.

Union Cemetery – This beautiful cemetery, lying about a mile southeast of the borough, was laid out in 1873 and 1874. Among the treasurers was one *Thomas H. Irwin*. (Transcribed without spelling corrections.)

ABSTRACTS OF ORIGINAL RECORDS OF CHESTER BAPTIST CHURCH 1819 – 1829

With roster of members of the former SALEM BAPTIST CHURCH who transferred to Chester Baptist Church in November 1832. Indexed Transcribed from the original records by Frances N. Slack 1980. The Baptist Church in Chester Township, Co. of Knox and State of Ohio was constituted March 13, 1819.

The Chester Baptist Church and cemetery, located in Chester Township, Morrow County (Knox County before 1848), Ohio, is 2.25 miles s.w. of Chesterville, at the intersection of the Chesterville-Johnstown (SR 314) and Panlan (TR 179) Roads.

Thomas Irwin succeeded Judge Wilkins. He was appointed, in 1831, by President Jackson, and held the office until 1859, when he resigned and retired to private life. He was born in Philadelphia, February 22, 1784. His father, Col. Matthew Irwin, was a distinguished soldier of the revolutionary war, and one of the Philadelphia patriots of that trying period who brought relief to the famishing army at Valley Forge, subscribing himself \$5,000 for that purpose. His mother was a daughter of Benjamin Mifflin, whose ancestor came to Pennsylvania at an early period. Thomas Mifflin, the first elected governor of Pennsylvania, was a relative of Judge Irwin, after whom he was named. The Mifflins were known as the "Fighting Quakers," from the active part they took in the revolutionary war.

William W. Irwin, farmer, post office Gamble's, is a son of John and Ann (McConnell) Irwin, and was born in 1843 on the farm now owned by him. His grandfather was a native of Ireland, and came to this county where John was born, and served in the war of 1812. William's father was twice married, his first wife being Sarah La Fever, who was born in 1793, and died in 1832. John was born 1788 and lived to be ninety-one years old. Their children were Harriet, Margaret, John Brady, Joseph L., Mary Catherine, Charity Elenor, Rebecca Ann, Martha Ann, Henry F. and Susanna. Ann (McConnell) Irwin was born in 1802, and lived to be eighty years old. Their children were Sarah Alice, Nancy D., Findley D., Loressa J., William W. and Anna A. The following are deceased: Charity, Rebecca, Catherine, Susan, Nancy D., and Henry F., Findley D. and William W. served in the late war. Findley D. was wounded and taken prisoner. In 1873 William W. married Nora, daughter of John McHenry, whose parents were natives of this county. Their children are Frank W., Bert M., Henry F., John F., Anna B., Marion P. and Maggie; the last named is deceased. The rest are still at home. Mr. and Mrs. Irwin are members of the U.P. Church; he is a republican.

NORTH HUNTINGDON TOWNSHIP, PA. (p. 55)

IRWIN BOROUGH. Irwin is located on the line of the Pennsylvania Railroad, 22 miles east of Pittsburgh, and is situated in the heart of the bituminous coal region of W. Pennsylvania. When the railroad was finished, in 1852, the site of the town was a forest of (mainly) white-oak timber. In 1844 there was only one house here, which was owned by Thomas Shaw, and an old log cabin occupied by a coal-digger. John Irwin, its founder, laid out the first plan of lots in September 1853, to which he subsequently made several additions. The original

The social life of the Irwins was a busy one, being one of the leading families in this area.

It is best described by Dorothy W. Bowers in her history of the Irwins and the Harrisons into which family the Irwin girls married.

Jane Irwin married on February 18, 1824, at Irwinton, William Henry Harrison, Jr., son of the general and later president of the United States, William Henry Harrison.

Elizabeth Irwin married another son of William Henry Harrison, John Scott Harrison. She was the mother of Benjamin Harrison, a future president of the United States. The Harrisons, after years of prominence in Virginia, made a new place for themselves in the Ohio Territory.

By 1841 the Irwins had left Franklin County for Ohio and the plantation listed for sale. From that date Irwinton has had three owners until purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Wm. S. Bowers in July, 1969.

Irwinton Mills is six miles west of Greencastle, PA, off Route 16 on the Anderson Mill Road.

The property was placed on the Pennsylvania Inventory of Historic Places March 15, 1974.

HISTORY OF ALLEGHENY CO. PA.

John V. Irwin, justice of the peace, post-office Homestead, was born June 6, 1837, in Elizabeth, Pa. The progenitor of this family in America was Joseph, a civil engineer, and a native of Scotland. He settled in White Oak Levels, Pa., in 1767, and three years later Joseph returned to his native country to bring his family and that of his brother-in-law. During his absence the settlers were driven off by the Indians to the vicinity of Fort Duquesne for protection. The Irwins located in Mifflin Township. An old ledger dated 1784, is yet in the possession of the subject of these lines. In 1824 Joseph died, leaving three sons and two daughters. His sons, James and John, who farmed and died on the homestead, inherited his estate. John married Elizabeth Huey, of Dauphin County, Pa., and lived near Six-Mile Ferry, where he died aged eighty years. His children were Joseph, Jane, James, Nancy, Presley, John and William.

show that he served as Colonel of the First Rifle Regiment (Tannehill's Brigade) from September 25 to November 25, 1812, when his enlistment expired and he was discharged.

After finishing his term in Congress he returned to his home. While in office his private business had been so neglected that financial failure was the result. At this time it is uncertain where he lived, whether in Milton or on the Union county side of the river. It is inferred, however, that when the war broke out he was residing in Union county, for he raised his company of volunteers in that county.

After the war we soon lose all track of Jared Irwin. His career had been brilliant and successful as a politician, office holder and military man. What became of him? The only clue we have to his mysterious disappearance is a remark by the late Tunison Coryell in his reminiscences of Milton settlers that "late in life he went to South America and never returned!" As Mr. Coryell was contemporary with him, and knew him personally, we can accept his statement as conclusive. He probably died at sea, or in that far away land, and no man knows when, where or how he was buried.

The writer knows little or nothing concerning the family of Jared Irwin. In the History of the Montgomery Family (p. 10) it is stated that he had three children, viz: Robert; Mary; Elizabeth, but no data of birth or other facts are given. According to Linn's Annals of Buffalo Valley (p. 570) Nancy Irwin, his widow, died at Lewisburg, January 23, 1830. And there the history of the family ends.

IRWINTON

An early trading post on the West branch of the Conococheague Creek in Peters Township, Cumberland County, PA.

James Irwin was the first of the family to settle here in 1748 on a nearby tract of 540 acres.

Archibald Irwin, the first of James's sons ordered a survey in 1766 and soon built the stone mansion house and mills on 217.5 acres he had surveyed, about three miles south East of present Mercersburg.

Archibald I died in 1798 and his son Archibald II became the new owner.

The Irwins all saw service in the Revolutionary War, their mills supplying the army with grain and beef. The local community depended on the mills for their services.

When Jared Irwin grew to man's estate he married Nancy, fourth daughter of Hugh Montgomery. Her mother was Jane Reese, and she married Montgomery November 15, 1778. As they were married in 1778, and Nancy was the fourth child, she was probably born about 1792 or 1793. The fact of the marriage of Jared Irwin is obtained from the Montgomery Family History, page 10, but is lamentably deficient in dates and details. Hugh Montgomery lived in Milton at that time and kept a public house. Reasoning from the few dates given it is probable that Nancy Montgomery married Jared Irwin about 1810 or 1812.

From the few fragments of his early history that have been preserved, it appears that Jared Irwin became a small merchant in the town of Milton soon after it was founded by Andrew Straub in 1792. About the time of the opening of his store he purchased real estate of the proprietor of the town, but how much is unknown. He soon came into prominence and was speedily recognized as a representative man. During Jefferson's first administration as President he was appointed postmaster of the infant village of Milton, July 1, 1802, and served until June 29th, 1803. He was the second postmaster of the village, Samuel Hepburn being the first, and was succeeded by Bethnel Vincent. In 1809 he was elected sheriff of Northumberland County and served until 1812, one full term of three years.

Before the close of his term he was elected a member of the Legislature in 1811, and on retiring from the office of sheriff he took his seat among the State lawmakers. But a higher honor still awaited him. In October 1813, he was chosen a member of Congress and served until 1817, a period of four years.

In the meantime the war of 1812 broke out. Jared Irwin, although a member of Congress, quickly responded to the call of Governor Snyder for troops, and he was soon after promoted to the command of a regiment. The records on file in the War Department, Washington,

He had charge of the first select school ever opened in Wooster, and taught upon the premises where E. Quinby, Jr., resides.

HISTORY OF WARREN CO., OHIO

Thomas M. Wales, retired farmer; P. O. Harveysburg. The earliest ancestor of the Wales family of whom we have any knowledge was George Wales, a native of Scotland, but who removed to Ireland in 1690. He had one brother who never married and was editor of a paper in Belfast, Ireland, and died there. Of the children of George Wales, his son Thomas, emigrated from Ireland to America in 1735, and of his children, George was the grandfather of our subject, and was born in Pennsylvania; was married to Jane Irvin, a daughter of Wm. Irvin, who came from Ireland to America with Thomas Wales in 1735, and they settled together in Pennsylvania. Their descendants emigrated to North Carolina, with a brother of Jane Irvin, Samuel Irvin, who removed to Ohio in 1799, and settled six miles south of Dayton, Montgomery County, where he died, leaving four sons and one daughter; the eldest son became Judge Amos Irvin, all of whom have now passed away.

COL., JARED IRWIN

Colonel Jared Irwin was a resident of Milton in the last decade of the eighteenth century, and was a prominent businessman and politician. His father, John Irwin, was born in Scotland in 1726, but when he came to this country is unknown. The tradition is that he settled in Pennsylvania, and after taking part in the Revolutionary War, went to the West Branch Valley, where he permanently located. He died May 16, 1791, at or near the present borough of Lewisburg. His wife was Rebecca Farland.

Among some of their descendants the following Bible record has been discovered, but it is not positively known to belong to this particular family, though the presumption is that it does. It is as follows:

HISTORY AND BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES OF SCIOTO COUNTY, OHIO

THOMAS IRVIN

Was born in Albemarle County, Virginia, in 1794. His father was WILLIAM IRVIN, a Presbyterian minister, and his mother's maiden name was HOLT. She was from Kentucky, and ATTORNEY-GENERAL HOLT was her cousin. The family originally came from the town of Irvine, in Scotland. They were descendants of Irvine of Bonshaw, in the time of Robert Bruce, who conferred titles and lands on William De Irvine, an ancestor of our subject. Our subject's father was an extensive slave-holder. Judge Irvin's father regarded slavery one of the temporal curses, and so wrote to his eldest son, W.W. IRVIN, in 1805. He, however, treated his slaves with the greatest kindness. Our subject imbibed anti-slavery ideas as a boy, and they remained with him all his life.

He was a student of Washington College, at Lexington, Virginia. He afterwards read law and was admitted to the bar at Stanton, Va. After this he located at Lancaster, Ohio, where his brother, HON. WILLIAM W. IRVIN, resided. On February 9th, 1826, he was appointed President Judge of the Eighth Circuit, and served two terms, or until February 19th, 1840.

In 1836 he removed to Pomeroy, Ohio, where he resided for twenty years. In December, 1837, he was married to Miss MARY RUSSELL POMEROY, daughter of SAMUEL WILLIS POMEROY, for whom the town was named. In 1845 and 1846 he represented Athens and Meigs counties in the Legislature. Hon. Rodney M. Stimson, OF Marietta, Ohio, who knew him well, said of him: "He was tall (six feet high), of straight figure; a most perfect gentleman; a good lawyer; a general reader; of great common sense; prudent and careful."

2nd Query: Jim Irwin in Walla Walla, WA, is looking for information about Col. Constant L. "Pete" Irwin. He was MacArthur's Asst. Chief of Staff for Operations and served with Gen. Jonathan Wainwright before the Japanese took over the Philippines in WWII. My interest,

He was the best of the President Common Pleas Judges who ever sat in Portsmouth, except Peck. He at one time owned the Calvert farm in Scioto County, and was a Director of a Portsmouth Bank. Once, during his Judgeship, he resided almost a year in Portsmouth.

In Politics he was a Whig so long as the Whig party lasted, and after that was a Republican. In 1855 his health gave way and he determined on a rural life. He bought sixteen acres of land back of Newport, Ky., and moved there in 1856. He resided there until his death, January 7th, 1869. During his residence in Kentucky he recovered his health, and devoted himself to horticulture, of which he was passionately fond. He called his Kentucky home Mt. Vernon. He was reared a Presbyterian, but on May 20th, 1867, was confirmed in the Episcopal Church, at Christ Church, in Cincinnati, by the Rt. Rev. Bishop McIlvaine. His wife survived him seven years. They had an only child, ELLEN, who married JONATHAN CHAPMAN of Boston, Massachusetts. He died October 18th, 1881, and left his wife and an only son, THOMAS IRVIN CHAPMAN. Mrs. Chapman resides at Tokyo, Japan.

Judge Irvin was always anti-slavery in his views and during the war was a staunch adherent to the cause of the Union. He was noted for his integrity. He was a great advocate of the temperance cause, and opposed to licensing the liquor traffic. He was of a generous nature, and a most agreeable companion.

WILLIAM C. ERWIN

Was born in Harrison Township, Scioto County, Ohio, November 30, 1866. He is the son of Robert Erwin and a great-grandson of Robert Erwin, who came to Ohio from Pennsylvania. He was of Irish descent, and settled first in Scioto County, near Portsmouth, at Jeffordsville, and removed from that place to Madison Township about 1835. His son, ROBERT ERWIN, was one of a family of eight children as follows: ANDREW, SAMUEL, MARGARET, ROBERT, WILLIAM, ELLIS, JAMES AND JULIA. The mother of our subject was HULDA ROCKWELL, daughter of Johathan and Martha Brown Rockwell, from New York and Virginia respectively. The paternal grandmother of William was Elizabeth Wallace who died in Madison Township at the age of 84. Robert Erwin, the father of William, was a soldier in the civil war, in company F. Ninety-first O.V.I. He entered the service August 22, 1862, and was mustered out with the company June 24, 1865. William spent most of his boyhood and youth in Madison Township, where he received a common school education. He worked on the farm and attended school until 1890, when he engaged in business in an installment house at Columbus for about one year. He spent two years as a conductor and motorman on the street railroad at Portsmouth. In the spring of 1893, he removed with his parents to Harrison Township. In 1899, he commenced the merchandise business which he still continues. He was Clerk of Harrison Township in 1901 and 1902. He is a Republican.
