Five Generations of Hoffmans in Delaware Restaurant and Bakery Business: George Frederick Hoffman, Bakery East Winter Street, 1864-1887; George J. Hoffman, Bakery and Restaurant, 15 West Winter Street, 1889; George Kase Hoffman "Bun," 1913; LeRoy Hoffman, 1922; George C. Hoffman "Bunnet," 1943; George Michael Hoffman "Mike," 1972.

Restaurant and Bakery Expansions: Middle Room 1923, Colonial Banquet Rooms 1925, Retail Bakery and Candy Room 1927, and Tudor Oak Room 1928.

George Frederick Hoffman, the country boy, went to Munich, the capital of Bavaria. Here he learned the finer arts of making all types of bread and pastries. On the twelfth of March 1849, he migrated to the United States from Kautzen.

He worked a while as a pastry baker on an Ohio River steam boat in the fall of 1849, going from Pittsburgh to Cairo, Illinois. Later he was employed by Cushman Baker, R. B. Field. He was working of his trade in Delaware in 1855.

His son, George J. Hoffman, was naturalized 17th October, 1859 (at age 33).

About 1857 George Frederick bought a small business in Millford, Ohio. He served in Civil War in 1864. He left Millford September 1864 for Delaware via the Little Miami Railroad. He had purchased the brick store room and home owned by William Kurley on East Winter Street. He built a bake shop at the rear and did a thriving business with workers of New York Central Railroad, Cadwalader Lumber Yard and saw and planing mill of George Perry and their factory of the Lybrand Brothers.

At one time this bakery supplied bread and baked goods to local stores and boarding students (Ohio Wesleyan University).

Members of the Hoffman Family have been prominent members of Zion German Church, known now as Zion United Church of Christ, corner of West Central and North Franklin Streets.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

I am undertaking a family genealogy. I am interested in all lines of descent and, of course, my chief concern is to be able to move backward tracing the entry of each line into the United States.

The following list gives my great-grandparents with two exceptions missing. The dates, in cases where month and day are not given, are derived from ages found in various census records, and can therefore be a few years off, either way.

1. POSTER, JOHN C. b. 1791, Pa.
I believe that his father was also born in Pennsylvania.
2. CALDWELL, SARAH b. 1791, Pa.
I believe her parents were born in Ireland.
3. ROBERTS, WILLIAM EDW. b. 1790, Pa.
4. HAY b. 1791, Pa.
MORSE, DEBORAH, was a direct ancestress in this line. She was born on the Atlantic Ocean on the voyage to America.
5. HATFIELD, PETER b. 1800, England
6. AIN b. May 12, 1804, Selby, England
Peter and Ann came to the Grand-Lafayette area, Wisconsin, between 1812 and 1845, when the lead mines opened there. Their daughter Maria Ellen gives her birthplace as Penn. so they probably came to the coast of Philadelphia.

KILL. This is the only great-grandparent, whose I know other members of his family. There were at least 5 brothers, probably part of a large family. All 5 went west to the California goldrush, coming leaving his family in Mansfield, Ohio (he had been married in Philadelphia); and John and Joseph leaving their families in Platteville, Wisconsin, with the exception of Joseph's son, Charles, who went with them; John was absent for the party and was killed by the Indians. Joseph and Charles died that first year after reaching California - minor's fever.

8. CAPRON, SARINA b. 1800 to 1805 in Vermont, d. 1838 in Platteville.
