

THE LACKORE FAMILY  
 Bloodline of Walter Ellis Lansing  
 Through His Mother,  
 EMILY HUBBARD LACKORE

Early data for this family history is derived from the research, and a book entitled THE LACKOR FAMILY by Mary McCall Middleton<sup>1</sup>. Later information was assembled and recorded by my 1st cousin, Irene Lackore Peterson. Some of this material has been in my possession for many years, but, in the fall of 1978 my wife, Elsie, and I visited a double cousin, Archibald Guy Lackore, and his wife Lucille. They shared with me a large quantity of Xeroxed newspaper clippings concerning Lackore family reunions, weddings, obituaries, social events, etc. In addition, I have obtained copies of vital records and have corresponded with descendants of the Lackore family who have done research on other lines. Mrs Middleton has provided fifteen pages of worksheets - supplemental to her book which almost certainly ties the fourth generation of her book to my great-grandfather, William Lackore, born 4 January 1809. With this material as a basis, my parents' Family Bible, National Census records and historical publications, I shall attempt herein to compile a record of my maternal family background.

I would urge that those who desire more complete information on this family purchase a copy of Mrs. Middleton's book which won the first award in a contest sponsored by The American Society of Genealogists for excellence in genealogical arrangement, proper citation of sources, thoughtful evaluation of the evidence, and careful research.

This record starts with "John Lacore". Nothing at all has been learned of his background or how he arrived in this country. He may have been in a large group of French Huguenots who settled in Massachusetts, or he might have come from England or Scotland.

The spelling of his name does not help to solve his origin. Sometimes three or four different spellings occur for one person. From 1701 until about 1860, the following variations are found:

Mrs. Middleton uses several different spellings - primarily Lacore, Lackor and Lackore. For this record I shall use the spelling, LACKORE, as was used in recent generations of my family line.

In the first 24 pages of her book, Mary Middleton carries the line from John Lackore to John Lackore, Jr. (b. about 1706), Lemuel Lackore, (b. 22 June 1745), William (b. c 1781-1784), William, (b. 4 January 1809). I shall not relate the details as given by Mrs. Middleton - only to state, that for those interested in this family, the nominal cost of this book is well worth while - just for these 24 pages.

My first cousin, Irene Lackore Peterson, daughter of John Chester and Emelia Patet Lackore, (b. 19 Feb. 1903, d. 21 April 1979) collected and saved newspaper clippings and other data on the Lackore family. This was done over a period extending from about 1935 to 1979. I have copies of most of this material and pertinent information from this material is used in this record.

#### NUMBERING

Numbers 1 through 55 indicate bloodline relatives and immediate families. Numbers are repeated when male or (in the case of my Mother) female members head, or share head) of families.

Small numbers entered after given names indicate generation, beginning with the first known immigrant family. JOHN LACKORE is given Number 1 and my youngest grandchild, Tiffany Suzanne Lansing Number 55.

1. JOHN<sup>1</sup>, LACKORE was born about 1680. He married Sarah (Hurley) Ferguson, widow of Richard Ferguson, on 11 Aug. 1701. She b. (probably) 23 Dec. 1670. This is the first record of him. They had one son:
2. JOHN, Jr.,<sup>2</sup> LACKORE, (John<sup>1</sup>)  
Born 1706, d. 16 March 1793, age 87. (Westfield Congregational Church register for 1793). John Lackore was living in Chester, Mass. as late as 2 Sept. 1788 (See Middleton's book). He moved with his family to Rutland about 1718 - 1720 where he remained until 1741 or 1742, when he moved to Pelham (Lisbon). Between 28 March 1766 and 19 April 1768 he moved to Murrayfield, Hampshire Co., Mass. "The town of Chester, Hampden County, was formerly called Murrayfield, which, as a plantation, was established as a town October 31, 1765-----February 21, 1783, the name was changed from Murrayfield to Chester".  
John Lackore, Jr. was married in Rutland, Mass., 20 May 1731, intention not recorded, to Margaret Crawford. She was born about 1713, presumably in Ireland. They had 8 children, as follows:

Since only two sons were shown and we do know that John had a son named Lemuel (see Chapter II, note 30) as shown in a deed in 1771, and Lemuel Lackore is listed separately in the 1768 valuation list (Chapter II, note 23) I am presuming this birth refers to Lemuel".
8. SON - (Probably JOHN) LACKORE (Lacore), born 27 February 1749, Pelham, Mass. "This is also a torn record with only the notation "s" for son. A cemetery inscription indicates John "Lackor" died 24 September 1808, aged 58 years; i.e. born 1750, or late in 1749."
9. DAUGHTER - b. 29 March 1751, Pelham, Mass. No further record.
10. DAUGHTER - b. 23 October 1754, Pelham, Mass. No further record.
7. LEMUEL<sup>3</sup>, LACKORE, (John, Jr.<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>1</sup>).  
Born 22 June 1745. Married 12 July 1770 to Editha Eggleston by the Reverend John Ballantine. Served in the Revolutionary War Oct. 21, 1776 to Nov. 17, 1776 (28 days) and from Aug. 17, 1777 to Aug. 23, 1777, (7 days). (Secretary of the Commonwealth, publisher, Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War, IX 'Boston, 1902' 405.) Died, probably in Champion, Jefferson Co., N.Y. between 1820 and 1830. No proof. Lemuel and Editha Eggleston Lackore had 8 children:
11. EDITHA LACKORE, b. 23 March 1771, Murrayfield, Mass. She married 17 Jan. 1795 to Samuel Clapp, Jr., of Southampton.
12. LEMUEL LACKORE, born \*Nov. 1772, Murrayfield, Mass. d. 8 Jan. 1816, age 44 - or 7 Dec. 1816 (\*footnote 19 of The Lackor Book).
13. MARGARET LACKORE, born 31 August 1775 in Murrayfield, Mass. She Married 5 January 1797 to Chester Clapp of Southampton.
14. JOHN LACKORE, b. 9 October 1777, Murrayfield, Mass. Married 25 December 1800 to Lucy Warriner of West Springfield. d. March 1824.

15. NATHANIEL LACKORE, b. 15 June 1780, Westfield, Hampshire County, Mass. Married in Martinsburg, Lewis County, New York to Sarah Weaver, who was born 10 February 1785 in Killingworth, Middlesex County, Conn. (See The Lackor Book for more detail)
16. WILLIAM LACKORE, b. probably between 1781 and 1784 in Westfield. Married 1 May 1808 to Hannah Weaver. She probably born in Killingworth, Middlesex County, Connecticut 1 February 1787, the daughter of Timothy and Sarah (Vaughan) Weaver.
17. JAMES LACKORE - no contact found with this family except 1820 Census in Rutland, Jefferson Co., N.Y. (See Lackor Book).
18. MARTHA LACKORE, b. 17 April 1785, Chester, Mass. d. 21 Feb. 1876. Married 11 June 1807, Lowville, Lewis Co., N.Y. to Johiel (Jehiel) Gillet.
16. WILLIAM<sup>4</sup>, LACKORE, Lemuel<sup>3</sup>, John, Jr.,<sup>2</sup> John<sup>1</sup>.  
Born - no birth date record. The 1820 Census, Champion Town, Jefferson Co., N. Y. lists him in the 26 to 45 age group. He probably was born about 1781 - 1784 - possibly in Westfield, Mass., but no proof of this. He was married 1 May 1808 to Hannah Weaver (see above). Both William Lackore and his wife Hannah (weaver) Lackore were supposed to have died and been buried in Watertown, Jefferson Co., New York, but so far no record has been found of either their death dates or burials. (Letter of 12 June 1980, from Mrs Mary (McCall) Middleton states "We really do believe your William was the first son of William and Hannah (Weaver) Lackore. It's been so long since we worked on it I can't recall now what we used to substantiate it.")\* One of the children of William and Hannah (Weaver) Lackore was named Timothy Weaver Lackore which further substantiates Timothy Weaver as having been Hannah's father. William and Hannah had 5 children:

22. LEMUEL LACKORE, b. ? d. ? Married and resided in South Illinois 3 or 4 children, including a Chester and George. Lemuel Lackore was listed as a blacksmith in Winnebago Co., Iowa in the late 1850's.
23. HANNAH LACKORE, b. ? d. ? Married 4 November 1838 to Augustus Frisbie.

37. WALTER, b. c 1869. Reported to have died with typhoid fever. Never married.
38. MORTIMER ELVIN, b. 13 April 1875, Hayfield, Hancock Co., Iowa. m. 15 Sept. 1897 to Emma Josephine Lansing (sister of Elmer Ellis Lansing), Hayfield?, Iowa. d. 12 July 1925. Bur. Madison Twp Cemetery, Hancock Co., Iowa. They had 5 children: Twila Maude, b. 14 Feb. 1902, Edna Mae b. 1 Aug. 1903, Archibald Guy, b. 13 Oct 1905, Bessie Mildred, b. 25 May 1909, Eva, b. 14 Dec. 1913. (These children are double cousins of the children of Emily Hubbard Lackore Lansing).

45. EVELYN BESSIE LANSING, b. 11 September 1904, Hancock Co., Iowa. Died 15 August 1932 at Ranier, Columbia Co., Oregon. Buried Fern Hill cemetery, near Ranier Oregon. She died from tuberculosis.
46. WALTER ELLIS LANSING, b. 30 December 1907 in Fergus County, Montana. m. Elsie Nail, daughter of Robert Griffith Nail and Catharine Winn, on October 15, 1930.
47. CLYDE EVERETT LANSING, b. 6 June 1914 in Fergus County, Montana. d. 23 March 1972 in Kennewick, Washington. He married Virginia Emmons, daughter of Dee Emmons and Gertrude Read (sister of Harold Read) on 26 July 1936. They had three children: Bruce Dee, b. 11 April 1937, in Salem, Marion Co., Oregon. m. Elizabeth Nash 10 June 1956; Lyle Ellis, b. 18 May 1944, m. Nancy Joan Jorgenson 28 January 1968; Raymond Russell, b. 27 August 1945, m. Barbara Ann Rasmussen 21 August 1965. EMILY HUBBARD LACKORE LANSING was the 6th child, and only daughter, of GEORGE WILMINGTON LACKORE and MARY JANE BALL, who were married 23 October 1861. Following is the only information I have on the Ball family at this time:

EMILY married ELMER ELLIS LANSING, 10 November 1897. They lived in Hancock County Iowa, where her husband farmed and their first two children were born. They moved from Iowa to Swift County, Minnesota, where their third child, Hazel was born; then back again to Iowa where the fourth child, Evelyn was born. In 1907 they moved to a cattle ranch in Fergus County, Montana, where Elmer was in charge of the "River Ranch" for Mr. P. T. Culver, who raised Herford beef cattle. They spent that first winter in a one-room log cabin, where their 5th child, Walter was born on 30 December 1907. Bitter cold, and a raging snow storm prevented all possibility of a doctor's presence, and so delivery was in the charge of the husband and father - Elmer. The young man survived and has lived to undertake the preparation of this genealogical record. Two more children were born in the nearest town of Winifred - Clyde, in 1914 and Lloyd, in 1916.

EMILY was a deeply religious young lady and, a short while before their marriage, Elmer accepted and shared her faith. They became life-long members of the Free Methodist Church of North America. Elmer Ellis was ever one to be searching for "greener pastures", moving from Montana to near Post Falls, Idaho, where he bought a 15-acre truck farm; raising berries, apples, corn, melons, strawberries, hogs and chickens. From there moved for a short period of time to Glenwood, Idaho (near Kamiah) where he and his family operated a shingle mill in partnership with his brother-in-law, Adrain Saunders. Then back to the truck farm again and, in the summer of 1925, selling and moving to Riverside, California. In 1932, they moved again into the area of Salem, Oregon; then, several years later to Ranier, Oregon, where he died in 1942. Emily lived on for several years at their home in Salem, Oregon, and later going to live with her son, Clyde at Wenatchee, Wn., where she died in Sept. 1965. She was buried beside her husband in Fern Hill Cemetery, near Ranier, Oregon.

Staple foods and specialties, such as grapes, apples, nuts, etc., were bought in Lewistown, a distance of 40 miles, by team and wagon. The children's pastime consisted of swimming and fishing in the Judith River, playing games and taming a young herford steer to ride and pull a home-made sled. The father, Elmer Ellis Lansing, homesteaded 160 acres of land near Winifred, Montana, and the family moved there in 1914. Grain, potatoes, chickens and livestock provided the family income. Walter came with his parents to Riverside, California in the summer of 1925, where he completed high school in the spring of 1926. After attending Riverside Junior College and Riverside Business College, he was employed by the United States Department of Agriculture in 1930, where he worked in various capacities (including 25 years as Administrative Officer) until June 1, 1971. He and his wife, Elaine, were members of an agricultural research team in the Near East - South Asia for 5 years, beginning in 1965, where they were headquartered in Teheran, Iran and in New Delhi, India. Their travels have taken them twice around the world and into 35 or more countries. They are now (1981) both retired and living at 2444 Sunset Drive, Riverside, California, 92506, and enjoying full and active lives.

Following are excerpts from two letters from Edna Louise Lackore, daughter of Henry Delos Lackore and Myra Belle Amsden (He b. 14 July 1856, Morgan Park, Ill., she b. 12 May 1860) m. 23 Aug. 1881, Plainville, Kansas. His parents were Timothy Weaver (20) Lackore and 2nd wife, Mary Minerva Prisbie.

Letter #1: 2532 N. Hamlin Ave., Irving Park, Chicago, Ill., Aug. 8, 1907 - addressed to Mrs. LACKOR (i.e. Mrs. ELIZA DANIELS LACKOR, widow of HORACE L. LACKOR<sup>4</sup>, Timothy Smith<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>1</sup>) "Your letter was forwarded me from Seattle to my home here in Chicago. I have an aunt in Seattle, MISS LILLIAN LACKORE, but did not know of anyone else of that name there.... I, myself, have resided in that city four years. But as I belong to the Chicago Lackores you probably have my family all straight. If not I will send any information you require.... My father is HENRY LACKORE and my grandfather, TIMOTHY WEAVER LACKORE. Grandpa had a brother and his many children in Iowa, but you have all those I believe... Sincerely Edna L. Lackore."

Letter #2: Irving Park, Ill., Sept. 28, 1907 - "Dear Mrs. Lackore:- Have been looking up all my family since I received your last letter. I think you could find in the courthouse of Watertown, N.Y. some data. My father has heard his father say that his (T.W.LACKORE's - T.W. stands for TIMOTHY WEAVER LACKORE) grandfather was a Frenchman who spelled his name with a capital C, but had it changed in the courts of Watertown. I have never heard of an ancestor of mine being born on the ocean. The one I just spoke of is as far as I know anything of. One of his sons is the father of T. W. LACKORE and he was a WILLIAM LACKORE who married HANNA WEAVER. They both died in Watertown, leaving four children:

WM. LACKORE of Mason city, Iowa was the oldest, then  
T. W. LACKORE, CHESTER LACKORE, who died when 19 years old; LEMUEL LACKORE who lived in Southern Illinois and had 3 or 4 children. (I have heard of a CHESTER and GEORGE, the latter being married) and HANNAE LACKORE who married AUGUSTUS PRISBIE, the brother of T.W.LACKORE'S 2nd wife.

'WM. LACKORE, of Iowa, married a MISS CHURCH. There is one of the CHURCH family in Chicago, I believe. WM. LACKORE had 7 sons,

HUDSON, JAMES, and WM. are dead, JESSE is single, and  
CHESTER, GEORGE and AUGUSTUS have large families all living in Iowa.

Mrs. GEORGE LACKORE, Hayfield, Iowa, may write to you. She would be more apt than the others. (Note by W.E.L. This is my grandmother, and she would be one most likely to write). My father looked them up last summer and brought home the names I will enclose. . . . . I will write to my aunt in Seattle...She is a nurse like myself so is pretty busy....Sincerely, EDNA L. LACKORE". Following is the list of children she enclosed: i.e. children of WILLIAM LACKORE, brother of T. W. LACKORE, and son of WM. LACKORE of Watertown, N.Y.

1. HUDSON LACKORE of Forest City, Ia., Children: H.J., C.H., & E.O. in business together; LILLIAN, ROSE, DAISY and IDA who was married to an Anderson.
2. JAMES LACKORE - married twice - 13 children - 2 dead.
3. CHESTER LACKORE - 4 children - Mason City, Iowa.
4. AUGUSTUS LACKORE - 8 children - one named LEROY.
5. WM. LACKORE (dead)
6. GEO. LACKORE - children: MORTIMER LACKORE has 2 children, Twila and Edna FRANK LACKORE; 1 daughter, 2 more sons
7. JESSE LACKORE - single

It seems quite evident, from the information supplied by Edna Louise Lackore, record of migration, family names, etc., that my LACKORE line does come from the Lackores of Mary (McCall) Middleton's book. Walter E. Lansing - 1981.

## HISTORY OF IOWA

Excerpts from "History of Iowa - Kosciusko, Hancock and Winnebago Counties, Iowa. Published June 1884 by Union Publishing Company, Springfield, Illinois."

\*The first permanent settlements made by whites within the limits of Iowa, was by Julien Dubuque, in 1768, when, with a small band of miners, he settled on the site of the city that now bears his name, where he lived until his death in 1810."

## EARLY SETTLEMENT

To the reader of local history, the chapter pertaining to the early settlement of a country is of more than general interest. Especially is this true with the pioneers themselves, those who have witnessed the changes that have been made, who have seen this trackless wilderness made to blossom as the rose, and filled with industrious, happy people. He here reads slowly and critically every word, recalling memories of the past, which for a generation have lain buried among a host of recollections, which now rise before him like a dream. His old associations, the deeds, the trials and battles against hunger and cold, while the settlers were few and far between, and wolves howled about the little cabin, sending a chill to his heart, and the wind driving the sifting snow through the crevices--all now arise vividly before him. Often it is with pleasure that he can recall these recollections, viewing with satisfaction the thought that he has lived to see a thrifty and happy land, dotted with school houses and churches, villages and towns, where first he planted his stakes and built his humble home. - - - - -

Less than three decades ago, (30 years) that part of the state of Iowa, now comprising the county of Hancock, was an unbroken wilderness, inhabited only by the wild beasts of the plain, and the birds of the air, and their scarcely less wild conquerors, the red men, who roamed at will over the broad prairies, fishing in its streams, or hunting the game that everywhere abounded, seemingly caring nothing for the morrow, and ever living only in the present. - - - - - The prairies were indeed a grand sight, in the summer, clothed in verdure bright, in the fall, robed in the many-hued garb that tells of the departing year. If a grand sight to see the prairies as the tall grass waved to and fro, it was a magnificent sight in the fall of the year, to see the annual prairie fire as it swept over all. - - Language cannot convey and words cannot express to you the faintest idea of the grandeur and splendor of that mighty conflagration, lighting by a blaze of light, illuminating every object around. - - - - - This county, lying as it does at the headwaters of the Iowa, Boone and Des Moines rivers, and traversed by numerous creeks, had no doubt been visited by white men, for these fertile plains had long been the haunts of trappers and hunters before the actual settlers made their appearance. - - - - - The first attempt at settlement within the limits of what is now Hancock county, was made by Anson Avery, who, with his wife, came here and located at the Upper Grove, in the township since named after him. This was upon the 9th day of September, 1834.

Mr. Avery built a cabin, to shelter him and his from the elements and commenced to open up a farm. He broke the first land and sowed the first grain in the county, on this new breaking, and settled down to pass the winter. Mr. Avery is still a resident of the county (1884), and although his hair is silvered with age, still he retains much of the fire of youth, and bids fair to outlast many of the less rugged younger generation.

In October, 1854, George Nelson, with his family, came to Upper Grove, and settled in the neighborhood of Mr. Avery. - - - - An amusing story is related of a Mr. Stockton, which will be trite to illustrate the character of the man. It seems that in the winter of 1857-58 Judge Clark and others made up a purse of about \$200 and sent Mr. Stockton off to Dubuque to purchase a supply of provisions. Stockton staid about a month, used up a great portion of the money in "seeing the sights", and returned with a barrel of whiskey as the bulk of his cargo. The people had a jolly time, but were rather short of rations.

William Lackore and family located in Forest City, where they have lived since. (Probably 1857) - - - - Martin Bugardner, a pioneer settler, is well remembered by many of the present settlers of the county. He it was who built the court house in Forest City. He is now a resident of Hancock county. - - - - The first settlement of this township (Madison) was effected in September, 1855, by John Maben. On the 27th of that month he located in the eastern edge of that township, on sections 12 and 13, which place he has made his home almost ever since. Mr. Maben has, since his coming, been one of the most prominent and influential citizens in the county and been honored by his fellow citizens with many official positions of trust - - - - .

Later on, among the more prominent of the pioneers of Madison township were James Lackore, Harrison Wheelock, Jacob Seibert and others. James Lackore was born in Jefferson County, N.Y., November 1, 1815. When sixteen years old he removed to Illinois and located within 12 miles of Chicago. He remained there five years and then removed to Iowa, locating in Forest City, Winnebago county. He soon after bought eighty acres of land in Madison township, Hancock county, section 3. He lived in Forest City five years, erecting the first frame house built in that town. He then built a house on his farm and moved there in 1864. In 1868 he bought another eighty acres in Madison township. He has twenty acres of timber in Ellington township, this county, and ten acres of timber in Forest township, Winnebago county. He has been married twice. His first marriage was in 1864 to Sophia Seiberi, of Illinois. Result of union, seven children, four of whom are living--William, Cora, Peter and Jonnie. Mrs. Sophia Lackore died Jan. 9, 1876, aged thirty nine years, five months and twelve days. He was married the second time, Nov. 21, 1879, to Mrs. Elizabeth Schwichtenberg, of Germantown, Hancock county. Result of union, two children--Arthur Pearl and Ervin Millard. Mrs Lackore had three children by her first husband--Martha Mary, Alice Lida and Ida Nettie. Mrs. Lackore is a member of the Germantown M. E. church. Mr. Lackore is a Republican. In 1864, he enlisted in the Iowa regiment, company F and served under Gen. A. J. Smith until the close

of the War, participating in the battle of Spanish Fort and many skirmishes of minor note. His parents, William and Elizabeth Lackore, live in Forest City. Mrs. Lackore's mother died seven years ago. Her father lives in Allamakee county, Iowa.

The first school house was erected in 1858, and is what is known as the Barker school house. - - - - It was a frame structure 18 x 30 feet, and cost in the neighborhood of \$600 to build. - - - - The Steiff, or Lackore school house was erected in 1869 on section 3 and is a brick edifice 20 x 36 feet in dimension and cost \$800. The first teacher here was Mr. Walker. A cemetery was laid out as a public burial place in 1864, on section 11. The first interment was that of Charles R. Wright, who came into this township in 1856 and died in the year 1859 while county surveyor. Mr. Wright was the first citizen of the township to die, and was buried at Forest City, but on the laying out of the cemetery, his remains were exhumed and brought to this place and reburied. (This cemetery is still known as Madison Township Cemetery and a great many of the Lackore family members are buried there). The first birth occurred in January, 1856, and was that of a son of Thomas Bearse. The first marriage was that between James J. Barker and Harriet Dawson, which took place in 1860.

#### Winnebago County

The first white settlement was made in the county in 1854 and 1855. Philip Tennis, George Thomas, John Maben and Thomas Bearse were the first to settle in the county. Others soon followed.

In 1857 a postoffice was established in Forest City, with Robert Clark postmaster, and in 1858 a mail route was secured from Clear Lake to Algona, by way of Forest City, with Joseph Hewett mail-carrier. Previous to this the settlers were required to go to Mason City for their mail. - - - - At this time, the earliest settlers were obliged to go to Cedar Falls, a distance of 100 miles, for flour.

Some amusing things have occurred in the history of the county. The standard of religion and morality was not of the highest type, and early preachers were not always received with the respect usually accorded to those in clerical robes. The first preacher that filled stated appointments was an itinerant Methodist minister by the name of Hankins, who traveled a circuit of some 50 or 60 miles, and who, to all appearances, had been a rough character before he experienced religion. He traveled his circuit with an old horse and buggy. While preaching at Forest City he had offended some of the worldly-minded people, and in order to retaliate, some wicked son of Belial suggested the idea of taking the burs off his buggy. The suggestion met with favor and the burs were taken from the axle of the buggy. He hitched up his horse to make the next appointment without discovering what had been done, and started off at his usual gait, but had not proceeded far before a wheel run off and let him down. He returned with the Old Man Adam fully aroused, and would have administered severe physical punishment had he discovered the guilty party. Soon after this a preacher was holding services in Forest City one night, when some wicked boys took a donkey and placed him in the entrance of the building where he was preaching, and by torturing the poor brute, induced the donkey to sing one of his songs. The preacher, hearing the music, and taking in the situation at once, remarked: "I have heard of the devil going about like a roaring lion, but tonight he has taken the form of a braying ass".

In the fall of 1883 the medical profession of Forest City was represented by Drs. W. H. Jones, J. A. Hewitt, J. W. David, H. R. Irish and W. R. Franklin. (Dr. Irish was the Lackore family doctor for many years). Dr. Harry H. Irish was born in Dane county, Wisconsin, October 1, 1860. His parents were David and Harriet (Brown) Irish, who located in Dane county in 1853. Dr. Irish graduated from the medical department of the Iowa State University with the class of 1883 and soon after came Forest City where he is associated with Dr. W. H. Jones, the oldest practicing physician in the county.

#### Miscellaneous

The following account of a frightful runaway is taken from the Winnebago Summit of July 29, 1890:

'The worst accident that ever occurred in Winnebago county happened on last Sunday afternoon. A wagon containing eleven persons started to go out on the prairie west of town. As the team started down the hill by the gravel pit, which is quite steep, the horses started to run. Uncle William Lackore and George Dunaway sat on the front seat, the latter driving his own team. Mr. Lackore attempted to assist in stopping the team, and in some way they were turned to one side, overturning the wagon and throwing all of the occupants violently to the ground. Mrs. George Dunaway was killed outright, Mrs. L. C. Green, daughter of Mrs. Dunaway, had her right elbow dislocated, and was badly bruised about the head, face and limbs; her little daughter had her left arm jammed, and was badly shaken up. Mrs. William Lackore had both arms broken and is also cut about the head. Uncle William Lackore is bruised up considerable; George Dunaway is badly injured about the back; Mrs. Gambell was slightly hurt on the right hand, and Mrs. Clark and her daughter were slightly injured. Jesse Lackore was the only one of the entire load who was not hurt; as the wagon upset, he jumped and fortunately escaped uninjured. Drs. Jones and Hewitt were called at once, and did all that lay in their power to alleviate the wounds of the suffering, and the injured are doing as well as could be expected.

#### Forest City and Forest Township

This beautiful and enterprising little city was laid out in the spring of 1856, by Robert Clark, afterwards county judge. - - - To those who have watched its progress from its earliest origin, when Winnebago county was but a wild prairie country, until the present time, the accomplishment of bygone days would seem now like a great task, but it is in fact the legitimate result of an advanced state of civilization.

Forest City is in Forest township, and is situated in the south part of the county about one-half a mile from the south line and nearly seven miles from the eastern boundary. - - - - - In October 1858, Forest City was made the county seat of Winnebago county. The following is a list of names of the citizens at this time: Robert Clark, Charles H. Day, B. P. Denslow, A. E. Curtis, William Gilbert, B. A. Hill, Cornelius Baker Avery Baker, John S. Blowers, A. T. Cole, James Church, Charles Church, James Lackore, William Lackore, George Lackore, C. H. Lackore, Harrison Beadle, George Beadle, John Haben, Charles Lutz, David Stancliff, Nathan Jeffords, John Jeffords, Charles Bice, Thomas Bearnse, A. P. Harper, Sylvester Belcher, Martin Emgariner, H. G. Bottsford and George Strong.

### First Things

The first child born in Forest City was Brentner Clark, son of Robert and Rebecca (Brentner) Clark. He was born in the summer of 1858.

Shortly after the organization of the county in October, 1857, Judge Clark officiated at the first marriage ceremony ever performed in the county or in Forest City. The contracting parties were Sylvester Belcher and Viola Lackore.

The first to die in Forest City was Samuel Jeffords in the fall of 1859. He died of lung disease.

The first house within the corporate limits of Forest City was built in the spring of 1856, by Robert Clark, in the Elmerhassett block.

The first store was built where the City Bank now stands, by Alexander Long, in the fall of 1856.

The first school was taught in 1856, by Sarah Beadie. The house in which the school was held was the one build by Nathan Jeffords.

Rev. Hankins, a Methodist minister, preached the first sermon in a little building used by the county officers, and called the 'court house'.

Forest City was incorporated June 25, 1878. The first officers were as follows: Mayor, Eugene Secor; Recorder, A. H. Chase; Marshal, L. C. Green; Councilmen, C. H. Lackore, T. C. Hanson, B. A. Plummer, H. Lansett, J. W. Mahoney and W. O. Hanson.

In 1883 the officers were: Mayor, J. F. Thompson; Clerk, S. K. Gregg; Treasurer, J. E. Howard; Marshal, Elwood Alexander; Councilmen, Eugene Secor, B. A. Plummer, C. H. Lackore, W. O. Hanson, H. Lansett and J. W. Mahoney."
