LATHROP

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The surname Lothrop or Lathrop is derived from the parish owthorpe. Thorp means village; so the name literally signifies low village". The surname is on record in Yorkshire, where it as been common from 1216.

The Lathrop family is among the oldest of the Colonial amilies who settled in New England for expressing and living coording to their honest religious Convictions, and they secured amounty from further persecution only on their promise to leave he country.

Reverend John Lathrop, the American ancestor of this family, as baptized in Elton, Yorkshire, England, December 20, 1584, and died November 8, 1653. He was one of those who suffered apprisonment for ministering to a nonconforming congregation. Is wife, with her large family of children, petitioned in person or his release, but died 1633, before he was liberated. He was curate in Egerton, Kent, England, and removed to London in 1624, here he became the 2nd pastor of the first Congregational Church, t Southwark. He and forty-three members of his church were imprisoned by order of the Archbishop Laud, April 29, 1632, because many practiced the (new) teaching of the New Testament. Upon romising to leave the country they were released.

Reverend Lathrop came to New England to Massachusetts. He as admitted a freeman of Plymouth colony, 1636-37, and two years atter removed, with a large part of the membership of his church, Barnstable. He was a man of great piety and energy, and did ach to further the secular, as well as the spiritual, welfare of the Colony.

He married (first) in England, October 10, 1610, Hannah House, sughter of Rev. John House (and Alice House), rector of stwell in Kent. He married (second) about 1635, Ann, daughter of lliam and Elizabeth (Paine) Hammond of Levenham, County of sffolk, England.

REVEREND JOHN LOTHROPPE

John L. Lathroppe was baptized in Etton (Elton), Yorkshire, December 20, 1584. He was educated at Queen's College, Cambridge, There he was matriculated in 1601 and received his B.A. in 1605 and its M.A. in 1609.

Authentic records next locate him in Egerton, 48 miles Southeast rom London, in the Lower Half Hundred of Calebill, Lathe of Scray, county of Kent, as Curate of the parish Church there. To this living was admitted about 1611 by the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul. Our aptismal records show that he was there in the Fall of 1614, and the ast report of his family there, was in the Fall of 1619. It was probably is first and only parish charge as a minister of the Anglican Church. The Church in which he officiated was an ancient structure standing on the summit of a rounded hill and could be seen from a great distance.

Here Mr. Lothroppe labored faithfully as long as his judgment ould approve the ritual and government of the Anglican Church. But hen he could no longer do this, we find him conscientiously renouncing is orders and asserting the right of still fulfilling a ministry to hich his heart and conscience had called him.

He left Egerton in 1623 and the next year he was called to succeed he Rev. Henry Jacob, an independent Minister. Rev. Jacob's Church as situated on Union Street, Southwark, and from the burial lot atached to it, was still later known as the Deadman's Place.

His wife, Hannah Howse Lothroppe, died while he was in the old link prison in Newgate for his religious beliefs.



He spelled his name Lothropp. He was eduexted in Queen's College, Cambridge, graduating in 1601 with the degree of B. A. and tale-ing his master's degree in 1600. He became corate of the parish church in Egelton in the Lower Half Hundred of Calchill, Lathe of Servy, county Kent. He was there as early as 1614, probably in 1614 and as late as the rall of 1619, and it was doubtless his first and only parish as minister of the Church of England. When he could no longer subscribe to the cross of that church, he renounced his orders in 1623 and allied himself with the Paritans. In 1624 he was called to succeed Rev. Henry Jacob, an independent minister of the First Independent Church of London, who had resigned to go to Virginia. The worship of this church was illegal and their meetings secret. The church was discovered by a spy secret. The church was discovered by a spy named Temlinson and forty-two made prisoners, eighteen being allowed to escape, April 22, 1632. The Puritan prisoners were con-signed to the old Clinic prison in Newgate and in the Gatchouse. In the spring of 1634 all were released on ball except Mr. Lathrop. In the quaint language of Nathuniel Morton in the "New England Memorial" (1069) the story of his further stay in England is briefly told: "His wife fell sick, of which sickness she died. He procured liberty of the hishop to visit his wife before her death, and commended her to God by prayer, who soon gave up the ghost. At his return to prison his poor children, being many, remired to the hishop at Lambeth, and made known unto him their miserable condition, by reason of their good father's being continued in close durance, who commiserated their condition so far as to grant him liberty who soon after came over into New England." "He came to Boston with part of his flock in the ship, "Griffin," and another sailing in the fall of 1634 and arriving September 18, proceeded to Schutz, where time pionners had already located, and prepared the way for others. He was formally chosen pastor January 19, 1034. He married again Anna -, and was granted a farm near the First Herring brook and had shares in the salt murabes. He left his home in Scituate after some disagreement in the church, and with others from Sciunte located at Barnstable on Cape Cod, arriving October 17, 1639, bringing with them the crops they had raised in Schnate. Mr. Lathrop fearlessly proclaims in old and New England the great truth that

man is not responsible to his fellowman in matters of faith and conscience. Differences of epinion be tolerated. During the fourteen years that he was pastor of the Barnstable church, such was his influence over the people, that the power of a civil magistrate was not needed to restrain crime. No paster was ever more beloved by his people, none ever had a greater issumence for good, * * * To become a sumber of his claurch no applicant was compelled to sign a creed or confession of faith. He retained his freedom, he professed his faith in God, and promised that it should be his constant endeavor to keep His commandments, to live a pure life and to walk in love with his irrethran." He stood among the Puriture, a Congregational of the Uni-turian denomination, as we now class them, Morton says: "He was a man of humble and Imoken heart spirit, lively in Dispensation of tive Word of God, studious of peace, furnished with godly contentment, willing to spend and be spent for the cause of the Church of Christ." 3rd generation # 30 children of Joseph Lothrop

Hore, born 15 July, 1671, married 15 Nov. 1696, Elizabeth Lathrop, who was born in Barnatable 15 Nov. 1677, a daughter of Melatian fathron, [219]. They settled first in Barnatable, where he is encelled among the townsmen in 1695, and where the oldest of their children were born. He subsequently moved to Falmouth, "ass. and still later to Connecticut. He purchased 150 acres of land in Tollend, in 1726, of Daniel Ecton. The deed identifies him as from Falmouth in the county of Barnatable, in his Mejerty's province of Manachusetts Tay. Welde, in his Tolland, records the tradition that he was brother instead of father, to John, also then resident of Tolland. How early he removed with his family, if indeed as a family they ever came to Connecticut, we have no data to show. The tradition is that they remided for years in Hartford, and also that for a time at least they lived in Sharon, Conn. He died Oct. 20, 1736, and she died Feb. 21, 1763.

2nd generation

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Joseph, contid

"Joseph Lothropp and Pary Annull marryed alsoe by him (Brother Thomas Hinckley) Dec. 11, 1650." He actiled and lived in Bernstable, where his news on the local records show him to have been an enterprising and hanged man. He was deputy for the town in the general court of the State for fifthen years, and for twenty-one years merved as one of the selectmen of the town. In the organization of the county, he was appointed the register of the probate court, and recorded in 1566 the first deed out on record in the county. The court had appointed him in 1653 to keep the ordinary of the town. He was admitted freeman June 6, 1655. In 1644 we find him as acting constable, and in 1667 a receiver of excise. That he was also in the militery line is shown in the titles of lieutenant and captain which successively mark his name.

Mr. Freemen, in his history of Cape Cod County, smerks of him as a "conspicuous number of the Council of Mar in 1676." He also remorts lieut. Joseph Laythorne and his brother Barnabes Laythorne as commissioned to hold select courts in Barnateble in 1679; and names both of these brothers among the agents for the settlement of Singeren.

His standing in still further shown to a letter from Capt. William Seast written from Cases, in September, 1679, to Gov. Thomas Hinckley, reporting his skinnishes with the 3 stern Indians. At the close of this report the captain presents his own and his limitenants sarvice to the Governor, Esq. Lathrop and Mr. Russell. We know enough of that day to be assured that none but a prominent and public men would be thus complimented.

Mr. Lothron probably had no collegiste aducation, yet he must have been a well aducated man-probably with a legal aducation. His will hears date Oct. 9,1700, and was proved Apr. 9, 1702, between which ustos his death, of which no record is preserved, must have occurred. He names in his will as heirs, his four sons, Samuel, Barnabes, Hope, to whom he left the homestead, and Thomas; and his two daughters, hery Denes and Elizabeth Puller.

In the 'nventory of his estate are reported 27 volumes of law books, and 43 volumes of classics and serson books, the 'nventory amounting to 5216 pounds. One other item of the inventory--"three negroes,"-- shows that it belonged to an age past now beyond recall.
