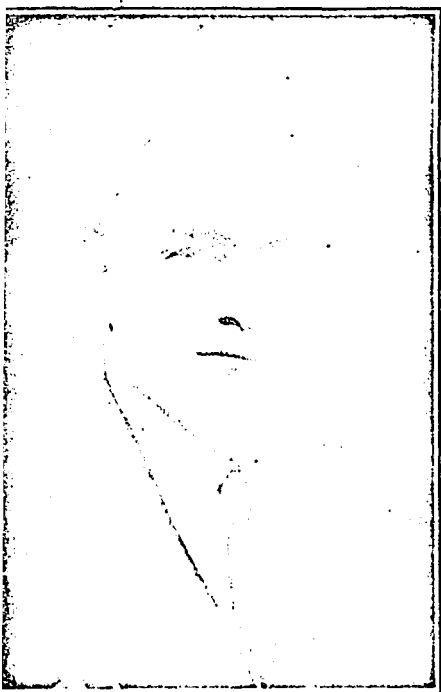

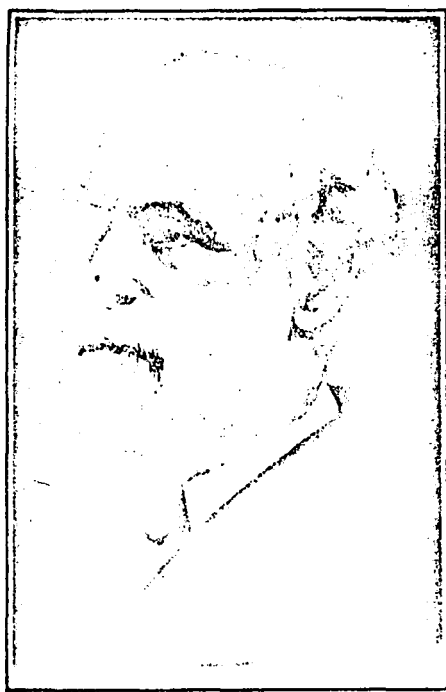

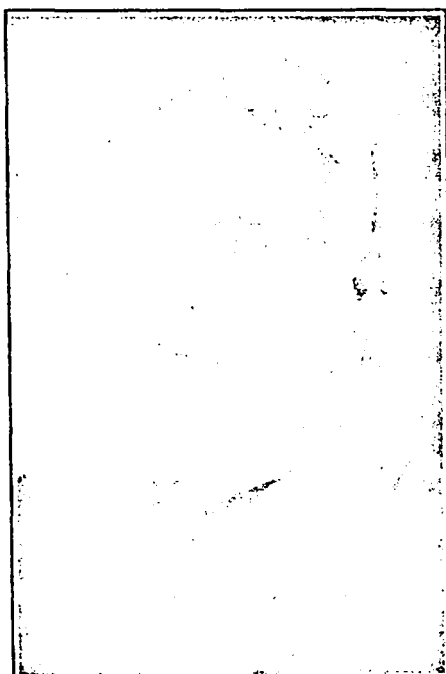

(A) INTRODUCTION



THE Lee Family is among the forty-nine "best families" selected by the American Historical-Genealogical Society for whom the Society has published family histories during the past few years.

The Lee Family has been prominent in the British Empire and in the United States, its members having played important roles in war and in peace. Family pride is a commendable trait and should be cultivated. All Lees have just cause to be proud of their family history and traditions.

In references No. 7 and No. 14 we find the following regarding the origin and meaning of the name Lee:

The surname of Lee is of a common origin with Lea, Leigh, Lye, Legh, Lehe, Lyra, Leighe, Lyhe—all derived from the Saxon lay or leah, meaning "the pasture, the place, the meadow or grassy plain." Thus in very ancient records we find "John de la Lee," "del Lee," "at lee," etc.

We can readily see that families of a widely differing origin may have the name of Lee merely because of their residence upon pasture or untilled land. Consequently the early history of many old county families of the name in England is traced to between the years 1050 and 1300 A. D., and then lost in obscurity.

It has been found that county Cheshire was the cradle of the Lees, and a long, interesting roll bearing the name may be found in the county history of England.

The data in this volume is gathered from reliable sources. We have selected what we consider the most important material. Many of the daughters and sons for whom no issue was shown, have been omitted from the pedigree. A missing symbol indicates that a name has been omitted. Those desiring further information are advised to consult the volumes mentioned in the list of References.

The compiler hopes that, in producing this volume, he is bringing to the Lee Family information which will be of interest and value to them, and that he is rendering an important service to the public. He and his associates will be glad to give their co-operation to members of the family who are interested in having a complete genealogy of the family published.

Unless otherwise plainly shown, the persons in this volume whose names are accompanied by three figures are children of the immediately preceding persons bearing immediately preceding numbers. All persons in each group bearing the same letter as a part of their numbers are directly related. Three generations of the descendants of those bearing numbers of three figures are represented as follows. However, some of our material is published as copied from various records without rearrangement according to this system.

(B) THE LEE COAT OF ARMS



COAT of Arms is an emblem or a device which is displayed by titled persons, persons of royal blood, and their descendants. Coats of Arms were originally used for purposes of identification and recognition on the field of battle as well as in civil life.

It is claimed by some writers that Coats of Arms, in a crude form, were used by Noah's sons after the flood. There are records of other Coats of Arms, in one crude form or another, at different periods of ancient history. Heraldry, however, as we know it today, did not become of much importance until soon after the invasion of England by William the Conqueror, A. D. 1066. Heraldry became of general interest at about the time of the Crusades.

The Lee Coat of Arms shown in the front of this volume is the Arms of the Lees of Shropshire, created 1641. Coats of Arms very similar to it are used by the Lees of Langley, co. Salop (bart., extinct 1660), who were descended from Richard Lee, High Sheriff of Salop, 1479; the Lees of Coton, co. Salop; and many others. Numerous other branches of the Lee family have Coats of Arms resembling it.

This is the most widely used of all Lee Coats of Arms and has been in existence for many centuries. It is described in BURKE'S GENERAL ARMORY, BURKE'S LANDED GENTRY, BURKE PEERAGE AND BARONETAGE, Crozier's AMERICAN ARMORY and other reliable works on heraldry, in some cases accompanied by illustrations and pedigrees. It is the arms of the Lee family of Virginia, and has been used for generations by their descendants and by many other American branches of the Lee family.

This Coat of Arms is to be found in the Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge, one of the most sacred spots in America. The first Choir Pew in the Chapel was the gift of the Society of the Lees in Virginia, and was formally presented by the Hon. Blair Lee on behalf of the Society, June 5, 1926, and dedicated in the presence of more than fifty members of this distinguished family. The memorial Choir Pew is of hand-carved oak, and on the Pew ends, Continental soldiers kneel in prayer. In the center of the Pew

back are carved and colored the arms of the Lee family, with the date Anno Domini, 1641, and the motto, "Non Incautus Futuri." The inscription also carved and colored, is as follows:

The family of Lee is one of the most ancient in the records of English history. In the eleventh century the name of Launcelot Lee is associated with

William the Conqueror, and in the division of the spoils by that chieftain, a fine estate in Essex was bestowed upon him. Lionel Lee raised a company of gentlemen cavaliers, at the head of whom he accompanied Richard Coeur de Leon in the Third Crusade, 1192. For gallant conduct at the Siege of Acre he was made Earl of Litchfield, and another estate was given to the family, which was later called "Ditchly." They were devoted followers of the Stuarts, and distinguished for their loyalty to the Crown, and for their acts of valor received various honors and distinctions. Two of the name have been knights of the Garter and their banners surrounded by Lee arms may be seen in St. George's Chapel, Windsor.

Lee of Coton

The family of Lee, of Stanton, Roden, etc., and afterwards of Langley and of Coton, Salop, is stated to be one of the oldest in England. Eyton treating of Reynor de Le about 1195 gives also an unbroken descent from the Stantons of Stanton Hineheath from 1086.

ALFRED THEOPHILUS: B.A., M.A., LL.D., D.C.L. (1829-1833); topographer; son of Sir J. Theophilus of Lauriston Hall, Torquay; in 1871 was secretary to church Defense Institution and Tithe Redemption Trust; in 1877 preacher at Gray's Inn. Among his more important writings is "The New Burial Act—What It Does, and Does Not Do."

CHARLES: (1731-1782); American Major-General; belonged to old Cheshire family of Lee of Lea and afterwards of Dernhall; son of Maj.-Gen. John Lee. He purchased an estate in Shenandoah Valley, Va.; in 1764 became major-general in Polish Army; went to New York and commanded right wing of Washington's army.

CROMWELL: (d. 1601); compiler of Italian-English Dictionary; settled in Oxford, where he compiled his dictionary as far as word "tralignats." A manuscript copy is now in St. John's College Library. His grandson, Henry, of Craig Castle, Co. of Tipperary, purchased land, 1678, at Barna and his descendants are at Barna.

EDWARD: B.A., M.A., B.D., D.D. (1482 (?) -1544); archbishop of York; lord mayor of London; fellow of St. Mary Magdalene College, Oxford, 1500; in 1529 was chancellor of church of Salisbury; in 1530 received prebend of York, and also of royal chapel of St. Stephen's, Westminster; aided king in matter of a divorce.

EDWIN: M.D. (d. 1870); medical writer; gave public demonstrations in England on lithotripsy, for which the college surgeons awarded him the Jacksonian prize; member College of Surgeons and of various foreign medical associations; fellow of Royal Medico-Chirurgical Society of London; author of many books. His writings, including translation of L. Aime' Martins' "The Education of Mothers," 1860.

VICE-ADMIRAL FITZROY HENRY: (1699-1750); son of Edward Henry (first earl of Lichfield and his wife, Lady Charlotte Fitzroy, natural dau. of Charles II and Duchess of Cleveland). He entered the navy and in 1748 became vice-admiral of the white.

FRANCIS: B.A., M.A., B.D., M.D. (1661-1719); miscellaneous writer; chief founder of Philadelphian Society. His acquaintance with Oriental literature gained him popular name of "Rabbi Lee."

FREDERICK RICHARD: (1799-1879); painter and royal academician; exhibited at British institutions, the Royal Academy, National Gallery, South Kensington Museum; an honorary retired academician of Royal Academy, 1877.

SIR GEORGE: B.C.L., D.C.L. (1700-1758); lawyer and politician; son of Sir Thomas (second baronet) and brother of Sir William (judge); till death held offices of dean of archers and judge of prerogative court of Canterbury; knighted and made a privy counsellor.

GEORGE ALEXANDER: (1802-1851); musical composer; was in Lord Barrymore's service as "tiger" when a boy; was the first to bear that title; leased various theatres; was composer and musical director to Strand Theatre and later held similar post at Olympic.

HON. GEORGE HENRY: Third Earl of Lichfield (1718-1772); chancellor of Oxford University; sat in House of Lords; custos brevium in court of common pleas; bequeathed £7000 in consols to found the Lichfield clinical professorship at Oxford.

HON. GEORGE HENRY: M.A., M.P.; son of Hon. George Henry and succeeded him as third Earl of Lichfield and custos brevium. Was lord of the exchequer in 1760 and a privy councillor in 1762.

HARRIETT: (b. 1757); novelist and dramatist; aided sister Sophia in keeping a private school at Belvidere House, Bath; in 1786 published "The Misfortunes of Innocence," a novel in five volumes. She and her sister were first to predict future eminence of Sir Thomas Lawrence, who presented to them portraits by himself of Mrs. Siddons, John Kemble and Gen. Paoli.

SIR HENRY: (1530-1610); master of ordinance (son of Sir Anthony (d. 1550 (?)) of Borston, Buckinghamshire; M.P. for the county). Henry became master of the leash; was knighted, 1553; served as member of parliament for Buckinghamshire; was esteemed a model knight.

HENRY: (1765-1836); author of "Caleb Quotem"; early contributed poetical articles to Moore's Almanacks; owned and managed theatres at Taunton and other places.

HENRY: (1826-1888); naturalist of Brighton Aquarium and for a time rector; a fellow in several London societies and very popular.

JAMES: (1715-1795); nurseryman in partnership with Lewis Kennedy at Chiswick, Hammersmith; introduced many exotic plants into cultivation in this country—the fuchsia among them.

JAMES PRINCE: B.A., M.A. (1804-1869); bishop of Manchester; son of Stephen, secretary librarian of Royal Society; at Cambridge was "one of most distinguished classical scholars ever known in university"; nominated by Lord John Russell to newly-constituted See of Manchester; consecrated his first church on day enthroned, and his 130th church on Saturday before his death, 1869; promoted establishment of Manchester Free Library, bequeathing his own library to Owens College, Manchester; left £1000 to provide two annual prizes for encouraging study of New Testament in Greek.

HON. JOHN: (1733-1793); lawyer and politician; member family settled in Leeds since early part of 16th century; in 1780 became a king's counsel; solicitor-general and member of parliament for Clitheroe in Lancashire; at the bar was known as "honest Jack Lee," distinguished for integrity and amassed fortune.

JOHN: (d. 1804); wood-engraver; member London school of wood-engraving. His son James, wood-engraver, was largely employed in illustrating books.

JOHN: M.D., D.D. (1779-1859); principal of Edinburgh University, 1840; chaplain in ordinary to king, 1830; moderator of general assembly, 1844; collected library of 20,000 volumes.

JOHN: B.A., M.A., LL.D. (1783-1866); collector of antiquities and man of science; member, treasurer and librarian of College of Advocates.

JOHN EDWARD: (1808-1887); antiquarian and geologist; traveled several years, visiting Russia and Scandinavia; settled at Caerleon Priory, Montshire, devoting years to study of Roman remains. His chief work was "Isca Silurum," an "Illustrated Catalogue of the Museum of Antiquities at Caerleon," 1862.

JOSEPH: (1780-1859); enamel-painter of miniatures from life; also copied pictures and exhibited at Royal Academy; an enamel painting by him is at South Kensington Museum.

MATTHEW: B.A., M.A., M.B., M.D. (1694-1755); benefactor to Christ Church, Oxford; in 1739 was physician to Frederick, Prince of Wales; among

other bequests gave a sum of money for establishment of exhibitions at Westminster School.

NATHANIEL: B.A. (1653 (?) - 1692); dramatist; educated at Westminster School; became an actor. His first essay in blank verse (his best known tragedy), a triumphant success, was called "The Rival Queens or the Death of Alexander the Great."

SIR RICHARD: (1513 (?) - 1575); military engineer; in 1528 was page of the king's cups; in 1533 served with army at Calais; in 1573 the Earl of Essex requested him to go to Ireland to construct a fort near Belfast. A Latin epitaph commemorating Lee and his family is in chancel of St. Peter's Church, St. Albans.

RICHARD NELSON: (1806-1872); actor and dramatist; b. Kew, the day of Nelson's public funeral, a circumstance to which he owed his second name; managed several theatres and wrote over 200 pantomimes and plays; in British museum Catalogue the "Life of a Fairy" is assigned to "Nelson Lee."

ROBERT: D.D. (1804-1868); prof. at Edinburgh; in 1843 became minister of church and parish of old Gueyfriars, Edinburgh.

ROBERT: M.D., F.R.S. (1793-1877); obstetric physician; member Edinburgh College of Surgeons and fellow and licentiate of Royal College of Physicians. In 1835 was lecturer on midwifery and diseases of women at St. George Hospital.

ROWLAND: LL.B. (d. 1543); bishop of Coventry and Lichfield; lord president of council in marches of Wales; from 1531-1534 was constantly employed in the king's service. His brother, Rev. George, LL.B., succeeded his brother, Rev. Rowland, in benefice at Ashdon, and was by his means preferred to be master of St. John's Hospital, Lichfield; prebendary of Bishopshill and of Wellington; treasurer of Lichfield; and lastly, dean of St. Chad's, 1542.

SAMUEL: M.A. (1625-1691); puritan divine; minister of St. Botolph's, Bishopsgate; preached in London and Oxford.

SAMUEL: B.A., M.A., B.D., D.D. (1783-1852); orientalist; master of eighteen languages; rector of Barley Hertfordshire; superintended publication of the prayer book in Hindustani; wrote a history of the Abyssinian and Syrian churches.

SOPHIA: (1750-1824); novelist and dramatist; sister of Harriet and daughter of John (actor); founded a school for young ladies at Belvidere House, Bath.

CAPT. THOMAS: (d. 1601); captain in Ireland and supporter of Robert (Earl of Sussex); was Protestant Englishman; in 1597 was created provost-marshal of Connaught; commanded the party that killed Leagh Mac-Hugh O' Byrne among the Nicklow mountains. He wrote "A Brief Declaration of the Government of Ireland," etc.

SIR WILLIAM: (1688-1754); judge (his grandfather was Sir Thomas (d. 1691), a baronet and member of parliament for Aylesbury). In 1728 William was made a king's counsel and attorney-general to Prince of Wales.

WILLIAM: (1809-1865); water-color painter; member and secretary, Langham Sketching Club, all souls Pl., London; member Institute of Painters in Water Colors. His "French Fisherwomen" is in South Kensington Museum.

REV WILLIAM: D.D. (1815-1883); archdeacon of Dublin. In 1863 Dr.

Trench, archbishop of Dublin, made him examining chaplain; in 1864 preferred him to archdeaconry of Dublin and the rectory of St. Peter. In private life few men were more fascinating. Among his more important writings is "The Speaker's Commentary on the Holy Bible."

Charles (Va.). Major-General Continental Army, 17th June, 1775. By the act of 20th July, 1776, it was "Resolved, that the thanks of the United States of America be given to Major-General Lee * * * and the officers and soldiers under their command, who, on the 28th June last, repulsed with so much valor, the attack which was made on that day on the State of South Carolina by the fleet and army of his Britannic majesty." Taken prisoner at Baskenridge, 13th December, 1776; exchanged 6th May, 1778; informed that his services were no longer required, 10th January, 1780 (Died 2d October, 1782.)

Daniel (Mass.). Lieutenant 3d Massachusetts, 1st January, 1777; Regimental Quartermaster, 1st January to 1st October, 1777, Regimental Paymaster, 1st October, 1777, to 21st September, 1778; Brigade Major, September, 1778, to 21st December, 1778; Captain Lieutenant, 31st March, 1780; Captain 1st February, 1781; retired 1st January, 1783.

Elisha (Conn.). Sergeant in the Lexington Alarm, April, 1775; 2d

Lieutenant 6th Connecticut, 1st May to 19th December, 1775; 1st Lieutenant 10 Continental Infantry, 1st January to 31st December, 1776; Captain 4th Connecticut, 1st January, 1777; resigned 22d May, 1778. (Died 15th October, 1815.)

Erza (Conn.). Sergeant 10th Continental Infantry, 1st January, 1776; Ensign, 11th October, 1776; Ensign 1st Connecticut, 1st January, 1777; 2d Lieutenant, 1st January, 1778; 1st Lieutenant, 5th June, 1778; Regimental Quartermaster, 16th November 1778, to 1st January, 1781; transferred to 5th Connecticut, 1st January, 1781, and paymaster of same, June, 1781, to June, 1782, when retired. (Died 29th October, 1821.)

Francis Lightfoot (Va.). A signer of the Declaration of Independence; died 3d April, 1797.

Henry (Va.). ("Light Horse Harry.") Captain of a Company Virginia Dragoons, 18th June, 1776; company attached to and formed part of the 1st Continental Dragoons, 31st March, 1777. By the act of 7th April, 1778, it was "Resolved, whereas Captain Henry Lee, of the Light Dragoons, by the whole tenor of his conduct during the last campaign, has proved himself a brave and prudent officer, rendered essential service to his country, and acquired to himself and the corps he commanded, distinguished honor, and, it being the determination of Congress to reward merit, Resolved, that Captain H. Lee be promoted to the rank of Major-Commandant; that he be empowered to augment his present corps by enlistment of two troops of horse to act as separate corps." By the act of 24th September, 1779, it was "Resolved, that the thanks of Congress be given to Major Lee for the remarkable prudence, address and bravery displayed in the attack on the enemy's fort and work at Powles' Hook, and that they approve the humanity shewn in circumstances prompting to severity, as honorable to the arms of the United States, and correspondent to the noble principles on which they were assumed, and that a gold medal emblematic of this affair be struck under the direction of the Board of Treasury, and presented to Major Lee." On 21 October, 1780, his Battalion was designated Lee's Partisan Corps; Lieutenant-Colonel of same, 6th November, 1780, and served to close of war; Major-General United States Army, 19th July, 1798; honorably discharged 15th June, 1800. (Died 25th March, 1818.)

Isaac (Conn.). Colonel Connecticut Militia, 1775-1776. (Died 1802.)

James (Pa.). Captain 2d Continental Artillery, 1st January, 1777; resigned 11th December, 1779; name also spelled Lees.

John (Va.). Ensign 1st Virginia, 6th September, 1775, to —; Captain 2d Virginia State Regiment, March, 1777; Major, 1st February, 1778, to October, 1781.

John (Va.). Ensign 7th Virginia, 4th July, 1779, to ——. (Name also spelled Leigh.)

Jonathàn (Mass.). Surgeon's Mate of Paterson's Massachusetts Regiment, May to December, 1775; Surgeon's Mate 15th Continental Infantry, 1st January to 31 December, 1776.

Joseph (Mass.). Captain 14th Continental Infantry, 1st January to 31st December, 1776.

Noah (Conn.). Lieutenant 2d Canadian (Hazen's) Regiment, 3d November, 1776; Captain, 1st June, 1778, and served to June, 1783. (Died 1840.)

Parker Hall (Md.). Ensign 4th Maryland, 1st January, 1777; 2nd

Lieutenant, 19 November, 1777; 1st Lieutenant, 16th October, 1778; resigned 14 February, 1780.

Philip Richard Francis: (Va.). Captain 3d Virginia, 8th March, 1776; mortally wounded at Brandywine, 11th September, 1777.

Richard Henry (Va.). A signer of the Declaration of Independence; died 19 June, 1794.

Samuel (Conn.). Surgeon 4th Connecticut, 1st January, 1777; resigned 3d April, 1778; served subsequently as Surgeon in Navy.

Seward (Mass.). 2d Lieutenant of Glover's Massachusetts Regiment, 19th May to December, 1775; 2d Lieutenant 14th Continental Infantry, 1st January to 31st December, 1776.

Thomas (N. H.). Captain Independent Company New Hampshire Rangers, 1776 to 1781.

Thomas (N. Y.). 2nd Lieutenant 4th New York, 28th June, 1775; 1st Lieutenant, 3rd August, 1775; Captain 5th New York, 21st November, 1776; resigned 19th May, 1778; served subsequently as Captain New York Militia. (Died 1814.)

Thomas (Va.). Adjutant of Grayson's Continental Regiment, 5th February, 1777; resigned 21st April, 1778.

William (N. H.). 1st Sergeant of Reed's New Hampshire Regiment, May to December, 1775; Ensign 2d Continental Infantry, 1st January, 1776; 2d Lieutenant 1st New Hampshire 8th November, 1776; resigned 9th January, 1778.

William B. (Va.). Ensign of Grayson's Additional Continental Regiment, 8th June, 1777, to —. (In service August, 1778.)

William Raymond (Mass.). Captain of Glover's Massachusetts Regiment, 19th May, 1775; Major, June to December, 1775; Major 14th Continental Infantry, 1st January to 31st December, 1776; Colonel of one of the Sixteen Additional Continental Regiments, 1st January, 1777; resigned 24th January, 1778. (Died 26th October 1824.)

(I) PROMINENT LEES OF AMERICA, PAST GENERATIONS

ALBERT LINDLEY LEE: Soldier; b., Fulton, N. Y., 1834; Judge of Kansas Supreme Court, 1861; commissioned Brigadier-General of Volunteers, 1862, and commanded the cavalry in the Red River expedition of 1864; passed much time in Europe after the war.

ANDREW: Clergyman; b., Lynne, Conn., 1745; ordained pastor of the Trinitarian Congregational Church at Hanover (now Lisbon) Conn., 1768; mem. of the corporation of Yale Coll., 1807-23; received the degree of D.D. from Harvard, 1809; was the author of several books.

ALFRED: (s. of Benjamin); P. E. bishop; b., Cambridge, Mass., 1807; admitted to priest's orders at Hartford by Bishop Brownell. At the death of Bishop Smith, 1884, he became Presiding Bishop of the U. S.

BENJAMIN: (s. of Alfred); physician; b., Norwich, Conn., 1833; mem. of the State Board of Health at Philadelphia, 1885; was instrumental in securing the passage of laws for the regulation of the practice of medicine and for the registration of physicians.

CHARLES: General; b., England, 1731; d. 1782; appointed a Major-General in the Continental Army, 1775; captured by the British in 1776, not being exchanged until 1778. During this confinement he became a traitor to the American cause. This fact was not discovered until many years later. He disobeyed

the orders of General Washington at the Battle of Monmouth in 1778 and was sentenced by a Court Martial to one year's suspension from the service. A short time later he was dismissed from the service by Congress.

CHARLES ALFRED: Physician; b., Salisbury, Conn., 1801; was one of the founders of the Medical College of the Univ. of N. Y. and of Buffalo Medical College, and held professorships in both.

CHAUNCEY: Clergyman; b., Coventry, Conn., 1718; s. of Jonathan, 1st minister to settle in Salisbury, Conn.; ordained pastor of the Congregational Church at Sunderland, Vt., 1790. He was skilled in music, composed verses, and was a classical scholar.

DAY KELLOGG: M.A., D.D.; clergyman; b., Sempronius, N. Y., 1816; pastor of various Congregational churches until 1865, when he moved to N. Y. C. His writings include three volumes on labor questions—the last entitled "Merri-nack, or Life at a Loom" (1854).

ELIZA BUCKMINSTER: Author; b., Portsmouth, N. H., 1794; m. Thomas Lee, of Boston; was the author of many books, including "Parthenia, of the Last Days of Paganism" (1858).

EZRA: Soldier; b., Lynne, Conn., 1749. When, in 1776, he landed safely after remaining several hours in the water to affix an infernal machine called a "Marine Turtle" to the British warship "Eagle," he received the congratulations of Washington, who, afterward, employed him in the secret service. He later participated in the battles of Trenton, Brandywine and Monmouth.

FITZHUGH: Soldier and Governor of Va.; b., Clermont, Va., 1835. He was the s. of Sidney Smith Lee (3d s. of "Lighthouse Harry" of Revolutionary fame, and a bro. of the great Robert E. Lee). He was grad., U. S. Military Academy, 1856, and after service in the West was ordered back to West Point as instructor in cavalry tactics. He served as Governor, and later became Consul-General at Havana. His s., Fitzhugh Lee, 2d, was a Captain in the 3d Cavalry, and another s., George Mason, was a 1st Lieutenant in the same regiment.

GIDEON: Merchant; b., Amherst, Mass., 1778; was agent for the Hampshire Leather Manufactory in New York City, 1807, and established an extensive business there. He was elected to the Legislature, 1822, and became Mayor of New York in 1833.

HANNAH FARNHAM SAWYER: Author; b., Newburyport, Mass., 1780; m. George Gardiner Lee, of Boston. One of her works, "Three Experiments in Living," passed through more than thirty editions in America and ten in England.

HENRY: Pioneer; b., Va., 1758; one of the early settlers in Ky.; mem. Va. Legislature from District of Ky., and also of the U. S. Constitutional Convention; Judge of Quarter Sessions and Associate Judge of Circuit Court for Mason County. He was a sagacious business man and amassed a large fortune.

HENRY WASHINGTON: P. E. bishop; b., Hamden, Conn., 1815; elected 1st Bishop of Iowa, and consecrated in St. Luke's Church, Rochester, 1854; was the recipient of many honorary degrees.

JAMES: Merchant; b., Scotland, 1795; built up a larger business as an import merchant in New York City; was a most benevolent and public-spirited man.

JESSE: Missionary; b., Prince George Co., Va., 1758; m. to North Carolina and entered the Methodist ministry, being for a while the co-worker of

Bishop Asbury; later served as chaplain in the U. S. House of Representatives and Senate.

RICHARD: Statesman; b., Shropshire, England, about 1590; a des., in the 9th generation, of Sir Walter Lee, of Lee Hall, Widenburg, Cheshire; was a mem. of the Privy Council of Charles I, and early in that monarch's reign emigrated to Virginia with a number of followers, whom he settled upon lands at his own expense.

RICHARD: (2d s. of Richard, statesman); d. about 1690; was educated at Oxford and was a mem. of the Governor's Council. He had 5 sons: Richard, Philip, Thomas, Francis and Henry.

THOMAS: (3d s. mentioned above); d. in Va., 1750; was for many years President of the Council, and, at the time of his death, had just been appointed Royal Governor of Virginia. He m. Hannah, granddaughter of Governor Ludwell, of N. C., and has six sons: Philip Ludwell, Thomas Ludwell, Richard Henry, Francis Lightfoot, William and Arthur. (See biographies immediately below.)

THOMAS LUDWELL: Statesman; b., Stafford, Va., about 1730; was a mem. of the Va. House of Burgesses and Judge of the General Court.

RICHARD HENRY: Signer of the Declaration of Independence from Virginia; b. 1732; d. 1794. Acquiring a good education in England he returned to Virginia when twenty-five years of age. He became one of the delegates from Virginia to the first Congress, in 1774, and on June 7, 1776, introduced his famous resolution for Independence. He was a member of a large number of commissions while in Congress, usually acting as chairman. In 1784 he was elected President of Congress. He was one of the first Senators from Virginia under the new Federal Constitution. He retired from public life in 1792.

FRANCIS LIGHTFOOT: Signer of the Declaration of Independence; b., Stratford, Va., 1734; mem. of the Va. House of Burgesses. For a short sketch of his life see 9th volume of Sanderson's "Biography of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence" (Phila., 1827).

WILLIAM: Diplomat; b., Stratford, 1737; engaged in mercantile business in London and for a time was agent for Virginia.

ARTHUR: Diplomat; b., Stratford, 1740; educated at Eton, from which he went to the Univ. of Edinburgh, and obtained the degree of M.D. After a brief interlude as a medical practitioner at Williamsburg, Va., he returned to London, where he studied and, later, practiced law. In 1775 he succeeded Franklin as the agent of Massachusetts, and, in the same year, was appointed secret agent of the Continental Congress in London. From 1776 until 1780 he acted as U. S. Commissioner to France and Spain, and in a semi-official capacity visited Prussia and Austria. After his return to America he served in various governmental offices, including the Continental Congress and the Treasury Board.

HENRY: Soldier and statesman; b., Leesylvania, Va., 1756; grad., Princeton, 1773; secured captaincy in Col. Bland's cavalry legion soon after the breaking out of the Revolutionary War; joined Washington in 1777 and spent the next three years in scouting and outpost duty, where his restless activity earned him the nickname of "Light Horse Harry." (For an account of his military career see Chapter (H).) He was elected to the Continental Congress in 1786 served as Governor of Va. from 1792 until 1795, and in 1799 became a mem. of the Congress of the United States.

CHARLES: Bro. of Henry; b., 1758; delegate to the Continental Congress and mem. of the Va. Assembly; was offered the Chief-Justiceship of the United States.

HENRY: s. of Charles; author; b., Westmoreland Co., Va., 1787; grad., William and Mary Coll., 1808; served in war of 1812; was appointed Major in the 12th Regiment; served under President Jackson as Consul to Algiers.

ROBERT EDWARD: Soldier; b., Stratford, Va., 1807; s. of "Light Horse Harry"; grad., U. S. Military Academy, 1829, 2d in his class; served in the Mexican War, receiving many honors for his remarkable feats of physical and moral courage; was superintendent at West Point for three years. In April, 1861, with the specter of the Civil War looming up, he declined the command of the Army of the United States, and subsequently became Commander-in-Chief of the Confederate states. His gallant and humane conduct throughout the war is the common knowledge of all America. He died, 1870, after serving five years as president of Washington College, but lives enshrined forever in the hearts of his countrymen.

GEORGE WASHINGTON CURTIS: (eldest s. of Robert E.); soldier; b., Arlington, Va., 1832; grad., U. S. Military Academy, 1854, at head of his class; as major-general, in 1864, was given command of division of the Army of Northern Virginia; was captured at Sailor's Creek. After the war he succeeded his father as president of Washington College (now Washington and Lee University).

WILLIAM HENRY FITZHUGH: (bro. of G. W. C.); soldier; b., Arlington, 1837; grad., Harvard, 1857; rose to rank of major-general of cavalry in Confederate Army, and led his division in fights from Rapidan to Appomattox, where he surrendered. Later he served in the State Senate of Virginia and in the United States Congress.

SAMUEL: Clergyman; b., England, 1625; became a learned non-conformist divine, and was minister to a church in Bristol, R. I., 1686-88.

THOMAS: Statesman; b., Charleston, S. C., 1769; s. of one of Charleston's patriots sent to St. Augustine by Sir Henry Clinton. He was elected Associate Judge of S. C. House of Representatives, 1804, and in a few months became Comptroller-General of the state; appointed U. S. District Judge, 1823, and held the office until his death in 1839.

THOMAS SIM: Statesman; b., Frederick Co., Va., 1744; Governor of Maryland, 1779-83.

WILLIAM LITTLE: Chief Justice of Hawaiian Islands; b., Sandy Hill, N. Y., 1821; Chief Justice and Chancellor of the Hawaiian Islands for life; responsible, with William L. Marcy, for the reciprocity treaty negotiated when the latter was Secretary of State.

WILSON: Clergyman; b., Sussex County, Del., 1761; became an itinerant Methodist minister in 1784; labored in West, especially in Kentucky. After 1794 he served on the New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore circuits. He shared, with Jesse Lee, the honor of founding Methodism in New England.

(M) RELIGIONS OF THE LEES

For several centuries the Lees lived in England, Wales and North Ireland. Most of the British (with the exception of those living in South Ireland), and, likewise, the Lees were and are of the Protestant faith.

There are a few Lees of the Catholic faith in the British Isles, but it is estimated that their number does not exceed ten per cent. of the entire Lee population.

The Lees who came from the British Isles to America continued in the faith of their fathers, for the most part, though their descendants in this country today will be found in the memberships of practically all the various churches. It is estimated that of all the Lees in America who are church members, at least seventy-five per cent. are of the Protestant faith.

Biographical sketches of 67 Lees appear in WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA. Their religious faiths are shown as follows: BAPTIST, 3; CHRISTIAN SCIENCE, 1; CONGREGATIONALIST, 5; METHODIST, 3; METHODIST EPISCOPAL, 1; PRESBYTERIAN, 4; ROMAN CATHOLIC, 1; UNITARIAN, 1; OTHER PROTESTANTS, 3; RELIGION NOT STATED, 44.

ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY

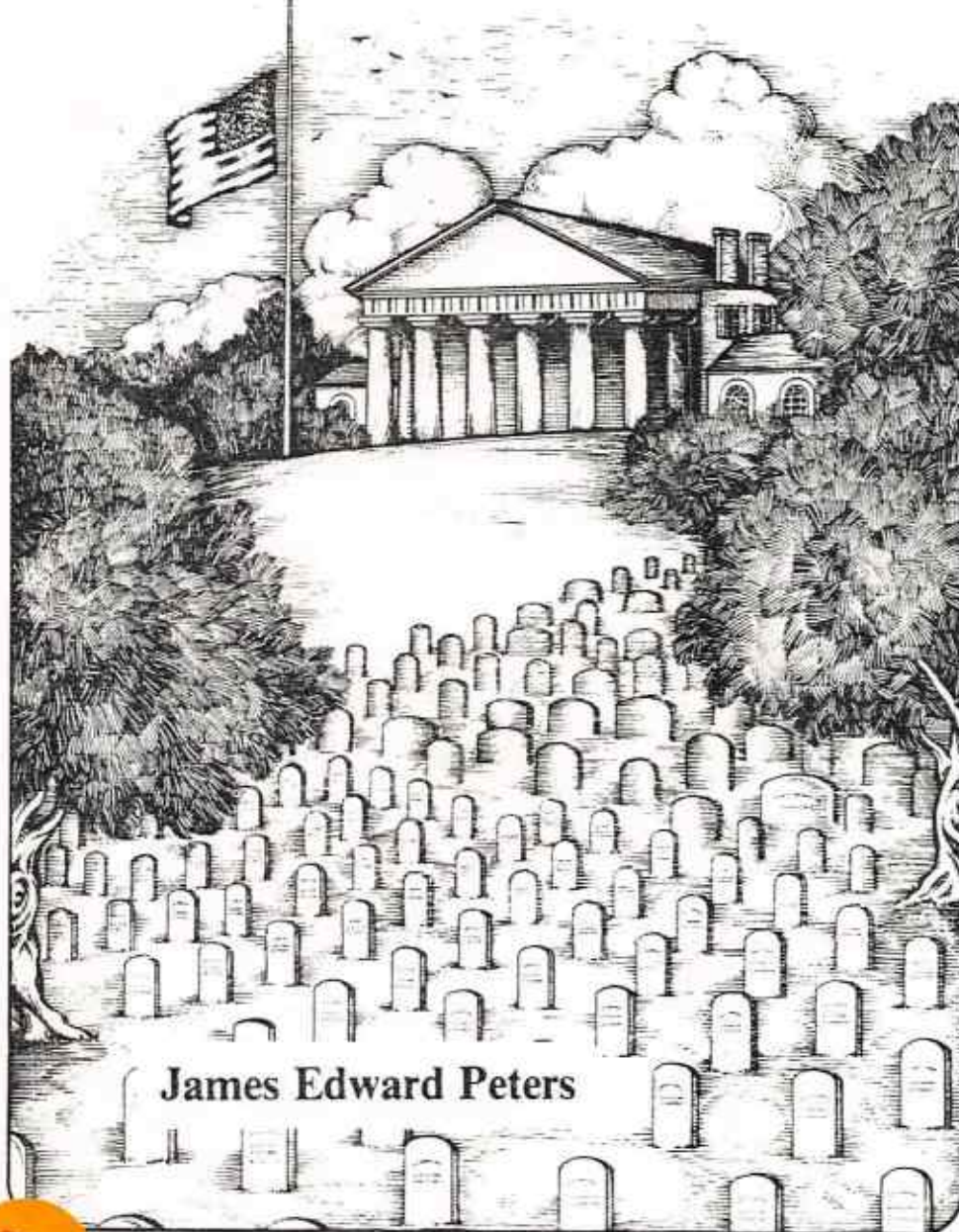
Shrine to America's Heroes

Arlington House — the focal point of Arlington National Cemetery — rises majestically above the Potomac River, overlooking Washington, D.C. In 1802, when construction of Arlington House began, it was not to be the centerpiece of a cemetery, but rather a living memorial to George Washington. Here, Washington's foster son — George Washington Parke Custis — proudly housed the largest collection of Washington memorabilia in the world. Tragically, that collection and Arlington House itself became victims of America's bloody Civil War.

Prior to the Civil War, George Washington Parke Custis occupied the home with his wife, their daughter, and their daughter's husband, Robert E. Lee. Arlington House was Lee's home when the Civil War began and later when Arlington was designated a cemetery, but its colorful history can be traced to George Washington and the American Revolution.

George Washington married Martha Custis in 1759, becoming a devoted stepfather to Martha's two small children, John Parke Custis and Martha Parke Custis. Young Custis idolized Washington and sought to emulate his stepfather's management skills. In 1778, the twenty-five-year-old Custis purchased an 1,100 acre tract of land about fifteen miles north of Mount Vernon. It was on this land, later known as Arlington, that Custis intended to build his home following the war for independence.

Sadly, during the siege of Yorktown in 1781 — while serving as an aide to General Washington — John Parke Custis died, leaving the Washingtons devastated by the loss. George and Martha Washington then reared two of

Custis' children, George Washington Parke Custis and Eleanor Parke Custis.

George Washington Parke Custis was only six months old when he came to live with the future President in 1781. Young Washington Custis, as he was known, held a front row seat to the historic events surrounding the birth of our nation. When President Washington died in 1799, the eighteen-year-old Custis promptly directed his energies to perpetuating the memory of the man whose name he bore. On the land which his natural father had purchased, Custis began construction of a home for both himself and his large collection of Washington memorabilia. This house — located just across the Potomac River from the new federal capital — would serve as a national memorial to The Father of Our Country. The mansion was completed in 1818 and its vast portico with eight majestic columns, stood like

an honor guard greeting the many visitors to Arlington House.

The grandest event to occur at Arlington House was the wedding of Custis' only child, Mary Anna Custis, to Robert E. Lee on June 30, 1831. Robert, a little-known but highly-respected West Point graduate, and Mary Custis Lee made Arlington their home, despite Lee's frequent absence due to his military career.

In 1860 the dark clouds of secession spread across the South. As war became more probable, Lee agonized over the crisis which threatened to destroy the Union which his father fought to establish. On April 12, 1861, the first shots of the Civil War were fired at Ft. Sumter. Several days later, Lee was summoned to Washington by General Winfield Scott who offered him command of the troops being raised to suppress the rebel states, but Lee declined the appoint-

The Auxiliary and the Author

Jim Peters might never have written a book about Arlington National Cemetery if he hadn't grown up in an American Legion family and been sent to Boys' State by Quincy, Illinois' Auxiliary Unit 37.

He was thirteen when his mother, Kathleen, was elected President of her Unit in Quincy. "I can still remember the installation ceremony back in 1964. The entire family was invited — and when there are ten of you in the family, you're rarely invited somewhere at the same time — but we were all there. I remember feeling very proud and important as I sat on the dias with my father and my brothers and sisters, watching Mom assume her office," said Peters.

Although he had been a member of the Sons of the American Legion since he was younger, his first recollection of the Auxiliary was through his mother. "With eight children, she didn't have a lot of free time but one of the activities she insisted on finding time for was the Auxiliary," he added. The Auxiliary was — and still is — quite active in Quincy as it is the site of the Illinois Veterans Home.

His older sister, Judy, went to Girls' State in 1965 and Jim remembers visiting her on visitors day. "We gathered to hear an address by the newly elected Governor of Girls' State and I remember thinking to myself — and I've never told anyone this before — that some day I was going to be Governor of Boys' State!"

ment. Instead, after long deliberations, Lee resigned the army commission which he held for thirty-two years.

On April 22, Lee was summoned to Richmond by the Governor of Virginia. As he left Arlington House that day, Lee knew that his beloved home, with its strategic location overlooking Washington, could not escape direct involvement in the conflict. He did not know, however, that he would never again set foot on the land he considered more dear to him than any other. Soon after he left Arlington, his wife and family left as well and on May 24, 1861 federal troops occupied Arlington House.

Early in the Civil War, much of the fighting centered around Washington and burial space soon became scarce. When asked to recommend sites for a new military cemetery, Quartermaster General Montgomery Meigs offered just one location — Arlington House. Meigs considered Robert E. Lee to be a traitor, and he hoped that the establishment of a cemetery on the Lees' estate would prevent them from ever returning. On June 15, 1864, Secretary of War Edwin Stanton signed the order establishing a national cemetery at Arlington.

But in 1864, Arlington National Cemetery did not enjoy the honored status it has achieved today. Rather, it was little more than a pauper's field. Only those who died unknown or whose families could not afford the costs of private burial services were interred at Arlington. Montgomery Meigs took advantage of the large numbers of burials, quickly surrounding Lee's home with graves and hoping to make the home uninhabitable. To further his plan, Meigs ordered the construction of a burial vault in the middle of Arlington's once-famous rose garden and placed in that vault the remains of 2,111 unknown soldiers who had died in battles near Washington.

After the War, Robert E. Lee and his wife never again made Arlington their home. Lee accepted the presidency of Washington College in Lexington, Virginia, where they are now buried. After their

deaths, their son, George Washington Custis Lee, filed suit against the United States in 1877 in an attempt to reclaim Arlington. The case wound its way through the courts until December 1882 when the Supreme Court ruled that the government had taken Arlington House illegally and ordered the title be restored to Lee. But by this time, there were 25,000 persons buried at Arlington. So for payment of \$150,000, Custis Lee deeded the property to the United States.

Since that time, Arlington has grown in stature, being chosen as the final resting place for many of America's greatest patriots. It has also become the site of many important monuments and memorial services. As early as 1868 the first Decoration Day services were held there in accordance with a declaration by General John A. Logan that May 30 be set aside as a day to remember "comrades who died in defense of their country." This early commemoration evolved into day-long ceremonies which found thousands of people journeying to the cemetery to attend memorial services. The custom continues today on Memorial Day when ceremonies are held and each of the nearly 125,000 graves are decorated with small American flags.

George Washington Parke Custis envisioned Arlington House as a national shrine. Unfortunately, his dream of a memorial to George Washington was eclipsed by the tragedy of the Civil War. But that war forced the creation of a strikingly different national shrine — Arlington National Cemetery — and today it occupies a very special place in the hearts of all Americans.

Two years later, his older brother Dan attended Illinois Boys' State and in 1968, it was Jim's turn to attend one of the largest and oldest Boys' State programs in the country. More than 1,200 high school boys attended that session at the Illinois State Fair Grounds. "Out of that large number only one boy was sponsored by an Auxiliary Unit — me," he says with pride. "Our Quincy Auxiliary always sponsored at least one boy so when I was elected Governor, you can imagine that the members of ol' Unit 37 really shared my joy! I was the first Governor ever elected who had been sponsored by an Auxiliary Unit. I was very proud for myself and for the Auxiliary."

He remembers traveling around the state and a parade down Michigan Avenue in Chicago, "quite a thrill for a boy from Downstate, but the greatest thrill was when I was chosen to attend Boys' Nation in Washington, D.C." That week at Georgetown University with its daily excursions through the nation's capital ultimately led to his recently published book. Now a resident of Washington, D.C., he says the impression in 1968 was so striking that Arlington was the first place he visited when he moved to Washington nearly 17 years later.

"My interest was still so great that when I searched the bookstores and scoured the libraries for books about our greatest national cemetery and was unable to find any book in print about Arlington, I immediately began to write one," said the graduate of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale and the New England School of Law in Boston.

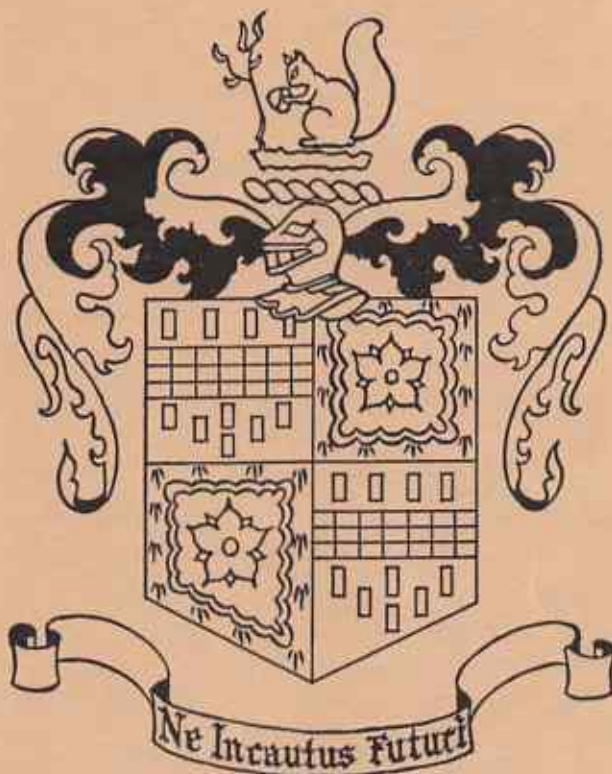
His book, *Arlington National Cemetery: Shrine to America's Heroes* was recently published by Woodbine House and is the first book on Arlington in nearly two decades. "I think its fair to say that this book probably would never have been written had I not been given the opportunity to visit Arlington at a time in my life when it left such a great impression," Jim added. "Truly, that chance to visit Washington would never have occurred if it had not been for the American Legion Auxiliary. I am so certain that Boys' Nation spurred my interest in Arlington that I mention that fact in my Author's Notes in my book."

He adds that his younger brother and sister attended Boys' and Girls' State, making a total of five children in the Peters family to benefit from the Auxiliary's involvement with young people in Quincy. Both his father and mother are still active members of Quincy Post and Unit 37 and three of his nieces are Junior members of the Auxiliary.

Sharing an overview of his book with the Auxiliary is Jim Peters' way of thanking the Auxiliary for its influence on his life. 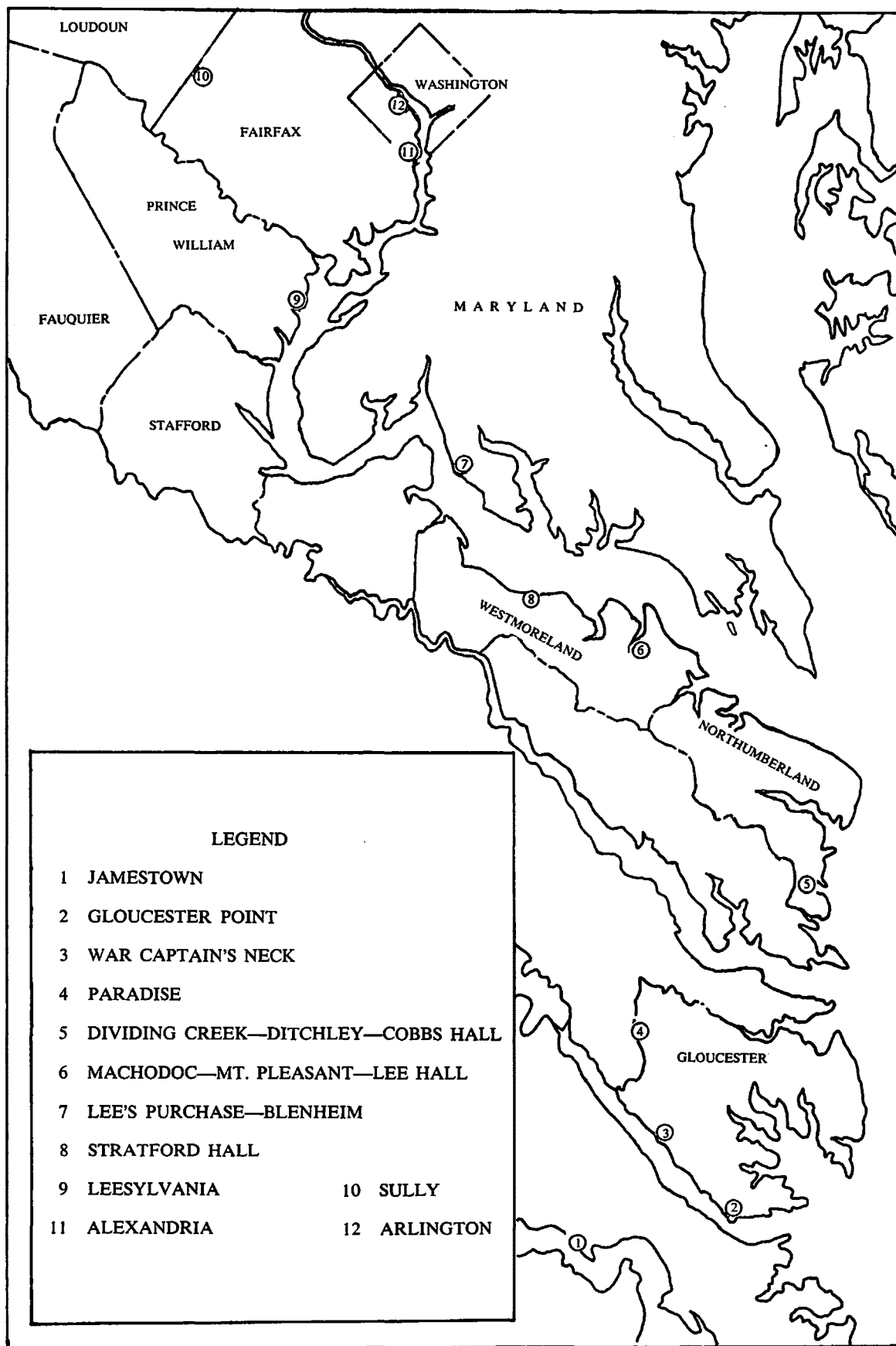

FOREWORD

This booklet provides a summary account of the six main branches of the Lee family descended from Richard Lee and Anna Constable, and of their most notable members. It is intended only for general orientation, and is of course no substitute for more extended works on the family or on individual members of it. The basic genealogy of this family is Edmund Jennings Lee's *Lee of Virginia*, published in 1895. The most comprehensive treatment of its history is Burton J. Hendrick's *The Lees of Virginia*, published in 1935. The articles on various aspects of the subject published by Cazenove Lee in the *Magazine of the Society of the Lees of Virginia* over a period of seventeen years, 1922-1939, have been skillfully consolidated by Dorothy Mills Parker in *Lee Chronicle*, published in 1957.

The only complete and authoritative account of the progenitor of the family is "Richard Lee, the Emigrant", *Virginia Magazine of History and Biography*, Vol. 62 (1954), as supplemented by "The Will of Colonel Richard Lee" in the same *Magazine*, Vol. 74 (1966).

The title, "The Lees of Virginia", requires acknowledgement that there have been many worthy Lees in Virginia who were not members of this particular family. The Lees of Lee Hall, near Yorktown, are a notable example. The surname Lee is derived from a common feature of the English landscape. It has been borne by many families in England, and consequently in Virginia, who were in no way related to one another. Richard Lee and his descendants, however, have been the pre-eminent Lees of Virginia ever since his arrival at Jamestown in November 1639.

Most of the photographs reproduced herein have been generously provided for that purpose by Mrs. Cazenove Lee, Washington and Lee University, the Robert E. Lee Memorial Foundation, Mr. P. Blair Lee, Mr. E. Brooke Lee, Jr., and the Historic Alexandria Foundation, to all of whom we make grateful acknowledgement.

The responsible author of the text and captions is Ludwell Lee Montague. Eleanor Lee Templeman has collaborated in the layout and has had entire charge of the process of publication.

THE LEES OF VIRGINIA

Richard Lee was the grandson of John Lee of Coton Hall, lord of the manor of Nordley Regis in south-eastern Shropshire. He was born there, perhaps in 1613, but, as the son of a younger son, he had no prospects there. His father, Richard, had only a life tenure in one of the farms of the manor. At an early age he was sent to London to seek his fortune under the tutelage of his first cousin, John Lee, an established merchant in hides and pelts. In London he received some legal education as well as commercial experience.

Richard Lee came to Virginia in 1639 to be Clerk of the Quarter Court at Jamestown. Not long after his arrival he married Anna Constable, a ward of the Governor, Sir Francis Wiatt. But his principal occupation in Virginia was as a factor for his cousin, John Lee of London, in the fur trade with the Indians. He took his young bride away from the colonial capital to live among the Indians beyond the frontier of settlement (Their home was near Gloucester Point.) They must have narrowly escaped death in the Great Massacre of 1644, when some 500 English were slain by the Indians in a sudden onslaught. Undaunted, Richard Lee resumed his trade with the Indians just as soon as peace was restored, in 1646.

In 1649 Richard Lee was appointed colonial Secretary of State—that is, next in authority in Virginia after the Governor, Sir William Berkeley. In 1650 he made a voyage to the Netherlands to report Virginia's loyal adherence to King Charles II, but he was not the devout royalist that he is often represented to have been on that account. Two years later he negotiated the capitulation of Virginia to the Commonwealth of England and was well satisfied with the terms that he obtained. He then retired from public office, but he had no personal difficulty in accommodating himself to the Commonwealth regime. On several occasions he represented the interests of Virginia in London, albeit in the character of a London merchant.

From 1652 onwards Richard Lee spent almost as much time in London as he did in Virginia, becoming as much a London merchant trading to Virginia as he was a great planter in Virginia. That personal accommodation to the Navigation Act was the foundation of his later fortune, which was perhaps the greatest in the Virginia of his day. Disposing of several lesser properties, he consolidated and developed four major plantations, two in Gloucester County ("War Captain's Neck" and "Paradise") and two in Northumberland

("Dividing Creek" and "Machodoc"). He also acquired a plantation ("Lee's Purchase") in Maryland. In 1660 he was restored to the Council of State in Virginia, but that made no difference in his trans-Atlantic operations.

In 1658 Richard Lee acquired a residence at Stratford Langton, then a pleasant suburb of London, and in 1661 he moved his family thither. He did that for the better education of his younger children—his two older sons, John and Richard, were already students at Oxford—but he always intended that their future should lie in Virginia, except for Francis, who was designated to become a London merchant. Richard Lee died at his Dividing Creek plantation in 1664 and his family returned to Virginia soon thereafter.

Richard Lee's will directed that his property at Stratford be sold, and that the proceeds be used to discharge his debts, to complete the education of John and Richard at Oxford, and to provide dowries for his daughters, Elizabeth and Anne. He left the Machodoc plantation to his son John, the Paradise plantation to Richard, "War Captain's Neck" to Francis, and the Maryland plantation to William. The Dividing Creek plantation he left to his widow for her lifetime and afterwards to be divided among his younger sons, William, Hancock, and Charles.

John Lee died unmarried, in 1673. The Machodoc plantation then passed to his brother Richard, as their father's heir-at-law.

Richard Lee II married Letitia Corbin. Four of their sons—Richard, Philip, Thomas, and Henry—became, respectively, the progenitors of the Mount Pleasant, Maryland, Stratford, and Lee Hall branches of the family. Their only daughter, Ann, married William Fitzhugh. She also has many descendants.

Francis Lee sold "War Captain's Neck" and became a London merchant trading to Virginia. He married in London and had two sons and three daughters. Their English descendants are unknown to us.

William Lee died in 1696 and left his estate to one Mary, the widow of Thomas Heath and wife of Bartholomew Schreever. It has been supposed that she was William Lee's daughter. Richard Lee II, however, claimed William Lee's lands as heir-at-law of their father, contending that William had had only a life estate in them, since the first Richard's will had contained, with reference to them, no "words of inheritance"—i.e., "and his heirs forever". This contention

was upheld by the courts of both Virginia and Maryland, and the Schreevers were dispossessed. The same contention would have served to dispossess the heirs of Hancock and Charles Lee, but their uncle gave them quit-claim deeds to their lands, citing his natural affection for them. It is plain that he bore no such affection toward Mary Schreever, that he did not regard her as a niece. For that reason, the Society does not accept claims of descent from Richard Lee and Anna Constable through her.

Hancock Lee inherited the southern third of the Dividing Creek plantation and became the progenitor of the Ditchley branch of the family.

Elizabeth ("Betsey") Lee married Leonard Howson. Anne Lee married Thomas Youell. Both have many descendants.

Finally, Charles Lee inherited the middle third of the Dividing Creek plantation, including his parents' home there, and became the progenitor of the Cobbs Hall branch of the family.

THE MOUNT PLEASANT LINE

When John Lee died, in 1673, Richard Lee II (1646-1714) established his residence at the Machodoc plantation, which by that time was in Westmoreland County. There he married Letitia, the daughter of his neighbor, Councillor Henry Corbin. Soon afterward he was himself appointed to the Council, a body which served as the Governor's privy council, the upper house of the colonial legislature, and the colonial supreme court.

Richard Lee II left half of the Machodoc plantation, including the family residence there, to his eldest son, Richard (1678-1718), but this third Richard Lee resided in London as a merchant trading to Virginia. He leased his estate in Virginia to his brothers, Thomas

and Henry, for an annual rent of one peppercorn only, payable on Christmas Day.

In London, Richard Lee III married Martha Silk, "an heiress". In 1735 their son, George Lee (1714-1761), came to Virginia to claim his inheritance, bringing with him his two sisters, Lettice and Martha. The old Machodoc plantation house had been destroyed by fire in 1729. George Lee built a new mansion on a different site, and called it and his estate Mount Pleasant.

George Lee married Ann Fairfax. Lettice married John Corbin. Martha married, first, George Turberville, and second, William Fitzhugh. They have numerous descendants.

THE MARYLAND or BLENHEIM LINE

In 1704 Philip Lee (1681-1744), the second son of Richard Lee II, acquired some land adjacent to the "Lee's Purchase" plantation (which was near the Maryland end of the present Potomac River Bridge). On this land he built a mansion which he called Blenheim. (The battle was fought in 1704.) Ten years later his father left to him the "Lee's Purchase" plantation, the greater part of a plantation called Rehoboth on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, and the reversion of the

Paradise plantation. Philip Lee married Sarah Brooke and, after her death, a widow, Elizabeth Sewall. In due course he became a member of the Council in Maryland. He was survived by nine sons and eight daughters.

The most distinguished member of this numerous branch of the family was Thomas Sim Lee (1745-1819), a grandson of Philip Lee. He was Governor of Maryland during the Revolution.

THE STRATFORD LINE

In 1711 (three years before his father's death), young Thomas Lee (1690-1750) was appointed resident manager of the vast Fairfax Proprietary (all of the land between the Potomac and Rappahannock rivers, to their headwaters). He opened his land office at Machodoc and vigorously set to work to introduce system and order into the business of the Proprietary, which had been rather carelessly managed by Robert ("King") Carter.

Richard Lee II left to Thomas the northern third of the old Dividing Creek plantation and a part of the Rehoboth plantation, but Thomas Lee preferred to remain at Machodoc, which his brother, Richard, let him have for the nominal rent of one peppercorn. In 1722 he married Hannah, the daughter of Councillor Philip Ludwell. Not long thereafter he purchased for himself a large estate on the Potomac 20 miles west of Machodoc and began building there a mansion which he called Stratford after his grandfather's residence near London. In due course he was appointed to the Council, and eventually, as President of the Council, he became acting governor of Virginia during a vacancy in the governorship. That was the highest political position that a Virginian could hold in those days.

Thomas Lee was an empire builder like his grandfather, Richard Lee. He acquired Fairfax grants for large tracts of land on the upper Potomac, in what are now Stafford, Fairfax, and Loudoun counties, and for another large tract in what is now Fauquier County, including the site of Warrenton. He also negotiated the Treaty of Lancaster with the Six Nations of the Iroquois, wherein they ceded to Virginia all of their lands south of the Ohio River, and organized the Ohio Company composed of Virginians interested in promoting settlement on the Ohio. Although it occurred after his death, the proximate cause of the French and Indian War (the Seven Years War in Europe) was conflict between the Ohio Company and the French from Canada for the possession of the Ohio country. In that conflict young George Washington fired the first shot.

Thomas Lee of Stratford had six sons, five of whom played distinguished roles in the American Revolution. The eldest, Philip Ludwell Lee (1726-1775), became in due course a member of the Council, which precluded his participation in revolutionary agitation. He died before he had to make a choice in his allegiance, between Virginia and the Crown. The second son, Thomas Ludwell Lee (1730-1778), was a Burgess for

Stafford County, a member of the revolutionary conventions, and a member of the Committee of Public Safety, the temporary executive authority between the flight of the last royal governor and the election of the first republican governor. The third son, Richard Henry Lee (1732-1794) was a Burgess for Westmoreland County, the leader of the Virginia delegation in the Continental Congress, and the member of Congress who proposed the historic resolution that "these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States". The fourth son, Francis Lightfoot Lee (1734-1797) was a Burgess for Loudoun County and a member of the Continental Congress. Richard Henry Lee and Francis Lightfoot Lee were the only brothers to sign the Declaration of Independence.

While all this was going on in America, Thomas Lee's youngest sons, William (1739-1795) and Arthur (1740-1792), were in London. William Lee was a merchant in the Virginia trade. Arthur Lee was a doctor of medicine and also a barrister; he took up the study of the law the better to argue the American case in the lobbies of Parliament and in pamphlets which he signed "Junius Americanus". Largely through Arthur Lee's contrivance, William Lee was elected an Alderman of London in May 1775—after the "shots heard round the world" had already been fired at Lexington and Concord. He was elected precisely because he was an American, as a demonstration of the City's opposition to the American policy of the Tory Ministry. But early in 1776, when it had become evident that no reconciliation within the Empire could be achieved, Arthur Lee, still in London, secretly obtained the first French commitment to supply clandestine military aid to the rebellious colonies. In December 1776 he went to Paris as one of the three American commissioners there; in February 1778 he signed the Treaty of Alliance between the United States and France. William Lee also abandoned his prospects in London to become an emissary of the Congress in Europe.

Richard Henry Lee was afterwards President of the United States under the Articles of Confederation, in 1785. As Senator from Virginia, 1789-1792, he played a leading part in securing the adoption of the Bill of Rights.

A distinguished member of the Stratford branch of the family in a later generation was Admiral Samuel Phillips Lee (1812-1897), a grandson of Richard

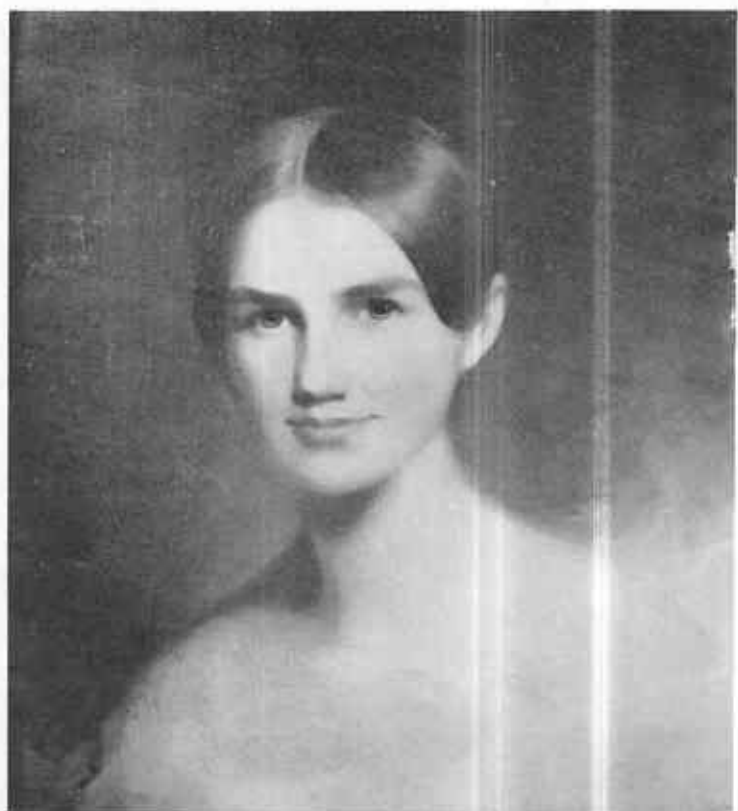

Henry Lee. During most of the Civil War he commanded the U. S. naval forces in the waters of Virginia and North Carolina. His control of the James River was essential to the success of General Grant's operations against his third cousin, Robert Edward Lee. His home in Washington near the White House is now part of the Blair-Lee House, the guest house in which visiting heads of state are lodged.

Admiral Lee's son, Francis Preston Blair Lee (1857-1944), was a Senator from Maryland, 1913-1917. He was President of the Society of the Lees of Virginia from its foundation in 1922 until his death in 1944.

Two other members of the Stratford branch of the family should be mentioned. Edward Douglas White (1845-1921) was a descendant of Thomas Ludwell Lee. As a Confederate private soldier, he was taken prisoner at Port Hudson in 1863. He lived to become a Senator from Louisiana (1891-1894), an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court (1894-1910), and Chief Justice of the United States (1910-1921). Henry St. George Tucker (1874-1959) was a descendant of Richard Henry Lee. He became Bishop of Kyoto (1912-1923), Bishop of Virginia (1927-1946), and Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States (1938-1946).

R. E. LEE'S BOYHOOD HOME, at 607 Oronoco Street, Alexandria. The house was built in 1794. Robert Lee lived in it from 1811 to 1816, when he was four to nine years old, and again from 1820 to 1825, when he was thirteen to eighteen. His aunt, Mary Lee Fendall, lived across the street; his uncle, Edmund Jennings Lee, lived nearby. He left here to enter the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.

THE LEE HALL and LEESYLVANIA LINE

Henry Lee (1691-1747) inherited from his father, Richard Lee II, a portion of the Machodoc plantation and built there a mansion which he called Lee Hall. He inherited also from his grandfather, Henry Corbin, a large tract of land at Freestone Point on the Potomac, in what later became Prince William County. He acquired for himself additional lands in Westmoreland County and on the frontier in what later became Fairfax County. He married Mary Bland and had three sons and a daughter.

The third son, a second Henry Lee (1729-1787), inherited his father's lands in Prince William and Fairfax counties. At Freestone Point he developed a plantation which he called Leesylvania. He married Lucy Grymes and had five sons and three daughters. He was County Lieutenant and Presiding Justice of Prince William, a Burgess, and a member of the revolutionary conventions.

Three of the sons of Henry Lee and Lucy Grymes are of particular note. The eldest, a third Henry Lee (1756-1818) called "Light Horse Harry", was a daring leader of light cavalry during the Revolution and a young favorite of General Washington. He was afterwards a leading figure in the Virginia convention on the ratification of the Federal Constitution, in 1788, Governor of Virginia, 1791-1794, and a member of Congress, 1799-1801. It was he who in Congress eulogized Washington as "first in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen". The second son, Charles Lee (1758-1815), was Attorney General of the United States under Presidents Washington and Adams, 1795-1801. The third son, Richard Bland Lee (1761-1827), a member of Congress, 1789-1795, was instrumental in bringing the Federal Capital to the Potomac. His home, Sully, built in 1794, is now maintained by the Fairfax County Park Authority.

"Light Horse Harry" Lee married, first, his second cousin, Matilda Lee, the heiress of Stratford, and, second, Ann Hill Carter of Shirley. Robert Edward Lee (1807-1870) was a child of this second marriage, but was born at Stratford because his father continued to

reside there until his eldest son, Matilda's heir, came of age. Thus Stratford is now maintained by the Robert E. Lee Memorial Foundation as a memorial to R. E. Lee, although he was not actually a member of the Stratford branch of the family.

In 1831 Robert Lee, a lieutenant in the U.S. Corps of Engineers, married Mary Anne Randolph Custis, the heiress of Arlington. She was his third cousin by descent from that Ann Lee who married William Fitzhugh. Having no home of his own, Robert Lee came to feel at home at Arlington. He spent some part of almost every year on leave there and lived there during a tour of duty in Washington, 1834-1837. On the death of his father-in-law, in 1857, he became the master of the plantation. The passage of time having healed the wounds of war, the National Park Service now maintains Arlington as a memorial to the foremost general of the Confederacy.

Robert Lee was strongly opposed to both slavery and secession, but in the circumstances of 1861 he felt that his duty lay to Virginia—that a Union which could be held together only by force of arms had already ceased to exist. No provincial, he understood from the first that the South lacked the means to maintain its independence if the North proved sufficiently determined to prevent that. The object of his military operations was to convince the North that it could not prevail at an acceptable cost. In this he almost succeeded, but of course failed in the end, despite his many brilliant victories. He was not sorry to see the Union restored and slavery abolished, although he deeply regretted the cost of the war in death and destruction. He devoted his last years to the education of the rising generation, as President of Washington College, now Washington and Lee University.

General Lee's sons, George Washington Custis Lee (1832-1913) and William Henry Fitzhugh Lee (1837-1891), were major generals in the Confederate Army, as was his nephew, Fitzhugh Lee (1835-1905). This second Fitzhugh Lee was later Governor of Virginia, 1886-1890.



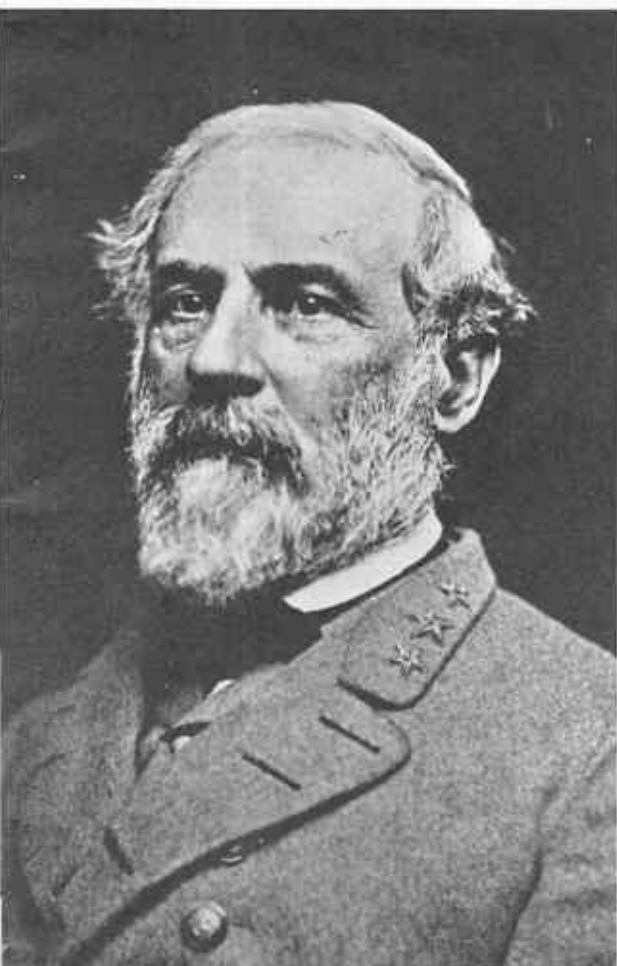

Robert Lee considered Arlington his home after his marriage with Mary Anne Randolph Custis in 1831; he became the master of house on the death of his father-in-law in 1857. It was here, on the night of the 19th of April 1861, that he reached his agonizing decision to resign from the U.S. Army. One of his daughters said that it was as though there had been a death in the house.

WASHINGTON COLLEGE. The college was founded in 1749 and was named for George Washington in 1798, in acknowledgment of an endowment provided by him. The buildings depicted were erected in 1813. R. E. Lee was President of the College from September 1865 until his death in October 1870, after which it was renamed Washington and Lee University.

THE RECUMBENT STATUE in the Lee Chapel at Washington and Lee University. The sculptor, Edward V. Valentine, had modelled a bust of Lee from life.

ZACHARY TAYLOR (1784-1850), as President of the United States, 1849-1850. General Taylor was called "Old Rough and Ready" in contrast to General Scott, "Old Fuss and Feathers". Captain R. E. Lee served under Taylor in northern Mexico as well as under Scott in the capture of Mexico City.

THE DITCHLEY LINE

Hancock Lee (1653-1709) eventually inherited the southern third of the Dividing Creek plantation, which he called Hancock's Neck. He married, first, Mary Kendall, and second, Sarah Allerton, a great-granddaughter of Elder William Brewster, the leader of the Plymouth Colony. Thus some of the Ditchley Lees have a *Mayflower* ancestry.

Richard Lee (1691-1740), Hancock Lee's eldest son, inherited Hancock's Neck and renamed it Ditchley, after Ditchley Park in Oxfordshire. He was pleased to suppose (erroneously) that he was somehow related to the Earl of Litchfield, the most distinguished Lee of his time. The present Ditchley mansion was built, about 1762, by this Richard Lee's son, Kendall Lee.

Hancock Lee was the only son of the emigrant Richard Lee who proved to be an empire-builder like his father. He acquired for himself extensive landholdings

in what later became Stafford, Prince William, and Fauquier counties. All these lands eventually came into the possession of his posthumous son, Hancock Lee (1709-1789). He married Mary Willis. His sons, Willis and Hancock Lee, and his nephew, Hancock Taylor, went to Kentucky in 1771 as surveyors for the Ohio Company founded by Thomas Lee of Stratford. Hancock Taylor was killed there by the Indians in 1774, Willis Lee in 1776. The third Hancock Lee (1736-1815) became the progenitor of a large family in Piedmont Virginia and Kentucky.

The most notable member of this branch of the family was General Zachary Taylor (1784-1850), a grandson of Elizabeth Lee, a daughter of the first Hancock Lee. He distinguished himself in the Mexican War and was afterwards President of the United States. His son, Richard Taylor (1826-1879), was a Confederate lieutenant general.

THE COBBS HALL LINE

Charles Lee (1656-1700), the youngest son of the first Richard Lee, eventually inherited the middle third of the Dividing Creek plantation, including the home at which his father had died. In about 1720 his son, Charles Lee (1684-1741), built a new house a half-mile from the original one and called it Cobbs Hall. The present Cobbs Hall was built in 1853 by Lewis

Harvey, the husband of Martha Lee (1803-1878), a great-great-great-granddaughter of the first Charles Lee. The present master of Cobbs Hall is her great-grandson, E. Walter Harvey, Sr. Cobbs Hall is the only property once held by the first Richard Lee which has remained continuously in the possession of his descendants down to the present day.

DR. JOHN C. LEE OF CASSANDRA

Dr. John C. Lee (1818-1876) and his
 wife, Sarah (1820-1863) with 4 children came
 to Cassandra from Randolph County, AL
 about 1850.

His parents were Zachariah Lee
 (ca.1775-1845) and Rebecca Brooks. He was
 born in Laurens County, SC, and his parents
 moved to Gwinnette County, GA about 1825.

He married Sarah prior to the 1840

Census. Her parents were James M. McGuf-
 fey and Sarah Gordon.

Sarah died in childbirth 28 April 1863,

and Dr. Lee married later that year his second
 wife, Martha I. Powell (1926-1898), daughter
 of Thomas and Isabelle Powell. They had 1
 child, Lou.

Dr. Lee served as Cassandra Post
 Master from 21 March 1866 to January 1873.
 He built Lee's Mill on Mill Creek near Cassan-
 dra. This mill was destroyed when the railroad
 came through in 1890. He practiced medicine
 until his death in 1876.

Dr. Lee filed a claim, No. 8465, 14 June
 1873 at Cassandra, for food, animals, etc.,
 taken by soldiers during the War. This claim,
 totaling \$1652.50, presented to the Southern
 Claims Commission, was rejected because the
 loyalty of claimant was regarded as doubtful.

After the death of Dr. Lee, his son-in-
 law, Dr. A. Thornburgh, who was administer
 for his estate, filed another claim 10 July 1888.
 Witnesses examined were John C. Pierce, An-
 thony Voils, and F. M. Parr. Eventually the es-
 tate was awarded \$1255.50 in 1890.

Abstracts from Walker County Messen-
 ger referring to Dr. Lee:

Dec.22, 1898 - Mrs. M. I. Lee died at her hone
 in Cassandra November 28, 1898. Born May
 29, 1826, was converted at age 16 old school
 Presbyterian. Married J. C. Lee in 1863 and
 joined Methodist Church at that time. Buried
 by her husband in Cassandra Cemetery.

Dec. 6, 1900 - At the residence of Henry
 Smith, uncle of the bride, W. J. Wallin led to
 the altar, Miss Lou I. Lee, daughter of such
 lamented Dr. J. C. Lee.

Oct. 16, 1903 - On the 10th Thomas Gravatt
 lost his house and most of his household
 goods. Fire caught in flue while Mrs. Gravatt
 was cooking dinner. This house belonged to
 H. Lauderbach and is known as Widow Lee's
 house, being just in front of J. C. Morgan's
 place. (This location would be near present
 day Cassandra Baptist Church on West Cove
 Road).

That he is a citizen of the United States and reside at present in

Carrandria, Walker County, Georgia.

That during the late rebellion he was a Union man and known as such.

That he has a claim against the United States for 2 stores and supplies taken from him by the officers of the United States Army at the date below given. The said stores being as your petitioners believe for the benefit of and use of the United States service and were of the value as below stated at the time and place stated. That all the items in the above schedule were of the full value therein set forth and were the property of and were taken from your petitioner for the use of and were used by the United States Army.

The officers commanding the troops at the time of the several takings were General Brannon and Major Genl. McCook commanding Divisions - Genl. Wilder commanding Cavalry, also Colonel Boon commanding Regiment of Cavalry and Colonel Merrill of Cavalry.

General Brannon camped his brigade two days upon your petitioner's farm - The Quartermaster of General McCook's Division or corps took the stores and supplies as stated and promised that your petitioner should have a voucher the next morning as it was lost on Friday evening before the battle of Chickamauga and was ordered to move that night and the voucher never given - Colonel Boon was on a raid one of his Cavalry men had lost his horse and Colonel Boon ordered him to take my mule - The supplies taken by General Wilder was when he was marching to the front with his Cavalry May 1864. Colonel Merrill told me personally that he had ordered the mule & horse to be taken as per account of items.

That no voucher, receipt or other writing was given therefor & though it was promised by Officer to your petitioner, I know well that the Quartermaster took possession of some of the supplies taken.

That your petitioner resided at the time said claim accrued at Cassandra Walker County State of Georgia.

That your petitioner John C. Lee is

the original owner of said claim, and that he is

THE ABIJAH LEE FAMILY

The LEE's were an early capital day family, natives of Cayuga County, New York. In *Fayette Facts*, Vol. 15 No. 3 pages 5-13 we published a family history of the children of William LEE which included Henry, Abijah, Chauncey, William, Lemuel and Royal Newlin LEE.

Also present in the county and involved in business with Lemuel were Harvey and Ashael LEE who were assumed to be brothers. Information on the Harvey LEE family was published in *Fayette Facts*, Vol. 26 No. 4 pages 32-5).

Earlier this year the Society received a copy of a family booklet compiled by Raymond Harold Olson of Cheboygan, Michigan. The book was entitled, "Abijah, Abner, Samuel and William Henry LEE sons of Abijah LEE and Abiah SMITH; Soldiers Of The American Revolution". Information in the book indicates that Harvey and Ashael were brothers - sons of Abijah and Anna FELLOWS LEE.

Abijah LEE was born 20 Aug 1764 Middletown, CT d 30 Jul 1806 Onandaga Co., NY and He was one of 4 sons of Abijah and Abiah SMITH LEE to serve as soldiers during the Revolution. Abijah enlisted for the town of Sandisfield, MA, Berkshire Co. He was in Capt. Robin's Co., Col. Ashley's Regt. Abijah appears as a private on muster and payroll of Col. Benjamin TUPPER's 10th Regt. He served 6 months beginning 1 Jul 1781.

Abijah married 27 Mar 1785 Anna FELLOWS, the dau of Ephraim and Margaret ROOT FELLOWS and was born 22 Apr 1765 Litchfield, CT, died 11 Jan 1843 Knowlestown, Orleans Co., NY. There were 9 known children:

ASHAEL LEE

Ashael lived in what is now Otego Township. He was a prominent citizen of the day, was a justice of the peace and at the time of his death, the probate justice. His estate deals almost entirely with the estates not finished, the amounts to be paid and the debts to be collected. His wife was Laura, maiden name unknown.

Ashael LEE was also a skilled carpenter and worked with his brother Harvey and cousin, Lemuel LEE on the second statehouse in Vandalia. This statehouse was a renovation of the burned State Bank Building.

She married Jan. 13, 1870, at Ringgold, Ga., Gideon Wesley Ellis who was born Nov. 1, 1841 in Blount County, Ala., and died Jan. 24, 1889 and is buried in family plot in Combs cemetery near Fayetteville, Ark. He entered service of the Confederate States in May 1861 as private in Co. C of the 4th Battalion, afterwards 60th Regiment Georgia Volunteers. He had his left arm broken by bullet in battle at Sharpsburg, Va., was wounded in leg and captured at Strawsburg, Va. He and his two brothers were in same company, one brother, Robert Asbury Ellis, being killed in action on May 16, 1864 near Culpeper, Va. 4. Samuel Wesley Ellis, born Apr. 30, 1875 near Corsicana, Tex; married on Mar. 14, 1898 to Maude Marie Eichelberger, born Feb. 15, 1876; died Dec. 2, 1949 at Hot Springs, N.M.
5. Lena May Ellis, born Apr. 10, 1877 near Corsicana, Tex.; married on Aug. 31, 1898 at Fayetteville, Ark. to Walter Franklin Ham, born Jan. 21, 1872.

FAMILY REUNION, Sept. 2, 1899

The home of Mrs. Mary H. Lea, two miles east of Fayetteville, was the scene of a very enjoyable family reunion, when the children and their posterity living near began assembling at the parental home, while others living from St. Louis to Texas had arrived the previous night and early that morning.

Joyful were the greetings of long separated relatives. Particularly interesting was the meeting of two brothers who had not seen each other for 32 years. "Why, Ben, this can't be you with that bald head and wrinkled face!" "Pshaw, Preston, this isn't you. Your hair was black and you had the face of a young man."

Scarcely had all arrived when the time came for spreading a sumptuous repast beneath the large oaks on a blue-grass lawn. Of these delicious viands all partook with a hearty relish, remembering that it had been more than 30 years since they had been together around that best-of-all, a "home meal".

An artist having been secured to take a picture of the crowd as they sat around the dinner, a photo of the five generations that were represented was also taken. Ten children - five daughters and five sons - constituting all the living family, were there. Fifteen grandchildren were present, eight great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild, making a total of 69 living children.

The dear parent, now 81 years of age and able to move about unaided, seemed proud of her numerous brood and her spirits were buoyed by the meeting. The afternoon was spent in music and conversation until the hour for goodbyes, when all realized that this happy day would never come again to all.
