The last will and testament of William Egan Sen, of Roxbury in the Co. of Suffolk in the Province in New England as followeth: I the sd. William Egan being in my perfect understanding and memory by the blessing of my Heavenly Father with these hands, I now commend my soul, I dispose of my worldly estate as followeth - I will and constitute my eldest son John Egan to be my sole and alone executor and Administrator, to act with full power as I myself can do during my natural life for to take care for to discharge any pay or cause to be paid all my just debts and such charges as may be needfull for my dearest child. And also as an attorney to receive all due debts of the sd. William Egan's estate. I further will and give unto my son John Egan, my now dwelling house together with all and every parcel of land or lands belonging unto me in Roxbury to the sd. John Egan and his male heirs, and if the family should fail of male heirs, then the same benefit to Thomas and his male heirs, and Samuel Egan and his male heirs and William Egan and his male heirs and Joseph Egan and his male heirs - furthermen my will is that my same should equally divided between them not withholding the words all and every parcel in the said last will. Further more my will is that my beloved wife Martha should have hereon penche a year - that is to say three pounds and ten shillings in money and three pounds ten shillings in Country pay, as the sd. Martha shall need of current prices, and the new deutors of the estate and of my heirs for to duly me, and as soon as the Parlor as she shall have occasion for the same penchings above mentioned, to be duly performed by the above mentioned Executors with the sd. Martha Egan during the natural life. My will is that my four sons Thomas Samuel, William and Joseph shall have sixteen penche apiece duly and truly paid unto them in current pay of current prices within six years of the my death by my above mentioned Executors. As for the debts and things my son John Egan to discharge these obligations, I the sd. William Egan Sen. give all my movable within and without doors, excepting those things particularly given - And furthermore I in case that the said Martha don't come to make Thomas & William sixteen penche apiece then to be made up out of the estate -

their time during their minority - Expecting and Requiring them to be very dutiful
and Obedient unto her". He bequeathed to son Seth Lyon when he shall reach the
age of 22 without reservation of the widows third, My house and household,
also my 10 acres of woodland at Westhill, and 1/3 part of my West Division of Land
and 1/3 part of my Right in Common and undivided Land in the South half of
Woodstock, he paying unto each of my three daughters Abigail, Sarah & Esther
Lyon the sum of Thirty pounds as they successively arrive at the age of Twenty,
the years. And to Seth I give my Ten Lots of Meadow in Johnson's Meadow
To my son Gould, my sixty-four acres of Land in the Third Range of out Division
Lots, and my twenty-five acres of Land at Claybrook" also a third of the
lands before mentioned, the other third going to my son Noah Lyon together
with my second Division of Land, called "Thirty-two Acres" - my lot of Twenty-
four acres and two rods, in the North half of Woodstock" - further my will
is that none of my sons shall sell any of their lands herein bequeathed unless among
themselves until they arrive to thirty years of age on penalty of forfeiting same to other
children - Child of 1st wife A + D - 1693 all others by Abigail Gould

Death from accident. J. W. Lyons, a former Versailles citizen succumbs to injuries.

The following is copied from the Carroll Herald, in memory of J. W. Lyons, a native of this county.

The fatal injuries occurring to J. W. Lyons last Thursday removes one of the best men in the county. Mr. Lyons went to his barn Thursday forenoon to let the horses out to the field. While stooping over to pick up something in the manger before untying the horse at his side the animal was bitten by another standing near and jumped against Mr. Lyons. He was crushed up against the manger, but it was only momentarily. He turned around and let the horses out, watered them and did some other chores before going to the house. He then told the folks about the incident but was not apprehensive of serious results. It was late in the afternoon when his condition attracted the attention of the family. Dr. Wright was called out to examine the father and decided that nothing could be done till morning. In the night Mr. Lyons became quite ill and in the morning was taken to the hospital. An operation was performed as successfully as his condition would permit. But it was apparent to the surgeon that his injuries were of a fatal nature and his recovery was impossible. It was found that the intestines were ruptured and broken in several places and other organs had been seriously injured. Mr. Lyons did not long survive the operation, passing away in a short time.

J. W. Lyons was one of the intelligent farmers it is a pleasure to meet. In him one met the ideal qualities of citizenship. His dealings with fellow men were based on the golden rule. He treated others as he would have them treat him and his children. He was honest, intelligent, cordial and unassuming, not obsturive with his own ideas about matters in general, but ready at proper times to express his opinions and defend his conclusions. His ambitions were limited within the horizon of his own home. He served his neighbors in local offices, but never sought them. And though his qualifications were first class. He was all in all the kind of a man one likes to meet. His memory was retentive and his knowledge of the history of political and economic questions was as great as his intimacy with current events.

The following obituary was prepared by one of his near relatives and is based largely upon data which he himself gathered and jotted down.

Jacob W. Lyons was born in Darke Co. Ohio, December 31, 1838. His father, Joseph Lyons, was born in Preble Co. Ohio, December 21, 1810. His father, David Lyons, was born in Rockingham Co. Virginia, and his father in England and emigrated to America and settled in Virginia at a very early date. He afterwards returned to England to secure a legacy but was never afterward heard from. David Lyons, his son, was bound out after his father's departure, until he came of age. In 1807 he united in marriage with Miss Susan Black, and in 1808 he moved to Preble Co. Ohio, where he lived until his death. He was drafted and served six months in the war with England in 1812. His wife died in 1846. The fruits of their marriage were 10 children. Mr. Lyons died in 1850. Joseph, his son and the father of this sketch, was united in marriage to Miss Katherine Emrick in 1837. The fruits of this marriage were seven children, one son and 6 daughters. In 1838 he moved to Darke Co. Ohio, where he lived with his family till his death on February 9, 1865. J. W. Lyons, his only son and subject of this sketch, grew to manhood on his father's farm in Darke Co. Ohio, and on April 7, 1859, he was united in marriage to Miss Lavina

Marker. She was born in Montgomery Co., Ohio, February 12, 1838. After his marriage he purchased a farm in Darke Co. where he built a comfortable home and lived until the spring of 1882, when he moved with his family to Green Co. Iowa. In September he purchased a farm in Carroll County, Iowa where he moved his family.

On May 16, 1883, his wife Lavina died after a prolonged illness of many years, and her remains were laid to rest in the Carroll Cemetery. Mr. Lyons continued to live on his farm with his two youngest sons and several families whom he employed to do his housework until July 2, 1885, when united in marriage to Miss Sarah Abel, born in Erie, Pa., February 12, 1856. With her he lived on the farm until his death. She has been a true helpmate to him in the struggles during the latter years in the building up of a nice home, kind and loving to the children of his first marriage and an earnest, industrious, loving wife, and mother to her husband and children. Eight children were born to bless this union of which six survive to mourn their loss and bless the years they have known of his kind and loving care and attention to their childhood's wants and their needs for their future life.

Mr. Lyons has always been a very public spirited man ever ready to put his shoulder to the wheel of the cause of right for his fellow men; strong in his conviction and true to his principles. He was a volunteer in the service of his country during the rebellion of 1860, and showing honorable discharge papers from the government. He has since been an active member and brother in the G. A. R. Mr. Lyons has been actively and closely connected with the ranks of the Republican party, not as a politician seeking office but as a man seeking to build up his party to the best and highest possible condition. Such men are the true heroes never afraid to the right, and their names go down on the pages of the past in the noble accomplishments of their combined efforts.

Mr. Lyons was a member of the Lutheran Church, having been confirmed upon a public confession of the Lutheran faith after a regular course of instruction in Trinity Evangelical Church in Versailles, Ohio, on the 25th day of March in the year 1875. To these principles he has ever remained faithful, living a true christian life, morally and spiritually clean in his everyday life. He is mourned by all who knew him, for life is sad at parting, yet it is but the step to the future reward.

Mr. Lyons has many relatives and friends in Versailles and vicinity who are very much pained over his tragic death. He was a charter subscriber to the Policy of which he was a regular reader up to his death.

Among many undated scraps of paper in the Slater Collection, one was found that had been folded in six sections, one of which was missing. After further browsing the missing piece was discovered and this is what the paper contained:

John Lyon & his wife Ruth was married in March 15-1688
Ruth Lyon the wife of John Lyon Died November the 20-
1706

Thomas Lyon was born December 28-1689

Ruth Lyon was Born february the 17-1691

John Lyon was Born Apriel 25-1693

Mary Lyon was Born october the 8-1695

their was a Booy Born may 19-1698

Hannah Lyon was Born august the 5-1700

their was a Boy Born December

Daniel Lyon was Born february the 3-1704

Juda Lyon was Born august in the year 1706

Hannah Lyon the wife of Daniel Lyon Died February 19-
1730/31

Hannah Lyon was Born november the 5 Day 1730

The member of the family, and I can think of no one else having done it, arranged the names in the order of birthdates. The compiler of the Lyon Memorial had a penchant for listing children in the order of boys first and girls last. He lists John^c Lyon's children as:

Thomas born "before 1689"

Daniel born "about 1688"

John born "about 1690"

Ruth "living in 1736"

Mary "living in 1736"

Hannah "born 1704"

Jude "living 1736"

This may have been influenced by the order in the will.

We then find in our card index of persons, John² Lyon's card which states that Ruth Ogden was his wife from a reference to a deed from Jude Brown, perhaps her maiden name, to "John Lyon the husband of mi daughter ruth ogden" as her share of her father, John Ogden's estate. Some may want more evidence than this but I am satisfied, as I am with the "birthday list" that contains the names of John Lyon's children.

The last entry "Hannah Lyon was Born november the 5 Day 1730" is made to order for Daniel's daughter Hannah Lyon who married Gilbert Merritt, born 9 January 1725. The next to last entry "Hannah Lyon the wife of Daniel Lyon Died february 19-1730/31" offers a possible solution to the next big question before the house.

With all of these bits and pieces, the conjecture about Daniel's³ uncertain life becomes less clouded or at least we have the means to attempt to straighten out the muddled proble. The Lyon Memorial gives Daniel a wife, Sarah Jennings and/or a wife Elizabeth Marshall, a son Daniel and a daughter Hannah. Elizabeth Marshall was incidentally Daniel's cousin, being the daughter of Daniel's aunt Elizabeth, sister of John².

From the Slater Papers we have -- Daniel³ was born 3 February 1704, had a son Daniel and a daughter Hannah. In 1752 was granted a divorce from Elizabeth Marshall and died in 1781 or 82.

It then would seem to work out that Daniel³ Lyon was born 3 February 1704 and, if married at 21 years of age, married about 1725 to a Hannah ___?___ who bore him a daughter Hannah, on 5 November 1730 and for some reason died on 19 February 1731. He may then have married Sarah Jennings, perhaps by necessity, to have his son Daniel born 12 December 1736. He may have lost Sarah by 1738 or 39. By 1741 or early 1742 he married his cousin Elizabeth Marshall who lived with him one year and left him and from whom he was divorced 4 November 1752.

For the rest of his life, from 48 years to the end, he did not remarry. Three times around with the life he had had would cure any man of marriage. With his daughter Hannah married at about 18 years to Gilbert Merritt, 23, he had a close and congenial relationship with his son-in-law as they went joint bond to various people, had mutual interests, mutual endeavors, and mutual transactions. In his later years he apparently befriended the widow Rachel "Bevalate" (Bouvelot) the widow of Jacques or Pierre Bouvelot of Rye leaving her the use of a room in his house on Byram Neck for as long as she lived. A letter in French attests to the Bouvelot residence in Rye.

As one final point, that someone else will have to research, is the date of Daniel Lyon's will as probated. As far as we know, it was probated 3 April 1782 but our copy as of 3 April 1782 was written 26 February 1782 and not on 7 February 1782 as stated in the Lyon Memorial. We also have a rough draft as of the same date, not signed but with different witnesses.

I sincerely hope that this new information and interpretation will help someone to get or to give a better, clearer picture of their descent from Thomas Lyon in the line of his son John.

Editor's Note: According to the 1790
Census of Massachusetts, page 139,
a Joseph Buttrick and an Isaac Hoar
were living in Concord Town at that
time. Massachusetts Soldiers and
Sailors in the Revolution lists a Joseph
Buttrick as contributing money at the
time of marching to take Burgoyne in
1777. An Isaac Hoar is given as a
fifer from Concord. He may well
have acquired a captain's title later.



LYON and QUEREAU Bible
Records. These have been
copied by Lois Short of Oak
View, California, from a Bible owned
by a friend in San Diego. The data is
quite interesting as it connects very
nicely with the genealogical informa-
tion in Bolton's History of Westches-
ter County, New York, Volume II,
Appendix A, page 748, titled "Lyon of
North Castle". Bolton's account is a
trifle confusing, but even more so are
some of the notations regarding early
family history in the Bible. We will
omit the statements that are obviously
based on tradition (rather than cause
more confusion) and stick to the fac-
tual entries. Bolton says that John
Lyon who settled in Rye, New York,
about 1719 had four sons: 1. Capt.
Roger, 2. John, 3. Samuel, and 4.
James, proprietor of Byram Point.
The Bible record states that he had

four sons, but names them as

The will was drawn 14 July 1749, and was proved 16 August, same year.

MENDON AMENDMENTS

By Thomas E. Collins

*A*N old record book of Ahaz Allen, discovered in 1909, contains records which supplement the Vital Records of Mendon, Massachusetts. I have checked each record carefully against the Mendon Vital records, and have listed here only those which differ in spelling or provide dates which augment in some way the information contained in the published Vital Records of Mendon. For example, the Vital Records often contain only the date of the marriage intention. Ahaz Allen's record shows the date he performed the ceremony.

The exact spelling in the original record has been preserved. Only the few marriages given here vary in any particular from the published records.

Ahaz, born 23 July 1765, was the youngest child of Joseph and Lydia (Aldrich) Allen. His mother was daughter of Moses Aldrich, celebrated Quaker preacher. Ahaz was born, lived and died within the limits of the old town of Mendon. He was a farmer and country squire, attending to the legal affairs of his neighbors, and as magistrate heard small cases and solemnized many marriages. For many years he was town treasurer.

Newsy Letter

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ELEN BRADFORD HARDEBROOK, S. C. G. S. member copied the following letter, which is in the possession of her father's first cousin, Olive Brownell of Watsonville, California. It was written to Mrs. Brownell's grandparents by the grandmother's sister and is reproduced verbatim.

"Stat of Missouri County of Newton
December the 29 1857.

"Dear Brother and Sister

"I now take my pen in hand to let you know that wee are all well at prezant hoping these few lines ma find you all well and to let you know that I got your letter the 28 of this instant which gave me great satisfaction to here that you was all well at doing and well pleased with texes (this refers to Texas) I will gave you some of markiting prises horses hav bin high but is coming down moles (mules?) is a good price Cow is from 10 to 15 Dollars work cattl from 40 to 60 Dolars Pork 4 to 5 c Lbs wheat \$1.00 per bushel corn fr 25 to 35 cts bushel Money is mity scearze and ha(r)d to come at Fath and family is all well at prezant but was here today william and James living round Alexander and tolover somewhere in Arkansas Elizabeth and Mary an is some ware on the waters of the gaskanad I hant herd from Mary an sense last summer it has bin a bout tree years sens I herd from Elizabeth and they was ing no good and Mary Twiddy mari old Conaway and I want you to wri to me when this come to hand and Direct your letter to hayle botum
