

Patriot 2 Feb 1916: Local: The death occurred at Caledonia yesterday, February 1st, of Mr. James Walker, age 89, the only surviving brother of our respected citizen Mr. David Walker. The deceased has been in failing health for the past few years, but was not confined to bed until a few days ago when his illness assumed a more serious turn, terminating fatally. He was born in Brackley Point, but has been a resident of Caledonia for some years. He was Scottish descent, his father being a native of Perthshire, Scotland, and his mother being Miss Catherine Stewart of Belfast. He has been successfully engaged in farming since his boyhood. He leaves to mourn one son Wallace on the homestead, one daughter, Mrs. D. L. McKinnon, Montague; and one sister, Mrs. John Duff of Dundas. The deceased was greatly esteemed in the community and leaves behind him a record of a long and useful life.

Guardian 8 June 1918: Death: In her late home there passed away on the 11th of May last one of the first settlers of Brooklyn in the person of Mrs. John MacPherson. She was born in Skye, Scotland 88 years ago, and with her people came to Prince Edward Island in 1841. They settled in Heatherdale, which was then nothing but forest, and she remained with them till she married Mr. John MacPherson 18 years afterwards. With her husband she started life in the forest again with all that meant, settling in Brooklyn, where she lived till the day of her death. Though she experienced the hardships peculiar to new settlers, yet she enjoyed fair health, a good measure of happiness and peace, and the blessing of being the mother of a large family, which possesses the interesting feature of twins twice, all boys and all living - Christina (Mrs. MacPherson), Bellevue; Norman at home and Angus in Caledonia (twins); Annie (Mrs. John MacPhee), Bellevue; Ewan died in 1894; John, Sydney, N.S.; and Lachlan, Charlottetown (twins); Elizabeth Anne, (Mrs. M. L. MacPhee), Heatherdale.

Guardian 1 March 1926: In Memoriam: Mrs. Peter Beaton: There passed to her eternal reward on January 31, 1926 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. N. P. MacPherson, Kilmuir, Mrs. Peter Beaton at the advanced age of eighty-six years. By the passing away of this estimable lady one of the very few remaining links binding the present generation with the past is now severed. She was born in Kilmuir, Isle of Skye, Scotland and emigrated with her parents to this province in the year 1841. The family settled in the locality where she passed the remainder of her life. — Her husband predeceased her almost fourteen years (ago). She raised a family of eleven children, all of whom she endeavored to bring in the nature and admonition of the Lord. All of this large family grew up to young manhood and womanhood. The following members of her family predeceased her: Angus, Maggie, Annie (Mrs. William MacKinnon), Daniel, Mary (Mrs. W. Spooner), and Lauchlin. There remain to cherish the memory of a kind and affectionate Christian mother the following: Effie (Mrs. N.P. MacPherson), with whom she died; William in Alaska, Malcolm in California, John in Quincy, Mass., and Alex in Brooklyn, P.E.I. She also leaves thirty-seven grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Guardian 8 May 1935: In Memoriam: After a brief illness patiently borne there passed away on April 24, 1935 at the home of her sister, Mrs. Margaret Finlayson, Kilmuir, Miss Catherine Murchison in the 85th year of her age. The late Miss Murchison was born August 16, 1850 at Point Prim, a daughter of Simon Murchison and his wife Flora Murchison. For the last thirty-five years she made her home with her sister in Kilmuir. Three sisters and three brothers predeceased her. Mrs. Finlayson is the only member of the family living. The funeral service, which was conducted by Rev. D. M. Sinclair on April 25th, was largely attended, a token of the respect in which the deceased was held. Mr. Sinclair spoke briefly from the words "In the fear of the Lord is strong confidence." Interment was in the Polly Cemetery, Mount Buchanan.

**MacEachern Genealogy based on the
"A Collection of Fragments of Family History Derived from Ancient Records & Authentic Traditions" -
1866, by John MacEachern, Rice Point, Lot 65, PEI**

The following family genealogy was compiled from the above noted diary of John MacEachern Elder. If you haven't read the above document, you should go to the Island Register and read it for yourself. It is a compelling story about the way one Highland family raised the money to come to the New World, their adventures in gaining passage and the trials encountered on that journey across the ocean. It also gives an excellent description of Charlottetown at the time of arrival (1830) of this family and how they go about adapting to their new life and surroundings. It is written in a first person account, although at the latter end of the gentleman's life. He is obviously recording his family lore for future generations and he is to be commended on doing that. The style and language used indicate he obviously was well schooled and well read. Definitely worth reading if you haven't already done so.

The genealogy as extracted from the diary was supplemented with census information, newspaper items, etc. as

all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance.

Patriot 21 Mar 1874: Died: At her son's residence, Savage Harbor, on the 8th inst., after a few days illness, Harriet, wife of the late Mr. David Pigot, Sergeant-Major, Royal Artillery, in the 88th year of her age. Deceased was a native of Portsmouth, England, and at the age of two years moved with her parents to Newfoundland, thence to Savage Harbor, more than 40 years ago. She retained her faculties to the last and died in perfect peace.

Island Argus 20 Apr 1875: Deaths: Shaw - Montague River on Saturday the 10th inst., at the advanced age of 86 years, Mr. Neil Shaw, a native of Collonsay, Argyleshire, Scotland, Great Britain. He was a resident of the Island for 55 years, senior Deacon of the Baptist Church of Three Rivers for many years, loving and beloved. By the Grace of God, lived the life of faith, walked with God and departed this life in full hope of a glorious immortality.

Island Argus 27 Apr 1875: Deaths: Creed - At Sturgeon Bay on the 21st of March, Catherine Creed, relict of the late J. B. Creed, at the advanced age of 85 years. Deceased emigrated to the Island from the Isle of Mull in 1810. She was highly respected by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Her end was peace.

Patriot 16 May 1874: Died: At East Point on Sunday, the 10th inst., Anne, relict of the late Alexander Beaton, at the advanced age of 95 years. She was born in South Uist, Scotland and at an early age she with her parents emigrated to Glengary, Upper Canada. The family after remaining there for some time, removed to this Island and finally settled at the East Point where the deceased lived for upwards of 70 years. To the calls of charity and distress she always cheerfully and generously responded. Notwithstanding her very great age she retained her mental faculties until the last, and after having received the consolations of her religion, she died as she lived, at peace with God and man.

Patriot 30 May 1874: Died: At South Lake on the 11th inst., Mr. Angus Stewart in the 82nd year of his age. The deceased was a native of Perthshire, in Scotland; lived as a Christian should, and died in the assured hope of immortal life at the appearing of Jesus.

Patriot 13 Jun 1874: Died: At her residence, Kent Street, on Sunday, May 31st, Mrs. Bridget Breen, widow of the late Mr. John Breen, Blacksmith, aged 99 years and 5 months. She emigrated to this Island from Ireland, Sept 25th, 1824, and was known for her kindness and hospitality.

Patriot 19 Oct 1874: Died: On Saturday, Oct. 3rd, in the 78th year of his age, Donald Gillis, an old and respected inhabitant of Orwell Cove. He emigrated to this Island in the ship *Polly* in the year 1803. He leaves a large circle of friends and acquaintances to mourn their loss.

Patriot 21 Jan 1875: Died: On Friday, the 15th inst., at her residence on the Covehead Road, in the 75th year of her age, Mrs. Catherine Reilly, relict of the late Patrick Reilly. The deceased was a native of Thomastown, County Kilkenny, Ireland. She, with her late husband, emigrated to this Island in the year 1829. They settled in the primeval forest, and by their industry made the wilderness to blossom as the rose. The deceased was widely known for her many virtues, her social qualities, her benevolent disposition and lady-like manners. The deceased left a large circle of relations and friends to mourn their loss.

Patriot 21 Jan 1875: Died: At St. Peter's Road on the 4th inst., of cancer in the stomach, Henrietta Affleck, relict of the late Mr. Thomas Connelly, in the 63rd year of her age. The deceased was a native of Dumfries, Scotland, and emigrated to this Island in 1820. She bore her sickness with great patience and resignation to the Will of God, and was highly respected by all who knew her.

Patriot 21 Jan 1875: Died: At New Argyle, Lot 30, on the 10th inst., after a lingering illness, Mr. Donald McDonald, in the fifty-third year of his age, leaving a wife and nine children to mourn their loss. The deceased emigrated from the Isle of Mull to this Island in the year 1838.

Patriot 3 Jun 1875: Died: At Belle Creek on the ___ult., Mr. Donald McDougall in the 86th year of his age. The deceased was a native of the Isle of Skye and emigrated to Prince Edward Island in 1803 in the brig *Polly*. He was an honest, industrious man, a good neighbour and kind-hearted friend. He spent nearly all his days at Belle Creek, and as he lived respected, he died regretted by his neighbours and acquaintances.

Presbyterian Evangelical Protestant Union 16 Sep 1875: Deaths: At Charlottetown on Monday the 6th inst., at the residence of her son, in the 78th year of her age, Mary, relict of the late Hon. Peter Stewart McNutt, of Darnley, and eldest daughter of the late Francis Longworth, Esq., of this city, and formerly of Esker, Athlone, Ireland.

New Provincial Archivist Appointed: In a news release dated August 4, 2006 Hon. Elmer MacFadyen, Minister of Community and Cultural Affairs, announced that Jill MacMicken-Wilson has been named Provincial Archivist and head of the Public Archives and Records Office, succeeding Marilyn Bell who recently retired from the position. Ms. Macmicken-Wilson was educated at the University of Prince Edward Island and Queen's University where she obtained a Masters degree in history. She has worked in the archival field for almost ten years and has been active in the Archives Council of Prince Edward Island as well as national organizations in the profession. Formerly employed as systems archivist at the Public Archives and Records Office, she has also worked for a number of years as a sessional lecturer at the University of Prince Edward Island.

The Public Archives and Records Office is responsible for collecting and preserving documentary history of the province, and for ensuring the documents are available to the public. In addition, the office is responsible for recording information management of the provincial government. The reference services of the Public Archives are located in the George Coles Building in Charlottetown.

"I am very pleased that Jill MacMicken-Wilson has accepted the position of provincial archivist and I welcome her to this important new role. I know she will serve the province well," said Community and Cultural Affairs Minister Elmer MacFadyen. It took three years of long days for the committee to read from microfilm the *Summerside Journal*, the *Pioneer*, the *Journal-Pioneer*, the *Island Farmer*, the *Agriculturist*, the *Island Guardian*, and the *Charlottetown Herald* to find the facts included in *Goin' to the Corner*. The book is divided into eight chapters, followed by a list of maps. *Goin' to the Corner* is anything but a boring book. Contained within its pages are copies of actual newspaper articles, diaries, excerpts from journals, list of first landowners, numerous pictures - and much more. The front cover shows Elmsdale Corner in earlier times, while the back cover illustrates students at O'Brien Road School during the mid-1930's. It is a very readable and interesting book and an excellent resource for historians and genealogists, and an excellent value for \$29.95 plus postage and handling.
