Notes on William Mallett Family:

1. Orange County was formed in 1889 from the southwestern portion of Los Angeles County. Therefore, the communities of Westminster and Santa Ana were in Los Angeles County before 1889 and in Orange County from 1889 on.
2. William Mallett, Sr.: 1870 Census, New Almaden, Santa Clara County, California; occupation miner; there was a colony of British, mostly Cornish, miners working the quicksilver (mercury) mines there in that time; see The Cornish Miner in America. Original naturalization (citizenship) records on file in Superior Court, Santa Clara County, San Jose, California; copy in possession of compiler. Birth date of 21 August 1838 taken from monumental inscription, Santa Ana Cemetery; no addition evidence or proof found to date. 1900 Census shows entered U.S. 1863, married 36 years (therefore, since ca. 1864), birth date May 1838. No record of birth of a William Mallett in Cornwall found in indexes to English birth records for 1838. Copy of death certificate in possession of compiler; lists parents as unknown, birthplace England, birth date "August". Records of the Westminster Colony note the arrival of William and Caroline Mallett and family, summer 1875.
3. Caroline Pope Mallett: Birth date, birthplace, and parents' names confirmed by certified copy of birth record from London, in possession of compiler. No record of marriage of William and Caroline found; unknown whether in England or U.S. Certified copy of death certificate from Los Angeles County records in possession of compiler. Record of her christening not found in typescript of records of St. Mabyn Parish, Cornwall. However, parish records do show christenings of several of her siblings, as well as the burials of her parents and some siblings. 1900 Census indicates she was the mother of 8 children, 6 then living. Recorded deaths of Edward J. in 1868 and John Henry in 1893 leave 6 known sons living in 1900. Her sister Celina (Selina) Pope, unmarried, born May 1850, whose twin Emmeline had died at age 2 in February 1853 in St. Mabyn, was living with them in 1900. Her brother Henry Pope migrated first to Pennsylvania, then in 1877 to Westminster, California, with his wife Ann and family. Henry died in California in 1921.
4. Records of Oak Hill Cemetery (established 1847), San Jose, California, show: Old part, Lot 3, Block 12, Section C; owner, William Mallett. Burials in the lot: EDWARD J. MALLET, age 10 months, died June 11, 1868, born and died Almaden. JESSE MALLET, age 1 year, died December 9, 1869, born and died Almaden. CHARLES GOLDSWORTHY, age 2 years 10 months, died June 20, 1869, b. & d. Almaden. Jesse Mallett (gender not shown on records) is believed to be a child of John Mallett (1870 and 1880 census, Almaden township), probably brother or cousin of William. John Mallett was born in England ca. 1824-1826; U.S. citizen, San Jose, 1871 (court records). Relationship, if any, of the Goldsworthy child to the Malletts is unknown. NOTE: Several family plots in same section of Oak Hill show on headstones of oldest burials, "Native of Cornwall, England." Also buried in the vicinity are some notable pioneers, including several Donner Party survivors.
5. Original marriage certificate of Arthur Mallett and Isabel Josephine Luntsford in possession of compiler. Married in Methodist Episcopal Church, Westminster, on 25 December 1902. Divorced, 1912, Orange County Superior Court. Both remarried. Certified copy of Arthur's death certificate in possession of compiler. Copies of court files of probate of Arthur Mallett's estate, Contra Costa County Superior Court, in possession of compiler. Documentary evidence supplemented by personal reminiscences of daughters of Arthur and Isabel, Nellie Marie Mallett Durieck Jesse (1904-1985) and Goldie Isabel Mallett Newman (b. 17 September 1906) and their children. No children born to subsequent marriages of Arthur or Isabel.
6. William and Caroline Mallett apparently retired from farming about 1897-1898 and moved to Long Beach, California.

MOTHER of MARY MALLETT

I have been asked to tell you the history of early settling of the valley east of Vale, my immediate vicinity.

"Three men in search of a new location left Mason Valley Nevada in 1881 with light spring wagon, camping equipment and provisions.

They were I. H. Adams (white Horse Adams) one man who did not continue the entire journey, and C. W. Mallett, who followed a route that took in Lake and Marney counties leading to Malheur river where Vale now stands, they only a stage station on the Oregon Trail (Old stone house owned by Reinharts). So far, no location had appealed to the two men though they saw what seemed to be a desirable place to plan for an irrigation canal.

Here they paused and discussed possibilities and future of the country, yet they wanted to reassure themselves so pushed on across Snake river at the point where the Boise and Owyhee rivers fed the Snake.

Their desire was to find what western Idaho had to offer the after exploring the Salm-on river country and source of Payette river, also parts of Washington area, it was concluded that the Malheur Oregon region was their choice of land and home site.

After returning to the Malheur a crude survey was made for a future ditch possibility followed by determination to remain in Malheur valley. Mr. Mallett once said that the valley could blossom as a rose with water available.

About this time this group already increased by a new member, C. H. Brown was including G. W. Blanton and his family from

Kansas. Mr. Lee also joined the small community.

Mr. Blanton, Mr. Adams and Mr. Mallett selected land they wanted on which to file and make homes.

Mr. Lee as along Malheur river five miles east of Vale, Mr. Blanton that which would come under the ditch, Mr. Adams, land later the Standfield holdings and Mr. Mallett's homestead on the south side of the valley including timber claim. This was located then now seven miles from Vale and better land than that along the river.

C. W. Mallett filed on a full section, later turning half of to C. H. Brown. To own then was to file on and occupy it for five years to claim ownership.

Soon afterward Mr. Lee and Adams returned to Nevada to bring their families but Mr. Lee sold his rights to Thomas Holliday. Mr. Adams brought his wife and son Earnest in the autumn of 1881, Others making up the small community

also to arrive were James Walters, the Adams family, came to make homes under the new ditch. Mr. Chandler too was the owner of a small supply store in the neighborhood.

I, Mary W. Mallett have since 1881 to 1938 seen many changes and know many more will follow due to beginnings of irrigation.

Halliday, who with Mrs. Halliday and Mr. Lee's nephew, James Walters, also his niece and family, the Arnolds, C. H. Brown and Mr. Chandler, together with Mr. and Mrs. H. Adams and their son Ernest, came in the autumn of 1881 to Malheur valley making homes under the new ditch begun late that fall.

Early Malheur County History

Probably you have heard the story of the lady from Boston who hurried home in a pouring rain and was greeted by the exclamation: "Why, were you out in all that rain?" Very primly she answered, "Oh, no! Only in that which fell in my immediate vicinity."

I have been asked to tell you the story of the early settling of this part of the valley east of Vale. But I can tell you only of that which took place in my immediate vicinity.

Three men in search of a new location left Mason Valley, Nevada May 1 of 1881, and made their way to Baker county, Oregon. These men were T. H. Adams, William Lee and G. W. Mallet. With camping outfit and provisions loaded in a light spring wagon drawn by two horses these pioneers followed a route that took them into northern California, through Alturas and into Lake county, Oregon, thence through Harney county and eastward to the place on the Malheur river where Vale now stands, at that time only a stage station on the Oregon trail.

Thus far, no location had appealed to these men. At this point they first saw what seemed a desirable place to plan for an irrigation canal. Here they paused and discussed possibilities and the future of this country, yet they would be more sure when they had seen the kind of country to be found in western Idaho. They therefore pushed on across the Snake river probably crossing at the old Riverside ferry on the Old Oregon Trail near the point where the Owyhee and Boise rivers empty into the Snake. After exploring the Salmon river country and following the Payette river to its mouth, they concluded that the Oregon side was most desirable and returned to the location on the Malheur in Oregon, where, after surveying in a crude way the line for a ditch for carrying irrigation water to the lands below, they decided to remain in this region.

About this time this group was joined by G. W. Blanton and his family from Kansas. There were also his married son and a son in law, Seth Leavitt, all of whom for a time camped near the site chosen for a beginning of a ditch.

Soon after this the three men of the original party, together with Mr. Blanton, selected the portions of land upon which each in-

Pioneer History Concluded

By Mary W. Mallett

Our family moved at once into the small house built by Mr. Brown on his land seven miles east of Vale, where we remained until lumber was brought from a mill at Emmett, Idaho, with which to build our two room shack. The history of procuring this lumber is interesting, as my husband in the early spring of 1882, gone to Emmett and worked in this saw mill for two months, arranging to take his pay in lumber. Late in October of that year John Blanton, the oldest son of G. W. Blanton, was hired to haul with his mule team, this lumber to the site of our present home. With some assistance from Mr. Brown in putting up the frame Mr. Mallett completed the house so that we moved into it on December 17, 1882.

The first Thanksgiving dinner was an event which must not be omitted in this narrative. The six families in our immediate group met in the little one room house belonging to the late Judge Brown, and there celebrated our first Thanksgiving dinner. Unlike the Puritans on the first occasion of such a celebration, we did not have wild turkey and pumpkin pie but we did have roast chicken, the fowls having been given to me by Mr. Chandler. And our pies were made from squash bought in Boise with eggs I had packed carefully before we left Nevada. I recall the laughter that greeted the color scheme of my table spread as it

was, with a white tablecloth, and set with blue willowware dishes purchased as we passed through Winnemucca. Mr. Brown had a dozen red fringed napkins which completed the patriotic combination.

Our Christmas dinner brought the same group together again, this time in the home of Mrs. Arnold, while on New Year's day we all gathered again in the home of the Hallidays. Thus the social gatherings relieved the toil and the hardships which characterized our early life in the new raw country.

For our groceries and supplies, long journeys with team and wagon had to be made, either to Baker or to Boise. These trips requiring several days, were made three or four times a year, during which time I would be left alone with my small children. Usually one of Mr. Blanton's daughters would ride her horse from her home four miles east and stay with me during the absence of my husband and Mr. Brown.

Ten miles eastward from our home was a line of grade stakes indicating the survey of the O. S. L. R. R. No construction had been made at this point when we arrived here, but in 1884 this section was completed and on the site of Ontario a new town was laid out. When the depot was built and the late G. L. King was sent as agent here, his land on the hill west of Ontario came under the Nevada ditch. Mr. King was chosen secretary of the Nevada ditch company and for many years held that important office.

With the coming of the railroad the hardship of these long journeys for groceries ended. Also with the establishment of a post office at Ontario the first postmaster being the late William Scott, another difficulty was removed for through those first early years there was no post office nearer than Glenn's store on Willow creek 16 miles from our home. To this place Mr. Brown and Mr. Mallett would walk on alternate weeks to get our mail.

I remember that our first garden was grown on a two acre tract, cleared and cultivated perhaps a mile east of the point on the Malheur river, where the new ditch was taken out. Besides an abundance of excellent vegetables, a goodly crop of wheat for our chickens was also grown, hauled to our place and threshed with flails.

As the years went on sage brush was cleared from the land and fields leveled in readiness for the water which, after two and a half years, reached our land. The building of a dam across the Malheur river and the digging of the channel of the ditch in the slow way of

those times was very different from the speedy methods of today, hence months of toil were required with scrapers and teams and even with picks and shovels in the hands of men to make this irrigation canal.

As I have already said a part of our land was taken as a timber claim, so as soon as the water reached the land we planted groves from small nursery size trees already started from seeds. The first locusts were grown from seed fathered from a tree which we passed in Humboldt valley, Nevada. From this start a grove of locusts was planted and these were the parent trees of all the locusts now to be found in the valley. Mr. Brown sent to Illinois for small maple seedlings which were planted on his land and ours and from this start all of the large maples growing on ours and many other ranches had their beginning. Recently we measured some of the oldest maples at our home, trees now probably 52 years old. Several are five feet in diameter. There were also planted the seeds of the Catalpa, ash and elm which as the years went on grew into beautiful shade and ornamental trees. Our groves have furnished fuel and fence posts for more than 40 years, and in recent years even lumber for several types of construction. The first cottonwoods were pulled from the ground as nursery size trees along the Carson river in Nev. and brought here by J. H. Adams when he returned in the fall of '81 with his family. The hundreds of thousands of Cottonwoods now growing all over this country may trace their ancestry to that horse bucket full of young trees brought 500 miles in a covered wagon 57 years ago.

The first orchard on our land was enclosed within a sage brush fence built by laying two parallel rows of newly grubbed sage brush, trunks or roots inward and brush or tops on the outside, making a substantial wall about four or five feet across and five or six feet in height. Through this stock could not enter nor could rabbits penetrate, hence the five acre tract thus enclosed made a safe region for starting young orchard trees as well as a sheltered garden spot. Within a very few years these trees were producing apples, peaches, plums, prunes, apricots, etc. providing shelter for hives of bees, and making a haven for many song birds.

Perhaps this story relates more or personal history than of community life in the early days of this county, yet it rust in this way I have given a view of the early life of the pioneers who have made the history of this section.

THE MALLETT FAMILY IN MASSACHUSETTS AND MAINE!

INTRODUCTION BY FLORENCE E. CARR, SOMERVILLE, MASS.

There are many people in the United States today who bear the name of Mallet, and and they are undoubtedly the descendants of the Mallets who were Huguenot refugees, and who came to America at the time of the Revocation in France, or even earlier. They were of a rich and powerful family in Normandy in the early history of France, and were early interested in the Reformation. The title is still borne by the head of the family in France, viz: the Marquis Malet de Granville, and the name of Mallett is still one distinguished in France and America in art and science. Baird, the historian says, 'Charles, Duke of Orleans, third and favorite son of Francis I of France, may have had sincere predilections for Protestantism. At least, it is barely possible, that the Antoine de Mallet, when, on the 8th of Sept. 1543, Charles sent him to the Elector of Saxony and the Landgrave of Hesse. Protestants, were something besides mere diplomatic intrigues to secure for his father the support of these princes. Lefevre, a great Protestant, was Charles' tutor, and a friend of Mallet.'

This Mallet must have been a skilled diplomat and an orator to have pleaded his cause before foreign rulers. Then there was Paul Henri Mallet, born in Geneva, of refugee parents. He became famous for his writings on the history of Denmark and Sweden. ~~at whose courts he lived for some time. History mentions more of these Mallets of whom we have not space to tell.~~

That the Mallets were early subjected to severe persecutions because of their devotion to the cause of Protestantism is amply proved by various records, and while there is no actual proof that those who fled to this country were of the same family, there is every reason to believe that they were. The custom of those days of renaming the children for the elders of the family makes it difficult to trace a direct line, but it also goes to prove in this instance a kinship, since all the Mallet emigrants in this country bear the same Christian names.

David Mallet - 6 times (grandfather)

There were several Mallets who fled to America at about the same time and settled in different localities. We are told of David Mallet, who, with his five sons, held a position of prominence in the army of Louis XIV, fled to England, and died there in 1691. One son was broken on the wheel, and another established himself as a physician in Yorkshire, England. A third son sent to Germany, and we hear of a David Mallet at Rothen and later a hat manufacturer in Berlin in 1685, who probably was one of these 5 sons. The fourth son, John Mallet, came to America, bringing with him his brother, and a nephew named Peter. This John Mallet was a ship carpenter, so tradition says, and probably escaped from Lyons, France. He was a man of considerable wealth, and succeeded in bringing some of it with him. He first came to N. Carolina, and made several return voyages (probably secretly) to France. During one of these return trips his wife and child were lost at sea. He then married his servant, Johannah Larion, a woman who is said to have been very beautiful; to them were born several children. This couple, John Mallet and his wife, finally settled at Fairfield, Ct. He died in a ripe old age, leaving many descendants and much property. The sons and daughters were more numerous than at the present time, and there is no doubt that sons of this John Mallet's descendants remained in N. Carolina and finally settled in Virginia, since the name of Mallet is among those of the early settlers of Manakin, Va.

Charles Weiss, who was assisted in his work of compiling a history of the Huguenots in France and America by a Charles Mallet, tells of the contraband trade established by the refugees, which constituted a loss to France. They caused to be sent, by correspondents which they had in Lyons and in the principal towns of Dauphiny, articles

of daily consumption. In the space of two years the three brothers, Jean, Jaques, and Louis Mallet, thus succeeded in drawing from the Kingdom manufactured articles to the value of more than a million livres.

5 times great grand father of Charles Mallet's Family
 Among the Huguenots who settled at Oxford, Mass., was Jean Mallet, in whom we of Somerville, Mass., are more particularly interested. Bolbec, France, in the Province of Normandy, was believed to be the home of this man. He sailed from England, together with 30 families, in 1685 or 1686. Gabriel Bernon, a man of considerable wealth, and a Huguenot of some notability, was the original owner of some 25,000 acres in what is now a part of the town of Oxford, having received a grant of the same by purchase from Governor Dudley. This little company first landed at Fort Hill, Boston, and were cared for by friends, and probably Jean Mallet and his children were received by relatives, as Mallets were then living in Boston. And just here I would like to say I believe this Jean Mallet to have been a brother of the David Mallet before mentioned, who fled to England. This little company of Huguenots, among whom we find the names of Faneuil, Bowdoin, Sigourney, etc. which have since become so familiar in the history of Boston, proceeded to Oxford, Mass., and established a settlement which bid fair to become a flourishing, prosperous town. After a few years, however, the Indians, who had been represented as peaceful, became troublesome, and at length a massacre took place. There was also some trouble over the title deeds, which never became straightened, and the families, becoming disheartened, finally returned, some to Boston, and others to New Rochelle, N. Y. Traces of these French homes are still to be seen at Oxford, Mass., but, unfortunately, the church records of that time have been lost. The descendants of Gabriel Bernon, however, still have many papers relating to that time, and, in the list appended to one of these papers, we find the name of Jean Mallet, Ancien, or Elder, of the Church. Jean Mallet returned to Boston in 1696, and probably practiced the trade of a shipwright. He had at this time six children, all of whom were grown, and had escaped with him from France. There is no record of the mother of these children, and doubtless she died, either in France, or soon after removing to America. In 1702 we find that Jean Mallet purchased ten acres of land in Somerville, Mass., of Jonathan Fosket, and proceeded to erect the old mill, which still stands, and is known as the old Powder House.

It is commonly believed that at this time occurred the marriage of Jean Mallet with Jane Larion, and that she died, and that in 1712 he married Ann Mico. This I believe to be a mistake. Old Jean Mallet was then about 60 years old, and had evidently seen many hardships in life. Everything points to the fact that he built the mill to establish his two sons, Andrew and Louis, in business, they having been brought up as millers. His son John, evidently the eldest and whom he mentions in his will as having started in life, I believe to have been the John Mallet who was a shopkeeper in Boston, and whose will was probated there in 1741, and that he is the John Mallet who married Jane Larion, Ann Mico, and later, Elizabeth Makerwhit, who survived him.

I have mentioned a John Mallet who married Johannah Larion in Fairfield, Ct. This Johannah Larion had a brother Louis, who was a Refugee and settled in Milford, Ct. He became very wealthy, and dying, at a good old age, left a generous bequest to the French Church in Boston, and also to the one at New Rochelle, N. Y. I believe Jane Larion, who married John Mallet of Boston to have been a younger sister of Louis and Johannah, and that her husband was a cousin of the Mallet of Fairfield, Ct.

Jean Mallet of Somerville, Mass., built a homestead near the old mill, and probably removed to this with his son Andrew, and with his daughters Mary and Elizabeth. His son Matthew (who is also mentioned as being of Stratford, Ct., thus further proving kinship with the Ct. branch of the Mallet family) married at Cambridge, Mass., in 1703, Abigail Linn. For some time they lived in the old mill, the family still retaining their interest in the French Church in Boston, of which Jean Mallet still served as Elder. This Church was held in the Latin schoolhouse situated in School St., on the site now covered by a part of King's Chapel, and down to the statue of Franklin in front of the City Hall. Here the French Protestants worshipped for about 30 years, when they were allowed to build a church of their own on the site now occupied by the School St. Savings Bank.

In 1709 occurred a break in the family of Jean Mallet at the old Somerville, Mass., mill, and the daughter Mary married Daniel Blodget of Woburn, Mass. About this time the son Louis Mallet removed to Somerville and married Margaret Fosdick. Louis seems to have alternated between Boston and Somerville, sometimes living in one town and then in the other. In 1715 Andrew Mallet married Martha Morris of Cambridge, Mass., and brought his bride home to the old mill. Finally Elizabeth Mallet, the last of old Jean's flock, was married in the old French Church to Daniel Vieaux.

In 1720 old Jean Mallet made his will, leaving legacies to his daughters and to his sons, John and Matthew, and to his sons Andrew and Louis the homestead and the now famous old mill. Two years after making his will Jean Mallet died, at the age of 78 years, and is buried in the old cemetery at Charlestown, Mass. The son Louis Mallet soon sold his share in the homestead and mill to his brother Andrew, who continued to live on this estate until his death in 1743. It is this son, Andrew, who numbers the most numerous descendants of the Charlestown Mallets. His 8 children all grew to maturity and married as follows: Andrew married twice, and died before his father -- John Mallet married Martha Wilson and removed to Topsham, Me. where his descendants still live, some of whom bore a noble part in the Revolutionary War--Martha Mallet married Shadrach Ireland -- Elizabeth married Ephraim Mallet, who probably was her cousin-- Michael Mallet married Martha Robinson, and to him was left the bulk of his father's property, subject to a life interest held by his mother. In 1747 this Michael sold the old Mill to William Foye, Treasurer of the Bay State Colony, and here was stored the powder belonging to the Colony. Michael was guardian for his young brother Isaac and for his sisters Mary and Phoebe, minor children at the time of their father's death--Isaac Mallet in after years became very wealthy and owned considerable land at Charlestown, Mass. He was a blacksmith and a schoolmaster at Charlestown Neck, etc. A great deal of property was destroyed at Charlestown during the Bunker Hill battle, and Isaac Mallet claimed damages to the amount of \$3,200, which, of course, he never received.

The sons of Ephraim and Elizabeth Mallet served faithfully in the Revolutionary War, and we find Ephraim Mallet, aged 18 years, among the little garrison on Prospect Hill. Afterwards he re-enlisted at Fishkill, N. Y. and there are various records of his services preserved in the archives of the Boston State House.

The name of Mallet, once so common in this locality is now extinct, and all that remains to mark the record of their lives are a few old gravestones in the Charlestown, Mass., cemetery, and the various Wills and Deeds in the Registry Office of Middlesex County. Much of story and romance is hidden between the lines of these old records, and in imagination one can call up vivid pictures of life in the old Colonial days while poring over these papers.

The above article was written at the request of the Somerville, Mass. Historical Society, and was read before that Society at one of its Literary Evenings. It was printed in the Magazine, Historic Leaves. I carefully gathered the data for it, and shall be very glad for you to use it in your Mallet History.

I am sorry to say that I have no relics of the Mallets. My great-great-grandmother was a grand-daughter of Ancestor Jean Mallet of the Mill. These people were burned out during the Bunker Hill battle, and they lost everything. Outside of my own connections I know of no Mallets in this vicinity.

There are none of the old Mallet houses left. Those at Somerville, Mass. were long since destroyed. The burning of those at Charlestown accounts for the fact that we find no heirlooms of family papers.

Several of the descendants of Ephraim Mallet and wife, Elizabeth Mallet, are living, and there may be others of whom I have no knowledge. Wyman in his history says that Ephraim Mallet of Watertown, Mass. was the son of Ancestor Jean Mallet, which certainly is not correct, since he did not mention him in his will, and he married a grand-daughter of Jean Mallet.

Somerville, Mass., was once a part of Charlestown, and the region of Ancestor Jean Mallet's Mill, or the old Powder House, as it is called, is very near the Cambridge line. I understand that the records of the 1st Church of Cambridge, Mass., have been published, I am sure that in these Mallet records may be found.

5 times great grand father

(See previous sketches of it). He was one of the founders of the French Church in Boston, of which Peter Faneuil was a member. For a long time Jean Mallet was the very faithful Deacon of that Church. His records show that he was ever a faithful Christian; a man of sound judgment; of good education; and that he transacted much of the business of his neighbors. By occupation he was a shipwright. His Will was probated Feb. 19, 1722--'23; in which he devised legacies to his sons John and Matthew; gave to his son Louis 1/2 of land and grist mill; 1/4 of house etc. To son Andrew 1/2 of land and mill and three-fourths of a house. To his daughters legacies. As his wife is not named in this will she is supposed to have died before he left France, or shortly after his arrival in America. *(Will still stands)*

THE WILL OF ANCESTOR JEAN MALLET.

 In the name of God, Amen. I, John Mallet of Charlestown, in the County of Middlesex, in the Province of Massachusetts Bay in New England, shipwright, being weak in body, but of a sound and disposing mind and memory, praised be to God for the same. Considering nature's Frailty and Death's Certainty, I do make and ordain this to be my last Will and Testament, as follows:

FIRST. I commend my soul into the hands of God who made it, hoping for mercy and ye pardon and forgiveness of my sins thro the merits and sufferings of Jesus Christ my only Redeemer; and my Body I commit to the earth, to be Buried in Decent Christian burial at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named. And as touching such worldly estate where with it hath pleased God to bless me. After my Just Debts and Funeral Expenses are paid I give and Bequeath and demise ye same in ye following manner and form--

I give and bequeath to my son John Mallet three pounds in current bills of Credit upon ye said Province and ye said three pounds with what I have formerly given him my said son in moveables and money I judge to be his proportion of that estate that God hath given me to dispose of.

ITEM: I give and bequeath to my son Matthew Mallet the sum of twenty pounds in the Current Bills of said Province together with all my Appariel, and also one-third part of all my carpenter tools. But if my son shall not pay, or cause to be paid, the 12 pounds for which I stand bound with him to Mr. Thomas Frothingham of Charlestown as by obligation under my hand and seal may appear, then in yt, case I hereby revoke and make said Twelve Pounds of ye Twenty Pounds given and bequeathed to him as above said.

ITEM: I give and bequeath to my son Lewis Mallet the one half of all my land lying and situated in Charlestown, together with one half of my grist mill, and also the fourth part of my dwelling house and fourth part of my barn, together with one third part of all my Carpenter's tools; and also one young bullock, or ox, to the sole and only proper use and Behhofs of him my said Son Lewis Mallet.

ITEM: I give and bequeath to my Son, Andrew Mallet, the other half of all my lands situated and lying in Charlestown, together with the other half of my grist mill, and also the other three parts of my house and barn not before given, with all my Household Stuff, Household Goods, Linnen Bed's Bedding, both Woolen and linen furniture for the same, as also my table linen of what sort and kind whatsoever; as also the other third part of all my Carpenter's tool, to ye sole and only proper use and Behhofs of him my said son, Andrew Mallet.

ITEM: I give, demise and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth Vieaux, wife of Daniel Vieaux, eight pounds in Bills of Credit of this Province, as also a suite of Apparial of four pounds value for mourning; as also I give and bequeath to my Daughter Mary Blocheard, 8 pounds in Bills of Credit of sd. Province; as also a suite of Apparial of four pounds.

I do give, demise and bequeath, all ye rest and residue and remainder of my Estate Real and Personal unto my two sons, Lewis Mallet and Andrew Mallet, to be equally divided and enjoyed by them, share and share alike, after payment of my Debts, Funeral Expenses and Legacies, and I do hereby make, ordain, and constitute, and appoint, my said Sons, Lewis Mallet and Andrew Mallet, to be executors of this my last Will and Testament; hereby revoking all former and other Wills by me at any time heretofore made by me. In witness whereof I the sd. John Mallet to this my last Will and Testament have put my hand and seal the thirty day of August, Anno Domini 1720, and in the seventh year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord, George King of Great Britain. etc.

I, Andrew Mallet, Senior, of Charlestown, in the county of Middlesex, in New England, yeoman, who weak in Body, yet of sound and disposing mind and Memory, Thanks be to God therefor; and Sensible of the Undertainty of this Life, after having Recommended my Soul into the hands of God, hoping for mercy through Christ, and committed my Body to the Dust to be Buried by my Executors hereafter named, in Hope of a Glorious Resurrection by the Power of God --- Do for the Settlement of my Estate according to my mind, make and ordain this as my last Will and Testament.

My Will is that my Executrix sell that lot of land I purchased of Stephen Fosdick to pay my just Debts and Funeral Charges as soon as may be after my Decease, and if anything remain to pay it to my son Michael.

Item: I give unto my wife Martha whom I constitute the Executrix of my last Will and Testament the use and improvement of the whole of my Estate both real and Personal not otherwise disposed of during her widowhood for her support and the support of her children yet under age; and if my wife should marry again then I give her one-third part of my personal Estate and the income of one-third of Real Estate; and the same shall be valued by men during her life.

According to the data preserved by the descendants, he located at Topsham, Me., about 1738, and took up land in the Cathance District of that town. He had 100 acres lying between the land of Job Merrill and Capt. Thomas Wilson. His days were spent on that farm. In 1737 he served in Captain Adam Hunter's Company in the French and Indian Wars. He was ever an industrious, worthy and helpful citizen. He and his wife are said to have been buried near the old First Church of Brunswick, Me. No one has been able to locate the place of their burial, as many of the gravestones there have long ago dis-

appeared. Many regard this story of the burial place as only a tradition. "John Mallet came to Brunswick, Me., with a brother who afterwards settled at Warren, Me."

Married July 26, 1746 by Rev. Thomas Prentice Martha Wilson, who, in the marriage record, is called "of Charlestown, Me.," As no trace of her family has been found in the Charlestown records it is probable that she was of Topsham, Me. Some have erroneously given her name as Sarah Wilson.

He was the inventor of many useful devices, which revolutionized the work in which they were involved. In 1851 he moved to Norway, Me. In 1859 to New Haven, Ct., where he was engaged in the carriage business, and made some decided improvements in the machinery for making light carriage wheels, for which he obtained patents of great value to wheel makers. About the time that the Civil War broke out, and during that War, he was engaged in gun work for the Government. At the close of the War he en-g was engaged with the Am. Fish-Hook and Needle Co., for 4 years as Superintendent. In 1873 he went to Boston with a set of machinery on which he obtained patents in America and in most of the European countries. He made an exhibition of his machinery in the Travels' Building in Boston, and from that showing a Company was formed with a million-dollar capital. That machinery revolutionized many of the important machines in the manufacture of sewing machine needles. His first venture was in Chicago with the large firm of A. H. Andrews & Co. as their Superintendent in manufacturing school furniture and all kinds of school appliances. He remained there until 1882. He then went to Brockton, Mass., as Superintendent of a sewing-machine Needle Co., where he made another important machine for pointing the needles; remained there one year. Then to Pullman, Ill. as mechanic having charge of all the wood-working machinery of the Pullman Palace Car Co.'s plant. In 1886 he went to N. Y. City where he remained until 1900, being an expert and mechanic. He was an architect and had charge of erecting the large stone building at the corner of 29th St. and 5th Ave. known as the lumber drying works, and he had charge of that business for 4 years. In the meantime he made an important invention in a chainless bicycle, for which he obtained a patent in the U.S.A. and in three foreign countries. He went East, and visited his old home at E. Winn, Me."

"Elisha P. Mallett was a great Master Builder. For nearly half a century he was a familiar figure in the shipyards of Bath, Me. By his death Bath loses one whom by general consent will place as a leading master builder, and that means, so far as wooden ships are concerned, of the world. Nearly a hundred vessels have come from his hands, and all of them, from the Emerald Isle of 1853 to the Shenandoah and Susquehannah, were recognized as among the best that could be wrought of wood and iron. At 19 years he left his father's farm and went to work in the already famous shipyards of Bath, Me. Those were the days when the Pattens, Moses', Sewalls and Drummonds were sending out ships which did their share in maintaining the glory of the American marine and when craft for the West Indies were in demand. Many a Bath man recalls the 'ship-building city' of those days, and knows well of the swift fleets that went from the Kennebec in the forties. Mr. Mallett was a man whose mind was with his chosen work. The industry and care which characterized all that he did attracted the attention of his employers and it was not long before he was promoted. In 1852, he was made a master builder for the firm of Trufant & Drummond, and in 1853 launched his first ship, the Emerald Isle, by far the largest which up to that time had been launched in Maine. She was of 1736 tons. For years he remained with the Drummonds until they stopped building. Associated with Mr. Melcher, he built a bark at the Drummond yard. He then began to work for the Sewalls, his first vessel being the Tabor. He remained with this firm until his death. 43 vessels were built in that time, two of these being the leaders in the world's wooden fleets. Nearly 100 vessels took shape under his hands, and the consensus of all builders and carpenters was 'There are none better'. When President Harrison visited Bath, Me., he walked the keel of the Repahannock and was introduced to Mr. Mallett by Mr. Sewall as the man who had built more tonnage than the American Navy then contained. This comparison at once shows the great amount of work that must have gone out from the two hands of Mr. Mallett. Though he said he was too old to do more work, he was urged to take charge of the work on the Roanoke, and was busy with this ship when he died. Said a builder whose long experience may qualify him to speak without suspicion that he would flatter the dead 'Elisha Mallett stood at the head of his profession, there were none better. There was nothing about the construction of a wooden ship he did not know and know perfectly. He could get more work out of a crew of men with the least effort than any man I ever knew. Not that he hurried them-- but he always had his work so laid out that no time was lost and no mistakes were made.' For the greater part of his life Elisha P. Mallett was a member of the N. Church of Bath, Me., and he was always one of the strongest supporters of that church. He contributed liberally for whatever that Society might need. He was not only a member of that church but he was a thorough Christian, a man of unimpeachable and unquestioned honesty and uprightness, and one whose death will be sincerely felt by all."

Wilbert Grant Mallett was born in Topsham, Maine, April 10, 1867, the son of Isaac E. and Mary Purington Mallett. He entered Farmington Normal School in 1884 and was graduated with the class of 1886. In 1891 he received his A.B. degree from Bowdoin College, and in 1921 he was awarded an honorary A.M. by his Alma Mater.

During Mr. Mallett's student years at Farmington, he taught in 1884 and in 1885 in a rural school in Topsham. While attending Bowdoin he taught for a time at Five Islands, and in 1889 and 1890 served as principal of Topsham High School. Following graduation in 1891 he returned to Farmington Normal School, the school to which he gave a long life's service. For eighteen years he was admired, respected, and loved by Farmington students as a teacher of science and moral philosophy. In 1909, following the sudden death of George C. Purington, Mr. Mallett became principal, in which capacity he served for 31 years. A more highly esteemed administrator has never been found in any educational institution.

A very full and what must have been a very satisfying life ended on January 12, 1942. In his departure Wilbert G. Mallett left a record of service in his community, his church, his state, and most of all in Farmington Normal School that will probably never be equalled. Memories of this truly great educator will always be cherished by all who came in contact with him, and particularly by those who were privileged to be students at Farmington between the years 1891 and 1940.

Charles William Mallett was born in Penobscot County, Maine, December 30, 1846, and passed away at Portland, Oregon, October 24, 1921. He was the fourth son of William and Sally (Merrill) Mallett. The Malletts and Merrills were of old Colonial stock, both families moving from western to eastern Maine about 1827. Here his grandfather, Mallett, was given large grants of land by the state as compensation for building roads and mills. His father also was extensively engaged in building roads and in lumbering.

After attaining manhood, Mr. Mallett followed lumbering principally, with the exception of one summer spent on the coast of Maine and one season on the Banks of New Foundland cod-fishing. In 1873 he went to California where he engaged in lumbering and mining, later going to Nevada. There, in October of 1875, he was married to Miss Mary Barnes, a native of California, whose parents were natives of Maine and pioneers of California. To this union ten children were born: Albert, Fanny, Howard, Harold, Stanley, and Mary living here; Isabelle at Wall City, Washington; Alice at Jackson, Michigan; Mrs. J. W. Campbell of Portland, Oregon; and Vivian who passed away July of the present year. He also leaves three grandchildren: Stanley Mallett, Jr., and Donald, and Philip Campbell, also two sisters, Mrs. Ruth Brown of Williamsport, Pennsylvania, and Miss Lenore Mallett of Ontario, Oregon. The later with all his children except Alice, who was unable to attend, were present with Mrs. Mallett at the funeral.

After his marriage, he followed farming in Mason Valley until the spring of 1881, when company with R. Adams and W. R. Lee, he came to Malheur Valley where he located and spent the remainder of his life with Messrs. Adams and Lee. He made the original location of the Nevada Ditch July 12, 1881. He was one of the incorporators of the Nevada Ditch Co. and almost continuously a director for a number of years. He was President of the company and always the most ardent defender of its rights.

Next after his family, his great object in life was to see the Malheur Valley irrigated, and to that end he devoted all his energies. He was one of the foremost workers for the Warm Springs Reservoir and for Government aid in its endeavor to obtain such the needed funds to Washington, D. C. One in company with Col. C. E. S. Wood of Portland and one with Judge Dalton Biers of Ontario. He was ably assisted by Judge Will R. King, former Chief Justice of Malheur County, now at Washington, D. C.

Through the local opposition of people who were in favor of the construction of the Reservoir by private capital, he was defeated in securing Government aid when it was almost within grasp. It was characteristic of Mr. Mallett to look into the future to weigh an issue in its permanent benefit or harm, to consider whether the generations to come would profit by acts performed in the present. Therefore, instead of hastening a project by any means available, he desired to help establish an irrigation system which would not overwhelm with a burden of taxation the people who would seek homes in the Malheur Valley. His own home was established, his own irrigation system developed, hence we know his motive was wholly unselfish. His co-workers in this enterprise realized that the ultimate good of many, not the immediate profit of a few, was the end he sought. And toward this he bent his untiring energies, until the Warm Springs Project was constructed by means of private capital instead of by an efficient economic and just means as would have been the case had Government aid been accepted. Was ever a matter of deep regret to Mr. Mallett? The disappointment in the failure of an issue which had received his earnest consideration for more than a quarter of a century added to the weight of business cares, undermined his once rugged health so greatly that he had not the power to rally from the

He was one of the foremost authorities in Oregon on reclamation and irrigation and was so recognized by Governor Chamberlain who appointed him a member of the Commission to formulate a Code of Irrigation Laws. He was unanimously elected chairman of the Commission. The Code drawn up was too advanced for the average legal light of the state and failed of adoption at that time, but later became the basis of the present water laws. Col. C. E. S. Wood and Judge Will R. King were among the legal fraternity in favor of the Code from the first. Like all men who devote a great part of their lives to the welfare of the people, Mr. Mallett met strenuous opposition, but as time rolled on it was becoming more and more apparent that his course was to the best interest of the people.

He attended the meetings of the National Irrigation Congress at Ogden, Utah, El Paso, Texas, Portland, Oregon and Sacramento, California, as well as the various state conventions. He served Malheur County as Commissioner for one term.

As evidence of his successful farming he leaves one of the best improved farms in this valley. Early seeing the necessity for drainage, he installed there what has been declared by engineers who have inspected it, a very complete efficient system of drainage.

Politically, he was a life-long Democrat, and attended several conventions of his party. Though not a member of any church, he was a man of firm principle and high ideals, strongly opposed to drunkenness, gambling or any form of immorality. For over fifty years, he was a member of the Masonic Fraternity, having been initiated in the state of Maine, and was ever an ardent supporter of its precepts. It was the lot of the writer of these lines to be associated with him as a member of the Fraternity for more than forty years, first as a charter member of Hope Lodge No. 22 of Mason Valley, Nevada, next as members of Washoe Lodge, Payette, Idaho, and later as charter members of Acacia Lodge No. 113, Ontario, Oregon. He was proud of the unique distinction which he enjoyed of having three sons who are members of the same lodge. He was a charter member of Star Chapter No. 69 of O. E. S. at Ontario.

He was a man of strong personality and inflexible purpose. Though not hasty in making up his mind to any course of action, when convinced that he was right, he carried his point if possible, regardless of the obstacles he encountered. His word was bond, and he always carried out to the letter any agreement that he made. Strong in his friendships, he was loved by many who will long mourn his loss.

The welfare and comfort of his family was ever the uppermost thought in his mind. It was a matter of much concern to him that his children had no school privileges, for Ontario, ten miles distant from his home, was the nearest school, no other district being set off for many years after he had several children of school age. As a solution of the problem, he and Mrs. Mallett, in 1891, employed a teacher, and maintained a private school in their home, later building and equipping a modern school house, where, until 1902, they maintained a school for their children, unassisted by any public funds. In this undertaking, as in other activities, Mrs. Mallett's sympathetic co-operation was an important factor in its success.

Mr. Mallett was the principal owner of the Vale Milling and Elevator Company, and its President. It was the privilege of the writer of this article to have been closely associated with him, both personally and in business, for over forty years, during most of which time we lived on adjoining farms, and had almost daily intercourse.

Thus passes one of the great figures in the development of Eastern Oregon, a man who had a vision beyond his time. He had here endeavored to set down the plain facts of his life, without exaggeration or fulsome eulogy.
