Martha J. Hawley Marks had three brothers and one sister, Roswell, Victor, Alfred and Elsie Hawley, all born at Cambridge, Vt.

Roswell married Ida Blood; Victor married Mary Jones; Elizabeth Mallory, and died September 1931, age 83 years. Eliza died at seventeen years of age, in 1861.

Frederick A. and Martha J. Marks, had two boys, Emerson Joseph Marks and Earnest Frederick Marks. Emerson born November 30, 1896, married Adrienne Dowell, in Santa Ana, California, who died August 26, 1904, leaving one son, Charles Adrain Marks. Charles Adrain married Blanch Horton, at San Diego, California, on October 27, 1930. Emerson married Frances Odelle Evans at Los Angeles, California, October 1906.

Ernest Frederick Marks, born January 9, 1887, in Santa Ana, California married Edna Lillian Brown at San Diego, California, September 1914. They have two daughters, Thelma Jeanette, born May 2nd, 1917; Elaine Betty, born August 14, 1921.

Martha J. Marks had one son by her first husband, James Van Velzer who died. The son, Dr. Allan Clifford Van Velzer, born June 29, 1872, at Oneida, N.Y. He has three daughters, Lucille, Marion, Mary Louise and one son, David.

The Hawleys trace their ancestry back to Revolutionary days. Three .
ancestors served in the Revolutionary War, 1776, Ensign Abel Hawley and his
two sons. Lieutenant Elisha and Major Josiah Hawley.

Ensign Abel Hawley was born at Meridan, Conn., October 10th, 1716.

In the space below give interesting facts on life of pioneer—i. e., where he lived before coming to California or the Middle West; when he arrived; the route and method by which he came; what his business was and other facts of importance.

Richard Whatly, grandfather of Frederick A. Marks and family came to Canada in 1832, reaching Toronto, then called Little York, about May 14th. Landing at Quebec from sailing vessel of 700 tons, called the Uprasyne, commanded by Captain Sampson came up the St Lawrence to Montreal by steamboat, thence by Bateau to Prescott on Lake Ontario, thence by steamer to Toronto.

Richard Whatly and Mary Burnett were married April 23rd, 1810, in the Established Church at Hatesburg, Wilshire, England. On July 18, 1902, Mr and Mrs Charles R. Marks, on a visit to Hatesburg, saw this on the Parish Records of the church.

Frederick Anthony Marks, educated at Yale University, followed his profession as an architect before and after coming to California. In October 1881, he bought a ranch in Santa Ana facing Bristol Street, and became a rancher. In coming to California he traveled by the Southern Pacific Route. At that date travelling was exceedingly crude; it was before there were tourists' Trains. Passengers and emigrants occupied cars together. There were no berths. Passengers carried their bedding and food.

Lundy's Lane, the birthplace of Frederick A. Marks, in later times was changed to the name of Niagara Falls, South. History records Lundy's Lane as a battlefield between the English and Americans, in the war of 1812.

QUITS WITH HONORS
Cecil J. Marks

Ex-fair President Honored

Longtime Orange County agriculture promoter Cecil J. Marks, former president of the Orange County Fair Board, has won special tribute upon retirement from that 32nd District Agricultural Association panel.

Marks, of North Tustin, stepped down recently after four years on the Fair Board.

He was appointed in 1967, but had been closely associated with staging the annual event for years, as executive secretary of the Orange County Farm Bureau.

He retired from that post in 1965 after 31 years including support of the fair dating back to 1934. Fair Board President Richard L. Huston noted in presenting Marks with a plaque.

Marks contributed strongly to development of Future Farmers of America and 4H Club participation in the fair and 4H clubbers also recently honored him.

Born in Kansas, Marks is a World War I veteran who came to the Southland in 1922 after graduating from the University of Arizona.

His record of service to Orange County extends far outside farming and agriculture to more contemporary urban issues.

Marks was chairman of the county Board of Supervisors' Voting Systems Evaluation Task Force for two years and was a founder of Project 21, a study and research team.

He is on the board of trustees for Orange County Services for the Blind and is an officer of the Orange County Genealogical Society.
