## MY DESCENT FROM REVEREND JOHN MAYO OF ENGLAND & MASSACHUSETTS

REVEREND JOHN MAYO was born in England in 1598. He died at Yarmouth, Massachusetts on 3 May 1676 and is buried in Falmouth. He married in England TAMSIN (Tamison, Tamsen) surname unknown, birth date and place unknown. She died at Yarmouth 26 February 1682.

John Mayo, Congregational clergyman, entered Magdalen Hall, Oxford University, England, at age seventeen, but left without a degree, as did many of his fellow dissenters. He emigrated with his wife and five children to America in 1639, and settled in Barnstable, Massachusetts in a sturdy frame house overlooking the ocean. Reverend John served as a teaching elder of the Barnstable Church. Five years later, he moved the family to Eastham, where he took charge of the church until 1655, when the family relocated to Boston. There Reverend John Mayo was ordained as the first minister of the Second or Old North Church, where the "one if by land, two if by sea" bells rang out at the start of the Revolutionary War. Moving from the smallest town on Cape Cod to the largest in the Bay Colony, he took his place with quiet dignity among Boston's distinguished leaders. He served until 1672 when he was forced to resign due to old age. Reverend John was also an early clergyman of the Ancient & Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts. He spent his last years back on Cape Cod.

- 2. Samuel Mayo (Rev. John¹) was born ca.1620 in England and died at Boston 1664. He married at Yarmouth in 1643 THOMASINE LUMPKIN, daughter of WILLIAM & THOMASINE LUMPKIN of Yarmouth. She was born 1626 and died at Brewster 16 June 1709. They resided at first in Yarmouth, and later moved to Boston. Captain Samuel Mayo was a mariner, owner of several vessels.




In 1653, Samuel Mayo, PETER WRIGHT and WILLIAM LEVERIDGE bought from an Indian sachem the land which became the village of Oyster Bay on Long Island, New York. William Leveridge, the first pastor of the church in Sandwich, Mass, employed Samuel and his vessel, Desire, to transport goods to Oyster Bay. Samuel Mayo was at Oyster Bay for some time; two of his children were born on Long Island, but the family was back in Boston by 1658. He died at the early age of 43. His father, Rev. John Mayo, was named administrator of his estate, the widow having refused her right to serve. She married (2) JOHN SUNDERLAND, of Boston.

In 1776, Bangs Burgess enlisted as a private in Captain Joseph Parker's Company, Cushing's 4<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts Regiment, later Capt. Pope's Co, Col. Shepard's Regt. He was in the battle of Monmouth, New Jersey, the siege of Yorktown, and the capture of Cornwallis. He was celebrated for his brave deeds in the Revolutionary War, and also served with George Washington's bodyguard. He was discharged in June 1783. While he was in service, he married his second wife at Canterbury, Connecticut. They later settled in New York and in 1818, were living in Hoosick, Rensselaer County when he applied for a pension.



10. GEORGE FRED RODGERS (Lucie Bates, Lydia Burgess, James Burgess, Bangs Burgess, Simeon Burgess, Thomasine Bangs, Mary, Samuel, Rev. John) was born at Sandwich on 7 July 1868. He married at Brockton on 27 February 1889 LAURA JANE CONSTANCE FERGUSON, daughter of JOHN FERGUSON. She was born in Prince Edward Island, Canada on 29 September 1868 and died at Brockton 24 March 1932. George deserted his wife and son in 1903 and there is no further record of him. He was a stitcher in a Brockton shoe factory. An extremely talented musician, he was able to play all instruments. After the seven year period of desertion, Laura married DAVID WILL HARVEY and she is buried at Pine Hill Cemetery, West Bridgewater, under the Harvey gravestone.

EDGAR YOULDEN. She was born at Brockton on 17 June 1892; she died at Braintree on 17 March 1968. Harry married (2) at Brockton in October 1968 EMMA MASON. birthdate & place unknown. Harry was a talented organist and his career covered silent movies, theater, vaudeville and radio. In later life, he played the organ for many Masonic lodges in the Massachusetts area. After leaving Brockton in 1920, he and Jessie moved to Lewiston, Maine, where he was conductor of the Lewiston Symphony orchestra. In 1930, he moved to Quincy, Massachusetts. After his second wife died, Harry moved to North Palm Beach, Florida, to live with his daughter and son-in-law. In failing health, he died at the Helen Wilkes Nursing Home in Lake Park, Florida. Harry and Jessie are buried in Blue Hill Cemetery, Braintreee, Massachusetts.

Jean Rodgers, though born in Lewiston, Maine, grew up in Quincy, Massachusetts, and it was there she married Elliot C. Patten. They made their home in North Abington from 1950 to 1959, in South Weymouth from 1960 to 1968, and then moved to North Palm Beach, Florida. Jean was a professional organist in the New England area and an organ teacher.

In 1982, Jean began to research her ancestral lines and it wasn't long before she discovered that both she and Elliot descend from Reverend John Mayo (see chart at end of article.) This intensified her search over the next several years. She found information on over two hundred families of hers and over three hundred of Elliot's. There isn't a cemetery in the Cape Cod and Southeastern Massachusetts area that doesn't have a sleeping ancestor of theirs.

JOHN MAYO.

The first who went to Eastham as a religious instructor, as 400-2 far as can be ascertained, was Mr. John Mayo. He was from England, it is understood, and came over quite early. He was at Barnstable, said the late Amos Otis, as early as 1639, and there when Mr. Lothrop and company came from Scituate. Mr Mayo "was ordained teaching elder of the Church" over which Mr. Lothrop was pastor, on Fast day, April 25, 1640. His stay here was not long, as Nov. 9, 1665, he was inducted to the pastoral office of the Second church, in Boston, which had been gathered June 5, 1650. Here he preached until the beginning of the year 1672, when he became "very infirm insomuch as the congregation was not able to hear and be edified," and concurring with his brethren, in the proposal to secure another, he retired from the ministry soon after, and in 1673, moved "his person and goods" to Barnstable to reside with his daughter. He afterwards resided at Yarmouth, where he died in May, 1676, and was buried.

Of his ministry at Eastham, but very little is certainly known. It is evident he was not a settled minister there. The settlers, at the time of his removal to the place, were in no condition apparently to hold out great inducements, and it is probable for their failure in that respect, that Mr. Mayo left the town and colony.

Of his children there appears no complete record. It is certain he had Samuel, Hannah, Nathaniel, Elizabeth and John.

The wife of Mr. Mayo survived him, it is supposed, as a "Ma Mayho" died at Yarmouth, according to the records of that town, Feb. 26, 1682.

Samuel, their son, born in England, married Thomasin Lump-kins of Yarmouth, and at first located at Barnstable. From there he went to Oyster Bay, L. I., it is stated in 1653, and purchased land of the Indians. He sold out his land there in 1658, and resided in Boston. He died there the latter part of the year 1663, or the beginning of 1664. He seems to have been a sea-faring man. His father settled the estate. He left a wife, Thomasin or Tamzin, and several children. The widow married Mr. John Sunderland of Boston soon after. Mr. Sunderland was a citizen of Eastham

as early as 1678, when the town was thrown into excitement on account of the appearance of the smallpox. Mr. John Cotton, under the date of Aug. 26, this year, in a letter to Mr. Increase Mather, reports the disease increasing and four or five sick; that one man had died, and that Mr. Sunderland's son and grandson had each had it. Mr. Sunderland was a school teacher many years, and was admitted townsman of Eastham in 1695. He died testate, Dec. 26, 1707, aged 84 years; and she died, aged 84, June 13, 1709. They both lie buried at Brewster, where stones with inscriptions mark the spots. Samuel Mayo's daughter Elizabeth' was the first wife of Mr. Samuel Treat, the first settled minister of the town; daughter Mary was the first wife of Jonathan Bangs of Harwich; their daughter Sarah, the second wife of Lieut. Edward Freeman of Eastham; their daughter Mercy Mayo married Captain Samuel Sears of Harwich; and their son John Mayo married Hannah Freeman, daughter of Major John Freeman, and settled in Harwich. He was the first representative from that

Hannah, the daughter of Mr. John Mayo, married Nathaniel Bacon of Barnstable in 1642. He was the first of that name in the county.

Nathaniel Mayo, son of Mr. John Mayo, married Gov. Prence's daughter Hannah, Feb. 13, 1649-50, and removed to Eastham, where he was somewhat of a prominent man. He died at that place, the beginning of the year 1662. He made his will Jan. 10, 1661-2, and it was presented in March following. He left Thomas, Nathaniel, Samuel, Theophilus, Hannah and Bathsheba. He desired that all of his children should be "brought up to read and write." His son Theophilus went to reside with Gov. Prence, but died when a young man. Hannah Mayo married for her second husband Captain Jonathan Sparrow of Eastham.

Elizabeth<sup>2</sup>Mayo, daughter of Mr. John Mayo, married Joseph Howes of Yarmouth.

John Mayo, Jr., married Hannah Reyeraft of Eastham, Jan. 1, 1650-1. He made his will in 1702. It was presented for probate May 4, 1707. He had eight children.

After the removal of Mr. John Mayo to Boston, in 1655,

(IX) Catherine Marie, only daughter of Rev. Samuel Alexander and Susan Elizabeth (Greenlaw) Fuller, was born in Brewer, Mame, May 28, 1857, and was educated in public schools in Searsport, Brewer, Maine, Mrs. Hill's private school at North Brookfield, Leicester, Millbury and Topsfield, Massachusetts, and Adams, Female Seminary, at Derry, New Hampshire, where she graduated in 1878. She is a member and treasurer of the Sons and Daughters of Maine Society, of Nashna, New Hampshire; the King's Daughters, the Good Templars, of Hampstead, New Hampshire, and Daughters of Grand Army of the Republic, of Nashua. At Derry, New Hampshire, October 4, 1884, she married Charles A. Huntington, of Nashua, and had four children, three of whom were graduates of the Nashua public schools: 1, Edgar Alstein, born August 22, 1885, married, January 31, 1904, Molly C. Brackett. 2. Helen Almeda, June 22, 1889. 3. Anna May, July 9, 1893. died August 1, 1894. 4. Isabel Fuller, March 31, 1895.

The surname Mayo may be identical with Mayhew, a name distinguished by Rev. Thomas Mayhew, the noble preacher to the Indians at Martha's Vineyard, son of Thomas Mayhew, of Watertown, Massachusetts, but some authorities believe that the names are distinct and the immigrants not related, stating that Mayo is distinctively an Irish name.

(4cb -z) (1) Rev. John Mayo, immigrant ancestor of this family, was born in England, educated there, and was presumably a college graduate. He came to New England in 1638 or 1639, and in the latter year became teacher in Ar. Lothrop's church at Barnstable, Plymonth colony. He was admitted a freeman March 3, 1639-40, by the general court at Plymouth. About 1644 he removed to Nauset, or Nawset, later Eastbam, Massachusetts, upon the gathering of a church at that place, and became the minister. There is no account of his connection with the church at Nauset in existing town or church records. Among the list of men able to bear arms in 1643 in Plymouth county, we find the names of Mr. Mayo and his sons Samuel and Nathaniel, all of Barustable, however. Samuel Mayo and his father were of the forty-five original set-

tlers of Barnstable. Mr. Mayo remained at Eastham until 1655, when he was called to

Boston to become pastor of the Second

Church, and ordained there November 9, 1655. He preached the election sermon before the general court in June, 1658. There is little known of Mr. Mayo's pastorate excepting what is contained in the church records in the handwriting of Rev. Increase Mather, who succeeded him in the ministry: "In the beginning of the year 1670. Mr. Mayo, the pastor, grew very infirm, insonuch as the congregation were unable to hear and be edified, wherefore the brethren (the pastor manifesting his concurrence) desired the teacher to take care for a supply of the congregation that the worshipful God may be upheld amongst us, which was for the present by him consented to, as Christ should enable him," "In the 15th of the 2d. month (April) 1673, Mr. Mayo removed his person and goods also from Boston, to reside with his daughter in Barnstable where (and at Yarmouth) since he hath lived a private life, not being able through the infirmities of old age to do the work of the min-

He died at Yarmouth, May 3, 1676, and was buried at Barnstable. His widow Tamsen died February 3, 1082. While living in Boston, Mr. Mayo owned a house lot and house on Middle (now Hanover) street, thirty-eight by one hundred twenty feet, selling it in 1672 for 210 pounds to Abraham Gording. A horse belonging to him was killed in the expedition against King Philip at Mount Hope, in 1075. He must have been born as early as 1590, for his son Samuel at least was of age in 1640. A committee was appointed by the court to settle his estate upon his wife and children, June 7, 1676. The inventory was presented by his widow Thamasin, not including goods she brought at marriage. The division of the estate was agreed upon between the widow, the son John, Samuel, Hannah and Bathsheba, children of son Nathaniel, deceased; Joseph Howes; daughter Hannah

(11) Rev. Samuel2son of Rev. John Mayo, was been about 1015, in England. He was ordained a teaching elder (minister) April 15. 1640, at Parustable, and was associated with his father there. His name does not appear in the settlement of his father's estate, but he probably had sold his interest to one of the other heirs. At any rate he was then living on Long Island, at a great distance. All autherities agree that he was the son of Rev. John. He followed the sea, and became master mariner; bought a large tract of land of the Indians at Cyster Bay, in 1653, and went thither about 1654. Four years or so later he settled in Boston, Massachusetts, where he died in 1663. He married Thomazine (same as Tamsen, etc.) Lumpkin, daughter of William and Thomasine Lumpkin. His wife joined the church at Barnstable, January 20, 1649. His name is one of the list of those able to bear arms in 1643. Children: 1. Mary, born at Barnstable, 1645. 2. (III) John (2), son of Samuel Mayo, was born in Oyster Bay, Long Island, 1656-57. He settled in Hingham, Massachusetts, and removed later to Harwich, now Brewster, w Massachusetts, where he died February 15, 1744. He was elected the first representative to the general court from Harwich after it was incorporated, and served several years afterward. He held many other important offices. A monument was erected on his grave in Brewster, and is still standing. He married, April 14, 1681, Hannah Freeman, born 1665. died February 1, 1756, daughter of Major John and Mercy (Prence) Freeman. Her father was born in England, in 1628, and died at Eastham, October 28, 1719; her mother, Mercy Prence (or Prince), was born at Plymouth, in 1631, died at Eastham, September 28, 1711; married, February 13, 1049-50. Major John Freeman. She was daughter of Governor Thomas Prence, who was born in England, in 1600, and died at Plymouth, March 29, 1673; married, August 5, 1624, Patience Brewster, who was born in England, and died at Plymouth in 1634, daughter of

Elder William Brewster, born at Scroolsy, England; married Mary \_\_\_\_; died at Ply-mouth about April 18, 1643, one of the most distinguished Pilgrims who came in the "Mayflower" in 1620. (IV) Samuel (2), son of John (2) Mayo, was born in Harwich, July 16, 1684. He lived in the easterly part of Harwich, now the southerly part of Orleans, near which many of his descendants now reside. (V) Thomas, son of Samuel (2) Mayo, was born in Harwich, Massachusetts, about 1720. He settled in South Orleans, on or near the homestead, and was a farmer. He died at Orleans in 1794. He married (first) February 28, 1745; (second) October 27, 1757. Sarah Higgins, widow. Children: 1. Thomas. 2. Samuel, died young. 3. John. died young. 4. Samuel. 5. Rev. John. 6. James, mentioned below.

(VI) James, son of Thomas and Sarah (Higgins) Mayo, was born June 16, 1761. He lived in Orleans until after his marriage about that time, then settled in Hampden, Maine, probably just after the revolution. He was a soldier in the revolution, in Captain Isaiah Higgius' company, Major Zenas Winslow's regiment, at the alarms at Bedford and Falmouth, on Cape Cod, 1778. (VIII) Leonard, son of Joseph Mayo, was born in Hampden, Maine, and died at Hodgdon, Maine. He was educated in the public schools of his native town, where he also learned his trade as cooper. He was called to the ministry and studied divinity, was ordained a Daptist minister at St. George, Maine,
