INTRODUCTION TO PART TWO

"McFADDEN FAMILIES OF CRAVEN COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA" represents the work of nearly five years of collecting data on this Scottish family. Not all of the sources have been tapped. This writer has never personally visited any of the areas involved, nor has he ever seen any of the original records. He has been dependent upon photostatic and typed abstracts or full copies. Much of the data were contributed by very helpful clerks or deputies, or by the efforts of a group of unselfish cousins of the writer, who live in or near Meadville, Pennsylvania. (Shirley) Abbott, Seagertown, Pennsylvania; Mr. Eugene Floyd Throop, Seagertown, Pennsylvania; Mrs. Lloyd Kightlinger, Seagertown, Pennsylvania; W. H. Battles, Acting Secretary of Greendale Cemetery, Meadville, Pennsylvania, and others. None of them is, by birth, a McFadden.

As time went by, the much information was gathered, it became sadly apparent that these old McFaddens were not the type of people who would willingly bequeath helpful family information to us their descendants! Their lust for "independence" often drove them to live well beyond the limits of the normal boundaries of security, far from the courthouses of the county in which they dwelt. To them, family bibles and information contained in them were "private property," not to be made public at any time. The only known extant bibles belonging to these McFadden families are in the tight clutches of two lady members of the "clan," and it is their determination to keep them "safe!" Others in the family advised this writer that there are no physical deterrents to these ladies helping him. Several letters, enclosing reply postage, were ignored. It is the hope of this writer (who, after all, has a few pints of the same Scottish determination in his bloodstream,) to obviate by the publication of this work, any future boycott by such selfish individuals! Herein are presented all known facts, and all documented sources to support both fact and speculation. Perhaps the "curse of the McFaddens" will descend upon me for displaying the family information which they seemed so determined to conceal! No thanks to them nor any who do not wish us well. What started out in innocent, nay - naive enthusiasm and joy - has been turned to bitter determination. Others would have long ago given up. Thousands of letters have been written and received, and equal amounts of data have been exchanged. Those who would not help us, or who tried to hinder us, we, so to speak, shoved out of the way or trampled over. The sins and errors of the Patriarchs from Adam down are exposed to the eyes of their lineal descendants (us) in the pages of the ancient Holy Scriptures of the Hebrews, so why should not these records of the McFaddens, whose "sins," indeed, pale by comparison!

Any reports from interested readers which will shed more light will be most welcome. Perhaps this work will stir the interest of a person financially more equipped to make direct visits to all the courts and cemeteries, historical houses, and other sources, which would make the search complete and fill in the last missing pieces to complete this family history.

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McFADDEN FAMILIES OF CRAWFORD COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA

ANDREW McFADDEN. Of Wayne (later Randolph) township, Crawford County. Born 1769, (Fextong township, Lancaster County - now Swatara, Dauphin County?) Pennsylvania; Died 1842, Randolph; ne about 72 years; Buried in Brawley Cemetery, Randolph twp. (-Stone has since been stolen.) Farmer; Veteran of War of 1812.

He married, before 1785 (?) Northumberland Co., Pennsylvania (?), MARY DANIELS, who was born about 1774, in Pennsylvania; and died between 1830-1840, Randolph twp., Crawford Co., Pennsylvania, aged about 56 years. Buried (?) Brawley Cemetery, i. id.

ISSUE: 1. (?) McFADDEN, (a son), born 1784-1790, Northumberland Co., Penna. Perhaps died before 1810.

2. MARY "POLLY" McFADDEN, born 1793, (Northumberland County?) Penna.; Died Jan. 2, 1867, Greenwood township, Crawford Co., Penna., ne 75 years; Buried in Geneva Methodist Cemetery, ibid, with headstone.

Mary Daniels, wife of Andrew McFadden, had a large family of brothers and sisters. Her parents are not identified. Her brothers: Samuel, John, Daniel & Abraham, and her sisters: Sarah, wife of Joseph Armstrong, and Lucy, wife of Hugh Brewley, were all of Methodist persuasion, and all except John settled on tracts of the Holland Land Company in Randolph township. Andrew's daughter Ann probably married a child of Sarah Armstrong, thus a marriage of first-cousins. Sarah McFadden also seems to have married a near relative. Andrew McFadden was assignee of John Daniels, on Tract 214, Head township, 100 acres, on Dec. 13, 1799. (Holland Land Company records, present whereabouts not known, abstracted in the 1885 history.) This is the same number as the land on which he ultimately settled in 1813, in Randolph township. It may be a mistake in copying.

Our subject came from the West Branch of the Susquehanna River, in what is now Clinton county, Pennsylvania, in 1797. He came with his brother John McFadden. (See John McFadden Sr. (No. 2) below.) Both were of Methodist faith. The area in 1797 was called French Creek township, Allegheny county. Records of Tax Assessments for that region were destroyed in 1822 in a fire in Pittsburgh. They covered the period 1789 - 1799. John and Andrew (and probably their brother William as well), settled on the Outlet of Conneaut Marsh, in what would probably now be in Union township. In 1797 it was French Creek or Head township. July 9, 1800, Fairfield and seven other townships were erected to form the new Crawford County. Hence, in the 1800 Tax Assessments, all these men were in "Head township," but in 1801 and 1802, they are to be found in Sadsbury, Fairfield or Head townships, although they probably had not moved an inch off of their claims. It is true that Andrew did move, and after remaining a year and a half in Head, he went to Sugar Creek, and finally to Sugar Lake where he remained till his death. This man was probably the youngest child in a large family. His brother John was twenty one years his senior! Andrew Continued/

first appears in records in Pennsylvania archival material, in Northumberland County, in the 1790 U.S. Census, on page 100. The County was not returned by townships, but his name appears in same area with his brothers William & John McFadden, which would indicate he was also in Pine Creek township. There are four persons in his household, which include himself and wife Mary. Since he was but 21 years old in 1790, he was not probably married very long. One of the two other persons may be a child not his own. But this is speculation.

Andrew McFadden, being a Methodist, attended the meetings held in the home of his brother, John, near "Bunnestown" (Donnstown at the Great Island in Susquehanna River, warranted to William Dunn Senior.) William Colbert, Methodist Circuit-riding Minister who served the Northumberland Circ it in 1792, kept a journal, on which he marked McFadden's home and name as one of his stops. At that time the family had gone to Bald Eagle township. Upon arrival in Crawford County, Andrew McFadden became one of the first attendees of the Methodist class held in the house of David Mumford, pioneer settler of Fairfield, about 1800. As a matter of record, only the Mumford and McFadden families attended in that early day, with the addition of that of John Leach. The property where this house stood is now in Union township.

The Tax Assessments and U.S. Census for the year 1800 list Andrew in Head. He is taxed on 400 acres of land. No deed has been found in regard to this land. Later it is 100 acres, and in Sadsbury; and at length, in 1809, in Wayne, which township was erected in that year. Randolph was organized out of part of Wayne in 1824, but Andrew doesn't appear there until 1830. In 1843, "Andrew McFadden's heirs" are assessed for 88 acres of land, and 1 cow.

In his will, Andrew names all of his children above named.

He served as Sergeant in Capt. James McKnight's Company, 137th Regiment of Pennsylvania Militia, during the war of 1812, at Erie Pennsylvania. He did not live to be eligible for the Acts of 1850, 1855 and 1871, which granted benefits to the war's surviving veterans. We, also, are bereft of this important data.

Andrew's family was in a scattered condition as early as 1885 when the first complete history was published. Many were in Stafford county, Kansas, by that time, and not long after, in Colorado. Since the names of Andrew, Thomas and John figure in our Crawford County McFadden family, it reminds us immediately of Andrew, John & Thomas "McFadden," of early New England history. Andrew of that day, born in 1675 in Scotland, came to Boston in 1718. We suspect that others were with him on the voyage. (See the first Part of this work for details.) Andrew McFadden this subject was probably a direct descendant of these hardy Ulster-Boots.

John Jackson (No. 3). Ancestor of this writer. Father of Uriah & Sarah (Votaw)
Jackson, native & respectively of New Jersey & Virginia, and early pioneers of Relic-
field township, Crawford County. Uriah was born 1802/3 in Fallowfield; and died Jan. 19,
1870, at Jackson home, Blue Earth Co., Minnesota, aged 68 years. Uriah married, about
1816, in Crawford County, Elizabeth Votaw, son of John (No. 3) and Catherine (Stein-
brook) Jackson of Wood township. She was a direct descendant of the original
father, Deacon John Jackson and Deacon William Votaw, of Plymouth and Westham, Mass.
(For full details see Appendix I. of this work.) - issue 5 children.

John Jackson. Of Fairfield township, Crawford County, Penna. Born before
1785, probably in Pennsylvania; died in latter part of 1810, Fairfield, aged over
45 years. Place of burial unknown.

ANNANIAS CRADDEN

Is he, continental? Perhaps a large family, which may include HENRY CRADDEN & SONS, who
married JANE A. HAMILTON, 1822. (See p. 19 of this work, under John Cradden (No. 3)).

ANNANIAS CRADDEN's name first appears in Westerry twp., York County, Pennsylvania,
in 1793, with six persons in his house. If this is our subject, he would have
had at least 4 children before that date. There is no proof that they are children,
nor, indeed, that this is the same man. But since the residence had such definite
connection with York county, it is quite probable. For an unknown reason, his name is not in
the 1790 census of Pennsylvania, nor in the 1800 census of Crawford County. But he
is also 1st in West township, 1800, with 400 acres. Later he is in Fairfield, and
in 1810 near his son-in-law, Thomas Abbott. The real name of Mr. Abbott was "Benton." His
brothers were Jacob & Abraham Abbott, who later renounced their true names. But
Thomas did not, nor kept the Abbott name until death. But deeds, in Loyal Co., N.J.,
list a Thomas MURRAY in Greenwood township, Crawford county, at a time when only
Mr. Abbott could be this man. Much more work is being done on this family. It is
possible Annanias Cradden was a brother of John, Andrew, & William Cradden.

(1) The original family will record of David McFadden, in his own hand, (except the last entries, made after his own death), which were legally certified and transcribed in his widow's pension application; and (2) the Cemetery burial ledgers of the Greensdale Cemetery, Headville, Pa., showing the family plot. Additional data is supplied by U.S. Census records, wills, and personal information contributed.

The issue of Sept. 2, 1862, of the Crawford Democrat, has the following obituary: "DIED, on the 23rd ult., of disease of the heart, DAVID MCADDEN, Esq., in the 75th year of his age. The deceased was one of the earliest settlers of Crawford County, having settled here about 62 years ago. He always took an active interest in local affairs, and was one of our most enterprising citizens. He several terms served as High Sheriff of the county and in all the relations of life enjoyed the confidence & esteem of his neighbors. His loss is mourned by a large circle of relatives and acquaintances who knew him as a kind and affectionate father, a good citizen, and one who was ever ready to lend a helping hand to the deserving in distress."

David McFadden, Continued.

David McFadden served his country twice as Sheriff, and once as Coroner. His two terms were (as Sheriff) 1827, and 1833. One of his predecessors, Samuel Withrow, was David's Commanding Officer at Erie, when they both served in the War of 1812. James Alexander McFadden, his son, was elected in 1846 to the office of County Treasurer. James was also the Secretary of the Democratic Central Committee in 1844.

His son, James McFadden, was David's Executor and Administrator. David left no will.

His widow, Betsey McFadden, wrote her will, dated June 30, 1874, and Proved Apr. 11, 1877, recorded in Book H., page 10, at Leadville. She named her sons Edwin, C.W., (George), her "dear husband," David McFadden, and daughter Sarah (who received a gold watch), Mrs. Harry McFadden. James is well known, but not identified as "son." She also mentions her deceased son, David McFadden Jr. The will was signed with her mark, and witnessed by George Hamilton and Maria L. Horway.

There are seventy three (73) Deeds recorded with the name of David McFadden upon them, in the period 1826 through 1860, in the Courthouse at Leadville, Pennsylvania. (I have given book and page of all of them below.) Sixty five of them are from him as Grantor, and only eight to him as Crastee. During his Office as Sheriff, he acted to sell such land for delinquent taxes, and this explains the great volume. In other cases, he despatched lands to his sons, James or John.

David McFadden was witness to the Application of John McFadden (No. 3) of Lead township, when the latter applied for County land under the Act of 1850. This suggests but does not prove, a relationship. This writer thinks they were brothers, or first cousins.

Despite all the wonderful data we have with regard to this man's life history, family, grandchildren, etc., the one prime question not answered is: Who were his parents, brothers and sisters? No records have been found which would shed any legal proof to our speculations, as is the general case with all McFaddens born before the year 1800. I could offer many speculations, none of which can be proved. This writer feels that David McFadden was the son of (1) John McFadden "Sr." the Revolutionary Veteran, who lived in Lead township in 1833, and who was a Methodist. (See) This would make David the brother of William McFadden (No. 4) of Richland township; of John McFadden (No. 3) of Lead township; and of Susannah, wife of Joseph Laird of Coal township. If not John's son, then the son of his brother (2) William McFadden, (No. 2 below), and wife Rebecca, of Leadville, none of whose children are certainly known, except possibly George McFadden of Leadville. (See George McFadden No. 2.)

Since David McFadden is no doubt the most famous and well-remembered of the clan, perhaps there is more information somewhere in the county archives, or in Allegheny College Library (not investigated), or elsewhere. To find it would take time, money, (much money), and a knowledge of the right places to look. After five exasperating years, I am ready to confess I don't have a clue left on which to pursue the search.

Edward McFadden does not rightfully belong in "Crawford County" McFaddens, as he seems not to have had any descendant who lived there. But he lived so close to that county that his presence must be noted, to avoid confusion. He came first to Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, and then, in 1797, in Irwin township, Venango County. The Tax Lists show him only in 1802 - 1805. Later lists not searched. He remained in Venango county as late as 1810. Some of his descendants are reportedly living in the Clintonville, Venango county, area, today.

The above sketch is based on the U.S. Census. Not much is known about this George McFadden. More research could be carried out in Deeds, and vital statistics at Harrisburg, where death records might reveal the maiden names of his 2 wives. He lived his entire life in Head township, near the farm of his father, John McFadden. He left no will. Mrs. Loper's notes say "he was a war veteran." Perhaps Mexican or Indian War?

The above fine record is not only due to the "bridge terminology," but to the help of Mr. W. C. Bettis of Crawford Cemetery. Very all of the above children, and the parents of Mrs. Flinton L. McFadden, are buried in the George McFadden lot.

The Centennial edition of the "Monroeville Standard-Allein," 1886, states that George McFadden to have been born in Leadville. The only record in the City at that date (1806) was William Mc. 2 below, wife Rebecca. This is the only clue to his parents' availability. He had a farmery in Monroeville, he inking in 1829, and later a partnership with Mr. Torbett in the 1850's.

Mrs. McFadden came with her parents to Leadville in 1817. A cousin married Jessie, son of William McFadden (No. 4) of Richwood Township. From no date suggests a relationship. Seymour McFadden was the last survivor of this family.

In a John Reynolds Scrapbook in Meadville Library, there is an obituary writeup, copied out of an unidentified newspaper, listed under Revolutionary soldiers - "John McFadden of Sugar Creek, died Apr. 3, 1841, ne 89 yrs." While it is probable that this man was a soldier in the Revolution - there were a number of John McFaddens in Pennsylvania units - it is the opinion of this writer that Mr. Reynolds was confusing this man with the older John McFadden of Mead township, whose brother Andrew lived near Sugar Lake, Crawford Co., Penna. This John (See John McFadden No. 2, below) was an acknowledged and pensioned veteran. He lived in Mead until after 1833, also in his eighties.

Care must be taken in research in Irwin, Jackson & Sugar Creek townships, not to confuse the (Methodist) family of Edward McFadden, with this (Presbyterian) family of John McFadden. Both had sons named John, reared in the same vicinity! There were men named "Levi McFadden," of both! (See: Edward McFadden.)

This John McFadden came to French Creek, Westmoreland County, Penna., about 1796 and settled on the stream, maintaining a claim. Later he moved to Wayne township in Crawford County, which was set up in 1800 from Westmoreland, or, actually, Allegheny county territory. He warranted land in Wayne township, but seems to have sold it and removed to near Cooperstown, Venango county before 1820. Prior to removal, he already was a founding member of Sugar Creek Presbyterian Church, along with Robert Bentz and others, about 1813.

This John McFadden could have come from York or Washington County, Pennsylvania, to Crawford County. This writer has not made a complete investigation of the respective families of the John McFaddens who lived in those counties. The 1790 U.S. Census indicates they had large families, and the statistics given somewhat assist these for "Bald Hill" in the 1800, 1810 and 1820 U.S. Census enumerations of Crawford & Venango Counties.

It is best to here reproduce the Census of 1800, Head township, Crawford Co., Pennsylvania, page 13, taken by Samuel Lord, Capiz. The three early pioneers of this name are all grouped together here. The census was partially in alphabetical order, so it is impossible to speculate whether they actually lived on adjacent farms. The census indicates that they did not.

It is firmly believed by this writer that Mr. Samuel Lord confused the order of identification on the above three men. Examinations of the later census reports show that No. 1 above moved to Wayne township, and, before 1820, to Sugar Creek, Venango county. The 1825 History of Crawford County, and the 1850 History of Venango County both verify this move. John No. 2 above is called "John McFadden Senior" in the Tax Lists of Head in 1800 and in 1801, though he moved or was assessed in Fairfield township, he was still called "Senior." John No. 3 above was called "Junior" in the Tax Lists. He remained in the Head township area until his death in 1861. In this work, these men are sketched in the order of the above census. Our present subject "Bald Hill," (as he was called in the Tax Lists), should be designated "another," while the man listed as "Junior" above should be "Senior." This is of course, the opinion of this writer, but after nearly five years of constant research. The above census has been a source of great confusion and frustration. Only when the Tax Assessments were finally abstracted this year has the confusion "lifted" somewhat. Also, the sudden realization that "Bald Hill" was of the Presbyterian faith, while the other two (father and son) were Methodists, has helped cut through the haze.

John "Bald Hill" McFadden became a member of the Sugar Creek Memorial Church at its founding, about 1812 or 1813, which was several years before he actually moved to that vicinity to live. He, or his son John Junior, served his township as Auditor in 1823 and 1824. His son Elijah was in that office in 1825, and son Stephen was the Clerk of the township the same year. He settled on French Creek in Head township prior to 1800, and there maintained his claim. He appears to have remained there a few years, and then removed to Wayne township in the southern portion of Crawford County. He stayed there until about 1815 and removed to near Cooperstown, Venango County, where he died. In the Tax Lists, his name first appears in 1802, as "Bald Hill." Nos. 2 and 3 appear in 1800 as "Senior" and "Junior" each with 400 acres of land. This subject, in 1802, is assessed in Head with 330 acres. At other times he is designated "John D. B. McFadden," which is a new source of confusion. His name continues to appear in Wayne township until 1822, in which last assessment he is again called "Bald Hill," which identifies him very well. He does not appear in the 1820 Crawford County census, but does in the Sugar Creek, Venango Co. Census. This indicates he maintained his home in Crawford County until 1822, since he is called "Senior" to avoid confusing him with his son John, who first appears as a single man in the 1810 and 1811 Assessments with James McFadden another son.

Much more could be presented here, but we will leave it to the Reference section.

NOTE: As stated on page 17, the above scheme of "Issue" for John McFadden, is entirely unsupported by any legal records. However, the individual families of these persons are accurate, as far as source material has allowed. (See References.) The only "arbitrary" act committed by this writer, is the assumption that they all were children of this particular McFadden. However, in regard to the first three named (Suzannah, wife of Joseph Liro; John McFadden "Jr.", and William McFadden (No. 4);) the evidence, of circumstantial nature, abounds. But in consideration of the other three, namely, David McFadden, Susannah, wife of John M. Peterson, and Johnston McFadden, the circumstantial evidence is scarce. In fact, it is doubtful that either David or Susannah were the children of this John McFadden. They could have been the children of Lazarus McFadden (See) or of William McFadden, testator, of Kendaville; (See William McFadden No. 2) Still, there is not enough proof for any of those assertions.

As for John McFadden, the supposed father of these persons, he is the only member of the family as at whose to know anything in regard to his life before emigration to Crawford County. The reason for this is that he applied for, and obtained, a U.S. Service Pension as a soldier of the Revolutionary War. In this application, (which is woefully lacking in any genealogical details of wife, or family) he stated that he was born in Virginia, Virginia county, in 1748, and that he possessed a "farm at John's Island," Northumberland county, Pennsylvania, at the time of his service, 1777-1778. He also affirmed, with supporting statements by three others, that his family participated in the "big Runaway," in the year 1776, and sojourned in York county, for the duration of the war, returning to his farm in 1784. He further stated that he remained in Northumberland county until 1795, at which time he removed to Westmoreland county, and then, after two more years, went to his permanent home in Reed township, Crawford county, "about thirty-five years ago," (written in 1832) or 1797. A check of the biographical material available for the other early McFadden pioneers, one can see that this was the year in which Andrew McFadden also arrived, "in company with his brother John," according to one authority. Hence, it is almost certain that this John McFadden and Andrew (see) of Randolph township were brothers, even though they were twenty-one years apart in age.

In the Pension file, John stated that he and his brother were in the war together. For an unaccountable and very agonizingly frustrating reason, the name of the brother is not designated! It almost seems as if he intended not to name any relatives, as if he felt that it was a "private" matter! But since Andrew was only eight years of age in 1777, it would indicate that the brother was not him. Hence we are dealing with at least three brothers. Neither is there a record of Andrew McFadden serving in the Revolution. There is, however, record of a William McFadden, and it is felt that he was the "brother." (See William McFadden No. 2.)

John McFadden began his 10 months service in Harvest Time of 1777, in Cookson Long's Regiment, under Captain Alexander Hamilton. (Not the famous one.)

Alexander Hamilton was killed in 1751 by Indians. But his son, James Hamilton, was one of the defendants who affirmed the service of John McFadden, in his application. George Long, a nephew of Colonel Cocke-on Long, McFadden's commanding officer, also was one of the subscribing witnesses, as was also James Dunn, a son of William Dunn, the owner of "Dunn's Island," where the fighting, in which the McFaddens participated, took place. This writer feels strongly that these three named men were more than just "acquaintances," of John McFadden, and that they were closely related to him and his "native family." But the application is such, that not one "irrelevant" piece of data was included - not even the name of John's brother, or the names of even one of his own family of children! It is to be regretted that the document was not even a little bit "irrelevant!"

John stated that he and his brother and 23 others went up the Susquehanna River to the vicinity of Dunn's Island, where he retrieved one of his own horses. This would indicate that he went to his own abandoned farm, which was situated "at" Dunn's Island. For an inexplicable reason, no entry has yet been found for any town in his name in that, or any county formed from the county. Upon the return to the fort, the Indians rode their horses across a point where the river curved. There they were ambushed by the savages, who shot both the horses. The McFaddens escaped with their lives, only because other soldiers came up to the rescue.

The tax lists available for York County, Pennsylvania, 1779 - 1783, seem to warrant the assertion that our subject fled to Barrington township, and was living there in 1783. In 1781 he is assessed for 152 acres of land, 4 horses, 3 cattle and a still. In 1782, for 200 acres, 3 horses, 2 cattle. Finally, in 1783, no land assessment, but designated with six inhabitants. Two of those must be himself and his wife. The other four could (or would) be, Suzanne, John, and perhaps another daughter. The sixth person is unidentified. The 1790 census for Northumberland County shows our subject's name, and verifies his return to the West Branch of Susquehanna River. There is no John McFadden family listed for York County in 1790. This also supports the idea that those tax lists, 1781-1783 refer to our subject. In Penn Township, York County, during the period 1779 - 1783, lived Hugh McFadden, with acreage, and a Negro, and 11 inhabitants, according to the several tax lists. Also in Penn was a singleman named Samuel McFadden. Penn township was divided on April 5, 1815, to form Reach bottom township. In the 1790 Census, James McFadden and Hugh McFadden appear, Hugh in Penn township, (page 272) with 1 male over 16; 3 males under 16, and 8 females. This totals twelve persons, a gain of one individual in 7 years. This is probably the same Hugh who, in 1823 died, then of Reach bottom. His will probated Apr. 12, 1823, in Book P, p. 8, named Executrices Ann, Elizabeth & Sarah McFadden, but the clerks hasn't made clear if any other heirs were named.

The lands in Pine Creek township, now in Clinton county, Penn., were, in 1777 - 1783 period, not part of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The McFaddens and others settled on this Indian land, and subsequently had a difficult time acquiring title. It is believed John McFadden was one of those who simply never recorded title, and at the time of his removal, left no records for us to check on just where his farm was located, as to the legal description. This writer still feels, however, that in some recital of later times, this land may be ascribed to McFadden.

John McFadden was a Methodist, as was his brother Andrew. This is a principle by which he may be constantly distinguished from the other John McFadden, Continued/

"Hald Hill," whose sketch received this one, who was a Presbyterian. It is certain, however, that our subject was a Presbyterian by birth, who probably joined the Methodist church in his youth or early manhood. His home near "Dunmoreburg," (Somerset at th. Great Island) Northumberland county, Pennsylvania, was destined as a part of the Methodist Circuit of Northumberland, in 1782. William Gilbert, the Circuit Rider, marked John's name on his circuit. (See Methodist Circuit Rider, 1782-1783, by Bell & Sonneier, (1952) pp. 25, 26.) He circuited his field to Lycoming county, and appears to have been a pioneer member of the Presbytery's Chapel Methodist Church in Head township, which is said to have been organized there about 1812. Up until that time, the "Head Circuit-Rider," coming by wagon or horseback, served Head township Methodists. It is regretted that the Methodist Church records were not kept well, if at all, in this period.

In 1792, William & John McFadden's names appear in Head Eagle township tax assessment, Northumberland county, Pennsylvania. It appears to be the last list in which their names appear in that county. Lycoming county was set up in 1795, taking in all of this territory.

The only landed McFadden in the vicinity of Dunn's Island was Hugh McFadden, of Pine Creek. He died in 1785 or earlier, and, according to Upton's Court records filed 18 years later, had children Samuel, Alice, James, Hugh, John, Mary and Elizabeth, wife of Phillip Moyer. Child of Hugh McFadden Jr. was Mary, who is believed was the daughter of Isaac Carson of Northumberland county. It is possible, of course, that this Mary Carson named in her father's will, (1785) was the wife of our subject, John McFadden. The only reason we choose Hugh is that name of George's children - John, James, Anna and Samuel, sons, and Jane, Anna & Elizabeth, daughters - bear striking similarity to the given names of Hugh McFadden's children. In 1810 most of these children of Hugh McFadden pulled up stakes and went west. It is not known what became of them. Whether or not Hugh was a brother of our John is not certain.

William Dunn, another settler of the West Branch, had a daughter Rebecca, married to Samuel McFadden, who was born in 1750 and died in 1785, just a year after their marriage. Yet, William Dunn, in his (1805) will, names this child as Rebecca McFadden. It is felt by this writer that Rebecca perhaps married a second McFadden, as widowold remains such for long, in those days. (See William McFadden No. 2) Samuel & Rebecca (Dunn) McFadden had a child - their only child - Mary, who married Alexander Dunn, a relative of the other Dunn's. Alexander Dunn and Rebecca McFadden, widow of William McFadden of Newville, were the executors of the latter's estate in 1822. It is this evidence upon which we base our assertion.

The records of Centre County, which was carved out of land which was near Dunn's Island, show that Elizabeth Reed, daughter of a William Reed, also married a McFadden, whose given name is not known. Alexander Mcilton's wife was Amanda Reed. So here is seen a connection between the Reeds, Mciltons, McFaddens & Dunns, three of whom combined their efforts to obtain for our subject his pension.

Please refer to some of the arguments (and references) presented in "John Hald Hill McFadden," preceding. Our present subject, is called one of the first settlers - with William McFadden's son - of Fairfield township, Crawford county. The tax and census records verify. From 1801 until 1816 he dwelt in Fairfield. About this time it seems his wife died, and he subsequently received and lived the rest of his days in Head township. The 1820 census for Head, under "John McFadden,"

(No. 3 or "Junior," twice described in full) on page 194, Head township, lists John McFadden (who was then only forty-one years old) and his family, and then lists a wife over 60 years of age. This, it is believed, was John McFadden our present subject, the Revolutionary soldier, then aged 72 years of age. He probably was then widowed, and living with his son. Although there is no evidence he lived with his son's child in the 1830 census, yet in his pension application, he asserted he was "of Head township." So it is perhaps possible and probably true that he lived at different periods with different children.

For John McFadden appears in the 1787 and 1798 tax lists for Pine Creek township, Northumberland County, Penna., and in the 1793 list for Gold Eagle township. Also in the 1790 census, p. 119, 100, for Northumberland county, which was unfortunately not returned by townships. With him or near to him in the lists, appear Andrew, Angus, Mary & William McFadden. Very near the widow of Hugh McFadden who lived on Pine Creek and died about 1768, leaving a large family. She is succeeded for the only property in the name of Mary McFadden. Incidentally, the names of Hugh, William & John McFadden, are constantly found together in several different areas of Pennsylvania, and one group in old Augusta County, Virginia, not many miles from York County, Penna., in the latter part of the 18th Century. No connection between these groups has been established.

Brown's History of Crawford County, Pennsylvania, (1865) page 575, states: "Brown's Chapel Methodist Episcopal church, tract 172, Head township, was organized in 1812... members included John McFadden." This is probably our subject or his son. Referring again to page 553 of the same work (Under "Greenwood Township,") "In the eastern part of the township (which was then Fairfield) the earliest settlers were ... William & John McFadden...James, James Junior, John & William Peterson...and others." This shows the obvious connection between these Petewrens and the McFaddens, who were apparently well acquainted with each other, and subsequently, several marriages took place between these two families. (See the list of possible children of John McFadden No. 2, above.)

In farther brief regard to the Petersons: This was a Scottish or English family from around Frankford, in Philadelphia county, which had a branch settle in Pittsgrove, Salem County, New Jersey, before 1770. Thomas Coates Sutton had 6 sons and 3 daughters, among them James Sutton who married Elizabeth, daughter of Abdon Abbott Jr., and his wife Elizabeth Blew. Abdon Abbott was a grandson of James Abbot ("Abit" in the records) of Long Island, who settled there before 1690. Thomas C. Sutton was a Loyalist, and his sons, with the exception of only one, joined the British Army in 1778, thus creating great animosity for themselves. Later, James and his brother-in-law, Abdon Abbott, Junior, deserted the British forces, on June 25th, 1783, according to official muster rolls preserved in the Ottawa (Canada) Archives. This rendered James Sutton in great personal danger. He subsequently changed his surname to Peterson, (probably in regard to the many Petersons of Swedish descent in the Salem County vicinity,) and fled into Washington County, Pennsylvania, about 1797, approximately, and then moved over the river to near Brownsville, Fayette County, remaining there until 1803. In that year his whole family, with exception of two married daughters, came to Fairfield township, Crawford County. The tax lists of that region, 1803, show "James Patterson" or "James Peterson" listed from that time on, with 400 acres of land, etc. His sons Thomas and Uriah were westward, in Fallcfield township. Then Greenwood was erected out of this area in 1829, all of the Petersons were then in its embrace. The story of the "Peterson-Sutton Mass Change" is well known to nearly all of the descendants, and is a universal story, although some branches of the family have different facets of the details than do others.

There are no records to indicate the exact date of John McFadden's death. The last payment on his pension was made for the first quarter of the year 1834, at Kenderville, Indiana. It would seem that he passed away in that time. In obituary, will, administration, Orphan's Court record, or headstone or other relevant record, has been found to verify this information. There is also the reason we have no proof for the names of his children! In many cases, personal visits to the courthouse were made by reliable persons, who failed to record. This writer also wrote letters to the clerks in the pertinent offices, and received "nil" reports. Not content, he wrote again, after over a year had passed and new officials were installed in these offices, with no such a result, just to be doubly sure that the first investigation was not a hit-and-miss one. Again, a negative reply.

John's wife seems to have died between 1818 and 1820, or, more nearly, about 1818 - about the time he moved from Fairfield township back into Pendleton to live with son John Junior. Again - no records of any female McFadden in that time period.

There is, curiously enough, a strange item appearing in a Kenderville newspaper, recorded except the indexed date in the Historical Society at the Library. It is as follows:

"John McFadden married Mary Carson, Jan. 3, 1830."

This is all that appears, and that in the old scrapbook of John Reynolds. Exactly where he obtained this is not known, but the actual Kenderville papers do not seem to contain marriage records. This is so curious that it is barely possible that it refers to our John and his wife, rather than to any young couple who married on the above date. Since, in Northumberland County records (see above) we find record of "Mary Carson, wife of _____ McFadden," in the will of Tom Carson of Bald Eagle township in 1785, it is perhaps possible that she was not the wife of Hugh, but of John McFadden, our subject. No explanation has been found.

In a final remark about this man, it is important to state that there is no clue to the names of his parents. There are many possibilities. One Thomas McFadden was in Northumberland County in the early years of the American Revolution, and was one of those who first volunteered for service from beyond the purchase line. No other information about this man is available, but the name Thomas is one repeated in the Crawford County histories often. There lived, in Northampton county, Pennsylvania, a William McFadden, who died in 1775, naming a son John in his will. In Lancaster County, in 1760 period, a John McFadden was the subject of a guardianship with his sister Eleanor, as orphaned children of another William. In Lancaster county lived three brothers, Hugh, John & Samuel McFadden. Samuel died in 1779, leaving, in his will, his property to his nephews, Samuel & John, children of his brother John McFadden, who were under age. In Bedford county a deed has appeared, which names widow Margaret, born, Catherine, May, Margaret, Thomas, Hugh and John McFadden, as heirs of a certain _____ McFadden, proprietors of a tract of land in Berlin township, about 1787. (Deed book K.) None of these small groups fit our Crawford County McFaddens properly. According to what is now known, the father of our group should name in his will, sons John, Samuel, William & Andrew, and perhaps son Benjamin. This may be criticized as "pre-supposing" the situation, but there is plenty of circumstantial evidence to support it.

Descendants of these McFaddens seem to maintain their independent spirit. Family bibles, only two of which are known, have been deliberately kept from this writer, so that it cannot be judged if they contain anything of help. They are in the tight grip of two little spinster-like ladies who do not know of each other's existence, yet their attitude of selfishness is as if they were Siamese twins!

It is hoped that further research, now going on, will reveal the tying links of this united family history. In that event, it will be added via an "Appendix." Otherwise, this volume itself may serve to stimulate the search by others, who may use its accurate references to base their more intensive research upon.

Jacob Steinbrook, Jr., served in the war of 1812, in the company of Capt. John McNight, in the 137th regiment of Penna. Militia. He was drafted at Monroeville, and served from August 13th to October 20, 1812, at Erie. He applied for, and received, a pension, with subscribers including brother-in-law, William Kimey, (see above) also a soldier in same unit. Previously, he had received a bounty warrant for same. John McFadden, Jr., was beyond doubt the son of John McFadden "Senior" of Fairfield township, (No. 2, described fully above) the Revolutionary soldier from Northumberland county. The close proximity of these two in 1800, in Acred township, (and presupposing this proximity from 1797 when they all arrived), are the main-tenance of the "Sr." "Jr." identification by the Tax Assessors in 1801 lists, when John had moved to Fairfield township on the north side of Connocht Cutlet. (Or, to look at it another way - when Fairfield township had been erected out of the land upon which "Senior" dwelt -), seems to make it a definite fact, but no legal proof has turned up. Otherwise, I could be stating that descendants of this John Jr. might be eligible for membership in the several patriotic Societies! A family Bible would be a Godsend! Inquiries and additional information, however welcome, will be welcomed.

Assuming this to be true, then John Jr. was the second child and probably the oldest son, born after his parents removed for safety (during the "big runaway"), to York county. He probably spent his early youth on the banks of the Susquehanna after the family returned to that place, 1784 - 1795. He married young, being only about 18 at the time. Though his wife Catherine was older than he by 3 years, it is not known if she had been previously married and widowed. This is a possibility. The 1800 census for this subject shows three children under the age of 10 years, two males and one female. One of them may perhaps be a child by her supposed prior marriage. The family name of Catherine is not known but best choice is STEINBRUCH, (STEINBROOK) because the given name of Catherine was popular with this Palatine family. Abraham Steinbruch of Penn., Northumberland Co., Penna., is no doubt the pioneer ancestor in the American continent. He appears to have been the father of all of those who came to Crawford county. He also had a child Katherine, and though her married name is not given, perhaps this is our Catherine, wife of John McFadden, Jr. One reason for doubting this is that it appears the Steinbrooks were not in the United States in 1776 when she was born, and has children, in 1830 (census) stated she was born in "Pennsylvania." This writer has failed to find any entry under the Continued/

names of "Steinbruch, Steinrock, or Steinbrook," in Hupp's or Hinke-Strassburger's Passenger Lists of Pennsylvania Immigrants, circa 1718 - 1805, to Philadelphia. It appears that they entered Pennsylvania after 1730, as the name does not appear in the U.S. Census for that year, for the Commonwealth writer states haven't been consulted, and this cannot be stated as "exhaustive" search. The fact that the Steinrocks, Kahlingers & co-senders of said township intermarried continually all the way from 1800 through 1910 in that area is a hint that there were ties perhaps before they arrived in Crawford County. (See SARAH CALHOUN, above, for a resume of her obituary.)

This John McFadden was a Methodist, like his father, and was a founding member of the Pine Grove M.M. Church in Wood Township. He wrote a fine will, naming all of the children whose genealogical charts are not yet made. He also was a soldier in the war of 1812, with his brother William McFadden (of Richmore Township - see William McFadden No. 4) and Thomas L. McFadden of whom, whose pretense is even more uncertain. He served in Capt. Beccari's Company of "Upper Creek Rifle Rangers," attached to the 135th Regiment of Penna. Infantry. Also seems to have served in the Co. of Capt. Andrew Shaffer, 137th Regiment, which is late 1814 from Jan. 1 to Feb. 8th. (This name "Andrew Shaffers" is erased & carries through in the County Warrant Application.) He stated that he volunteered at Newville on the 15th of August, 1812, and served for 3 months and was honorably discharged at Erie, Penna., on the 15th of November, 1812, but recollects having received no written discharge. It was supported in his claim by David McFadden. No statement of relationship, if any, is made by either of them. He received two County warrants, both of which he sold, (one to his son Andrew), to relatives or near-relatives. (See references.)

First mention of our subject in Crawford County - or anywhere in Pennsylvania records, as far as this writer knows - is in a deed from the Holland Land Company, dated July 30, 1799, Tract 218, to John McFadden, Junior, 100 acres in Wood Township, deed executed to "Frederick Steinbrook, testigee..." (History of Crawford County, 1865, Warner, Gers & Co., page 572.) A search for this under John McFadden has not been found in Crawford County records. It was a Holland Land Company transaction, and probably recorded under the name of Frederick Steinbrook, in Crawford or Allegheny County (the latter was parent county to that territory until 1800.) Here, again, we find a connection, if only of a legal nature, between our John and the Steinbrooks.

The signature of John McFadden (spelt "McFaden" in his own hand) compares well with that on his will in 1861, as found on these County warrant applications. Unfortunately, he died before the Act of 1871, when he could have obtained a pension. This has cheated us of the date and place of his marriage, and his wife's full maiden name, as was required by the act!

Donald T. McFadden, past Chief Assessor for Crawford County, has made un-certified statements to the effect that his ancestor, William McFadden (of Richmore township - see No. 4 below) and a brother John McFadden, both of whom came to Crawford county in their youth. This is the only statement to the effect, and is in a way a proof of this writer's contentions.

John's name is connected, in a deed dated 1820, but recorded in 1826, at Book #1, page 14, 15, wherein "John McFadden, Jr., William McFadden & Susannah, wife of David Laird," are mentioned as lawful heirs and representative of a certain Christina Kinnear. The deed is from Daniel Maloney of said, and an assignment of the exact acreage is then made (1827) to Justus Keichum. Thus, there was no opportunity for a later deed in which these heirs would have had to recite how they obtained

the land. Nevertheless, this deed is a curiosity, especially in regard to why they are recited as the "heirs" of "Christina Minnaer," as it seems highly irrelevant to the type of inheritance case! No will of any Christina Minnaer has appeared.

In the tax lists for Crawford County, the name of John McFadden appears straight through from 1800 to 1866, which is as far as we have been examined, and always in New Township, except during several years when he claims to have owned 13 or 30 acres in Payne Township. (1813 to 1852 lists.)

John was a farmer. But he was good with a rifle, and used one in the war. It appears as if he kept it and used it for hunting in later years, finally bequeathing it to his son Andrew, by his will.

Mr. Clesue C. Christensen, of Madeline, Minnesota, a descendant of John's son, William McFadden (see William McFadden no. 3) and Mrs. Anna Peterson, grandmother, both now deceased, (now deceased) speak of "John & Catherine McFadden," but could not swear that they were mentioned as direct ancestors.

John W. McFadden Sr., and wife Lodiska, apparently came from Massachusetts between 1820 - 1826, and settled in Venango township. He bought land in Cambridge Borough in 1829, and, being primarily a hatter by trade, opened a new H t Shop in See Hill in April, the same year, placing a notice in the Meadville Messenger, Apr. 2, 1829. He also was a lumber man and farmer. He seems to have had a brother, Christopher, a twin, if the census be correct (1850), who lived with the family in 1850. He does not appear again. The age of this census is blank, after the ages are given, so no occupations or birthplaces are provided for any of this family.

Joseph B. McFadden, his son, was a member of the Zion Church, and of the Cambridge Grange. He was a lumberman and a farmer. In 1857 he moved to Miller's Station, in Lockerie township where he resided at the time of his death. The biographical sketch of this man's family and life is remarkable, but fails to provide the places of his parents' births. If John W. McFadden, Sr., was born in Massachusetts as the 1860 U.S. Census designates, then he is at best a "distant cousin" (if related at all) of our Crawford County family, but the names of his children bear striking similarity to those of the others - "Catherine, Rebecca, George, John." He was appointed Postmaster of Cambridge Springs, Pa., and lost it, all in the year 1829. He sold land to the Methodist Church, which may indicate he was a member thereof, as were our pioneer families. (See John McFadden No. 2.)

Information is needed on this Thomas McNaul. Confusion arises, owing to the fact that two of these men - the other "Thomas R. McNaul" - see below - lived in the same community for a period of years, and was a near relative.

Thomas R. McFadden is often confused with Moses, son of Andrew & Mary (Daniels) McFadden, (No. 1 above), because both resided at times in Randolph township. Our subject served with William (No. 4) and John (No. 3) McFadden, in the Company of Capt. Andrew Schaffner, in the 17th Pa. Heavy Artillery Regiment, in the war of 1812. He was called "Captain T. R. McFadden." It can however, be presumed he was also in the Char-ville Light Artillery. (See Apr. 22, 1856, obit.) He suffered the loss of his two children, William & Agnes, possibly from an epidemic, or an accident.

The above list is made up with help of early census records, which give only statistics, alongside the names of the heads of families. It may be incorrect. The children named are correct.

William McNaul of Sadsbury or Summit township, settled about 1801, west of the village of Harmonyburg. He lived there till his death. Since he doesn't appear in the U.S. Census of 1830, we assume he died prior to that year. His son James' name first appears that year. The 1846 Directory of Crawford County, for 1846, states that he came from Philadelphia. As the son James was alive in that year, we assume the information is correct, and probably provided by him. James, the eldest son, was one of the trustees in the Estate of his younger brother, William J. McNaul, along with his nephew, William Putman. It is not certain that the above statement is correct, but many clues point to it. He purchased 400 acres in Sadsbury on May 20, 1801, from James McClellan; land on edge of Conneaut Lake, bounded by Joseph Gerecke & others. He seems to have sold all of it to Rhineus Putman, in 1826. Land in Sadsbury continued in his name until 1836, according to the Tax Assessments. This is probably because James was his Executor and title passed to him, without any administration. No Will or Administration has been found, and no Orphans' Court dockets seem to exist.

William McFadden (No. 1) Continued.

In the 1850 census of Summit lists James' wife as "Hannah." No explanation. But it is possible she was the mother of the children, and Jane L. McGranahan a 2d wife.

In the early Tax Assessments, our subject's name appears first in 1802, along with another William, in Sadsbury, (See William McFadden No. 2) both having 400 acres of land, the subject of this sketch being also marked "Head of Conneaut Lake." This William McFadden is the only one assessed in 1803 list for Sadsbury, and until 1811, when the amount of acreage is reduced to 150. The same continues, until 1824, when he has only 100 acres. This is the last appearance of his name, and may indicate the year of his death. Thereafter only "John McFadden (?) and "James McFadden," his son, appear. However, the 1827 and 1838 Tax Lists are missing.

He does not appear in the 1800 U.S. Census, but he appears in the 1810, 1820 census, and not thereafter. In 1810 he is listed next to the name of Joseph Garwood, whose property was next to his own.

Whether this man was closely related to the other McFaddens is not certain. If he came from the city of Philadelphia, it is possible he was not. Where the writer of the 1876 Atlas and Directory got his information is not known, but most likely from William's daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Clark, of Venango township, since her name and residence is given in the short biography.

It is arbitrary to assume that William J. McFadden of Leadville, Penna., was a son of our subject. We have no proof. However, in this younger man's Administration, (1848) one of the Administrators is William Putnam, who may have been a son of Jane Putnam, daughter of William of Sadsbury. Another reason for this suspicion is that in the 1820 census, William McFadden, our subject, has one male under 10 years of age in his household. W. J. McFadden was born in 1816.

NOTE: THE ABOVE SUMMARY is based upon the 1800, 1810 and 1820 census. The inclusion of "George McFadden No. 2" here is arbitrary, but not without basis.

This writer believes that this man - William McFadden of Headville, - was the full brother of "John McFadden No. 2" above. (See) He also believes that Rebecca his wife was first married to his brother (?) SAMUEL MCFADDEN, (1750-1785) who had one child, Mary McFadden married Alexander Dunn. Samuel McFadden's wife was Rebecca Dunn, born 1767, oldest daughter of William & Sally (McKinstry) Dunn, of York county, who subsequently (1768) settled on the West Branch of Susquehanna River, on Pine Creek, now in Clinton County, Pennsylvania. Mr. Dunn warranted and finally was granted full title (1796) to "Dunn's Island," in the Susquehanna River. Already shown, John McFadden Sr., the Methodist, and Veteran of the Revolution, had lived in that region prior to his arrival in Crawford County. James Dunn, the son of Mr., had been a deponent in McFadden's Pension Application. To this we add the fact that, in our subject's Administration, Alexander Dunn also was an executor, with the widow, Rebecca. William, our subject was probably the "brother" whom John McFadden mentioned, whose horse was shot dead under him, in 1777, while both were in the bar.

Rebecca McFadden received an Annuity from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, on her husband's service in the Revolution. Unfortunately, the papers of Application have perished. Only the payment vouchers, or the ledger accounts, remain, but they serve to show that she had died by 1827, when the payments were cancelled. This application might have solved many problems. There may perhaps be a record or copy of this file, tucked away among the archives of the Court of Common Pleas, Headville.

There is virtually no doubt that this man was the same William McFadden whose name appears in Northumberland County Tax lists of 1785, 1786, and the 1790 census of that county, and the 1792 taxlist for Bald Eagle township, always in company with John McFadden. Their brother Andrew also appears nearby. William's (1790) family contained 5 persons: 2 males over 16, which might include William's aged father, and himself; and 3 females, who may include his oldest daughter, Rebecca Jr., his wife Rebecca, and Mary, the daughter of his brother Samuel, deceased.

William McFadden (No. 2) Continued.

In 1805, William McFadden sold his large tract of land - or released his interests in some warrant - in Fairfield township, and settled in Meadville, on Center Street, which was (1885) later the site of Jesse Hupp's residence. The Tax lists show he owned or paid tax on "John McFadden's House & Lot," in Meadville. Before this time, he had come first to Head township, about 1797, and paid tax on 400 acres of land in 1800, the first list now extant. In 1801, and 1802, he appeared in Sudsbury, and "Rebecca McFadden, Jan." with him, assessed also for 400 acres. Her title implies there was another Rebecca McFadden, older, in the vicinity, and this writer thinks it was her mother, wife of William. This may not be correct. In 1803 he came to appear with one horse to his name, and in Fairfield township. In 1804 he has 200 acres, part of "T. W. Fittnogen" (?) and 2 horses, which was the only reference of this farm. From then on until 1822 he is assessed for the house and lot in Meadville. In 1823 his "heirs" were assessed for the same, and not after 1824. But no Orphan's Court records or deeds appear to show these various sales of a later date! The early transactions become ambiguous.

The Deeds show that William sold his 1/2 interest in a tract of 400 acres, (Head township?) soon or assigned under articles of agreement, to Joseph Hackney, Jan. 29, 1802. Land adjoined land of Robert Carson & James McConnell. On Dec. 4, 1804, Gibson & Astley conveyed to Wm. McFadden, (same man?) two tracts - (1) 1/4 interest in a tract in Sudsbury; and (2) 1/2 interest in 401 acres and 150 perches in Head township.

There is a very distant possibility that David McFadden (See) of Meadville was a son of this couple. All the records do not support this view. William was probably of the Methodist faith, and seems to have moved with his brother John wherever that one would go. It is thought that he lived with John in York county in the period 1779-1783, in Harrington township, since no assessment for him appears in either Northumberland or York for those years. He was in Cookson Long's Co., at Reed's Fort, during the Revolution, as was John, his brother.

WILLIAM McFADDEN (No. 3) of Greenwood township, Crawford Co., Penna., and pioneer settler of Dodge County, Minnesota. (1856) Son of John & Catherine (?) William Webster served in the war of 1812, with his brother, John (see No. 3) and his son, Andrew, who was a major soldier, probably also a drummer. (See, also, entry under the Company of Capt. Andrew Shaffer, in the 137th Regiment of Pennsylvania Infantry, who served from January 1, to Dec. 1, 1814, at Erie. William applied for a pension, a service pension. The documents are very helpful, and the writer obtained copies, which give his marriage date, wife's maiden name, etc. - without the above list of 100 children is complete. This, with the date and name of David, is there uncertainty. Since he was without doubt a brother of John Webster of Newfane, then he was also son of our John Webster Jr., of Newfane & Fairfield, who came with brother Andrew from Oneida Lake, in 1797 and settled on Conneaut Creek in that in New Union township. His sister was probably Hannah, wife of Joseph Ward of Head township. The name of Hannah is in the children of both John & William, as is the case Margaret, in all three families. This is the best clue to the given name of our John's wife, mother of our subject.

Sarah Webster, wife of our subject, was the child of David & Abigail (see No. 1) of Fairfield (now Union) township. David was reputedly a veteran of the Revolution. This latter claim has not been verified, if it is so, and the above documents are eligible for memberships in the various patriotic societies, provided certificates of documentation of the above lines can be supplied. David Sanford's cabin was the site of the first Methodist church class, about 1800 or 1801. It was attended by three families: the Websters, Andrew Cradden's family, and John Ladd's family. Andrew later removed to Lugar Lake, in Wayne County (see Andrew Cradden) and John his brother may have attended this class also. This would explain the marriage of David's daughter Sarah, to John's son, Andrew, in 1809. David's family, besides Sarah, included sons Jacob, William, Peter, and Peter (married to John Williams,) and Maria, (married to Arthur Johnson, married again to John Williams,) and Maria, (married to Arthur Johnson, married again to John Williams,) whose son, Arthur Johnson, married Maria, (see Maria Johnson,) was a great-great grandson, was a boy, in the early 1800's. It was called "Mamford tree."

1. This Webster lived along the Coneva Creek, and a canal went through later, which discouraged his trapping by driving away the mink and other animals, and bringing in many more settlers. He then built his new house on land about 1,000 feet from the Lancaster-Richmond township line. (This might explain the Tax Lists assessing him in these two townships at different times.) This cabin was built in such a way that he could drag logs through the house to the fire-place. He then took up farming, and was rather well to do in his day. His will seems to show this, but he was rooted of all his savings, as we are told, which changed his whole situation.

It is in Fairfield, in the Tax Assessments, that William McFadden first appears. In 1808 his name appears near that of John McFadden (Senior). Previously, in 1807, it appears that he was assessed in that township also as a single man. This seems to me, in 1807, at least twenty one years of age, to be taxable. This compares with the known date of his birth, 1786, which would make him just twenty-one in 1807. In 1809 he is assessed in Fairfield with 100 acres of land. In the 1810 U.S. Census, Fairfield, he appears, next on the same page genealogically to John McFadden Senior, (Age 413). He has only one child, a female, under 10. This would be Martha, born late in 1809.

Mr. Silas Lloyd McFadden, of Crawford county, has related that his great-grandfather, our subject, was originally in Greenwood, but removed to Richmond township later, and began trapping. At that time, Fairfield was on the edge of the Conneaut Marsh outlet, (now Conneaut Lake Canal), and in those days heavily covered with trees and brush. But it was also rapidly populated with settlers! On Feb. 2, 1808, William signed an agreement at Deed Book G-1, page 80, with his son-in-law, Jonathan Dolittle, husband of his daughter Anna, for trapping privileges upon a 400-acre tract of land in Vernon township. This confirms Lloyd McFadden's remarks. In the 1821 Tax Assessment, he pays tax on 100 acres of woodland."

William McFadden moved from Greenwood township (which had been erected out of Fairfield and Willowfield in 1829) to Richmond township, in 1841. This is ascertained by the fact that, in the Tax lists, he first appears in Richmond that year, with 200 acres of land, 2 oxen, 3 cows and 2 horses. He also is taxed in Randolph township for 150 acres of land. Deeds support the idea that it is the same person. Lloyd McFadden relates that William became very poor in his older years, and was robbed of all his savings.

In his application for U.S. Pension on his War of 1812 service, on May 20, 1871, he gave his address as "Lyon's Hollow," Pennsylvania. He signed the document in a very feeble hand. His witnesses included son-in-law, David Hunt. He signed his name slightly different from that on his County Land Warrant Application, (Dec. 21, 1850 and Apr. 23, 1855), as "McFadden." This called for a re-check of his signature by the Bureau of Pensions. In 1850 he signed "McFadden," and in 1855 as "M'fadden." To genealogical searchers, this is a slight difference, especially in a time when orthography was not constant. But to the legal authorities, it was a case to split hairs. But he received his pension, after all. In the file appears his Discharge certificate, signed by Capt. James McKnight, with whom he had served in 1814, in a second batch at Erie, Penna.

Mr. Donald T. McFadden, another descendant of our subject, states that William "and his brother John" McFadden, came from Scotland, settled in Greenwood township, and became fur-trappers. He further states that, when the canal went in, William removed to Richmond, but John stayed in Fairfield. This is the only personal or any other testimony to names of any of this William's brothers' names. Actually, John his brother lived a few miles north, in Head township, but their father, John Senior, was a long-time resident of Fairfield, on the outlet of Conneaut Marsh. This also is where his father, John, and uncle, Andrew, had at first settled, about 1797, upon their arrival from Westmoreland county. Actually, both of these men, and their father and uncle, were all born in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and did not come "from Scotland." But their father's father, or perhaps their great-grandfather, had, indeed, come from Scotland, via the North of Ireland. (See the Introduction to this work for details and documented evidence.)

Upon arrival in Richland, at Lyon's Hollow, William and son James built a house which still stands. It is not known how old it is. It is now falling in. William was buried in the Lyons Cemetery, but was too poor to afford money to provide a headstone for himself or his wife. His children knew the location of his burial by the arrangement of the trees in the vicinity. But one day some along whom the neighbours decided to level off the hilly and rocky surface of the cemetery. They had along with them some whiskey to keep the energy up, and, in the process, tore out all these trees, and hence, nobody is sure just where William is buried. Most of William's family are buried in that vicinity, with or without markers.

Very few of his children married into families who lived in Richland township. His son James McFadden was the Postmaster of New Richland at one time. He was also in the township government in several offices, and a member of the Grange eight years. He was a member of the Spiritualist Church of Lyon's Hollow shortly after the close of the rebellion in 1865. In 1885 he was the proprietor of a general store in New Richland. He has a fine biography in the History of the County (1885) on page 952. In that work, his surname is spelt "McLadden."

It is not clear whether, in fact, his two daughters, Lucretia and Abigail, were twins. Only the exact date of birth of Abigail is known. Lucretia died before her father died, and was therefore not mentioned in his will. However, the marriage records supply the omission, being recorded in the old newspapers.

Both Lucretia and Abigail married brothers, sons of Joseph & Anna (Peterson) Thatcher of Fairfield township. Anna Peterson Thatcher was a daughter of James Sutton, alias Peterson, and wife Elizabeth Abbott, of Salem County, New Jersey, who settled about 1803 in Fairfield, on land very near that settled by John McFadden. A number of marriages between the Petersons and McFaddens took place. The Thatchers were married in Hunterdon County before 1800 and came to Crawford county about 1810. Anna Thatcher's father, James Sutton, later James Peterson, was in flight from the British and American forces at the time of her birth in 1778. It is related by her grandson William H. Harley, who lived with her until her death in 1869, that she, as an infant, was taken out of her crib by the Whig soldiers who confiscated her parents' property in 1778/9, and then they burned it with other household furniture. James was never caught, and successfully eluded his would-be captors, to live out a full and successful life. He died Feb. 16, 1837, in Greenwood township, with much property, at the age of 91 years, leaving over two hundred living descendants. Joseph Thatcher's family probably came Hunterdon County, New Jersey, where a family of that name had lived for a long time. Joseph has a son Wringlesew Thatcher, a family name among the New Jersey clan.

William McFadden was probably raised in Pine Creek & Bald Eagle townships, Northumberland county. It is very unfortunate that the information about the family in the days before 1800 is so meagre.

William J. McFadden was prominent in Lickville affairs, and was as well known
as the Sheriff, David McFadden. But, he was a lad, whose uncertain of this man's
parentage. There is a fair amount of circumstantial evidence available which supports the
assertion that he was of the McFadden family, of Sadsbury (No. 1)
whose family is described above.

William J. McFadden was Captain of the Lickville Troys, in 1846. This was the
time assigned to the Lickville Light Artillery. He was a member of the organization
as early as 1843. It may perhaps have had an interest in a firm of "Verickson &
Verickson," in the same district also, as, etc., but was given with "Jos.
McFadden and D. V. Verickson." Letters of Administration to James McFadden and
William Putnam, the latter of which is a will. It is not verified who the James Mc-
Fadden can be, but this writer thinks it was James L. McFadden of Lickville.
If so, then this is very strong evidence. Mr. Putnam was probably a son of John

83-Year-Old Son Of Pioneer Family 'Fighting City Hall'

FULLERTON — The 83-year-old son of one of northern Orange County's pioneer families has categorically stated that he will resist all attempts by this city to run him off what is left of the family homestead to build a regional shopping center.

Robert C. McFadden characterized recent city council action in attempting to get 68.8 acres of Yorba Linda Boulevard and Placentia Avenue rezoned from residential to commercial and "freezing" the property from development or sale until a developer is found as "nefarious" and "reducing the property owner to a title holder without rights."

The retired vice president of Southern California Edison Co. currently makes his home in a New England-style house on an acre at 1511 N. Placentia Ave., all that is left of the 100-acre ranch established by his father in 1867.

Over the years, the ranchland has been sold piecemeal until

today there are 11 owners of the 68.8 acres in question, once part of the original McFadden ranch.

Largest holding is 39 acres held in trust by Bank of America. Eadington Fruit Co. of Fullerton has 14 acres. Other smaller landowners, according to the county assessor map, in addition to McFadden are W.J. Haney, the state, J.F. Addy, J. Aquire, J. Abandato, G. Abandato, E. Carr and C. Capps.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. William McFadden, were the second family to settle north of Anaheim. The Daniel Kraemer family had purchased 3,900 acres for \$4,600 two years earlier.

His father came from San Francisco to visit friends in Anaheim. He borrowed a horse to ride around. Then he purchased his small ranch for \$10 an acre.

McFadden, a school teacher, decided to build a school. His neighbors, the Kraemers, donated land on Orangethorpe Avenue and El Cajon School was built.

Four years later, the school was moved to the corner of Chapman and Placentia avenues, to be nearer the students. McFadden's wife, Sarah Jane, helped name the small, developing community to the east — "Placentia." She said it meant "a pleasant place to live."

McFadden and other citrus ranch owners were the first to plant valencia orange groves on their property.

The son said, "It's probably too late for me to get any

redress, but I think that people should be warned, for what the city is doing here can be done over and over again to every property owner in Fullerton."

He added, "The only way to stop it is to get a change of personnel in city hall." He said he will work toward that end.

Said McFadden, "What in effect city hall is doing is usurping property without paying for it, which is against the traditions upon which this country was founded."

In its latest move the council at the behest of the Mayor's Blue Ribbon Committee, has reversed its position and decided to employ an outside research firm for a \$7,000, 10-week study of the "highest and best use of the land." Two previous studies have stated it will be by the mid-1980s before the land is suitable for a shopping center.

The council action came after the mayor's committee complained of being "let down" because councilmen wouldn't authorize the study after levying a development "freeze" April 1. City planning commissioners refused to rezone the land to commercial claiming "the highest and best use" was for apartment development.

In reversing their previous stand, councilmen decided to extend the moratorium while exempting the bottom 22 acres, now under development for apartments, from both the freeze and the study area.

The exemption was given at the request of the property owners. The 22 acres now is being bought by two apartment developers from the Bank of America which holds it in trust.

Both the mayor's committee and councilmen at various sessions have publicly admitted there is no shopping center developer currently interested in the land.

However, they characterize the land as the sole remaining suitable parcel in the city for such a venture and bemoan the fact that so many sales tax dollars are going into other cities from Fullerton which has the highest per capita income in the county.

There has been some discussion that the city condemn and buy the property to hold until a shopping center developer comes along.

A.J., Mabel McFadden Personify Love

SANTA ANA — Call "love" an intense affectionate concern for someone or a tenderness or a "strong personal attachment induced by sympathetic understanding," as the dictionary does.

Or call it what happens when a husband of 18 years still opens car doors for his wife.

Or the way she ruffles his hair when he kids her.

For A.J. McFadden, son of a pioneer Santa Ana and Newport Beach family, and his wife, Mabel, love is living together 18 years in that manner.

On the eve of Valentine's Day, McFadden, who was 72 when they were wed Jan. 30, 1954, reveals his secret for a successful marriage, simply: "Marry a woman with forgiveness in her heart."

Mrs. McFadden figures it is their similar senses of humor that have made them good marriage partners and, for 45 years before that, good friends.

"We used to look at each in a crowd," she remembered vividly, "and he might smile about something and I'd smile too, and nobody else around

could understand what was funny."

He started off teasing her the first time he met her at church 53 years ago, she recalled.

job building the railroad line that connected the landing to inland areas and opened trade to San Bernardino County. "I carried a water bucket and a dipper for the construction crew," he laughed. "and I got six bits or \$1. a day."

The pier has been dedicated as a state historical landmark.

McFadden was an attorney here for two years before the San Francisco earthquake in 1906, but "because I couldn't leave my client's cases at the office," he developed ulcers. "My doctor told me I could be a living farmer or a dead attorney," so he turned to farming 30 acres of family property surrounded by the Irvine Ranch.

A close friend of James Irvine Sr., McFadden later became president of the Irvine Co. and now is an honorary director of the company.

He was president when the company donated 1,000 acres near Upper Newport Bay for the University of California at Irvine.

McFadden was the president of the Council of California Growers and is a former president of the State Board of Agriculture and the California State Chamber of Commerce.

He also has served as president of the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, California Agricultural Probate Commission, California Walnut Growers Association and Persimmon Growers Association.

A regent for the University of California 16 years, he also has been a Pomona College trustee more than 40 years.

And he has been a director of the Southern California Edison Co., the Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co., Diamond Walnut Growers and the California Fruit Exchange.

In 1965, he was recognized as a man of the year by Newport Beach.

Retired now, McFadden still makes occasional hunting trips...but few public appearances.

"We read a lot," Mrs. McFadden said. "And we work in the garden together. He usually does one area and I do another. That way promotes more harmony."

"We don't always agree on how to do things," she smiled.

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
