

It is too bad that I did not get the urge to authenticate my husband's ancestry when I was young and when more of his immediate family were still living. I recall so many incidents which my husband told me concerning his wonderful grandfather (A.W.G. Morse) who lived with my husband's parents for many years and who died in their farm-home near Vivian, So. Dakota.

While my husband was still a student at Northwestern University Medical School in Chicago, Illinois, and after he and I were married in 1913, we lived on Michigan Avenue on Chicago's south side. Two meiden ladies named Morse lived in an adjoining apartment house. They were "ancestor hunters" and really fired my husband's interest in the Morse Society.

After World War I, we settled in Rapid City, So. Dakota. We were primarily interested in founding a home and a medical practice and rather lost sight of ancestor hunting, but after my husband's demise in 1970, I found old papers and letters from sundry people that he had saved. I assume that he planned eventually to work out a genealogy of his branch of the Morse family. There already existed a sparse outline of his ancestors clear back to the original Samuel. With this outline as a basis, I have managed, with much help from town clerks, historical societies and varied correspondents, to authenticate the lineage contained in this little booklet.

Time runs out, and I am relieved to have finished this project and to have it distributed to family members as a memorial to my fine husband.

GENEALOGY OF THE MORSE FAMILY

Compiled by Ruth Morse Wife of William Emsley Morse 1973

15 April, 1635. These parties hereafter expressed are to be transported to New England imbarqued in the "Increase", Robert Lee, Master; Samuel Morse, husbandman, age 50, Elizabeth Morse, age 48, Joseph Morse, age 20.

This is the first statement concerning Samuel Morse who came to Watertown, Massachusetts, in 1635, and became the founder of our branch of the Morse family in America. Samuel was the son of Richard and Margaret Morse of Dedham, England and, since he was 67 years old at the time of his death (April 15, 1654), in Medfield, Mass., it is generally agreed that his is the birth confirmed by an entry in the town register of Dedham, England, which states, "Richard Morse, married Feb. 15, 1586, Margaret Symson and their son, Samuel, were baptized July 25, 1587."

"Son Samuel" and his family became members of Water-town's First Church and on August 15, 1635, a covenant for a new settlement was drawn up. The signatures of Samuel Morse and his three sons, Joseph, Daniel and John, appear on the document. The new settlement was originally called "Contentment", but such was the family's above-average influence that the name was later changed to Dedham in honor of Samuel's birthplace.

According to a law in existence at that time, a com-

a community which grew beyond one-half mile from its meetinghouse was to form a new community. Thus, when new town of Medfield was established (presumably as an offshoot of Dedham), Samuel Morse received a plot of land in this town, where he died on April 15, 1654, at the age of 67 years. (Foregoing information from 'Memorial of the Morse Family, 1631-1896".)

Joseph Morse (1.1.3) emigrated with his father, Samuel, and mother, Elizabeth, when he was 20 years old and settled in Ipswich, Mass., prior to 1641. He died there (Foregoing information from 'Memorial of Morse Family", p. 34.) 1.1.3.6 Captain Joseph Morse, b. July 25, 1649, liwed in Sherborn where he built the first mill in company with a Capt. Ware. He served as a representative and the first public worship was held in his house. (XIX) Major Eleazer, son of Peleg Lawrence, was born 28 Feb 1674, died 9 Mar 1754. He lived for some years in a house in Littleton on the east side of the old stage road to Concord and Boston, a short distance south of the Stoney Brook railroad. The sellar of the house still remains. He was frequently chosen moderator of town meetings and served as selectman and constable. He received the title of major about 1734. He died at Pepperell, 9 Mar 1754, aged eighty years. His will was dated 29 Dec 1749, and proved 13 Jan 1755. He married Mary Scripture, born 1679, died 29 June 1761, eldest daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Scripture. Children, born in Groton; 1. Elizabeth, 28 Feb 1699, married ----- Buttrick. 2. 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Robert Morse of Stoke next Nayland, England made his will 9 Oct 1552. It was proved at Bury St Edmunds, 15 Sept 1553. His wife was Agnes ----.

Son, Thomas Morse, eldest of the seven children, was born before 1520 at Stoke-by-Nayland, Suffolk, England, was buried 17 Feb 1566/7 and his wife, Agnes was buried 5 Apr 1674 at Stoke-by-Nayland. They had six children.

Thomas, the Elder was born before 1551 and married 26 May 1573 at Boxted, Essex, England to Margaret King. He married, second Margery Boggas, 24 Nov 1585. He was a minister of the gospel. He fathered ten children, five by each of his wives.

Samuel, the second child of Rev Thomas and Margaret King, was christened in Boxted 12 June 1576. He married 26 June 1602 at Redgrave, Suffolk, Elizabeth Jasper. She was the daughter of Lancelot Jasper and Rose Shepard. She was born 30 Oct 1579 in Redgrave. He died 5 Apr 1654 in Dedham, Mass. and she died in Watertown on 20 June 1655.

Son, Joseph was born in Redgrave 2 May 1615. He married Hannah Phillips 1 Sept 1638 at Watertown, Mass. He died 20 June 1654 at Dedham, Mass and the widow married Thomas Boyden of Watertown.

Elizabeth Morse, born 1 Sept 1647 at Dedham. She married 22 Dec 1668 Peleg Lawrence in Medfield, Mass. They had ten children. He died 14 Feb 1692 at Groton, Mass.

Suffolk], bushandman, being "sick of body," dated 17 February 1616 [1616/17]: To William, my son, and Francis [sic] his wife, for their lives, the tenement wherein I dwell, which I purchased of Gregorye Fysher, with the hemp land and croft thereto belonging, on condition that they pay to Rose, my wife, for her life, 49s. a year, quarterly; otherwise my son Henric is to enter thereon. If William and Frances pay the annuity, then the tenement shall, after their decease, be equally divided among the child ron of my said son William and Frances, his wife, viz., Nathaniell, Jonathen. Joseph, Jerymic, Elizabeth, Bridgett, and Marye. To my son Nathaniell Jasper and his heirs £5. 6s. 8d., payable by my son William within one year of the death of my wife Rose. GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN ENGLAND

Morse

Ox 15 Apr. 1835 there embarked on the Increase, from London, England, for New England, Samuel Morse, husbandman, aged 50 years, Elizabeth Morse, aged 48 years, Joseph Morse, aged 20 years, and Elizabeth Daniel, aged 2 years, Joseph Morse being without doubt a son and Elizabeth Daniel probably a granddaughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Morse. Samuel Morse settled first in Watertown, Mass., but moved to Dedham, Mass., at its first settlement in 1636 and died in 1654, leaving a will. Of his children who are found in New England the eldest son was John Morse, the second Daniel Morse, the third Joseph Morse, and the youngest child, apparently, was Mary, who married, 10 Aug. 1641, Samuel Bullen of Watertown and Medfield, Mass., whither also the Morses went. From the date of Mary's marriage it may be inferred that she was born about 1620. A Thomas Morse who appears in the Dedham church records on 5, 2 mo. 1640 and 28, 4 mo. 1640 was probably another son of Samuel Morse, and, as nothing more is heard about him, he probably died childless soon afterwards.

Samuel Morse's son Daniel came to New England before his father, and settled at Watertown, for on 6 May 1635 Daniel and Joseph Morse of Watertown were admitted as freemen. This Joseph Morse was not Joseph the son of Samuel, as the latter Joseph came in the ship with his father, but he was apparently the Joseph Morse, aged 24, who embarked at Ipswich, England, 1 Apr. 1634, on the Elizabeth. He appears to have been a son of Joseph and Dorothy Morse of Dedham, England; and his father migrated to Ipswich, Mass., and in his will in 1646 mentions a son Joseph. That Joseph Morse of Ipswich, Mass., was a relative of Samuel Morse of Dedham, Mass., will appear from the records given in the following pages.

For many years the question of the ancestry of Samuel Morse of Dedham, whose descendants are numerous, has pussled New England genealogists. It is with pleasure, therefore, that the Committee on English and Foreign Research presents English records and a pedigree based on them which show very conclusively the ancestry of Samuel Morse and the parentage of his wife Elizabeth.

Acknowledgment is due to Mrs. Bidney Morse of London for information contained in her valuable notes, from which the clue leading to the parish of Redgrave, Suffolk, was first obtained.

FROM PROBATE RECORDS

The Will of Robert Mones of Stoke Nayland [co. Suffolk], husbandman, dated 5 October 1551. To my son John the Elder the house where I live, he paying to my cldest son Thomas £3 in three years. To Robert and Thomas, sons of my son Thomas, who now dwells with me, 20s. towards their keeping. To my son Richard the house and lands called Canons, at his age of twenty-one. WILL OF REV. THOMAS MORSE, OF FOXEARTH, COUNTY OF ESSEX, ENGLAND-1596.

[Copied by Honatio G. Somennt.]

In the name of God Amen. I Thomas Morse, Minister of God his word in the Countie of Essex and in the Dvocesse of London, do make and ordevne this my Last [sic] and Testament in manner and forme followinge, first althoughe weake in Bodye yet in good and perfecte Remembrance thancks be unto God Doe bequeathe my soule to aimighty God, and my Bodye unto the earthe from whence it was taken. Rem, I give and bequeathe to my nyne children now levinge. nyne score Foundes of good and lawful money of Englande, that is to saic, To John, Samuel, Daniell, Joseph, Jeremye, James, Nathaniell and Phillipp my sonnes, and to Sara my daughter, and to every of them Twentye Pounds att the age of Three and twentye yeares, Savinge my mynde is that my daughter Sara shall receive her percen of Twenty poundes at the age of One and Twentye yeares. And yf any of them doe departe this life before theis yeares of age be expired, Then I will that his or her parte or partes be equally devyded amonge my children we shall be then livinge. I give and bequeathe unto Richard Morse my brother, Fortic shillings of lawfull money. Rem, I give more unto Margarett Morse my sister, Twentye shillings. Item I give unto my eight youngest children Eight Bybles, every of them a Byble to be provyded at the cost and charges of my eldest sonne uppen we Condicon I give hym all my Bookes in my Studdye. them, I give and bequeathe unto the poore of the Parishe of Foxenate Foxearth Tenne shillings. The rest of my goods, money, plate Bonds, morgages, cattle, household stuffe, or whatsoever else unbequeathed, my Legacyes discharged, I give unto Margaret my wife with condicon to bringe upp my children in Learnynge with all things Litt for them untill she shall place them in some honest service, whoms I make my sole Executrize for the performance of this my last will and Testament. Also I will that yf Margarett my saide wife fice dispuse herselfe to marrye, that then she and he whome she shall marrye with enter into sufficient Bondes unto my eldest sonne then livings before her marriage for the discharge of all these things which concerne here to be discharged in this my will. Also, yf yt please God she doth marrye that she doe enter into sufficient Bondes to give unto my eight some before rehearsed Thirty and fyve poundes equallys to be devyded amounge them and unto my daughter Sara tenne poundes we is all five and Forty poundes, To be paide we in one year after the marriage of the saide Margaret or att the severall yeares of their ages before mencaned. And yf she shall refuse to cater into sufficient bands for the discharge of their Legacies before expressed or any parte of them. I then will that my eldest sound then hisingshallse Executour in her place, and she to resigne all over to bym And he to enter into sufficient bonds to paye unto Margarett my Wiele whin one years after the takings of this Office, Fourescore pounds of good and lawfull money of Englande, besydes the shall entoye all my household stuffe and cattell. Onlie my will in that she shall deliver in all my Bonds, morgages and money. And of any be consumed, she for to make it good. And that my sonne shall enter into sufficient Bondes for the discharginge of my will as ys before required of my Wiefe. And yf Margarett my Wife doe departe this liefe unmarryed, that then my desyre and will is that she gere unto my Foure Children which I had by my first wive Twentye noundes of good and lawfull money, that is eche of them Fyve poundes. And this is my true mynde and will the which I doe testefve by my bands and scale this Tenth of November, and in the yeare of our Lorde 1506.

The above Rev. Thomas Morse was no doubt the father of Samuel. X of Bedham and Medfield, who, aged 50, in 1635, embarked & London, having in filial reverence named a son Thomas, who died If Dedham, s. p.: another, Samuel after himself, who returned to Ragland and served as Colonel under Cromwell, and four other sons offer four of his brothers; and not having enough to go round, he was probably suffered to name a grandson Nathuniel towards completing the list. Robert, Thomas, Anthony, William and Edward were the great family tomes, both in Suffolk and Wiltshire. If Rev. Thomas need a son Themas for himself and father, (?) and another Robert for his grandfather, (?) they probably died before the date of this will. The baptismal names of the above sons were peculiar; only one of them occurring on any Morse will discovered prior to 1650. From the early adoption of surnames until 1563, both upon the continent and in England, the name was invariably spelt Mors, as it still is throughout Germany its birth place, probably in the Count de Mors about" 1200-1300. German immigrants have no doubt carried the name into Russia. The geographical centre of the name in England was the co. of Suffolk, where it was not probably planted until after 1400. and then by a single family, as their peculiar Christian names in 1500-1600 in this and conterminous Counties indicate, and as references to each other in their thirty wills show. The Merses of Wiltshire were undoubtedly a colony from Suffolk, for they cerried with them and transmitted the identical names peculiar to the Morses of Suffolk, and still have the same family arms. These perchance might have been the arms of the Count de Mors of Nassau, Germany, carolled by courtesy at the English Herald Office with c final Added to the name to make it English : for the arms are too simple and the ene blems too ancient to have been conferred no lately as the addission of e to the name, and the family claim for them about 200 years higher autiquity than the appearance of their name in England, g. tig back quite to the age of the German Count. But my correspond ace with benoused Gent, of the race in Europe, and exploration a ancient records in England, are not completed, and more light may just be received to modify my conclusions.

Of the early rank of the name little has been gathered. From the will of Widow Margaret More, probably the great grandess ther or

Vet XIX.

aunt of the Rev. Thomas, made in 1510, it is evident that she owned the Church in which she directed her body to be interred. One, a husbandman, held a life lease of a manor; others had many houses and freehold estates; one owned half of 6 ships, another half of 4, and quite a number were less interested in navigation. One of their ships was probably the famous Speedwell. No mechanics are named in the wills before 1635, except one worsted weaver and three cloth workers. About half were husbandmen, and many bequeathed small sums to the poor of one, two, three, and sometimes twenty parishes. Several ranked as Gentlemen. Nicholas was Gov. of Bengal about 1750, and grandfather of Lord Bixley, Chancellor of the Exchequer. Another married Oliver Cromwell, great grandson of the Protector! But no one is believed to have been knighted in England before Sir Robert, the East India General, about the middle of the last century, who kept and transmitted the ancient arms now held by his grandson, a baronet.

As my working days may not be prolonged to finish an improved edition of my Memorial of the Morses, I beg leave to add that no evidence has reached me of the least connection between Morse and Moss, Morris or Moors, or that any two of them have ever been used in England as convertible names, or in the United States until since 1790. Moss, with the Jews a contraction for Moses, is extremely common throughout the three kingdoms; but Morse has never there been a very common name, and "is now rather seldom to be met with," and the London Directory confirms it. In the United States, the British Provinces and the Eastern Circles of Germany it is very common, and may ere long require weeding out, according to the German custom of compelling the subjects of an embarrassingly common name to choose and take on another,

Mass., President of the Washington Bank, Boston, and former President of the New England Hist, Gen. Society, William grad, at the English High School in Poston, in 1850; was appointed discount clerk in the Washington Bank, at the age of 19.

He was killed April 6, 1865, in a fearful cavalry charge made by three company of his Regiment, on the Rebel cavairy, under Fitz Hugh Lee, at High Bridge near Burkerville, Va., when about every officer of this command was either killed or wounded. The part culars of his death were received in a letter from Hon. Frank B. Fav. of Cheles, who in a letter to his father. writes. "Your son swan engaged in a hand to hand fight with a rebel, and had unhorsed him by his superior use of the calire, when another rebel abot him in the breast with a pistol, and he fell dead."

The following account copied from the Boston Traveller, is correct. " Capt. Hodges had recently been at home on a furlough, and arrived at the head querters of his regiment on the 27th of March. The next morning, at three p'clock, his company moved forward to the front. He was actively engaged during the battles which ended in the evacuation of Richmond, and took part in the pursuit of Let, up to the engagement in which he lost his life. Capt. II. first held a commission as Lieut, in Capt. John L. Swift's company of the 41st Mass, regiment, and he bore an honorable part in the compaigns in Louisiana.

"At Port Hudson, volunteers were called for, as a forlorn hope, to make an assault on the powerful works of the enemy, and he was one among the first to offer his services for the dangerous duty. This was quite in keeping with the character of the decessed, who was a courageous and determined soldier. He was a universal favorite among the eitigens of Roubury, and he possessed in a high degree the confidence of all who knew him. Possessed of fine abilities, with good habits and pleasing rinuners, he seemed to have before him a useful and honorable future."

The 41st Regiment of Infantry, which was recruited in August, 1882, was changed, by an order from the War department after its arrival in Louisiana, to the Third Moseschusetts Coralry, and Lieut. Hodges was promoted in April, 1851, from Lieut of the third to a Captainey in the 4th Massachusetts Cavalry, which he held at the time of his death. Capt. Hodges' remains were brought to Roxbury and placed in Forest Hiller the funeral took place unthe 24th of April.

Adjutant Lathrop, of the 4th Mass. country regiment, thus alludes to the mouner of the death of Capt. Hodges in a letter to a brother of the deceased, dated Richmond, May 5th:

- I saw but hitle of your brother in the fight, for after the first charge we met such overwhelming numbers that it was impossible for one engaged to know what was going on a few yards from hur. I was captured at about the time Col. Washburn fell.

" Up to that moment your brother was unburn and with Livet, Savgent, rallied about twenty men and made the last charge. At the time of his death the Captain was engaged with a robel major, and just as he unharmed him, he was abot through the breast by another rebel officer, and died instantly. I regret very much that the sabre which he used so well in the fight could not be recovered. Every exertion was made to obtain it after Gen. Lee's surrender, but as Rosser with most of his men had escaped it was useless."

LAWRENCE, Phiness, Lexington, June 9. 1854, a. 59 yrs., 3 mes., 21 fevs, being born in Waltham Fob. 19, 1776; a respectable farnier, and for several years a representative from Lexington to the Legislature.

Lestuz, Mrs. Hannah, Whatel & Franklin Co., Masa. : May 12, 1864, a. 101 years, 4 months, 12 days; at the resideace of her son, Samuel Lesure. Esq. Her maiden name was Cummings, and she was formerly from Unbridge, Mass. During her long life she was never ill enough from any disease to require the advice of a physician. Her husband, Mr. Samuel Lesure, was a saldies of the Revolution, and received in battle a musket ball in his grain, which he carried to his grave. They moved from Leverett to Warwick in 1805. and he died at W. in 1825.

LINCOLN, Nathaniel, North Windham, Conn., Dec. 27, 1864. Mr. Lincoln was bern on the 1st day of February, 1771. and had nearly completed his Dith vens .. He was born in the North Windham district, as was his father and grandfather before him, where ther all lived and died. He was the only sen and child of the late Captain Nathaniel Lincoln, who attained the greatest age of any man ever born in Windham, being, at his death, 105 years, 3 months and 18 days old. Smauel Lincoln, the 2d, of Windham, the father of Nathamel. .ca. reached the age of 101 years, lacking 2 days, or if we allow for old style, 12 days, though his gravestone says "in ye 102 year of his are?" Samuel, 2d. above named, was ron of Samuel the dat, who settled in Windham in 1635. the Jame year that Samuel, 2d was born. The united ages of Samuel, 24 Nathenick wer, and Nathaniel Lencola, Ir., are according to our rethounce allowing for difference in style, 300 years, 2 months and I dove, being an average of over 100 years each in three salvesalve generations. 

county of Buckingham, 3 miles (8.) from Fenny-Stratford; containing 407 inhabitants. It is situated near the London and Birmingham railway, and comprises by admeasurement 1523 acres, nearly equally divided between arable and pasture. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's books at £19. 9. $4\frac{1}{2}$; net income, £249; patron, the Bishop of Lincoln. The tithes were commuted for land and a money payment in 1774. There is a place of worship for Wesleyans.

STOKE-HILL, a hamlet, in the parish of STOKE ST. MARY, union of Taunton, hundred of Taunton and Taunton-Dean, W. division of Somerset; contain-

ing 80 inhabitants.

STOKE LACY (St. Peter and St. Paul), a parish, in the union of BROMYARD, hundred of BROMASH, county of HEREFORD, 4 miles (S. W. by S.) from Bromyard; containing 413 inhabitants. The parish is situated on the road from Bromyard to Hereford, and comprises 1992a. 1r. 8p., of which nearly half are arable, and the remainder meadow and pasture, with the exception of 64 acres of hop-grounds. The surface is hilly, and the subsoil a strong clay; stone of excellent quality is quarried for building, and limestone is extensively used for agricultural purposes. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's books at £8, and in the gift of John Kempson, Esq.: the tithes have been commuted for £315, 12.; there is a glebe-house, and the glebe contains about 20 acres. The body of the church is dilapidated, but the chancel has lately been rebuilt by the incumbent, and is considered one of the finest specimens in the county of the early Euglish style. There is a place of worship for Wesleyans.

STOKE-LANE (St. MICHAEL), a parish, in the union of Shepton-Mallet, hundred of Whitestone, E. division of Somenser, 4 miles (N. E.) from Shepton-Mallet; containing 1056 inhabitants. The parish is situated about a mile north of the road from Wells to Frome, and comprises 2074 acres, of which about 256 are arable, 1607 meadow and pasture, and 165 woods and plantations. The soil in general is shallow and damp; that portion of it lying on the north side of the Mendip Hills rests upon a layer of red gravel, and in the other parts there is a substratum of limestone and firestone. The living is a perpetual curacy; net income, £60; patron, the Vicar of Doulting; impropriator, Richard Strachey, Esq. : the great tithes have been commuted for £75, and the vicarial for a like sum. The church, rebuilt in the early English style in 1838, contains 500 sittings, of which 256 are free.

STOKE, LIMPLEY, with WINSLEY, a chapelry, in the parish of GREAT BRADFORD, union and hundred of BRADFORD, Westbury and N. divisions, and Trowbridge and Bradford subdivisions, of WILTS, 3 miles (W. by S.) from Bradford; containing 2646 inhabitants, of whom 377 are in Limpley-Stoke. The chapel is dedicated to

St. Mary.

STOKE-LYNE (St. Peter), a parish, in the union of Bicester, hundred of Ploughley, county of Oxford, $4\frac{1}{4}$ miles (N. by W.) from Bicester; containing, with the hamlets of Bainton and Fewcott, 601 inhabitants, of whom 347 are in Stoke-Lyne township. The living is a discharged vicarage; net income, £173; patrons, the Trustees of J. Bullock, Esq.; impropriators, the family of Coles. 'The tithes were commuted for land and a money payment in 1793.

STOKE-MANDEVILLE (St. Mans), a parish, in the union of Wycomne, hundred of Aylesbury, county of Buckingham, $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles. (N. W. by W.) from Wendover; containing, with the hamlet of Prestwood, 493 inhabitants. The living is annexed, with those of Buckland and Quarrendon, to the vicarage of Bierton. There is a national school.

STOKE-NEAR-NAYLAND (St. Many), a parish, in the union of Suducry, hundred of Babergh, W. division of Suffolk, 2 miles (N. E. by N.) from Nayland; containing 1362 inhabitants. A monastery existed here in the middle of the 10th century, to which Earl Alfgar, and his daughters, Æthelfied and Ægelfied, made considerable donations, it being the burial-place of that noble family. In the parish is Gifford Hall, an ancient structure, with a fine entrance gateway, built in the early part of the reign of Henry VIII.; and Tendring Hall, the seat of Sir J. R. Rowley, Bart., was formerly the residence of the dukes of Norfolk, where the Earl of Surrey wrote his poems. The living is a vicarage, valued in the king's books at £19. 0. 10., and in the gift of Sir J. R. Rowley: the great tithes, belonging to P. Mannock, Esq., have been commuted for £1254, and the vicarial for £305. The church is a spacious structure in the later English style, with a finely-proportioned tower, and contains numerous monuments and some ancient brasses. A chapel for the inhabitants of Leavenheath has lately been erected by subscription, and is endowed with three acres of land, and £1100 in the funds. There is a Roman Catholic chapel. Sir John Capel, lord mayor of London in 1503, was a native of the place; and the Rev. William Jones, the well-known author, was vicar.

STOKE-NEXT-GUILDFORD (St. John the Evan-GELIST), a parish, in the union of Guildford, First division of the hundred of Wokeing, W. division of Surrey, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile (N.) from Guildford; containing 2054 inhabitants. The parish comprises 2314 acres, of which 88 are common or waste; it is intersected by the Wey canal, and situated on the road by Kingston to Portsmouth; part of it is included within the limits of the borough of Guildford. There are a paper and a flour mill. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's books at £18. 0. 5., and in the gift of certain Trustees: the tithes have been commuted for £679. The church is in the later English style, and contains several neat monuments. James Price bequeathed Bank annuities to the poor, producing a dividend of £96; and three almshouses for six women above 60 years of age, were founded and endowed by Henry and William Parsons, Esqrs. Mrs. Charlotte Smith, the celebrated novelist,

was buried here.

STOKE, NORTH, a township, in the parish of SOUTH STOKE, union of GRANTHAM, wapentake of Winnibrigs and Threo, parts of Kesteven, county of Lincoln, $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles (N. by W.) from Colsterworth; containing 118 inhabitants. It comprises 1834a. 27p. of land, the property of Christopher Turnor, Esq., M.P., whose fine seat and park here greatly enhance the beauty of the scenery. The tithes were commuted in 1796, for land and corn-rents.

STOKE, NORTH (Sr. Marr), a parish, in the union of Wallingford, hundred of Language, county of Oxford, 2 miles (S.) from Wallingford; containing 160 inhabitants, and comprising 800 acres by computation.

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assumed the cowl at Laon, in France. Henry III. granted to the society the privilege of holding a weekly market, and the abbot was summoned to parliament in the reign of Edward I. Edward II. resided at the abbey during the siege of Leeds Castle, at which time he signed a charter for the citizens of London. At the Dissolution the revenue was estimated at £218, 19, 10.; and the site, with a portion of the estates, was granted to Sir Thomas Wyatt, the poet. The abbey contained a celebrated rood, which, together with the image of St. Rumbald, was taken away, and publicly destroyed at St. Paul's Cross, in 1538: there are still some remains of the buildings. The parish is noted for the manufacture of paper of a superior quality. The living is a vicarage, valued in the king's books at £12. 19. 2.; net income, £834; patrons and appropriators, Dean and Chapter of Rochester. The church is a neat small edifice, with a handsome square tower. A national school was established in 1832, and a school for 20 girls is chiefly supported by Mr. and Mrs. Whatman. An extensive rabbit-warren, part of the possessions of the abbey, lies beneath the chalk hill; and there was another near Penenden Heath (about half of which is in this parish), but it has been brought into cultivation. A small stream that rises just below the church, and runs through the village, is stated to petrify wood with an incrustation resembling brown unpolished marble.

BOXTED (St. Many), a parish, in the union of LEXDEN and WINSTREE, Colchester division of the hundred of Lexben, N. division of Essex, 5 miles (N.) from Colchester; containing 856 inhabitants. It comprises 3082 acres, of which 2432 are arable, 576 meadow, and 74 woodland, and is bordered on the north by the navigable river Stour. The living is a discharged vicarage, valued in the king's books at £7. 13. 9.; patron, Bishop of London; impropriator, J. Josselyn, Esq. The great tithes have been commuted for a rent-charge of £520, and the vicarial for one of £220; the glebe belonging to the impropriator comprises more than 61 acres; the vicar's, not quite four. The church is an ancient edifice with a tower, and has been repewed within the last few years; it contains an elegant monument to Sir Richard Blackmore, physician to William III., and author of several medical and other works. A school is supported by voluntary contributions.

BOXTED, a parish, in the union of Sudnury, hundred of BABERGH, W. division of Suffolk, 54 miles (N. E.) from Clare; containing 200 inhabitants. This place has long been the residence of the Poley family, whose descendant, the Rev. G. W. Poley, is the present proprietor; the family mansion is a spacious and ancient edifice. The living is a rectory not in charge, consolidated with that of Hartest: the tithes have been commuted for a rent-charge of £375. 10. The church is a small edifice, adjoining the chancel of which is a family vault of the Poleys, containing some monuments of very delicate sculpture, in marble. There is a charity, amounting to about £10 per annum, with an equal amount for the poor of the parish of Hartest.

BOXWELL (St. ANDREW), a parish, in the union of Tethury, Upper division of the hundred of Grum-BALD'S ASH, W. division of the county of GLOUCESTER, 5 miles (E. by S.) from Wotton-under-Edge; 6 miles (W.) from Tetbury; containing, with Leighterton, 334

inhabitants. This place derives its name from a plantation of box-trees, one of the most considerable in the kingdom, and from a copious spring of water that issues from it. A numery was established at a very early period, which is said to have been destroyed by the Danes, and of which the possessions were subsequently annexed to the abbey of Gloucester. Charles II. rested at the ancient manor-house on his route from Boscobel to Bristol; and Prince Rupert, when governor of that city, made it a place of frequent resort. The parish comprises 2243 acres, of which 30 are box-wood, 100 woodland, about 300 pasture, and the remainder arable: it is situated on the road from Cheltenham to Bath; the soil is fertile, and there are some good quarries of oolite freestone. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's books at £23. 4. 9\frac{1}{2}.; patron and incumbent, Rev. R. W. Huntley: the tithes, including those of Leighterton, have been commuted for a rent-charge of £375, and there are 68 acres of glebe. The church is a very ancient structure, with a tower and campanile turret. There is a chapel of ease at Leighterton; and a parochial school is supported by the Huntley family. In a field at Leighterton is a large barrow.

BOXWORTH (St. PETER), a parish, in the union of St. Ives, hundred of Papworth, county of Cambridge, 61 miles (N. E. by N.) from Caxton; containing 326 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's hooks at £18, 12, $3\frac{1}{2}$, and in the patronage of George Thornhill, Esq.: the tithes have been commuted for a rent-charge of £490, and the glebe comprises 126 acres. The church contains a monumental bust of Dr. Saunderson, F.R.S., the blind professor of mathematics at the University of Cambridge; he died and was buried here, in 1759. A school is supported by the lord of the

manor, the rector, and the curate.

BOYATT, a tything, in the parish of OTTERBOURNE, union of Hursley, hundred of Buddlesgate, Winchester and N. divisions of the county of Southampton; containing 160 inhabitants.

BOYCUTT, a hamlet, in the parish of STOWE, union of BUCKINGHAM, hundred of PLOUGHLEY, county of Oxford, though locally in the hundred and county of BUCKINGHAM, 3 miles (N. W. by W.) from Buckingham;

containing 35 inhabitants.

BOYLSTONE (St. John the Bartist), a parish, in the union of UTTOXETER, hundred of APPLETREE, S. division of the county of Derby, 71 miles (S.) from Ashbourn; containing 343 inhabitants. The living is a discharged rectory, valued in the king's books at £6. 0. 2.; net income, £260; patron and incumbent, Rev. W. Hurst. An allotment of land and money payments were assigned in 1783, in lieu of tithes.

There is a place of worship for Wesleyans.

BOYNTON (St. Andrew), a parish, in the union of BRIDLINGTON, wapentake of DICKERING, E. riding of YORK, 2 miles (W. by N.) from Bridlington; containing 100 inhabitants. It is on the road from Bridlington to Malton, and comprises by computation 2100 acres, the property of Sir George Strickland, Bart., whose family were anciently scated at Strickland, in the county of Westmorland, but the principal branch of which has been settled here more than two centuries. Boynton Hall, the residence of the baronet, is a lofty and handsome mansion, beautifully situated upon an eminence in a richly wooded park, on the acclivities of which are

which last is a cheese fair. The town is under the government of a mayor, or bailiff, a constable, and two headboroughs, chosen at the annual court lect of the lord of the manor: the Bond, or Bound, is under that of a constable and three headboroughs. There is also a town-master, chosen at the church on the Tuesday in Easter-week, who is empowered, in conjunction with his predecessor in the office, to audit annually the accounts of the trustees of the Feoffment. The town-hall was rebuilt in 1803, by means of funds arising from what is called the Feoffment benefaction; and a bridewell was erected in 1768.

The LIVING is a vicarage, valued in the king's books at £9. 9. 912.; net income, £338; patrons and appropriators, Dean and Chapter of Westminster. The church is a spacious edifice, erected chiefly in the thirtcenth century, with a tower and finely-proportioned spire, the latter built in 1788; it has been enlarged by the addition of 340 free sittings, the Incorporated Society having granted £200 in aid of the expense. Of the several chapels of ease which formerly belonged to the church, only that of Dadlington remains. There are places of worship for General Baptists, the Society of Friends, Independents, Wesleyans, and Unitarians, and a Roman Catholic chapel. On the invasion of Belgium by the French, in 1794, the English Dominicans of Bornhern, near Antwerp, took refuge in England, and after remaining for some time at Carshalton, in Surrey, settled at Hinckley, where they have built a neat chapel, and founded a small school. A national school is supported from the funds belonging to the Feofiment benefaction, and an infants' school by subscription. In addition to these large funds, is a bequest of Ralph Chesser, Esq., in 1826, producing £74 per annum, to be distributed to the poor. The union of Hinckley comprises 11 parishes or places, of which 9 are in the county of Leicester, and 2 in that of Warwick; and contains a population of 15,589. At a short distance from Hinckley, on the road to Lutterworth, is a spring called Holy Well; and in the neighbourhood are good mineral waters, at Cogg's Well, Christopher's Spa, and the Priest Hills.

HINDERCLAY (St. Many), a parish, in the union of Stow, hundred of Blackhourn, W. division of Suffolk, 2 miles (N. W. by W.) from Botesdale; containing 357 inhabitants. The parish is bounded on the north by the smaller river Ouse, which separates it from the county of Norfolk; and comprises by computation about 1300 acres. The living is a discharged rectory, valued in the king's books at £9. 19. 4½; net income, £408; patron, G. St. Vincent Wilson, Esq. The church is a handsome structure, in the later English style, with a square embattled tower.

HINDERWELL (St. HILDA), a parish, in the union of Whitby, E. division of the liberty of Langbaurgh, N. riding of York, 10 miles (N. W. by W.) from Whitby; including the chapelry of Roxby, and containing 1970 inhabitants, of whom 1771 are in the township of Hinderwell. This place, which derives its name, anciently Hilderwell, from a spring of pure water in the churchyard, dedicated to St. Hilda, who is said to have had a retreat near the spot, was granted by William the Conqueror to the Percys, and afterwards became the property of the powerful family of Thweng, who retained possession of it till the reign of Richard II., since which time it has successively belonged to the Lumley, Shef-

the Marquess of Normanby, who is lord of the manor. In 1603, the plague was communicated to the village by a Turkish vessel wrecked upon this part of the coast. and raged here for six weeks, carrying off many of the inhabitants. The parish, which forms part of the district of Cleveland, is of considerable extent, and is bounded on the north and north-east by the sea; the soil is chiefly clay with a mixture of gravel, and clayey loam, producing favourable crops, and the surface is diversified by craggy hills and precipitous acclivities, and much beautiful woodland scenery. Stone for building is quarried in abundance, and jet of fine quality is found on the coast: there is a woollen manufactory on a small scale. The village stands on gently rising ground, about a mile from the sea; and within the limits of the parish, are also the villages of Runswick and Staithes, both on the sea-shore; the village of Runswick, to the east of Hinderwell, has a strikingly picturesque appearance, and that of Staithes is romantically situated on a narrow creek between two cliffs. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's books at £15; net income, £610; patron, Robert Barry, Esq. The church, rebuilt by the parishioners, in 1817, at a cost of £600, is a plain neat structure, with a tower; and at Roxby is a small chapel of ease. There are places of worship in the village of Staithes for Calvinists, Wesleyan Methodists, and Ranters. Two schools are supported in connexion with the Church. The Rev. Nicholas Howlet bequeathed 40s., and the Rev. William Smith, late rector, £2. 15. 2., per annum, to the poor of the parish. HINDLETHWAITE, a small hamlet, in the town-

HINDLETHWAITE, a small hamlet, in the township of Carlton-Highdale, parish of Coverham, union of Leyburn, wapentake of Hang-West, N. riding of York, 7 miles (S. W.) from Middleham. At this place, of which Mr. Dearden is lord of the manor, the monks of Coverham had land producing a rent of £3. 6. 8.; and near it is Arundal House or Grange, also one of their possessions, and then valued at £3 yearly, but now only an ordinary farm-house.

HINDLEY, a chapelry, in the parish and union of WIGAN, hundred of WEST DERBY, S. division of the county of LANCASTER, 21 miles (E. S. E.) from Wigan; containing 5459 inhabitants. It comprises 2527 acres, of which 169 are arable, and 2358 pasture. The living is a perpetual curacy; net income, £148; patron, Rector of Wigan. The chapel was creeted in 1651. The tithes have been commuted for £298. 11. There are places of worship for Independents and Unitarians, and a Roman Catholic chapel; also a schoolroom, built in 1632, by Mrs. Mary Abram. Here is a rare phenomenon, called "The Burning Well," which attracts many visiters; it is similar to that at Petoa Mela, near Fierenzota, in Italy, except that the flame of the Italian spring is perpetual, in the absence of heavy rain, and consists of sulphuric gas; while the inflammable principle of that at Hindley is the decomposition of water acting upon ores and sulphate of iron.

HINDOLVESTON (Sr. George), a parish, in the union of Aylsham, hundred of Eynsford, E. division of Norfolk, 12 miles (N. E.) from East Dereham; containing 839 inhabitants. It comprises 2490a. 2p., of which 1590 acres are arable, 511 meadow and pasture, and about 5 woodland. The living is a discharged vicarage, valued in the king's books at £6. 1.; net in-

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Charles II., Jonathan Backleigh, Esq., built an aballlarise for eight widows, and endowed it with the great titles of the parish of St. Wenn, now let for 2150 per annual and Mr. Rushleigh has lately built another alreadouse for the rune unmove of valows. The cast blated massion of Place-house, on an eminence near the church, anciently the residence of the Treffry family, is a curious role of early domestic architecture; and an oriel, projecting from the south rule of it, is very richly ornamized with tracery. The roles of the block-houses erected for the defence of the harbour, by command of Edward IV., are also still to be seen.

FOWNHOPE (Nr. Mass), a parish, in the hundred of Greyrage, union and county of Herryone, 6 miles (8, E.) from Hereford ; containing, with the chapelry of Fawley, 1004 inhabituats. The parish comprises by computation 5700 acres, of which scarly 1000 are conpice wood; the surface is varied and picturesque, and from the summit of Capler half, which is finely wooded. the prospects are rich and extensive. There are quarries of corolline limestone used for burning, and of sandstone of good quality for building. The village is plensantly situated on the eastern bank of the Wye, the road from Hereford to Newcut passing through it. Petty-sessions for the division are held every fourth Monday. The living is a viceence, valued in the king's books at £6, 9, 94., and embra-d with one-third of the rectorial titles; patrons and appropriators, the Dean and Chapter of Hereford. The appropriate titles have been commuted for £,150, and the vicarial for £160, and there are about 70 seres of globe, of which one-half belarge to the rectory, and the other half to the vicarage. The church, a large and well-built edilice, exhibits traces of the Noziana, early English, and decorated styles; a Norman tower supports a more recent shangled spire of considerable elevation. There is a charel of case at Fawley. Two schools are supported by subscription: and a school has been established by the trustees of Edward God, Esq., who, in 1913, requesthed funds for that purpose. About half a mile to the north of the village is an eminence crowned by an ancient camp; and at some distance, on Capler hill, is a second camp, double trenched, and called Woldbury.

FOXCOTE, a chapelry, in the parish, union, and hundred of Annover, Andover and N. divisions of the county of Southampton, 2 miles (N. W.) from Andover;

containing 72 inhabitants.—See Annoven.

FONCOTT, or Foscott (St. Leonard), a parish, in the union, hundred, and county of Buckingham, 2 miles (N. E.) from Buckingham; containing 119 inhabitants. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's books at £9. 9. 4½, and in the gift of the Duke of Buckingham; the tithes have been commuted for £165, and the glebe comprises 28 acres.

FOXEARTH, a parish, in the union of Supremy, hundred of Hindarond, N. division of Essex, 3½ miles (N. W.) from Sudbury; containing 474 inhabitants. It is partly bounded by the river Stour, and comprises by admeasurement 1473 acrez, of which 1275 are arable, 166½ pasture, and 31½ wordland. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's books at £10, 4, 4½, and in the gift and incumbency of the Rev. J. Pemberton, whose tithes have been computed for £435, and whose glebe comprises 23 series—tithes inlenging to the trustees of the Guildhall charity in Bury St. Edmund's have

been commuted for £68, 16. The church is an ancient edifice, with a square embattled tower. A school is partly supported by subscription.

FONHALL (An. Survey), a parish, in the minim of Weammanner, bundred of Cvencone, E. division of Surrous, 44 miles (E. by 8.) from Ipswich; containing 200 inhabitants, and comprising by computation 2000 acres. The living is a perpetual curvey, annexed to that of Brightwell; the church is in ruins.

FOXHAM, a chapelry, in the parish of BRESHILLS, union of Carre, hundred of Chippenham, Chippenham and Calne, and N. divisions of Witts, 5 miles (N. E. by L.) from Chippenham. The chapel is dedicated to St. John the Baptist.

FOXHOLES, a parish, in the union of "harriero, unpentalse of Diekening, E, riding of You a containing, with the chanciry of Butterwick, 349 inhabitants, of whom 249 are in the township of Foxholes with Boythorp, 7 miles (N. E. by N.) from Sledmere. The parish comprises by computation 4210 acres, of which 2610 are in the township; the lower grounds are watered by several brooks, and the curious stream called the Gypsies terminates its course here. The village, which has a next appearance, is scoted in a valley. The living is a rectory, valued in the king's backs at £22, and in the patronage of R. Sykes, Esq., with a net income of £531. The church is an ancient structure, consisting of a mare and changel, separated by a fine Norman arch, There is a place of worship for Wesleyans; and a school is partly supported by subscription.

FORLEY (St. Thogas), a parish, is the union of Mirrono and Lauxburgen, hundred of Eyssroup, E. die som of Nouvolk, 34 miles (E.) from North Elachism of Contaming 253 inhabitants. This parish, which is intersected by the road from Norwich to Fakenham, comprises by admeasurement 1620 acres, whereof 1193 are arable, 226 mendow and pasture, and 291 woodlands the village is pleasantly situated on an entinence. The living is a discharged rectory, valued in the king's books at £6, 13, 4., and in the gift of E. Lombe, Esq., the tithes have been commuted for £403, and the glebe contains 21½ acres, with a handsome parsonage-house, erected in 1842. The church is chiefly in the early and later English styles, with a square embattled tower crowned by pinnacles.

FOXLEY, a parish, in the union and hundred of Malmeshury. Malmeshury and Kingswood, and N. divisions of Will's, 2½ miles (W. S. W.) from Malmeshury; containing 70 inhabitants. It is bounded on the north by a branch of the river Avon, and comprises about 760 acres; the surface is flat, and the soil of inferior quality, chiefly stone brash. The living is a discharged rectory, valued in the king's books at £3. 17, 8½, and in the gift of Lord Holland; the tithes have been commuted for £147, and the globe comprises 94 acres. There are some slight traces of a Roman station in the parish, at the spot where the Avon crosses the Roman Fosse-way.

William Glover of Dedham, co. Essex, clothier, in his will, dated 26 Jan. 1608/9, bequeathed 40s. to Joseph Morse of Deliham and 20s. to the Widow Morse, in the Valley. John Anger of Dedham, clothier, in his will, dated 19 Jan. 1623/4, bequeathed 20s. to Joseph Morse the Elder. John Pye of Deliham, clothier, in his will, dated 8 Nov. 1624, made a gif to Joseph Morse, Sr., of Dedham. Ann Anger, in her will, dated 2 Sept. 1625 and proved at Colchester, co. Essex, 16 Dep. 1625, mentioned Joseph Morse. Judith Morris of Dedham, widow, in her will, dated 25 Jan. 1645/6, bequeathed 20st to "Joseph Morse in New England," "if he be living;" and, "if he be dead," to "William Stone in New England."

The exact time of Joseph Morse's emigration to New England is unknown; but he was a proprietor of Ipswich in 1637. His son Joseph and perhaps also his son John had gone to New England before him. In his will, dated 24 Apr. and

"In his list of children of Samuel Morse (6), published in the Memorial of the Morses, in 1860, ley. Abner Morse did not include Thomas, Elisaboth, and Sars — these two daughters, of course, iid not appear in New England records; but he sadaned to the immigrant a daughter Abigail and son Jeremiah, who were not his children, although he had grandchildren bearing those names, le also gave to the immigrant a sun Samuel, who, he said, married Mary Bullen and died "at the Latward," 24 Sept. 1838. ADDENDUM

THE JASPER FAMILY OF REDGRAVE, CO. SUFFOLK

From entries in the parish registers of Redgrave, co. Suffolk, and from the will of Lancelot Jasper, printed in the previous instalment of this article, the following facts in regard to Lancelot Jasper, the father-in-law of Samuel Morse of New England, and his family have been derived.

LANCELOT JASPER, of Redgrave, co. Suffolk, husbandman, born probably about 1550, was buried at Redgrave 2 [sic, ? 22] Feb. 1616/17. He married Rose——, who survived him, and, as Rose Jasper, widow, was buried at Redgrave 3 Sept. 1625.

In his will, dated 17 Feb. 1616/17 and proved at Bury St. Edmunds, co. Suffolk, 3 Mar. 1616/17, he names his wife Rose, his son William, with William's wife Francis [sic] and their children

*Govers (Genealogical Dictionery) exzigns to him a wife Dinah and gives the year of his death as 1807. In the Morse Genealogy (part 1, 1903) his wife's name is given as Ellisabeth, and his son John is said to have married at Woburn, Macs., 5 Mar. 1886 [1886/7], Dinah Rnight, daughter of John and Hannah Knight,

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Morse, Mary Bullin, and Ann Morse, the widow of his son Joseph, "who with my said children shall have an equal portion upon a just division with them for the childrens sake of my beloved Joseph. Therefore my will is that the above named Ann . . . shall make an equall distribution of all that portion upon division unto every child of my sonne Joseph when they & every one of them shall grow up to the age of one & twenty years." He made his wife Elizabeth the executrix of the will. (Cf. abstract of this will in REGISTER, vol. 5, p. 299, and the full text in the Morse Genealogy, by J. Howard Morse and Emily W. Leavitt, part 1, 1903.) The inventory of the estate of Samuel Morse of Medfield, taken 5 Dec. 1654, was accepted at a County Court held in Boston, 30 Jan. 1654/5, and showed a valuation of £124. 7s. (REGIS-TER, vol. 9, p. 141.)

Children: THOMAS (probably son of Samuel), of Dedham, Mass. He was proposed for membership in the church at Dedham at its formation in 1638, was admitted to the church 28 June 1640, and probably d. s.p. soon afterwards, as no further record of him has been found.

ELIZABETH, bapt. at Redgrave, co. Suffolk, 6 Mar. 1605/6; probably m. ____ DANIEL, and d., leaving a daughter, Blimbeth, b. about 1633, who was probably the Elizabeth Daniel, aged 2 years, who was taken to New England in 1635 by Samuel Morse and his wife.

- John, of Dedham and Boston, Mass., tailor, bapt. at Redgrave, co. Suffolk, 28 Feb. 1607/8; d., probably in Boston, 26 May 1657; m. about 1636 Annas Chickening, who survived him and d. in 1691. Whether he came to New England before or after his father is uncertain; but he was admitted freeman 13 May 1640. He moved from Dedham to Boston in 1654, and on 18 Dec. 1655, "now undertakeing a voyage for England," made his will, in which he named his wife Annas and his eight living children and made his wife and her brother, Francis Chickering, executors. Francis Chickering, however, renounced the executorship 18 June 1657. The inventory of the estate of John Morse, tailor, of Boston, deceased, dated 9 June 1657, amounted to £385. 9s. 5d. (Cf. abstract of the will in REGISTER, vol. 8, p. 278, and text in the Morse Genealogy, part 1, 1903.)

Joseph Morse came to New England with his father and mother in the Increase in 1035, aged, according to the shipping lists, 20 years. His uncle, James Morse of Barham, co. Suffolk, in his will dated 2 Sept. 1638, bequeathed to him 40s., describing him so "my cousin Joseph Morse." In New England he lived first at Watertown, seed hiere. In New England he lived hist at Watertown, and then was, with his brother Daniel, among the first to whom land was allotted in Dedham, in 1638. He moved to Dedham in 1637. In 1649 he was one of the proprietors of that part of Dedham which was set off in 1651 as the town of Medheld, and he settled there, with his father. At his death, however, he was of Dorchester, being so described in the "inventory of yt pie of the Estate with he had at Meadfield," which was taken 20 June 1654 and amounted to £183. (Cf. REGISTER, vol. 8, p. 277.) His father, in his will dated 2 Dec. 1664, refers to him as deceased. On 18 Oct. 1061 Thomas Boyden, "Inte of Boston, now of mead-feld, eo. Suffolk, in New England, yeoman," gave a bond of £300, "together with the house, upland & meadow now in my possession, lately the Inheritance of Joseph Morre, late of Meadfeild," to comme the suitable maintenance and bringing up of the "severall children of ye late Joseph Moree & Hannah his [Boyden's] now wife during the time of theire Nonage or Unmarried Condicon, or till they choose theire Guardians," and the payment to them "at theire severall marriages or days of Age" of "the severall portions to them Assigned by the County Court at Boston In January last." (REGISTER, vol. 30, p. 433.) Children:

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Daniel (an earlier brother Daniel having died young, it is supposed), an own sister named Sara, and five half brothers, Joseph, Jeremiah, James, Nathaniel, and Philip. His seven brothers and his sister were named, with Samuel himself, in the will of their father, dated 10 Nov. 1596. Of these names, John, Daniel, Joseph, and Sara were given to children of Samuel and Elizabeth Morse of New England, and they had one grandson named Jeremiah and two grandsons named Nathaniel. Two others of their eight known children were named respectively Thomas (if the Thomas Morse who was in Dedham, Mass., in 1640 was a son of Samuel) and Elizabeth, Thomas bearing the name, presumably, of his father's father and Elizabeth the name of her mother. The remaining children were Mary and Samuel. Moreover, Samuel, son of Rev. Thomas Morse, was living (or was believed to be living) on 2 Sept. 1638, when his half brother, James Morse of Barham, co. Suffolk, named him in his will, together with his (the testator's) own brothers, Joseph, Nathaniel, and Philip, the child of his half brother Daniel Morse, probably then deceased, and his half brother, Mr. John Morse of "Rumforde." The testator's own brother Jeremiah is the only one of the brothers who was not mentioned in the will - for what reason is not known, as he was then living. James Morse also left a legacy to his "cousin," that is, his nephew, Joseph Morse, undoubtedly the son of Samuel. The testator does not, however, state where his brother Samuel and his "cousin" Joseph were then living. Furthermore, the Samuel Morse who embarked in the Increase in 1635 had a wife Elizabeth, whose age was given as 48 years. Now the parish registers of Redgrave, co. Suffolk, record the marriage of Samuel Morse and Elizabeth Jasper on 29 June 1602 and that of Joseph Morse and Ann Jasper on 29 Oct. 1605; and they show also that these two brides were daughters of Lancelot Jasper and that Elizabeth was baptized at Redgrave 30 Jan. 1579/80. Lancelot Jasper, in his will, dated 17 Feb. 1616/17, mentions his daughters Elizabeth Morse and Annes Morse. That the Samuel Morse and Joseph Morse who married these two sisters at Redgrave were the sons of Rev. Thomas Morse appears extremely likely, when the geographical situation of some of the Suffolk and Essex parishes mentioned in this article is studied. Stoke-by-Nayland, the home of the probable father and grandfather of Rev. Thomas Morse, is in southern Suffolk, only two miles north from Nayland, which is on the River Stour, that separates Suffolk from Essex. Boxted, where Rev. Thomas Morse was vicar from 1573 to 1578 and where he apparently continued to live for some five years more, his fifth child having been baptized there in 1583, was only a mile or two southeast from Nayland, on the Essex side of the Stour, and Dedham, also in Essex, was a few miles farther down the river. In 1583 Rev. Thomas Morse became rector of Hinderclay, a parish in northern Suffolk, about

thirteen miles northeast from Bury St. Edmunds and very near Redgrave, on the Norfolk border. A short distance casterly from Redgrave was Palgrave, where Joseph Morse, a son of Rev. Thomas Morse, settled. Samuel Morse, therefore, must have been taken by his father to Hinderclay when he was only seven years old, and probably remained there at least until he was seventeen or eighteen years of age, for his father did not leave Hinderelay and become rector of Foxearth in Emer until about 1594. Prosumably Samuel became acquainted with the neighboring parish of Redgrave while his father was rector of Hinderclay, and in 1602 married a Redgrave young woman, his brother Joseph marrying a sister of Samuel's wife some three years later. Certainly this Samuel Morse, the son of Rev. Thomas Morse, is much more likely-to be the man who married Elizabeth Jasper of Redgrave than either of the other two Samuels who have been considered, the first belonging to Stratford St. Mary, on the extreme southern border of Buffolk, and the second having been baptised at Dedham in Essex, in 1587 and being therefore too young to have married in 1602. Elizabeth (Jasper) Morse, to be sure, would have been 55 years of age when the Increase sailed, instead of 48, as recorded in the shipping list; but this discrepancy may be disregarded, as already explained, in the face of the other evidence. It may be added that Samuel Morac's son Joseph, whose age is given in the shipping list of the Increase as 20 years, was baptized at Redgrave 2 May 1613 and was therefore about 22 years old in the spring of 1635, an age that corresponds better with the age in the shipping list than do the ages of his father and mother.

On his arrival in New England Bamuel Morse went first to Watertown, Mass., where he was admitted to the church and where his son Daniel, who had crossed the Atlantic before his father, had already settled. Daniel Morse and his second cousin, Joseph Morse (7, i), had been admitted as freemen at Watertown on 6 May 1635. Samuel Morse remained only A short time in Watertown. In 1636 he was a proprietor of Declar, where he was prominent in the early settlement of the town, a member of the First Church there at its organization, a freeman 8 Oct. 1640, and a town officer. His last days were spent at Medfield, Mass., which had been set off from Dedham in 1651 and was the home of his daughter Mary, the wife of Dea. Samuel Bullen. The son of a minister of the Church of England, Samuel Morse was a man of fair education and of considerable importance in the Massachuset to communities in which he lived. Among his numerous descendants were several ministers, graduates of Harvard.

In his will, dated 2 Dec. 1654, Samuel Morse bequeathed all his estate, whether moveable or immoveable, to his wife, Elizabeth Morse, for life, and directed that after her decease it should be divided amongst his children, John Morse, Daniel Medfield, Mass., husbandman, baptized at Boxted, co. Essex, 12 June 1576, when his father was rector of that parish, died at Medfield, Mass., 5 Dec. 1654 (Medfield Vital Records). He married at Redgrave, co. Suffolk, 29 June 1602, as will be shown below, ELIZABETH JASPER, baptized at Redgrave 30 Jan. 1579/80, died at Medfield, Mass., 20 June 1655, daughter of Lancelot Jasper of Redgrave, husbandman, and younger sister of the Ann Jasper who married at Redgrave, 29 Oct. 1605, Joseph Morse, brother of Samuel Morse.

Children of Samuel Morse are recorded at Redgrave from 1605/6 to 1613 and at Burgate from 1616 to 1626, and he may have lived at times elsewhere in England, as the records of the baptisms of some of his children have not been found. On 7 July 1626 his wife, Elizabeth Morse, witnessed the will of Anne Copping of Burgate. On 2 Sept. 1638 his half brother, James Morse of Barham, co. Suffolk, bequeathed to him £10, without indicating, however, where he (Samuel) was then

living.

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On 15 Apr. 1635, as has been stated in the first paragraph of this article (supra, p. 70), a Samuel Morse, husbandman, aged 50 years, with Elizabeth Morse, his wife, aged 48 years, Joseph Morse [without doubt their son], aged 20 years, and Elizabeth Daniell [probably their granddaughter], aged 2 years, embarked on the ship Increase, bound from London for New England.† The chief reasons for believing that this passenger, Samuel Morse, was the Samuel who was a son of Rev.

Thomas Morse (4) are as follows.

The records published in the first instalment of this article disclose three Samuel Morses who should be considered in any attempt to identify the Samuel Morse who emigrated to New England in 1635. The first of the three is Samuel, son of William Morse of Suffolk, clothier, who in his will, not dated, but proved 12 September 1582, names his five children, Robert, Edward, John, Alice, and Samuel (vide supra, p. 71). This testator is evidently the William Morse of Stratford St. Mary, co. Suffolk, the baptisms of four of whose children are recorded in that parish, viz., Robert, 29 July 1570, Edward, 28 July 1572, Alice, 8 Jan. 1573/4 (these three by a wife named Anne), and John, 7 Apr. 1576 (by a wife named Rachel). The son Samuel, whose baptism does not appear to be on record at Stratford St. Mary, was probably the youngest child, as he was named last in the list of children in his father's will, and was born, therefore, between 1576 and 1582. He would, accordingly, have been from 53 to 58 years of age when the Increase sailed for New England in 1635, and might well have been entered in the shipping list as aged 50, for it must be remembered that the ages given in the shipping lists are often notoriously inaccurate, the original lists having been carclessly made and only copies having come down to the present day,

so that, when an age given in a shipping list corresponds with that revealed by a baptismal record, it is corroborative evidence, but, when it is not confirmed by a baptismal or other record, it is by no means certain that it is the correct age. Since, however, none of the names found in the family of William Morse of Stratford St. Mary, except John, are repeated in the family of Samuel Morse of New England, his son Samuel is not likely to be the New England immigrant of 1635.*

The second Samuel Morse to be considered as possibly the New England immigrant of 1635 is the Samuel (5, iv, of this pedigree) who was baptized at Dedham, co. Essex, 25 July 1587, the son of Richard and Margery (Symsone) Morse. He would have been nearly 48 years of age when the Increase sailed in 1635, only about two years below the age assigned to Samuel Morse in the shipping list; and in the "Morse Genealogy" he is assumed to be the New England settler. although Rev. Abner Morse, in 1865, was of the opinion that the Samuel Morse of the Increase was a son of Rev. Thomas Morse (4). Both Richard Morse of Dedham (5) and Samuel Morse of New England (6) had sons named Joseph and Daniel; but the names of the parents of the Samuel who was baptized at Dedham in 1587 are not found among the names of the children of Samuel of New England, and this fact makes it almost certain that Samuel Morse of Dedham, co. Easex, was not the Samuel Morse who migrated to New England in 1635.

The third Samuel Morse who may have been the passenger in the Increase is Samuel, second son and second child of Rev. Thomas Morse (4) by his first wife, Margaret (King) Morse. This Samuel was baptized at Boxted, co. Essex, 12 June 1576, and would have been, therefore, almost 59 years old when the Increase sailed, an age which would exclude him from consideration were it not for the frequent errors in the ages given in the shipping lists, as already mentioned, and for the following facts that make it likely that he was the emigrant to New England. Bamuel, son of Rev. Thomas Morre, had two own brothers named John and

*From the records published in the previous fastalment of this article it appears that William Morse, electuer, whose will was proved in 1582, and at least three brothers, namely, Edward, who had a wife Mary and children Ameli for Asabel) and Sara. Nathaniel, whose son Nathaniel was istorised at Stratford Bt. Riary 14 Aug. 1375, and Anthony, one of the executors of his brother William's will, whose own will, dated 4 Aug. 1603 and proved 20 Sept. 1804, shows that he had a wife Elizabeth but evidently no children hving. In the search, under the auspices of the Committee on English and Foreign Research, for the ancestry of Samuel Morse of Dedham. Mass., records pertaining to several Morse families in the counties of Essex and Suffolk, England, have been collected, and abstracts of these records have been presented in the preceding pages of this article. Some of them relate to families whose connection, if there was one, with the family to which the New England immigrant belonged has not yet been established; but these are helpful, nevertheless, in showing who were not his ancestors. Many other records, however, point unmistakably to a family that included two clergymen of the Church of England, namely, Rev. Thomas Morse, vicar of Boxted, co. Essex, and rector of Hinderclay, co. Suffolk, and Foxearth, co. Essex, in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and his son, Rev. John Morse, M.A., curate of Romford, co. Essex, in addition to other charges, for many years in the reigns of James I and Charles I: and in the following pedigree, based on some of the foregoing English records, on a few English authorities cited below, and on various New England records and authorities, it will be shown that Samuel Morse of Dedham, Mass., was a son of Rev. Thomas Morse, who, in turn, was probably a grandson of a Robert Morse, husbandman, who lived at Stoke-by-Nayland, co. Suffolk, in the first half of the sixteenth century. It will also be shown that Joseph Morse, planter,

who was at Ipswich, Mass., as early as 1637 and died in 1646, leaving

descendants, belonged to the same family and was a first cousin of

Samuel Morse; and several erroneous statements that have been

made in the existing Morse genealogies in regard to the children of

Samuel Morse will be corrected. The late Rev. Abner Morse, compiler of the "Memorial of the Morses," which was published in 1850, expressed the opinion, in a note attached to the copy of the will of Rev. Thomas Morse of Foxearth which was printed in the REGISTER in July 1865 (vol. 19, p. 264), that the testator "was no doubt the father of Samuel of Dedham;" but he had not found the entries in the various parish registers of Essex and Suffolk nor the other wills that prove the truth of his conjecture, and J. Howard Morse and the late Miss Emily W. Leavitt, who, under the auspices of the Morse Society, compiled a revision of the "Memorial of the Morses," under the title of "Morse Gencalogy," which was published in two parts in 1903 and 1905, identified Samuel Morse of Dedham, Mass., with the Samuel, son of Richard and Margery (Symsone) Morse, who was baptized at Dedham in England 25 July 1587 and was a half brother of Joseph Morse of Ipswich, Mass. (Cf. the following pedigree, Nos. 5, i; 5, iv; 6; and 7.) The "Morse Genealogy," it may be added, throws no light on the relationship between Samuel Morse of Dedham and

EARLY BLOCK ISLAND FAMILIES

By G. Andrews Morlahtt, Jr., A.M., LL.B., of Newport, R. I.

II. THE PAYNE OR PAINE FAMILY!

THE Payne family, which is now very numerous on Block Island, does not appear there until the first quarter of the eighteenth century. The founder of the family appears to have been a certain John Payne of Newport, R. I., a saddler, who was made a freeman of that town in 1686. The late Dr. Henry E. Turner of Newport, an authority upon the early history of that town, states positively that this John Payne was the brother of Capt. Thomas Payne of Newport and

Jamestown, R. I.

This Captain Payne had been an old privateersman and pirate at the Bahamas, whence he was driven to the Carolina coast. He appears to have been one of the company of buccaneers under L'Olinois who took and sacked Maracaibo. In 1689 he arrived at Newport with an old commission from Lieutenant Governor Hunter of Jamaica. The Governor of Rhode Island commissioned him to go out against Captain Picquart or Pecker, as Rev. Samuel Niles calls him, a French privatoer, who had captured Block Island and was committing many enormities upon the inhabitants. Captain Payne fought a sea battle with the French and drove them off the Island, and then he returned to Newport a great hero. He married Meroy, daughter of Gov. Caleb Carr, and settled down on Conanicut Island (Jamestown) as a country gentleman. He was active in the founding of Trinity Church at Newport and was an early warden there. He

was an old friend of the famous Captain Kidd, and the latter visited him at Jamestown just before his capture.

Captain Payne died in 1717, without issue. By his will he left his estate to certain nephews, not the children of John Payne of Newport: and they came to Rhode Island and settled at Jamestown. The compiler of this article has never found any actual proof that Capt. Thomas Payne and John Payne the saddler were brothers: but, as John Payne the saddler bought land at Jamestown adjoining that of Capt. Thomas Payne, such a relationship seems most likely. and it is quite probable that Dr. Turner had some evidence for his statement that they were brothers.

1. John' Payne, of Newport, R. I., saddler, born about 1642, died 17 May 1704, aged 62, and was buried in the Common Burying Ground on Farewell Street, Newport. He probably married twice. his first wife, whose name is unknown, being probably the mother of his eldest son, Thomas, and his second wife, MARY ----, being perhaps the daughter of Jeremiah Brown of Newport, a son of Chad

Brown of Providence (cf. REGISTER, vol. 80, p. 77).

John Payne was made a freeman of Newport in July 1686 (Newport Town Meeting, vol. 1, p. 20), and on 5 June 1694 was chosen constable of Newport (ib., p. 32). On 25 May 1698 Isaac Martindale of Newport sold to John Paine of Newport, saddler, 90 acres of land at Jamestown, bounded east on the salt water, north on land of Capt. Thomas Paine, west on the highway, and south on land of John Weeden, and also an island called Dyer's Island (Rhode Island Colonial Deeds, book 2, fo. 72); and on 30 May 1698 John Paine and Mary, his wife, reconveyed this land to Isaac Martindale (ib., book 2, fo. 73). On 21 Nov. 1700 Latham Clarke of Newport, merchant, sold to John Paine of Newport, saddler, 30 acres in the Pettyquamscott Purchase, bounded south on undivided land or a highway and north on the lands of William Gibson, survivor [?] to Jeremiah Brown of Newport, deceased, 160 rods deep and 30 rods wide. This deed was witnessed by William Brown (son of Jeremiah) and Daniel Vernon (Rhode Island Colonial Deeds, book 2, fo. 141 (161)). On - Jan. 1701/2 John Paine made - of Kingstown in the Narragansett country his attorney regarding these same lands, and acknowledged this act before Isaac Martindale on 2 Jan. 1701/2 (North Kingstown Deeds, book 1, fo. 5); and John Paine of Newport, suddler, sold the above-described land to Samuel Brown of Pettyquamscott, the deed being signed by John and Mary Paine and acknowledged on 2 Jan. 1701/2 (ib., book 2, fo. 195). On - May 1697 Isabel Morse, then of Warwick, quitclaimed land in Kingstown to John Paine, and the deed was witnessed by ---- Paine (ib., book 2, fo. 129). On 5 Jan. 1702/3 John and Thomas Paine each received shares adjoining each other in the Newport common lands (Newport Miscellaneous Records, p. 6).

John Paine of Newport, saddler, in his will dated 15 May 1704 and proved 4 June 1704, leaves his house and land in Newport to his

The Will of RICHARD MORSE of the parish of Duddinghurst, co. Essex. yeoman, being "weak in body," dated 16 August 1632. To my brother Edward Morse all moveables, he paying £70 to my loving wife Margaret. To my wife Margaret £5 yearly, towards the bringing up of her child until it be fourteen years of age. My executor is to pay the whole fine for my land, so that my wife may enjoy her third part without fine; otherwise he shall pay her £10. To my clder daughter Margoreth £100, viz., £50 at her age of cighteen and £50 at her age of twenty-one; if she marry and have issue before her age of twenty-one, her issue is to have the mother's portion lit is not expressly stated that this portion is to go to the issue on the mother's death]; if she die without issue in the meantime, the latter part of the portion shall go to her younger hister; if she die under eighteen years of age, the whole portion shall go to the younger sister. My executor is to bring up my elder daughter or to put her forth to some sufficient man, with her portion. To my younger daughter [not named] £100, payable at the same ages; but, if she die, [her portion] is to remain in my executor's hands. To my wife the bed [manuscript torn]. To the poor of Duddinghurst 20s. The mark of Recherd Morse. Witnesses: Samuel Petchey, the mark of Samuel Merden, the mark of Nicholas Ouerall.

Administration with the will annexed was granted 1 November 1632 to Edward Morse, brother of the deceased, no executor having been named in the will. (Archdeacoury of Essex [Somerset House, London], filed copy.)

The nuncupative Will of Rost. Mossa of Hinderelay [co. Suffolk], husbandman, declared 6 January 1633/4, makes the testator's wife, Judith, the sole legatee, and she is to bring up his children. Witnesses: Mary Locke, Kath. Scarphe. Proved 13 January 1633/4 by the relict, Judith. (Consistory Court of Norwich, 1633, fo. 398.)

The Will of Jeames Mosse of Bargham, co. Suffolk, being "weak of body but of plect memorie," dated 2 September 1638. To my brother Joseph Morse and his heirs all my lands and tenements, both free and copyhold; and my said brother Joseph shall make sale of so many of the said lands and tenements as shall raise these sums of money following, and dispose of the said money in the legacies hereafter mentioned: To my brother Nathaniell Morse £20. To my brother Phillip £5. To the child of my brother Daniell Morse £5. To my brother Mr. John Morse of Rumforde £5. To my brother Samuell Morse £10. To my cousin Joseph Morse 40s. To Mr. Catlin and Mr. Candler and Mr. Swayne, to each of them 40s. and a pair of gloves, and the like pair to Mr. Fowle. To Edward Inca, Andrew Wills, Edwarde Sacker, and Elisabeth Sacker, to each of them 20s. To Richard Aldridge 20s. To Richard Balewe and Margery Colstone, to each 10s. To Willim, Studde, Danell Dale, and Steven Blomfeild, to each of them 5s. To every servianit in this house, besides these before named, to each of them 2s. 6d. "And my will is yt my Executor doe give to everyone of my fellowes servis [a] payer of gloves and Ribond." To Mrs. Wardd, Goodman Mapes, Goodman Harvye, and Goodman Tayler, to each of them 20s. To my good Mrs. Bacon 40s. for a pair of gloves, and to Mrs. Nathaniell Bacon and Mrs. Francis Bacon, to each of them 20s. for a pair of gloves, and the like legacy to Mrs. Phillip Bacon. To Mr. Lyonell Bacon 40s. To Robert Baker, Mr. Arthur, Mr. Burgh, Mr. Fowle, and Goodman Fouldger of Disse, to each of them 40s. To Katherin Westbrowne £5. To Mr. Nathaniell Bacon and Mr. Francis Bacon, to each of them 5s. To Goodman Aldridge, Goodman Turner, and Goodman Warde, to each of them 20s. To the poor of Codenhall 40s., and to the poor of Bargham [sic] 40s. Sole executor: my brother Joseph Morse. Immediately after my death my said brother Joseph shall make proffer of the sale of all my lands in Stowmakett

to Mr. Yorge, of whom I bought them, at the same price that I had them of him; and, if he shall refuse to purchase them upon the offer, after the rate aforesaid, then my will is that they be immediately sold to any other body, at the best value, by my said executor. I give to my said executor all the overplus of my whole estate, my deb[ts] and legacies being discharged. Witnesses: Fr. Bacon [evidently the writer of the will], John Swaine, Thomas Fowle. [Signed] James Morse. Proved at Ipswich 8 September 1638 by the executor named in the will. (Ipswich, uncalendared wills, 1638, 101a.)

Administration on the goods of ALICE MORSE of Beccles [co. Suffolk was granted in 1644 to her husband, John. (Ipswich, Act Books, 21, fo. 9.)

The Will of John Monse, Mar. [i.e., minister], of Romford [co. Essex], dated 14 July 1645. To Dorothe, my younger daughter, £100, to be paid by my executrix within two years after my decease or at the day of her marriage. To Elizabeth, my clder daughter, £5, to be paid within one year after my decease. To my brothers or brothers' children £30, to be paid within two years after my decease at my dwelling house in Romford and to be divided among them at the discretion of my executrix. To my beloved wife Dorothe all my lands and tenements, for life, and she is to be sole executrix and to dispose what else she see meet [sic] to the poor. [Signed] John Morse [with seal]. Witnesses: Daniel Cramphorne, the mark of Mary Cramphorne. Proved at Brentwood 25 May 1648 by Dorothy Morse, widow and executrix. Valuation, £133. 15s. (Archdeaconry of Essex [Somerset House, London], original will. Cf. Archdeaconry of Essex, Act Books, 19, fo. 31b).

The Will of Judith Morais of Dedham, co. Essex, widow, dated 25 January 1645 [1645/6], contains a bequest of 20s. to "Joseph Morse in New England," "if he be living;" and, "if he be dead," to "William Stone in New England." Proved 17 March 4645 [1645/6]. (P. C. C., Twisse, 33.) [A lengthy abstract of this will may be found in the Redister, vol. 48, pp. 118-119, and in Waters's "Genealogical Gleanings in England," vol. 1, pp. 818-819.]

The Will of Samuell Mose of Littell Walden in the parish of Great Walden, co. Essex, labourer, being "week in body," dated 14 November 1647. To Robart Mosy, my second son, a hutch, a kneeding trough, and one-half of my working tools. To my daughter Margett, now wife of Henry Bechshop, my little tenement, paying ——. To Edward Mosy, my eldest son, 12s. To James Mosy, my youngest son, a table and form in the parlour. Residuary legatee and executrix: my wife Alce. The mark of Samuell Mose. Witnesses: Thos. Wenhain, Francis Belleham. Proved at Dunmowe Magna 1 January 1647 [1647/8] by William Wood for the executrix. (Commissary Court of London for Essex and Herts [Somerset House, London], filed copy, January 1647, Clarke, 71.)

Administration of the goods of Joseph Monaz of Palgrave [co. Suffolk] was granted in 1648 to Elizabeth, relict of the deceased. (Bury St. Edmunds, Act Books, 3, fo. 122.)

The Will of Jeremy Mosse of Dedham, co. Essex, clothworker, dated 14 May 1663. To be decently buried, with a sermon. To my wife Abigall and to her heirs for ever the house where I dwell in Dedham, with residue of household stuff and shop stuff. Executrix: my wife Abigael. Supervisors: Thes, Luffkin, gent., and Joseph Gleason, grocer, both of Dedham. Witnesses: Jeremiah How and Jeremiah Songer. Proved at Colchester 20 May 1664 by the oath of the executrix. (Commissary Court of London for Essex and Herts [Somerset House, London], Alderton, 329.)

my brother Richard Mosse 50s. To my sister Margaret Morse 20s. To my eight youngest children eight "Bybles." To my eldest son all my books in my "studdye." To the poor of Foxearth 10s. Residue of goods, money, plate, bonds, mortgages, cattle, household stuff, etc., to my wife Margaret, and she is to bring up my children in learning. If my wife Margaret die unmarried, she is to give to the four children by my first wife £20. Proved 28 April 1597. (P. C. C., Cobham, 26.)

The Will of Robert Mosse of Stoke by Nayland [co. Suffolk], single man, dated 21 August 1600. Testator bequeathes his house and other property in Stoke to Gillian Bacon, his executrix. Proved at the Bishop's Court, Norwich, in 1602.

The Will of Anthony Monse* of Hinderclay [co. Suffolk], dated 4 August 1603. To my wife Elizabeth lands in Stoke by Nayland for life, and then to my nephew Azaell, son of my brother Edward Morse. To my wife lands in Boxted, co. Essex, for life, and then to said Azell, if he pay to the children of my brother Nathaniel Morse £20. To the children of my brother William, i.e., Edward, John, and Samuel, to each £40. To Robert Snow of Stratford £20. To John Pigott £20 per annum for life. To poor students of Cambridge £4. To the poor of Stratford £40. To the poor of Hinderclay £40. To Cousin Bond and wife a ring. To Sister Mary Morse of Stratford a ring and the furniture in my house at Stratford. To Mr. Dow, a preacher of God's word at Stratford. To Mr. Smyth of Rickinghall a book. Like bequests to Mr. Ravens, Mr. Wallys, Mr. Hall, and Mr. Chamberlain of Hunson. To Nathaniel Hollingston of Cambridge. Executrix: my wife Elizabeth. Supervisor: Henry Farr. Proved 20 September 1604. (P. C. C., Harte, 77.)

The Will of William Glover of Dedham, co. Essex, clothier, dated 26 January, 6 James [1608/9], bequeaths to Joseph Morse of Dedham 40s. and to the Widow Morse, in the Valley, 20s. Proved 5 May 1609. (P.C.C., Dorsett, 39.) [An abstract of this will may be found in the Register, vol. 46, pp. 312-313, and in Waters's "Genealogical Gleanings in England," vol. 1, pp. 582-583.]

The Will of LANCLETT JASPER of Redgrave [co. Suffolk], husbandman, being "sick of body," dated 17 February 1616 [1616/17]: To William, my son, and Francis [sic] his wife, for their lives, the tenement wherein I dwell, which I purchased of Gregorye Fysher, with the hemp land and croft thereto belonging, on condition that they pay to Rose, my wife, for her life, 40s. a year, quarterly; otherwise my son Henrie is to enter thereon. If William and Frances pay the annuity, then the tenement shall, after their decease, be equally divided among the children of my said son William and Frances, his wife, viz., Nathaniell, Jonathan, Joseph, Jerymie, Elizabeth, Bridgett, and Marye. To my son Nathaniell Jasper and his heirs £5. 6s. 8d., payable by my son William within one year of the death of my wife Rose. To my son William and his heirs I acre of land which I purchased of Elizabeth Sheppard, he to plough and sow it with hempseed during the life of my wife Rose, and the hemp to be equally divided between himself and my wife Rose. My son William is to pay to Annes Morse, my daughter, £3 within two years of the decease of my wife Rose, and to Elizabeth Morse, my daughter, £3 within three years of the decease of my wife Rose. To my son Jeremye and his heirs, if it please God he overlive me, a piece of land (2 acres) which I purchased of Edmond Fowle, he paying to Rose, my wife,

13s. 4d. a year for her life. My son Jeremys shall pay to my son Daniell Japper £5 within one whole year of the decease of Rose, my wife, and to my son John Jasper £5 within two years of the decease of said Rose. If Jeremye die before his mother, "weh God defende," and "before he hath taken yt upp," then my son Henrie Jasper shall have the two acres, paying to his mother her annuity and to his two brethren, Daniell and John, the portions last-named; and in default of payment Daniell and John are to enter on the land. My wife Rose shall have those rooms and fruit trees which I have reserved and which are now in my tenure out of the before-bequeathed premises, with ingress and egress and to the fire, for life. To my wife Rose one bed complete, as it standeth in my chamber, with one cupboard, a cupboard table, two coffers, a chest, a kettle, a little brass pot, a warming pan, two ale firkins, one mortar with the pestle, and a candlestick. Executor: my son William. Witnesses: Roberte Debenham, Edmond Fowle, Robert Fysher. Proved at Bury St. Edmunds, 3 March 1616 [1616/17], by the executor. (Archdeaconry of Sudbury [Bury St. Edmunds], book 46, fo.

The Will of Robert Monse of Stoke by Nayland [co. Suffolk], yeoman, dated 6 May 1619. To my wife Ann 3s. per annum for life and her dwelling in the house where I now dwell and her board, etc., at the charge of her son Richard. To my son Richard all my freehold land in Stoke. To my son Robert £20, at twenty-one years of age, and the lands given to him by his grandfather Richard Morse, deceased, after the death of his brother Joseph. To my daughter Lydia, at twenty-two years of age. To my son John, at twenty-six years of age. To my son Francis, at eighteen years of age. [Testator's son Joseph was not yet eighteen years of age.] Executor: my son Richard. Proved in the Bishop's Court, Norwich, 19 September 1622.

The Will of John Anger of Dedham, co. Essex, clothicr, dated 19 January 1623 [1623/4], contains a bequest of 20s. to Joseph Morse the Elder. Proved 18 February 1623 [1623/4]. (P. C. C., Byrde, 19.) [A lengthy abstract of this will may be found in the Registren, vol. 50, pp. 400-402, and in Waters's "Genealogical Gleanings in England," vol. 2, pp. 1187-1189.]

The Will of John Prz of Dedham, co. Essex, clothier, dated 8 November 1624, contains a bequest of Joseph Morse, Sr., of Dedham, and mentions Jeremie Morse. Proved 24 February 1624 [1624/5]. (P. C. C., Clarke, 13.) [A lengthy abstract of this will may be found in the REGISTER, vol. 50, pp. 386-387, and in Waters's "Genealogical Gleanings in England," vol. 2, pp. 1173-1174.]

The Will of ANN ANGER, dated 2 September 1625, mentions Joseph Morse. Jerimiah Morse is a witness. Proved at Colchester 16 December 1625. (Commissry Court of London for Ferex and Herts [Somerset House, London], 1625-28, no. 177.) The nuneupative Will of Marr Mosas of Dedham, co. Essex, single, declared 9 May 1631. To my three unmarried sistem apparel at the discretion of Francis Gibbes. Witnesses: Jeremy Mosse, Margt. Mosse. Proved 25 January 1631/2 by Fran. Gibbes. (P. C. C., Audley, S.)
