sisters received payment? We have the 1856 Cherokee Payment roll
here in the library. I can check that if it is the right year.

I did find the following information on Nelms and one
Swan which I will include. Unless your family lived in the Indian
Territory or Cherokee Nation at the time of final enrollment, I'm
afraid they will not be listed on any Final Rolls of the Cherokees
made in 1902-1906.

If we can be of further help to you in your research we
shall be happy to do so.

P. 53: WILLIAM NELMS, W.W. 28 Apr. 1719, W.P. 17 Aug. 1719. "Son SAMUEL NELMS - horse, bridle, saddle, pistols & holsters, my still and worm, Negro girl Matt and the plantation whereon I now live, to him & his heirs.

"Son WILLIAM NELMS, land which I bought of Samuel Smith deceased, lying in little Wiccocomo River side to him & his heirs lawfully begotten of his body. Also a horse, bridle, saddle, a Negro boy or girl that is suitable to his age, and one thousand pounds of tobacco.

"Daughter ELIZABETH NELMS, Negro girl Moll, a feather-bed & furniture; three pewter dishes and a half dozen plates to her & her heirs.

"Daughter WINNEFRED NELMS, mulatto girl Betty, a feather bed & furniture, 3 pewter dishes & a half dozen plates to her and her heirs.

"Daughter ANGELICO NELMS - Negro girl Lucy, a feather bed & furniture; three pewter dishes and a half dozen plates to her & her heirs.

"Daughter MARY NELMS, Negro girl Beck, a feather-bed & furniture, 3 pewter dishes & a half dozen plates to her & her heirs.

"Daughter HANNAH NELMS, Negro girl or boy of 10 or 11 yrs. of age, a feather bed & furniture, 3 pewter dishes & half dozen plates to her & her heirs.

"Daughter SARAH NELMS, a Negro girl or boy suitable to her age, a feather-bed & furniture, 3 pewter dishes and a half dozen plates to her & her heirs.

"Each of my sons, SAMUEL & WILLIAM, a feather bed and furniture, if any; if not each a Flock bed.

Wife, ELIZABETH NELMS, 2 Negro women Nan & Jane, one feather-bed & furniture; her horse & saddle & two suits of cloaths.

"After my decease my sons SAMUEL NELMS & WILLIAM NELMS TO BE OF AGE TO take their estates into their own possession when either of them attains the age of twenty one years.

"My daughters, ELIZABETH & WINNEFRED, ANGELIES, MARY, HANNAH & SARAH - to have their estates at the age of 21 or day of marriage, which shall happen first.

"If any of the Negroes given to my children should die before my children receive them, the Negroes that die are to be made good out of my old stock, if any.

"If any of my sons & daughters should die before they come of age, their estates to be divided equally among the rest of my children & wife.

"Wife, ELIZABETH NELMS to possess my dwelling plantation during her widowhood.

"My son SAMUEL to take his part along with him where he now lives. If my wife should marry a man as my children can't agree with, then each daughter so disagreeing to have her estate at age of 15 years.

"Rest of my estate whatsoever, real or personal to be divided equally between my wife and children.

".....Thank you so much for answering my query. You are the first person to answer my queries either this year or last. I received questions on the wife of WESLEY NELMS..... AKA BABY GOODWIN. My research has not been too diligent because my Swires line suddenly opened up the earlier part of last year and most of my time went into furthering that search. I, too, have the listing of the people who are registered with a surname index. I received many GOODWIN, one of whom was Charles Henderson, who now resides in Yakima, Wash. and who sent me his line. It centers around Hamilton County, Ohio. So far I have done nothing on this line....."

"My NELMS research has turned up the family of JOHN NELMS who came to Fannin County, Texas from Ky. There are four books on the NELMS..... ALLEN...DARRON. I have them but the research on the era you are interested in lists only names...state and a date. There is no way to pinpoint the date.

I haven't done any genealogy work for more than a year. George is my first concern and every day is precious. He is so weak and tired. He went to the pharmacy for medicine today & just that little bit of exercise left him shaking.

Our kids are all busy as bird dogs. The boys both have to work out doors. George jr installs & maintains traffic lights & there are so many accidents now. Bob is also an electrician and is one of the two who maintain the dozen or so substations in this area. They both wear snow mobile suits these days. I do hard work but pay well.

I don't have much news today and want to write

a couple more letters tonight.
(if I can keep my eyes open).

George is watching a T. V.
foot ball game between The
San Francisco 49ers and Houston.
Am so glad he enjoys sports.
He would find life pretty
monotonous otherwise.

Last night we went to genealogy meeting for first time in a year. My eyesight is so poor that I'm terrified to drive at night. And wouldn't you know - we couldn't hear half that was said!

Room was big & gals who talked were at one end, we at the other and they made no effort to raise their voices even when people complained. They ^{had been} ~~attent~~ to a meeting in Cleveland. Thanks hope. We had about an hour to read & accomplished some.

I'm looking forward to getting the data on Eli Goodwin. Lucy, how do you go about writing for things like marriage records and wills? I have no idea who I should write to, how to say it or what it costs. As I said before - I sure wish you were here. I'm sending a little cash to help with the postage on what you send. It is it were more but our \$50 a month doesn't stretch much. We have one baby here full time, one half time and don't dare load up again! But that buys the groceries & Georges medicine. We are thankful for that.

Sounds as though you folks have your hands full there. It's amazing how many people have so little sense of honesty. And you don't need that sort of worry. Why don't you chuck the whole lot and move into a retirement village? I'm sure would, if we had the money. Can't rent even a sleeping room here for less than \$100 a month. I don't know how the students manage. No wonder they all demand huge wages when they are through school.

George's family have their annual reunion over Labor Day. He will go with Ellen & Don. I just hold my breath & pray we get there and back. He is so tired and has such a time breathing. And after that last black-out we just don't go much. Guess we are lucky to be together.

Our kids mow the yard and keep up in garden stuff. The boys do the repair work so we are well-off in that respect. One of the boys is a pretty good barber & cuts George's hair - now if one of the girls would do my hair we would be all set!

She had a taste of your California smog last week. Was sure a nasty bit. We have never had anything like it in the Midwest. Could hardly breathe & visibility was poor. How do you stand it? Has been so hot and dry all summer here. We have a few tomato plants in

our flower bed. They sure do taste good. There is a nice fruit market near us & we are now having melons. The blew ourselves to a honeydew melon last week.

Most of the melons come from muscadine on the Mississippi. The sandy river bottom soil is just right.

Our church is building a new Sunday school building and George has made & sold light Crocheted afghans to raise money for our building pledge. Have him something to do as well!

I made a few knitted baby things. Its good to have something we can do that helps someone else.

Lucy did I send you some family record sheets to fill out for you & Henry? I meant to. I'd like your autobiography too. It has meant so much to me to find you folks.

Time to stop and get some lunch. Hope to hear from you soon.

Dear Lucy & Henry:

George is watching football and I couldn't care less who is on the bottom of the dog pile so I'm getting some lettered done. We went to the historical society library Tues afternoon for a couple of hours but didn't get much done. Takes so long to find stuff. Their census films are sparse too. Nothing on any states ^{except Iowa} after 1860 & many Iowa counties missing through 1880. Ohio & Pa. indexed but only 1818 & 1820 Illinois indexed. Sure wish I could get to Des Moines for a few days. I cleaned out my notebook yesterday & found a slip of paper that I had jotted down the name of a book and can't for the life of me remember where or when I made the note. Book was "Historical & Genealogical Records of the 5 civilized tribes and other Indian Records" by George C. Yountkin.

I wrote Mrs Lord May 16 but never even got my stamp back. Its amazing how many people don't even acknowledge receiving letters. I wonder if Lewis R. Bruce the Commissioner of Indian Affairs in Washington could give us any clues on Susanrah, wife of Releg Baker? It must have been after 1875 when Grandma Lizzie signed away her rights because the kids were provoked at her for doing it and she

told them she "didn't need the government's money". She had a husband who supported her. "I don't have any other information on that deal. I sure wish I had quizzed her more when she came to see us in 1941. I started to plow through the Record of Connecticut men in the War of the Revolution in hope of finding some clue to my Swan ancestor. Only got about 30 pages checked but have an idea that one of the men from Stonington may be the one. Great Grandpa was named Samuel Prentice Swan & there was a Major Samuel Prentice in a troop from Stonington and a Joseph Swan who married a Mary Prentice is listed in Patriots book. So maybe if I'm persistent I'll get somewhere. I know that Samuel Swan & Harriet Smith lived in Stonington for a while. This is more fun than fig saw or cross word puzzles. I finally got enough stuff together to send in my D.A.R. papers but the gal who has been helping me has a sick husband so papers still are here. I used one of Grandpa Swan's Halt family as I had all those records but one & a Halt cousin came through with it. I don't have Eli & Susannah's marriage date or her birth & death records so couldn't use Peleg Baker. So far I have 5 soldiers in Rev War but don't have the finances just now to chase down records that meet D.A.R. requirements.

Our gene group is fairly new & I don't get there often. They are presently copying old records at courthouse so mormon people can put them on micro film. Also getting old cemetery records cleared up. Bob's wife has been doing some of that. It's hard work plowing through weeds & brambles. One farmer had piled up old stones & plowed the ground! Such sacrilege!

She finally found Georges mother's parents & older sisters listed in 1870 Appanosee county census but mother wasn't born until 1872. They moved some time later to a farm north of Clarinda where Grandpa Elam died in 1903. She thinks we have been looking in the wrong county for them. So maybe we will find out the names & b. places if we keep looking. 1870 census said that G. grpa Elam was born in Illinois and we thought he was from Tennessee because his wife was. Census also said wife was 36 in 1870. Her obituary said she was born in 1835 but census would indicate 1840. They could neither read nor write so we are up a creek & no paddle!

Am enclosing a clipping which may interest some of your Cohorts. One never knows.

George feels just real fine most of time. Woesn't take much to tire him. She went visiting last Sunday & he didn't rest. That night he was alarmed because he had some chest pain. Guess he will have to be

quiet for a while longer.

I'm sure hope Henry is improved. You must have been very upset. I just really lose my senses when George gets sick. He is my whole world. And I know how much Henry means to you. Tell him we sure are praying regularly and earnestly for his return to good health.

I sure wish we weren't so far apart. Am so glad you came to Albuquerque.

Well the game is over so I'll stop this and look for some good news from you.

Dear Henry and Lucy:

You must sleep in a film reader and eat books! I am just flabbergasted at the information you have uncovered. Perhaps if we can find out where the Goodwins were married and when we will be able to find his parents. I called one of my friends in the "Genie" society here who has some kind of index & asked her if there was a Pelig Baker listed in N.Y. Militia. Her reply was "yes, he was married to a woman named Susannah." So if Henry can prove he belongs to that family he is in.

I've made my application to the "Nathaniel Fellows" Chapter of D.A.R. here. I'll take a while to get my credentials verified. Am using my fathers gr gr grandfather Walter's record so I won't have so many documents to run through. Am hoping that D.A.R. will be able to help locate my mother's ancestors. Am so limited in time. Later this summer we will only have two babies and maybe just one so that I can get to the library. Bob's wife is going to see if she can get an old Appanoose County history for me. George's mother was born in Appanoose County in 1872 and we can't trace his grandparents. We know that the mother came from Tennessee but not sure about the

Father. They couldn't read or write so there are no letters or Bibles to refer to. I finally located my dad's only living cousin (on his father's side) & wrote to see if I could get some Swan information. I've also written the secretary of the Grand Lodge of New York (Masonic) to see if they have any records. Somebody should come up with something. The cousin I referred to is 89 years old and may very well be senile, she lives with one of her children and I'm hoping that the offspring will have some answers. All the Swans I've run down so far are Md. or N. Carolina.

I wrote to Mrs Lord at Promise City and now I watch for the postman like a lovesick teenager! I was lucky enough to get eleven generations back of papas grandmothers grandmother so have 16 generations in that one line through Fairbanks ancestors. I started to index the thing & gave up. Dear Lucy,

Thank you so much for the pictures of Henry and you. The surely hope you can come east next fall. The children were wondering what the bush in the background is. I intended for you to keep all the snaps I sent. Ralph was a shutter bug and I had the ones he sent Justice, mama, & grandma as well as ones for me. I'll send them back one of these days.

I have many wakeful hours in the night because of arthritis pain & do a lot of thinking. It usually is "I wonder if", "I wonder why", "maybe they", "if I look in this record or search that one", type.

Last night I put some pieces together (I think). Eli Goodwin had that land in Indiana. My grandma was born at Lincoln Ill. He took the children & left home. Where did he go? Grandma's obituary says that she came to Missouri when 7 years old. I think that may be true because the picture I have of Caleb Huff - Grandma Bateman's father - was taken at Attica Ind. Also, the one of Susannah Baker was taken at La Fayette Ind. So maybe Eli didn't get to Missouri but wandered around Illinois & Indiana. And maybe - just maybe the Baker-Woodson family did also.

I still can't figure out how
come Elizabeth Woodson Baker ~~was~~
Sutton was in Appanoose County
Iowa. Unless she moved there
with Mr Sutton. I've written Mr
Robert Beck the editor of the Centerville
"Iowegian" to see if there might
be old newspaper files prior to
civil war. Do you suppose the
1860 census of Lincoln Ill would
give any information on age of Jesse
Goodwin? Maybe age wasn't listed.

I sure wish I could have time to
read microfilm at historical building
here. Have to be patient I guess.

When you get to a regular
Library look for the Sept 1967
readers digest. It has some source
material listed. You may already
have some of it. I hadn't known
about the family histories listed
in the Jefferson room of the

room might have a Nelson history. I imagine you have already investigated possibility of newspaper files for Mantalba. Keep digging. Something will show up. How did you locate Stanley C Nelson's grave? Is Anna Mary there too?

If George continues to feel as well as he does we may get up courage to make the trip in August. We have never been south of Oklahoma. I love to knit and collect fine lace patterns which I do on my mother's mother's old steel needles. They are about as big around as wire in a common paper clip. The lace is so much daintier than crocheted lace. So far I have about 50 or 60 patterns some are quite complicated. I do a lot of yarn work too for the family but have to use acrylic fibers instead of wool. Wool fuzzes & makes my noses irritated.

Dear Lucy:-

You sounded so discouraged. Please don't be. I've been at this business for 25 years & it takes a lot of patience. I've been wondering if Wesley Melme might possibly have been a civil war veteran. He would have been very young but there was no draft at that time & many older men with families hired young men to go in their places.

Some time when you are able to find the time I wonder if you could hunt for a swan ancestor for me. Justus Swan, my grandfather had 4 uncles who were sons of Samuel & Harriet (Smith) Swan. I know the name of only one.

Julius A. Swan was born Aug 17 1830 at Angelica, Allegany County, N.Y. He died Feb 19 1913 and is buried in Woodlawn Cemetery at Linclean N.Y. What I particularly want to know are the names of the other three brothers & 5 sisters of Samuel Prentice Swan & Julius A. Swan. The builder of our original state capital here in Iowa City was a Chauncy Swan who came from New York State. The Masonic Lodge of

which he was a member has no such information on him. And the early newspaper files were destroyed in a fire. I do know that Chauncey Swan had 4 children one of whom was Charles born in 1823 in New York State & died in 1883 at Auburn California. Perhaps from these bits & pieces & census records from that era we may come up with something. Probably an 1830 or 1840 census. I wish I had the time & means to chase it down.

I did get down to our local library & had some papers copied for you & Fixin. The one very old paper about the land transfer in Indiana didn't come through very well. Perhaps their machine isn't too good. Even the newspaper isn't too clear. If you can get a better copy there I'd be glad to send the original. It is very yellow & brittle. I hoped to get it laminated. I find this business very fascinating.

It's hot & hot time so must stop.

Dear Cousins

Just a note today to let you know how welcome your long letter & the pictures were. As you want the picture of Uncle Henry & Aunt Susie Nelson returned? He reminded me of his cousin Arthur, my father. I have enclosed some pictures from the album that Lizzie Swan had. They are different from the ones you have. You may keep the one of Elizabeth Woodson. There were two of them in the book. Tell your friend that Nian Bateman's father's name was Caleb Huff. There was a picture of him in the book. It was taken at Attica Indiana when he was quite old. Maybe she can get a clue from that small bit. Who raised Anna Mary Goodwin? I have no idea whether she stayed in Missouri or where she and Wesley Nelson lived. My grandparents moved from Missouri to Illinois sometime between the Jan of 1875, when they were married, and Aug 1, 1878 when Justin was born. There was an earlier birth to them but was stillborn & have no record save hearsay. When I was born in 1901 my father sent the card of announcement.

to Lizzie Swan in Lincoln Illinois. So evidently she had gone to Lincoln after her father died. As I said before, my grandparents moved about a great deal. They lived in Maryland in 1904 when their daughter Elvira died. A number of years later they moved her body to the cemetery in Nevada Mo.

Concerning Jesu W. Goodwin I have no ~~of~~ information except that Justice said she saw him once. He was a drifter & typically Indian in appearance. I hope to get some free time after July 1st and get some of these papers Xeroxed for you.

I have Filomenas pictures wrapped and want to write her a letter. The Swan Pedigree goes back to pre-revolutionary times. I'm about 50 years late and may find it will take a lot of writing to locate some of those. Luckily my grandfather Sular's brother belonged to Sons of American Revolution & I have some papers there. Too bad that humans don't care about their own ancestry as much as the pedigrees for their line stock!

It is I hope we could get together. I'll write again soon. Am pushed for time now. Lovingly

Dear Cousins:

I was flabbergasted to say the least, when we got your call. I've been interested in such affairs for many years but have been limited both time wise and financially until lately in my pursuit of ancestors & relatives. My grandmother Lizzie Swan visited us here in 1941 & I wrote down some of the things she told me then. She was born at Lincoln Illinois, not Rock Island. Her mother was part Cherokee & part Comanche Indian who became a trained nurse. Eli Goodwin was a man of a violent temper. One day Grandmother Susana came home to find the house empty. Eli had taken the three children & gone. Grandmother Susana spent her life searching for her children. She would nurse long enough to get money to hunt & then nurse again & hunt more. Eli traveled & when he reached Nevada Missouri he left the baby Lizzie with H. A. and man Bateman who had nine boys & were enchanted by the tiny Indian baby. Lizzie was grown & married before her natural mother found her. ~~She~~ Lizzie wrote to her mother & her sister Anna Mary and had one visit from Uncle Jesse. She never saw either her sister or mother but pictures were exchanged. I have pictures in an old album of Susana Baker Goodwin, Anna Mary & Heeley Nelms & Elizabeth Woodson Baker Sutton.

My grandparents Lizzie & Justus Swan moved about a great deal as grandpa had wanderlust. He was well educated for teaching but was more interested in photography. He came to Missouri & met and married Lizzie Bateman at Nevada Mo Jan 20 1873. They moved back to Illinois where Justus was born at Delavan. In 1881 they were back in Missouri where my father was born. Eventually they moved to Nativita Colorado & Nucla Colorado. They were among the founders of Nucla & had a fruit "raunch" later they moved permanently to Nativita where they had a hotel called The Nativita House. Grandma did tailoring & ran the hotel & Grandpa had a photo gallery. I remember my father saying how provoked the family were when grandma sold her oil rights back to the government for \$15. Perhaps the Bureau of Indian Affairs might have some records available. My father was a telegraph operator & met my mother at Lamar Colorado where she lived & worked as a telephone operator. They lived in Nebraska for about 5 years & moved to Nucla where they lived until 1915. Papa was injured in an accident at farm & was unable to do heavy work afterwards. So they came to Iowa where they spent the rest of their lives. I worked for Rock Island. Aunt Justie was married four times. The fourth marriage was the longest but her husband

Elmer Judd was buried in Denver in a military cemetery, so when she died in 1954, my sister & I took her body to Nucla and laid her beside the third husband Stacey Arnold who died of "flu" in 1918. Her only child only lived a few days. She married Stacey Arnold while we lived in Nucla. He gave her the 5 happiest years of her life. Later she married Elmer Judd who was a man of violence & very jealous. She stayed with him out of fear. An enormous man weighing nearly 400 pounds he beat her often. In later years he became an invalid and unable to walk. Remorseful of earlier ill treatment ^{for} he was like a child whom she cared for lovingly until he died.

Ralph was a willful and charming rascal who left home early. Married to Hilda Woods who lived at Nucla. They had one daughter. Hilda & Ralph were divorced when Philomena was just an infant. Ralph was married 6 times. The fourth wife Daisy Jeanette died about 1950. They were married for 28 years. After her death he was lonely & in 1954 he married a Loise —. She got mad & cut up the upholstery, packed everything moveable & left him. ^{She couldn't get into going} In desperation he sent for my mother who went out & helped him buy linens, curtains etc & repair furniture. Ralph wanted

her to stay but she came home after a few months as she said he was such a rough talker she couldn't stand it. She wrote often for a while & then Ralph wrote to say that he & Mildred were married but secretly as her mother disapproved of him. Then the letters stopped coming. We sent Christmas & birthday greetings & no response. Finally my sister sent a registered letter & got the response I've enclosed. Since we make a habit of always putting return addresses on all correspondence we are inclined to disbelieve her efforts to notify us. I'd much appreciate knowing where he is buried & if Mildred still lives in Long Beach. Ralph had some old family bibles & records that I'd much like to get hold of. When Justice died in Oct 1954 my sister called Ralph & he met us in Montrose. Only time we ever saw him. He arrived there before we did & spent the night before papers in heating stove burning. Couldn't find many records so we had hiked to a lawyer whom he knew in Montrose & whom himself declared executor & had had all her money in Government bonds & made a joint tenancy deed with Ralph so there wouldn't be any inheritance tax.

Ralph took everything. Somewhere in Mildreds possession are our Grandmothers cut glass & sterling which rightfully should have been Philomenas & ours when he was gone. But that is all water over the dam now. Philomena wrote to him until she was in high school & he disowned her when she refused to come live with him at that time. Ralph was a lovable, charming person who was very careless with the truth. He was vulnerable to anyone who showed him affection and undoubtedly very lonely. Papa loved him but was not about to trust him.

My sister & I were both teachers. She elementary grades & I music. She has lived in Cleveland Ohio since 1934. Her second husband was a brilliant chemist who was top research chemist for American Steel & wire & 17 years older than she. Their only child was born when he was 58 and she nearly 42. Mary Helen is a beautiful & talented girl who has been going to Muskingham College in Ohio & will transfer next fall to a Cleveland school to be near her fiancée who will be in law school there. My sister Elnora has been credit manager for Chemical Rubber in Cleveland since her husbands death four years ago.

My husband George L. was studying for ministry when he became ill & was unable to continue in school. When he regained his health after much surgery and years of disability he was well again & we were married. Then came the depression & lost jobs & family & finally manager of a cooperative oil firm. He left them 7 years ago when firm was reorganized & now is a part time office manager for one of the State Farm Insurance offices here. He draws social security so only works 3 days a week ^{now} at the office. I've enjoyed having him at home to help with the five infants I have here in a home day care business. He is the kindest most Christian man in all the world. I say that after nearly 42 years of marriage.

Our five children all live here in Iowa City and Coralville except the one twin (farmer) living about 15 miles east of us. They have all married people we are fond of. Some are more prosperous than others but all doing well. Bob, the youngest, fell in love in high school with a girl he had known all his life. She was a shy, sweet person with scholastic ability but too late we found she was immature emotionally & not interested in making a home. She finally left him. He has accepted her inability to grow up and is

making a new life. Retained his home & dog & active in community theatre, sings in church choir and is a substation electrician for light co.

Geo Arthur, (whom you talked to) married the daughter of a wealthy contractor. She is not one bit arrogant or living on her folks money. She works as a typist for students & manages Georges salary well. He is second from the top in traffic control department for Iowa City.

Edward The farm twin enjoys her farm life. They farm almost 400 acres. She is active in Christian church at West Liberty. She has a good marriage.

^{Edith} Leora married a baker. They owned their own business until about 6 years ago. Ken is a Korean war veteran who got a bad dose of shrapnel. The injuries finally became such a drag that he retired from the bakery & lives on investments & government compensation (75% disability). They just have one daughter. Ken is Catholic but Leora still Methodist.

Ellen Louise married a man who is a lithographer for Moore Business Forms. He couldn't be dearer to us were married 8 years before they had children. Their first child was stillborn. Rick & Leesa are loving beautiful children & we enjoy them so much.

I do so wish you could come for a visit. We have a nice little ~~bed~~ room home here.

The Amana Colonies are only 20 miles away
& Iowa City was the first territorial capital.
Now you know about all there

Dear Henry and Lucy-

I was indeed glad to hear from you all. I'd been aiming to write but not much to say, only work and too tired to try.

See my son-in-law & I built a mile of wire fence at his odd times, mostly in the eve, as he looks after oil wells - not any of mine, as all are dead. Then he comes by feeds my cows, then home to feed & tend over 100 head - and cleared a patch of woods so he could plow up & put in Coastal grass. Oh this farm life is a drag and tiresome one. When I had a bout a mile of fence posts rotting off so fence was falling down or leaning so bad, soon would fall. So I dug holes and son-in-law hauled me posts so I could finish fixing up the fence, now believe me

I could hardly move a foot forward by night, so sore couldn't sleep much, but that's over now and I'm starting some garden. just can't get out the old habit, but I'm not going heavy on that, only me, most garden spot is in Corn. I've only 10 cows + bull and 3 heifers, 5 cows have each a young calf - 2 heifers just bred.

And you people I'm hoping this spring weather will help you all to feel better, of course we have a cool spell now, sun shining + very pleasant to day.

A Cousin's Husband + girl from Houston spent Thur. Fri nights with me, then my 2 adopted boys + wives came to see me too for Easter.

my daughter spent Sat Night in Dallas with their son

And Family. Came back by this morning, a boy that stayed here last Summer came to see me this morning too.

my Sister in law I mentioned that had a Tumor removed 2 yrs ago called this morning. She had 2 bad Spasm of the muscles yesterday and she feels awful today. Her husband had double Pneumonia week before last, he a tall poor boney looking man has heart trouble not doing too good - weak. I poor humans not able to be alone no children of theirs, but he has a mob of nephews & 1 niece that are heaven to them. They just bought & had a new brick home built (a bunch of none sense) at this age, and health. They had a nice home living in but sold it, had it moved, so see, no one

but his nices & nephews to leave money too, my side, or his side of kin probably want reap any of it.

no Tommie never told me a word of you calling them, How did you know how to get him. may be I'd be giving his place of business some time.

Back to weather, we all are afraid the freeze & heavy frosts got our fruit crop. something we all can use and need.

Sorry about alline, hope they all are doing better, I don't ever hear from Elbert now. I'd love to make some visits. but I've stuff to care for too much to ask son-in-law to drive 4 or 5 miles to shut up chickens every night, opossums and skunks so bad, I caught 2 opossums in trap, and killed 1 with a club, a Cousin killed 1 at 5 o'clock in morning. and over

Shot at / Thur. night near
house. Varmints killed 6 or 8
hens before getting those. Now
an Armadilla plows up my
yards, haven't got him yet.

Well its 2 oclock this Sun. eve
I'm looking for the boy and his
girl friend, got kindle up fire,
Speaking of Arthritis in your
hands, my daughter Henrietta
Neal, Henry met her at Lucy's
funeral has knots forming on
all fingers & joints, hands look
awful, but want go to Dr.

It's been some time since I've written or heard of you all. Just hope you haven't suffered too much from the drought. See it sure has been a dry hot year. but we've had 2 in. rain and some cool cloudy weather this + past week. some places not over 4 miles from me had from 4 to 5 in. rain, well I'm proud of 2 in.

in was 112 degree, temp to 108. Lucar about same. Guess you get the reports all along.

my garden was almost a failure. started off beautifully. grass in pastures were near dead and eaten almost to ^{the} ground. stock losing weight.

I done good and felt real good till of late. got to having That Sick stomach (Gastritis) and Arthritis in knees & joints, then pains below right ankle on right foot had quick pains, for several days.

one morning week before last I got up and couldn't put weight on right heel, found a dark place below ankle, a blood vessel had broke. I went to Dr. finally, got a shot in bottom of heel, eased it some but plenty of hurting yet, got med. for Arthritis. hope it helps.

(I'm sending you a clipping that Henry's Cousin had sent him, it got put away when we moved from ~~the~~ old house over the fence to our present house, (new house) so I came across it last week, it probably be of some help in the family tree, there should be some more letters some place,

Well I don't feel too good. I had a bad spell Monday morning, heart choked down I reason with Gas. my Cousin said I got white as a bed sheet. I know I felt as if I was a goner. my heart had fast running spells, I've had 4 spells this yr already, I hope to mention it to Dr when I go back in 2 more weeks.

It's near time to go milk & feed cows, & calves so will run along for now.

Well several days have passed by. Co. came from Houston, a cousin and Hub. & daughter, the man and girl been here working on an old house of theirs, they are leaving to morrow for Houston their home. They all helped me all along. and wasn't so bad.

we've had a shower of rain each past 2 nights, helps moisture along. and grass sure is growing fast.

If any of this information is of any value to you and you think they are related in some way to your Nelms, perhaps you could send to the County Clerk in Christian County for copies of some of the death records, marriage licenses or wills and deeds. I have been able to get quite a bit of information this way. If you do not have the information at hand on how to order these, let me know and I will send it to you.

I also received a letter from a Mrs. Carl (Viola) Baum, P.O. Box 962, Burney, Calif. 96013 in Bay asking for information on the Widick, White and Cooper families. I sent the information along to her regarding her family and had also added the Nelms line as it ties into the Widick and Cooper families. Perhaps you could write to her to see if she has followed through with the Nelms name.

Also notice in the Sept. '72 issue of the Halper-page 368-W31- there is a Leo W. Ware seeking information on the Nelms line. His address is 2913 East 3370 South, Salt Lake City, Utah 84109.

BISHOP Family

As I approach the end of this year late issue. This current article is added. Because it has greatly disturbed me and I feel that it should be publicized at the earliest possible time. It is written for use in this publication. However my circulation is only about 300 copies. In a hope for wider circulation, I invite other editors, to reprint it, or extract and make their own comments. Only wide circulation will help deter others who would seek to degrade good genealogists and cast dishonor upon the ancestors we are proud of.

On page 49 of the Sept.-Oct. 1972 issue of a bi monthly magazine "CHICAGO". Begins an article titled "How to grow yourself a family tree" author Dan Rottenberg. Outside a couple of emphasized remarks that I will treat later, the story could well be that of any one of several thousands of 3rd or 4th generation Polish Jews in Chicago. It cites few facts but in general it is a reasonable study of the methods to employ in tracing ones ancestry. However there is a note of humor added by an emphasized statement at the bottom of the page. "From the Garden of Eden to Chicago: One Family's Journey in Time" While we know that it has to be the beginning of all ancestries there are very few that are foolish enough to think it possible to do. And if it could be why I ask would anyone waste their time trying to prove that he is a 32nd cousin of someone else, that is a foregone conclusion.

Personally my interest is no farther back than those glorious men and women who 350 years ago braved the stormy seas in ships not much bigger than rowboats to plant the seeds of democracy on the shores of this greatest nation on earth and their descendants who a 150 years later bled and died to preserve those principles and establish this nation with freedom and justice for all.

Basically what aroused my ire is the fact that all through the article, the writer refers to our ancestors of whom we are proud as WASPS, and infers that they should be scorned. Certainly he does not realize that had it not been for these ancestors of ten and twelve generations ago, there would have been no land of bread and honey to welcome his ancestors of 3 or 4 generations ago. In my opinion the writer can be nothing less than a reactionary, with a heart full of ethnic and

Racial prejudice. This writer has often described himself as an unorthodox genealogist. It is my feeling that race, religion, politics and financial status are the individuals personal business. The family group sheet should be used and the the statistical information, should be as complete as possible, the dates and places of birth, death, marriage, together with the parents names are all that are important. Any thing else such as place of burial, sometimes occupation, if provable facts are helpfull but not necsssarily essential. I am a surname genealogist. My principle function is to accumulate data, cvaluate it and credit it to the proper line of descent from any one of hundreds of people named BISHOP who have migrated to this country since its beginnnng. I have no interest in their national origin, their religion, race or politics. Some of the various names that translate to Bishop are Bischoff, Biskup, Bishov, Leveque and many others.

Now it is time to take up the emphasized misstatements in the article. # 1 " The Newberry Library has the best genealogical collection between theEast Coast and Salt Lake City." rumors that what was written were not to well appreciated by people at Newberry have been heard. Perhaps they will not appreciate this evaluation of it either. In his text he points out the purposes for which Walter L. Newberry endowed the library That part is well and good, I feel sure Mr. Newberry had much pride in his ancestry and that of other founders of Chicago and this nation. What is wrong is that the writer likens it to a monument to those WASPS for whom he bears so much prejudice. He goes on to state, " So the half dozen or so WASPS left in Chicago have Newberry Libray as a splendid reminder of their bygone days of glory". Most certainly he does not realize that of the three and a half million population to which he credits Chicago, no less than 75% are intermarried with those terrible WASPs and now form the vast number of family tree climbers who are in search of their WASP ancestors as well as those of their lately arrived Polish, Jewish, Latin, Lithuanian or black ancestors. Here he probably got in bad with Newberry people was glorifying their collection. It is possible that he may have created a run on the library by amateur family tree climbers. Those of us in the know are well aware that this has long since been fact.

Newberry Library in days gone by was rated one of, if not the top genealogical library in the country. Like many other of the finer things about Chicago of the past, for the last quarter century has been deteriorating. Perhaps not in all respects, but in its original purpose that of a genealogical nature. It is doubtful if it is now numbered in the top twenty five. In this last quarter century genealogy has been advancing by leaps and bounds. The Mormon Church, Genealogical Society without a doubt holds 1st place. But more locally Fort Wayne (Ind.) Public Library is fast becoming # 2, financed by a federal grant, in very recent years it has come up fast. Presently it has an arrangement with Newberry where by it is either photo copying or micro filming the rarer publications in the Newberry collection. In addition many State Libraries such as Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, and others are now high on the list of good genealogical libraries. Not to mention cities like Milwaukee, Detroit, St. Louis and even tiny Valparaiso, Ind. has an amazing collection. Quite recently the CHICAGO GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, turned its collection over to the Winnetka Public Library, which has a librarian dedicated to genealogy and that institution is fast acquiring a good collection. Near by Wilmette is the seat of one of the branch libraries of the Mormon Church Society where the researcher can order micro film from the more than a million roll collection of the main library at Salt Lake City and read it at his leisure. Many other suburban libraries are building genealogical collections. With - in the last month a new library has been established on the campus of Thornton Community College at So. Holland, by the former So. COOK and No. WILL Counties Genealogical and Historical Society for which this writer is known as the founder. The name has also recently been changed to SOUTH SUBURBAN Genealogical & Historical Society. The average genealogist no longer depends on Newberry Library. Situated in a hard to get to location, with danger to personal life, and impossible parking situation. Hard put for time and money he prefers to drive a little further and be able to have better service with greater variety than now offered by Newberry. One thing that surprised me was that this writer did not mention the block square park across the street from Newberry which in the good old days was called "Bug House

Square. Also endowed to the public by some public spirited individual, (I don't have the time to check it.) Perhaps also by Mr. Walter L. Newberry. It was dedicated to our right of free speech. On a balmy summer evening as many as eight or ten persons of the type that the writer of the article I question appears to be, Could be found each on his own soap box expounding on the terrible circumstances that had been created by this writers pet peeve the WASPs who created our great country. That was half a century ago, more or less. Their audiences were mostly made up of WASPs who looked upon the activities as sort of a free three ring circus. Today those characters basking in the sun enjoying free college educations provided by the sons and daughters of those terrible WASPS, have taken their propaganda to the press in articles like the one I refer too. They find time while waiting for their welfare check to congregate at Newberry in search of the point where some little Russian or Polish Jew or some black man from the jungles of Africa has by virtue of the principles of demaocracy created by those terrible Wasps has permitted them to intermarry and now have that oncesy to point to in pride. The writer probably failed to find the point so adopted the fairy tale of his descendance from Adam and Eve.

Statement # 2 " A city full of descendants of immigrants and slaves now has the leisure to wonder where we came from and the self-confidence to assert our backgrounds." The leisure has always been there for those that had the desire to use it for a noble purpose. The costs were no greater comparably than they are today. An example is the collection this writer now owns that was made in the very late years of the last century and the first quarter of this one, by the grandfather of todays celebrated news commentator Paul Harvey, then an aged Civil War veteran struggling to eke an existance from a few acres of arid Kansas prairie. Poor soul, he did not live to publish, but since some 25 years after he passed on another dedicated family member who had enjoyed slightly better financial result from his labors in the slave market did publish it in part and the Lord willing I hope in my day to publish more of it.

Statement # 3. " Genealogy - hunting is a lonely hobby because nobody is likely to be interested in your particular family other than you and

your relatives." Why I ask, such a statement ? There are tens of thousands of people doing genealogy today. There are hundreds upon hundreds of genealogical societies. All willing and able to help you do your genealogy or climb your family tree. No less than twenty are nation-wide in there scope and coverage. Almost every one of the fifty states has a society geared to that particular states materials. Yet their membership is scattered over the country, due to the highly migratory make up of the present population. Time was when the movement was westward, an people sought their ancestors back in the east. That has all changed and now those in the south are searching in the north and west and those in the east all over the country.

In the state of Illinois there are now twenty five local societies. In the Chicago metropolitan area there are two. CHICAGO GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, P.O. Box, 1160, Chicago, IL. 60690 meets monthly at the M.C.A. College on Wacker Drive. Pres. Miss JUNE B. BAREKMAN a genealogist of national and international reputation. Second is the SOUTH COOK and NORTH WILL COUNTIES GENEALOGICAL and HISTORICAL SOCIETY. Recently renamed the SOUTH SUBURBAN G. & H. SOCIETY, P.O. Box 96, So. Holland, IL. 60473; Meets monthly in their library on the Campus of Thornton Community College, So. Holland. Pres. Mrs. BARBARA M. DAILEY, not yet as well known as Miss Barekman but growing fast in genealogical circles. The vast majority of societies publish a periodical devoted to usable source materials from their particular area. Membership fees may run as high as \$ 50.00 annually for some of the large national groups, but the average I would say for all societies is about \$ 5.00 per year and usually includes the publication.

Another large group is the family association or individual working on one surname. Here again the average yearly dues are about \$ 5.00 and also includes a periodical of which this is an example. Being the individual project of this writer.

There are also many commercial firms publishing genealogical materials in periodical form. The largest is the Genealogical Helper which has a circulation in excess of 20000 copies. Several devote much space to foreign source materials. Two that comes to mind are World Records, and Genealogy Club of America. Here again one can have a years subscription for from 5 to 7 dollars.

One of, if not the best of the latter type, periodical as well as possibly the longest in continuous publication is the American Genealogist. The late Donald Lines Jacobus, for many years known as the dean of genealogists, starting in 1922 done eight volumes on the "Ancient Families of New Haven" probably the best multi family genealogy of all time. (Of course devoted to Mr. Hottenberg's hated WASPs.) After which he became editor and publisher of American Genealogist, a position he continued in almost until his death a couple of years ago. When Dr. George E. Mc Cracken took over the editorship and it continues to be a very high class periodical in the field.

So in closing my remarks on the loneliness of a genealogist I want to say that any who are have only themselves to blame. I pride my self in the fact that mine is a WASP descent from one of those "Ancient Families of New Haven," traditional Connecticut Yankees, of independent natures, with the inclination to go through life as lone wolves. Due to this my younger years may have been some what lonely and my friends few and far between, now I count them in the thousands.

It is prsumable that some of the organizations and individuals mentioned above are among those that the writer was referring to when he made the statement, "There is no shortage of fast-buck operators anxious to cash in on the new American root-consciousness". There is nothing new about the interest in genealogy. It has always been there among those whom Webster described when he said "He that careth not from whence he came, careth little wither he goeth." The greater interest of today is reflected in the larger population and the better economic situation of the average person thanks to our WASP ancestors who established this nation and its democratic principles. The writer mentions the professional who charges \$ 5.00 and up. a very few of these may be chislers but on the average the professional is a good buy at any price, because he knows the short cuts and can in the long run save you money. The only real chisler general in operation is the peddler of false coats of arms. Personally I sell a Bishop Coat of Arms but with a definite staement that it is only that, not that it belongs to any individual. Then there is an occasional character such as the reprinted item on page 189, whom we seek to stop just as we do these that try to degrade us anf this great work.

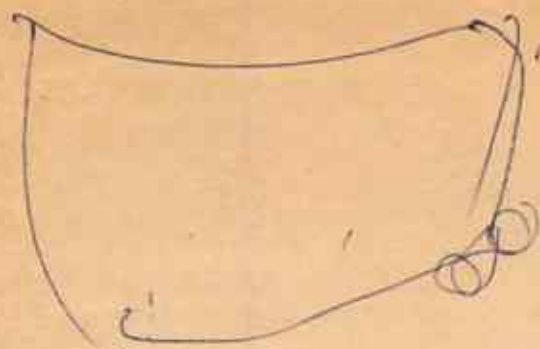

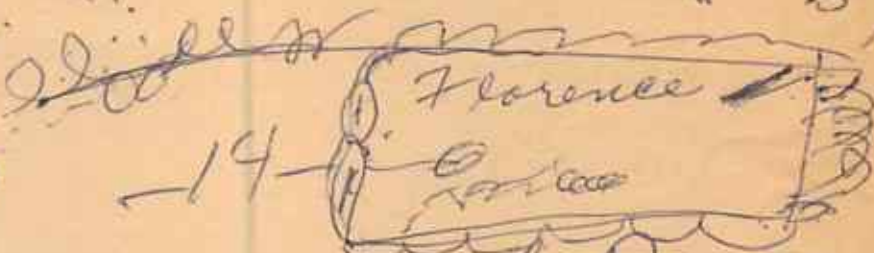

Thanks for your recent letter with the items of RICKMAN data.

As it happens, I have the same data from Sumner Co., Tennessee, but still appreciate your sending it, for I'd rather have it twice than not at all.

However, one item was new to me, but you failed to mention the name. Will you please check your records and let me know? Here is what you wrote:

In Jackson Co., Tenn., 1802 Tax List, Roll 5, Tenn. State Archives
O W P this is none WP what that is is not given.
640 acres in Capt. Jabez Fitzgerald's Co.

My understanding of this information is that he had no WP (whitespoll), although he owned 640 acres of land. Men under a certain age (I'm not sure, but probably 16 or 18) and over a certain age (probably 60 - I don't know) did not have to pay poll tax. So, if a man owned land but paid no poll tax, he was either under or over the age, and in the case of a man's owning 640 acres, he was undoubtedly over the age.

If you have notes on this, please send me the name of the man for whom the data is given. But please don't go read the microfilm again, for that is a great deal of trouble.

I have made no further progress on my Rickman line, but will continue to work on it. If I should learn anything further about the NELMS family, I will advise you.

Enclosed is a postcard addressed to me -- to make it easier for you to send me the name requested. Thanks.

Thank you for your recent note and the page on the PRIOR family. Actually, I do not work on my husband's family (he's retired and has as much or more free time than I have); also, his grandfather came to San Francisco in 1852 from England, so what little work we have done on his line has been in England. I am returning your page, just in case you may want to send it to someone else.

Is your NELMS line related to the Hollands? Sarah Rickman Holland, b. 8-19-1797, Greene Co., Ga., d. 1-12-1865 in Texas. She married 12-28-1815 Samuel Hardy Nelms (d. 1838, Perry Co., ^{Ala.}), son of Niol and Nancy Hardy Nelms.

Thomas Holland, father of Sarah, married Phoebe RICKMAN, probably in Nansemond Co., Virginia, ante 1779. Migrated to Georgia, Alabama, and some descendants to Tennessee or Texas.

My interest is particularly in the Rickmans, but I've had so much difficulty with that line that I have begun working on related lines in an effort to learn anything about the Rickmans. Do you find any mention of the name RICKMAN in your research data or correspondence?


If you find, or suspect, that your Nelms are related to the Hollands, you will find the Holland-Jackson Genealogy very valuable. I copied a few pages from it at a library in San Francisco because of the Rickman connection.

I have a good deal of notes on the Hollands, but all I have on the Nelms is in the above mentioned genealogy.

I hope that you can help me somehow with my Rickmans, who, incidentally, ended up in Texas in the early 1800's. My mother, Beulah Mae Rickman, was born in Collin County, Texas.

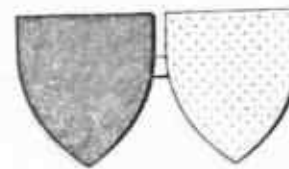
TINCTURES.

Armorial insignia consist for the most part of one or more objects called "charges," depicted on a *field*, i.e. the escutcheon which represents the knightly shield, and whose points have been already explained. One coat of arms differs from another, not by the differences of the charges only, but by differences of colour; or, more correctly speaking, of tincture, both in the charges and in the field. The field may be of one, or of more than one tincture, divided by the partition lines hereafter to be explained, which are represented on page 75. The tinctures used in British Heraldry are nine in number; and comprise two metals, five colours, and two furs. Of these furs there are several variations to be noted presently.

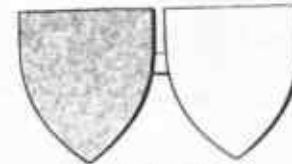
The metals are *Or*, that is gold, Plate III., fig. 1; and *Argent*, that is silver, fig. 2; in painting these are often represented by the colours yellow and white; but they are more properly represented by the actual metals.

The colours are red, known as *gules*; blue, known as *azure*; black, as *sable*; green, as *vert*; purple, as *purpure*. The French equivalents are, *d'azur*, *de gueules*, *de sable*, *de sinople*, *de purpure*.

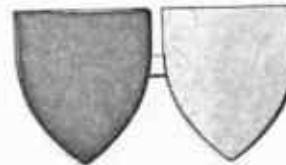
Besides these are two other colours mentioned in old heraldic treatises—orange, known as *tenny* or *tenné*, and blood colour, termed *sanguine*. These last occur so rarely in British Heraldry as to be scarcely worthy of enumeration with the other five. They were intended by the old heralds to be used in the system of "abate-ments" which they had invented, and of which some



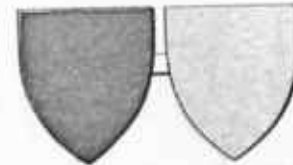

You may recall that we corresponded about two years ago regarding the Nelms family.

I am sorry that I do not have a copy of my last letter to you, so I don't remember what information I gave you. I have found some more information, so I will just bring you up to date.

My great-great-grandfather, James H. Nelms, was born in Indian Territory (later to become Troup County, Georgia) on March 9, 1818. According to later census records, both his parents had been born in Georgia.

James married Francis D. Pierce at DeKalb, Kemper County, Mississippi, on July 23, 1840. They moved to Texas in 1845, settling at Henderson, Rusk County.

James died in Denison, Grayson County, Texas, on April 4, 1891. Francis died there on Feb. 6, 1897.

I have succeeded in tracing nearly all of their direct descendants, about 230 persons. None of them, except myself, know anything of the family's origins.

I have run across a Joseph Horace Nelms who, in a newspaper article, was identified as my great-grandfather's first cousin, making him the son of James H. Nelms' brother.

Joseph was born on June 28, 1848, in Mississippi. He married Lillian Hudson of Panola County, Mississippi. He died in Greenville, Mississippi, on May 13, 1916.

One of James' grandsons was named Horace. It may be that that was just a popular name in those days, but I have wondered if two Horaces in the family might not be a clue to some ancestor.

You mentioned in your letter of March 31, 1975, that you have three censuses from Mississippi counties where the head of the household is from Georgia and in the age bracket of my GGGF; also the names of the Nelms in Georgia and the counties where they lived 1756-1909. I would like to see those.

I know of no Nelms family history in Dallas. My family has been here since 1872, so I know most of the old ones. There was another family of Nelms here, but I don't know if they were interested in genealogy or not. Ocie Lee Nelms and his brother, Bennie Buell Nelms, are both deceased. I think that Bennie did sell cars at one time. O.L., who ran an ad daily in the newspaper for many years ("Thank you, Dallas, for helping O.L. Nelms make another million."), started out in the candy and tobacco business, but made his fortune in real estate.

If you have any other information on the early Nelms and their origins, I would surely appreciate a copy. If you are interested in James H. Nelms and his descendants, I would be happy to send you what I have.

Thank you for your response to my inquiry.

Yes, the Nelms mentioned in the 1870 census of Rusk County, Texas, are my great-great-grandparents and their family.

My g/g/gf, James H. Nelms, was born in Troup County, Georgia, on March 9, 1818. According to a Mexican War Pension application he made, his parents were also born in Georgia. I do not know their names or whether they had other children. I do know that my great-grandfather, Richard Runnels Nelms, referred to Joseph Horace Nelms as his cousin. Joseph was born June 28, 1848, in Mississippi. He married Lillian L. Hudson of Panola County. They moved from Batesville, Mississippi, to Greenville, Mississippi, about 1888. He died there on May 13, 1916. He is memorialized by a window in St. James Episcopal Church in Greenville. Evidently, they had no children.

James H. Nelms married Frances D. Pierce in DeKalb, Kemper County, Mississippi, on July 23, 1840. In 1845 they moved to Henderson, Rusk County, Texas. Between 1872 and 1873 they lived in Longview, Corsicana, Dallas, and Red River City, Texas, following the railroads which were just coming into North Texas. In 1873 they settled in Denison, Grayson County, Texas. He died there on April 4, 1891, at the age of 73 years, 26 days.

James and Frances had fourteen children, six of whom lived to maturity. I know the names of only eight of them: James A., John, William, Fannie, Richard Runnels, Harry Hobbs, Pauline, and Thomas A.

I am presently tracing all of the descendants of James H. and Frances and am well on the way to completion of the task. If you are interested, I will send you a copy when I have finished. From my investigations thus far I have learned that nobody in the family knows anything about the family history. What I have dug up is about all that is known.

I have seen a copy of the book on the Nelms of Fannin County, Texas, but was unable to draw any connection.

There was another Nelms family here in Dallas for many years, but O.L. Nelms and his brother ~~Bobbie~~ *Bennie* Buell Nelms both died in the past year. I always heard that their family had come from Tennessee.

As you know, most of the early Georgia census records are missing. In 1820 there was no Troup County; it was created in 1826. At the time of James H. Nelms' birth it was Indian Territory.

There are no Nelms in the 1840 Troup County census, nor are there any in the 1830 census. Neither were there any in the 1850 Kemper County, Mississippi, census (of course, my family had left for Texas by that time). There are no Nelms in the 1850 Mississippi Mortality Schedules either.

If any of this information helps you to break the riddle, please let me know. I am desperate for information myself.

It was nice hearing from you. Genealogists are the friendliest people.

Again, thank you for writing.

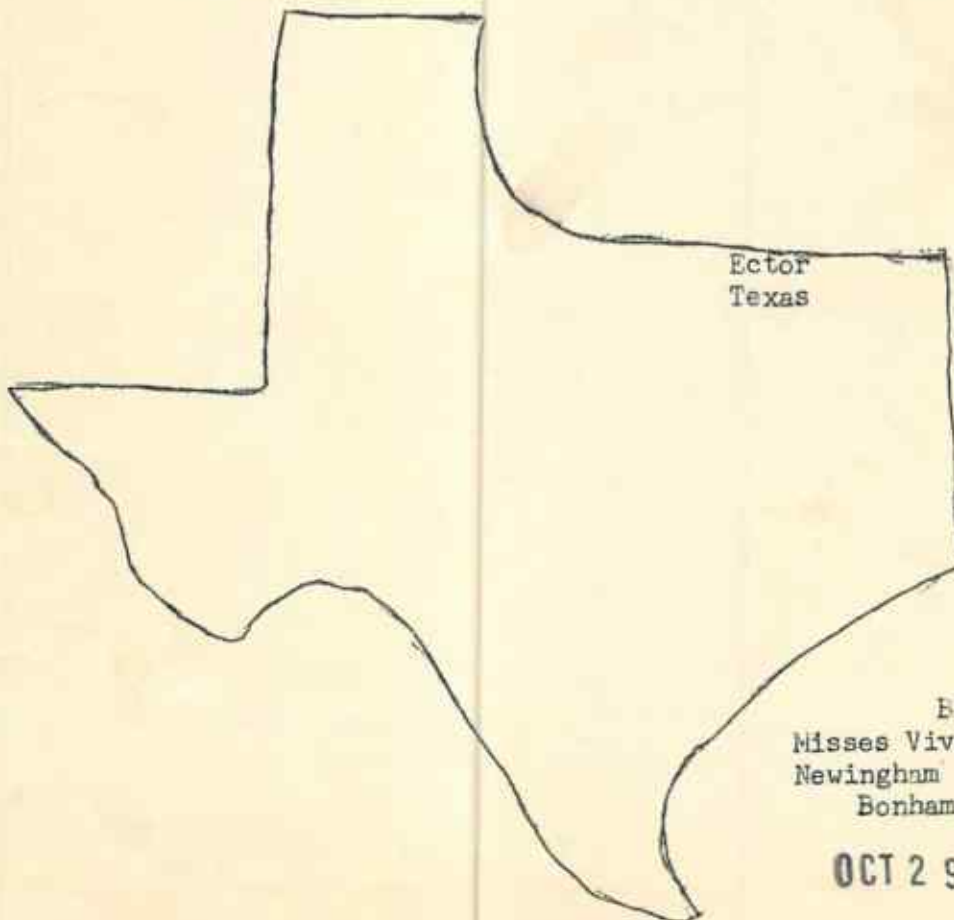

John Archibald Nelms , a Methodist Minister, was born in 1797 in Virginia. He died July 22, 1867 at his home at Ector Texas. and is buried in Carson cemetery at Ector Texas. He was a Circuit rider in Fannin County Texas in the early days. He married Mary Bell Crain who was born December 18, 1793 in Tennessee. she died August 5, 1874 at her home at Ector Texas. and is buried in Carson cemetery at Ector Texas.

Reverend John A. Nelms was a Methodist Minister and also a Shoe and Boot maker. He and his wife, Mary Bell Crain Nelms, came with their family from Kentucky to Texas in 1842. They lived in Dallas for awhile and then moved to Bonham, Fannin County, Texas in 1845. Bonham is 12 miles from Red river and Red river separates Texas and Oklahoma.

When John Archibald Nelms and his family moved to Bonham Texas there were only about 75 families living there. He and his two oldest sons went into the Shoe and Boot business for two years, then the married son went into the saddle business.

Reverend John A. Nelms and wife settled on land where they built a home six miles west of Bonham Texas and two miles northeast of Ector Texas , where they lived the remaining years of their life.

Their son, Christopher Columbus Nelms, (C.C. Nelms) settled on land at Ector Texas He came to Texas in 1842 with his parents and sisters and brothers in a covered wagon drawn by oxen.

C.C. Nelms married Delilah Damron January 24, 1856 at Ector Texas . C.C. Nelms built the first house at Ector Texas where he and his wife's children were all born and reared. C.C. and Delilah Nelms lived their entire married life together in that house . They were married 55 years when C.C. Nelms died in 1911. Delilah Damron Nelms died in 1912.

She was buried in a white dress, with her white bible in her right hand and a white carnation in her left hand, a symbol of the beautiful life she lived. She had always requested for many, many years that she be buried in white.

John Edwin Allen was a cowboy in his youth and rode the range for many years. riding herd on the cattle and helping at the round-ups. Then he and Mr Cain were in partners together for many years in a ranch across Red river over in Oklahoma where they raised cattle. They rounded up the last herd of wild horses in the Indian Territory in Oklahoma. Allen Duckworth, nephew of John Edwin Allen used to help him and Mr Cain when they would round up the herds of wild horses in Oklahoma territory.

Ed Allen and Mr Cain went to and fro from their homes in Fannin County, Texas to their ranch and cattle business in Oklahoma. Always coming home on week-ends (Red river separates Texas and Oklahoma. Ector is about 8 miles from Red river Bonham Texas is 12 miles from Red river)

The great flood of 1908 washed away all their cattle and outbuildings as they all went floating down Red river. and they had to start all over again in their cattle business. They quit ranching in Oklahoma in 1920. They farmed in the later years of their life in Fannin County, Texas. John Edwin (Ed) Allen was a native of Ector, Fannin County, Texas and lived his entire life there.

John Edwin (Ed) Allen and Delilah Catherine (Katie) Nelms Allen, our beloved great grandfather and our beloved great grandmother, were school day sweethearts. They were both born and reared at Ector, Fannin County, Texas and both lived their entire life there at Ector Texas. They both attended the First Methodist Church at Ector Texas and both attended the same school there at Ector Texas. (Ector is only about 500 population and only has one Public school) They were both lifelong Methodists and were members of the First Methodist Church at Ector Texas

Aunt Kate, as she was called by everyone, professed religion and took the Vows of the First Methodist Church at Ector Texas in 1885 when she was 13 years old. Her daughter, Juanita, took the Vows of the same Church in 1917 when she was 8 years old. Our beloved great grandmother, Delilah Catherine Nelms Allen, lived every day of her life for Christ, so did our beloved greatgrandfather, John Edwin Allen. Every one knew him as Ed. Ed and Kate Allen were both from the best and most respected family and the oldest pioneer families in Fannin County, Texas. They were both loved and respected by all who knew them. They were a friend to all. and always lent a helping hand to all those who were in need.

All ten of Ed and Katie Allen's children were born and reared at Ector Texas. (Fannin County) and all ten of their children attended the same First Methodist Church and attended the same school at Ector, Fannin County, Texas that they attended.

May 1943

Dear Mom:

by the time this reaches you it may be past Mother's Day but I want you to know I am thinking of you and will be thinking of you on that day.

Of all the things you did with your dear little toiled and worn hands. The prayers and tears you've shed over our fevered brows. The times you've dried our eyes and kissed our dirty chubby little hands when they were hurt. When and as I think of you and all you've did and cared for me I cannot restrain the tears from flowing down my cheeks. At daybreak this morning, while I was on watch high upon this ship, a light came through the clouds and I immediately thought of Mother.

It was like a Blessing sent from heaven and like you have always been to me. Before very long, I'll be attmy destination and this trip has had its trials and its triumphs.

Remember, I love and cherish Mother in all I do.

Pony.

"Pony" is what his beloved father and his beloved mother always called him all through his childhood years. and even after he was grown. All his sisters and brothers called him Pony. His brother, Stanley, was called "Tubby" after an Indian Chief in Oklahoma named "May-Tubby" who was a friend to their father when he was in the Ranch and cattle business in Oklahoma. Juanita was called "Wanie" by her parents when she was growing up and then when she was grown they called her Nita.

GEORGE DAMRON

Born 1796 in Tennessee. He died December 1849 at his home northeast of Ector Texas. He is buried in Carson cemetery at Ector Texas

He married Delilah Fisher who was born 1798 in Kentucky. she died December 11, 1857 at her home northeast of Ector Texas. she is buried in Carson cemetery at Ector Texas. They married in 1816.

In 1829, George Damron and his wife, Delilah Fisher Damron and their children came to Bonham, Fannin County, Texas. with Bailey English and his family and several other families, among whom was Dr. Wm. Hunter and his family. Delilah Fisher Damron Bailey English and Dr, Hunter were all cousins.

George Damron, Bailey English and several other men built Fort English, a stockade fort with several buildings inside of it, at Bonham, Fannin County, Texas. in 1836.

George Damron and his family were the first settler near Caney creek, northeast of Ector Texas and six miles west of Bonham Texas. They built a log cabin there and their daughter, Delilah Catherine Damron, was built in that log cabin April 18, 1837. The farm is now owned by Euil Ramey and wife, Nita Clayton Ramey.

George Damron was a man of many talents. He was a Road Engineer. He was also an Indian fighter, and a man prominent in civic affairs of the settlement. He was a charter member of the Masonic Lodge of the community around Fort English in Fannin County, Texas.

He was appointed to build the Rocky Ford toll bridge across Red river north of Bonham Texas in 1839. He and three other men completed it in 1840. He also was appointed to build the old Jefferson-Warren trade road. Joseph Swagerty, Daniel Montague were also appointed to help build the road.

In November 1838, George Damron received a Headright certificate for 1280 acres of land northeast of Ector, Fannin County, Texas. where he and his wife, Delilah Catherine Fisher Damron settled and spent their last days. The farm in later years was owned by Jake Fitch and wife.

Moses Damron moved to Jack County Texas from Fannin County, Texas in the middle 1800's. He built the first school house in Jack County, Texas. It is being used to day for a Church house. It is 13 miles northeast of Jacksboro Texas. Moses and Julia, his first wife, settled on the Wichita river north of Seymour Texas. He built a ranch house there and raised cattle. He is listed in the 1860 Jack County Texas census as a stock raiser. and that he had real estate valued at \$450.00 and personal estate valued at \$3,500.00 which was cattle.

Moses Damron was a Scout for Randal McKinsie in his fight against the Indians in west Texas. They had a camp near Quitaque Texas about 40 miles northeast of Matador Texas.

After the death of Moses Damron's first wife, Julia Damron, he married 2nd. *Salitha*

Ann Raines at Jacksboro Texas. She was born Aug. 21, 1844 ^{May Ann} at Corsicana, Navarro County, Texas. She was the daughter of John and ~~John~~ Raines. They moved to Jack County, Texas from Corsicana Texas in 1854. Mary Ann Raines was half Cherokee.

Her father, John Edwin Allen died at his home northeast of Ector Texas. In June, 1960, she took a picture of her mother, Mrs John Edwin Allen, sitting in her porch swing, and a large Kotalpo tree was in bloom by the front porch. and in the picture, you can see the sunshine on the white flowers of the Kotalpo tree. Mrs John Edwin (Katie) Allen died 4 months later, in October 1960. In June 1961, two zinnia bushes sprung up through the grass under Juanita's bedroom window. no flowers had ever been planted there. they bloomed all summer long.

He fought in the great battle of Brandywine where his Captain fell and 1st Lt. John Blackwell took command. He was also in the action at Germantown and was in the battle at Monmouth Courthouse. He was also in the siege of Charleston, where he was taken prisoner.

During part of the time he was a prisoner, he was confined on a ship which was built by the enemy on a small island in Charleston bay which was under water in high tide. Sometime in 1781 he was exchanged as a prisoner and was sent to Virginia where he later received a discharge from the Army in 1782.

In 1819, he moved with his family, from Virginia, to Lebanon, Wilson County, Tennessee.

They rounded up the last herd of wild horses in the Indian territory in Oklahoma. (Ed Allen's Nephew, Allen Duckworth , used to help him round up wild horses in the Indian territory in Oklahoma). John Edwin (Ed) Allen and Mr Cain went to and fro from their homes in Fannin County, Texas to their ranch and cattle business in Oklahoma. Always coming home on the weekends (Red river separates Texas and Oklahoma) Ector is about 8 miles from Red river and Bonham is 12 miles from Red river.

Ed Allen used to tell his daughter, Nita, when she was a little girl, how he used to sit around the campfires with the Indians in their camps in Oklahoma and he showed her how he used to dance with them around their campfires.

John Edwin Allen and his wife, Delilah Catherine Nelms Allen (Ed and Kate) our beloved great grand parents, were school day sweethearts. They were both born and reared at Ector Texas and spent their entire life at Ector Texas except for the time he spent at his ranch in Oklahoma but even then, he was always home on weekends. They both attended the First Methodist Church at Ector Texas and attended the same School at Ector Texas. (Ector only has one school and it only has a population of about 500 persons.)

Ed and Katie Allen were both lifelong members of the First Methodist Church at Ector Texas . Aunt Kate, as she was called by everyone, professed religion and took the Vows of the Methodist church at Ector Texas in 1885 when she was 13 years old.

She lived every day of her life for Christ. so did her beloved husband, Ed Allen Everyone knew him as Ed. Ed and Kate Allen were both from the best and oldest and most respected families in Fannin County, Texas. They were loved and respected by all who knew them. They were a friend to all. They always lent a helping hand to all those who were in need.

All ten of Ed and Katie Allen's children were born and reared at Ector Texas. (Fannin County) and all ten of their children attended the same First Methodist Church at Ector Texas and also attended the same Public School that their parents attended at Ector Texas.
