



When Caesar invaded Britain he found a brave, fearless race of people, who in religion were followers of the Druid Priests, and were worshippers of the mistletoe, and believed that there was no heaven but for the brave, and that in heaven they would drink wine out of the skulls of the enemies they slew in open, manly combat.

To keep this brave and patriotic race subdued he built many military roads, and built them so well that many are still used; and so well did he locate his military camps that many of them became great cities; and among others the city and county of Leischester.

The county of Leischester is an inland county, about ninety miles northwest of London, and in shape, an irregular hexagon, about forty four miles long and forty miles wide. The surface is an undulating table land, the highest point being the Charnwood Hills, with an elevation of about nine hundred feet and is also traversed by some small rivers and two canals.

From the old aborigines of Briton, mixed with the blood of Teutonic invaders, the Pate race sprang up from the county of Leischester.

When sur-names were universally adopted, people who lived near crossing places of rivers were called Fords; people who were workers of iron, gold or silver were called Smiths; the garment makers were called Taylors; and such was the rule, with few exceptions. But not so with the Pates, as only one family adopted the sur-name, which in middle-English, meant a bald head.

In nideaval days they were known as feudal lords and brave soldiers. From the fifteenth to the seventeenth centuries they were English Barons. Their pedigree, coat of arms and family motto can be obtained from the Herald's College, London, E.C., Queen Victoria Street for about thirty-two dollars. The Pate arms: a stag's head, decorated or attired, and between the antlers, a raven with outstretched wings.

When the fame of the New World was spread abroad in Europe, many sons of wealth and nobility came to enhance their fortunes; so came Richard Pate, son of a former Lord Pate and brother of Sir John Pate, baron of Leicestershire, and entered 1,141 acres of land on the north side of The York River in Gloucester County, Virginia, December 12, 1650, and in 1657 represented Gloucester County in the House of Burgesses, and died in 1657, and having no family in America, his brother, Sir John Pate's son, John Pate, administered the estate.

John Pate was a man of much prominence, and a large land owner, and in addition to what he had accumulated and inherited, was granted 10,500 acres; was appointed Justice of the Peace (a County Court judge) for Gloucester County in 1660; and was a member of the Council of Virginia when he died in 1672 (Henning Statutes, II, 15).

His wife, not residing in this country, his father's younger son, Colonel Thomas Pate, was appointed administrator. (General Court Records, the Virginia Historical Magazine, etc.).

It was at Major Thomas Pate's house in Petsworth Parish that Nathaniel Bacon, the denounced but patriotic rebel leader, died October, 1676.

It was but natural that Major Pate should take sides with the common people against the tyranny of Governor William Berkeley, as his father, Sir John Pate, Baron of Leicestershire, England, did against the infamous rule of King Charles the First.

Bishop Beilby Porteus (from which line descends Queen Mother Elizabeth the second of England, M. McC.) had a painting of this home, of which he was very proud (William & Mary College Quarterly, Volume #4, page #268).

Major Thomas Pate was an English emigrant, son of Sir John Pate, who was created a baron of Leicestershire, England, in 1643, at the death of his father (according to a letter to me from Everard Green, Herald's Collège).

From Major Thomas Pate, all the Virginia Pates and their descendants sprang. (So says Lyon Gardinier Tyler, President of William and Mary College (and esteemed genealogist, M. McC.), in a letter to me (Professor John Ben Pate of Atlanta, Georgia).

Major Thomas Pate was Justice for Gloucester County in 1686; he and his wife, Elizabeth, had issue: one son named Mathew, who was baptized February 20, 1686 (Abingdon Parish register).

Mathew married Anne Reade, dau. of Francis Reade, son of George Reade, and reared a large family:

1. *Jacob, b. ca. 1710, m. Zilla Broach. He moved to North Carolina, probably about 1760, and was an Indian fighter of note. It is said that with the aid of his wife in re-loading guns for him, that he killed seven Indians, after which they withdrew the siege of his home. He lived to a happy old age, and was buried doubtless in the upper part of Georgia, as he followed the best cattle range. He had issue.
2. *Jeremiah, b. ca. 1713, married a Miss Bender. One son, Mathew, b. ca. 1743, and married Elizabeth Cardwell. Their only daughter, Nancy, born about 1780, m. Charles Corling and had, among other children, Elizabeth, born about 1810 and married William Wilson Levering of Baltimore, April 22, 1826. William died in Petersburg, Virginia, July 17, '829; she died 1840 (per letter by nephew, Joshua Levering of Baltimore, Maryland)..
3. *Elizabeth, b. ca. 1718, m. James Shelburn and had issue.
4. *Rachel, b. ca. 1719; married (1) Robert Robinson; (2), John Warrington, and had issue by each husband.
5. *Sarah, born ca. 1721, married William Anderson February 18, 1737 and had many descendants in Virginia. Robert Anderson of Williamsburg, who died in 1838, had gathered up much family history and was their grandson.
6. *Mathew, b. ca. 1725, m. Miss Buck ca. 1749 and had son, Mathew, born ca. 1750 and two daughters, Elizabeth, b. ca. 1756 and Rebecca, born ca. 1758, and doubtless two more sons, Richard, born ca. 1752 and Anthony, b. ca. 1754! both soldiers in the American Revolutionary War. Rev. Thomas was youngest son. In the D.A.R. Index: Anthony d. 1815; m. Sarah - - - Captain of Va.

Robert Christian, (2) Julia Gardinier of the famous New York family; Lyon, youngest son, never met or corresponded with Letitia's oldest son, Robert. Lyon's widow published the last volumes of Tyler's Quarterly. M. McC.).

VII Reverend William married Miss Weatherby ca. 1774; had daughter, Phoebe, but died soon after, Phoebe was given to her mother's people and during the war they moved away, and Reverend William was never able to find her. On 29 January, 1777 he volunteered for a term of three years, and served in Captain Robert Fenner's company, -2nd North Carolina Battallion, commanded by Col. John Patton. Was stationed at White Plains, North Carolina, September 9, 1778 in the adjutant's office. The old powder horn then used is in the possession of A. and S.E. Pate of Amboy, Georgia. Thomas, uncle to William, Richard, Anthony, Mathew (first cousin to William) served in the war from Virginia. William married again ca. 1785. Issue:

Reverend William Pate moved to the upper part of Georgia soon AFTER THE Revolutionary War, with his father and some of his brothers, but most of his brothers moved to the westward; they possessed great herds of cattle and other live stock and always hunted the best pasture lands. He lived for a while in Gwinette County, and on moving away, perhaps, left a brother, at least a nephew, bearing his own name, William, who was a member of the first Grand jury of Gwinnett County, and one niece, Mrs. Smith.

Jeremiah, son of Mathew Pate, had a grandson, Robert W. Pate, D.A.R. #72389 John Christian, b. 1752, died 1792, in Kentucky, married Judith, granddaughter of Mathew Pate and daughter of Jacob Pate of Hanover County, Virginia (Virginia Magazine, H. & B., vol. #8, #1, pp. 100-104).

Laura Nelson Christian, daughter of Dr. William Henry Browne Christian, born Campbell County, Virginia, 1829, married, aged 18 years, Robert William Pate of Halifax County, Virginia, of this English baron line, He was a large tobacco grower near Lynchburg, Virginia, where Laura her mother and sibs then lived, Shortly after the marriage, he leased his plantation,

to take charge of a government commissary office in Richmond, Virginia, and while in pursuit of his duties, he contracted pneumonia and died. 1868, so Laura came to Lecompton, Kansas, where her brother in law, Daniel Woodson, was Secretary of Kansas Territory, and actual Governor during some of the troublous times when Governor Reeder was away.

There, she later married as third wife, George W. Zinn, who had represented Douglas County in the first Constitutional Convention of 1857. They were married July 25, 1877. George was born in Indiana, December 21, 1809.

After his death, Laura was for several years postmistress of Lecompton, but failing health forced her to retire. She was laid to rest beside him in Maple Grove Cemetery. married William Henry Vernon, a Quaker, born near Marietta, Ohio, February 6, 1852, son of Joseph Vernon of Athens County, a near relative of Secretary of War Edwin Stanton of Douglas County, Kansas and Civil War memory. William came to Kansas with his parents, spending his youthful years in Douglas County, Kansas, near Lawrence. Aged fourteen years, in 1866, he attended Missouri State Normal School at Kirksville. Before the age of sixteen years, he taught school at Perry, Kansas, and studied law in the office of Thatcher and Stevens, his instructor being the noted Solon D. Thatcher. He tries his first case in Douglas County successfully. Most of his practise was before the Land Office. In the fall of '75 he went to Larned, Kansas, etc., becoming associated with William C. Edwards, deceased. For the past forty-five years he was Dean of the Shawnee County Bar. An able pleader, he drafted the first town ordinances. He was a quiet, reserved man, almost stern - he was devoted to his family. A Quaker until 1878, but he always wore a black frock coat. a precisinist at law. He passed away at home, 1021 Broadway, Tuesday evening at 6:52 P.M., aged 70 years, four months, and twenty six days, after a long illness, having suffered several strokes. Bright's disease caused his death. Services were by the Presbyterian Church, Masonic Lodge, and his friends for forty years. Judge Eric Cole of Great Bend opened the address. Vernon issue:

He is straight, and with the peppiest, happiest pair of eyes, rather deep-set you ever saw. He is a darling. He came over to aunt Alice's for a few minutes and I fell in love with him. His wife, Emma, nee Brooks, died last June. A religious fanatic, and Watt a martyr. She was extremely difficult. Religion came first; the family and husband a poor second. His daughter Pauline, took care of her (senile decay) for the last five years, and now she has collapsed - can't sleep. One

She resides at 1958 Estrella Avenue, Los Angeles, an apartment, with her daughter, Laura, a pathetic person. Her husband is A GRADE "a" scoundrel, though. He ditched her. I can see why - a whiney, quëllilous way of talking, and scrawny, and she stoops. They are poor. She took up Christian Science, uncle All deserted Alice for that queer religion of his, so she made a life for herself. But Laura just mopes.

Laura's beautiful daughter, Virginia, married beneath her. He is a half-breed Indian, half Welch and Irish; an attendant at a gas station. Virginia had an incubator baby. It is doing nicely and will soon be home. Alice doesn't like her grandson in law. Aunt Alice is a dear person. Cousin Laura has died. Her son, Vernon, got me to cash his rubber check for thirty dollars; he died of heart trouble. The other son has heart trouble, too. He resides in Portland, Oregon, with his second wife - his first wife and childreh probably reside in Los Angeles. She is a nurse. Estelle is in Portland now, visiting them, and she will come back to L.A. to see her daughter in law and grandson. She likes them. better than the son's wife #2. Estelle's second husband died fairly recently, so she is alone. She fell, broke her hip, was in the hospital for fourteen months and is just getting around and used to crutches.
