544 LEVI RISLEY (Elijah⁵, Moses⁴, Jonathan³, Richard², Richard¹) born 14 June 1805, at Cazenovia, Madison Co., NY a son of Flijah Sr and Pheobe (Bills) Risley, he died 29 June 1889, Chicago, IL. He was married, 24 December 1834, at Forrestville, NY to Sophia Ann Darling who was born 15 January 1811, Rutland, VT and died 4 April 1891, Chicago, IL. Levi went to Fredonia Chautauqua Co. NY with his father and brothers. He was noted for his honesty and his ability in the field of horticulture. In partnership with his brothers the Risley Seed Company, of Fredonia was formed and it became a most successful business. In 1859, Levi removed to Cedar Rapids, IA where he purchased a large farm, in 1876 he sold the farm and moved to Chicago, where Levi and Sophia lived the rest of their lives. They are buried in the family plot in the Forest Home cemetery, in Chicago, the stones for them at Fredoria are memorial only. The children were all born at Fredionia, excepting Alice.

JAMESON RISLEY (Richard⁵, Richard⁴, Jonathan³, Richard², Richard¹) born 13 February 1787, at East Hartford, CT, a son of Richard and Deborah (Cook) Risley, he was baptised at the First Congregational Church of East Hartford on 18 February 1787. 

WHEN WE WENT WEST By Rev. William David Risley



The following is taken from a narrative of the author's life written in the 1920's. He was an ordained Baptist Minister and dairy farmer at Alsea, Oregon where he died in 1946.

I was born near Blairstown, Benton County, Iowa, January 11, 1868, son of John M. Sr and Malinda (Israel) Risley [No. 460 D.R.R.]. The thermometer was 26 degrees below zero, so I can truthfully say that I have had a dislike for cold weather from my birth.

When I was two years old my father moved with the family of which I was the 7th child, from Benton Co. Iowa to Marion County, Kansas, and took a homestead there where for five years he prospered as a cattleman. In 1875, in September, he sold out and came to Oregon bringing his family on an emigrant train by way of Sacramento and San Francisco. On our reaching Sacramento, the terminus of the railroad at that time, the passengers of the immigrant train together with their belongings were transferred to a steamboat which was to convey us down river to San Francisco. The steamboat had not gotten out of sight of the town when it grounded on a sand spit in the river. There the boat stuck and all efforts of the managers to extract her and float her to deeper water were in vain. So from the Claremont, for that was the name of the steamboat on which we had embarked, we were all transfered to a flat boat, which they called a barge. This barge with its precious cargo was turned loose to drift down the Sacramento River with the hope of meeting another steamboat at some point in the river between the capitol city and San Francisco Bay, which would pick us up and carry us to the city of San Francisco.

It was about the middle of the forenoon when our barge was loaded and pushed out into the middle of the stream and we began to move on in our journey westward down the river. The sun shone exceedingly hot and we had no shade except for a few parasols carried by some of the ladies. Trunks, baggage, boxes, bedding, and men, women and children these were all there was on that flatboat. No shelter, no shade, no toilet, nothing to eat or drink, not even a place to sit down, and I well remember that for the most part the people stood up most of the time. It was extremely tiresome to say the least. Imagine our relief and delight to see, just before night fell, the long looked for steamboat come in sight around the bend in the river. How we rejoiced to see that splendid craft come puffing up against the current to our rescue.

The transfer of the passengers from the barge to the steamboat was a rather exciting experience for some of us at least. The barge was lashed along side the steamer and a gangplank, a two by ten, ten feet long, was placed near the rear of the boats. This, owing to the curvature of the steamer, left an opening between the boats at the gangplank of about five or six feet. To this gangplank there were no bannisters except a big black negro at the barge end and a "green" deckhand at the other end of it. These men by stretching their arms as far as they could reach managed to balance the passengers up the plank which stood at an angle of about 30 degrees because the barge was so much lower than the steamboat. This operation was very dangerous, and it looked all the more so to people from the prairies who were not accustomed to water transportation. Some of these people had never before seen a skiff or a scow to say nothing of a barge or steamboat.

The passemgers, some seventy five or a hundred, were so anxious to get off that old barge that they jostled one another and crouded the helpers somewhat in their rush for the gangplank. I shall never forget the language and demeanor of the Captain of that steamboat during the rescue act. He paced nervously back and forth on the uppermost deck and gave commands and directions to the crew as they negociated the transfer. Interspersed with his commands and direction were fits of anger and vituperous billings gate, cursing and swearing and fuming about in such a manner as I had never seen or heard before from any one. "just throw them overboard Nig if they croud you," he called out again and again in his stern acid voice to the negro on the barge end of the gangplank. The negro gave us to understand that he would do nothing of the kind, saying, in a low subdued tone so that the captain could not hear, "That would be a pretty way to do." By the sympathetic attitude and kindly efficient help of the negro we were all finally aboard, safe and sound in the big roomy steamboat.

Those words of the sea captain sank into my very soul, and altho is was only seven years of age at that time, they have not faded out in all these years. As I now look back on that scene I am want to consider it as my first and formal introduction to the west.

The hot, blistering, scorching September sun of the Sacramento Valley from 9 AM that day until it sank behind the Goldengate which was upon us, together with the anxiety for our safety, and the longing for something to eat and drink to satisfy the cravings of the inner man, made our transfer from the barge to the steamboat like a transfer from hades to paradise. From the pergatory below to the paradise above, with only a ten inch plank to bridge the gap. My account of this incident would not be complete without mentioning the colored gentleman who served those magnificent sweet potatoes and butter for our supper. This service of supper by that cook is ever recalled by my memory as a colored gentleman of the first order in contrast to the steamboat's captain.

We arrived at San Francisco some time in the night and went to the Golden Eagle Hotel. We remained in the city two weeks seeing the sights and acquainting ourselves with its places of interest, being captivated with what was then called Woodward's Gardens, now the city's park. The last week in September we shipped on board the Steamer Ajax from San Francisco to Portland Oregon. The trip required four days and as many nights. The first half of that trip was awful, the sea was rough and the vessel rolled and pitched, and tumpled and squeaked, and I was nearer scared to death than I ever was before or since. The last half of the trip was more tolerable and became somewhat delightful toward its end. We arrived in Portland about the last of September hungry, tired, and travel worn, but pretty well over our seasickness. At the hotel we were served with the first fied salmon we had ever seen. It was fine, we all liked it, we like it yet.

My father rented a dwelling house in Portland and we lived there during the month of October 1875. During this time my father traversed over the greater part of western Oregon, and finally bought a farm of two hundred acres, about two and a half miles northwest of Albany, in Benton County, Oregon. For fourteen years my home was on the farm near Albany. During this time one school year was spent in Albany at the public school, and three years at Corvallis, in the Oregon Agricultural College. Later I spent one year at Monmouth in the Oregon State Normal School and two years at McMinnville in the college at that place. In 1892 I graduated from the classical acamedic course at McMinnville, and some years later from the philosophical course in the Philomath College with the degree of Bachelor of Philosophy. Upon finishing this course I went to Berkeley California and entered the Pacific Coast Theological seminary, which I graduated 3 years later receiving a Bachelor of Divinity. I was converted at the age of 17, in October 1885 I was baptised in the Willamette River near Spring Hill and united with the North Palestine Baptist Church.

While attending the Oregon State Normal School in March 1890, preparing myself to be a teacher, my home church licensed me to preach the gospel. Three years later, after my graduation from college, this church called me to be its pastor and was subsequently ordained a full-fleged minister of the gospel. I held pastorates in Oregon at Corvallis, North Palestine, and Alsea. And in California at Glenn, in Ocean County. After my North Palestine and Corvallis pastorates I lived seven years in Lincoln Co., Oregon, on Alsea Bay near Waldport. I then moved to California and lived there 3 years returning to Alsea in 1910, where I have since continuously resided. I have officiated at more funerals than any other person in this community. Am somewhat in demand as a funeral orator and preacher. A goodly number having asked me in advance to speak at their funerals.




