TAX LISTS OF 1783 FOR BALTIMORE AND HARFORD COUNTIES TO BE PRINTED

During the preparation of the Guide to the Manuscript Collections of the Maryland Historical Society (The Society, \$15.00) it became apparent that the Society held many manuscript tax, debt, militia and other lists which were hitherto unrecorded. They may be the originals or copies of originals, but they are, as far as is known, unique. Readers are now using them heavily and unless they are microfilmed they will become unreadable in a very few months. It is therefore with great pleasure that the Society announces an arrangement with Mr. Wister Brown, President of Microsurance Inc., of Philadelphia, whereby all lists will be microfilmed and then printed up in book form by Rhistoric Publications, a division of that company.

The whole project has the blessing and cooperation of Dr. Morris Radoff, Archivist and Records Administrator of the State of Maryland, Hall of Records.

Because of the absence of any census records for Maryland between 1776 and 1790, the publication of the tax list of 1783, the most complete for Maryland, will prove an invaluable aid to economists, genealogists, historians and sociologists. Unlike the census records, the tax lists give each householder by name,

the exact number of his dependents under and over the age of 16, the numbers of his slaves, the types of taxable property, and the value. The plan is to make hard cover publications of the actual tax list, but it is important to note that the copy will be facsimile and not a transscription. Indexes will be included where they already exist, and there will be notes by the Society's staff concerning the nature of the document and any peculiarities or omissions in the original

Initially the tax lists for 1783 for Baltimore and Harford Counties will be issued in two volumes. Approximate prices are \$30,00 a volume prepublication, or \$35 after 1 June 1969. Orders and inquiries may be sent to the Librarian or to Rhistoric Publications, 302 North 13th

(We desire to place each of these Ross marriages. Was Reuben of 1790 related to these other Ross families? No will is found for Reuben in Guilford Co., and he is not on the 1810 census there. A will for a Reuben was found in Ashe Co., No. Car. for the year 1820, naming a wife Mary, children: Washington Troy, John, Thomas, Andrew, Wilborn, Alfred, Anna, Prudence, Rebecca and Elizabeth. (These were by his second wife, Mary, Children by his first wife were Larin or Sarin (unreadable) (could this be Levin?), Edward, William, James, Mary and Sary. (Book A, page 98, Ashe Co.). By the naming of these children, it would appear that Reuben may be related to our John Ross. Also, the 1800 census of Guilford shows Reuben to be a widower. (Further follow-up work in Ashe Co. has not been done, as yet).

Original Copy of Famous Document Given to Knott's

'Declaration' Donated by Dewitt Mott

BUENA PARK — Traditions were made to be broken — or so it often is said — and another apparently has been at least temporarily cracked.

least temporarily cracked.


For the past 190 years, one of only a few dozen original copies of the Declaration of Independence has been handed down from generation to generation to generation.

But with the donation of one of those original copies to the new Independence Hall at Knott's Berry Farm by Dewitt Mott, it appears as if the document has found a more permanent home.

Mott, who is the descendent of not one, but two, of the original signers of the Declaration of Independence, has been in possession of the copy since about 1940. It had been passed on from parent to child over eight generations.

He is one in a long line of possessors that began with George Ross — or "Geo. Ross" as he always signed his name — one of the lesser-known persons who inked his signature to the Declaration of Independ-

FIFTY-SIX SIGNED

Fifty-six men signed that document, giving Americans the right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

Not among that number was the "Father of Our Country,"

George Washington Ross was a lawyer and a jurist. He was born in Delaware in 1730 and moved to Pennsylvania, where he died at the age of 49.

In 1768, he was elected a member of the Pennsylvania Assembly, Six years later he was elected a delegate to the

Continental Congress,

Ross was one of eight delegates from Pennsylvania elected by their constitutents to sign the Declaration of Independence, which origanally was known as the "Unanimous Declaration of the 13 United States of America."

He left the Continental Congress in 1777 under ill bealth and died less than two years

later.

Before he died, though, Ross, Washington and Robert Morris were delegated to interest Betsy Ross in sewing an American flag.

COPIES MADE IN 1800

Copies of the original declarative document were made about 1800; Mott said. Somewhere between 30 and 50 were given to the governors of the 13 states or colonies and to the signers or descendants of signers of the Declaration of Independence.

Since that time, Mott said, the copy received by the Ross family has been passed on to the oldest child in the family. Mott, an only child, received it from his mother, the oldest

SHORT FOTE ON SETTLEMENT OF CENTRAL FEMILYLVANIA

Central Pennsylvania was opened for settlement in the year 1768, and one Samuel Wallis--one time owner of the tract now known as the Major Ross farm just west of Pine Grove Mills-- was among the first to venture into the wilderness.

Wallis journeyed from Philadelphia as far as the west branch of the River Sesquehanna and the full beauty of its valley burst upon him causing him to decide not only to acquire as much land as possible in that region but to clear a place in the wilderness for a home.

This home, now notable in many ways, is located fourteen miles east of Williamsport as the first permanent dwelling in central Pennsylvania. It is of colonial type, so perfect in design, so lovely in its setting that architects and lovers of beauty long have made it a study of admiration.

Wallis built this home in 1769 in the beautiful west valley of the Susquehanna for his bride--a woman who had enough faith in the man she loved to have home, friend, and all the refinements of civilization to begin a new life with him in the wilderness of the then little known interior of Pennsylvania.

She was Lydia, daughter of Zebulon Hollingsworth, of Philadelphia. From the refinements of the city who was tranxplanted in to the wilds of Pennsylvania hinderland, hostile with the threats of Indian Massacres.

Lydia was of a prominent family--Valentine Hollingsworth, the American progenitor--sailed with William Penn from England to the new world in the bark Welcome in 1682. Henry Hollingsworth, his second son and grandfather of Lydia, was a man of distinction. When only 19 years of age, he helped Thomas Holme lay out the city of Fhiladelphia and in an old history is found: "Henry Hollingsworth when surveying planted an apple tree at the end of each mile and wrote to a friend that he had recently planted an orchard nine miles long."

Samuel Wallis took his bride to the manor house on the Susquehanna early in the spring of 1770, and Muncy farms—named from the tribe of Muncy Indians, tribe of Delewares, found in this Valley when invaded by the white man—was soon known up and down the frontier for a gracious and varied hospitality. It was situated between the valley's two highways of travel, the river and the Indian trail, known as the Shawokin Path.

Bishop Ettwein, the Morairan Missionary, records of a visit to Samuel Wallis in 1772, and the famous Seneca Chieftains, Coruplanter and Red Jacket, when on missions of peace, were sometimes honored guests.

During the American Revolution an invasion of British, Toreis, and Indians forced all inhabitants from this section. At this time the roof was burned but the rugged walls 30 inches in thickness withstood the onslought fire.

The Wallis family returned in 1787 having in the meantime repaired the old home. By this time many farms contained over 7,000 acreas of land and Samuel Walllis was considered the leading man of the West branch. As he advance in years and power he became obsessed with what was to be the ruling passion of his life and finally his undoing-Laud Uswger.

As a result of this passion he soon became known as the "Laud King of Pennsylvania". Laud implied power-as finance does today--and cost of the men of the times as Alexander Hamilton, Augustine and Lawrence Washington etc., were engaged in acquiring it. But Samuel Wallis outstripped them all. Not even Lord Thomas Fairfax, who possessed most of Northern Virginia, could watch him.

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Later Samuel Wallis lost all his possessions and after his death Muncy Farms was sold to Henry Drinker of Philadelphia. Mr. Drinker sold it to Robert Coleman, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, most noted iron-master and friend of George Washington. Mr. Coleman presented Muncy Farms to his daughter, Elizabeth, wife of Charles Hall, a barrister of Sunbury, Pa. The place was lived in and owned by the Hall family for over 100 years, and finally came into possession of Henry Brock a great-great-grandson of Robert Coleman, the iron master. Henry Gibson Brock at this writing is woner and inhabitor of Muncy Farms.

Thus the history of Samuel Wallis onetime possessor of Ross Farm. (1925)

JCHN ROSS (Born 1786-Died 1859)

The founder of a direct line of descendents in the United States of America dating from the latter part of the eighteenth century when he in company with two brothers, James and David sailed from Ireland to make their way in the new land of the free.

John Ross is named among the early settlers of Ferguson township, center county, Pennsylvania after its founding in 1791 by Thomas Ferguson. John's early life in this country is not recorded by anyone but it is evident that in some manner he traveled up Big Valley, Pa. where he married Susan McKnitt of a prominent family in that Valley. He apparently lived with the McKnitt for the following two or three years following which period he came into and settled in the newly founded township of Thomas Ferguson. He settled a tract of land just west of Pine Grove Mills. This tract was warranted from the John Barron Jr. Estate to Ephriam Gower in the year 1766, being surveyed for the first time in 1767. The Ephriam Gower was sold by Samuel Wallis after he had bought it of Thomas Ferguson for 300 L (Deed dated September 5, 1791) to James Kerr and he in turn to General Phillip Benner, builder of the old Iron Foundries at Rock, Pa. From him it was sold to Mrs. Hunter Wilson, wife of Samuel Hunter Wilson-parents of Col. Phillip Benner Wilson. Mrs. Wilson disposed of it to James Irvin Ross whose parents John and Susanna Ross came from Mifflin County in 1812 renting of the General Phillip Benner who was the owner at that time. Here John and his wife Susanna remained until 1820 when they purchased a tract of their own of McElroy-just east of Pine Grove Mills--and shortly afterward added to their possessions about 400 acres of adjoining land procured of Samuel Wilson. Ref: --- History of Center and Clinton Co. by John Blair Ly., Bellefoute, 1883.

This land (some 500 acres) purchased by great-grandfather Ross was cleared by he and his men and divided into five fertile farms. During his life he builded buildings of a modern type and completely equipped these farms. These five farms are still divided as he originally designed and at present are owned by Mr. Millor, Mr. Goss; Mr. Custerborder; Mr. Martz.

John Ross as described to me by his grand-daughter, Mary Agnes (at this writing 78 years of age), was a tall man standing well over 6 feet, a fine looking Irish gentleman, good features, high cheek bones and spoke with that pleasing Irish brogue. He was an even tempered man, kindly, and well like by all who chanced his way. His dealings were always of an honest nature and it was said that the word of John Ross was as good as his bond.

He amassed much land and estate during his lifetime much of which he divided among his many children.

SHORT NOTES CONCERNING THE II GENERATION

JAMES MCCLURE ROSS -- son of John Ross who bought him a farm in Westmoreland County, Pa. where he moved after his marriage to Esther, of Stone Valley. They farmed this land for the remaining years of life. His children were Irvin, David, Miles, Mary Jane, Susan, Ella, Adie--all dead at this writing and nothing further known of their children.

ELIZABETH ROSS--married James McCurdy. They moved to Missouri where they managed and owned a ranch. They became quite wealthy. A large family was born of this union, some of whom were--Clark, Laura, Mary-- all dead at this writing.

ROBERT ROSS--(Born 1813-Died 1863) Married Sarah Starett, his cousin. He moved to Spring Mills, Pa. where he farmed. He died when 50 years of age, following an injury after his horse had run away and thrown him from his carriage. He was wealthy at the time of his death. He was given a small farm by John Ross his father from which he built up his fortune. His Children were--John; Aleck; Robert; Mary Ann; Susanna Agnes; Nancy Starett; Cyrus C.; Elizabeth M. These children are now all dead but Robert Jr. who lives in Kansas. He owns a large wheat belt and Stock Ranch in Kansas. He recently (1925) communicated with the remaining branches of his family in the East. He plans a trip to visit us all sometime in the near future.

JOHN ROSS II--lived in Pine Grove Mills, Pa. nearly all of his lifetime. Just before his death he moved to Petersburg, Pa. where he was buried. He married Leah Durst from Center Hall, Pa., a descendant of a long line of Merchants in that Valley. Her people were quite wealthy and they received a goodly portion from the Durst Estate. They had no children.

MARY ANN ROSS-married James Myton of Shavers Creek (Stone Valley), this Myton family was of little account in this community and little is known of this particular James Myton. They lived in Shavers Creek Valley all of their lives. Their Children were--Clark; Agnes! Albert; Louisa; MacCalister; Benner; Leah; Erma.

MATILDA ROSS-married James Clark of Westmoreland County Pa., a very religious man and a good husband and father, John Ross gave them a farm home on which they lived their entire lifetime. They had 13 children, some of whom were -- Martha; Joseph; Frank; John; Thomas; Jane; Arna.

JAMES IRVIN ROSS--(Born Oct. 24, 1826--Died Feb. 3, 1901) the third son of John Ross, Sr., and the grandfather of the writer, was born on the old Ross Homestead east of Pine Grove Mills, Pa. Oct. 24, 1826. He spent his youth helping his father control his then large estate. During this time he was given a common school education as was the sustom in those days.

He married Mary Caven, daughter of John Caven (Born November 27, 1827-died August 22, 1901), of Ligonier, Pa. Her family was of good stock, wealthy farmers and respected in the community in which they lived. James Irvin bought the Wilson farm now owned by my mother Mary Etta daughter of James Irvin. His father John Ross helped him pay for the farm but he was aggressive and paid much of it himself.

James Irvin, my maternal grandfather, was a short stock man, very gruff in his manner and speeck, head of his home and a man who saved with great diligence so that his children might have a start in life. It is said he was nver happy and was unusually gruff until he had had his breakfast followin which his attitude changed at once. Following his morning meal he would light a cigar and joke with those about him.

He was a great lover of horses and drove the finest team of road horses in the sections in which he lived. He was known as Major Ross and his bearing and attitude justified the name. This title clung to him from the time when he was a Major in the famous Penns Valley Dragoons. He served as a 1st Lieutenant during the Civil War, but was in no active service.

In his later life he was overseer only of his farms and acted as mananger and boss both of which he could aptly do. Late in life he wore a closely clipped beard, had a head of bushy white har and dressed similiar to the old English Squires of previous times.

James Irvin was a good business man, who drove a hard bargain. His memory is something worth speaking of. It is said he could read and repeat whole passages. He was known for his ability to entertain and he loved nothing better being at his best at the breakfast table. He was a great smoker consuming an average of 9 cigars daily. He was very liberal and always thinking of other peoples comfort often forgetting his own and family's is his eagerness. His friends were always first and even on his death bed he always insisted that those who came to see him should stay to dinner.

In the year 1882 James Irvin, wife Mary, and son Elmer were stricken with severe typhoid fever and following this illness he was forced to give up farming. They moved to Petersburg, Pa. where they engaged in the general merchantile business. In 1883, James Irvin contracted Malarial Feber from the swampy lands along the Junita River. This illness was repeated so often that he was forced to move across the mountain again to Pine Grove Mills where they lived for the following four years. In 1888, James Irvin and family, moved to Lemont, Pa. and set up a coal, grain, and general merchantile business which soon proved very successful. He built the grain elevator still in use today by his son Elmer Caven. The store occupied the building at the cross-roads in Lemont today the home and store is owned by Elmar Caven. He is retired and has had a very successful business career. Besides owning the business above he has much real estate and many stocks and bonds of recognized value today.

Mary Caven, wife of James Irvin was godly woman in every sense of the word. She was known throughout the valley for her hospitality and kind manner to all who happened their way. She carried an air of good will and true motherhood everywhere. Her character may be illustrated by saying she often repeated to her children. "If you know no good about a person say nothing". She thought always of the welfare of family and friends.

The hospitality of the James Irvin Ross family is something of which I am proud to write. I am told by everyone that no traveler ever passed the old Ross threshold without food and rest if he were in need of such things. During religious meetings held frequently in those days long tables were set in the old fashioned turkey platter reposed in a tempting manner at each end of the tables. All the good things accompanied these dinners of plenty in the good old fashioned style of the country folk of the day: The preparation of the food was just as Famous as the bill of fare and Mary Caven had the reputation of being an excellent cook as well as a good mother and tidy housekeeper. A reputation much to be envied in those past days when woman's work was in her home exclusively.

After the death of the parents the farm was retained and divided among the children. Inaddition the grain elevators, home, and store room at Lemont were among the possessions at the time of James death. These real estate holdings were of much value at the time and thus were factors in making Major Ross one of the most prosperous mon in the valley.

James Irvin died of Pneumonia at the age of 74 years in Feb. 1901. Mary Caven followed him into the shadow of death six months later from strangulation of a right feudral hernia. She was 73 years of age at the time of her death in August, 1901.

The children to this union were--Louisa, Sarah Alice, Martha Agnes, Adie Zeliah, John Hale, Laura Leah, Idelia, Elmer Caven, Mary Etta.

Post Humous-Under the beaching, "An old Landmark Gone" a Bellefoute County paper gives a life account of Grandfather Ross. Extracts from it are given the original being found in the old Ross family Bible.

"Major Ross, as he was familiarity known, had many friends being unusually hospitable, clever and genial. He loved a good joke and could tell one. Under the most adverse circumstances he could always see the bright side of life.

His military career dates away back in the early fifties when he was commissioned major of the Penns Valley Dragoons, a crack troop of the date. He served as a lst. Lieutenant in Co. H.P.V.M. during the Civil War.

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He was born on the old Ross homestead just east of town (Pine Grove Mills) October 24, 1826. June 1, 1848, he married Miss Mary Caven of Westmoreland, Pa.

In 1887 he located in Lemont, Fa. and erected extensive grain elevators and coal sheds and made the venture a success.

His old place of residence is one of the finest in the section. The large and beautiful home and its grand surroundings indicate the taste and good judgement displayed in the adornment of his presence.

He was a Republican in politics, but never sought an office.

He was a life long member of the Presbytarian Church.

He was a member of Cap't. J. O. Campbell Post 272 G. A. R.

DAVID ROSS-son of John Ross Sr., married Barbara Neff from Center Hall, Pa. She was of a poor, unknown family and David's father was very displeased with the match, but she later proved herself to be a woman of character and a good wife and mother. He was a farmer, but was quite unsuccessful. Later he moved to Arlington, Kansas where he was more successful and in later life had a grain and feed business in that territory. Some of his children were--Blanchard; Neff; Agnes; Florence; Curt.

MARTHA ROSS--married George Gray of Stormstown, Pa. He was from good stock and well-to-do family. He was a good man and because a large farm owner in Stormstown He lived to be 92 years of age. Their children were--Alice; Bell; Agnes; Anna; Irvine.

This completes the second generation and gives the root families for the many branches throughout this country. Short interesting notes will suffice for the remaining branches.

MCCLURE'S FAMILY -- nothing known of this family.

ELIZABETH'S -- moved west in early life.

ROBERT'S ... John Ross II married Mary Alexander of Center Ha.. She was a scion of an old and wealthy pioneer family. They had three children, Sadie; Frank; Lettie; all dead at this writing.

Aleck Ross moved west when young and his history is lost. He married a Rhinebardt from Center Hall.

ROBERT ROSS II --- early migrated west and settled in Kansas. He married a quakeress, Minnie Bell Gause. He owns a large wheat belt and stock ranch in Kansas. He is still living (1926) and expects to come East for a visit soon.

MARY ANN-married James Krape. They lived on a farm near Pine Grove Mills. Their children were Anna; Oscar; George; John. Anna married Calvin King and is now living in Spring Mills, Pa. Of the remaining children nothing is known at this time.

Agnes -- died when young. John Ross II married, but had no children.

MARY ANN ROSS (MYTON) FAMILY --

Clark Ross Myton-died when young of fover.

Agnos Ross Hyton-married Amos Caven, a brother of Mary Caven. No children were born to them.

Albert Myton-married Kate Greenwalte. He became very wealthy, owning such real estate in and about Huntington, Pa. He also owned a beautiful home in Huntington, Pa. They had but one child, Agnes, who died at the age of 19 years of heart failure. She was never married. Kate Myton died in 1926.

Louisa Myton--married Westley Gregory. They became wealthy owning many farms in and about Petersburg. They had one child, a son Ralph, who is married and lives in the old home in Petersburg at this time (1926). He is a very prosperous merchantile at this time.

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Mac Calister Myton--married Callie Henderson. They built up a fortune during their lifetime which was spent in Petersburg, Pa. They had no children.

Benner Myton married Margaret Robb. He was a farmer for much of his life, but now lives in Washington D. C. in retirement. He inherited fortunes from the above named brothers. Seven children were born to them—Maunie: James; Graham; William; Caroline; Jay; Myrtle. These children are all married and living in Washington D. C. with the exception of James who lives in Petersburg, Pa.; and William who lives in Wilsontown on a farm.

Leah Myton died when young of Tuberculosis without ever having been married.

Emma Myton married Alexander Gilliam. They have lived in Huntingdon, Tyrone, and now Petersburg, Pa. They also have a home in Florida where they spend their winters. He has been very successful in the wholesale merchantile business. They have no children.

MATILDA ROSS (CLARK) FAMILY --

Nothing is known of this family except Anna Clark who married a Mr. College They had one child, Mintie College. They live in Ligionier, Pa.

JAMES IRVIN ROSS FAMILY --

Louisa-died at birth.

Sarah Alice--married David Weaver. They lived at Pine Grove Mills, Pa. where Mr. Weaver was in the merchantile business. They had four children--George, Walter, Morris, Foster.

Martha Agnes--married Levi Krebs from Pine Grove Mills, Pa. They farmed for awhile and then lived a retire life in Pine Grove Mills. He died in August, 1900 of cancer of the stomach. Since then Martha Agnes has lived with George and Mary Etta (her sister) Glenn of State College, Pa. She is still living and has been the source of nearly all of this family information. She is a genial, good woman who used to carry me astride of her back when I was very small while she did her early morning tasks. Levi and Agnes had no children.

Adie Zellah--married Daniel Lowder of Oak Hall, Pa. They farmed during her lifetime. They lived in the beautiful old stone house just east of the Oak Hall Roller Mill. It is truly a beautiful home and was always kept in splendid condition. She died of Diabetes Mellitus at the age of 54 years. Their children were; Ralph, Joel, Clarence Ross, Elmer Stuart, Mary Florence(died when young of Diabetes)

John Hale-married Adelia Messar from Pine Grove Mills. They farmed for a few years at Pine Grove and then moved to Linden Hall, Pa. where he was a merchant and Flour Miller for the remainder of his life. He is still living at this writing (1926) as is also his wife Adelia. Their children were-Ella, Charles, Earl, Irene, Ruth, Paul, Lynn, William.

Laura Leah-married James Irvin Lytle from State College, Pa. He was a son of Lytle and a member of one of the old pioneer families of Pennsylvania. Early in life he was a coal and grain dealer in Lemont, Pa. Later they moved to State College where they lived a retired life. They built the first modern fraternity house in this college town at present occupied by the Ply Signa Kappa Fraternity. They built three large fraternity houses and own much real estate in State College and a fine residence on South Banard Street. James Lytle served as a volunteer in the Civil War when he was but 16 years of age. They are both living today and are quite active. Their children are--Irvin Ross, Mary Agnes, Preston Kay.

Elmer Caven--married Gertrude Irvine of Jacksonville, Pa. They lived in Lemont where Elmer carried on his father's coal, grain, and merchantile business very successfully. He is quite wealthy and owns much real estate in this Valley. They had one child born to them - Edith Irvine.

Mary Etta (the Writer's Mother) -- married George Glenn of the Branch. He was the son of Andrew Glenn a well thought of and pioneer family in the old strip of country in Center Country, known as the Branch. He was a school teacher for eight years in the Branch School. He was prepared for this work by attending sessions in the famous West Chester Normal School.

After marriage he lived in the large corner home on the Right as one turns up to the Lemont Railroad Station. Four years later they moved to State College where George entered the United States government service as a Postal Clerk. He was promoted to Assistant Post Master in the first class office in State College which position he has held for the past five years. (See Glenn geneological record)

JAMES ROSS--(Born 1794 (Ireland) -died 1869(America) another brother of John Ross, Sr. in whose company with David sailed from Ireland and landed in America in the early nineteenth century.

James Ross located in Ferguson township in 1821 and the next year in Patton township, near the gray church. There he lived and farmed in a prosperous manner until the year 1870 where he died at the age of 75 years. (History of Clinton and Center Counties James Blain Lynn 1883)

James Ross built the old Ross church in Loveville. He contributed the land, material and aided in its building so that the populace of the valley might have a suitable place in which to worship. Their children were--Betty; Selia Jane; Mary; Louisa A.; George.

Generation II

BUILDING OF THE ROSS CHURCH-- as related to me by Robert S. Ross, Grandson of James Ross.

"The wife of James Ross was a very religious woman making it her main life interest. A church was needed in the community and no funds seemed avilable in the country side for such use. Thus James Ross came to donate the land of the Ross Church and cemetary. Again in lieu of funds he furnished nearly 400 L to build the structure and his wife boarded all the help employed in the construction. The congregation pledged themselves to pay the 400L as years went by. This was never carried out and James Ross and wife are the sole founders of that quaint spot known today as "The Ross Church". I visited the Ross Church in the summer of 1926 and found it to be a very pleasant spot overlooking much fertile farming lands. It was in good repair, but the tomb markings of James had fallen over. This was proped up and his tomb marked for repair and resetting of the stone.

DAVID ROSS--

The third of the brothers who emigrated from Ireland with James and John finally came to settle in Potter County along the foot of Mitdany Mountain near Linders Hall. He married Mary Pollanna Lewis. He owned three farms in this region all of which he personally directed in the clearing of forest lands. He built a beautiful brick home at the foot of Mitdany Mountain and recently owned by Mr. Ripka. His farms were all well equipped and all boasted of fine brick homes. Of the children there were—John, William, James, Elizabeth, Ann, Sally, Ella.

Generation II

JOHN ROSS-son of David, married Mary Ora Myton. They moved to Kansas where John engaged in Merchantile business. His wife became a missionary amoung the American Indians. He died in Kansas, his wife is still living at this writing. They had two children-Sydney who died in childhood and Walter who now lives in Los Angeles, California.

JAMES ROSS-son of David married Elizabeth Sechrist. They lived on a farm near Linden Hall. Late in life they moved to Boalsburg where they built a home.

JAMES ROSS(CONT)--They were a very delightful couple. James dressed very well in an old gentlemanly style. Elizabeth was a very religious woman beautiful even in old age and of the type of real motherly woman fast disappearing in our so-called civilized day.

ELIZABETH ROSS-married a Mr. Koch who was stabbed to death by a negro in Bellefonte, Pa. His wife died soon afterward from the shock of the death of her husband. Eney left one child Nora who married Dr. James Smith-- a well known physician of Artcona, Pa.

ANNA ROSS-married Samuel Gregory of Manor Hill, Pa. They lived on a farm at Manor Hill all their lives. They children were Mary Jane and Ross.

SALLY ROSS-married Dr. White, a dentist, and moved to Kansas. They had four children-Anna; Denoise.

ELLA ROSS-married David Kline-a lumber dealer. They moved to Kentucky where he had large lumber interests. He lost everything in a fire and then moved to California where Ella died. Mr. Kline is still living in California.

The farm occupied by J. B. Mitchell was purchased by him and his brother. J. H. Mitchell, off John Barron, in 1848. Samuel Wallis sold the Ephriam Gower to James Kerr, and he to Gen. Philip Benner; from him to Mrs. Hunter Wilson, who disposed of it to James Irvin Ross, the present owner and occupant, whose parents, John and Susanna Ross, came from Mifflin county in 1812, renting off Philip Benner, who at that time was the owner. Here they remained until 1820, when they purchased a place of their own off John McElroy, and shortly after added to their possessions about 400 acres of adjoining land procurred off Samuel Wilson. Their family numbered nine children, as follows: James McC., Robert, John, James, Irvin, William, Elizabeth, Mary A., Matilda, and Martha. Of the above, James is in Westmoreland county; William in Reno county, Kansas; Robert died in Gregg towhship; James Irvin married mary Caven, of Westmoreland county, and has seven children: Alice, Agnes, Ada, Hale, Laura, Elmer, and Mary.
