
Emigration of the Schlenkers to America

In the spring of 1753 a party of Schlenkers embarked on a ship at Hamburg, the largest port in Germany, near the mouth of the Elbe River. Their destination along with the approximately 150 other passengers on the ship was Pennsylvania in the New World.




The ship, named Leathley, was under the captain-ship of John Lickley. This was the first and last trip carrying emigrants from the European continent to Pennsylvania that this ship and captain made.

Leaving the continent of Europe behind the ship sailed for England, for ships carrying emigrants to America had to stop at an English port and get clearance papers for American ports. This was necessary because the colonies in America were under English rule.


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Captain Lickley put in at Cowes, on the Isle of Wight off the south coast of England. Most of the ships carrying migrants to Pennsylvania stopped at this port. The stopover here was probably from one to two weeks waiting to be passed through the customs by officials and until the winds were favorable.




Now began the difficult and most arduous part of the voyage. With the most favorable winds a sailing ship could cross the Atlantic in seven weeks. More often it was eight, nine, or even twelve weeks. Passengers were closely packed. Food and water were not of the best. Conditions were anything but healthful. All sorts of diseases, especially contagious ones, flourished under such circumstances. Children died in large numbers.

Among the children was little Johannes Schlencker, who was only six years old at the time of the voyage. He survived the trip, for which we thank God, and became the ancestor of the whole Schlenker Freindschaft of which we have knowledge at this time.



After reaching the American coast, our ship, the Leathley, sailed into the Delaware Bay and up the river toward Philadelphia. It was one of ninteen ships that came in the year 1753 bearing immigrants from Continental Europe.

Arriving at Philadelphia a physician appointed as health efficer visited the ship to make sure that no people with infectious diseases were landed.



Those with infectious diseases were removed to Province Island at the mouth of the Schuylkill some distance below the city. Here a hospital had been erected for this purpose in 1750. The immigrants were kept there until they died or recovered.

According to the law the ship captains were required to present to the authorities a list of all their passengers. These lists they gave varied in nature and conof them listed the male passengers sixteen tents. Most years and older. The lists were written on large sheets paper and were made not by the captains but by some ofship's officer designated by the captain. These clerks usually could not read or write German. They would ask the adult male passengers for their names and write them down according to the way they sounded to them. This resulted in strange and wonderful spellings not at all like the some real name.

Of the 324 ships known to have brought German immigrants to Philadelphia between 1727 and 1775 only 138 ship's lists survive. The list of the ship Leathley is among these. Below is a copy of this listing showing only, however, the names of the four Schlenckers appearing therein as published in Strassburger and Hinke, Pennsylvania German Pioneers, Norristown, Pa., Pennsylvania German Society, 1934. Volume I, page 536. (List 202 A)

Note the spelling for Schlenker as written by the sailor who made the list. He wrote it the way it English sounded to him. You will observe there are four Schlenkers listed. The numbers before the names indicate their order in the list of 52 names.

In addition to these captain's lists there are two other lists of German immigrants. The story of their origin is as follows:

Although Fennsylvania was an English colony, Penn's agents and the provincial authorities were glad to receive these German migrants in a sense; not so much because of the policy established by Fenn of offering a haven of refuge to the oppressed of Europe, but because these hardworking Germans did not shun the dangers of the wilderness but were willing to go into the backwoods of the colony, clear the land, and establish farms. Their industry was a large factor in making Pennsylvania the prosperous colony it was. At the same time the officials were concerned that so large a group of non-English might retain their own language and customs and perhaps therefore not become properly integrated into the life of the colony.

Accordingly, to insure their political integration the Provincial Council in 1727 passed a law requiring all continentals who arrived at Philadelphia to take oaths of allegiance to the British crown and fidelity to the Proprietor of the province together with a promise to obey the laws of the province.

Two years later in 1729 another oath was also added called a declaration of fidelity and abjuration.

Both oaths were to be administered by and subscribed to before public officials.

On September 19, 1753, those male passengers sixteen years and older passed by the health officer, left the ship on the Delaware and were led up Market Street (then called High Street) of Fhiladelphia in a procession to the Court House between 2nd and 3rd streets to sign the oaths.



The signing of the two oaths was cared for by two clerks seated at two different desks. For those who were unable to write the clerks wrate their names for them and the immigrants placed their marks in a space the clerk left for them between their first and last names.

Fifty-three men from the ship Leathley signed the first oath. Below is a copy thereof showing only the three Schlenkers out of the list of fifty-three as found in Strassburger and Hinke, <u>Pennsylvania German Fioneers</u>, Vol. I, page 537 and Vol. II, page 639. (List 202 B)

Note: Numbers in front of names indicate their order in the list. John Wm. who appears on the captain's list did not come to the court house to sign the oaths. Perhaps he was sick. Christoffel and Friederich Wilhelm signed their names in German script, but Hendrick Slinke is written in English letters. Franz denry could not write so the clerk wrote his name for him in this form. Franz Henry then made his mark of the "x" between the names. Out of the 53 names on the list of Leathley passengers 33 could not sign their own names.

Having signed the Oath of Allegiance the men went to the second desk to sign the Declaration of Fidelity and Abjuration. This was a two-fold oath. In it the signers:

1. Promised loyalty to George II and denied that the Pope had the right or power to depose him. 2. Acknowledged King George II as the lawful ruler and renounced obedience to the Roman Catholic pretender to the throne who had assumed the title of James III.

Fifty-two men from the Leathley signed this second oath. Herewith is a copy of this record with the names of the three Schlenkers given in their original form as found in Strassburger and Hinke, Vol. I, pages 537-538 and Vol. II, page 640. (List 202 C)

Notice that the three Schlenker men were again next to each other in line for the signing of this oath as they were for the first. Frantz Henry again makes a mark, this time a double "XX", to his name which is written by the clerk. Note how differently this clerk spells the name from the former one. Of the 52 names on this list 32 could not write their names and made marks instead.

After signing they were led back to the ship. Those who had money paid their bills to the captain for their passage across the ocean and were free to go. Some who had rich relatives in the Province sought a loan from them to straighten out their accounts. As for the rest, according to the agreement they entered into, announcements were printed in the newspapers stating how many of the immigrants were to be sold. Buyers came and bargained with the immigrants promising to pay their debts of passage in return for a certain number of years and days of service. When the agreement was reached the buyer took them to the merchant who paid all the immigrant's bills and the immigrant became the property of the merchant for the definite period agreed upon.

We do not know the financial circumstances of this group of Schlenckers so we do not know whether or not they were sold to pay their passage.

Of the 38,307 names recorded in the shiplists from 1727 to 1808 there are besides the four Schlenkers mentioned above only two other immigrants by the name Schlenker.

Although at present we have no direct interest in these latter two since they are not our ancestors, yet for the sake of general interest and in case something in connection with them should come to light we print their names, and dates of arrival as listed in Strassburger and Hinke.

recorded in German script in Will Book, Volume A, page 552 Berks County Courthouse, Reading, Pa.

The original copy written in German script on three sheets of paper as well as an English translation is also on file. The copy in the will book and the original differ in spelling and grammar, the copy ist having made corrections. The text below follows the original copy.

In dem Namen Gottes, Amen. Ich Johannes Schlencker Wohnhaft in Greenwich tawnschip Berks Caunty und Staadt von Pennsylvania bin bei gesundem Verstand and therlegung, Gott sey gedankt dafur, der mir zu gemuth führet die Sterblichkeit neines belens, und weissend dass er vor alle Menschen bestimt ist, einmal zu Sterben, thue mache und ordere diesen meinen letzten Willen und Testament hauptsächliches und vor dass allenersten gebe und recommendirn ich weine Seele in die Hände des Allmächtigen Gottes der sie gegeben hat und meinen leib recommandirn ich zur erden begraben zu werden in ein gudbefinden geziemendes und Christliches begräbnis nach gudbefinden meinen hiernach gemelten Executors nicht zweiflent ich werde denselben an der allgemeinen auferstehung wieder empfangen. Register Office Reading in Berks County May 16, 1808 there appeared Jacob Christ and Philip Gehr witnesses to the foregoing will and Codicil, who being duly sworn according to law respectively did depose and say that they were present together and did see and hear John Schlenker the Testator therein named sign, seal, and publish pronounce and declare the same writing as and for his last will and Testament and Codicil and that the names Jacob Christ and Philip Gehr are of the said Deponents own proper handwriting respectively thereto subscribed as witnesses in the presence of each other and in the presence and at the request of said Testator, And that said testator was at the time of signing said will and Codicil of sound mind and understanding to the best of their knowledge and as they verily believe.

TRANSLATION

In the name of God, Amen. I, Johannes Schlenker, a resident of Greekwich township, Berks Councy and the state of Pennsylvania am of a sound mind and understanding for which God be thanked, who brings me to the knowledge of the mortality of my life and being aware that it is appointed to all men once to die, I do make and order this my last will and testament.

First and forecost I give and recommend my soul into the hands of the Almighty God who has given it and my body I commit to be buried in the earth in a well ordered decent and Christian burial according to the good judgment of my hereinafter named executors not doubting I will receive the same again in the general resurrection.

And such worldly goods with which God has pleased to bless me in this earthly life I give and bequeath in the following manner and way.

First of all I order that after my death my executors shall as soon as possible properly pay all my real debts and obligations.

I order my executors as soon as possible and without damage that they sell at public sale and turn into money all my loose and moveable property, as also as soon as possible and without damage to sell to the highest bidder my plantation where I now live in Greenwich township, Berks County containing two hundred acres of land, more or less, and I in like manner empower them that they shall sign seal and transfer to the buyer or buyers of my aforementioned plantation and land sufficient and lawful deed or letter of sale which shall be entirely incontestible and of such power and effect as though I myself personally had completed them.

And my executors as also guardiens shall put in order the accounts and set down or cause to be set down a true inventory and deliver the same properly according to the law of the land.

My will is and I herewith order that my hereafter mentioned children, that is sons Johannes Schlenker, Jacob Schlenker, Henrich Schlenker, and Daniel Schlenker and my daughters Susana Fischer, Elisabeth Heldenbrand, Resina Braucher, Rebeca Glück, and Maria Schlenker all and every one of them shall have directly after my death one hundred pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania except those who have already received it during my life time and which my executors in equal parts to one as to the other according to the true meaning hereof.

My will is and I order herewith that after my executors have turned all my property and estate into money that they shall divide it in equal parts to my aforementioned sons and daughters to one as much as to the other except my son Jacob Schlenker who shall receive twenty-four aforementioned money less than the other children and my daughter Maria Schlenker who shall have twenty pounds more money as aforementioned than any of the other children in preference.

According to the true meaning hereof my will is that all money which I have as likewise bonds, notes, debts in the book and the sum of money from the sale and lend when it is sold shall and must at all times as it comes in be divided into equal parts so that each one of the heirs can and shall have his part as aforementioned and none of the heirs shall have a preference over the others.

My will is and I order herewith to my executors that if I do not live that long so that I can give it myself that my daughter Maria Schlenker shall have a new side saddle, one large bucking tub, one tub with a stopper, one water bucket, one butter churn with plunging dasher, one tin bucket, one earthen bucket, two chairs, one large and one small table(?), broom one large caldron with three feet, one melting pot, a bed and bedstead, a bureau, two cows with calf or twelve pounds in money of which she shall have her choice, one sheep, two flat irons, one clock of velvet and a fine hat and the other articles that are not mentioned herein and my other daughters in my lifetime as their downy have received from their father, so Maria shall and must have in preference and it shall not be reckoned as part of her inheritance with her brothers and sisters.

Lastly I make and order that my son Johannes Schlenker and my son-in-law Michael Heldenbrand be my true executors of this my will and testament and that all things be executed properly and completely in accuracy as soon as it is possible to do it without damage.

And I the aforementioned Johannes Schlenker recall, ennull and declare void all wills and testaments and bequests previously made by me and I make and order this to be my last will and testament in testimony of all this I have set my own hand and seal this twenty first day of April in the year of our Lord 1807. Subscribed and sealed by the witnesses.

Codicil

Since I Johannes Schlenker made my last will and testament on the twenty-first of April 180? and have forgotten something therein, I do command and order this present document as an addition to the aforementioned will and testament.

My will is and I order herewith that my executors shall still send to school my daughter Maria mentioned in my will as well as diligently see to it that Maria is well instructed so that she will be admitted to the Lord's supper as all my children previously and all costs of school, pastor, as well as clothing shall all be paid out of my estate.

My vill is and I order herevith that my aforementioned executors diligently take care of Maria's inheritance from my estate and property and shall be careful that at all times her money comes to people where it is secure until she needs or can use it.

Further I order herewith that my daughter Maria shall have her mother's chost with the lock in preference in addition to what has been previously assigned to her.

As witness of all the above I do make and declare this as an addition or codicil to my last will and testament this fifth day of May one thousand eight hundred and seven.

Sealed and subscribed in the presence of and in tostimony of which we at his request and in the presence of each other have subscribed our names.
