RESEARCHER'S NOTES

Dear Dan.

Here is some more Seely information that could help you and also help in my search for the mother of Charles S. Wright of Greenwich/Bald Mountain, Washington Co., NY. This is found in "The Asa Fitch Papers, Volume 1, compiled by Dr. Asa Fitch around 1850, and recently transcribed and edited by Laura Penny Hulslander, p. 46. "In the revolution, I have often heard, that James Eldridge's house was devastated. The house stood where the next house below Bassett's now stands. George Jacquay was then a boy living with Mr. Eldridge. George was going along the road, if I remember right, and seeing somebody coming. stepped aside into the bushes, and found out from their conversation that they were Tories, going to take Mr. Eldridge a prisoner. George ran and conveyed the intelligence to Mr. Eldridge, who had just time to get away from the house with his family when the Tories arrived. He fled over into Cambridge with his family. The Tories came and destroyed all of Mr. Eldridge's grain in the fields, stole three or for young horses that were very valuable, and took away from the house some of the goods. Some surmised (though probably without foundation) that Capt. Seely, neighbor of Mr. Eldridge directly opposite to him on the river, had divested the Tories to come and capture Eldridge, and that Seely was at heart a Tory, though so silent and sly he never committed himself by any overt acts. When Burgoyne's army passed along here Seely staid at home, and received no molestation. I think it was when the British army late at Ft. Edward, that the attempt was made to capture Eldridge. Ephraim Crocker, and I think, Noah Payne were actually taken prisoners by the Tories. A daughter of Capt. Seely's, as old as I am, is now living out near Bald Mountain, and can probably give many incidents. She is the Widow LeJeex, and is living with her son Charles Wright." Mary was born and reared in Chester County (Henderson) Tennessee. She was married at the age of 18 and moved to Washington, D.C. This marriage produced a son, Edward, also of Tujunga, CA. Edward has two sons, James and Jeffrey, who are teen-agers.



CGS REFERENCE ONLY

These indexes were compiled primarily from county courthouse records of marriage licenses and marriage returns. They give you information about the listed individuals and help you locate copies of the original documents. The marriage date is most often the date provided for each entry. However, when no marriage date was given, the date of the license was provided. The county locations listed in most marriage records are actually where the marriage licenses were issued. Historically, most marriage licenses were issued by the county where the bride lived, and most of the actual marriages took place in the same county.

In a few cases, a marriage may be listed twice, but in two different counties. This is often because some couples obtained a marriage license or bond in one county, but were married in another county, perhaps to be near other relatives. However, it can also be the case that the person who performed the marriage lived in the other county, and so reported the marriage in that county.

Finding Copies of the Records Referenced in These Indexes

The purpose of these indexes is to serve as a research tool for finding a record of a marriage. It is important to view the actual marriage record because of the additional information that it sometimes provides, such as ages, dates of birth, present residence, or previous marriages and parents' names. These may not always be provided on the records, but in some counties and circumstances they are a standard.

It is up to the researcher to go to the marriage records (usually on microfilm) to verify the information found in this index. Almost all marriage records in this collection can be found on microfilm at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah, or available through Family History Centers throughout the United States. Our County Breakdown tells you on which Family History Library microfilm rolls you can find the marriage records for each county.

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

TRIPLE TRAGEDY

Former Ottawa Man Kills Wife and Daughter and Commits Suicide.

William L. Seeley, a former well known resident of Ottawa, killed himself, wife and daughter, Miss Rene, in their home in Seattle, Washington, January 16, 1909, and their dead bodies were discovered Sunday morning by E. W. Zibbel, formerly of Ottawa, and Guy M. Smelser. The latter was engaged to marry Miss Seeley.


Mrs. Seeley and her daughter had been murdered by a blow with some blunt instrument, believed to have been a hammer. Seeley had been drowned, according to Coroner Snyder. Over the bodies of Seeley and his wife, as they lay head down in the bathtub, was a steamer trunk. The trunk did not touch the body of Miss Seeley. The instrument with which the murders were committed could not be found.

That W. L. Seeley, driven insane by worry over financial troubles, murdered his daughter and wife and then killed himself is the theory advanced by the police and coroner. Every door and window was locked, and not an article of jewelry or silverware had been taken. The crime was believed to have been committed Thursday night, as nothing had been seen of any of the Seeleys since that time.

The women had been killed in their beds and Seeley's nightgown, as well as the beds, was covered with blood. The man was half dressed. A bottle of chloroform, partly used, was open in the bathroom and a handkerchief was clutched in the dead man's hand. Evidence that the triple tragedy was premeditated is given in the fact Seeley telegraphed to his brother C. H. Seeley of Pomeroy, Washington, on Friday, saying "Come at once, urgent." His brother replied: "Can't come now, explain." This last telegram was found in the Seeley home.

Mr. Seeley was born in 1854 in Rushville, IL, and was admitted to the bar in 1879. Before going west, Mr. Seeley was a law partner of the late Samuel Richolson, and was appointed receiver of a number of banks. He moved his family to St. Joseph, MO, going from their to Seattle. Mrs. Seeley has two brothers living in Ottawa, Charles E. Smith and W. A. Smith. Her mother, Mrs. Susan F. Smith lives in Los Angeles, with her other daughter, Mrs. Helen Bradshaw. Miss Rene attended Ottawa High School and graduated in 1903.

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Seeley's in Pennsylvania Land Warrants

A land warrant was (in most cases) the first document issued by the state or province in the process whereby land was transferred from the government to private ownership. The warrantee was the original property owner. The following records are extracted from a CD-ROM-based publication I am working on. When completed, it will include all of the Pennsylvania land warrants starting in 1732. This list includes all Seeley's (all spellings) from 65 of the 67 Pennsylvania counties (excluding Northampton and Luzerne Counties, which I have not yet completed). The "County" column shows

three "application programs" which produced a somewhat different set of documents. These programs ran between 1765 and 1769. They were: ES = East Side [of Susquehanna River] Application number; NP = New Purchase Application number; WS = West Side [of Susquehanna River] Application number.

40 Years Ago in SGS -- Notes From Garner Osborn

Editor's Note: It's a lot of fun for me to look through the older issues of the SGS Newsletter (this is the 127th issue, by the way) and kind of watch as the organization takes shape. I found the notes below from SGS Founder Garner Osborne in the April 1966 — or 5th — issue.

Miss Marion and Miss Helen Seelye of Box 337, Abilene, Ks. are among our most recent of discoveries. Their modesty does not permit me to brag on their beautiful home in Abilene. But we can say that their father, Dr. Alfred Seelye, started in once to rally the Seelyes together and he and a cousin were gathering material for a Seelye book when his death stopped it all, 25 or 30 years ago. We are beginning to get access to the work started by he and his cousin.

We are confronted with the necessity of making a start on our proposed Robert Seely Genealogical Society. As we are far from having a complete knowledge of all Seely, Seeley, Seelye, Seally, etc. families in the Americas we feel that in order to hold our ground, we begin with a temporary organization till a more representative organization can be formed.

Traveling costs can be very prohibitive on a nationwide basis, so we have hit upon the device of a temporary organization in the middle west until we know better what we want. We could call a meeting of middle west Seelyes if necessary and meet with more success than in calling out the whole nation and getting only a small representation because of traveling costs. Your editor has known some of the middle west group for several years and has studied their gifts of personality. We have recently been in correspondence with these and we venture a few nominations which all understand are on a temporary basis.

We nominate the following:

Mr. John C. Seelye of 146 Palisades Circle, Manitou Spgs, Colo. 80289. Mr. Seelye is a business man and is in middle life.

Mr. Preston Seelye of 1100 Jasmine, Denver, Colo. He has helped from the beginning with the keeping of financial accounts. He is prompt, is very careful, a thoroughly good man.

Miss Marion Seelye of Abilene, Ks., Box 337 has but recently come to our attention. She is near the big backlog of Seelye information gathered by her father, Dr. Alfred Seelye. She is a very busy woman but has agreed to act as secretary on a temporary basis.

Offers have been made of Seelye books, photographs, etc., for the memento work which should be a part of the Seeley organization. We nominate for the post, the name of Charles Martin (a cousin) of 407 9th. Ave., Charles City, Iowa 50516, Charley is very much interested in the Seelye hunt; the reason — his mother was a Seelye. This too, will be on a temporary basis. Write him if you have something in mind.

There will need to be regional directors. This can come later. Matters of by-laws, etc., will be discussed later. A site for a Seeley center will be needed later. Be on the look-out for a good place. A name will be needed for the organization. Give us your suggestions. It should include the name of Robert Seeley and his dates. We welcome suggestions from all of you.

Please do not send any dues till the newsletter asks for them. Contributions for the costs of the Seeley Newsletter are acceptable though. It may be continued as an informational organ of the Seeley Society. At any rate, any left over monies will go to it if something else is decided on. Send us your questions and give us all you can of your Seeley history.

Editor's Post Script: The names of those nominees may sound familiar to our more experienced members. Marion Seelye served as SGS Secretary until February 1983, Charles Martin served as custodian until November 1983, Preston Seelye Served as SGS Treasurer until November 1986, and Garner Osborn remained active in SGS until his death on June 5, 1976. The name "Seeley Genealogical Society" actually pre-dates the newsletter from which the above is excerpted. It first appeared in the newsletter in the third issue in Sept. 1965.

NARA Fund Supports Microfilm By John Seely, Ancestor File Index Coordinator

The Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS) is the official collection agency for the Malcom H. Stern - NARA Gift Fund. FGS promotes and publicizes the idea of one dollar per society member per year to finance this fund.

The money collected makes possible the creation of finding aides and the micro-filming of valuable research materials now preserved in the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) in Washington, D.C. The microfilm copies, produced without government funding, are distributed to the NARA Regional Archives for use by researchers. These records are also available through any LDS Family History Center in the world.

Currently, funds are being sought for the microfilming of:

- War of 1812 Pension and Bounty-Land Warrant Records
- United States Colored Troop (USCT) Compiled Service Records.

Other examples of completed projects of the Stern NARA Gift Fund:

- Microfiche of Street Indexes to the 39 larger cities for the 1910 census.
- Galveston Passenger Arrival Records 1896-1948.
- 1920 Census Enumeration Districts.
- Index of War of 1812 Prisoner of War Records.

Access to this information is through any of the regional National Archives, but also through any LDS (Mormon) Family History Center in the world.

Additionally, the FGS NARA Filming Committee will continue to take suggestions for items to be microfilmed. Ideas are solicited from anyone interested in genealogy. The aim is to find material at the National Archives, or its branches, of major interest to genealogists.

I urge you to contribute your dollar to the Stern NARA Gift Fund and support the microfilming of NARA records.
