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For forty years, Mrs. Mabel Jacques Hadler, 13240 El Dorado, Apt. 187-H, Seal Beach, California, 90740, has developed the genealogy of the Selover-Slover Family and has published two books, the latest and most complete being a five hundred page volume published in 1968. Page references are to this book. The history of her family is given on page 309 of the book.

The history of John Elbert Binks Slover's ancestors has been excerpted almost verbatim from Mrs. Hadler's book, except that some slight modification has been made in the history of John Elbert Binks Slover's father and grandfather as the result of information contained in letters in the papers of James E. Slover, deceased, Rt. 2, Everton, Ark. 72933

The part of the history beginning with and following John Elbert Binks Slover is a blend of the work of Mrs. Hadler and of additional material developed from bibles, gravestones and recollections of his descendents.

We are greatly indebted to Mrs. Hadler for the fruits of her professional and dedicated work and for her gracious permission to use it in this pamphlet.

Excerpts Pages 1 through 7

The Slovers were French Huguenots who sought refuge in the Netherlands. The name seems to have been spelled Seloivre in the French form. Upon marriage to Dutch wives, who found the name difficult, the spelling became Seloover and Sloover. And then when New York was no longer Dutch, the English had trouble with both spelling and pronunciation and it became Selover and Slover. Some branches retained the Seloover spelling, others used Sellover and some even accented the first syllable by spelling it Sealover.

Mr. W. Blake Metheny of Philadelphia, Mrs. Harriet Stryker-Rodda, Archivist of Long Island Historical Society, and Mrs. Hazel Shear of Wellsville, N.Y., Historian of Allegany County, N.Y., are members of the Huguenot Society of America through their descent from Isaac Selover.

Several attempts have been made to find coat-of-arms but without success.

A letter from the Librarian of Leyde dated 10th of July 1951 says in part: "No. 4, Isacq Slover (or Selover). We found such a name. An Isaac Selover and his wife, Susanna Sohier, coming from Groede, joined the Church of Middelburg in October 1673."

A letter from an official in Middelburg dated 17 August 1951 supplies the following:

ISAAC SELOVER, born probably in Zeeland, son of Isaac Seloivre and Susanna Sohier. It is probable that Isaac left Holland shortly after the death of his father (between May 15, 1681 and April 25, 1682) as we find him on the tax rolls of Newcastle, Delaware from 1683-1687.

Isaac seems to have married his first wife, Hester Van Leuvenigh before coming to America and the first child, Susanna, may have been born in Holland. At the Hall of Records, Annapolis, we find a statement that Hendrick Van Leuvenigh was a brother-in-law of Isaac Slover.

Records of the New Amsterdam Reformed Dutch Church (N.A.R.D.C.) contain Isaac's second and third marriages. A translation of these records is as follows:

"Isaacq Selever, schoolmaster and assistant pastor at New Amersfoort, widower of Hester Leenda (Van Leuvenigh), and Jannekan Van Wilkenhof, widow of Jan Thyssen, the former of New Amersfoort, the second living here, Jan. 23, 1695."

"Isaacq Selover, widower of Jannekan Van Wilkenhof, and Judith Waldron of New York, Dec. 26, 1699." She was Baptised Dec. 22, 1675 New Amsterdam R.D. Church with Herman Smeeman (second husband of Annetje Daniels, Judith's paternal grandmother) and Gertrude Schuyler as sponsors.

ABRAHAM SELOVER, son of Isaac Selover and Jannekan Van Wilkenhof. Bp. Aug. 29, 1697, New Amsterdam R.D. Church with sponsors: Dirk Hooglant, Anna DeMill. Abraham married, presumably in New Jersey, Sophia Schermerhorn, b. Nov. 9, 1702, Esopus, Dutchess Co. N.Y., dau. of Lucas Schermerhorn and Elizabeth Damen. (Lucas Schermerhorn was born 1675, son of Jacob Janse Schermerhorn and Jannetje Egmont. She was the daughter of Cornelis Segerse Egmont van Voorhout. Jacob Janse Schermerhorn was a prominent trader in Baeverwyck in 1648. In 1715 Lucas' name appears on the muster-roll of Capt. Thomas

Farmer's Regt. of N.J. Militia and through this service Mrs. A. R. Granberg Amarillo, Texas became a Charter Member of the Amarillo Chapter of Colonial Dames of the 17th Century. In 1725 Lucas was one of the three Church Masters of the Readington R.D. Church.)

JACOB SLOVER, b. about 1731, Harlingen, N.J., son of Abraham Slover and Sophia Schermerhorn, md. either in New Jarsey before going to Virginia, after the death of his father, with his Schermerhorn relatives or in Va. He was killed by the Indians Aug. 1764. (Chalkleys Abstract of Records of Augusta Co. Va., shows that John Bowen was appointed administrator of the estate of Jacob Slover, Aug. 21, 1764. By family tradition, Jacob served in the Colonial Army at Braddock's defeat, 1756, but no proof has been found.) A pamphlet, "Narrative of the Perils and Sufferings of Dr. Knight and John Slover, Among the Indians During the Revolutionary War," by Hugh Brackenridge, published in Pittsburg, in 1782, gives John Slover's account of the massacre of his father, Jacob Slover and part of his family, by the Indians. From Pennsylvania Magazine, Vol. 20:570; List of Captives taken by the Indians and delivered to Col. Bouquet by the Mingoes, Delawares, Shawanese, Wyandots and Mohickons at Tuscararas and Muskingum, Nov. 1764. From Southern Dist., Elizabeth Slover, Elizabeth Slover, Jr. (Elizabeth, Sr. evidently was Jacob's wife.)

JOHN SLOVER, b. about 1755, near the New River, Augusta Dist. of Virginia, son of Jacob Slover and Elizabeth?, d. 1833 South Union Shaker Family,

Logan Co., Ky.

As related in Brackenridge's pamphlet, "Narrative of the Perils and Sufferings of Dr. Knight and John Slover ***", John Slover told how as a child, he was taken captive with his mother and sisters when the Indians killed his father, Jacob Slover. He was held a captive by the Miami Indians 6 yrs., then sold to the Delawares, returning to Ft. Pitt in 1773. His Indian name was Mannucothe. The pamphlet tells of John Slover's experiences when captured by the Indians while he was serving as a guide to Col. Wm. Crawford's ill-fated expedition against the Indians.

The story in brief, --While serving as a guide for Col. Wm. Crawford's ill-fated expedition against the Indians, John Slover and several others were captured. One by one they were killed after being tortured, leaving John for the last. After days of brutual torture, he was tied to a stake and a fire started. A sudden heavy rain-storm came up and put out the fire and his death was saved for the next day. That night he was closely guarded but, toward dawn, the Indians fell asleep and John managed to get loose. He chose the best horse in the meadow, took a rug for protection and rode away. With nothing but the rug for saddle and clothing, the flies and mosquitoes nearly drove him crazy, as his body was a mass of pulp from the torture. When the horse dropped dead he continued on foot and after several days without food he reached Wheeling and had to coax a boatman to take him across the river, as he looked like a negro.

In a letter to Mrs. Hight, James Anderson Slover told of talking to a man who had washed John Slover after his death and saw terrible scars on his body from his torture. (James Anderson Slover, b. Sept. 15, 1824, d. Nov. 13, 1913, was the son of John Slover and Rachel Taff, grandson of Abraham Slover and Martha Anderson, great grandson of Jacob Slover and Elizabeth, great great grandson of Abraham Selover and Sophia Schermerhorn, and great great grandson of the original Isaac Selover amd Jannekan Van Wilkenhof. Mrs. Hight was Grace Agnes Slover, b. Feb. 21, 1885, md. Jan. 9, 1915, Smith R., Clarence E. Hight. She was the daughter of Lewis Jackson Slover and Mrs. Maria Jaeckel (nee Maria Virchow), grandaughter of John Slover and Martha Jane Jackson, great grandaughter of Abraham Slover and Martha Anderson, great great great grandaughter of Jacob Slover and Elizabeth, great great great great grandaughter of Abraham Selover and Sophia Schermerhorn and great gre

Some official records of John Slover's war and service record follow:

From War Dept.: John Slover served in the Revolutionary War as a pvt. in a company designated at various times as Capt. Wm. Butler's Co. and Capt. Jas. Chrystie's Co. 2nd Pa. Batt.; also designated as 3d Pa. Regt. commanded successively by Col. Arthur St. Clair and Col. Joseph Wood. He enlisted Feb. 8, 1776 and his name last appears on the company roll for the period Jan. 1. to Mar. 31, 1777.

From Pa. Archives 5th Series, vol. V, p 647; Return of Capt. Chas Reed's Class Rolls, Chester Co. Militia, 1781, John Slover.

From Pa. Arch; 6th Series, vc' XI; p. 145; Capt. Chas. Reed's Co., 4th Batt. Washington Co., Militia; ordered to rendezvous July 3, 1782. John Slover, page 385; Sandusky Expedition, Col. Wm. Crawford: two-thirds of troops from Washington Co., the remainder from Westmoreland. Guide John Slover.

It was probably by boat down the Ohio R. that the John Slover family went to Red Banks, now Henderson, Ky. From U. S. Geodetic Survey, Topographical sheets 188 and 494: Slover Creek is situated in western Webster Co., Ky. (formed 1860 from Henderson)

Although the family has always thought John died about 1833 the Shaker records state: May 3rd. 1813. Demise - Jno. Slover Senr. Died & buried next day.

John Slover, Sr., John Slover, Jr. and Isaac Slover paid taxes in Henderson Co. 1800.

Mrs. Hadler's Slover Book gives a great deal more detail and documentation on John Slover, principally with regard to his Shaker relationships.

About 1776 John Slover married Nelly who died after him in So. Union, Ky. Their children were as follows:

- *1. Isaac Slover, b. 1777, Pennsylvania, d. Oct. 15, 1843, San Bernardina, Cal. (Later in the details of his life, Mrs. Hadler gives the date of his death as Oct. 15, 1854 and in a letter dated Sept. 8, 1850 to his wife Viley, Isaac's son, James, writing from Hangtown, Cal. said he had heard from his father and brother.) So it would appear the 1843 date should be 1854.
- 2. Eunice Slover, Shaker records: "Feb. 3, 1814, Eunice Slover left South Union for Busero, her former home." Nothing further.
- 3. ? Nelly Slover, listed 1831 as a signer of the Covenant, "Nelly S. Slover, Age 50." (Born 1781). On Aug. 26, 1822, "Nelly or Leona Slover" was one of those who went to Black Lick near Dayton, Ohio to start the Watervliet Family. In a later list of members at Watervliet, the name is given as Nelly Luana Slover.
- 4. Jenny (Jiney, Jane) Slover, Shaker records: "Sept. 14, 1810 at Busero Confession Jenny Slover confessed Sep. 14." On Feb. 25, 1815 she signed the Covenant of West Union (Busero).
- 5. John Slover, Jr., b. about 1784, Pennsylvania; d. 1858 South Union Shaker Family.
- 6. Preston Slover, b. about 1788, lived Wabash and Wayne Cos., Ill.
- 7. James Slover, b. about 1794, d. about 1826, Vanderburgh Co., Ind.

It is not known just where Isaac lived before going West, as the census records, giving birthplaces of the children are never the same twice. But it was probably in Ky. and Ind., since, when he moved west, he took the older children with him but left the twins with a brother. When the twins were about 10 yrs. old, an older brother came from Arkansas to take them to join the family. This was about 1826; that was when Isaac's youngest brother, James died in Vanderburgh Co., Ind. His widow may not have been able to care for the boys any longer.

The following record from the Nat'l Archives, Washington, D.C. may possibly belong here, as Isaac was also known as Cristobal and Louis. Christian Slover, pvt. Carter's Regt., Militia, a company at Hamilton Dist., Terr. South of the Ohio, commanded by Nathaniel Taylor, Oct. 4 to 14, 1793. 11 days: \$3 per month: \$1, 10cents.

Grant Foreman's "Pioneer Days in the Old Southwest" refers to that part of the Journal of the English naturalist, Thomas Nuttall, when he describes his travels in the neighborhood of Ft. Smith, Ark.; Nuttall went with two men in a canoe up Grand River to the salt works... they arrived at the home of a Mr. Slover, a hunter, who had a good farm on a fine elevation two miles below the Saline. The next day, he walked with Mr. Slover to see the salt works..."

Josheph J. Hill in "History of Warner's Ranch and Environs" says; "In Feb. 1824, Ewing Young, Wm. Wolfskill, Slover and others fitted out a trapping party at Taos to trap on the San Juan and other tributaries of the Colorado or Rio Grande of the West, as it was then called."

From Ingersoll's "Century Annals of San Bernardino Co., 1769-1904," as related by John Brown, Sr.: "A party of free trappers of whom I was one, erected an adobe fort on the Arkansas River in Colorado for protection and as headquarters during the winter season. We called it "Pueblo" and the city of Pueblo now stands on this ground. Into this fort, Christobal Slover came one day with two mules loaded with beaver skins. He was engaged to help me supply the camp with game and during the winter we hunted together, killing buffalo, elk, antelope and deer. He would leave our camp and be gone for weeks at a time wihout anyone knowing his whereabouts and at last he did not return at all." In John Brown, Jr's "History of San Bernardino Co." some of the members of the party of trappers were given as; James W. Waters, V. J. Herring, Alex Godey, Kit Carson, Bill Williams, Fitzpatrick, Bridger, Bill Bent, the Subletts and others.

From Bancroft's "History of California" Vol III, p. 162-166, for 1825-40; A resume. Sylvester Pattie and son, Jas. Ohio Pattie headed a party of trappers on the Colorado, 1827. With a passport from the N. Mexican custom-house, they started westward across the desert, having buried their furs. After terrible suffering they reached Santa Catalina Mission in Lower (Baja) California, Mar. 12, 1828. Ten days later, by Gov. Echandia's order, they were taken under guard to San Diego. The company included, besides the Patties, Nathaniel Pryor, Richard Laughlin, Wm. Pope, Isaac Slover, Jesse Ferguson and Jas. Puter. They were kept isolated until the buried furs were offered as ransom. They were released on condition that they return with the furs, leaving Jas. Pattie as hostage. The furs had all been spoiled by the overflow of the river. Four of the six returned in Sept.; the other two left their companions on the Colorado and started for New Mexico. Those two were probably Slover and Pope.

In Nov. 1828, Isaac was issued a pass to go back to Sonora. In 1843, a party of colonizers from N. Mex., commanded by Don Jose Salazar arrived at La Politano and founded a village known as Aqua Mansa (healing water). Isaac settled at San Bernardino at the south base of the mountain that bears his name.

From Hist. of San Bernardine Co.: Isaac Slover married a widow with a family, Maria Barbara Aragon. There is a story about the mountain which may have some truth. It is said that an old Mexican, perhaps Pio Pico, the last Mexican governor, owned the land which now takes in several cities and when the time came to divide his lands among his children, he gave the lands under cultivation to his sons, and a daughter received Slover Mt. Later, marble and limestone were discovered and the daughter made a fortune.

From Westways Magazine, June 1958 - The Mountain They Put In Sacks: Lime kilns went into operation in the late 1850's; marble was mined by 1861. This mountain which once rose more than 700 ft. above the surrounding plain, was called "Tahualtapa" or "Hill of the Ravens" by the Indians; "Cerrito Solo" or "Lone Hill" by the Spaniards.

John Brown continued as follows: "Slover was a quiet peaceable man, very reserved. He would heed no warning and accepted no advice as to his method of hunting. His great ambition was to kill grizzlies—he called them 'Cabibs.' "One day he went with a companion (James McMinds) up the left fork of the Sajon Pass, almost to the summit. There they came across a large grizzly and Slover fired at close range. The bear fell, but soon rose and walked away and lay down in some bushes. Slover after re-charging his rifle began approaching the monster, in spite of the objection of his friend as the old man approached the animal it gave a sudder full apring upon him. The other man came down the mountain and told the tale and a party went back. They found Slover still alive but insensible. The bear had done its work thoroughly. The scalp was torn from his head, his legs and one arm broken, the whole body torn and bruised."

From Los Angeles Star, Oct. 19, 1854; "The burial service was conducted by John Brown, his friend of Rocky Mt. days and some of the officials of the Mormon Church in the most orthodox style. The officiating priest was one of the sons of Capt. Jefferson Hunt."

In 1931, Enoch A. Slover, a grandson then living in Los Angeles, tried to locate Isaac Slover's grave. Mr. Geo. Beattie of Highland Cal., gave the following in the San Bernardino Sun, June 29, 1931: "In the first place I will call attention to the fact that the pioneer Slover was known by several Christian names. In the census of Los Angeles in 1844, he is named as a resident of San Bernardino Rancho and is called Luis. His will, probated in a SanBernardino court, was signed Isaac Slover and in the burial records of the Aqua Mansa Church he is entered as Christobal Slover. In all the records mentioned, his wife is called Maria Barbara Aragon. Cerrito or Slover's mountain is the burial place of the old hunter; marked by a cross, due to the piety of Dona Babara (his wife) without doubt. Apparently, Slover's wife was not satisfied with the burial service, for there is a record of a church burial of the body of Christobal Slover on Oct. 24. Whether there was a disinterment and reburial I do not know. Slover's grave was in the west end of the cemetery alongside those of Louis Bubidoux, the Trujillos and others of the early settlers of the New Mexican colony. A grass fire destroyed the wooden crosses that marked the graves of the pioneers."

From John Brown, Sr.: "He was taken to his home and buried between his adobe house and the southeast base of the mountain."

State Of California, County of Los Angeles, San Bernardino Township, Nov. 30th 1852.

Know all men by these presance that I Isaac Slover, do this day will & bequeath to my wife Maria Barbery all of my possessions, goods and chattles, lands and tenements, ec. To have and to hold for her own property, to use the same for her benifit from henceforth and forever. In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and afix my seal this day and date above mentioned.

P.S. My land being or lying in two peaces - above 250 yards more or less and below 300 yards more or less. The whole making 550 yards more or less of land belonging to me.

a mine explosion in California where he had gone with a group to the gold fields. In this group were John and Enoch, brothers of James, and James' sons Elbert and Alfred, and his son-in-law, John Jackson, who was blinded in the mine explosion Enoch led John Jackson home. (In the papers of James E. Slover, deceased. Rt. 2, Everton, Ark. 72933, are several letters and documents of the period 1833-1873.) Included is a letter from James Slover to his wife Viley (Vila) dated May 26, 1850 from Plate River, near Yount Cannery telling of his trip to that point. Two other letters are from Hangtown (Placerville) Cal. and are dated Sept. 8, 1850 and Oct. 13, 1850. In the first letter he mentioned hearing from his father, Isaac Slover, and his brother through a man who had seen his brother 7 weeks before. The brother is not identified. In the last letter he tells his wife of the death by fever of their son Elbert on Oct. 3, 1850. There is also a part of a letter dated May 3, 1850 from Pt. Scott, Mo. by Elbert Slover to his wife Elizabeth. Another letter, dated May 10, 1851, Albany, Oregon Territory, from John Bowen to Samuel. Henry, Huntsville, Ark., stated that he had loaned James Slover \$16.00. This material also contains the will of Vila Slover, dated April 21, 1857 and recorded for probate June 23, 1857. Also there is a power of attorney, dated August 19, 1857 by John Jackson and Louisa Jackson appointing John Slover as their attorney. Children of James Ira Slover and Vila
