Note - Most of the information, especially of later dates, has been compiled from private sources, and, though every effort has been made to be accurate, there have been some discrepancies found which have been interpreted as accurately as possible. Any Corrections or more information will be gratefully accepted with the view of better and more complete study of the Stockwell family.

The first Stockwells came from Scotland some time in the 1600's. At this time the ocean freighters were short of deckhands and many men were shanghaied for that work. Of this number was one Stockwell, who, legend says, was taken aboard a ship after having been liberally supplied with Scotch rye whiskey, and there sold by his abductor for enough money to pay the captor's fare. The term of his indenture is unknown, but it was usually set at three years.

Of the early Stockwells in America, there were five men - perhaps brothers. This surmise is substantiated by the names which are found in the Stockwell descendants: Quintin, Abel, John, Eleazer and Daniel. Of these Quintin settled in Ipswich, Mass. and seems to have left the most descendants and it is of this family that this genealogy is being compiled.

So, beginning with Quintin, we find that he was born in Scotland, and on April 11, 1666, was married at Medfield, Mass. to Abigail Bullard, who was born August 8, 1641, at Dedham, Mass., and died May 5, 1730, at Suffield, Conn. She was the daughter of John and Magdalen; William Bullard (Buller) and Grace Bignett; Henry and Margaret. Quintin died January 22, 1714/15.

From Sheldon, Volume I "History of Deerfield", we find a bit of information about Quintin. On September 19, 1677 a band of savages swooped upon the men of the town - resting in the evening. "Stockwell rushed down the hill and into the swamp. He slumped and fell down into the mire. One Indian, thinking he was wounded, came up to tomahawk him. Stockwell kept him at bay with an empty pistol. The Indian told him they had destroyed all of Hatfield and the woods were full of Indians, but assured him of safety if he would yield. Stockwell surrendered."

Seventeen Hatfield people were captives. The assailants, a party of 26 Indians from Canada, bound the captives and the march to Canada began. At night the captives were staked down. Stockwell says: "The first night of staking down, being much tired, I slept as comfortable as ever."

The whites with the aid of the Mohawks, set out to ransom the captives, went to Quebec and with the help of Governor Frotenac, ransom was paid and they started homeward.

This precedes the writing of the following letter, which was penned in Albany enroute home:

Dated February to May 22nd, 1678 - "Loving Wife: Having now opportunity to remember my kind love to thee and our child and the rest of our friends, tho we met with great affliction and trouble since I see thee last, yet now here is opportunity and joy and thanksgiving to God, that we are now pretty well and in

a hopeful way to see the faces of one another before we take our final farewell of this present world, likewise God hath raised us friends amongst our enemies, and there is but three of us dead of all those that were taken away. Sg't. Plympton, Samuel Russell, Samuel Foote's daughter. So I conclude being in haste, and rest your most affectionate husband till death makes separation. Quintin Stockwell."

Upon his return his second son was born at Branford, Conn., and they later moved, in 1683, to Suffield, Conn.

Issue of Quintin included Elizabeth, who was born June 15 and died July 9, 1667, at Dedham, Mass.; 2- John, born October 8, 1676; and 3- Eleazer, born April 25, 1679.

Of (3) Eleazer (1) descendants, we have been unable, up to this time, to contact more than one line of descent, which is as follows:

(3) Eleazer (1) was born April 25, 1679, and married October 21, 1700, to Sarah Pea(r)se of Suffield, daughter of William and grand-daughter of Richard who married Sarah Brown. They had issue of:

(A) Eleazer (3-1) married Mary Plough and had issue of: (B) Levi; was in Revolutionary War.

(B) Levi (A-3-1) born 1740 and died 1812. He married, first, Winche Karner, and second, Widow Holcomb. Had issue of:

(C) David; Eleazer, born April 21, 1768; died March 3, 1841; married March 7, 1802, Margaret Noble; Andrew, born 1770/2; died October 14, 1827; married June 4, 1804, Sybil Root.

(C) David (B-A-3-1) was born 1764 and died 1841 in Canton, Conn. He married in 1807 Lucy (Mills) Merritt, the daughter of Col. Amasa and Lucy (Curtis) Mills. Lucy was born August 2, 1772, at Canton, Conn., and died January 1, 1842, at Canton, Conn. They had issue of: (D) Amasa Mills, born March 1, 1808, at Ira, New York, and died April 28, 1879; Diadema Caroline, born July 9, 1810; died July 20, 1891; married April 12, 1827, Sabin Taylor; Peter, born 1815; 1-married January 22, 1833 Lucy B. Shepard; 2-married November 28, 1850, Sarah A. Mills; Pluma, born 1816; married Jan. 4, 1835, George A. Mills.

(D) Amasa Mills (C-B-A-3-1), married October 18, 1832, to Irene Case, who died in 1891. She was the daughter of Ezra and Dorcas Case. They had issue of:

Diadema, Joseph, Lucy, Lorinda, Amasa, Chloe, Helen, (E) Myron, Veronia Amelia (died at 9 months), and Frank.

(E) Myron (D-C-B-A-3-1) was born June 8, 1851, and died March 2, 1931. He married October 31, 1872, Myra Eliza Smith, born January 12, 1849, and died April 8, 1931. She was the daughter of William Cameron and Marcia (Cheldun) Smith. They had issue of:

Dr. William M. Stockwell, who is at the present time living at 232 Belltrees Street, Denedin, Florida. We are indebted to him for this brief resume' of his family.

Going back to (1) Quintin, we find that his other son, (2) John, was bor October 8, 1676, at Deerfield, Mass. He was one of the first settlers of Marlborough, Vermont. He was married first at Suffield, Conn. on August 13, 1702, to Elizabeth Weller, who died September 12, 1716, at Suffield, Conn. He was married, second, Dec. 11, 1716, at Suffield, to Mindwell Olds, daughter of Robert and Susanna (Hanford) Olds of Suffield. The issue of his first marriage was as follows:

 and died at his farm home near Salem, Wisconsin, on Aug. 8, 1886. In early
 life he taught school and later peddled in Kentucky and other southern states
 for a firm in New York City which handled silverware and jewelry. Thomas
 finished his studies at Guilford Academy, Norwich, New York; he went to
 Manchester, Michigan, where he operated a retail store for about a year with
 his brother Aaron, and in February of 1837, went to Wisconsin, and built a
 small home on land on the south side of the Kemosha and Geneva Road (which is
 now Highway 50) about 80 rods east of what is now called Silver Lake Corners.
 He was the oldest of the five brothers and sisters who went to Wisconsin.

Living at Bainbridge, New York at this time was Augustus Parsons
 and his wife Lydia. They were natives of Connecticut. Issue of this marriage
 totaled 13, and one of them was named Ann Sophronia Parsons, born June 5, 1818.

Thomas returned to New York, and although Ann was thirteen years his
 junior, they were married Sept. 20, 1837, and set out at once for Wisconsin.
 Their journey lay by boat down the Erie Canal to Buffalo, and thence by boat

through the Great Lakes to Southport, which is now Kenosha. Ann died Jan. 26, 1898.

Thomas was appointed a member of the First Wisconsin Constitutional Convention of 1846-7, but owing to illness was unable to attend. He served as Town Supervisor and Justice of the Peace. Issue of this marriage

Mary Jane, born July 11, 1838; died Apr. 1937; married June 16, 1885, in Salem, Wisconsin, Charles C. Reed, of Springfield, Ill. They had no children.

Augustus, born June 18, 1844; died Aug. 14, 1845;

(19) Aaron Field (12-9-5-2-1) was born in January, 1810 at Bainbridge, Chenango County, New York. He married Cynthia Ann Case in February, 1837 at Dundee, Monroe County, Michigan. It was while keeping store in Manchester, Michigan that he met Cynthia Ann, who was the daughter of Oliver Case and Electa Webster. (Electa traces her ancestry back to Governor John Webster of Connecticut).

During 1837 Aaron and his brother Stephen and sister Susan came to Salem, Wisconsin, where their brother Thomas had already settled. All of them acquired government land in the vicinity of Salem, and in 1846 the fifth member of the family, Jane, came west. She went to Fond du Lac County and married Heman Birch. A son of this marriage later became Superintendent of Schools of Milwaukee.

Cynthia Ann Case was born May 28, 1817, at Rochester, New York, and died Sept. 12, 1893 at Tullahoma, Tennessee. Issue of her marriage to Aaron Field Stockwell:

Lucretia, born 1838 and died in 1842;

(27) Charles Abner, born May 8, 1840;

Evaline Lee, born 1848; died Nov. 18, 1886 at Waterloo,

Wisconsin.

In 1846, after several years of farming near Salem, Wisconsin, the family moved to Southport, same state, where Aaron became a clerk for the Manny & Ayre General Store. In 1850 they moved to Chemung, Ill. and in November of 1852, to Kansas City, Missouri, where Aaron went into the General Merchandise business with John A. Bowen as a partner. In 1856 the Border Ruffian Trouble over the settlement of Kansas Territory ruined their business and drove Aaron, who was known as a Northerner, to return to Knox County, Illinois. Upon his arrival here he again took up farming and stayed until 1858. He did not like farming and in that year left his family and went to California where he remained, looking for gold, until the outbreak of the Civil War. About then he went up into Oregon and enlisted for Army service; he was with Captain Scott's Company of the Fourth Volunteer Infantry and was in the service for about four years in different parts of Oregon.

Of Aaron Field Stockwell's death nothing is known. Soon after the end of his Army service he went back to the middle west to visit relatives. He was last seen alive with a nephew, Eugene Case, the son of his wife's brother Abner. At the time of his disappearance he was known to be carrying \$1,800.00 with which he was going to Kansas City to close a business deal. Eugene said that he got onto the train; the conductor, brakeman and station agent, to all of whom Aaron was well known, said that they had not seen him.

(20) Stephen (12-9-5-2-1) was born in 1815, at Bainbridge, Chenango County, New York, and in 1845 died at Salem, Wisconsin, from the effects of exposure.

Stephen was an accomplished musician and played several instruments, although the violin was his favorite. He played with an orchestra in New York City while he was there learning his trade as cabinet-maker. He was in stature far larger than any other member of his family, as well as of his associates, as he reached the height of six feet seven inches and had a normal weight of over two hundred pounds.

He came to Wisconsin and acquired farm land adjoining that of his brothers. They had each taken up 160 acres at \$1.25 per acre. It was near here, at the home of her uncle, that Stephen met Roana Rich. She was the daughter of Larned Bush Rich who married Amanda Pierce, cousin of President Franklin Pierce. Roana was born in Ticonderoga, New York, and while visiting Zion Rich of Kenosha, Wisconsin, she and Stephen were married in 1840. To this union were born:

In the early spring of 1847 tragedy invaded the lives of this family. Stephen went out one day to chop some wood and do some hunting. While he was gone a terrible blizzard came up. He tried to return home and became a bit bewildered, so that he floundered into one of the numerous warm springs of that region. He climbed out and once more started homeward, only to be set upon by a pack of wolves. These he escaped by climbing a tree, but they kept him there in the raw, wind-swept storm for the rest of the night. It was not until neighbors came by on their way to the water spring the next morning that they found Stephen nearly unconscious, with his clothes frozen to his body. They carried him home, where he lived but never regained his health. Two years later, after a great deal of suffering, he died at the age of 32.

Two years after Stephen's death Roana married a second time, Bolivar Waggoner. To this union was born a girl, Mary. Roana, her husband and daughter went to California, leaving the boys, Edwin and Cassius, with relatives. From California Roana, Mary and Bolivar later went to Oregon, where they amassed quite a sizeable fortune, and were making plans to return to the two boys. But again tragedy struck Roana's life. They had settled in the Rogue River Valley. One day in 1855 Bolivar was away at Jacksonville, a matter of ten miles, and on his return, coming up a hill overlooking the farm he saw the entire area in flames, having been set by Indians. He returned to town, secured a posse and came back. Very few of the Indians escaped; neither did Mary nor her mother Roana, for they were found burned to death. Bolivar turned bushwhacker, and as far as we have been able to determine, was never heard from again by any of the family or friends.
