THE JAMES STOUT FAMILY

706

James Stout arrived in Pope County around 1842. He was born in Madison County Kentucky about 1809, the son of Abraham and Sarah P. Stout. Abraham was born ca 1779/80 probably in North Carolina. He was in Knox & Roane Counties Tennessee by 1806 and was the surveyor for the Baltimore Post Road which ran through Madison, Morgan, Blount, Cullman Counties, Alabama to Elyton, Alabama and moved along the route as he surveyed. This road is also called Elyton Stage Road & Stout's Road. Abraham Stout may have died in Washington County, Arkansas.

James Stout married Elizabeth Rackley on July 24, 1828 in Blount County, Alabama. He served in the U.S. Army Cavalry in the Civil War. He was 5'10", dark complexioned, blue eyes and dark hair. They had children: Sarah P., Isabella, John Dewitt, Michael, William H., Margaret A., Eliza A., Horatio Houston. The last two were born in Pope County. James died March 15, 1866 in Gum Log, Arkansas.

Sarah P. Stout was born 10 May 1830 in Blount County, Alabama and died 19 February 1909 in Gum Log. She married John C. Dixon in Pope County on November 25, 1847. Their children were: Mary Ann, David Clinton, James Warren, Alfred B., Nancy Isabella, William M., Elizabeth Ann, Margaret, Houston, Hugh D., Eliza Catherine and Henry Lee Dixon.

Eliza Catherine Dixon was born February 3, 1870 and died 15 January, 1931. She married Daniel Webster Matthews on September 1887 in Pope County. They had children: Gladys May, Andy Everette, Innas Bell, Edward, Frank Ward, Edith Irene. Gladys and Innas died young. Andy Everette married Eunice Holliman and had James Everette and Burnelle Helene. Edward, born March 31, 1893, married Mabel L. Cook and had Edward Freed, Catherine Rebecca, Margaret Irene and Mary Evelyn. Frank Ward married Ada Estelle Crain and had Daniel Edward and Anna Paul. Edith married William F. Millner and had Betty Ann and Max Fretwell Millner.

WILLIAM STOUT

707

William Stout, an early pioneer of Pope County, was a farmer, soldier, political leader, and a minister. He left his mark in Pope County through his efforts to improve his community, county, and state.

William, son of Abraham and Sarah Stout, was born in Knox County, Tennessee in 1806. His father was a surveyor and road builder who opened some of the major stage roads from Tennessee into the central part of Alabama.

The Stout family moved from Roane County, Tennessee, into Cotoaco County, Alabama in 1818, where Abraham was elected County Clerk. In the 1820's the family moved to Blount County. On July 26, 1826, William married Anne Parker. They were the parents of James M., born in 1828, John W., 1832, Elizabeth, 1836, Delano B., 1838, Milly M., 1842, Matilda, 1843, and Mary L., in 1847.

In 1842 William, with his brother, James, and their families, moved near Dover in Pope County, Arkansas. His father Abraham moved to Washington County, and his brother Peter to Lawrence County. Peter and his family later settled near Dardanelle, Arkansas.

In 1846, when the conflict between the United States and Mexico resulted in warfare, William volunteered in Capt. David West's Unit, which was formed in Pope County, to serve with Lt. Colonel W. Gray's Arkansas Volunteers. He was discharged April 30, 1847, at Ft. Gibson, Cherokee Nation.

While living in Alabama, William had served on the board of trustees for a Methodist Church developed on land granted by his father. Upon his return to Pope County following his war service, he served as a Methodist minister. Between 1847 and his death in 1865, he performed 61 marriages in the county. In 1848 he was elected County Clerk and served two additional terms.

With the outbreak of hostilities in the Civil War, William was placed in a perplexing position. He was born and reared in the South, but his political belief was for a strong federal union. This belief would bring him into conflict within his family and with some of his friends.

He was elected to represent Pope County when the constitutional convention was called at Little Rock on March 4, 1861. The delegation voted not to secede from the Union. When Lincoln called for Arkansas to raise 5,000 volunteers, the chairman would recall the delegates to Little Rock. William's concern was shared with his friend and fellow delegate, Jessie Turner, in a letter dated April 4, 1861. "Should we union men change our position? Should we become secessionists? I for one say not yet. . . . For me to take the side of the North against my brothers of the South . . . would be too bad, and to roll up my sleeves and kill off men that never did me harm . . . that would be bad . . . I have never looked at so gloomy a future."

The constitutional convention was later re-convened and the vote was 69 to 1 to secede. During the war William served in the home guard. He and others, fearing the courthouse would be burned, removed the county records to a place of safety for the duration of the war.

As it did in many other Arkansas families, the war brought division within the Stout family. William's youngest son, Delano, joined the Confederate Army in January, 1861. His oldest sons, James and John, as well as his younger brothers, James and Peter, joined the Federal Army in 1863. Delano died in captivity at Center Point, Virginia, in 1864. Peter died in 1864 in a cavalry Depot at present Devalls, Bluff, Arkansas.

In late 1863, when the Federal Army held most of Arkansas, another convention was called. William again represented Pope County and the delegates revised the constitution and submitted it to a vote of the people. A new constitution was passed by a majority and Isaac Murphey was elected Governor. Governor Murphey appointed William as county clerk of Pope County and instructed him to install the other county officials. The county records were brought from their place of hiding and placed in the Methodist Church, which served as temporary courthouse.

On the evening of December 6, 1865, William was writing letters at his home when an assassin killed him by firing a shot through a window. With the death of William, another voice of moderation was stilled, and a reign of terror began that would last for many years in Pope County, and would be known as the "Militia War."

In late 1841 or early 1842, William, James and Peter moved to Dover, Ar. Abraham must have moved with them but moved to Evansville, Ar. in Washington Co. Abraham bought town property bordering Indian Terr. He bought this property in 1842. He made a will in Sept. 1842 and it was filed in Dec. 1842. The probaton of this estate has been lost.

William Stout served in Capt. David Wests Co. B, of Gray's Ark. Vols. He served in 1846 and 1847. he was discharged at Ft. Gibson Indian Terr.. He received land in Pope co. because of this service.

He served as County Clerk 1848-1850, 1850-1852, 1852-1854. He was appointed again in 1865 and was in this position at the time he was killed. I believe that he was one of the men that was involved in saving the court records during the Civil War.

Williams granddaughter, Ethel Stout Bowden is living at Pottsville, and has the desk that he was using at the time he was shot through a window. Her father was John Wesley Stout, second son of William. He served as assistant to his father as County Clerk. He was also Sheriff 1868-1872. At least I believe that the J. W. Stout that served during those years was my great-great uncle.

On 9-23-1861, J. J. Bowden and wife Narcissa made a deed to the Methodist E. Church South. Trustees were William Stout, C. W. Jamison, W. E. Jamison, N. B. Rowland, D. P. West, Athan Conner, and William Evants.

Williams brothers, Peter and James served with the Federal forces during the Civil War. His two sons James Monroe and James Wesley did also. Peter died in service. I have all of the military records.

William also served as School Commissioner. I found several deeds in the court house where he bought land for the county schools.

With the errors I have made and also this old typewriter, I hope you can make out this brief report. I look forward to hearing from you and receiving material you have found researching William Stout.

THE CONDITION OF THE ABOVE OBLIGATION IS SUCH that, whereas the above bounden J W Stout has this day applied to the Clerk of the County Court of Yell County, for a License authorizing the solemnization of the Rites of Matrimony between the said J W Stout and Flourne Hardin. Now, if the said parties applying for said License have a lawful right to the same, and if they shall faithfully carry into effect and comply with the provisions thereof, and shall, within sixty days from the date hereof, return the said License to the office of the Clerk of the County Court of said County, duly executed and officially signed by some one authorized by law to solemnize the Rites of Matrimony, then this obligation shall be void, but otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.


