

Swindle/Swindell History

The Swindle name is believed to be English. It is said to mean "one who came from Swindale". There is a chapelry in the parish of Shap in northern England's county of Westmoreland named Swindale. The original meaning of the name is thought to be derived from a dale or dell where swine were raised or perhaps a haunt of wild boars. There is a great website at <http://dswindell.members.beeb.net/aOSwind.htm> the research was done by David Swindell and he explores the origin of this family name.

The family claims a coat of arms, which has a boar's head and two crossed blue swords with gold hilts on a silver shield.

In records I have seen that there was a William Swindell who was born before 1584 in England and was killed in an Indian massacre in Virginia. He died on Captain Berkley's plantation about 60 miles from Jamestown, Virginia in 1624. His last name is spelled Swandal in these records. Thanks to Dee Holland Swindell's research on a recent trip to Virginia some interesting information has been found about this William Swandal. "William Swandal was an iron worker brought over in 1619 on the ship Margaret by Lord Berkley. A ship full of iron workers sponsored or indentured by Lord Berkley were brought over to work at the Falling Creek Iron Works now sited in the city limits of Richmond Va." "William came without his wife and sons. There was only one wife and family on the ship and it was not William's. He was age 32 whereas most of the men were in their early twenty's or late teens." "So on Good Friday, 1622 the natives wandered into the various settlements as was their custom and rose up and massacred many settlers including those at the Falling Creek Iron Works. So, William Swandal was not killed at Berkley Plantation, but at the Iron Works further inland. One of the Natives warned some of the settlers of the attack and many were spared. However there was heavy loss of life among the settlers." This information was gathered from the Charles City Historical Society in Charles City and the Rockefeller Research Library in Williamsburg, Virginia.

In Cheshire, England on 08 Oct 1578 a William Swyndles married Margery Barber. On 10 Dec 1598 in Cheshire, England a William Swindles married Izabell Hiberte. On 29 May 1610 in Cheshire England a William Swindles married Elizabeth Mallbone. There are several others by this name in Cheshire. William Swindles and Isabell Hiberte had sons, Thomas Swindle and Daniel Swindle.

In a muster taken 30 Jan 1624 there is a Thomas Swinhow who was reported as having arrived on the "Diana" and living in the main of the Corporation of James City, Virginia. The researcher that Dee Holland Swindell spoke to at the Charles City Historical Society indicated that this Thomas Swinhow/Swenhow was from another family and not related to William Swandal/Swindel. There was a Thomas Swindell who arrived in Westmoreland County, Virginia in 1654. It has been indicated that Thomas Swindell moved to the eastern shore of Virginia. There was also a Daniel Swindell in this same area as mentioned as tithables in that county in 1666. Thomas Swindell had a son named John Swindell who married the daughter of George Willis. George Willis gave the

This John Swindle is thought to be the son of William Swindle (Sr.) of Hyde County, North Carolina. His Revolutionary War Pension file gives his age a 73 in 1833 making his birth year about 1760. It is likely Asa Swindle was his son as he is listed on the 1836 tax Records of Benton County, Tennessee and appears to have inherited John's 40 acres.

The 1820 census of Humphreys County, Tennessee includes:

John Swindle and in his household were one male 10-16 years of age, one male over 45 years of age, one female 10-16 years of age and one female over 45 years of age. Note:

The 1830 census of Humphreys County, Tennessee includes:

John Swindle and in his household were one male 20-30 years of age and one male 70-8-years of age.

This part of Humphreys County became part of Benton County. John Swindle lived near John Anderson who is known to have lived at Chalk Level. This son must have been Asa Swindle.

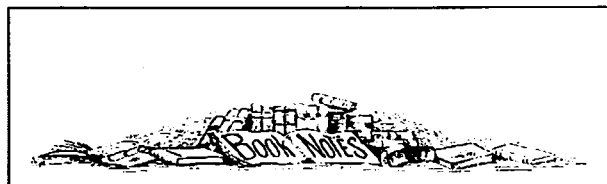
The Hyde County Historical and Genealogical Society of North Carolina has a publication called High Tides. The issue of High Tides seen as Volume VIII, Fall 1987, Number 2 includes a section titled "The Swindell Family". Hyde County, North Carolina had all the Swindle/Swindell

families included in the 1790 census of North Carolina except for two: Parker Swindell in Edenton District of Currituck County and a Samuel Swindell in the Wilmington District of Bladen County.

This article also states: "John, Son of William (Sr.) We believe that William Swindell (Sr.)'s son, John Swindell, is the person who in 1832 applied for a pension in Humphreys County, Tennessee." And also "It is most likely that Asa Swindell inherited his 40 acres as he is so listed in the 1836 tax records of Benton County."

The article also states "William Swindell (Sr.), was the son of John Swindell (Sr.), was married to Dina _____. We have been unable to identify Dina's parents. And "On 5 March 1746/47, John Swindell, Sr. was granted a patent to his 900 acre tract in Hyde County." John Swindell had "five sons - William, Josiah, Caleb, John (Jr.) and Zedekiah Swindell".

Christopher Swindell was a son of Caleb Swindell (Sr.). Christopher and his descendants moved to White County, Tennessee by 1820, as did John Swindle, the Revolutionary War Veteran. John Swindle would have been a cousin to Christopher. John moved from White County on into Humphrey's/Benton County by the 1820 census where "he entered a 40-acre tract in surveyor's district 12, range 7, section 3, on 25 May 1825. This cleared as a land grant on 27 June 1827. In 1834 he declared he had lived in Humphreys County "for the space of twelve years past"



couple a cow in 1668. John and ... (Willis) Swindell lived in North Hampton, Virginia and he died in North Carolina 1750. Thomas Swindell, who arrived in Westmoreland County, Virginia in 1654, was an indentured servant and John Walton and John Baynol who were Virginian "Planters" paid his transport. John Swindell was still on the eastern shore of Virginia as late as 1700 when he witnessed the will of John Tilney of Nassawaddox.

In 1702 John Swindell moved into Bath County, North Carolina and in that same year proved headrights to 240 acres. This John Swindell may have been the father to Thomas Swindell. In 1729 there was a Thomas Swindell who was a cooper from Beauford Precinct of Bath County North Carolina. Thomas Swindell purchased 100 acres on the north side of the Pamlico River from James Singleton.

There was a Timothy Swindle in Culpeper County, Virginia in the 1770's. This area of Virginia was settled by Germans, but it is believed that this Timothy Swindle was not of German ancestry. Timothy Swindle married Rebecca Crease (Crees, Crest, Criece, Greys) who was clearly German. Rebecca Crease's family was from Wurttemberg in what was to become Germany. Timothy and Rebecca Swindle had children:

It is obvious that the Swindle family came from England possibly as early as 1619. They settled in Virginia, moved into North Carolina by 1702, into Tennessee by 1815 and later into Arkansas by 1860.

According to research done by Charles H. Swindle and James E. Swindell The Swindle line is as follows:

John Swindle was born about 1523 in England. John's wife's name is unknown. Their son was William Swindle (Swandal) who was born before 1584 in England.

William Swindle (Swandal) married Isabell Hiberte on 10 Dec 1598 in Macclesfield, St. Michael, Cheshire, England. Isabell was born before 1580 in Cheshire. William Swindle (Swandal) was killed in the Indian massacre on Good Friday, 22 Mar 1622 at Berkley's Plantation 66 miles from James City, Virginia. James City is known today as Jamestown. Isabell died in 1652 in Virginia. William came to the New World about 1619/20. William and Isabell Swindle had at least two sons:

Thomas Swindle b. abt 1604 and lived in North Hampton, Virginia and Daniel Swindle

Thomas Swindle was born about 1604, lived in North Hampton, Virginia and died about 1669 in Rappanock, Richmond County, Virginia. Thomas's wife's name is unknown but she was born about 1610 in Rappanock and died about 1670 in Virginia. Thomas Swindle's known children were:

Timothy Swindle born between 1646-51 and died in 1683 in Virginia
John Swindle b, 1648 in North Hampton, Virginia

Daniel Swindle born about 1648.

Timothy Swindle married a lady named Sarah who was born in England. Sarah's last name is not known. Timothy and Sarah's son was John Swindle who was born 20 Mar 1675/76 in Rappanock, Farnham Parish, Richmond County, Virginia.

John Swindle married Mary McPherson, the daughter of William McPherson, about 1696 in Lower Norfolk, Currtuck County, Virginia. John died before 1772 in Hyde County, North Carolina. Mary Swindle died between 1746 and 1751. Some of their sons were:

Josiah Swindle was born about 1732 in Albermarle, Hyde County, North Carolina. Josiah was a carpenter by trade. He signed his will on 07May 1804. His estate was probated in 1806. He left mechanic tools equally divided among sons, furniture to daughters and most of his estate to his wife, Ester. Josiah Swindle was married at least three times. The name of his first wife is not known but they had a son:

Samuel Swindle was born about 1754 in Hyde County, North Carolina. He died about 1807 in the same county. Samuel is believed to have moved to Bladen County, North Carolina from Hyde County in the late 1700's. Samuel Swindle married a lady named Mary. Mary's last name is not known. Samuel and Mary Swindle had children:

Willis Swindle
Samuel Swindle
Henry Swindle b. abt. 1776
James Swindle

Note: Some indicate Samuel Swindle married Elanore Carawan who was born about 1756 in Hyde County, North Carolina. They say Elanore Carawan was the daughter of William Carawan and the mother of his children.

There is a document dated 07 Jun 1807 in Bladen County, North Carolina for a Samuel Swindall, which indicates that at the time of his death Samuel's wife was named Mary. This document reads:

"State of North Carolina
Bladen County

Know all men by these presents that Samuel Swindall Sen. of the County and State aforesaid planter for the love good will and affection which I have and do bare for my well beloved wife Mary Swindall and for divers other good causes and considerations me hereunto moving have given and granted and do by these presents do give and grant unto the said Mary Swindall during her natural life four negroes to wit: Nan Cuffo Salim and Lucy together with the third part of my stock and household furniture which negroes and other property after her death shall be equally divided between my four sons Viz: Willis, Samuel, Henry and James Swindall which property I the said Samuel Swindall do for myself my heirs executors administrators and assigns warrant and forever defend unto them their heirs and assigns as above directed against any lawfull claim or claims but be it remembered that the said Samuel Swindall will have the use of said property during my natural life the same as tho' this deed of gift had never been given and likewise be it remembered that the said Mary Swindall must not move the above mentioned property out of said County without the consent of my sons Viz: Willis, Samuel, Henry and James.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 7th of June in the year of our Lord 1807.

Samuel Swindall (seal)

May Term 1808: This deed was proved by John High and ordered to be registered.

J.S. Purdie, C.C."

Since Samuel only gave one third of his property to his wife, Mary it can be assumed the other two thirds went to his sons. Records indicate Samuel Swindall died in Hyde County about 1808. It is not clear if Samuel Swindall is one in the same as the Samuel Swindell who married Eleanor Carawn by 1793 in Hyde County, North Carolina but many researches say he is. In the 1800 North Carolina Census there were three Samuel Swindles listed, two in Bladen County, Sr. and Jr., and one in Hyde County. This part of Bladen County later became Columbus County and in that County there is a Will dated 16 Aug 1824 for Willis Swindal.

James Swindle was born about 1779 in North Carolina. James Swindle married Mary Howe, the daughter of Job Howe Jr. They were married in North Carolina. Mary Howe was also born about 1780 in North Carolina. James and Mary Swindle had children:

Seth Swindle b. abt. 1807

John Swindle (no further records)

Thomas Swindle b. 09 Feb 1811
William E. Swindle b. abt. 1813
Nathan Swindle b. abt 1815

These children appear to have been born in North Carolina. This family is seen in a part of Bladen County, North Carolina, which separated off as Columbus County. By 1829 they moved to a part of Humphries County, Tennessee, which separated off as Benton County.

There is a James and Mary Swindle found in Perry County, Alabama in the 1840 census. Thanks to Ginger Ferguson who has postings on www.genforum.com/swindal as she gave me their children's names and alerted me to the fact that this James Swindle had moved to Washington County, Florida.

A Mary Swindle is seen in the 1850 and 1860 census of Perry County Alabama living with her children.

It appears that this James Swindle left his family in Perry County, Alabama, sold his property and moved on to Washington County, Florida by 1850. The 1850 census of Washington County, Florida indicates James was 71 years of age. Family history indicates James left Alabama with Virginia Kershaw who was a "full-blooded Indian". One of her descendants says that when James died his family "came down" and took everything Virginia had. The sale of James's property in Perry County, Alabama states he was living in Washington County, Florida. He appears in the 1860 census of Washington County, Florida with a new wife and several young children:

William Swindle 1 year of age born in FL

It is reported that James and Virginia (Kershaw) Swindle had nine children together. Ginger Ferguson and I agree that that story about Lord and Lady Howe relates to a much earlier time than this James Swindle and his wife Mary Howe. Ginger believes the story but believes it happened while they were still in Virginia. She also believes the Lord Howe of the story was the father of William Howe who was the father of Job Howe of early North Carolina.

There is a land grant for James Swindle in the 12th District of Tennessee from 1829. It reads:

State of Tennessee
12th District

James Swindle by virtue of the right of occupancy enters two hundred acres of land in Range 8 section 2 beginning 90 poles East of a point 800 poles north 28 West from the north east corner of 100 acre entry in the name of Samuel P M Full runs north 228 poles to a conditional line thence west 44 poles north 12 poles west 20 poles north 20 poles thence west ... for compliment July 20 1829

J M Alexander ...

Land records in Washington County, Florida indicate there was a James Swindle who owned property in Range # 15 West, 3 North and 13 West, 2 North. There was also an Asa Swindle who owned land in 14 West, 2 North and a Thomas Swindle who owned land in 15 West 3 North according to the Federal Land Tract Book

Thanks to Wilt Gainey, who also posts on genforum, the final resting place of James Swindle was found. He states it is located in Township #2, Range #13 West, Section #33 of Washington County, Florida. A stone is located inside a small fenced area on private property about a half mile off Duma Jack Road and Ellen Road in a wooded area. The stone reads: "James Swindle 1779-Oct. 17, 1861 Native of North Carolina and his daughter Becky age 16". On the back of the stone it reads: "Swindle This memorial placed by the children of Jessie C. Swindle Sr. Bonifay FL". Becky must have been the Rebecca seen in the 1860 census.

Note: I do not believe that the James Swindle of Perry County, Alabama and later of Washington County, Florida is one in the same as the James Swindle who married Mary Howe and moved to Benton County, Tennessee. I looked at all available census records. The James Swindle of Bladen County, North Carolina was born before 1775. The James Swindle of Alabama and Florida appears to have been born about 1779. I believe this James was the son of Willis Swindle and a nephew of James Swindle who married Mary How. James Swindle, son of Willis, also had a son, James P. Swindle. I spent many hours researching this connection.

Jena Green Hopwood wrote a family history in 1987 called "The Swineherders". It contains photocopies of documents, photos and detailed information about the following:

Thomas Swindle was born 02 Feb 1811 in North Carolina. He died 29 May 1904 in Benton County, Tennessee. Thomas Swindle came to Tennessee with his parents when he was four years of age (1815). Thomas Swindle lived in Gismonda, Tennessee for over sixty years. When Thomas died he was reportedly 93 years, 3 months and 20 days old and was the oldest man in the county. Thomas Swindle was a Methodist and member of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and was licensed to "exhort", which is to preach, about 1850-1860. Thomas Swindle married 1st Miriam Anderson, the daughter of John and Elizabeth Anderson, on 15 Jan 1833. Thomas Swindle was Justice of the Peace in Benton County, Tennessee in 1869. Thomas and Miriam Swindle had children:

Thomas Swindle married 2nd Nancy F. Harris on 12 Jul 1873. Detia Roe indicates that the following children were by Nancy's 1st marriage to John Harris. Jena's book indicates they are Swindle:

Isabella Swindle (Harris)
Doctor Bennet Swindle (Harris)
Clark M. (Martin) Swindle (Harris)
Louellen Swindle (Harris)

Note: The 1870 census does indicate these children were the children of John and Nancy Harris and not Swindle children. The 1880 census names some of them as Swindle. This is probably how Jena got the idea, she may not have seen the 1870 census records.

The Swindle families had children attending the school of District Three from 1843-1850 according to the records of that time. These include, Thomas, Asa, Nathan and William Swindle. It is believed that Seth Swindle had gone on to Alabama. District Three is described as "begins at the mouth of Birdsong Creek runs up Creek to the mouth of Ammons Creek, thence up Ammons Creek to Garlands old place on the Natchez Trace, Thence northward running with the ridge, round the head of little Birdsong to Lewis Barkers on Cypress Creek. Thence northward private way leading by Berry Williams to Thomas Jones, Huntington road thence east with said road to Cane Creek thence down said creek to the mouth, and down Cypress creek to Ammons Bridge across said Creek thence with road to Kirkmans Ferry thence up Tennessee River to the beginning and say the election in said District be held at Chalk Level."

The Camden Chronicle, one of the early newspapers of Benton County, Tennessee reported Thomas's death on 10 Jun 1904. "Thomas Swindle, who had been in bad health for some time, died Sunday at the advanced age of 93 years, 3 months and 20 days, and was the oldest man in the county. Mr. Swindle was born February 9, 1811. He professed religion in July or August, 1843, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1844. In the division to which he belonged, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, he was licensed to exhort somewhere in the date between 1850 and 1860, and was faithful to the trust until his death, being a devoted servant of God for more than sixty years. He was first married to Miriam Anderson on January 15, 1833. To that union there was twelve children, eight of whom lived to be grown and four died in infancy. His second marriage was to Mrs. N.F. Harris on December 7, 1873, who survives him. In 1867, he received the degrees of F. & A.M. at Camden Lodge # 179, of which he died a member. The burial took place at Shiloh Cemetery Tuesday with all the honors of masonry and was attended by a large gathering of friends and relatives."

Note: Some researchers say this Thomas Swindle was the son of Christopher Swindle of White County, Tennessee?

William Anderson Swindle was born 18 Jan 1834 in Benton County, Tennessee which was Humphreys County at that time. He died 26 Jan 1914 in Randolph County, Arkansas. William A.

Swindle was a farmer and trader. William A. Swindle married 1st Angelina Smith on 10 Nov 1850 in Benton County, Tennessee. Angelina was the daughter of William and Elizabeth (Lewis) Smith. William A. and Angelina Swindle were living in Arkansas in 1860. Angelina Swindle died in Randolph County, Arkansas in 1860. William A. Swindle volunteered in the Civil War from Arkansas in 1863 under Captain William Black and Colonel Shaver. William A. Swindle was in battles in Missouri and Siloam, Arkansas. In 1864 William A. Swindle returned to Tennessee and lived there until 1911 when he returned to Arkansas to live with his son, Dr. William T. Swindle. He was known as "Uncle Billie" Swindle. William Anderson Swindle is buried in the Siloam Cemetery near Middlebrook, Arkansas. William A. and Angelina Swindle had children:

William A. Swindle married 2nd Mary (Smith) Lewis on 20 Jul 1864. Mary was married 1st to John Lewis on 30 Sep 1855. Mary and John Lewis had two children, Martha and William. Mary Smith was the sister of William A. Swindle's first wife. Mary Smith was born in Benton County, Tennessee 06 Oct 1840 and died in Randolph County, Arkansas on 23 Aug 1905. William A. and Mary Swindle had children:

The 1870 census of Benton County, Tennessee includes:

- William A. Swindle, 38 years of age

- William Lewis, 10 years of age
- Artie Swindle, 5 years of age
- Elizabeth Smith, 62 years of age (mother-in-law)

William A. Swindle's military records indicate he was wounded at the battle of Siloam, Arkansas and that he was shot with a "Minnie ball" through the right "rist" joint, breaking these bones and "then into my body on the right side and lodged at skin in back". William died in Randolph County, Arkansas on 26 Jan 1914 and is buried in the churchyard at Siloam near Middlebrook, Arkansas.

Dr. William Thomas Swindle was born in Benton County, Tennessee on 13 Mar 1854. He died 04 Aug 1924 in Middlebrook, Randolph County, Arkansas. In Benton County, Tennessee he married Vandora Hatley on 11 Dec 1873. Vandora was Victoria Vandora Hatley, the only child of Wyley and Leah (Nowell) Hatley. Vandora Hatley was born 11 Dec 1858 and died in Maynard, Randolph County, Arkansas on 12 Feb 1924. Dr. William T. and Vandora Swindle had ten children:

Dr. William and Vandora (Hatley) Swindle are buried in the Siloam Cemetery near Middlebrook, Arkansas. His gravestone contains the symbol for a Master Mason. Dr. William T. Swindle traveled back and forth between Benton County, Tennessee and Randolph County, Arkansas where he practiced medicine.

Dr. Cloyce Odom has a great website with a brief history of Dr. William T. Swindle and some great family photographs. It can be seen at www.rootsweb.com/~arrandol/FamilyAlbum.htm I found a brief obituary for Dr. William Thomas Swindle in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) Vol. 82, No 17 dated April 16, 1924 and it reads: "William Thomas Swindle, Maynard, Ark.; Wisconsin Eclectic Medical School, Milwaukee, 1896; aged 70; died, April 8, of senility."

There is an interesting story passed down by Arvena Hambrick Brackett concerning her grandmother Ula Balkus Swindle. Arvena says her grandmother "chewed tobacco and that she would sit on the porch and spit it out into the street". It should be understood that this was a rural area and the street was a dirt path.

* According to another family historian a family Bible records Ula Balkus Swindle as Uler Balkus Swindle. My mother, her granddaughter, says her name was Ula?

Ula (Uler) Blakus Swindle married John Francis Rapert in Randolph County, Arkansas. John and Ula (Swindle) Rapert are buried in the Antioch Cemetery near Doniphan, Missouri.

Their daughter Gussie I. Rapert married Thad Hambrick in Randolph County, Arkansas.
Their daughter Ula Arvena Hambrick married 2nd Harold Earl Brackett in 1947 in Berrien County, Michigan.
