## June 25th TFA Meeting

The June 25th TFA meeting was a success! The Thayer Academy in Braintree, Massachusetts was host to the first Board of Directors meeting of 1994. Some of the business conducted included: approval of the latest revision to the Bylaws, approval of the format and wording of a multi-purpose application, renewal and Dues Notice forms, election of Albert Thayer Morton to the Board of Directors, and installation of Patricia Thayer Muno as TFA Historian / Genealogist.

## Edward Carrington Thayer

Edward Carrington Thayer (1828-1898) was honored during the centennial celebration of the Uxbridge Massachusetts Free Public Library June 18, 1994. Edward C. Thayer donated the land and a \$20,000 building fund for the construction of the Thayer Memorial Building to be used as the Uxbridge Free Public Library. The original proposal was written with beautiful penmanship by Edward Thayer on February 20, 1893. The Town of Uxbridge gratefully accepted Mr. Thayer's offer on March 18. The dedication of the Thayer Memorial Building occurred on June 20, 1894.

The above picture of Edward C. Thayer and a short biography appeared in Old Home Week Souvenir of Uxbridge, Massachusetts (1908).

Edward C. Thayer was born May 10, 1828 in Uxbridge, MA. He was 1 of 5 children born to Joseph Thayer (1790-1872) and Chloe Taft (1793-1869), daughter of the Hon. Bezaleel Taft. Edward's lineage is as follows; Edward<sup>7</sup>, Joseph<sup>6</sup>, John<sup>5</sup>, Joseph<sup>4</sup> (Rev. Sol.), Isaac<sup>3</sup>, Ferdinando<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>. Portraits of Joseph and Chloe, for whom the building is named, were given by Edward.

Edward C. Thayer married Julia B. Ball (b. 1835). Julia (Ball) Thayer bequeathed over \$40,000 to be used for the benefit of Uxbridge schools. This endowment is known as "The Edward C. Thayer Fund". We may speculate that Edward and Julia were so generous with their community because they had no children. In addition to the Thayer Memorial Building in Uxbridge, Edward C. Thayer gave a scholarship to Brown University for the benefit of young men and women of Uxbridge. Additionally, there is a Thayer Memorial Library in Keene, NH which Edward Thayer donated the land and money to build, and a dormitory at the Worcester Hospital he donated money for!

The exact date when Edward C. Thayer moved to Keene, NH is unknown. We do know that his original proposal to Uxbridge, February 20, 1893, was written from Keene. Edward operated a mill in Keene, manufacturing cloth for overcoats. Additionally, he gained interest in several railroads and other large corporations and was identified with their management. Edward C. Thayer died in Keene, NH on July 4, 1898.

The Thayer Memorial Building is 70 by 80 feet, 1 1/2 stories high. The foundation is of granite and the superstructure red brick. The main entrance is a carved and molded limestone arch with the inscription "Thayer Memorial Building".

## Historian / Genealogist News

Some of you have expressed your concern over the omission of the descendants of the daughters of Thayers in the forthcoming publication, A Comprehensive Genealogy of the Thayer Family. Rest assured that this condition applies only to the currently planned genealogical project. I have already informed the officers of the TFA and others that I will gladly accept the genealogies of the daughters of the Thayers for use by the association in future publishing projects after the "Comprehensive..." has been completed. However, I wish to take this opportunity to elucidate a few points of consideration regarding this predicament.

First, it is almost impossible for individuals to comprehend what a single listing of 40,000 type written names comprises. One determining factor, of necessity and most certainly, is the computer's capacity for storage of such vast amounts of information. Another point for consideration is the amount of space it would take to publish the genealogical and biographical data, as well as the documentation of sources of such a vast number of individuals. Also, I have taken into consideration the fact that the Thayer family has been 350 years in this country without an accurate representation of their lineage, and therefore, I found it necessary to make my current publishing project directed at helping those who carry that surname a priority.

I hope this information helps to clarify our stance for those of you who have been concerned about what has been mistakenly viewed as "the exclusion of the Thayer daughters." If any of you have information to share with us, PLEASE send it along and rest assured that we will be dedicated to the publication and preservation of the same.

## Captain Thayer's Journal

Simeon Thayer, son of David and Jane Keith Thayer, was born in Mendon, Mass. on April 30, 1737.

In 1756 Simeon Thayer was a member of a Rhode Island regiment in the French War. In 1757 he served in the Mass. line in the Rangers. He was in three engagements with Indians. In August of 1757 he was in Fort William Henry when taken by Montcalm. The Fort surrendered on the seventh day of the siege. He was released after 20 hours wearing only a waistcoat. Near Bloody Pond he was attacked by Indians with Knife and tomahawk. His coat slipped off, but he escaped only to be attacked again by Indians, at which time his companion was killed. Simeon escaped to Fort Edwards, but caught pneumonia from exposure and was sick for several years.

Captain Simeon Thayer served under Colonel Benedict Arnold in the ill-fated expedition against British held Quebec. Arnold had only 550 effective men at Quebec, of which 160 were killed and 426 taken prisoner. Of Captain Thayer's Company, 22 were sent back sick, 27 were captured, including Captain Thayer, 3 deserted, 8 enlisted in King's Service, and 8 escaped. Arnold was shot through the leg. The snow was 5 feet deep at the time.

When released from prison in Quebec Captain Thayer returned to Elizabethtown, New Jersey, with 9 enlisted men and 1 lieutenant. Captain Thayer went home, stayed for a while, and again took up arms in defense of his country. He was promoted in rank to Major. During the battle of Monmouth he lost an eye by wind concussion from a near miss by a cannon ball. He was temporarily blinded in both eyes but recovered the use of one eye.

Major Thayer was selected by LaFayette to cover LaFayette's retreat from Barren Hill Church. After the war he was appointed a Brigadier General in the Rhode Island Militia.

General Simeon Thayer's name appears on page 514 of Bezalcel Thayer's genealogy of the Thayer family published in 1874. His lineage is: Simeon<sup>1</sup>, David<sup>1</sup>, Josia<sup>3</sup>, Ferdinando<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>.

The above data on the exciting life of Simeon Thayer was taken from the book: Captain Thayer's Journal, published 1867 by Hammond, Angell & Co., Providence. A copy of this book is in the collections of the Rhode Island Historical Society.

## Computer Corner



I would like to start a new column for those of us interested in computers. No one has sent me material on this subject so I will have to lead off on the topic.

I am publishing your newsletter on a 486DX2-66 PC clone. I use Microsoft Word® 6.0 as my word processor. This program allows me to do all the layout you see in this document including: columns, importing pictures and clipart, and designing text blocks. I am using the Times New Roman font at 10 point, bold. This font comes with the program and I find it easy to read and photocopy.

My printer is a Hewlett Packard LaserJet 4®. I printed the masters for the last newsletter at 600 dpi (dots-per-inch). This newsletter will be printed at 300 dpi to improve the appearance of the photographs. The masters are being photocopied by the print shop until we have enough volume to use printing.

I have a MODEM which allows me to communicate with other computers over the telephone lines. I communicate frequently with Patricia Thayer Muno and Al Morton on America On-line®. This bulletin board service allows the transfer of computer files as well as personal messages. Al and I are using this feature for your mailing labels. Al maintains our membership list and sends me a compressed computer file just before each mailing. I download the file, sort by zip code, and print out mailing labels with barcodes.

Al, Patricia, and I would love to hear from any of you who have access to America On-line. We can be reached at our respective screen names: AlMorton80, TriciaMuno, and RickThayer (note the omitted spaces).

For my own genealogical work I use the PAF® (Personal Ancestral File) program which is produced by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons). I believe I have the current version, 2.3, for which I paid \$35. I find this a very powerful program for the price.

## The C. A. Thayer


The *C. A. Thayer* is a wooden-hulled, three masted schooner with a long and colorful history. The last of her kind afloat on the West coast, the *C. A. Thayer* has hauled lumber, fish, coal, and war materials. She has survived 2 near sinkings and at nearly 100 years old requires much work to prevent her loss to wood rot.

The *C. A. Thayer* was commissioned in 1895 by the E. K. Wood Lumber Company of Hoquiam, WA for \$2,000, a 1/16th share. This lumber company supplied lumber to San Francisco and other California ports. The ship was named after a partner in that firm: Clarence Allen Thayer (1852-?). Clarence must have been a senior partner in this firm to hold such an honor as having a ship named after him.

Clarence Allen Thayer was born January 8, 1852 and was from Gainsville, Wyoming County, NY. We are not sure if Gainsville was his birthplace. His lineage is as follows; Clarence<sup>9</sup>, Charles<sup>8</sup>, David<sup>7</sup>, Jonah<sup>6</sup>, Jonathan<sup>5</sup>, Jonathan<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, Ferdinando<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>. About 1854 Clarence married Clara A. ( ). Clara was born in November of 1854 in NY. The couple had 5 children, the first 3 born in Michigan and the last 2 born in Oakland, Alameda County, CA. Our last record of Clarence is the 1920 Census which lists him as living alone in San Francisco, CA.

I am a married man and, being the loving husband I am, I would immediately see a unique situation here. If my wife's initials were the same as mine I would name the ship the *C. A. Thayer* and tell my wife I named it for her! This is pure speculation on my part but this coincidence must surely have been apparent to Clarence.

The *C. A. Thayer* was built by Hans Ditlev Bendixen (1842-1902), born in Thisted, Denmark. The *C. A. Thayer* was the 86th of 110 ships built by Bendixen at Humboldt Bay, CA. She was also 1 of over 400 ships built on the West coast for the lumber industry. The *C. A. Thayer* is 156 feet long with a beam of 36 feet. She has a hold that is 11 feet 10 inches deep and was rigged with masts 130 feet tall and 30 inches in diameter at the deck. The ship was built almost entirely of Humboldt Pine (Douglas fir). She was designed to carry 575,000 board feet of lumber, 50% of which was carried on the main deck.

As a working ship the *C. A. Thayer* did not lead a glamorous life but it certainly was varied and interesting. From 1895 to 1912 she carried lumber for the E. K. Wood Lumber Company. In 1908 she tore her rudder off and was stranded on Grays Harbor Bar. In 1912 she was nearly lost in a gale off Humboldt Bar with 7 men and 1 woman as crew.

In 1912 the *C. A. Thayer* was bought by the Bristol Bay Salmon Company. On April 28 she left San Francisco on her first salt salmon fishing expedition. From 1912 to 1924 the *C. A. Thayer* made winter trips to Australia, again carrying lumber and returning with coal or copra. The year 1918 was of particular interest for both good and bad events. The *C. A. Thayer* was trapped for days in arctic ice, was nearly sunk during an in port storm at Fort Bragg, had a record salmon season bringing home 6,000 barrels with another 6,000 sent home on another ship after only 28 days of fishing. She also made her second trip to Australia in 1918 and while carrying a cargo of 575,000 board feet of clear redwood she sailed for 2 days through a sea of floating volcanic pumice. On her return trip, carrying copra, she sailed through a broken up raft of logs "for as far as a man could see."

In 1925 the *C. A. Thayer* was purchased by the Pacific Coast Codfish Company of Polso, WA. She made summer trips to the Bearing Sea with the last successful voyage in 1931. The *C. A. Thayer* was mostly "laid up" during the depression of the 1930's until purchased by the U.S. Army in 1942.

From 1942 to 1945 the *C. A. Thayer* was stripped of her masts and used as an ammunition barge by the U.S. Army. She spent most of these 3 years of war service at Prince Rupert, BC. She was purchased back from the Army by the Pacific Coast Codfish Co. and from 1945 until 1950 she was a codfisher and the last commercial sailing vessel on the West coast. In 1950 she had a record haul of 190,000 codfish for her final working voyage.

From 1954 to 1957 the *C. A. Thayer* was owned by an entrepreneur who used her as a tourist attraction the "pirate ship", *Black Shield*, in Lilliwaup, WA.

In June of 1957 the State of California bought the *C. A. Thayer* for \$25,000 for the maritime museum at San Francisco. This began the final voyage home for the *C. A. Thayer*. This last, 14 day voyage may be the last time the *C. A. Thayer* will ever be under sail. The trip was a disappointment in many ways to the few old salts and several volunteers who brought her home. ## The C. A. Thayer (continued)

There was little wind and a trip the ship once made in 4 days took 14 and ended with the Captain calling for a tug.

This last trip of the *C. A. Thayer* is detailed in the book: The Schooner That Came Home The Final Voyage of the C. A. Thayer by Harlan Trott, Cornell Maritime Press, 1958. The author inter-mixes the last voyage with the history of the *C. A. Thayer* as taken from her logbook and the reminiscences of the men and women who sailed her.

The *C. A. Thayer* may be visited at the Hyde Street Pier, California State Maritime Historical Park, San Francisco, CA. She is designated as a National Historic Landmark and is in need of repairs that may surpass \$6 million. Other ships on display include the 1886 square-rigged *Balclutha*, steam tugs *Hercules* and *Epplenton Hall*, and the ferry *Eureka*, the world's longest floating structure, complete with antique automobiles on her car deck.

The Hyde Street Pier is west of Fisherman's Warf and is open daily from 10 to 5. Admission is \$3 for adults and \$1 for ages 12 to 18.
