### TRANSLATION OF A DOCUMENT FOR HATHAWAY ACRES

In possession of the Trustees of Pratt Free School are several historical records, pictures, account books, school records and documents. One of the most valuable documents is the original deed by "Praying Indian", James Thomas, selling some 50 acres off Pleasant Street in North Middleboro to Paul Hathaway in 1749. Included in this tract of land is a large, two-story house, which until 1975, was occupied by two generations of the Allan family.

One of the original Hathaway houses, this house is now the home of the David Anderson family. Another of the early Hathaway homes is the house of the James Wylie family, next door. The Hathaway's ran a successful farm during the late 1700's and on into the early 1800's.

This sale of land was made by the same James Thomsa, who gave 5 acres of land in 1750 to Titicut Parish. This gift was part of a donation by three "Praying Indians" specifically giving 38 $\frac{3}{4}$  acres of land to Titicut Parish for a meeting house (church), burying place (old section of cemetery), training field (green), parsonage, and including lands used for Pratt Free School and several nearby houses. This donation of land was given as follows:

James Thomas .....	5 acres
Stephen David .....	18 $\frac{3}{4}$ acres
Job Ahanton .....	15 acres
Total grant .....	38 $\frac{3}{4}$ acres

At least one of these "Praying Indians" was buried in the old section of Titicut Parish Cemetery. A monument was erected in memory of these friendly Indians. See Fig. -1.

Deciphering this deed has presented somewhat of a challenge, due to the old style handwriting, abbreviations, lack of punctuation and age of this document. The following is as exact a copy of the original deed as possible. See Fig. #2.

Know All Men by these presents That I James Thomas Indian Planter at a Place called Titicut in Middleborough in the County of Plymouth in New England By virtue of the Power and Authority to me granted by the General Court of the Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England aforesaid In June last past for making Sale of Some of my lands at Titicut aforesaid for paying my just Debts with the advice and Consent of the Guardians over me appointed ye by ye Said General Court For and in Consideration of the Sum of Five hundred and Seventy five pounds old Tenor to me in hand paid by Paul Hathaway of Middleborough aforesaid yeoman for the use aforesaid Have granted Bargained Sold and By these presents and with the advice and allowance of the Said Guardians hereto testified, Give grant bargain Sell convey and confirm unto him the Said Paul Hathaway his heirs and assigns forever a certain Tract of Land at Said Titicut Containing Fifty Acres Bounded as followeth beginning at a Stake and heap of Stones Standing On the great Plain before the English Meeting House On the Easterly Side of the Road that leads from Said Meeting House to Esquire Whites, from thence runing East Sixteen Degrees South One hundred and twenty Six Rods partly by My Other Lands and partly by the Lands of Hannah Robbin to a Stake and heap of Stones Standing in the Side Range of Joseph Pratt Land from thence runing South Sixteen Degrees West in Said Pratt Range Sixty Nine Rods and an half to a Stake and heap of Stones, Thence West Sixteen Degrees north ninety nine Rods to a Stake and heap of Stones by the Road, thence north about nine Degrees West as the Road is laid out Sixty Sever Rods to a Stake and Stones, thence north twenty five Degrees East Ten Rods to the bounds first mentioned To Have And To Hold The Said granted and bargained premises with all the appurtenances thereof unto him the Said Paul Hathaway his heirs and assigns forever to his and their intire use benefit and behoof forever with firm and Ample Warrent against the Lawful Claims of any Persons whomsoever. In Witness whereof I the Said James Thomas have hereunto Sett my hand and Seal and the Said Guardians in Testimony of their advice and Consent have hereunto Subscribed their names this first Day of September Anno Domini 1749 and in the twenty third year of his Majesty's Reign.

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# ENOS THOMAS: COLUMBIANA COUNTY PIONEER

Very little has been written about ENOS THOMAS, one of the first Justices of the Peace in Columbiana County, and in fact, who performed the very first marriage recorded in the county. Recently, Mary Joan Platt Lauer, 4223 Tacoma Ave., Fort Wayne IN 46807, sent material which helps to clarify his ancestors and descendants. It is taken from a book titled GENEALOGY OF THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN KIRK, Born 1660 at Alfreton in Derbyshire, England. Died 1705, in Darby Township, Chester (now Delaware) County, Pennsylvania. compiled by Miranda S. Roberts, edited by Gilbert Cope. (Doylestown PA: Press of the Intelligencer Co., 1912-1913). Anyone wishing to pursue the family further back is advised to study this excellent work.

## Ancestry of Enos Thomas:

John (1660-1705) & John (Eliet) Kirk

(p41) 44. MARTHA KIRK, b 9.5.1733; m 11.7.1764 at Gloria Dei (Old Swedes') Church, Philadelphia, to SETH THOMAS. For this she was disowned by Darby Meeting, 1.3.1765. According to statements of a granddaughter Seth Thomas came from Wales with a brother John, who settled at Plymouth VA. Seth's marriage is the first notice we have of him. He appears on the tax lists of Upper Darby, with 50 acres of land, from 1769 to 1774. After this they must have removed to Fayette Co., PA, though possibly by way of Virginia. ENOS THOMAS, supposed their son, was taxed in Fayette Co. 1785-6, though he could scarcely have been of age. In the spring of 1794 Seth Thomas, Samuel Todd and Jonathan Lyon and his brother Jacob shipped their families and goods aboard a flat boat (which was probably of their own construction) at Old Fort Redstone on the Monongahela, to Fort Duquesne or Fort Pitt, and thence down the Ohio to Georgetown PA, near the present State line, where they disembarked preparatory to the initiative of pioneers in the North West Territory. The Todds and Lyons remained in Beaver County, and in the early spring of 1798 Seth Thomas and family, consisting of himself, his wife Martha, his son Enos and a distant relative named William Thomas, crossed the Ohio River from Georgetown, moved out into the North West Territory and settled upon the N.E. Quarter of Section 26, now in St. Clair Twp., Columbiana Co., Ohio, later the property of John Montgomery (1879). Seth was a frail old man when the family settled in what is now Ohio. The date of his death is not known, but it was early in the 19th Century, and he was buried in the first cemetery in that neighborhood on the A.R. Hickman farm, about one mile north of Calcutta. Martha (Kirk) Thomas died in 1825 and was buried in the Long's Run Cemetery, just east of the same town. The account of them and their descendants has been furnished by L.B. Altaffer of Cleveland, Ohio.

(p63) Children of (44) Martha Kirk and Seth Thomas.

184. JOHN THOMAS (Martha, Joseph, John) said by a niece, Elizabeth Altdorffer, to have settled in Illinois, but nothing further is known of him.

185. ENOS THOMAS appears in the list of taxables in Springhill Township, Fayette Co PA. 1785 and 1786. In 1794 he removed with his father to Georgetown, Beaver Co., near the state line, and two years later settled in what became St. Clair Twp., Columbiana Co., Ohio. He married MARGARET CAMERON, dau of Lewis Cameron and Frances Sutter. Her father came from the Highlands of Scotland and settled in Nottingham Twp., Washington Co PA, where he belonged to Capt. Samuel Cunningham's company of Rangers, 1778 to 1783. He finally settled about 1801 on the N.E. quarter of Sec. 8, St. Clair Twp., Columbiana Co., OH; buried in the A.R. Hickman graveyard. His wife, Frances Sutter came from Lincolnshire, England.

In 1798 Enos Thomas was commissioned a territorial justice of the peace, served in that capacity until the organization of the county in 1803, and afterward for St. Clair Twp. for some 25 years. As justice of the peace he performed the first marriage ceremony in the county of Columbiana between Jesse Smith and Susanna Shaw, May 17, 1803; and on Sept. 8, 1803 he performed the ceremony for Andrew Poe and Ann Iloy. As foreman of the first grand-jury that sat in the county he received the sum of \$16.85 for his services, the first money paid out by the new county. This grand-jury held its first session on a log near the residence of Elias Lower in Fairfield Twp. July 1803. Enos Thomas was a member of the board of commissioners who organized Columbiana County in 1803. After that he was elected a member of the first board of county commissioners, he carried the returns of the first election in St. Clair Twp. to New Lisbon and Steubenville for which service he was paid the sum of \$40. He belonged to

Capt. John Cannon's Company of the First Regiment, Second Brigade, Fourth Division of Ohio Militia, and was a widely known and popular citizen. In 1805-6 Enos Thomas sold his improvement on the N.E. quarter of Sec. 26 to Dr. L. Smith, and at the same time opened up the second tavern on the N.W. Quarter of this section, on the road leading from Georgetown to New Lisbon. Thomas kept this tavern in operation until the fall of 1813, when he sold it to Uriah Wilson and moved his family to what was called "Rich Hill" on the S.E. Quarter of Sec. 22, about one mile N.E. of the village of Calcutta, now owned by John Anderson of East Liverpool, whose wife (Elizabeth Todd) is a great-granddaughter of Enos Thomas. The latter's wife was a Methodist and the first meetings of this denomination were held in the houses of Enos Thomas and others. He died in 1829 and was buried in the John Jackman graveyard, located in the N.W. Quarter of Sec. 14, St. Clair Twp., on the road from Calcutta to Fredericktown. His widow, Margaret, about 1831 or 1832, married Jesse Underwood of Middleton Twp., and resided in East Carmel until her death, 8.30.1849; buried in the Clarkson Cemetery.

186. MARTHA THOMAS, said by her niece to have gone back from Ohio to Pennsylvania to be married, but nothing more is known of her.

682. JANE THOMAS (Enos, Martha, Joseph, John) b in Ohio 1.2.1807; d 6.5.1888; m 1.14.1830, Jacob Todd, b Beaver Co PA 8.15.1805; d 11.3.1861; youngest son of Samuel & Lucy (Shivers) Todd, and grandson of Alexander Todd, one of the early settlers of Baltimore Co MD. They resided in Beaver Co PA until 1851, when they sold their farm and started on the long overland journey by wagon and buggy to their new home in Wells Co., Ind. where they settled on the N.W. Qr. of Sec. 19, Twp. 28 north, range 12 east, a portion of the almost unbroken wilderness. Here they developed a fine farm. Jacob Todd became prominent in the community. Jane Todd was a woman of slight stature and of remarkable mental and physical vigor. Members of the M.E. Church.

683. LEWIS THOMAS, b 1809, d 1825

684. JOHN THOMAS, b 6.23.1811; d 4 Mo 1888, m about 1832, Ruth Marsh. He was a man of keen intellect and good education. In his early days he taught school and studied medicine. In 1833 he taught the first term of school in the new brick building in Dist. No. 10, St. Clair Twp., Columbiana Co., where his niece, Margaret J. Altdorffer taught the last term in 1872. On 8.21.1909 some four hundred teachers and scholars of this district held a reunion. Dr. Thomas opened an office in the town of Unity and practiced there for some time; later in Middleton Twp., and finally about 1851 moved to Park Co., Ind.; then to Carlyle, Allen Co., Kan, and finally to Tonkwa, Kay Co., O.T., where he died, having survived his wife a few years.

(p115) 685. URIAH THOMAS, b 6.16.1813; d 8.1.1888; m Jane Crawford, d 1900; both buried in Mt. Zion Cemetery, Middleton Twp. Though born and raised in a pioneer country and time he was a well educated man, his thirst for knowledge being satisfied by long hours of reading and studying by the light of the "pine knot" and the "tallow dip." He was well versed in history and law, taught school in his younger days and took part in the stirring events of the border warfare in Kansas in ante bellum days. Although past the age limit at the breaking out of the Civil War he was permitted to join one of the Ohio volunteer regiments and experienced many thrilling adventures. For many years he served as a justice of the peace for Middleton Twp., and spent much time collecting the history of that and St. Clair Twp., which was left in manuscript. He was a man of small stature, wiry and alert, with a hook nose and keen piercing black eyes that looked out from under shaggy eyebrows; was suave and courtly, a gentleman of the old school.

686. MARTHA THOMAS, b 8 Mo 1815, m John Hull of Unity Twp. and moved to Athens Co OH, where she had five children, Margaret (m Hobson Beebe), Nancy, Elizabeth, John & Enos.

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687. NANCY THOMAS, b 8.12.1817; d 11 Mo 1902; m 1st Arnold Williams and secondly Joseph Henry of Elkrun Twp. She was a small active woman of unceasing industry; reared a large family and left numerous descendants. Her last husband d about 1876-9; all buried in Clarkson Cemetery.

688. FRANCES THOMAS, b 1819, d 1823.

689. MARY THOMAS, b 7.5.1821; m Uriah Wollam of Middleton Twp., about the year 1843, soon after which they removed to Coshocton Co OH, where she died in April 1902, and her husband several years before. They had eight children, Hester, Ezekiel, Samantha, Deborah, Ruth Virginia, Margaret, Elizabeth and Lincoln. Of these Hester m Stephen Crawford of Middleton Tp and raised a large family of children. Several years after her husband's death she married Mattox and when last heard from lived at Mt. Vernon, Oh.

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690. ELIZABETH THOMAS, b 7.27.1823; m 9.1.1842, Henry Lyon, b 2.3.1818; d 8.9.1849, son of John and Massina Lyon. They lived for a short time at Black Hawk PA and then on a farm in Middleton Twp. till his death. She m 2nd Samuel Altdoerffer, 7.10.1851, youngest son of John Altdoerffer, b 4.10.1810 in Fairfield Twp, d 1.3.1870, buried at the Christian Cemetery at Middleton, about a half mile south of his home. When a child of two years his mother carried him in her arms, on horseback, to their old home near Woodstock, Va. His widow sold the farm after his death and moved, April 3d 1871 to a small place on the Liverpool Road about one and a half miles south of Clarkson, where she still lives in the full enjoyment of mental and physical powers. [She died in 1920]

691. MARGARET THOMAS b 5.22.1825; d Marshalltown, Iowa, 5.27.1908; buried at Legrand IA, m (1st) 9 Mo 1843, John Richards and lived at Clarkson OH til 1854 when they moved to Legrand and later to Marshalltown; m 2nd husband Travis; was buried by the side of her first husband.

692. RACHEL THOMAS, b 3 Mo 1827; d 1848, unm.

693. SARAH THOMAS, b 6.5.1829; m 1846 Noah Johnson, b Washington Co PA, 4.27.1826; d Ossian Ind 9.23.1907, son of James Johnson and Rebecca Baxter. They moved to Union Twp., Wells Co Ind in a wagon and there purchased a farm which they cleared out from the dense forest. He enlisted in the 34th Ind.V.I. Oct.17, 1862 and served until the close of the war, having taken part in the Vicksburg campaign and the Red River Expedition. Owing to age and failing eyesight he purchased a cozy home in Ossian and moved there with his wife and daughter Bethena, where they still reside.

2032. SAMUEL T. TODD (Jane,Enos,Martha,Joseph,John) b 10.24.1830; d 1.11.1859; m 5.11.1855 Rebecca Crawford, who m 2d John Grosshans who lived and died near Calcutta. She bore him two sons, Frank and Hollis, prominent attorneys of East Liverpool, Oh, where she still resides. Samuel T. Todd had two sons who died in infancy and a dau, Elizabeth, b 1854, who m. John Anderson, a prominent business man of East Liverpool, where they have a beautiful home. They had two children who died in infancy and a son George, who is married and has one child.

2045. URIAH E. THOMAS m 1885 Minerva Hawkins, leaving a son Amos M. Married 2nd to Melvina Glass, had 4 sons; married 3d Mary A. Berry. Lived Tonkwa, Kay Co, Okla.

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CHILDREN OF (685) URIAH & JANE (CRAWFORD) THOMAS

2046. MARTIN THOMAS (Uriah,Enos,Martha,Joseph,John) m Emma Miller of New Lisbon OH by whom he had issue: Theresa, Walter, Mary, Sherman, Pearl, and Grace, besides two who died in infancy. He lived on the home place in the S.E. part of Middleton Twp. until the death of his father, when he moved to the East end, near East Liverpool, Ohio. He served during the war in squadron B, 12th O.V.Cavalry, joining Oct.3, 1863, and was promoted to sergeant and to commissary sergeant Aug.25, 1865, and was mustered out at the end of the war. Before his removal to East Liverpool he was an active member and local preacher of the Mt.Zion M.E.Church for many years.

2047. SOPHRONIA THOMAS m B.F.Berklew and resides in Coshocton Co OH and has 2 sons & a daughter.

2048. ALVIN THOMAS m 1st Hannah Huston, by whom he had two sons, names not obtained. Second wife, Martha (Billingsley) Grimm, by whom no issue. He has always been a resident of Middleton Tp, of which he is one of the most prosperous and respected citizens.

2049. ISODENE THOMAS m William Smith and lives on the old homestead; has eight children whose names are not obtained. William Smith served during the war.

2050. ELIZABETH THOMAS m James Longanecker, a native of Michigan. After their marriage he opened a general store at Fredericktown, Oh, where he died in 1906. Issue: Owen, married; Roy m Laura Hollinger; Leona, m George Stanley.

CHILDREN OF (687) NANCY THOMAS & ARNOLD WILLIAMS

2051. JESSE WILLIAMS (Nancy,Enos,Martha,Joseph,John) b 1839, m Elizabeth Barnes of Middleton Twp and had 5 children, Georgiana, Err, Corey, Ettie and one other. They went west some time after marriage but returned 15 or 20 years ago and settled at Middle Beaver, near the Henry farm, where they both died within a short time of each other, in 1908. Of their children Ettie m. Joseph Warrick, son of Milo & Mary Jane Warrick of Clarkson, O. For several years they have resided in East Liverpool. Issue: Jessie and two others.

2052. URIAH WILLIAMS served in the War; died in 1870 from the result of his service; buried in the Clarkson Cemetery; unmarried.

2053. AUSTIN WILLIAMS m Edna Crawford of Indiana. He served in the War of the Rebellion. After residing in Indiana several years he returned to Ohio and has lived for several years near Rogers, Issue: Capitola m William Sowders, son of John & Elizabeth Sowders; Harry; Cleveland; Helen.

2054. MARGARET WILLIAMS m George Azdell and shortly afterward moved to Missouri, where they still reside, near the town of Mexico. Issue: Mary, Jennie and Cordie.

He spent a summer in the Chemical Laboratory of Cleveland at the time when tests of the lake water were being made by Dr. Charles Wheeler to determine the location of the intake for the new tunnel which extends 5 miles from the shore, and by the use of which the health of the city was very decidedly improved. He was a teacher for three years at Farmington College, one year at Calvin College, Cleveland, and for the last 16 years instructor in chemistry at the West High School, Cleveland. He invented the Altaffer Individual Chemical Desk, by which noxious fumes are carried off without injury to the operator or those around him. He formerly devoted much attention to music, being a charter member and leader of the Clarkson Cornet Band. Residence, 1445 Wyandot Avenue, Cleveland.
