DESCENDANTS OF WILLIAM AND JUDITH ARCHER TRAYLOR (2)

In last week's issue we presented the descendants of their son Humphrey Traylor, Sr. and his wife Elizabeth Cousins. This week we have the families of the two other sons, Joseph and John Traylor.

JOSEPH TRAYLOR, son of William Traylor and Judith Archer, was born between 1700-1715 in Va., m. ELIZABETH NEAL, daughter of Thomas Neal, whose will was signed 3/23/1764, and witnessed by John Traylor, Mary Traylor, and Ralph Jackson. Their children were:

One Jesse Trayler, was enumerated in 96 District, Spartanburg Co. S. C. in the 1790 Census with this family: 1 male over 16 yrs, 1 female under 16, and 2 females over 16 yrs.

The connection between Joseph and Elizabeth Neal Traylor with this William Traylor has not been proved. His family data is presented because it appears that he might have been their son William Neal Traylor. WILLIAM TRAYLOR of Lunenburg Co., Va. m. MARY _____ and had these children:

William Traylor's will was signed 9/18/1761, probated 2/2/1762 in Lunenburg Co., Va.

Seen in 96 Dist. of Spartanburg Co., S. C. in 1790 were Agns, Joel, and William Trayler. In 1800 Agus and one Hyrum Trayler were enumerated in Pendleton Dist., S. C. Note that they were found in the same district as Jesse Traylor in 1790. No more information was collected on this family.

JOHN TRAYLOR, SR., son of William Traylor and Judith Archer, of Chesterfield Co., Va. m. MARTHA _____, who d. after 1774. John's will was signed 12/23/1774, probated in Chesterfield Co., Va. Executor was his son Archer Traylor, and "friend" Richard Wilkinson. Withesses were George Markham, William Traylor, and "Fore. Blankenship." Children mentioned in the will were:

ARCHER TRAYLOR m. (may be Judith Markham, dau. Geo.)

He was b. 1729 in Chesterfield Co., Va., m. ca. 1755 to _____ and d. 1803. The marriage between Archer Traylor and Judith Markham, dau. of George M. Markham, took place 1/25/1779 in Chesterfield Co., Va.; thus she could not be the mother of sons of Archer.

MIAL TRAYLOR, of Chesterfield Co., Va., b. ca. 1760-80, m. Phebe _____, made a will 2/21/1823, probated 4/14/1823 in Chesterfield Co. His executors were Littleberry West, Jr., and Robert Lockett. Witnesses A. Whitworth and William M. Dance. Mial's heirs were: John Fowler" who is generally known as John Traylor; son Mial Traylor, a tract of land formerly Josiah Fowler's; Mary Ann Traylor, dau. of "said John Traylor"; son Fincher Traylor; dau. Martha, wife of John H. Traylor; Fincher's son Albert Washington Traylor.

ALBERT WASHINGTON TRAYLOR, son of Fincher Traylor, was the father of ROBERT LEE TRAYLOR.

WILLIAM TRAYLOR, SR., m. 10/14/1780 Chesterfield Co., Va. SALLY HANCOCK, dau. of George Hancock, Sr. Their son was George Archer Traylor who m. Nancy Breeding Gates. John Milton Traylor, son of George Archer Traylor was m. 1838 to Livinia Cox, and d. 1849. They were parents of James Milton Traylor, b. 1844, m. 1877 Kitty Frances Harvey. Their son was Melvin Alva Traylor, b. 1879.

TRAYLOR BRANCHES—STEM UNCERTAIN

In researching the Traylor family these families were documented but their progenitor was unknown. Because more work is needed on these, we are presenting the data we have in hopes that others may build upon it and ultimately uncover the connection.

LITTLEBERRY TRAYLOR, witness to will of Aleck Moore 1771, together with Blanch Traylor; appraiser of estate of Ralph Jackson 1776; owned land in Chesterfield Co., Va. 1787

JOSIAH TRAYLOR, JR., with Nancy Turpin proved the will of one Francis Robertson in Chesterfield Co., Va. 10/28/1816.

THOMAS TRAYLOR, SR. bought cattle and a colt from HUMPHREY TRAYLOR of Dinwiddie Co., Va., with witnesses Thomas Traylor, Jr., and Betsey Traylor, all of Chesterfield Co., Va. 9/1795.

_____ TRAYLOR, husband of Eliza Winfree, sister of Valentine Winfree, will 1823 in Chesterfield Co., Va. Winfree leaves a bequest to his nephew VALENTINE W. TRAYLOR. Executors of the will were brother James Winfree, and brother-in-law James Clopton of New Kent Co., Va. (Ed. Note.: Cloptons appear in Ga. in 1810-30 in Putnam Co.)

ABSALOM TRAYLOR: "Ordered that a passport through the creek nation be prepared for ABSALOM TRAYLOR and Robert Hutchinson which was presented and signed. . . ." John Milledge, Governor, Journal of Proc. of Exec. Dept. of Ga. Tues. 27 Oct. 1807

Absalom Traylor drew in 1805 land lottery as resident of Hancock Co. -married man; also drew in 1806 lottery under the same conditions. A family sketch noted that Absalom left Virginia before

1790, a native of Virginia, died before 1850 in Livingston Parish, La. Wife's name is unknown; their son BENJAMIN TRAYLOR was born about 1800 in Ga.

BENJAMIN TRAYLOR, son of Absalom, married 1/31/1824 in Springfield, La. to MATILDA GAINES. Their children were:

Most of the children in this family remained in Springfield, La. David Crockett Traylor, however, who married during the Civil War (and d. 1882), lived in Virginia, Johnson City, Tenn., and Pike Co., Miss. Tradition holds that the marriage to Sarah Fry may have taken place in Virginia and Traylor lived there several years thereafter, then moving to Tenn. and Miss.

_____ TRAYLOR and his wife LUCY _____, of Chesterfield Co., Va., Greene, Putnam, and Upson Cos., Ga. Traylor probably never lived in Georgia, for his widow Lucy drew in 1805 Land Lottery of Greene Co. In 1827 she drew in the land lottery as the widow of a Revolutionary Soldier (unnamed), while resident in Upson Co. Yet in the Index to 1820 Census no Lucy was mentioned while her probable sons all appeared.

John S. Traylor was also a fortunate drawer in the 1827 Land Lottery, a resident of Upson Co. All sons were in Putnam Co. in 1820. William B. Traylor OF CHESTERFIELD CO., VA. bought land from Thomas Moody of Oglethorpe Co., Ga. 2/9/1809.

This land lay in the 7th Dist. of Wilkinson Co., Ga., parcel 464. This deed is on record in Oglethorpe Co., Book E, p. 404.

EDWARD TRAYLOR, b. 7/20/1783, Va., m. 3/1/1807 (Ga. ?), d. 9/4/1860 in Upson Co., Ga., probably the son of Lucy Traylor, m. NANCY JOHNSON, b. 4/20/1787, d. 3/2/1850. Their son was WILLIAM TRAYLOR, b. 3/9/1801, m. 1. Virginia Wheat, and 2. 9/16/1841 to Virginia Holloway. (Ed. Note. This data from History of Upson Co., Ga.) How could William, b. 1801 be the son of Nancy, who didn't marry Edward until 1807? There must be a misprint here!

ELIZABETH W. TRAYLOR, daughter of _____ Traylor, received an inheritance from her maternal grandfather NATHAN JOHNSON in a will 1797, Oglethorpe Co., Ga.

JOHN TRAYLOR, son of Edward Traylor and Nancy Johnson, m. SALLIE HUGULEY, and lived in Monroe Co., Ga. - and Upson Co.

_____ TRAYLOR m. FRANCES _____. Her will 11/3/1825 in Clarke Co., probated 1826 mentions deceased daughter Sarah's heirs, and daughter Frances Anderson. Sarah Traylor m. Wade White 10/24/1816 in Clarke Co., Ga. Frances Traylor left "my lands" to JAMES JACKSON.

WHO WERE THE PARENTS OF THESE FIVE TRAYLOR CHILDREN: Washington, James, Hamsell, Jordan, and Mary?

WASHINGTON TRAYLOR, b. ca. 1800-10, m. 6/25/1837 in Troup Co., Ga., d. Troup Co. 1839. His wife was ELEANOR WILDER. Their only child was JAMES EDWARD TRAYLOR. Washington's will mentions his brother Hamsell, brother James, and sister Mary Passet. His brother Jordan was executor. Was he George W. Traylor, who drew in Jackson Co. in the Land Lottery of 1827?

On the death of Edward Traylor, son of William Traylor, Sr., in 1830 Washington Traylor was appointed administrator of the estate. None of Washington's brothers appear to be connected with the family of William Traylor, Sr., however.

JORDAN TRAYLOR, brother of Washington, married 2/12/1843 to MARY M. DYE in Troup Co. The 1840 Census of Troup Co. enumerated Jordan Traylor as a head of family containing only 2 males aged 15/20! Was this an error?

ARCHIBALD TRAYLOR, Ensign in M Regiment, Hancock Co., Ga. militia in 1801. Was he husband of SUSANNAH TRAYLOR, a widow in the 1806 Land Lottery in Hancock Co. ? Or father of KATHERINE TRAYLOR, a single woman, head of household in Hancock Co. in 1806.

WHO WAS THE FATHER OF WINN TRAYLOR? We have not yet solved this problem. If his father was living in Oglethorpe Co., Ga., between the years 1806-7 when Winn was born, then his father would have to have been William Traylor, Jr., Edward Traylor, or Thomas Traylor. The family of William Traylor, Jr. and Edward Traylor have been completed through Bible and legal records, so that these appear eliminated. Thomas Traylor (be he Sr. or Jr.) was married to BETSY W. POWELL of Oglethorpe Co. This Thomas died in Jasper Co., Ga. in 1817, mentioning that he had two sets of children. He names those by his FIRST WIFE, but left the estate in the hands of his Betsy to administer it for the benefit of "her children begotten of me." At the time of his death the family was moving to Ala. The 1820 Census enumerated Mrs. Betsy W. Traylor in Dallas Co., Ala.

The names Pascal, Thomas, Henry, Randolph, and William have recurred in the descendants of Winn Traylor.

John Hunt, was the son of Wilkins Hunt of Hancock Co., Ga., and his wife Lucinda Kirk, m. 2/22/1825. Wilkins Hunt is buried in Victoria Co., Texas, where he and the family of Winn Traylor had moved.

RICHARD TRAYLOR, 1820 resident of Greene Co., Ga.

MARTHA TRAYLOR, b. ca. 1832, living with Charles and Rachael Freeman and their 3 children in Troup Co. 1850. Whose daughter was she?

LATHAM ARTHUR TRAYLOR, Baptist minister of Grant Parish La. 1886-94, m. SARAH YOUNGBLOOD of Bienville Parish, La. Their daughter ELEANOR TRAYLOR m. 1891 in Grant Parish, La. to FLOYD BAILES.

Far from being a definitive study of the Traylor family, this series of articles points up the lack of research along many of the family lines. I will continue to collect data on the Traylor Traylor family and would like to receive any and all information you care to send. If, through additional data, we can join a branch to the main family stem, this will appear in Family Puzzlers.

BANKS FAMILY--Because several recent queries pertain to the Banks family of Elbert, Wilkes, and Oglethorpe Cos., Ga., and because we have some information, and the prospect of more, these Banks queries are being held for publication in a later issue. If you have a Banks line in this area, won't you send it in (or your query on the Banks) immediately. A detailed report on this family will be printed soon.

COKER--Miss Era B. Hardy, 5223 G. Street, Little Rock, Ark. 72205 wants parentage and place of birth of JOHN WESLEY COKER, b. Ga. 1805, d. Randolph Co., Ala., about 1864, married about 1826 to NANCY WHITE, b. 1804 in Ga., and moved to Randolph Co., Ala. She moved to and died in Arkansas 1874.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Coker families in Georgia in time to draw in the 1805 Land Lottery were either in Elbert or Jackson counties, adjacent. One John Coker drew from Elbert in both the 1827 and 1832 lotteries, but in each he took only one draw, i. e. was a single man. Only one William Coker, of Washington Co., was separated from the "clan" in 1805, and Washington Co.'s records are destroyed. The Elbert Co. John Coker married 1st NANCY BOLLINGER 1824, presume she died shortly thereafter so he was "single in 1827-32, and 2nd MARTHA HATHCOCK 4/28/1833. This should exclude him from the search.

In Jackson Co. 1803-5 were two Roberts, one Philip and one JOHN COKER, all married men. The Georgia Dept. of Archives has the marriage records of Jackson Co. on microfilm; ask for the marriage of John and Nancy White. I know that there was a large White family in Jackson Co. at the time, and their homeplace and family cemetery are still owned by descendants near Commerce.

Gone to Georgia notes that John Coker's orphans drew for land in Jackson Co. in 1807. The Coker family was in Edgecombe Co., N. C. as early as 1748, in Surry Co., N. C. in 1771-2, By 1800 at least one was in Pendleton Dist., S. C. An article by Mrs. Z. T. Liles, on Joseph Coker son of John and Priscilla Geddings Coker, tells of his marriage to MARY ALDREDGE of Roanoke about 1745. Joseph's will was probated in Laurens, S. C. 1792. He had come from Craven Dist., S. C. prior to 1775. Their children were: William, Calvin, Thomas, Robert, John, Nancy, Honour, Hannah and Drury.

Her article follows only the children of Nancy Coker who m. FREDERICK THOMPSON 1784, and d. Walton Co., Ga. 1823. Drury Coker married Betsy Gary in Laurens, S. C. and had Joseph, Mary "Polly" and dau. Menice.

HARPER—for Mrs. E. L. Sutton, of Philadelphia from Mrs. J. P. Pullin, McDonough, Ga. Mrs. Sutton asked for parentage of Henry Harper, Sr. of Amherst Co., Va. and his wife Judith, and their progeny. Mrs. Pullin has sent this thorough summary: Heirs of HENRY HARPER, SR. and wife JUDITH _____ appear in the administration of their son William Harper, dec'd, of Wilkes Co., Ga before 10/6/1802. (Inv. Book LL, p. 146 & 282; Deed Bk. XX p. 35, 135 328, 351; Deed Bk RR p. 535; Court records, Albemarle Co., Va.; Deed Bk 9, p. 227)

Mrs. Pullin warned that some printed records recite that Judith Harper was the WIFE of William Harper, deceased about 10/6/1802, for on that date she was appointed temporary administratrix of the estate.

TRAYLOR-YOUNGBLOOD--Mrs. Malcolm Levy, 609 Nineteenth St., Alexandria, La. 71301 asks who the parents of LATHAM ARTHUR TRAYLOR were. He was an ordained Baptist minister who lived in Grant Parish, La. about 1886-1894. His wife was SARAH YOUNGBLOOD of Bienville Parish, La. Their daughter ELEANOR TRAYLOR, m. FLOYD BAILES in 1891 in Grant Par. When and where was Rev. Traylor born?

EDITOR'S NOTE: The birth and birth place of Rev. Traylor, as well as those of his parents can be obtained by reading the 1880 Census. Each person enumerated returned not only their name and vital information, but also the parents birthplaces. This record should give you also the names of the Traylor children, including Eleanor. If you do not find Rev. Traylor within La. in 1880 in the county you expect him, then either examine the "Index" reel to this census or have it searched in Washington.

The "Index to 1880 Census" made by state (or Territory) is an index to only those households having a child (or children) 10 yrs. or under. Because of the 1891 marriage of Eleanor, we may presume that either she or a brother or sister might be 10 or under in 1880, and this would have guaranteed the inclusion of Rev. Traylor's family in this Index.

Have you written the Southern Baptist Convention Archives, at Mercer University, Macon, Georgia for any biographical or church information they may have on Rev. Traylor?

The parentage of Rev. L. A. Traylor was not apparent among the data on the Traylor family here presented. Can any reader help? locate his forbears.

JACKSON--Mr. William H. Bailey, Jr., 1823 Pasadena St., Houston, Tex. 77023 writes" Our Jackson family came into Texas from either Sol Sada or Oaky Streak, Butler Co., Ala., shortly after the Civil War, but before they lived in Alabama, they lived in Georgia, "near Atlanta. What little information we have on this Jackson family is from the family Bible and a short outline written by my grandmother Mary Francis Caroline Jackson Bailey."

HENRY F. (FLOURNOY?) JACKSON, b. 9/8/1821 in Ga., m. REBECCA ANN F. PERLINA _____, b. 9/7/1823. Henry died in Montgomery Co., Texas and Rebecca died either during or shortly after the Civil War in Alabama. Their children were:

Henry F. Jackson was a Captain in the Civil War, in H. F. Jackson's Company of Alabama Reserves, which subsequently became Capt. Jackson's Company, 3rd. Battalion Alabama Reserves. He enlisted in Greenville, Ala. 7/2/1864. Henry was supposed to have had a brother named GREEN JACKSON who remained in Georgia.

"My grandmother described her life in Georgia and Alabama and indicated a plantation with many slaves, but I have not been able to identify this family on any Georgia census that I have searched," said Mr. Bailey. He would appreciate any information.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Flournoy family was found in Richmond Co. Augusta area early, later in Putnam Co. as was one branch of the Jackson family. No Jackson were shown in Putnam in the 1830 census, where there had been some in 1820. Perhaps a marriage of Flournoy to Jackson can be located in Putnam Co. Write the Ga. Archives, 330 Capitol Ave., S. E., Atlanta 30334.

Another source of data might be the Confederate service record of Green Jackson. The Civil War Records Section of the Ga. Dept. of Archives will make a copy of his service record for \$1.

I found the will of Prof. Henry Jackson of the University of Ga., recorded in Clarke Co., and thought I might have your answer, but Hull's Annals of Athens noted that son HENRY ROOTES JACKSON married CORNELIA DAVENPORT (excluding my theory!) To save your looking for this, here is an outline.

Henry Jackson made a will 2/17/1831, witnessed by H. C. FLOURNOY, J. A. COBB (her brother in law), and HOWELL COBB (her son). A codicil was added 1/10/1840 and the will probated 7/1840 in Clarke Co., Ga. His wife was named: Martha J. Jackson.

Youngest dau. Sarah M. R. Jackson; oldest child HENRY ROOTES JACKSON; dau. Martha J. R. Jackson.

Hull noted that Henry R. married Cornelia Davenport; Sarah to Oliver Prince; and Martha to Frank Erwin. Professor Henry Jackson was said to have come to the U. S. from England in 1811 and taught Natural Philosophy at the University of Georgia until his death.

If you suspect that Henry F. Jackson was an adult in Georgia, why not see if the personnel file at the Georgia Archives shows any listing of him on militia records. Did he volunteer for service in the Mexican War of 1846? In either Georgia or Alabama?

Since you know that H. F. Jackson volunteered for service in Greenville, Ala. during the Civil War, have you examined the tax digests and deed records to see when he reached that county? Often deeds will note that he formerly resided at another place, county, or state, and give you something to go on in your investigation.
