THE THOMAS A. TUCKER FAMILY OF ALBIA. MONROE COUNTY, ICWA

Thomas A. Tucker, the second child, and eldest son of Levi and Sarah Tucker, was born in Hampshire County, Virginia October 24, 1823. His infancy appears to have been spent in Virginia in that part of the state which later was admitted to the Union as the state of West Virginia in 1863. By 1829 his family had moved to Illinois where his parents raised a family of twelve children: six boys and six girls.

On May 13, 1847, Thomas A. Tucker married Elisabeth Hilvard in Springfield. Sangamon County, Illinois. Elisabeth was born July 22, 1830 in Illinois, the daughter of John Hilyard and Mary Knight. During the early years of their marriage, Thomas farmed, and they became the parents of three children born to them in Illinois: Sarah C. Tucker, born April 4, 1848; George Levi Tucker, born February 18, 1850; and Franklin P. Tucker, born November 7, 1852.

Thomas and Elisabeth moved to Monroe County, Iowa and settled in the town of Albia. Four more children were born, two boys and two girls: Squire E. Tucker, born March 18, 1856; Martha A. Tucker, born August 10, 1857; Tucker, born June 1, 1861; and Emma Bell Tucker, born May 24, 1863. and Elisabeth lost their daughter, Martha, who died from unknown causes May 9. 1859.

As the town of Albia grew, residents there pushed for its incorporation. petition for "Incorporation of the City of Albia" was circulated. 26, 1859, about 150 people had signed it, including T.A. Tucker, and the new city of Albia was organized.

Thomas A. Tucker worked as a butcher in Albia. When the Civil War began, he remained at home until 1864. Then on May 18, 1864, Thomas enrolled at Albe in Company 'G', 46th Regiment of the Iowa Infantry Volunteers for a of 100 days. Thomas served as a private under Captain Edward Merich. military records describe Thomas as "five feet, seven and one half light complexion; blue eyes; dark hair". He was mustered in on June 10, 1864 at Davenport, Iowa and detailed as the chief butcher of his regiment on July 16. 1864.

During his service, Thomas became very ill with an apparent liver disease which made him weak, caused a loss of weight, and gave his skin a very yellowed appearance. A comrade, Josiah Kellogg, described his condition in an affidavit in U.S. military pension records:

"Thomas A. Tucker was a sound and able bodied man free from disease and while in the military service of the United States . . . about 1864, at Colliersville in the state of Tennessee became disabled by billiousness and affection of liver and kidneys. He was as yellow could be. He was in a shanty of his own near the colonels headquarters. I was head nurse and second Steward in the field hospital at that time.



When the surgion examined and prescribed for Thomas A. Tucker I gave the medicines. He was the leading butcher to do the butchering for the Regiment. I think he was off duty for at least three weeks certain. He never fully recovered but was allowed another man to help him so that the work was very light. He was unwell and complained of his kidneys and liver up to date of his discharge."

Thomas A. Tucker was mustered out September 23, 1864 at Davenport, Iowa. He returned home and was unable to work for several months. Over the next two or three years he worked off and on butchering for John Landsberger in his meat shop, only about two days per week. He continued to suffer from his liver ailment, having severe spells from time to time, and never fully recovered. He died February 20, 1882 in Albia and was buried in the old part of Oak View Cemetery at Albia, Iowa.

A year after her husband's death, Elisabeth Tucker applied for a pension as the widow of veteran Thomas A. Tucker on March 14, 1883. After completing the paperwork consisting of proof of her marriage to Thomas A. Tucker and proof of his death, as well as sworn affidavits from attending physicians, friends, and comrades in the service with her husband, Elisabeth received approval for pension benefits on February 24, 1887. She received retroactive payments of \$8 per month from March 1883 to March 1886, and \$12 per month thereafter until her death.

Elisabeth Hilyard Tucker died December 30, 1907 at Albia. Her obituary appeared January 2, 1908 titled "Peacefully Goes to Sleep" and stated that "She lived a quiet and unassuming life and had done much where she saw it. Her life passed out as she had lived, quietly and peacefully."

Thomas and Elisabeth Tucker's daughter, Sarah C. Tucker, married Almon E. Crosby December 24, 1871 at Albia, Iowa. They had five children: Maude E., May L., Fred T., Ethel E., and Jennie B. Almon Crosby died December 1, 1886 and was buried at Oak View Cemetery, Albia. Sarah C. Tucker Crosby died on May 16, 1912 and was buried next to her husband.

The second child of Thomas A. and Elisabeth Tucker, George Levi Tucker, was married October 30, 1873 in Monroe County, Iowa to Matilda Jane Wright. She was born December 19, 1854 at Utica, Fulton County, Illinois, the daughter of James D. Wright and Christiann Bredwell. George Levi and his wife were parents of at least seven children: Frank, Freddie, Charles L., Rose Alice, Carrie May, George E., and Thomas. An eighth child may have caused Matilda to die at an early age following complications of childbirth. She died on August 1, 1893 at Albia. George Levi Tucker worked as a printer, or typesetter, in Albia. At one time he took over the publishing of a "Greenback" newspaper, the <u>Industrial Era</u> in August 1879, and ran it for four months. For a time, George Levi worked for the interests of the Greenback Party, a post-Civil War political party which opposed the reduction of paper currency in circulation in the U.S. George Levi Tucker died at Mason City, Iowa December 22, 1918.

Thomas A. and Elisabeth Tucker's third child, Franklin P. Tucker, died at the age of nineteen on March 19, 1872.

Their fourth child, Squire E., also known as Edward E., became a plasterer. He married Mary Ann Matthews on December 17, 1879 in Albia. She was born

in 1860 in Pomeroy, Meggs County, Ohio. Squire E. and Mary Ann Tucker had eight children: Arthur Edna, Alfred Ellis, Vera Blanche, Sadie Leo, Theodore E., Laura E., Bonnie Marie, and Doris E. Squire E. and Mary Ann were members of the Albia First Christian Church along with four of their children, Sadie, Laura, Bonnie, and Doris. Squire E. Tucker died January 8, 1912 and was buried at Oak View Cemetery. His wife, Mary Ann, died on June 16, 1927 and is also buried at Oak View Cemetery.

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The sixth child of Thomas A. and Elisabeth Tucker, Thomas H. Tucker, was a mechanic. He married Maggie E. Stewart on June 26, 1886. She was born on July 6, 1866, the daughter of William S. Stewart and Mary Henderson, in Albia. Thomas H. and Maggie had four sons: Bert F. Tucker, Roy Ellis Tucker, Ward Edward Tucker, and Harold Tucker. Thomas H. Tucker died on June 8, 1896. His widow, Maggie, married her second husband, William Funk, on March 9, 1916. Maggie Stewart Tucker Funk died April 26, 1963 at age 97.

Thomas A. and Elisabeth Tucker's seventh child, Emma Bell Tucker, married William H. Beltzley on December 22, 1881. They had seven children, three daughters, and four sons: Clarence, Glen, Edwin, and Earl. Following her husband's death, she married her second husband, Dan De Young, on April 22, 1914. Emma Bell was an active member of the Methodist church. She died at age 74 and was buried at Bussey, Iowa.

Thomas A. and Elisabeth Tucker have six generations of descendents, some of which still live in Albia, Iowa, and many who are known living across the U.S.

PTYTON TUCKER, PIONEER By R. W. Tucker 603 North Trenton Ruston, La. 71270

Early county records contain frequent references to Peyton Tucker, and the Historical Society welcomes the following article which is a valuable addition to local history of territorial period. R. W. Tucker was a practicing attorney in Batesville until the early 1950s.

The name Tucker was a derivative from the "OLD FNGLISH", meaning "To Tuck", "To Fill". It usually meant courage. It is referred to as a tucker, one who cleaned and thickened cloth.

Tucker has been used as a synonym for "O Tougher", an Irish sect located in North Tipperary, well known throughout Ireland.

In the Battle Rolls of Sussex the name appeared in the 1236. A "Hugo Le' Tukker" was in the Minister's Accounts of the Farl of Cornwall in the year 1297, evidencing the early appearance of the name in England.

Four grants of arms were made to the name in England. Two of these were granted in Devonshire, one in Kent, and one in Dorset. In these coats of arms three sea horses appear.

The Tuckers were particularly successful in America and are noted for their great contribution to the social and political life of the country.

Daniel Tucker was the first arrival from Plymouth, England. He was treasurer or "Keeper of the Store" or "Cape Merchant" of the Colony of Virginia and later served on the Council in 1619. He died in Bermuda in 1624-25.

William Tucker sailed from Plymouth, England, and was on the Council of the Colony of Virginia in 1623. He also served as a member of the House Of Burgesses in 1619 and in 1623-24. Robert Tucker arrived in Milton, Massachusetts in 1621.

St. George Tucker, 1752-1827, was a late arrival from Bermuda. He came in his late 'teens and entered the college of William and Mary. He graduated and later was on the staff of General George Washington, later President of the United States.

Thomas Tudor Tucker, who was a brother of St. George Tucker, came over to America about the same time and settled in South Carolina at Charleston.

Devonshire was the chief location of the most famous Tuckers in England. They were involved with Sir Francis Drake, Captain Hawkins, and Sir Walter Raleigh. They also took part in the attack on the Spanish Armada.

#### Salado (Saluda)

Salado came from the word Saluda which is the name of a county, town and river in Northwestern South Carolina near Spartanburg. "SALUDA" is an Indian word meaning "The River of Corn" in the musical language of the Cherokee Indians whose homes and happy hunting grounds were up and down the "aluda River.

unning nearby and traversing the County of Saluda is the old Cherokee Road, ormerly an Indian trail, leading from the up county to the low country.

ssex Capshaw, a white man whose father came from Wales, leaving his home in atherford County, North Carolina, went to an Indian village on the Saluda iver in South Carolina and there met the daughter of an Indian chief, a herokee, and married her. This all happened about the close of the Revoltionary War. He appears on the U.S. Census Records for 1790.

ssex Capshaw next appears on the U.S. Census Records for 1800 at Smithland, ivingston County, Kentucky, and lived there until 1810 when he again appears on the census records and is listed as a tavern keeper along with Peyton Tucker, who had met his daughter, Sarah Capshaw. Just prior to that time, Peyton Tucker had married Sarah Capshaw, who was a beautiful girl. This took place on the 22nd of August, 1809.

Payton Tucker arrived in the Missouri Territory and established a trading post near the mouth of Salado (Saluda) Creek where it empties into White River (White Run). He also established a post office at White Run and was appointed magistrate. Essex Capshaw and family came with Peyton Tucker and lived nearby for a number of years. This all happened about the year 1814. ("WHITE RUN" was the first name for White River.)

On the 12th day of December, 1823, Peyton Tucker was granted his pre-emption rights to eighty acres of land at the mouth of Salado Creek, described as follows:

The west half of the Northwest Quarter of Section Eight, Township Twelve North of Range Five West in the District of Lawrence in the Territory of Arkansas, containing eighty acres (being his pre-emption rights).

The pre-emption was signed by J. Monroe, President, and George Graham. Commissioner of the General Land Office. This land was where the post office was established about the year 1814 and was the beginning of the platation which he and his son, Gideon Tucker, and his grandson, William Peyton Tucker, owned for a number of years, finally passing to William Peyton Tucker's daughter, Sallie Tucker, who married Commodore Wood, hency the name "Wood Farm". Gideon Tucker and his wife are buried in the cemetery about one mile northwest of Rosie, Arkansas, along with William Peyton Tucker, but his daughter, Sally (Tucker) Wood, is buried at Pleasant Plains, Arkansas, and a large monument is erected to her.

There are some springs near Rosie, Arkansas, named "Capshaw Springs" and nearby are a number of graves where the Capshaws are buried. There are also some graves on the top of the ridge, known as "Tucker's Ridge", overlooking White River. It is not known whether Sarah (Capshaw) Tucker, who died on June 4, 1832, is buried on the top of this ridge, but it is believed she was, as this is the most likely place. This is the place of the White Run post office, which was discontinued about this time and moved to Sulphur Rock, Territory of Arkansas. There are some graves near Cruthfield's place on Tucker's Ridge near where the old trading post and post office were located.

The Old Rock Bridge which was built of native stone, is now fallen into decay, but it is still remembered. It was built a year or so after William Peyton Tucker passed away, January 2, 1864, and his daughter, Sallie Peyton Tucker, had fallen heir to the Plantation. The Capshaw graves are on the road leading from Rosie to the bridge.

#### Ancestory of Peyton Tucker

Taving procured all of the wills and some of the deeds made by the Tuckers in Virginia, and taking into consideration the fact that the Jacksons, who came to Arkansas and Independence County, were related to Hannah Tucker, who married Reuben Jackson and left wills dated 1827 and 1836, and the further that all the birth and marriage records were destroyed from ca. 1780 to

1823 in Dinwiddie County, Virginia, one is forced to believe that the following is a correct version of ancestry of the Peyton Tucker family:

Colonel John Stith married Mary (Randolph) Stith in Charles City, Virginia, and who had a daughter, Anne Stith, who was born ca. 1659 and who married Robert Bolling (1645-1709). (Robert Bolling was married before to Jane Rolfe ca. 1675 at Kippax, Virginia, and she was descendant of Pocahontas.)

Robert Bolling 1645-1709, m. Anne Stith 1659-1710, issue; Stith Bolling, Anne Bolling, and others.

Anne Bolling 1690-ca. 1750, m. Robert Wynne 1685-1754, issue; Anne Wynne, Lucretia Wynne, and others.

Lucretia Wynne 1712-ca. 1770, m. Joseph Tucker ca. 1710-1780, issue; Lucretia Tucker, Robert Tucker, and others.

Robert Tucker, 8 September 1739-1810, m. first Mary Green; second Miss Coleman; third Mary Gilliam, and by his third marriage, issue; Stith Tucker, Peyton Tucker, and others.

Henry C. (Capshaw) Tucker was the grandfather of the writer of this sketch and Francis Peyton Tucker was his father and he is one-sixteenth Cherokee ic) Indian. My grandfather, Peyton Tucker, and my great grandmother, Sarah (Capshaw) Tucker, lived together for 23 years and had a family of these eight children.

#### CONCLUSION

Peyton Tucker and Sarah (Capshaw) Tucker were greatly honored by their friends and neighbors during this period of time and among these friends and neighbors were George Ruddell and John Saffold who signed the bond for Peyton Tucker as postmaster at White Run, Missouri Territory. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church along with John B. Craig and others. He and his wife ofter attended church at the home of John B. Craig just south of what was Elmo, Arkansas.

When the 1830 U.S. Census was taken, Peyton Tucker led the list for the Township of Christian, Independence County, Territory of Arkansas. There were three townships in the County at that time, Ruddell, Black River, and Christian. Ruddell embraced the northwestern part of the County, Black River embraced the northeastern part, and Christian embraced practically all of the county, south of White River.

Among those in addision to those mentioned above, were Charles Kelly, Walter Tardin, Abraham Ruddell, John B. Craig, Benjamin Hardin, Reuben Wyatt, Elisha Fortenberry, Abraham Wyatt, George C. Gibbs, John Poster, and others, including approximately 63.

It is also noted that Peyton Tucker had no slaves, because he did not believe in an inferior race. He believed as St. George Tucker that all slaves should be freed when they were born. In other words, he wrote a dissertation on slavery about 1785 in which he advocated that each child should be free when it was born. The Civil War could have been avoided with all of its horrors

and death and destruction if the people had listened.

The Tucker House in Williamsburg, Virginia, facing the public square, was built by St. George Tucker who, at the time, was married to Frances (Bland) Randolph, 1788.

Payton Tucker was the first member of the Legislative Council from Independence County, Arkansas Territory, in 1821, and Robert Bean was in the House of Representatives. Payton Tucker served on the jusy at Davidsonville as early as 1815 while it was the Missouri Territory. He also served on the Jury at Batesville, Arkansas Territory, several times. He was a justice of the peace in Indipendence County and performed numerous marriages. In 1833, he and Morgan Magness were elected and served as members of the Legislature of Arkansas Territory just before it was made a state.

Peyton Tucker, after his wife, Sarah (Capshaw) Tucker, passed away June 4, 1832, married Mary Magness and died in Caldwell Parish, Louisiana, without issue.

This writer is compiling a book about the Peyton Tucker family, ancestors, and descendants and would like to have comments from interested parties.
