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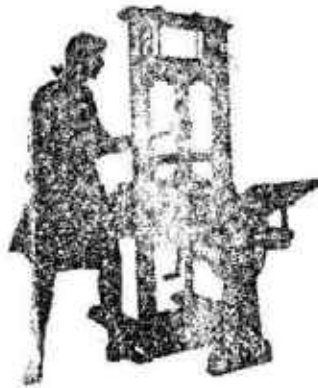

ASA DELOZEAR vs. EDWARD WALKER and SIMON ROACH JAMES GRUN HUNT, attorney for ASA DELOZEAR. EDWARD WALKER and SIMON ROACH on the 16th Oct. 1790 at Camden signed a promissory note for forty pounds sterling to be paid to ASA DELOZEAR six months from the date of the note. The suit says that EDWARD WALKER and SIMON ROACH "craftily and subtilly to deceive and defraud hath not yet paid the said some of money or any part thereof." ASA DELOZEAR seeks payment and damage in the amount of eighty pounds sterling.

It is commanded that the Sheriff of Camden District do summon thirty good and lawful men to be drawn by ballot pursuant to the Act of General Assembly Having found that the said ASA hath sustained damages in the amount of forty one pounds eight shillings and six pence to be paid by EDWARD WALKER and SIMON ROACH, also damages in the amount of ten pounds five shillings and three pence for costs. Total to be paid of fifty one pounds thirteen shillings and nine pence.

DANIEL KELLY vs. URIAH BLACKMAN & JOHN WALKER. On the 24th of January 1818 at Camden did sign a promissory note for four hundred thirty dollars with interest from the date of the said note on the first day of January 1819. URIAH and JOHN became unable to pay the said DANIEL. DANIEL is bringing suit and asks for damages of seven hundred dollars.

BIOGRAPHICAL HISTORY OF LANCASTER COUNTY PA
by Alex. Harris. 1977.

Pg. 610-11 WALKER, ASAHIEL, of Sadsbury township, was born at Vallet Forge, in 1746. His father was ISAAC WALKER and his grandfather, LEWIS WALKER, an emigrant from Wales, about 1700, who purchased a large tract of land from WILLIAM PENN at Valley Forge. He erected a commodious stone edifice thereon, and meetings of the society of Friends were conducted in the house when established in the year 1713. The same house was used by General WASHINGTON as his headquarters during the Revolutionary war. It is still standing as part of the family mansion (1872), although it has undergone repairs from time to time. The land is now divided into about ten farms, and is still held by his descendants. His grandson, ASAHIEL WALKER, married ANN, the daughter of the well-known JAMES MOORE, of Sadsbury, in 1769, and afterwards purchased a tract of land in Sadsbury which had belonged to his father-in-law, and had been taken up by WILLIAM PENN in 1700, while on his visit at the Gap, and which he had surveyed off for his own use. At the age of 66 years, he divided his land between his sons ISAAC and ASAHIEL, which is now owned and occupied by his grandsons, ISAAC and ASAHIEL C. WALKER.

After thus adjusting his temporal matters, he retired from the cares of the world and spent the remainder of his life (over a quarter of a century), in promoting the cause of his Divine Master, and became a worthy minister of the gospel truths in the society of Friends. During no period of his life did he seek public distinction; yet he had charge of various important public and private trusts for members of different religious persuasions, so that during his whole life he was truly a worthy and faithful member of the society, so that he may be classed with the good, and remembered with the just. He departed his well spent life in the year 1838, in the 93d year of his age.

His descendants are still numerous and respectable. Besides the WALKERS are included some of the MOORES, POWNELLS, COOPERS, LINVILLES, ELLMAKERS, DILLERS, WORSTS, HERSHEYs, Mrs. PUSEY BARNARD, Mrs. MARY L. ROBERTS, of Texas, the SPROULS, HOUSTONS, and some of that ancient and highly respectable family of the Trouts, of the township of Bart. His youngest living grandson is the well-known JOSEPH C. WALKER, esq., of the Gap, who was married in the year 1856 to LUCY H., daughter of ESAIAS and SARAH ELLMAKER, of Earl township.

Pg. 611-12 WALKER, Captain JOSEPH, of Sadsbury, was the son of JOHN WALKER who emigrated from Wales, and who was the original purchaser of a tract of land called the Avondale farm, in the year 1743. Captain JOSEPH WALKER was a serviceable man in the Revolutionary war. He was first engaged in transporting arms and ammunition for the continental army. He afterwards raised a company of militia in Sadsbury and Bart, of which company he was chosen captain, and was engaged in the service. Colonial Records, vol. xiv., p. 631. Dr. Michener's History, p. 397. After the war he was appointed one of the justices of the peace for Lancaster county, which office he filled with credit for the space of about twenty years. He also purchased and had patented the farm called McKeanville, now owned by ADAM RUTTER. The Avondale

farm is now owned by JOSEPH D. POHALL, and by a recent survey and alteration of the line, this property is now in Bart. The descendants of JOSEPH WALKER mostly reside in the southern parts of Lancaster county.

Pg. 612 WALKER, ISAAC, was born in the year 1808, in Sadsbury township, Lancaster county. He was for some years engaged in the mercantile business, but laterly has followed agricultural pursuits. He is noted for his rare knowledge of matters pertaining to the early settlement of Lancaster and Chester counties, and has written considerably of the early local history of the southeastern section of the county. He erected, in 1872, a monument over the Penn Spring, at the Gap, in memory of the beneficent founder of the State of Pennsylvania.

ISAAC WALKER is a son of ISAAC and DEBORAH WALKER, a grandson of ASAHEL WALKER, the first, of Sadsbury, and the great great-grandson of LEWIS WALKER, at Valley Forge; and also the great great-grandson of ANDREW MOORE the first settler at Christiana and Penningtonville, and who established the first meeting of the Friends at old Sadsbury in the year 1724, and also of JEREMIAH STARR, one of the first settler of New Garden, who was a prominent member of the Provincial Assembly in 1740, and of the well-known GUYON MILLER, the first settler at Kennet Square. He is also the great great-grandson of ISAAC TAYLOR, the first, who was a surveyor in the service of WILLIAM PENN, and of his sons, proprietaries and governors of Pennsylvania: who made original surveys of a large portion of the land in the eastern section of Lancaster county and the western parts of Chester; who was also the original purchaser of all the land in the Gap, and erected the first stone house at that place, which is three stories high, and is standing and occupied at the present time, (1872); and who was also a magistrate and a member of the Provincial Assembly at different times, for the county of Chester from 1705 to 1723. ISAAC WALKER is also the great-grandson of NATHANIEL NEWLIN, who was a member of the convention which framed the old Constitution of Pennsylvania, and of JOSEPH DICKINSON, one of the early settlers of Pequea Valley, who was joined in marriage with Elizabeth, the daughter of GUYON MILLER, also the great-grandson of the well known JAMES MOORE, of Sadsbury, who emigrated from Ireland in the year 1723, and erected a large mill on the Octoraro, below Christiana, which is still standing and in use at the present time.

W. FRANK WALKER

W. FRANK WALKER, son of STANHOPE and MARY (SMITH) WALKER, was born near Westminster, Oconee County, S.C., on 17 Mar. 1858. His father was a school teacher and superintendent of a large plantation. W. FRANK WALKER received his early education in the public schools, and through instruction from his father at night. He continued to be a student all his life and could be said to have been largely self-taught.

When he was 14 years old, W. FRANK WALKER, was employed by a small cotton mill in Spartanburg County. It was there that he began a life of business activity which was to keep him in the textile manufacturing for the next 47 years.

After four years, when he was eighteen, W. FRANK WALKER, went with the Piedmont Manufacturing Co., who was just beginning its long and successful career in cotton manufacturing. W. FRANK WALKER, remained for more than 25 years. He steadily climbed in various positions until 1896, when he was elected Superintendent. At that time the company was the largest in the state with four plants.

After leaving Piedmont, after his long service M. FRANK WALKER was connected with various cotton mills. In 1912 he moved to Greenville City to be with the Brandon Mills, where he worked for five years, retiring in 1917. He remained in Greenville until his death on 31 Dec. 1927.

He was known as a public-spirited citizen, active in civic betterment. He was liberal in his support of charities. His religious affiliation was with the Methodist church, and was the Steward in the St. Paul Methodist Church of Greenville.

W. FRANK WALKER was twice married; first to Miss HARRIET MC ELRATH, who died in 1912. In 1914 he married Miss LENA WRIGHT of Anderson County. His second wife survives him and resides in Greenville.

A. C. WALKER

A. C. WALKER was born in Columbia, Alabama 21 Dec. 1881. After finishing school, he moved to Atlanta, Georgia and began working in the cotton business. Later, while working for the McFadden Company he was transferred to Charlotte, N. C. as their agent. He was still in their employment when he came to Greenville. Here, he decided to go into business for himself as a cotton merchant. He has had marked success in this work until his death, 6 Nov. 1927.

A. C. WALKER was a member of the Elks Club, and the Greenville Country Club. He was the director of the Peoples National Bank. At the time of his death he was owner of the Walker Building on West Washington Street, among other properties of great value and business importance.

A. C. WALKER married Miss EMMA HOWARD, who survives him. He has four children, CURTIS, ELMORE, JEAN, and BETTY. The Walker home is in Sans Souci, Greenville.

JOHN L. WALKER, M.D., a prominent and successful physician and surgeon of Waycross, Ware county, was born in Washington county, GA, 27 Aug. 1854, son of ELISHA W. and MARTHA (WEBB) WALKER, who were likewise born in Washington county, the former on 19 Jan. 1832, and the latter on 12 June 1831. The father served a short period as a soldier in the confederate ranks during the Civil war, but withdrew upon his election to the office of treasurer of Johnson county, an exacting position during the turbulent epoch of the war between the states. Doctor WALKER took a course in the high school at Wrightsville, Johnson county, and thereafter began the work of preparing himself with all thoroughness for his chosen profession. He attended the Atlanta Medical college and the Kentucky school of medicine, securing his degree of Doctor of Medicine from the former and he has since done effective post-graduate work in leading medical schools and hospitals in New York city and Chicago. Since his graduation he has been successfully engaged in the practice of his profession, the greater portion of the time in Waycross, where he now has a representative and extended clientage. He is a member of the American medical association, the Medical Association of Georgia and the Ware county medical society. In a fraternal way, he is affiliated with the Masonic fraternity, the Knights of Pythias, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. In politics he exercises his franchise and influence in support of the Democratic party, and both he and his wife are members of the Methodist Episcopal church South. On 19 Dec. 1883 he was married to Miss LAURA

SINGLETON, daughter of SAMUEL and ANN (CHRISTIAN) SINGLETON, of Exonton, Putnam county, GA. They have four children, JOHN S., ROBERT C., ANNIE LAURIE, and SAMUEL E. WALKER.

A Twentieth Century History of Cass County, Michigan
ed. by L.H. Glover. 1906

HENRY CLAY WALKER is one of the prominent old settlers of Cass county and a veteran of the Civil war. He resides on section 5, Calvin township, being owner of Brookside farm, which is a well improved property. His birth occurred in LaGrange township, Elkhart county, Indiana, on the 13th of September, 1841, and he is descended from an old New England family. His father, LUCIUS WALKER, was a native of Vermont, in which state he spent the days of his boyhood and youth. He became a farmer by occupation and has devoted his entire life to that calling. About 1846 he removed to Indiana, establishing his home in Elkhart county. He married Miss LYDIA S. SANBORN, who was also a native of New England, born either in Vermont or New Hampshire. They became the parents of eleven children, nine of whom reached manhood or womanhood, while five are living at this writing in 1906.

HENRY CLAY WALKER, the ninth in order of birth in his father's family, spent his youth in the county of his nativity. In 1858 his parents removed from the farm to Bristol, Elkhart county, and he remained at home until the time of his enlistment for service in the Civil war. His patriotic spirit was aroused by the continued attempt of the south to destroy the Union, and in August, 1862, he enrolled his name among the boys in blue of Company I, Eighty-eight Indiana Volunteer Infantry. He joined the army as a private and served until the following January, when he was honorably discharged on account of physical disability occasioned by illness.

Following his return to Bristol, Mr. Walker continued his education by pursuing a course of study in the Northern Indiana College at South Bend, where he remained for one year. He afterward entered business life as a merchant at Vandalia, Michigan, opening a general line of goods there. He was also postmaster of the town for nine years and discharged the duties of the position in connection with the management of the store, in which he met with a fair measure of success, enjoying a growing trade by reason of his fair dealing and his earnest desire to please his patrons. In 1873, however, he retired from commercial life and took up his abode upon the farm on which he now resides on section 5, Calvin township, and has since given his attention to general farming. His fields are well tilled and the place is equipped with many modern improvements, including the best machinery for plowing, planting and harvesting. In his work he is practical and methodical and his labors have been so carefully directed that a gratifying measure of prosperity has attended him. His farm comprises two hundred acres, the greater part of which is under a high state of cultivation and it is appropriately named Brookside farm.

In 1872 Mr. WALKER was united in marriage to Miss OLIVE M. HULL, daughter of ISAAC and MARIA HULL. They have become the parents of MINNIE WALKER, who died when only three years of age, and T. MC KINNON WALKER, an accomplished pianist, who is at home.

HENRY CLAY WALKER has taken an active interest in public affairs. He has served as township clerk, in Vandalia and three terms township treasurer in Calvin township. He has been justice of the peace for about 16 years, rendering decisions which are strictly fair & impartial. He is a Republican. He belongs to the Albert Anderson Post # 256 G.A.R., holding some of the offices.

Colonial Black Salt

"Set your ashes in a tub, as when soap is make; draw your lye, let it stand three or four days, then strain it, and boil over a gentle fire till the salt makes, which will settle at the bottom, then take it out with a skimming dish and lay it on a woollen cloth in the shade, and it will dry and become good salt."

Salt was essential in preserving large amounts of colonial food. Because of the various products it produced, the ashery was one of the most important buildings on a farm. From ash also came soap, and pearlash, used as colonial baking powder.

In colonial times a tree was worth more for ash than for lumber. An acre of forest, cleared and burned, yielded two tons of potash.

JAMES WALKER FAMILY

Written by James Walker, 1908

My forefathers in America came from Wales to Virginia some time in the 17th century, the particular year I do not know. The first of them of whom I can give any definite account was Sylvanus Walker, who was born in Virginia in 1718. He commanded a company of Virginia Militia under Col George Washington in Braddocks famous expedition against the French and Indians near Pittsburgh, Penn, 1775, in which Braddock was slain and his army defeated. History tells us that Braddocks entire army would have been captured but for the military tact of Washington and the prowess of his Virginia militia.

This Sylvanus Walker was my great grandfather. He married a Miss Wade. She was a great-aunt of Senator Wade Hampton of South Carolina. Sylvanus Walker and Miss Wade reared the following sons: WILLIAM, TANDY, BEN, GEORGE, AURELIUS and JOSEPH. These were all born and grew to manhood in Virginia, but moved from that state to different parts of the country except George, who had been accidentally killed. William moved to Adams County, Mississippi, settling near the city of Natchez. He was buried near the village of Washington, six miles east of Natchez. Some of his descendants are still living there. The Hon Robert Walker, who was a member of President Pierce's Cabinet was a descendant of his.

Tandy and Ben moved to North Carolina, their descendants in that state have always been locally prominent as preachers, teachers, farmers and lawyers. I have recently met one of them and traced our kinship. I have also recently met a great-grandson of William Walker of Mississippi.

Joseph Walker moved to Tennessee. Of him or his family I know little of nothing. But as General William Walker of Nicaragua fame went from Tennessee to California, from whence he went to Nicaragua, I have thought that he might have been a descendant of this Joseph Walker, but have never thought enough of the matter to take the trouble to ascertain. This General William Walker was a newspaper man in San Francisco and went from there to Nicaragua in about 1850, and with a lot of (filibusters, they were called) restless and adventurous Americans, tried to establish a government with himself as it's head. Meanwhile, Alexander Walker, his brother, had established a newspaper, "The Delta" in New Orleans to boost William and his cause in Central America, which it did very ably. I was a subscriber to this paper and thought seriously at one time of joining Walker's expedition. Finally, he was arrested by the British as a disturber of the peace and turned over to the Nicaraguans and Costa Ricans who shot him; and thus ended the career of this desperate and ambitious man. During his Central American career he was styled the "gray eyed man of destiny" by the emotional grandiloquent part of the public. This affair created quite a sensation in the USA and in some other parts of the world. Whether he is my kirman or not, I do not know, but am inclined to think he was issue to my grand-uncle, Joseph Walker.

Aurelius Walker, who was my grandfather, moved to Fleming County, Kentucky. He was born in 1762, and died in 1833. He married a Miss Nancy Turner. They reared the following named children: MATTHEW, ANNE, WILLIAM, NANCY, HENRY, HARRIET, EDWIN, SYLVANUS and JOHN. Edwin was drowned when young, attempting to ford a swollen stream. Matthew, William, Henry and Sylvanus moved to Green County, Georgia. John, the other son of Aurelius, remained in Kentucky. He had one child, William, who died after reaching manhood, leaving no family.

Anne married a man named William Smith. They remained in Kentucky and many of their descendants are now living in Fleming County, in that state. They are a prominent family there, one of them having been a sheriff of the county several times.

Nancy married a man named Proctor, and Harriet, another daughter of Aurelius married a man named Wells. Of these last two families I have never learned much. They moved to Buchanan or Atchison County, Missouri, not far from the city of St Joseph, about fifty years ago, and I suppose their descendants, or some of them are living there at this time.

Matthew, William and Sylvanus, sons of Aurelius, became large slave owners and cotton planters after they came to Georgia, and John, their brother, who had remained in Kentucky also became a man of great wealth.

My uncle Matthew married a Miss Sally Stone. They reared a large family, but only one son, Sam Walker. Some of Sam's descendants are still in Green County, Georgia. The daughters of Matthew, namely: JANE, NANCY, MARTHA, AMANDA, ANNE and LOUISA, married as follows: Jane to Jim Hutchinson, Nancy to Covington Brooks, Martha to Urfin Hudson, Amanda to a man named Amos, Anne to a man named Cook and Louisa to a Dr Hitchcock. The last I knew of these cousins were still living in Georgia, but where they and their descendants are now, the Lord knows, I'm sure I don't.

Uncle Henry married twice. By his first wife, who died before I was born, he had two children, JOHN EDWIN and NANCY. John Edwin was a graduate of Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia. Both he and Nancy married and I think their descendants are still living in Green County, Georgia at Greensboro. Uncle Henry's second wife was Miss Mary Hutchinson. Their children were: WILLIAM, MARTHA, FRANCIS, RICHARD, AMBROSE and MARY. In the latter part of the old man's life, the family or the greater part of them moved from Georgia to Columbia County, Arkansas. The descendants of William and Ambrose (who have recently died) are still living in Columbia County. Richard, who has never had any children is still living, and is a dry good merchant at Stamps, Arkansas.

Ambrose' sons are now merchants at Magnolia, Arkansas. Of Uncle Henry's daughters, Martha, Francis and Mary, I can only say I cannot now recall the names of the gentlemen they married, or what has become of them.

Uncle Sylvanus had only two children: ROBERT and WILLIAM. Robert died of consumption when a young man. William moved to Florida, I have heard. This was some 50 years ago, since then I have heard nothing of him.

William, the other son of Aurelius, was my father. He was born in Mecklinburg County, Virginia. He died at my house in my arms. He was an industrious and upright man. Not a harsh word was ever uttered or could have been uttered against his honored name. He rests in the Magnolia Cemetery awaiting the final summons, his memory respected and honored by all who knew him.

My mother's name was Susan Hester Pennick. She was born in March 1801, in Mason County, Kentucky, where she and my father were united in marriage in 1816. She died on the 12th of December, 1840, and was buried at Ridge Grove Methodist Church in Green County, Georgia. She was a devoted member of that church, and I remember the presence often of ministers of that church at house on their meeting days. Ridge Grove Meeting House stood on my father's plantation, the land on which it stood having been donated by him, although he himself was not a member of the church. He did this in devotion to my mother.

My mother gave birth to twelve children, only six of them surviving to the age of their maturity. The names of these six children are: MATTHEW, JOHN, JAMES, MARY and EDWIN, in order of their ages.

Matthew, the oldest, became a physician, having a diploma from a medical school. In 1846 he married Miss Letitia Francis, a member of a wealthy family of Burk County, Georgia. He was a restless, ambitious and reckless character, though of free and magnanimous disposition. In 1851, all of us, that is, of my father's immediate family, having moved from Georgia out west, he took his wife back to her mother's in Georgia, raised a company of some 65 men, equipped them at Shreveport, and started overland to California to explore the country and hunt for gold, at that time nearly the whole of northern Texas, even further east than Dallas or Denton, was over-run by the Comanche and Flat Head Indians, who were exceedingly hostile. Of course, my brother did not proceed far into Texas on his journey before he met with trouble from the savages. The newspapers for a time contained frequent accounts of the terrible fights he had with these Indians, telling how he often whipped many times the number of his own little band. Finally, the most of the men not already killed became sick and discouraged, voted to give up the trip and return, and did return. All except my brother and eight of the men. These nine determined to push on, and a few days afterward they struck camp. The several others went out to kill game for food, and the Indians who had been hovering on their tracks chose this opportunity to attack them and slew every man of the little band excepting one man who lived to tell the story, this is the way in which my eldest brother, Matthew, lost his life. I ought, perhaps, especially at my age, to have a different feeling or sentiment, but I cannot help deriving some comfort from knowing my brother was a brave man, and that more than one of the red devils bit the dust before they got him. He was twenty-six years old when he died. He left no children. His wife married again.

My brother John, died in 1851 at the age of twenty-two, of yellow fever. He had been employed in some office of the U S Navy Yard at that time. He was of a literary turn and of rather mild and quiet nature. He taught a classic school in Matagorda, Texas in 1846, when only 16 years of age. I now have a letter written by him from that place in that year, which I think as much of as a memorial.

My only clue as to where they might have been in Ky is that Malinda Cann's sister Catherine married John Paul Eden in 1818 in Bath Co, Ky. They were supposedly the daughters of Joseph Cann - I have been unable to solve that line, either.

The Edens also went to Rush Co, Ind and then on to Moultrie Co, Ill which is next to Shelby Co, Ill. Both Malinda and Catherine gave their sons the middle name of Rice which should be a clue on the Cann line.

I think that the range of the ages of the children of Alexander and Malinda is strange. It could mean several things - two or more wives, dead children, or children who did not come with the family to Shelby Co, Ill. I have never heard mention of other children, or that Eliza Ann and Wallace were not full brother and sister.

ELISHA J WALKER

(taken from History of Newton, Lawrence, Barry & McDonald Counties, Missouri - 1888)

Elisha J Walker is a son of John S Walker and a grandson of James Walker, the latter being one of the early and prosperous farmers of Wayne County, Kentucky, where John S Walker was born and reared and where he married Sarah Ryan. John and Sarah were the parents of 14 children, eleven lived to maturity: Polly A, Elisha J, Henry T, Joseph, John, Harry, Moses, Martha E, Elizabeth, Jane and Abraham. In 1854 Walker moved to Missouri, settled in Benton Township, Newton County, and is now a prosperous farmer. He owns 112 acres of land. At the beginning of the war he enlisted in 14th, Co H, Missouri State Militia, U S Army; was transferred to Co M, 8th Regt; served 13 months. He participated in the Battle of Neosha and other severe skirmishes. He is a Republican and is a Universalist, formerly a regular Baptist.

J C WALKER

J C Walker, retired farmer of Neosho, Missouri, was born in the north of Ireland 28 December 1814 and has within the last few years made Newton County his home.

His father, Joseph Walker, was a native of Leicestershire, England and his mother, maiden name Nancy Cyle, was of Scotch-Irish descent. The father was a prominent farmer and horse dealer.

Their son, J C, was reared in his native country and followed farming until 1844 when he immigrated to the United States and engaged in the livery business.

After the discovery of gold in California, he was among the first to leave, going by way of isthmus. After remaining in California for two years, engaged in mining with indifferent success, he went to Australia. He remained there for two years with very satisfactory results.

Owing to injuries received on account of his horse being shot and falling with him, he had to abandon a prospect that was paying a large dividend and return to the states.

For 11 years, he made his home in Winona, Minnesota. He then went to Wilson County, Kansas, where he lived for 22 years - later coming to Neosho, Missouri.

He married in 1832 to Miss Rosa Clark, who was also born in the north of Ireland, and they have 4 children living: Joseph,

Ann wife of Capt Stratton of Wilson County, Kansas, John and Josie (now Mrs Haughey).

Mr Walker has traveled extensively and profited by what he has seen. As a farmer and stock raiser, he is unsurpassed, having always given strict attention to whatever business he ventured into.

He is a man of sterling integrity, positive in his convictions and nothing can swerve him from what he thinks and knows is right. No man merits in higher degree the success which has attended his career.

He went to Ransom, Illinois (near Streator) which was a German settlement. He married an American-born German girl named Margaretha GEHEGER. Grandfather came from a little German town named KIRCHENTELLINSFURT, which is on the Neckar River a few miles south of Stuttgart. I have found the WALCKER genealogy in the Deutsches Geschlechterbuch. The name ties is very well since it shows the family originating in Reutlingen about 1280, with branches moving to Kirchentellinsfurt in the early 1400s and still existing in the late 1800s. A German genealogist researching for me reported that church records indicated that over a hundred WALKERS had migrated to the United States. Incidentally, the town cemetery shows the use of the WALKER spelling. by ELWOOD C WALKER, 400 Mountain Avenue, North Caldwell, New Jersey 07006.

WALKER - KEY - RABURN LINE

Sent by Walker H Rayburn, 1012 Main Street, Elizabeth City, NC 27909.

Tandy A Key of Edgefield County, S C married HARRIET WALKER about 1829, most likely in that county. About 1836 a group from Edgefield, SC migrated to Bienville Parish, LA and founded the town of Mt Lebanon.

On July 11, 1865 Joshua W Key (s/o Tandy A & Harriet (Walker) Key) married MARGARET L RABURN, dau/o Hodge Raburn, a brother of my grandfather James Harvey Raburn. On May 7, 1868 James Harvey married Julia Arabella Key in Sparta, Bienville Parish, LA. Tandy A Key died either late in 1851 or early 1852. I have a certified copy of his succession records, but the exact date of death was not given. Both he and Harriet were buried in unmarked graves in the Mt Lebanon cemetery. This could not have been caused by a lack of funds at the time of Tandy's death.

Harriet Walker Key died about the end of the Civil War when everyone in the south was in poor financial position causing tombstones to be neglected.

At the time of the marriage of James Harvey and Julia Arabella Raburn, she was working as governess for the children of James' brother Hodge Raburn.

William Gibson Key, whom Harriet hired as tutor of her children after the death of Tandy A, married Harriet's daughter Virginia. There were no children. William Gibson died 31 October 1863. I have no record of his having fought in the War Between the States. In about 1865 Virginia married Joseph LeMay who owned a plantation on Spirit Lake in Lafayette County, Arkansas.

In 1872 James Harvey and Julia Arabella Raburn sold some land in Bienville Parish. At some period between 1872 and 1876 a group, including Joshua W Key's family and that of my grandparents, James and "Bell", moved to what they called the Trans-Brazos, Texas. A sandstorm is said to have cut down the cotton crop and they returned to Louisiana. My sister has a more "romantic" story. She says that Arabella took James Harvey's children by a first marriage and their children and

drove from what is now Fort Worth to Lafayette County, Arkansas in a wagon. That would have been about 250 miles. I think the group returned together to Louisiana. Then she drove up the east side of the Red River to Spirit Lake. This would be an easy trip because she had relatives living along the road where she could have spent the night. I do know that she took the children and drove to the LeMay plantation. My grandfather came on later. We will never know the real answer to this question.

Palmer Rayburn, b 29 September 1876, the fourth son of James Harvey and Julia Arabella, was born on the LeMay plantation. My father ROBERT WALKER RAYBURN was born 29 January 1879 on the home place one mile north of Stamps, Lafayette County, AR. The family continued to live at Stamps until after the death of James Harvey in 1901.

I am sure that my grandmother was responsible for the name change from Raburn to Rayburn. James G Rayburn, the son of James Harvey and Delilah Barnes Rayburn, claimed that the name should be spelled RABURN. Jim was correct as far as he knew, but if he had gone back one generation he would have found the spelling to be RABUN. Jim lost. His tombstone had the name spelled RAYBURN. This proves that truth does not always win.

The only information that I had on the Walker family, other than my great-grandmother was Harriet Walker, has come from Key and Allied Families by Mrs Julian C Lane:

"Tandy A Key (Henry 2, Henry 1) son of Henry and Phoebe Talbot Key, born 1804 m. Harriet Walker in Edgefield, S. C. She was torn in 1810. Their children: John, Joshua Winfield b 1835; Edwin; Virginia b 1841; Tandy; Robert m. Miss Ramsey; Belle b 1849; and Hattie.

John, son of Tandy A Key m. Miss Tompkins in Louisiana. They have three sons living in California.

Edwin Key, son of Tandy A Key m. Miss Presley, of Ringgold, La. No children.

Joshua, son of Tandy A Key m. Margaret Raburn in 1865. They had three children, Joshua b 1868 md Lucy Cook 1871; John Edwin b 1871, died in infancy, and Jennie b 1875 md W J Sheffield in 1892.

Virginia Key dau/o Tandy A md Mr LeMay and they had two children, Elizabeth b 1866 and Tandy Key b 1877.

Elizabeth LeMay md Mr Cabiness and to them were born LeMay b 1886; Clyde b 1889; Joe b 1897, and Fred b 1894. Joe Cabiness md Valentine Mitchell, and they had

two children, Helen Elizabeth and Martha Ann.
 Fred Cabiness md Ruby Dobson. They had one child George V Cabiness.
 Tandy Key LeMay md Frankie Butler, and they had one child Jack LeMay b 1901,
 Lawton, Okla.
 Belle Key, d/o Tandy A Key, md J H Raburn in 1868, Bienville Parish, La. To
 them were born eleven children, five dying in youth: Stella b 1869; Crayton
 b 1870 md Mary Plant; Palmer b 1876 md Mary Nix; Walker b 1877 md Maggie Cook;

The only male descendants of James Harvey and Julia Arabella Key Rayburn who
 can continue the Rayburn name are the grandsons of my father ROBERT WALKER RAYBURN.

JOSEPH ROBLEY WALKER (1768-1816) probably was born in Chesterfield County, VA.
 A GOLLOTHEN Walker was enumerated on page 50, 1790 U S Census of Chesterfield, VA:
 6 white, 1 black.

Apparently Callathun Walker was still living in Chesterfield County, Virginia

Tandy A Key owned and operated a plantation on Black Lake River, LA. He was
 postmaster of Mt Lebanon, LA. He was also active in the establishment of what
 they termed the "University". He and the grandfather of Lyndon Baines Johnson
 signed the contract to purchase the land on which the college was built. I have a
 copy of the contract.

This was during the building of the "Dog Trot", the home of the Key family in
 Mt Lebanon. It is still in good repair and is being lived in as of 1980. The
 last six people on the 1850 census list were boarders in the Key home.

8. The wills of Joseph Robley, Dorothy Winfield, Callathun, or Elizabeth Vaughn Walker.

In the earlier information taken from Key and Allied Families, Parmelia, the youngest child of Henry Key, Jr married a Mr. Walker. She was a sister of Tandy A Key. The time was 1836, the year of the migration to Bienville Parish, LA. She could have died in Alabama. Her mother, Phoebe Talbert Key died in Warriors Stand, Alabama. This is another interesting question that should be solved.

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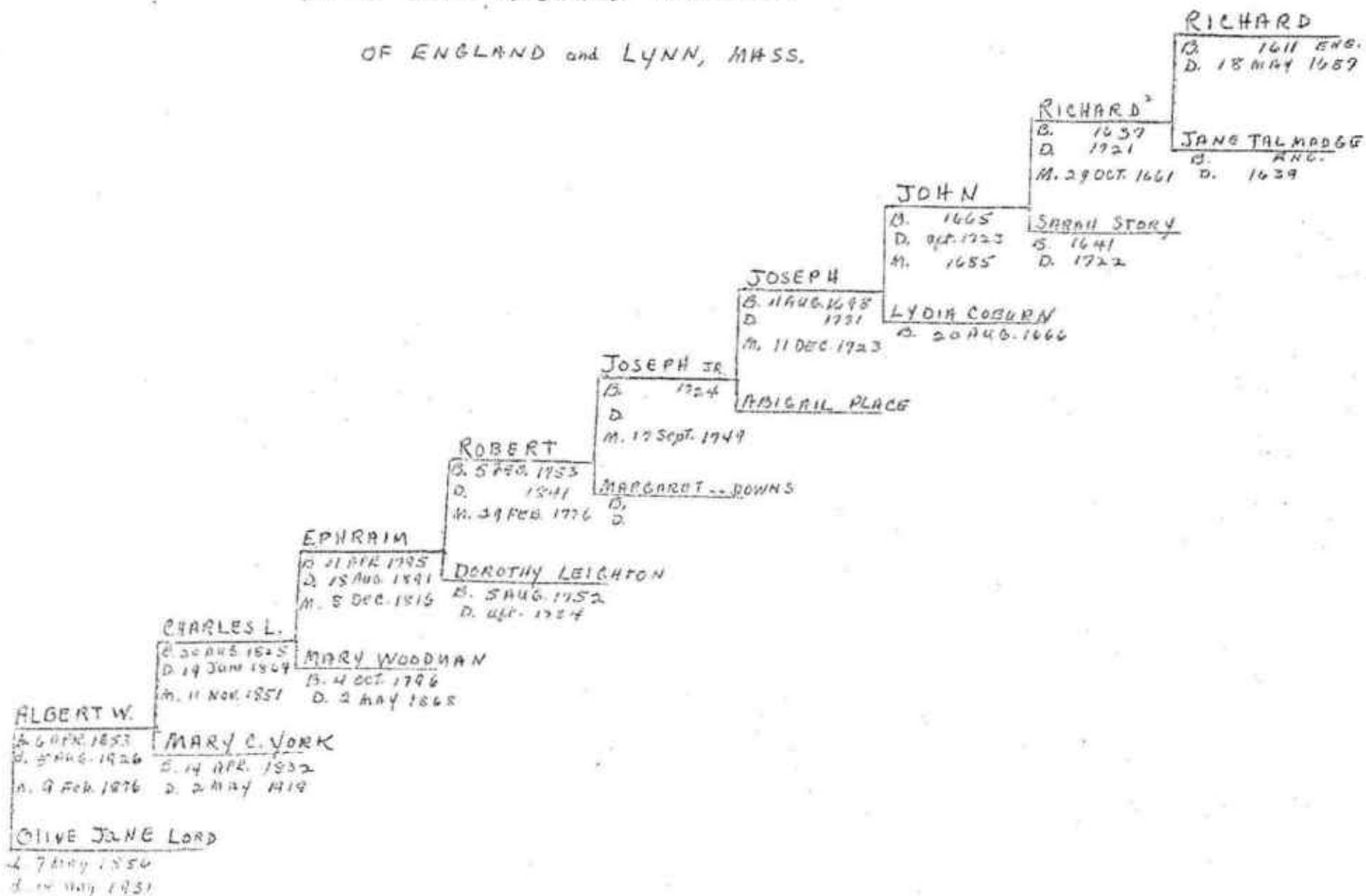

ALBERT WARD WALKER

Albert Ward Walker was the descendant of pioneers who emigrated from England to Massachusetts, then to New Hampshire and eventually in the 19th century, to Southern Maine. He was born (according to newspaper clippings in the early camp record book and his death certificate) in Portland, Maine, on 6 April 1853. Because courthouse records in Portland have burned, no birth certificate can be found. His grandfather Ephraim Walker's bible record also gives his birth date.

Albert was the oldest of three boys: Albert W., Mallory William and Charles Joseph. The younger boys were born in Baldwin, Maine, showing that Albert's family moved from Portland to Baldwin between 1853 and 1855.

The family lived on a farm in East Baldwin where they raised their food and eaked out a living. When Albert was 8 years old, the Civil War began. Two years later in December, 1863, his father Charles L. (the L is still a mystery), at age 38, enlisted as a private in the 30th Regiment of Maine Volunteers, and was shipped to Louisiana to fight in the Red River campaign. He never returned to Maine but died of dysentery on June 19, 1864 in Louisiana.

Albert's mother, widow Mary York, was of sturdy stock, and she struggled to bring up her young family alone. At age 32 Mary applied for a widow's pension which she sorely needed with her 3 sons, now ages 11, 9, and 4 years, plus an adopted daughter, Hattie McKeen (a niece who later married George Frothingham), as well as Charles's parents, Ephraim and Mary Woodman Walker. She received a \$300.00 bounty and back pay of \$225.00 for her husband's war services. Soon, before 1870, she decided to move with her family to Bridgton, probably to be near relatives and town. According to her diary, she hired her services out at a rooming house and thus added to her income. By 1874 she moved her family to Denmark. Albert was able to attend school in Bridgton, and when he was 17 years old he took a job as an employee in the Boston Ice Company where he worked for six years in the summer and taught and was a superintendant of schools in the Bridgton-Denmark area in the winter.

On February 9, 1876, he married Olive Jane Lord of Denmark, who chose to be known as Jennie, the daughter of Albion P. Lord and Olive Wentworth. Jennie was born 7 May 1856 and was also a teacher from age 16 when her father died. The newspaper article relates that they were married in Cornish, Maine, by Rev. Albert Cole, and then drove to Standish (at least one aunt lived there). A big snowstorm came up and they were stranded in Standish for 3 days before they could get home. They went to live in Denmark on the Albion Lord farm of Jennie's father, and their four children were born there: Percy Mallory in 1876, Eva Enna in 1880, Mertie Grace in 1880, and Alta Claire in 1882.

After a little more than 10 years in Denmark, Albert Walker decided to quit farming and he bought the S.F. Briggs ice business in South Paris in 1877. At first the family lived in a rented apartment between the village and the Congregational Church, and opposite the "old brick school". By 1889 he moved into a three story house on Pleasant Street, later 142 Main Street. On November 8, 1916, this house burned from a fire that had smoldered in the chimney. The barn was saved, but the house had to be torn down and rebuilt. It was occupied by April, 1917 by the Walker family.

When he moved to South Paris he owned two horses, and in addition to the ice route, he plowed snow and hauled lumber for many people. He also cut hay, hauled gravel for the railroad, and worked on the dam. A few years later, in 1892, he purchased the Norway Ice Company. At the same time he bought out Job Linscott, a granite dealer, and started selling masons' supplies, coal and farm implements. His company manufactured concrete blocks and bricks, enabling him to contract for jobs. After the big fire in Norway in 1894, he furnished than half of all the brick, lime, cement and sand used to rebuild the town. He also added

to the building of South Paris by grading the court house grounds, doing the mason work on the Billings Block, and in 1890, working with John Murch, built the Pythian Building.

After a few years he sold the ice business and concentrated on his other enterprises. In 1896 the firm became the agent for Standard Oil of New York. The farm implement part of the business grew rapidly as newly invented machines came on the market. Albert Walker knew the needs of farmers and must have enjoyed dealing with the latest machines without having to work them himself on a farm. John Deere equipment was the main brand which he carried- everything from tractors, plows, harrows to cream separators. It was a delight and treat for his grandchildren in later years to visit the little cement block office and huge wood adjoining showroom which was filled with various kinds of strangely shaped, big equipment as well as nails, screws, hinges, and myriads of small items. A.W.Walker must have been a good employer to work for. At least two men, Johnny Judkins (who first worked for him in 1895) and Cecil Tyler worked there many years, and of course, Bob Wise after he married Alta Walker in 1919.

Son Percy Walker joined his father by 1895 and in 1911 the company name became "A.W.Walker & Son". Daughter Eva also worked for him as a secretary.

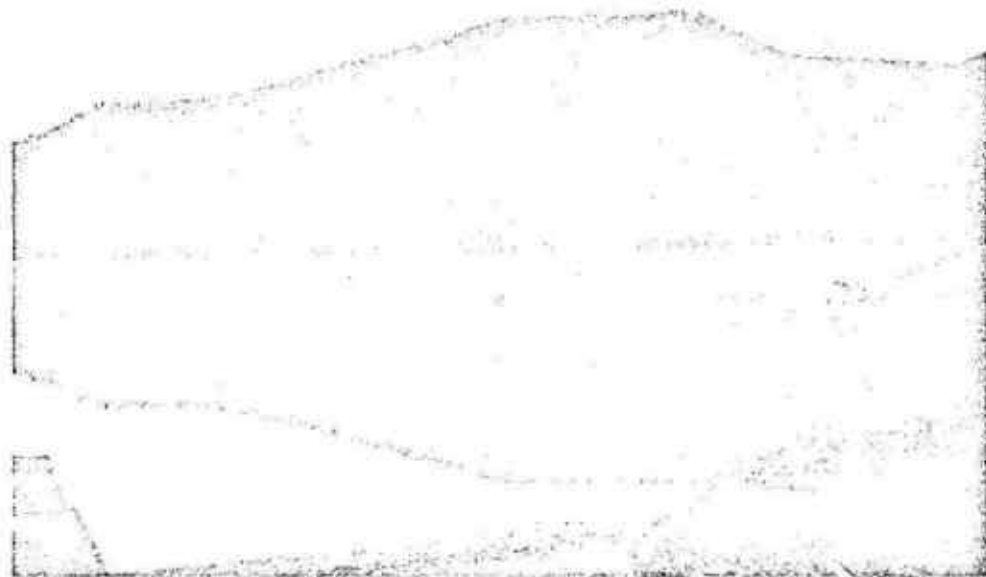
Largely due to Albert Walker's business acumen and friendly personality, the farm implement business grew to be the largest of its kind in Oxford County, and farmers from all over Southern Maine came to his annual "Field Day" which was held in late April on the grounds around his office at 166 Main Street. This event was started about 1906 and continued at least through 1932. Speakers from the county, state, or farm bureau, as well as local leaders were on the program. All the latest equipment was placed outdoors and demonstrated to the farmers. It was a combination business and social event. At noon a free lunch was served on long wooden tables with benches in the Burnham and Morrill "corn shop" which was adjoining the A.W.Walker & Son grounds. The menu was B.&M. baked beans, brown bread, and coffee. Without doubt the advertising and lunch helped boost the farm equipment sales, and also without doubt, Albert Walker thoroughly enjoyed the comradery of the whole event.

Albert and Jennie Walker attended the Congregational Church in South Paris, though Albert Walker's diary shows that Jennie was a more regular attender. They both supported its organizations. Al was a charter member and past grand master of Denmark Lodge, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, a charter member and past chancellor of Hamlin Lodge in Paris, Knights of Pythias; member and past master of the Masonic Lodge, a member of United Order of the Golden Cross, and of the Good Templars. In 1987 he was elected a trustee of the South Paris Paris Savings Bank and remained on the board for 20 years. He was the bank president when he died in 1926. It is said he was interested in everything pertaining to the welfare of the community.

Jennie and Al had celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary six months before he died at age 73 of arteriosclerosis and valvular heart disease. Albert Walker was of medium stature and stocky in his later years, with a friendly, open face and personality. He thoroughly enjoyed being with people and especially enjoyed his family around him. Jennie, or Nan, as her children called her, was a little taller than her husband, and always very spare. She enjoyed their many friends, was active in church work and Mr. Pleasant Rebekah Lodge, and was a loving grandmother. Her obituary says that she "was of a kindly, friendly disposition and could count as her friends all who knew her". Her descendants recall that she was known to have a quick temper and that her husband, Al, was the easy-going, calming influence. She died May 14, 1931, in her home, at age 78 after breaking her hip in a fall and subsequently suffering a stroke.

In the Spring of 1908 Albert Walker took a trip by horse and buggy to Shagg Pond in Woodstock, with his friend Albert Parks, to look at a large lot that Parks had acquired. He liked the spot very much with its sandy beach and mountains surrounding the pond, and he bought about half of the camp lot including the point of land on it. The next year he cleared the lot and built "Camp Altamerteva" which he named for his three daughters. We believe the logs were cut at John Redding's sawmill on the Shagg outlet in Redding. It was to be a roomy camp with 5 bedrooms upstairs and a large living room and kitchen down, and a front, side and back porch.

From the start the Walkers' many friends from South Paris were invited to share the camp with them when they went there. Meals were cooked on the black wood stove, water hauled from the pond by pails and from the spring by pails, and the "privvy" used for convenience. The kerosene lamps gave a soft glow to the unfinished pine walls in the evenings. Fortunately for us, Al Walker kept a camp record of the visits made to the camp from the first year, and interspersed it with his own style of narrative poetry. This custom of keeping the camp record has continued to the present time. His grandchildren grew up spending their summers at camp and loved the place as much as he did. Albert would be pleased to know that his great grandchildren are following the same tradition.

CHARLES L. WALKER

Charles L. Walker was born in Alton, New Hampshire on 20 August 1824 according to his father Ephraim's Bible records. Little is known about his early childhood, but we believe he grew up on a farm in New Hampshire. In 1830 his father is listed on the Federal census as living in Burton, N.H., now Albany. In 1840 the family may have been in Waterford, Maine. By 1850 his father Ephraim moved the family to Portland. Charles was the 4th son in a family of 7 sons and one daughter. He probably was living on the Baldwin farm when, on 11 Nov. 1851, he married Mary Chick York, born in Freedom, Maine, daughter of David and Sally Hazelton York. Sally, the mother, had died by 1851 and Mary was living in Standish with her older sister, Eliza York Burnham and her husband, John Burnham. Mary's father was a farmer living in Naples with his son Samuel at the time.

Charles and Mary Walker's oldest son, Albert W. Walker, was born in 1853 in Portland, but in 1855 they were settled in Baldwin and two younger sons were born there: William Malory, born 7 Dec. 1865 and Charles Joseph born 21 Feb. 1860. A biographical review of Albert W. Walker states that his grandfather, Ephraim, was a shoemaker who settled in Portland and purchased a small farm in Baldwin where he farmed in the summer and in the winter worked at his trade.

The family lived as many farm families did in Maine, tilling the land to grow their crops and raising enough cattle, pigs and chickens for meat. The times were hard but the family made a living. Charles and Mary adopted Hattie McKeen, a daughter of Mary's deceased niece, Sarah Burnham, and Hattie was raised as a sister to the boys. Charles' parents also lived on the Baldwin farm. On December 10, 1863, Charles Walker at age 38, decided to enlist in Augusta as a private in the 30th Regiment of Maine Volunteers to serve 3 years, or during the War of the Rebellion. As fate would have it, he didn't serve either length of time.

Charles was at Camp Hayes, Augusta on Jan. 24, 1864, and his record shows that he was 5 feet 8 inches, had light complexion and blue eyes. Very soon his 30th Maine Regiment, Co. I, was shipped from Portland to New Orleans on the transport "Merrimac" where it disembarked on Feb. 16, 1864. He wrote letters home from various stopping places of their march in Louisiana, across the flatlands, then by steamer up the Mississippi to Franklin where the regiment was assigned to the 3rd brigade, 1st division, 19th army corps. Some of his letters reminded Mary about what to do on the farm. They also tell about drinking the water from the Mississippi River.

In March the division marched northward 160 miles to Alexandria where it joined the Red River Campaign. Next they marched to Natchitoches, and on April 8 went into action at the battle of Sabine Crossroads where the entire advance army had already been disastrously repulsed. The 30th Maine helped to turn the Rebels back, then retreated to Pleasant Hill. Next day the enemy attacked again and the 30th Maine, fighting on the front, held its ground until after the retreat of all other regiments, and it was ordered back. Regrouped, they helped drive the enemy two miles from the field of battle. The regiment then retreated to Grand Ecore where they built earthworks for defence. On April 21 they retreated again and were forced by the enemy to ford the Cane River. At this point the 30th Maine assaulted and helped dislodge 5 regiments of enemy force, performing bravely. The army then camped at Alexandria. (The entire fighting of this campaign seems like a futile series of actions.)

In May the retreat continued to the Mississippi River, fighting along the way. They arrived in Morganza on the Mississippi on May 22. The 30th Maine Regiment sailed on the first of July for Virginia, but Charles Walker was not with it. Both Charles and his nephew, John Burnham, contracted dysentery. John recovered, but Charles died on June 19, 1864, six months after enlisting. He is buried in Port Hudson, LA. National Cemetery near Morganza, grave #2580. A headstone was placed by the government.

(CHARLES L. WALKER)

Mary Walker, a widow at 32, applied for a pension which she sorely needed with her 3 boys aged 11, 9 and 4, plus her husband's parents and an adopted daughter. She received \$300. bounty and back pay of \$225.00 for Charles' war services. Soon, before 1870, she decided to move with her family to Bridgton, probably to be near relatives and town. In Bridgton Albert attended school at the Academy and Mary worked at a boarding house in Fryeburg in 1877, according to her diary. She received a government pension until she married Hiram Brown September 11, 1877, in Denmark. Hiram died May 13, 1892, at Brownfield and she re-applied for a pension in 1901 from East Brownfield, signed Mary C. Brown. It was granted and she received \$12.00 a month. In 1916 she received \$20.00 a month, and in 1917 she got \$25.00 a month. After her second husband died, she went to live with her son William who stayed in East Brownfield and lived on a farm which he bought in 1881. Her son, Charles, when a young man, decided he didn't want to work on a farm any longer and took off for St. Louis where he became an engineer, married, lived and died there at age 53.

Mary Chick York Walker Brown was born in Freedom, Maine, on April 14, 1833 (the date on the York family record, although her pension record says she was born at Naples, Maine.). She was the youngest of eight children. She died on April 25, 1919 in Brownfield and is buried in the West Denmark Cemetery. The cemetery is about 2 miles from the Denmark road intersection at Albert Hill's farm and near the home of William M. Walker, son of Charles and Mary. She lived to see the Civil War and loss of her husband, the Spanish-American War, World War I, and the death of her son Charlie. The children of Charles and Mary Walker were:

EPHRAIM WALKER

Ephraim Walker, father of Charles L. Walker, was born in Alton, N.H. on 11 April 1795. He was the youngest of 10 children with the other 9 born in Dover, N.H. The town record book of Alton and Ephraim's bible records bear this out. His father, Robert, settled on a farm in East Alton, probably to have more and cheaper land after the long settled towns became crowded. Ephraim grew up in Alton and married Mary Woodman, daughter of Paul Woodman and Sarah Wentworth on 18 Aug. 1816. Their 9 children were born in N.H. In the 1830 census Ephraim was living in Burton, N.H. (now Albany) just west of Alton. And in 1840 he was in Denmark, W. In 1850 an Ephraim was in Waterford, and in 1860 he and Mary were living in Baldwin with Charles Walker's family. Mary, wife of Ephraim, died in 1868 and Ephraim 1871 in Denmark or Brownfield. We should find out more about this pioneer who left his birthplace in N.H. and pioneered into Maine.

ROBERT WALKER

Robert Walker was born 5 Feb. 1753 in Rochester, N.H. as recorded in church records and in History of Rochester, N.H. also in Ephraim Walker's bible where he is listed as Robard Walker. He was baptized on 10 Feb. 1753, the son of Joseph Walker. His mother was Margaret Downs, the widow of Gershom Downs. Little is known of his early life in Rochester until he married Dorothy Leighton, also of Rochester, on 29 Feb. 1776. He signed the "Association Test" of loyalty to the Colonies in 1776, along with his father and grandfather.

In July, 1791, Robert Walker had a land grant of 50 acres from the town of Burton, N.H., on condition of immediate settlement. Some time between 1791 and 1795 he moved to Alton, about 20 miles to the east, but may have retained the Burton farm, because his son Ephraim was living on it in 1830 for a time.

WE are not sure when his wife "Dolly" Walker died, but it probably was before her husband's death. Robert died in 1841 in Ossipee, N.H., where he was living with his son, Elder John Walker. The 10 children of Robert and Dorothy Walker were:

JOSEPH WALKER, Jr.

Joseph Walker, Jr. was the father of Robert Walker. According to "Walkers of Yesterday", p. 136, he was born in 1724, probably in Newington, N.H. He grew up in Rochester where his father moved by 1737. He married 17 Sept. 1749, as recorded in the History of Rochester, N.H., to Margaret Downs, widow of Gershom Downs who was killed in an Indian raid in 1746. Margaret's maiden name has not been found.

Joseph was the son of Joseph Walker and Abigail Place of Newington and Rochester, N.H.

Joseph, Jr. and Margaret had two sons as follows:

John, baptized 5 Aug. 1750 at Rochester, died 1827 at Farmington. He fought at the battle of Bunker Hill.

Robert, born 5 Feb. 1753, Rochester, N.H., died in 1841 at Ossipee.

Robert lived in Burton and Alton, N.H., married Dorothy Leighton, daughter of David Leighton and Ann Chamberlain.

Joseph Walker signed the Association Test in Rochester in 1776.

JOSEPH WALKER, Sr.

Joseph Walker, Sr., was born in Ipswich, Mass. on 11 Aug. 1698, moved to Newington, N.H. where he married Abigail Place (daughter of Richard and Martha Leighton Place) on 11 Dec. 1723. Before 1737 he moved to Rochester, N.H. where he died in 1781. (Walkers of Yesterday, page 66).

He left a will written the 28th of May, 1778, in which he leaves his "well beloved son Joseph Walker the sum of 5 shillings", and his two daughters, Abigail Wallingford and Lydia Downs "all my house hold furniture". Son Richard received all the real estate and stock of creatures, wearing apparel, utensils of husbandry and debts.

JOHN WALKER

John Walker was born in 1665, probably in Ipswich, Mass., the home of his father. He died after 1723 (Walkers of Yesterday, p. 128). In 1685 he married Lydia Coburn, daughter of Edward and Hannah Coburn, who, with his 7 sons, founded the town of Dracut, Mass.

John and Lydia Walker raised their family at Chelmsford, living, no doubt, on Edward Coburn's land. John was a farmer and commander of an Indian garrison. In 1713 he was an inn-keeper at Ipswich where he had returned to take care of his parents at "Walker's Island". He moved to Newington, N.H., by 1723 to spend his last years near his sons and daughters who had moved there. The exact dates of his and Lydia's deaths are not known.

Children of John and Lydia began to move into Southern Maine and New Hampshire in the early 1700s in search of better land. They joined their cousins, also descendants of Richard Walker, in the early settling of towns in this area.

RICHARD ² WALKER

Richard ² Walker was born in 1637 at Lynn, Mass, and died in 1721. He lived in Reading when a young man. "Walkers of Yesterday", p. 42, says that he went to Ipswich, then a new frontier town, probably with restless settlers from Lynn. In Ipswich he married his employer's niece, Sarah Story, on 29 Oct. 1661. Sarah was daughter of William Story and Sarah Foster, and niece of Francis Peabody. Richard and Sarah settled on a farm in the Argilla, or Chebacco area of Ipswich about 2 miles southeast of the present day city. It was known as "Walker's Island". The Story and Coburn families lived in the same area. Sarah's grandfather, Reginold Foster, was a prominent man in early Ipswich history.

Richard Walker repeatedly added land to his holdings and also sold some. In 1688 he and 36 others bought a 6 mile long, 4 mile wide tract called "Coxhall" near present day Lyman, Maine. He sold his share in 1693 but retained land he bought at Mousam Falls, ME. A record shows that he insisted on a turf and twig delivery of his purchase, and he travelled to Maine with a companion to get it. Richard was a tithingman several times and signed a petition of 72 persons asking the King not to resent their former proceedings and declaring their loyalty.

At Ipswich court in 1676 he presented a woman "for her strong fashion" for wearing a silk hood and scarf, and she was fined. When he was an old man in 1712, he and his son John signed a petition relative to removal of the Ipswich meeting house so it would not obstruct the view from Increase How's hotel windows.

Richard left a will recorded when he was 83 showing his children in 1720:

Hannah, born 10 Sept. 1663, died young.

John, born ca 1665, died 1723. Married Lydia Coburn ca 1685.

Sarah, born 29 Nov. 1666, never married.

Richard, born 6 Feb. 1674, died ca 1708, married Elizabeth.

Ruth, born ca 1677.

Joseph, born 29 Dec. 1679, died 10 Feb. 1739, married 1724 Martha Greenough.

Richard Walker, the immigrant, came to Salem, Massachusetts in 1629 with Governor Endicott and was probably from Wimbledon, County Surrey, now a suburb of London, England. It is believed his father was the Richard Walker of the London Artillery Company in 1622. In 1638 Richard was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston. Testifying in court in later years, Richard said he was 18 years old when he came, making him born in 1611. For the rest of his life he was an active member of the Colony as a trader, businessman, Indian fighter, farmer, diplomat and deputy governor of Acadia. He left his home when Charles I was oppressing the Puritans and found great opportunities in the new world.

In Salem he acquired 51 acres of land, but left after one year with settlers who explored five miles westward and founded Saugus (present day Lynn). The farm lot he chose was on "Walker's Plain", as it came to be known, on the west bank of the Saugus River and near where the Lynn Iron Works were established. In 1635 he returned to England for a visit. When he returned he built a 2 story house, with one story in the rear, on the banks of Saugus River.

In Lynn he married Jane Talmadge about 1636 whom he may have known in England, and two sons were born. Jane was the daughter of Thomas Talmadge, Sr., who was a business associate and neighbor of Richard at Lynn. Jane died about 1639, and soon after Richard married Sarah, possibly a sister of Jane.

In 1644 Richard became a first settler at Lynn Village, later Reading, and now called Wakefield, where he lived until 1666. He was elected repeatedly as selectman for both Lynn and Reading and served as deputy, or representative, to the General Court at Boston from one town or the other. As an experienced surveyor he ran farm lands, established town boundaries and located "highways". On his farm he no doubt, raised corn, pumpkins and other vegetables, and barley for malt. Fish and clams were abundant. Cows, goats and pigs were pastured on the common grounds. Settlers cut their wood in common, allowing 20 cords to each householder and 30 to the minister. They drew lots for grass in the meadows and marshes. There were no schools yet, but the minister provided the instructions.

Fishing was a big industry in the Bay Colony, and Richard Walker became involved early in a "fishing and planting" station like the ones already established at Cape Ann and on the Piscataqua River by Edward and William Hilton. (Note: William Hilton, an early ancestor through Olive Lord Walker's line). The Lynn records of January, 1635, say: "It is also voted by the freemen of the towne that these men underwritten shall have liberty to plant and build at Nahant and shall possess, each man for the said purpose and proceeding in the trade of fishing. Mr. (John) Humphreys, Daniel Now, Mr. (William) Ballard, Joseph Rednam, Timothy Tomlins, Richard Walker, Thomas Talmadge (Sr.), Henry Feakes, Frances Dent."

In 1635 when Richard made a journey to England he was listed on a ship passenger list in London as one of those licenced "to go beyond the seas". He was required to take the Oath of allegiance and gave his age as 24. The trip was probably made to buy fishing equipment or arrange for a market for it. The fishing trade at Nahant did not prosper very long, and it was given up.

The Lynn Iron works were set up in 1644 adjacent to Walker's Plain, and in that year Richard moved to Reading. He asked for an abatement of taxes that year on his deserted Lynn farm and complained about "two or three hundred acres which were overrun with sorrel". He was no 33 years old, a lieutenant in the Lynn Train Band (town militia), and had served three terms in the General Court in Boston as Deputy from Lynn. At this time he had started his trading enterprise with Acadia owning an interest in one or more ships which sailed along the coast to Nova Scotia. Governor Endicott had made peace with d'Aulney, the commander of Acadia, but Massachusetts vessels continued to be seized. The General Court in 1645 appointed Lt. Richard Walker and two other men to negotiate with d'Aulney further, for which he was paid £ 4 for his "good service".

Richard acquired land in Lynn Village (Reading) before he moved there, and

located his house on the west side of Great Pond (now Lake Quannapowitt). Each new town was organized with a church and minister; a school, militia, and training field. Capt. Richard Walker headed the first militia company at Reading and was its first representative to the General Court. He had been active with preparations for the new village and was allotted 200 acres. In 1642 he was voted at the town meeting to have 27 acres of upland where the early Train Band paraded. He was also voted a parcel of swampy meadow by Great Pond, and later 10 acres of upland on the north side of his tract. He moved in his house in 1644, already having married a second time to Sarah, possibly Talmadge. To Sarah and Richard were born 3 sons and 2 daughters.

Early Puritan records show that Richard Walker made many surveys. In Reading he was on a committee for the division of lands there. In 1651 he was one of a committee to "lay out land in the county of Lynn", and he arbitrated land disputes all his life, some ordered by the General Court. His brothers, Samuel and William, did the same. (Note: Samuel is also an ancestor through Olive Jane Walker's line.) He bought and sold several tracts of land and was in several drawings to receive land from the town. In 1658 his holdings made him one of the largest tax payers in the town.

When he moved to Boston in 1666 he and Sarah divided their land among their 3 sons of the second marriage, one of whom, Nathaniel, had moved to Virginia. The two older sons, Richard Jr. of Ipswich and John of Charleston, and the daughters were not mentioned in his will. His house was bought in the North end of Boston, and sold in 1679 to his son's widow, Sarah Haugh. At Boston he became a member of the Old North Church and was a member of the board of trustees in 1671 to purchase land for the church. From all indications he was tolerant in religious matters. His son, Nathaniel, married the daughter of Mary Dyer, the Quaker martyr of Boston Common. When Richard was a Deputy to the General Court, he was one of 5 persons who signed a petition dissenting on an order by the court to burn an English book. The book was "The Meritorious Price of our Redemption".

He returned to Lynn in 1677. During his stay in Boston he was active in the Acadia trade. Beaver skins were tender for gold and silver in many parts of the world, and muskrat, mink, badger and lynx were taken in trade for clothing and baubles. His business associate in Boston was Sir Thomas Temple who had been an intimate friend and supporter of Oliver Cromwell and was a leading man in the Mass. Bay Colony. He was one of 3 men holding a patent to the land of Acadia which included Penobscot, now eastern Maine to the east of that river. Sir Thomas was governor of that grant and ranked immediately after the Governor of Massachusetts. Cotton Mather called Sir Thomas "as fine a gentleman as ever set foot on the American strand?". Sir Thomas was also a friend of persecuted Quakers and Capt. Richard Walker was in accord with him. Thomas was proprietor and governor of Nova Scotia until Charles II chased him out and sold the land to France in 1670.

There was rivalry among the French factions for Nova Scotia, and warfare broke out for the command between La Tour and d'Aulney. La Tour appealed to friends in Boston, and the General Court sent four vessels and 80 men to join the attack against d'Aulney. There was a bloody skirmish at Castine in 1643 and in 1644 when La Tour was victorious, peace was made. However, d'Aulney continued to seize all vessels trading with La Tour, and Lt. Richard Walker was one of three men dispatched by Governor Endecott to investigate, as previously mentioned. They "skirted the grim coast" in clumsy sailing vessels and were successful in getting a settlement. D'Aulney was in authority, living in St. John, New Brunswick.

Soon after this Richard Walker was made a captain. He built up his shipping trade, his ships carrying trinkets and articles for the Indians between Boston and Nova Scotia safely until 1654 when eastern Maine and Nova Scotia were taken over by Cromwell forces. Sir Thomas Temple became Governor of the area in 1656 and Capt. Richard Walker was his principal assistant. Capt. Walker had a

term as deputy governor of Nova Scotia toward the end of Sir Thomas' term as governor. The English ordered the colonists to give up the eastern lands. Captain Richard took command of the forts of Pantagoet, now Castine; St. John, Port Royal, Le Have and Cape Sable immediately after his appointment, because Sir Thomas Temple was unwilling to execute the royal orders. Sir Thomas was deposed as governor by Charles II in 1665 and he returned to England where he died. In his last will he remembered Richard Walker who had relieved him of the painful duty of surrendering the eastern forts to the French. In the Mass. (other State Library is a copy of a volume published in 1755 in London with every page in English or French. The text chronicles the evacuation of the forts by the English as each was turned over from Capt. Richard Walker, Deputy Governor. When the next European ^{war} was declared in 1690, the irate colonists of Mass. Bay fitted out ships at their own expense and conquered everything between the St. Croix and Penobscot Rivers. By then, Capt. Richard Walker had died.

Captain Richard Walker continued to trade with Nova Scotia until his last days. He died 18 May 1687 in Lynn at age 76.

All the data concerning the life of William Walker's family furnished by William E. Connelly of Topeka, Kas.

In a series of letters to the Wyandotte Gazette in 1870, entitled the "Olden Time," Governor William Walker said that his father was captured when only a child, by the Delaware Indians and afterward sold to the Wyandot Indians, in Rockbridge County, Virginia, about 1774, or about the period of Dunmore's War. He was a son of Mr. Walker, who was one of the Walker family noted from Pennsylvania to Mississippi for brilliant and influential men. The Pennsylvanian named Walker, who was appointed Governor of Kansas Territory from Mississippi, was a relation of Governor Walker*.

The child captured in the Valley of Virginia by the Wyandots was brought to the Wyandot Nation where he grew up (see Letter No. 4 "Olden Time" above referred to). His name was William Walker. When he grew up he married Catharine Rankin, daughter

of James Rankin from Tyrone, Ireland. Rankin was a trader in Detroit where he married a Wyandot girl whose name was Mary Montour, and who belonged to the Big Turtle Clan of the Wyandots. Rankin was well to do and had his children carefully educated.

I have seen it stated that William Walker, Sr., and his wife were taken captive by the British and held as prisoners on board a British warship.

The subject of this brief sketch was born in 1765, in or near Greenbrier, some of his relatives say, Rockbridge County, Va. He was captured by a war party of the Delawares in the early part of the summer of 1781, being then eleven years of age. There was in the neighborhood a small stockade or temporary fort, to which the inhabitants fled for safety whenever an alarm was raised. The settlers, at the time this attack was made, were entirely off their guard; nothing calculated to excite their alarm had occurred for a long time, and all, old and young, male and female, were busily engaged in their fields. Young Walker and (I think) his uncle were ploughing corn, the former riding the horse and the other holding the plough. When coming out at the ends of the rows and in the act of turning, they were fired upon from behind the fence wounding the man in both arms. The lad sprang from the horse and both fled towards the fort. He was captured before getting out of the field and the wounded man overtaken and killed within a few yards of the fort. No attack was made on the fort, though there was only a few women and children in it. The invading party commenced a rapid retreat and after traveling four or five miles halted in a thick wood, from which a reconnoitering party returned to the invaded district. In the afternoon the party returned to the place of rendezvous laden with plunder and accompanied by another party of Delawares which the prisoner had not seen before, and to their mutual astonishment aunt and nephew met. Mrs. Cowen was captured in another part of the neighborhood by this second party. This was a distinct party, though they moved and traveled together. These two were the only prisoners they took. (No account is given of the ransom and return of Mrs. Cowen, although from what he says she was undoubtedly ransomed and returned.)

Then commenced the return march which was attended with much fatigue and suffering, and to add to their distress, notwithstanding the country abounded with game, yet the warriors were singularly unfortunate in their *bye hunts*. They traveled several days on a very

He might be excused, under the circumstances, for replying to this proposition in terms so harsh: "What do you want with a 'British Spy?' No, sir; No. I will not connect my fate with such an army." On arriving at headquarters Gen. Harrison ordered him on duty among the Ohio Indians.

But to return to the British headquarters. Failing to recapture the fugitive, his second son, Isaac, was arrested and confined in the same dungeon and there kept till Mrs. Walker appealed to Round Head, a gallant and generous Canadian Wyandott Chief, for his intervention in behalf of her son. He accordingly called (not upon Elliott & Co.) upon Gen. Proctor, and claiming the prisoner as one of his people, and insisted upon his release and restoration to his family who, in their distressed circumstances, needed his services. He was accordingly discharged.

THE MONTOURS.

About the year 1667 a French gentleman named Montour settled in Canada. By a Huron Indian woman he had three children, one son and two daughters. The son, Montour, lived with the Indians and was wounded in the French service in 1694. He deserted from the French and lived with "the farr Indians"—the Twightwees (Miamis) and Diondadies (Petuns or Wyandots). By his assistance Lord Cornbury prevailed on some of these tribes to trade with the people of Albany in 1708. For his endeavors to alienate the "upper nations" from the French he was killed in 1709 by the troops under Lieut. le Sieur de Joncaire, by orders of the Marquis de Vaudreuil, Governor of Canada, who wrote that he would have him hanged had it been possible to capture him alive. Of the two daughters of the Frenchman, Montour, one became conspicuously known as Madame Montour. She was born in Canada about 1684, captured by some warriors of the Five Nations when ten years old, taken to their country and raised by them. It is probable she lived with the Oneidas, as on arriving at maturity she married Carondawana, or the "Big Tree," otherwise Robert Hunter, a famous war chief of that nation. He was killed in the wars between the Iroquois and Catawbas, in the Carolinas about 1729. Madame Montour first appeared

as interpreter at a conference held at Albany in August, 1711, between the sachems of the Five Nations and Robert Hunter, the royal governor of New York from 1709 to 1719. The influence of Madame Montour among the Indians was so great and adverse to the French that the Governor of Canada repeatedly endeavored to persuade her to withdraw from the English and remove to his dominion, offering great compensation as an inducement, but without success until in 1719. Apprehensive of her doing so to the injury of the province to which she had been so serviceable, the Commissioner of Indian Affairs sent for her to Albany, when it appeared she had received no pay for twelve months. The Commissioner promised that she should receive "a man's pay from the proper officer of the Four Independent Companies posted in the Province," and the business was thus satisfactorily ended.

Madame Montour was present at Philadelphia in July, 1737, as interpreter at a conference held by Governor Gordon with several chiefs of the Five Nations. Again in October, 1728, her husband, Carondawana, otherwise Robert Hunter, was there also. She retained her father's name after marriage, and was usually mentioned as "Mrs. Montour, a French woman, wife to Carondawana, or Robert Hunter." Her sister was married to one of the Miamis. Her residence in 1734 was at the village on the Susquehanna, at the mouth of the Loyalsock Creek, on the west side, where Montourville, Lycoming County, Pa., now stands. It was known as Otsuago, Ots-on-wacken, or French Town. She was here visited by Conrad Weiser, Indian agent and interpreter, who he states is a "French woman by birth, of a good family, but now in mode of life a complete Indian." In the fall of 1742 Count Zinzendorf, the Bishop and head of the Moravian Church, visited this village. He preached there in French to large gatherings. Madame Montour was deeply affected when she saw Zinzendorf and learned the object of his visit. She had entirely forgotten the truths of the gospel, and in common with the French Indians, believed the story originated with the Jesuits, that the Savior's birthplace was France, and His crucifiers Englishmen. In June and July, 1744, the great treaty between the Six Nations and the provinces of Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia was held at Lancaster. Madame Montour was present with her two daughters. Witham Marshe, Secretary of the Maryland Commissioners, relates in his journal that he visited her cabin and obtained the particulars of her life. She told him that she had several children by the famous

war captain. He described her as genteel, of polite address and had been handsome. Her two sons-in-law and only son were away to war with the Catawbas. Moravian missionaries on their way to Onondago, stopped at Shamokin (now Sunbury) on the Susquehanna. They visited Madame Montour who was living on the island with one of her daughters. She had left Ozenwacken permanently. There is no further account of Madame Montour. It seems that she was not living in 1754. Of her children but three can be identified, one of the two daughters who was with her at the treaty of Lancaster in 1744, and two sons, Andrew, alias Henry, and Louis. Her daughter, known as "French Margaret," was wife to Keterioncha, alias Peter Quebec, and lived near Shamokin in 1731. Another of her daughters was a convert of the Moravian Mission at New Salem, Ohio, April 14, 1791. She was a living polygot of the tongues of the west, speaking English, French and six Indian languages.

Madame Montour could not have been less than sixty years old at the time of the treaty of Lancaster in 1744, and was probably older, and if but ten years of age when captured, as she said, the year of her captivity was 1694 and her birth 1684. Of the many errors respecting this noted woman, the most prominent are, first, that she was a daughter of a former governor of Canada. Second, that she was living at the time of the American Revolution, and also confounding her with her granddaughter, Catherine of Catherine's Town, near the head of Seneca Lake, New York, destroyed by the army under General Sullivan in 1779. She is not mentioned in any work of original authority as Catherine, but invariably as Mrs. or "Madame Montour." Highly colored accounts have been given respecting her relations with the ladies of Philadelphia, who evidently, owing to her intelligence and previous history, treated her with considerate kindness. From the authorities of the provinces she received such presents and compensation for services as were usually given to prominent Indian visitors. Those who knew her best, related that she was habited and lived like the Indians. Her French blood doubtless imparted a vivacity of manner to her, the like of which is observed at this day among the people of mixed French and Indian ancestry in Canada and along our northern frontier.

Condensed account from "The Journals of Christopher Gist," by William M. Darlington, Pittsburg, Pa., 1894.

"SOUTH WYANDOTT, Dec. 10, '73.

Dear Henry:

On the evening of the 6th I wrote you a short letter immediately after our adjournment, in the morning, intending to take it to the postoffice, it had mysteriously disappeared. Possibly a rat or mouse might have carried it off as building material for his winter's quarters. This proved to be an unusually short session, though there was considerable amount of business disposed of in that short time. The Committees worked late and early.

After the receipt of the President's message and other dispatches from Washington there appeared to be a determination among the leading members, and our Committee fell into the same current, that is, of not acting on or adopting an organic law, or constitution this session, but await the action of this new Congress. In conformity with this view our Committee on International Affairs reported resolutions accordingly, and recommended the appointment of an able delegation to be composed of members of that body to visit Washington and watch the action of Congress and report from time to time, and act as sentinels ready to raise the alarm.

There is a determined resolution manifested to resist any attempt to force a government by Congress upon them—deeming themselves amply capable of instituting their own government.

I reached Okmulgee on Sunday night, just as I desired; met my colleague and our Hackman Robinson waiting for us at Muscogee on the R. R. as agreed upon last spring. Everything worked like a charm. Monday morning upon looking round found an unusually large number of delegates on the ground. At ten o'clock no Hoag, our presiding officer; no Grayson, our sec'y; but we assembled, elected a president and sec'y and proceeded to business, and worked for two days before the arrival of our officers.

On Saturday the 6th at one o'clock we adjourned to meet on the first Monday in May, '74.

The Council was composed of a heterogeneous mass of humanity. From the polished well educated gentleman, down through various gradations to the red blanket buckskin painted native Indian, stalking about in all the majesty and dignity of paint and feathers.

The following tribes were represented: Cherokees, Creeks, Choctaws, Chickasaws, Seminoles, Cadd Waccos, Keechis, Uchees, Wattoes, Osages, Commichs, Quapaws, Ottowas, Senecas, Peorias,

LETTER No. 4, BY GOV. WILLIAM WALKER.

Taken from The Wyandotte Gazette.]

In these sketches I do not draw much from the current histories of the day, but give as far as I can the Indian version—the statements of the actors themselves in the stirring times of the last century, as far as can be obtained. In consulting history it is chiefly for the purpose of getting at dates, in order to place the events I am *trifly* narrating in chronological order. My means of acquiring information on these topics in early life were ample. I was old enough to hear, understand, to be interested in, and treasure up the narratives of the old men who survived their cotemporaries, and who acted conspicuous parts in that exciting period. My father was an officer of the Indian Department from 1805 up to 1822. To show the advantages I had, you and your readers must bear the infliction of a short episode, risking the imputation of egotism. He was captured in Western Virginia, in what is now known as Rockbridge County, about the time of Dunmore's war, by the Delawares, when about twelve years old. He was brought to the towns on the Muskingum; from thence taken to a village on the Whetstone River, now known as

the flourishing town of Delaware, where he underwent the customary order of running the gauntlet; after which he received the rite of adoption, according to their custom. He acquired their language and spoke it correctly and fluently.

My mother was the daughter of an Irish gentleman who had been connected with the Hudson Bay Company, and was engaged in the Indian trade in Detroit, where he married a Wyandotte woman of the royal house of Towara. They were married by a French Catholic priest. A Protestant clergyman at that period was a *rara avis* in that region. At a suitable age my mother was sent to Pittsburg to be educated. Some three or four years thereafter her father died, when she returned to her people in Michigan and western Canada. Sometime, perhaps a year after her return, she and my father were married. Finding her husband so illiterate, for he had lost what little knowledge he previously had of letters, turned her attention to his education, in which she succeeded to admiration. She was an accomplished woman for the times. Besides English and Wyandotte, she spoke French with ease and grace, Shawnee, Ottawa, Chippewa and Pottawatomie.

And now, whatever supercilious, *mutton-headed*, aristocratic people may sneeringly say of my descent, I here affirm that in my veins and those of my family courses as pure blood as ever ran through mortal man since Adam's fall. So much for my means of information. But to the treaty:

The negotiation was protracted and tedious. The three opposition tribes raised objections to immediate action on account of the absence of the Miamis and Shawnees, when there was not the remotest possibility of their attending. The Iroquois, notwithstanding that they had no further official business, still remained watching the progress of the negotiation with the other party. Joseph Brant, the celebrated Mohawk warrior, being one of the Iroquois delegates, professing to be warmly in favor of a general restoration of peace, with characteristic duplicity and true to his instincts, now secretly played the part of a British emissary. In their separate councils Brant worked insidiously to embarrass the negotiation by impracticable propositions and suggestions, urging upon them to make the Ohio River boundary their *ultimatum*. His officious interference had but little weight, as his object was too transparent to deceive. The young chief, Walk-in-the-Water, informed his friend Gen. Butler of Brant's machinations, and the General in turn informed the Governor. On

the reassembling of the general council, Brant being present, the Governor availed himself of the opportunity of administering a suitable rebuke to the crafty Mohawk. I regret that I cannot give the Governor's castigation, though I heard it once recited. One portion I do remember.

"A brave warrior I can admire though opposed to me in war, because he is supposed to be a high-minded and honorable man; but a warrior who can head, and carry on a barbarous war with the New Testament in one hand and the scalping knife in the other, I look upon with utter contempt."

This was most galling to the pride of the haughty Mohawk. In my first number I stated that *Port Harman* was the place designated for holding the treaty. In this I was in error. Duncan's Falls was the place designated. At this place, previous to Dunmore's war, there were large settlements of Delawares, Shawnees and some Wyandottes. Here provisions, goods and other supplies were stored under a strong guard of soldiers. Meantime a roving band of vagabond Chippewas which had been lurking about the neighborhood, tempted by a prospect of booty, made a night attack upon the depot. The freebooters, however, were repulsed, but with what loss was unknown from the extreme darkness of the night. This attack upon the depot determined the Governor to change the treaty ground to Fort Harman for greater security.

As previously stated, there were dissensions among the confederates in their separate councils. Disputes arose frequently, often marked with considerable heat and effervescence. On one occasion, Wau-ba-gin-quas, a Chippewa chief, somewhat wanting in good Indian breeding, though "as mild mannered man as ever scuttled ship or cut a throat," in the course of his remarks had the boldness to hint in terms not to be misunderstood, that the advocates of peace measures were influenced by fear and imbecility. This brought Round-Head, a Wyandott war chief, to his feet, who is reported to have replied substantially as follows:

"My brother Wau-ba-gin-quas is wrong in what he says. It is not fear that prompts us to advocate a treaty of peace and a settlement of the matters in dispute between us and the Big Knives. This my brother Chippewa well knows too. We and our nephews, the Delawares, know how to fight and gain victories over our enemies. When pressing the enemy back we don't lean our guns against trees, turn to plundering and stripping the dead as my brother and his warriors

do on the battle field. We war not for plunder, but for a higher and nobler purpose. And now I say to my brother Chippewa, if he unfortunately should succeed in defeating this treaty, and the war renewed, the next battle we have and my brother is brave enough to be there, I shall *watch him*, and if I see him retreating or lean his gun against a tree to engage in plundering, I will send a swift messenger (tossing a bullet in his hand) to recall him to his duty."

The Chippewas at length *caved in*, followed by the Ottawas and Pottowatomies. *The finale* was, the treaty was concluded and signed, reaffirming the validity of the Fort McIntosh treaty. Boundaries were adjusted and defined; regulations of trade and intercourse with the Indians were agreed upon. Adjourned. In two days time not an Indian was to be seen in the Muskingum valley.

SKETCH OF THE LIFE AND DEATH OF CATHERINE WALKER.

From Western Christian Advocate, Jan. 31, 1845.]

(Clipping preserved in Draper Mss. Collection Frontier Wars, Vol. II.)

Catherine Walker was born in Sandwich, Upper Canada, June 10, 1771. Her father, a native of Ireland, emigrated to this country prior to the Revolution and engaged in the Indian trade near Detroit. Here he became connected by marriage with Yau-a-tua-rant, a daughter of a distinguished Wyandot of the Turtle tribe. He soon afterwards settled in the mercantile business in Sandwich where he remained until about 1781, when he was appointed commissioner on the part of the general government and sent out to settle terms of peace with the different nations scattered along the western frontier. He was very successful in this employment which he continued until his death which occurred at Huntingdon, Pa., in the spring of 1803. While he was thus employed, Catherine, her mother and other members of the family, removed to Brownstown, an Indian village, near the mouth of the Detroit River, on the American side, at that time the seat of government of the Wyandot nation. Here she was married to William Walker, a native of Virginia, a man of extraordinary physical and mental endowments. From the time he became con-

netted with the Wyandots he studiously sought to promote their well being and happiness, and was much attached to the American government. He espoused the American cause and entered the war of 1812. He was interpreter for Gen. Hull at Fort Detroit, and was among those brave, but unfortunate spirits, who, owing to the cowardice of their commander-in-chief, were surrendered prisoners of war into the hands of their enemies. But fortunately for the American cause he escaped from the block house in which he was placed. He immediately started for Chillicothe, where Harrison's main army was then quartered, but was captured on the way and again made a prisoner by Gen. Winchester, an American officer, and confined as a spy until liberated by Gen. Harrison, and ordered to the post of Upper Sandusky. During the protracted absence of her husband, his wife was left with the sole care of a large family which she was obliged to remove from place to place, in order to secure their lives and property. She removed to Sandusky and joined her husband in the month of January, 1814. Here she was permitted to spend the remainder of her days in peace, where she was surrounded by almost everything that wealth and personal influence could obtain, yet she was unhappy. To use her own words, "I saw the insufficiency of our religion. It was not calculated to make us happy in life, and I began to fear it would do us no good in eternity." She therefore attended a campmeeting where she became convinced that the religion of the Bible was true, and ere the meeting closed, through faith in Jesus Christ she was enabled to go on her way rejoicing. In the following year she became connected with the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which she continued a most worthy and exemplary member until removed from the Church militant to join the Church triumphant. She passed away at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Garrett, on the evening of December 6, 1844. Her remains were laid in the Walker burying place on the west bank of the Sandusky River, and a few rods south of the old town of Upper Sandusky.

1. SAMUEL¹ WALKER died in Woburn, Nov. 6, 1684. He was aged 44, or thereabouts, in 1661, as per affidavit of himself and his son Samuel² Walker, made April 2, 1661.* He was first mentioned in a Woburn tax list in 1655, and held various town offices. In the Middlesex Co. Court Files is the following petition relating to his business:—

“To the honoured Magistrates assembled at y^e County Court houlden at Cambridge

The petition of Samuel Walker of y^e Town of Wooburn Humbles Sheweth That whereas y^e petitioner not longe since by advise of his friends did set upon the trade of stilling strong waters, and for y^e end by reason of his wife's weaknes, purchased a place near y^e meeting House where in buildinge, and other Vtinsels for y^e work, he hath expended about Two hundred pounds w^{ch} would be of little use unto him should he not goe on with y^e Trade and more eSpeciallie seeing y^e petition: is resolved through Gods assistance to prevent as much as in him lies the too frequent abuse thereof, nor shall he be wantinge to obserue y^e bounds and rules for; should you be pleased to grant him license for the retailinge of Liquors.

The premises considered we whos names are underwritten, humbles request this honoured Court that they would be pleased to grant y^e petitioner license not onlie to still, But alse to sell stronge water by y^e quart so long as he shall observe ye wholsam laws and rules y^e the Supreme power, and this Court Shall set for p^{re}venting y^e abuse thereof That so we may not be driven to goe to more remote Towns for a supply of our necessitie hearin, when we maie (if you shall be pleased to grant y^e request) haue Supply at home.” The following citizens of Woburn signed this petition: John Knight, John Wyman, John Mousall, Jr., John Cutler, Michael Lepingwell, Joseph Wright, Francis Kendall, Jonathan Thompson, John Wilson, Joseph Carter, Robert Peirce, Isaac Cole, John Carter, James Converse, Thomas Fuller, Henry Brooks, William Johnson, Matthew Johnson, Francis Wyman, William Simonds, William Locke, Samuel Blodgett, George Reed, William Clark, George Bruce, John Farrar, Edward Johnson, John Wright, Edward Converse, John Mousall, Sr., James Thompson, Thomas Peirce, John Rue-

sell, Edward Winn, Bartholomew Pearson, Allen Converse, John Wright, John Tidd, Moses Cleaveland, Matthew Smith, Philip Knight, Joseph Knight.

The answer to this petition is found in the records of the County Court, the petition being granted in April, 1662. Henry Summers succeeded him as innkeeper in Woburn, in 1682.

Samuel Walker was for a time a resident of Reading, and all of his children by his first wife were born there. The Reading church records state that, at some time after March 26, 1650, he was admitted to the fellowship of the church, and his wife with him. His connection with Reading ceases in 1654.*

Beyond the above particulars we know nothing of his first wife, but in a deed dated April 8, 1678 (and unrecorded), he says at the close, "I, the abovenamed Sam^l Walker, have hereunto put my hand and seal . . . also Ann Walker, in her acknowledgment of her consent to this deed, hath put to her hand and seal."†

Ann Walker, the above, was his second wife. She was the widow of Arthur Alger of Scarborough, and daughter of Giles Roberts, also of that place. She died in Woburn, Mar. 21, 1716.‡

This Ann Walker was the widow alluded to in the third volume of Woburn town records, as teaching school in that town: "The Widow Walker is appointed to be a school dame for the year 1686, and to have ten shillings for her labor as the other had."

After Samuel Walker's death, his sons Samuel, of Woburn, and Joseph, of Billerica, were appointed administrators of his estate.
