FOREWORD

Franklin Ware, in his "Genealogy of the Descendants of Joseph Ware, Immigrant, 1675" says:—"The family of Wares living in Camden are not descendants of Joseph Ware, the immigrant, 1675, as has been generally supposed, but of Jacob Ware, born in England in 1674. He was an army captain under Queen Anne. Among his descendants was the Rev. Thomas Ware, formerly well known in Salem and Cumberland Counties, and the dates and facts given in this paragraph are from 'The Life of Rev. Thomas Ware,' written by himself and published in 1831." From this latter book comes the largest share of our information concerning Capt. Jacob Ware.

1. Captain Jacob Ware, the immigrant ancestor, was born in England about 1674 and died in Greenwich, New Jersey, 1775 being one of the town's first settlers; he was captain in the British Army during the reign of Queen Anne, 1702-1714, coming to New Jersey prior to 1723. The first authentic mention of him, is as one of the executors of the will of Thomas Field of Manington Precinct, Salem County, N. J., April 3, 1723; Cushing & Sheppard's history states he was licensed to keep a tavern at Greenwich in 1728, 1729, 1741 and '42. His grandson, Rev. Thomas Ware, in his autobiography writes of Captain Ware:—"I remember him well, as he lived until I was sixteen years old. His personal appearance was fine and his mind wonderful. He had high notions of liberty, and was the first man I ever heard eulogize the Indian character. When this venerable man came to visit us we were always delighted, and vied with each other in our efforts to please him. His company was interesting. He lived to the great age of more than five score years."

He married, after coming to Greenwich, N. J., Priscilla — by whom he had six

2. Thomas Ware, (*Capt. Jacob 1.*) was born, Greenwich, N. J., 1731; died, Stoe Creek, N. J., May 5, 1769.* His will states he was a cordwainer, and directs his executors to sell the house and plantation where he then lived and which he bought of Leonard Gibbon; he also gives to his wife Margaret, the use of the house and lot where Isaac Sutton then lived, during her life, and he gives to his son Thomas (afterward Rev. Thomas Ware) the house and lot where his father, Jacob Ware, then lived, and after the decease of his father and his wife to son Thomas absolutely. He also mentions his sons Jacob, Isaac and Enoch and his daughters, Priscilla, Amme, Hannah and Lydia. Thomas and Samuel Ewing were joint executors. Will was dated *May 24*, 1769; Inventory, June 15, 1769. New Jersey Wills, Lib. 14, pp. 117.

He married, Jan. 14, 1750 (Greenwich Presbyterian Church records) Margaret Reed.

4. Thomas Ware 3, Rev., (*Thomas 2, Capt. Jacob 1*.) was born
Greenwich, N. J., Dec. 19, 1758, and died at Salem, N. J.,
March 11, 1852. His great grandson, Thomas Ware
Maires of Brooklyn, N. Y., states he was quite a promi-
nent citizen of Salem and quite a famous organizer and
preacher in the Methodist denomination, and a monu-
ment erected in his memory will be found in the church-

yard of the old Methodist Episcopal Church at Salem. In the history of his life which he published in 1831, Rev. Thomas Ware refers to the fact that he attended the old Greenwich Presbyterian Church of which his family were members.

The late Lemuel Swain Ware [23] has written:—"My father, John Wesley Ware, repeatedly stated that Uncle Tommy Ware, as he called him, was a Methodist minister, who itinerated in New Jersey, Delaware, and the Eastern Shore of Maryland. I remember seeing among my father's books a copy of the little book "The Life of Rev. Thomas Ware."

He was a chaplain in the Revolutionary Army.

He married Barbara Miller at Strasburg, Lancaster Co., Pa., on Oct. 15, 1797 and had four children:—

5. Asbury Ware 4, (*Jacob 3, Thomas 2, Capt Jacob 1*) was born Jan. 31, 1791, died Sept. 15, 1831, buried Roadstown, N. J., Baptist Cemetery. He owned a farm of 50 acres in Stoe Creek joining the old Wood farm. The house stood south of the gate and driveway of the old George Wood Sheppard home on the main road and it was in this house that all of his children were born. He married, 1816, Sylvia Stathem, born 1796, died July 9, 1848, buried in Roadstown, N. J., Baptist Cemetery; daughter of Isaac and Elizabeth Stathem of Stathem's Neck and descended from Thomas Stathem and Ruth Udell who were married, 1671, in New England. After the death of Asbury Ware his widow married, as his second wife, Ephraim Sayre, Sr. The Ware children, as they grew up, went to the city of Camden to live and became "the Camden Wares."

7. Isaac Stathem Ware 5, (*Asbury 4, Jacob 3, Thomas 2, Capt. Jacob 1.*) born Oct. 31, 1817, died Dec. 4, 1894. He bought, for \$900., his brothers' and sisters' shares in his father's home farm, and in this house his first five children were born. My father, William Brantley Ware, was his third child. Grandfather sold this farm in 1851 for \$1700. and five years later bought Long Point farm in Stoe Creek, which he bought for \$3200. and eleven years later sold it for \$8000. and he moved to Bridgeton for a short time. Subsequently he bought the right for Camden Co. to a patent Lime Bin, and moved to the city of Camden, N. J., where he lived until his death. He is buried in the Roadstown, N. J., Baptist Cemetery.

He married (1), March 2, 1842, Sarah Boone Bacon, born Mar. 10, 1817, died Dec. 9, 1850, daughter of Daniel and Ann (Schintz) Bacon of Stoe Creek, Cumberland Co., N. J., and a lineal descendant of Samuel and Martha (Foxwell) Bacon who were married in New England in 1659 and settled Bacon's Neck 1682; they bought land from the Indians and John and Elizabeth Adams and called it "Bacon's Adventure." This family was killed in an automobile accident near Egg Harbor City, N. J., and was buried from the Deerfield Methodist Church. Rev. Howard Clark of the Deerfield Presbyterian Church, of which Mr. Ware was a member, conducted the services at 2 o'clock April 7. The four bodies lay in state about the pupit platform. Other ministers taking part were Rev. Waldo E. Bump, Rev. H. S. Crammer, Rev. J. W. Bradway. More than one thousand people were at the funeral. The interment was in Overlook Cemetery, Bridgeton, N. J.
