In 1811 he removed to Montgomery County, Ohio, where his son John had settled in 1808. The will of Henry Warner is dated Sept. 25, 1815 and recorded Jan. 1, 1816. THE CONNECTICUT ANCESTRY OF THE WARNER-SPENCER FAMILIES OF VILLENOVA By Ruth G. Pickard, CALS

It is a truism of American genealogy that information on a given family can often be found by searching among their kith and kin, those who lived nearby and those with whom they travelled westward. It is also true that in order to solve a genealogical problem in one line, it is frequently necessary to research a number of collateral lines. In the geometry of genealogy, the shortest distance between two points may not be a straight line. The Warners of Villenova provide a case in point.

In the 1820s and '30s, this family—along with the Spencers and their spouses and in-laws, the Riders and their relatives the Smiths, formed the nucleus of a sizable group of related people who moved from the area in and around Litchfield, Herkimer County, to Villenova and Arkwright in Chautauqua County. Their decision was probably, in part at least, a response to the agressive marketing of the Holland Land Company and the positive and optimisic letters sent back by those who had gone on before.

The measure of success of the Holland Land Company in attracting settlers to the Arkwright-Villenova area can be seen in the Beers Co. Atlas of 1868. Driving along Rte. 83 in Chautauqua County today, it is difficult to imagine in that sparsely populated area the thriving agrarian community that existed there in the mid-nineteenth century.

One of these pioneer settlers of Villenova was Nathaniel Warner, Jr., a veteran of the American Revolution, who removed from Litchfield and settled on Lot 35 at Villenova which he had purchased in 1820 and where he remained until his death.

A native of Connecticut, Nathaniel Warner was born 4
July 1767 at E. Haddam [Revolutionary War Pension Application of Nathaniel Warner, S23990, Conn.] and died at Villenova
16 Apr 1847 [GS]. His wife was Lucinda Avery, b. Nov 1771
at Stonington, CT [A.W. Young, History of Chautauqua County,
N. Y. (Buffalo, 1875), p. 908. Hereafter Hist.]; d. 15 Dec 1845,
ae 75 yrs [GS]. Both are buried in Hamlet Cemetery in Villenova.

Hereafter CC&T]; m. 6 Feb 1821, Rebecca Nunn, b. 13 Apr 1799, reportedly at Stonington, CT [Hist, 908]. Her birth is not recorded in the ViR of Stonington. Obadiah served in the War of 1812, and Rebecca drew a widow's pension [Obituary, Fredonia Censor, 17 Feb 1892. Hereafter FC]. She and Lura Nunn, wife of Nathaniel Warner III, may have been the daughters of Samuel Nunn, an early settler of Litchfield, NY. Ten children: Harriet, George, Mariett, Charles O., Jerome, Lucinda, Samuel N., Lura A., Polly and Polly A. [Hist, 908].

- iv. Diadema [Hist. 908], m. Daniel Steward/Stewart and died in Iowa where she lived with her daughter Sarah Stewart Putnam.*
- v. Nathaniel III, b. 28 Apr 1801, prob Litchfield, NY; d. 2 Jul 1874 [GS]; m. 15 Jun 1824, Lura Nunn [Hist 908-9] (called "Lena" in the FC obit of 14 Jun 1893), [A.L. Wiatr, The Long Grapevine I, (Mt Clemens, MI, 1977), p. 2. Hereafter Grapevine]. Lura b. 23 Jan 1801, d. 6 Jun 1893 [GS], both bur Hamlet Cem., [Arthur L.D. Warner, Warner Cemetery Records, Hamlet Cem, read 1 Jun 1946 (Lura called "Luna")]. Children: Josiah, Augusta Reuben, Rebecca, Judah, Jenette, Enos and Russell [A.L. Wiatr, Grapevine 1:2]
- vi. Jeremiah, b. 28 Oct 1804 [GS], prob. Litchfield; d. 29 Aug 1873; m.(1) Eliza Dean Barmore* (2) Chloe A. [Patterson*], b. 24 Sep 1808; d. 21 Jun 1885 [GS; Hist, 908] both bur Hamlet Cem.
- vii. Abigail [Hist 908], b 1806 d. 2 May 1870; m. Azor Barnum, bur. Hamlet Cem.*
- viii. Lucinda [Hist 908], m. 25 Dec 1827, prob. Villenova, John Steward.*
- ix. Reuben b. 15 Jun 1813; d. Jamestown, 13 Apr 1887 [GS] at the home of his son A(zor) F. Warner [FC 20 Apr 1887]; m. Civilla Ann [Fish*]. b. 20 Jul 1814, d. 29 May 1845, both bur Hamlet Cem [GS, Hist 908].

The affidavit of Nathaniel Warner contained in his Revolutionary War pension papers states that he enlisted in the Continental Line at East Haddam in Jan 1781 and served primarily at West Point, NY until Sep 1783. At the time of his enlistment he was thirteen and a half years old!

Included in his pension application is the affadavit of Lucy Waters of Villenova who on 18 Aug 1832 attested that she had known Nathaniel Warner since his infancy. However, she did not specify what her relationship to him (if any) might have been. The widow of Henry Waters, Lucy died at Villenova 7 May 1844, ac 79 years and is buried in Hamlet Cemetery [CC&T 91:39].

On 18 Mar 1816 at Litchfield, Henry Waters was named as one of the agents to whom Anna Warner's brother-in-law William Hadley was to make payment on a deed-lease agreement between himself and said Anna for land in Lot 35 of Bayard's Patent which Anna had inherited under the will of her father John Warner 2d — of whom more shortly.

According to L. C. Warner and Josephine Genung Nichols, Nathaniel's father, Nathaniel Sr., (also a Revolutionary War veteran) "...Becoming pecuniarily embarrassed...removed to New York State after the Revolution." [L. C. Warner and J. G. Nichols, Descendants of Andrew Warner, (New Haven, 1919), p. 63. Hereafter Warner Desc.].

It remained for Alice Long Wiatr of Mt. Clemens, MI to locate deeds in Herkimer Co., dated 1797, and signed by both father and son, which proved that the Nathaniel referred to in the Warner-Nichols Genealogy was indeed the father of Nathaniel, Jr. [Letter from Alice L. Wiatr to Ruth G. Pickard dated 11 Dec 1982]. This line has now been proved to the satisfaction of the



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National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, and both father and son appear in *DAR Patriot Index - Centennial Edition 1990*, III:3104 — though the surname of Nathaniel, Sr.'s wife **Abigail** has yet to be discovered.

Mrs. Wiatr lists the children of Nathaniel Warner Sr; Reuben, Abigail, Dorothy, Esther, Nathan(iel), Judah and Diadema. Nathaniel, Sr.'s birth on 25 Dec 1718, recorded at E. Haddam in the First Book of the Land Records, shows him to have been the child of John and Mchitabel Chapman Richardson Warner.

Among the numerous members of the extended Warner family referred to above who originated in Connecticut, settled at Litchfield early in the first decade of the nineteenth century, and later moved to Villenova were two of the daughters of another John Warner, also originally from E. Haddam. This John Warner is sometimes referred to in the town records as John Warner 2d to distinguish him from at least two other men of the same name who resided in the town. These daughters of John Warner 2d were Mehitabel and Sarah. Their husbands were brothers -- Reuben and Gideon, Jr., sons of Gideon Spencer, Sr., and Elizabeth Hurd Spencer, also of East Haddam. Mehitabel and Sarah were distantly related to Nathaniel Warner, Jr. through their paternal line, but for many years their maternal lineage remained a mystery. However, their appearance at the same times and places as Nathaniel, Jr. prompted the nagging question - why was it that his half second cousins one removed seemed to have such an affinity for their somewhat distant kinsman, Nathaniel?

The solution to this genealogical conundrum if pursued earlier would have solved a number of long-standing problems relating to this family, prime among them the identity of the wife of John Warner 2d.

The latter-day Rosetta Stone which unlocked the puzzle lay with Mehitabel Chapman Richardson — mentioned above — the wife of the first John Warner and Ur mother of this branch of the family. In addition to her Warner children, Mehitabel had a number of Richardson descendants — the progeny of her first family whose different surname doubtless discouraged Warner researchers from pursuing the line.

Mehitabel Chapman was born at Saybrook, CT 29 Sep 1688, daughter of Justice of the Peace, Capt. John Chapman and his first wife Elizabeth Beamon (ViR Saybrook). In a ceremony performed by her father, she married (1) at Stonington 15 Dec 1709 (based on the recorded birthdate of their first child, this date should perhaps be 1708) Lemuel Richardson by whom she had three children surnamed Richardson, b. Stonington and perhaps a fourth b. E. Haddam:

- Mehitabel, b. 13 Sep 1709 [ViR], bp. Stonington, 26 Mar 1710 [Ch Rec]; m. E. Haddam, 7 May 1730, Allen Willey [ViR].
- Samuel, bp. Stonington 27 May 1711 [Ch Rec; Will of Lemuel Richardson, 2 May 1713, proved 5 Oct 1713, abstracted in C. W. Manwaring, Digest of Early Connecticut Probate Records [I (Hartford 1904), p. 279]; m. Stonington, 30 Nov 1732, Sarah Stanton [ViR] and d. say 1755.
- Lemuel [Will of L. Richardson], d. 9 Mar 1722 [ViR I:580]

 Perhaps Stephen, b. 1713 prob E. Haddam, d.y., birth not recorded, not named in his father's will, perhaps posthumous child [Hanna D. P., Some Descendants of Amos Richardson of Stonington, Connecticut (Skowhegan, ME., 1971), p. 6.

After Lemucl Richardson's untimely death at E. Haddam on 24 May 1713 [ViR], his widow Mehitabel m. (2) in that town 21 Mar 1716 [ViR]—as his first wife—John Warner, son of Lieut. Daniel and Martha Boltwood Warner. John and Mehitabel were the parents of nine children, eight of whose births are recorded in the ViR of E. Haddam [Warner Desc 63] where the Town Clerk's waggish sense of humor prompted him to write following the record of their marriage and the birth of their first child, "Quick work."

It is to Mehitable's first family and particularly to her eldest daughter, Mehitabel Richardson, that we now turn. As noted before, Mehitabel Richardson became the wife of Allen Willey, son of John and Elizabeth Harvey Willey, b. 29 Sep 1700 at E. Haddam [ViR; Willey Desc 5,8]. The well-documented children of this couple are listed in Henry Willey's Isaac Willey, of New London, Conn. and His Descendants (1888). The Willeys' fourth child — named Mehitabel for her mother and grandmother was b. E. Haddam 29 Sep 1736 [ViR] and bp. at Hadlyme Parish 22 Dec 1745. She m., prob ca 1758, John Warner 2d, almost certainly the son of Ichabod Warner of Saybrook and Lydia Spencer Warner.

No birth record has been discovered for this John Warner, however, he and his brother Daniel were mentioned in the will (dated 6 Jun 1738, proved 17 Dec 1744) of their grandfather, Gerard Spencer, who d. at Haddam 24 Nov 1744. [D. L. Jacobus, "The Four Spencer Brothers," The American Genealogist 27:176].

John Warner 2d settled in Hadlyme, (an ecclesiastical not a political entity, straddling the line between E. Haddam and Lyme) where he operated a ferry across the Connecticut River just below the site of the present Haddam-E. Haddam bridge [E. Haddam Deeds].

On 16 Jan 1802 John Warner 2d and his wife Mehetable (sic) of E. Haddam appeared at Saybrook and for the consideration of \$605.00 sold their property "lying partly in East Haddam and partly in Lyme in Had Lyme Parish...near the place called Warner's Ferry." [EH Deeds 14:71]. Shortly afterward they removed to Litchfield, NY. A number — but not all — of their children accompanied them.

On 17 Sep 1810, John Warner of Litchfield executed a will which was proved 16 Mar 1813 before Surrogate Dan Chapman. The will makes no mention of John's wife Mehitabel. There is no record of the burial of either John or Mehitabel, and no tombstones have been located. All of John Warner's children were remembered in his will; however, only one grandchild—Halsey, the eldest son of his daughter Mehitabel— is mentioned. John directed that Halsey be made equal with his own children in the division of his estate. The Revolutionary pension papers of Mehitabel's husband, Reuben Spencer, provide a substantial clue to the reason for this bequest.

In the deposition of Mehitabel Warner Spencer dated 2 Oct 1838 before Benjamin Walworth at Chautauqua Co., NY [Rev War Pension File of Reuben Spencer, W17857 Conn.], she declares that she was married to Reuben Spencer on the 21st day of Nov 1792 at E. Haddam by the Rev. Simson (sic)[Simeon] Dickinson, a Baptist minister of that town, and as further proof of her marriage she refers to the annexed paper marked "A" in the handwriting of her late husband which she asserts was taken from the family Bible. This fragment submitted with the application papers appears to be the only portion of the Bible record that has survived. In addition to the marriage of Reuben and Mehitabel, the snippet includes the birth records of their two children: Reuben Warner Spencer, b. 1 Oct 1793, and John Spencer b. 14 Mar 1796 — both probably b. E. Haddam. Not mentioned is Mehitabel's "eldest son" Halsey Spencer [Will of John Warner, dated 17 Sep 1810 at Litchfield, NY, proved 16 Mar 1813 — Records of the Herkimer Co., NY Surrogate]. This omission, coupled with the date of the marriage and the date of Reuben Warner Spencer's birth, leads to the almost certain conclusion that Halsey was not Reuben's child, though he used the Spencer surname throughout his life. Reuben's first marriage to Elizabeth Cone is recorded in E. Haddam, but no previous marriage has been found for Mehitabel. That fact combined with the evidence cited above points to the possibility that Halsey's birth was not legitimate. A clue to his paternity may lie in his somewhat unusual first name indicating a possible link with the family of Jeremiah Halsey which for a time resided in E. Haddam and later moved to Preston, CT.

This discussion of Reuben and Mehitabel Warner Spencer would not be complete without noting a correction to Frederick W. Kates, *Patriot Soldiers of 1775-1783* (Jamestown, NY, 1976), p. 331 in which Reuben Spencer's military service is confused with that of another man of the same name from Suffield, Conn.

According to his pension application sworn to on 17 Aug 1832, Reuben Spencer enlisted at E. Haddam on 24 Nov 1775 to serve from that time until 1 Jan 1777 in the company commanded by Capt Amasa Mills of Simsbury, Col Samuel Wyllys Regiment, Brigade of General Joseph Spencer. Soon after his enlistment he was marched to Roxbury, Mass. and from there to New London where he embarked by ship for New York. He subsequently marched to Kingsbridge and from there to Peckskill, where he was discharged having served for thirteen months and six days. He volunteered again at E. Haddam in Sep 1777 in the company of Capt. Damel Cone in Col. Abner Lord's Regiment and marched to New London where he served until November when he was discharged. His total service amounted to sixteen months and six days.

One of the persons attesting to Reuben Spencer's "good reputation in the neighborhood" was his wife's cousin, Nathaniel Warner, Jr.

The children of Sarah and Mehitabel's parents John Warner 2nd and Mehitabel Willey Warner, prob all b. E. Haddam were:

- Anna, res. Winfield, Herkimer Co., NY; d. aft 15 May 1832, at that time unm. Previously referred to in the deedlease agreement with William Hadley of 18 Mar 1816 [Herkimer Co. Deeds 18:436 and 27:67].
- Mehitabel, b. E. Haddam 15 Apr 1762 [Deposition of Mehitabel Warner Spencer dated at Villenova 2 Oct 1838, in Rev War Pens Appl File of Reuben Spencer],

- d. Villenova 4 Mar 1850 [TAG 30:52]; m. E. Haddam, 21 Nov 1792, Reuben Spencer [Rev War Pens Appl]. Three children surnamed Spencer: Halsey, Reuben and John.
- iii. Samuel, on 9 Nov 1813 executed a quit-claim deed to William Hadley releasing his interest in the estate of John Warner (2d) [Herkimer Co. Deeds 7:345]. Reported to have married [—] Parker and to have been living in 1834.
- Ichabod, named in the will of his father. Conveyed by deed dated at E. Haddam 4 Nov 1796 and witnessed by Israel Spencer 3 acres in E. Haddam to his brother Darius. Recorded 27 Feb 1801 [E. Haddam Land Records 13:1020].
- v. Darius, res Newburgh, Cuyahoga Co, OH as early as 1801. Known children: son, Darius Warner Jr., two daughters, Lydia Warner Hamilton and Esther Warner Hammond. Possible children: Spencer Warner, Marian Warner Wolker, and Norman Warner. Wife's name not known [Gertrude Van Rensselaer Wickham, The Pioneer Families of Cleveland 1796-1840 I (Cleveland, 1914), p. 1801].
- vi. Susannah, named in the will of her father.
- John, reportedly m. [—] Church and res Livonia, Livingston Co., NY.
- Lydia, m. William Ely, res Haddam CT. Did not accompany her parents to Litchfield. [Herkimer Co. Deeds 7:217-218
- Sarah S., b. 1774; d. 25 Mar 1853 at Villenova [Zadock Rider Family Bible in poss C. W. Ryder, Fredonia, NY]; m. 16 Mar 1797, Gideon Spencer Jr. b. 25 Jul 1771. E. Haddam [TAG 30:53], d. ca 1863, prob Arkwright, Chaut. Co., at the home of his son, Norman. Children, surnamed Spencer (all res Chaut Co): Lucy. b. E. Haddam 18 Feb 1798; d. 31 Jan 1854 at Arkwright; m. 24 Jan 1822, Winfield, Herkimer Co., Robert Delos Rider [Zadock Rider Bible Rec], Norman, b. E. Haddam 14 Sep 1800, d Fowlerville, MI 5 Oct 1872, m. Amanda Maria Smith [Samuel P. May, Descendants of Richard Sares (Sears) (Albany, 1890) p. 176]; Colvill b. prob E. Haddam 18 Feb 1802, d.7 May 1882 [GS], m. (1) Sally [--], m. (2) Lucinda [--]; bur with his two wives in Hamlet Cem; Laura, b. ca 1804, prob Litchfield, NY; m. John Smith [NY Census 1875, Arkwright, Chaut Co]. All except Norman probably bur. Hamlet Cem without markers,
- x. Lucy Maria b. ca. 1777; d. 12 Feb 1857; m. Litchfield, NY, William Hadley, son of William and Eunice Hadley, farmer. He d. Dec 1869; bur. Cedarville Cem. Eight children surnamed Hadley, all b. Litchfield, NY: Abram, Maria, William Jr, John, Harry C. and Harriet (twins), Elmira and Alsigna, d.y. (twins) [Warner Desc 300-301].

The above genealogical success story has been many years in the making. The research accomplished the following: The entire line of Mehitabel Willey Warner — previously unknown to her present-day Warner descendants — was revealed, both the Revolutionary service of Reuben Spencer

and the birth of his supposed son Halsey were critically examined, and the relationship of Mehitabel and Sarah Warner through the maternal line to their cousin Nathaniel Warner, Jr. was discovered. There are still genealogical problems relating to this family waiting to be solved. The family of Nathaniel Warner, Sr. remains obscure; however, perhaps a more detailed

investigation of his collateral relationships will yield up those secrets as well.
