ISAAC Winston - The Winstons of Virginia are said to be descended from the ancient and honorable family of that name in England. Four of the name emigrated from Yorkshire, England some time previous to the year 1710. Three brothers -- Isaac, William Essex and James, and a cousin, Pleasant Winston. They were of the Society of Friends, and left England to enjoy freedom of religious opinion.

6. Anthony³ (Anthony² Isaac) removed to Buckingham Co. near the "New Store" in 1771; m. March 11, 1776, Kezia (b. Feb. 1760) dau. of John and Elizabeth (Walker) Jones from Wales. Anthony Winston was a member both of the House of Burgesses and the Patriot Virginia Convention of 1775, from the County of Buckingham. He was also Capt. in the Army of the Rev. and a gallant officer. He was the purchaser of Peter Francisco, famous for his feats of valor and strength, whom he released from slavery to allow to enlist in the patriotic army. He was sheriff of Buckingham Co. for a long series of years. He removed to Davidson Co., Tenn. in the autumn of 1801.

In 1811 or 12, all of the children of Anthony and Kexia Winston, excepting the two youngest (who remained with their parents in Tenn.) removed to that locality of Mississippi Territory which now constitutes Madison Co., Ala.

"In 1813, when the war with the Creek nation commenced, a family council was held in Madison Co. to determine which one of the seven brothers, and brothers-in-law should be selected to remain and protect all the families", whilst the other six "went to the war". William Winston was selected on account of his firmness and prudence to protect the young families". The wives as well as their husbands were in the council. "John Jones Winston was a Capt., and his eldest brother Anthony, a Lt. in his company--the other five served in the ranks". Gen. Jackson "was the personal friend of all these young men", and bore cheerful testimony of the gallantry of each.

10. John Anthony Winston⁵, son of (William⁴ Anthony³ Anthony² Isaac¹) d. Dec. 22, 1871. He represented Sumpter Co., Ala. for many years in the General Assembly as Representative or Senator. He was Colonel of the _____ Ala. Regiment Volunteer Infantry, during the Mexican war; for two terms Gov. of Alabama; President of the State Senate; colonel 8th Alabama Infantry, during the late war, participating in the battles fought on Virginia soil. He was elected U.S. Senator in 1866, but was not allowed to take his seat. He is described as having possessed an "unbending will" and a vigorous intellect. His style of speech was "bold and incisive". He was never called an orator, but as a debater, he had few, if any, equals in the State. His personal courage was undoubted. He was as he represented his family as being "very tolerant in matters of religious faith".

11. John Jones Pettus⁵ son of (John and Alice Taylor⁴, Pettus, Anthony Winston³, Anthony², Isaac¹) was educated for the bar, but preferred planting. He was for many years before the late war a member of the Mississippi Legislature in both of its branches. He was twice Governor of that State.

Edmund Winston Pettus, brother of the preceding was a Solicitor for the State of Alabama for 8 years; Judge of the Circuit Court of the State, Major and Lt. Col. 20th Regiment Alabama Infantry, and Brigadier-General Confederate States Army during the late war. He was a gallant and efficient officer and received the encomiums of his superior officers. He is now a distinguished practitioner of law in Selma, Alabama.

12. William Winston² son of (Isaac¹) was called Langaloo Winston. "He was a great hunter; had a quarter in Bedford or Albemarle Co.; spent half the year there hunting deer. He was fond of the Indians, and dressed like them, and was a favorite with them. An amour with the daughter of an Indian Chief, who was engaged to another Chief, involved him in difficulties with the savages. They besieged him in a log fort for a week. He

defended himself with the aid of 3 negroes with rifles. Tom, one of the negroes, stood guard every night; at length the favorite squaw went out and made peace between the belligerents. Langaloo William was a great Indian fighter." (Article in the Va. Standard 185). He was endowed with those impassioned powers of natural and all-prevailing oratory, which rendered his nephew, Patrick Henry, the patriot, immortal. Wirt, in his Life of the latter, quotes the following anecdote from a correspondent--William Pope: "I have often heard my father, who was intimately acquainted w/ this William Winston, say, that he was the greatest orator ... ever heard--Patrick Henry excepted. That during the last French and Indian War, and soon after Braddock's defeat, when the militia were marched to the frontiers of Virginia against the Indians, this William Winston was a Lt. of a company. That the men were indifferently clothed, without tents, and exposed to the rigor and inclemency of the weather, discovered great aversion to the service, and were anxious and were clamorous to return to their families; when William Winston mounting a stump (the common rostrum of the field orator of Virginia) and addressed them with keeness of invective and declaimed with such force of eloquence on liberty and patriotism, that when he concluded, the general cry was 'Let us march on; lead us against the enemy!' and they were now willing, nay anxious, to encounter all those difficulties and dangers which but a few minutes before had almost produced mutiny".

The late George Winston of Richmond is supposed to have been a descendant of Pleasant Winston, one of the original emigrants—the connecting links cannot, however, be stated by his family. His children were:

The descendants of James Winston¹ in Hanover, Caroline, Louisa and Coochland Counties have long filled offices of local trusts, clerks, sheriffs, etc. Mr. William Winston was Lieut. and Adj'tant of Lee's Legion of Cavalry during the Rev.

The sons of John and Benjamin Winston are among the list of officers pensioned by the State of Va. for service during the Rev.

Joseph Winston, born in Va. 1746; d. near Germantown, N.C. 1814. He joined a company of rangers in 1760, was twice wounded in an Indian fight on the Greenbrier, was pensioned by the Legislature for his gallantry, removed to Stokes County N.C., 1765; was its representative 1775-6, and was appointed a Major, was in several fights victorious, and for his bravery at King's Mountain, where he commanded the right wing had a sword voted him by the Legislature. Commissioner to Cherokee Indians, with whom a treaty was made in 1777; first senator from Stokes Co., in 1791; and member of Legislature repeatedly

until 1812; M.C. 1793-5 and 1803-7. His son, General Joseph, d. in Platte Co., Mo. March 24, 1810, aged 52. He filled an important position in Stokes Co., N.C.; served in the War 1812; was for many years in the State Legislature, and was a Major-General of Militia.—Drake's Dict. Am. Biog.

"WINSTON FAMILY"

The origin of the Winston family in Va. has been greatly confused by the constant repetition of traditions which have no basis in fact we will not attempt here a critical examination of these traditions, but relying on the data afforded by the extant records, gives what appears to be the fact relative to the family's beginnings in Va. The first of name in Va. (thus far discovered) was William Winston of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co. living there as early as 1687. It was probably he whose name also appears in York Co. records in 1666 and 1667. William Winston patented land in New Kent Co. 1687, 1690, 1691, 1696 and 1701. William Winston died in New Kent Co. prior to Feb. 1702 leaving issue at least one son, Anthony Winston, of New Kent Co. of whom hereafter:

Anthony made a deed there to Bradley, Thomas first in Feb. 1702 and had a patent of land in St. Peters Parish, New Kent, Oct. 1701. He died there Dec. 4, 1725. He was probably the father of Anthony Winston of St. Paul Parish, New Kent Co. died between 1717 & 1719.

Isaac Winston of St. Pauls Parish, New Kent and Hanover Co. died 1760

Among the possessions of Winston, descendants of Barbara Overton Winston, was a copy of "Josephus" referred to in her will, and by her bequeathed to her son John Winston. This volume contained entries of births, deaths and marriages of a number of Overtons and Winstons families. The volume descended through several generations to Wm. Overton of Hanover Co. and finally lost in fire which destroyed "Courtland" his home in Hanover, in 1888. Fortunately, however, copies had been made of family records kept in old volume.

William Winston of York Co.

It appears by the records of the Court of York Co., Va. that on Aug. 24, 1666 Mr. Henry Tiler (Tyler) was granted a certificate for 1500 acres of land for importing several persons into the Colony of Va., among whom appears the name of William Winston. On Sept. 21, 1666 William Winston witnessed the will of John Bates, which was probated in York Co. Court Jan. 24, 1667. These references are evidence of the presence of William Winston in York Co. as early as 1666. What became of William Winston does not appear in the York records.

William Winston of New Kent Co.

(Note. The county records of New Kent prior to 1865 have all been destroyed. The records from 1656-1787 were destroyed in the latter year (William and Mary College Quarterly Historical Magazine Vol. IV, p 115). For a contemporaneous account of this matter, see "The Register of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co., p 170. The only remaining records for New Kent Co. and Land Patents (Office of the Register of the Land Office, Richmond, Va.), the Vestry Book of St. Peter's Parish 1686-1758, and the Register of that Parish 1680-1787, a Vestry Book of Blissland Parish 1721-1783, and the Land and Personal Property Tax Lists 1782 forward (Dept. of Archives, Va. State Library, Richmond).

William Winston was living in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent County in the year 1686. In Nov. of that year a complaint was made by one Will Turner that his help was unable to perform the task of clearing the highway, whereupon the vestry ordered that the said Turner should have the assistance in that work of Samuel Wady (Waddy), Thomas Glass, Will Winston, Robert Anderson and Charles Fleming. On Oct. 21, 1687, Lancelot Bathurst (himself a resident of New Kent Co.) was granted a patent for 5000 acres of land in New Kent Co. (on S side of Pamunkey River adjoining lands of Moses Davis and other) for the importation of 100 persons into the Colony of Va. and among the head-rights named to the said patent is William Winston. Register of Land Office, Richmond, Patent Book 7, p 598. On Oct. 26, 1687 William Winston was granted a patent for 266 acres in New Kent Co., being the land on which said Winston dwelt, and adjoining the land of John Lewis, David Crawford and George Phillips, and being part of a patent formerly granted to Moses Davis, together with a parcel of land purchased by the said Winston or David Crawford. (Patent Book 7, p 594).

The mention of William Winston as a head-right of Lancelot Bathurst on Oct. 21, 1687 raises the question as to whether he was an immigrant.

William Winston continued to live in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co., during the remainder of his life, adding considerably to his land holdings by patent and probably by purchase. On Oct. 3, 1690, William Winston had a patent for 1079 acres in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co., adjoining Burnell, Tarleton, and Kimbrough. (Patent Book 8, p 121). April 29, 1691 William Winston and John Engelbrecht patented 800 acres in New Kent on Mattedecum Creek and on same date William Winston had a patent for 769 acres in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co. Adjoining Dr. Phillip's, Pargitors and Totopotomoy's Creek, (now Hanover Co.) being part of 2400 acres formerly granted James Turner and by him deserted. On Oct. 29, 1696 a patent was granted William Winston for 2057 acres in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent, on South side Crump's

Creek and adjoining Henry Chiles, for the transportation of 40 persons; and on same date he received a patent for 350 acres in New Kent, adjoining Richard Littlepage, James Turner and Captain Langston. April 1701 William Winston patented 1091 acres in Pamunkey Neck, New Kent Co. adjoining Wormeley, Fleming and Dabney and lying amongst the branches of Mahixon Creek. (Patent Book 8, p 129 and 314, patent Book 9, p 59, 232, 353. Pamunkey Neck became King William Co. 1701.)

William Winston died in New Kent Co. prior to Feb. 1702/3 leaving issue at least one son whose name is known and probably other children, viz:

1. Anthony Winston (d 1725) of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent County.

2. Probably William Winston (d prior Sept. 1706) of King William Co.

Anthony Winston of New Kent Co.

On Feb. 20, 1702 (1702/3) Anthony Winston of New Kent Co., son and heir of William Winston, late of the same Co., deceased, conveyed to Thomas Bradley of King William Co., 1091 acres in King William Co. on Pamunkey River, adjoining Ralph Wormeley, James Dabney, Daniel Parks and Charles Fleming. (King William Co. Records, Book 5, p 21, 22, and 23.) On Oct. 24, 1701 Anthony Winston had a patent for 1079 acres in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co., adjoining Francis Burnell, Tarleton and John Kimbrough, which said land was granted to William Winston, Oct. 23, 1690, and by him deserted and since granted to said Anthony Winston by order of General Court, April 15, 1701 and is further due to him for the transportation of 22 persons (Patent Book 9, p 376, Register of Land Office).

Anthony Winston d in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co., Dec. 14, 1725 having had issue, probably:

1. Anthony Winston (d c. 1717-19) of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent Co.

2. Isaac Winston (d 1760) of Hanover Co.

Anthony Winston (d Dec. 14, 1725) of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co., most probably left children surviving him. Anthony Winston (d Dec. 14, 1775) doubtless had a son Anthony Winston. In 1704 the upper part of St. Peter's Parish was laid off into a new Parish called St. Paul's. St. Paul's Parish from its organization in 1704 to the year 1720 was in New Kent Co., but in the year 1720 Hanover Co. was created from the upper part of New Kent; that part of New Kent which lay within the boundaries of St. Paul's Parish. Thus, after 1720, St. Paul's Parish was in Hanover Co. The Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish 1707-1787, is still in existence in manuscript. The original of the Vestry Book is in the Library of the Va. Theological Seminary, Alexandria, Va. and a typewritten copy thereof in the Valentine Museum, Richmond, Va. An examination of this book reveals the fact that an Anthony Winston owned lands in St. Paul's Parish 1708 to 1715. In 1714 a vestry meeting is recorded as having been held at the house of Anthony Winston. In 1719 appears that Isaac Winston represented the orphans of Anthony Winston at the processioning of the lands. On March 31, 1720 there appears the lands of the orphans of Anthony Winston the lands formerly belonging to Hance Hendrick now the lands of Anthony Winston, lately deceased. From 1720-1743 appear the lands of Anthony Winston orphans. The names of these orphans are not once given. It seems circumstantially evident, however, that Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish, who died between 1717 (when his will

was dated) and 1719 (when his orphans first appear in the Vestry record) was a son of Anthony Winston, of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent who died Dec. 14, 1725. On March 6, 1734, Isaac Winston of St. Martins Parish, Hanover, 100 acres in St. Paul's Parish, Hanover, which said land was devised to said Isaac Winston by the will of his dec'd father Anthony Winston, dated in the year 1717. The deed is signed by Isaac Winston Jr. and Sarah, the wife of the said Isaac, relinquished her dower rights in said land (Hanover Co. Records, Vol. 1732-1735, p 202). Isaac Winston designates himself a Jr. in this deed evidently to distinguish himself from an elder Isaac Winston who was then living in Hanover Co., and in all probability the uncle or great uncle of the said Isaac Winston Jr. The Nathaniel Winston to whom Isaac Winston Jr. conveyed the land as above was probably a brother of the said Isaac Winston Jr. On Aug. 15, 1749 Nathaniel Winston, son of Anthony Winston of Hanover Co. married Jemima Bell, dau. of George Bell, of Hanover Co. (Records of Henrico Monthly Meeting of Friends, 1699-1756). Nathaniel Winston is referred to as cousin in the will of Isaac Winston of Hanover Co., dated Feb. 6, 1760. There is a perfectly clear record of Nathaniel Winston. Three patents were issued him for lands in Goochland Co., bearing date, respectively July 10, 1745, June 5, 1747 and July 12, 1750 (Register of Land Office Patent Book 22, p 261, Patent Book 25, p 615 and Patent Book 30, p 217). There are deeds in Louisa Co. Court 1748 made by Nathaniel Winston of Louisa Co. and in Sept. 1749, Nathaniel Winston of St. Margaret's Parish, Caroline Co. and in Sept. 1754 Nathaniel Winston of Caroline Co., planter, Jemima Winston, wife of said Nathaniel Winston relinquished her dower April 1755. Louisa Co. Records, Deed Book A, p 336, 353, and 356 and Deed Book B, p 29). In Louisa Co. there also appears a Samuel Winston of Fredricksburg Parish, whose will, probate Aug. 1758 names wife Elizabeth, plantation on Indian Creek; my four sons Joseph Winston, Anthony Winston, John Winston and the youngest a baby unbaptized, 1050 acres whereon he then lived; to all his children equal division of movable estate. In Oct. 1766 in a division of land of the estate of Samuel Winston, dec'd. among his children appear the names of heirs as, William (evidently the son unbaptised at time his father made his will), John, Joseph and Anthony Winston. In March 1774, the dower negroes of the widow of Samuel Winston dec'd were divided between Joseph, Anthony, Ann, John, William and Mary Winston the heirs (Louisa Co. Records Will Book 1, p 44, Will Book 2 p 14 and 296). This Samuel Winston of Frederickville Parish, Louisa Co., was probably also a son of Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish and brother of Isaac Winston Jr. of St. Martin's Parish, Hanover, and Nathaniel Winston of St. Margaret's Parish, Caroline Co.

Therefore, to summarize: Anthony Winston (d Dec. 14, 1725) of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co. was father of (1) Isaac Winston (d 1760), of Hanover Co., (2) Anthony Winston (d c.1717-1719) of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent Co. who was father of (a) Nathaniel Winston (b) Isaac Winston Jr., (c) probably Samuel Winston.

It will be noted above that Nathaniel Winston (son of Anthony Winston) who married Jemima Bell in 1749, was a Quaker. By referring to the statement of the Rev. Wm. Spotswood Fontaine it will be seen that he refers to a certain Pleasant Winston of Richmond, Va., "a grandson of Isaac Winston, the Quaker, a relative who settled in Henrico Co., Va. about 20 years" after the settle-

ment of the "original" in Hanover in 1702 or 1703 (according to the tradition). Without further comment here on the tradition as stated by Mr. Fontaine, it is readily seen that, regardless of all the errors contained in that statement, the tradition of kinship with a Quaker Branch of the Winston family is verified by the records. Though the exact degree of relationship is not proved, kinship is certainly evident.

William Winston of King William Co.

William Winston probably son of William Winston, lived in King William Co., and d prior to Sept. 1706.

William Winston and John Kimbro (Kimbrough) received on Oct. 23, 1703 a patent for 1500 acres of land in St. John's Parish, King William Co. in Pamunkey Neck, on the branches of Mangohick Creek and adjoining Littlepage and Johnson. (Reg. of Land Office, Richmond Patent Book 9, p 562). On July 20, 1704 there was recorded a deed from William Winston and John Kimbrow conveying to Charles Fleming 1500 acres in Pamunkey Neck, King William Co. on branches of Mangohick Creek adjoining Littlepage's line (430 acres on Mangohick being said Winston's share). Sarah, wife of William Winston and Margaret, wife of John Kimbrow, relinquished their dower rights in said land. (King William Co. Records Book 5, p 1, 2 and 3.) Date of this conveyance was Jan. 4, 1703 (1703/4).

William Winston died prior to Sept. 1706. The very fragmentary condition of King William Co. records prevents a clear tracing, but the abstracts are suggestive:

Charles Fleming and Susannah, his wife conveyed to William Winston 430 acres on Mangohick Creek in King William Co., being a part of 1500 acre tract conveyed by William Winston and John Kimbrough to the said Charles Fleming (King William Co. Records Book 12, p 64 and 65). Dates of sale missing but had to be after date of transaction above.

Then this fragment - William Winston of King William Co. conveys to James Edwards _____ 230 acres on Mangohick Creek in said Co. adjoining said Winston, Charles Fleming and Mangohick Creek, the said land being part of a grant to William Winston Sr., dec'd. and John Kimbrough, d Oct. 23, 1703 and containing 1500 acres, and by them (i.e. said William Winston Sr. dec'd. and John Kimbrough) sold to Charles Fleming _____ Book 12, p 362. Date missing.

Other fragment - "(200) and 30 acres of land and every part and parcell free and clear from all manner of incumbrances whatsoever to him the said James Edwards _____ /s/ William Winston and Sarah Winston, date Sept. 20, 1706.

Comparison of these fragments with the abstract of the fragment of the deed of William Winston to James Edwards shows them to be the concluding part of the said deed. The reference in the deed of William Winston to James Edwards to the land conveyed as "being part of a grant to William Winston Sr. dec'd. and John Kimbrough" is evidence that William Winston was then dead (prior to Sept. 20, 1706 the date of the deed.) The reference to said Winston as William Winston Sr dec'd points to the fact that William Winston, the grantor in the deed to James Edward, was a son of William Winston Sr. dec'd. The signature of Sarah Winston to the deed indicated the relinquished by her of dower right in the land conveyed and suggests that the said Sarah was the widow of William Winston Sr., dec'd.

William (d ante Sept. 1706) was father of
1. William Winston of King William Co.
2. Probably Isaac Winston

William Winston II of King William Co.

William Winston probably son of William Winston (d prior Sept. 1706) was living in King William as late as Sept. 2, 1706. No data as to what became of him. The following in all probability relate to him. On June 16, 1714, William Winston patented 150 acres in St. John's Parish, King William Co., on east side of Horn Quarter Swamp (Register of Land Office, Richmond, Patent Book 10, p 141) and on July 12, 1718 William Winston of Essex Co. patented 635 acres in St. John Parish, King William Co. on Moncuen Swamp and Mahiron (Ibid Patent Book 10, p 387). Could the above William have moved to Essex Co. For some years the record of William Winston of Essex Co. can be traced.

First appearance of William Winston in Essex is as a member of a jury in Feb. 1713 (1713/14) Essex Co. Records, Order Book 1708-1714, p 568). He married prior to June 14, 1714 Mrs. Martha (Tomlin) Gouldman, dau of Mrs. Rebecca Tomlin, of Essex Co. (whose will was proved in Essex Court Jan. 10, 1709/10) of Essex Co. On May 20, 1718 William Winston of Essex Co. purchased of Leonard Tarrant, of Essex 360 acres in Essex (Essex Co. Records, Deeds, Wills, etc. 1716-18, p 166). On July 16, 1718, William Winston of Essex Co. purchased of William Mackine 100 acres in Essex. (Ibid. 1716-18, p 179). William Winston's name frequently appears in the Court Orders of Essex Co. as plaintiff in suits and in other business connections between July 1718 to Aug. 1720 (ibid Order Book 1716-23). In Nov. 1721 as William Winston of Essex, Merchant, he purchased of George Ward the plantation whereon said Ward lived. (Ibid, Deeds, Wills, etc. 1718-21, p 329). On Feb. 19, 1721 (1721/2) Edward Rowzee, of Essex conveyed to William Winston of Essex 300 acres in Essex, being the part chosen by said Rowzee in a tract of 600 acres (formerly known as Nehockner) granted to Thomas Roson by patent in 1663 and since recovered by the said Edward Rowzee and William Winston from Rawleigh Chim by order of the General Court, Oct. 1719 and divided by the said Rowzee and Winston (Ibid, Deeds, Wills 1721-24, p 16). In Feb. 1721 (1721/2) there is another deed from Geo. Ward, of Essex Co. to William Winston of Essex, conveying 200 acres in Essex (Ibid. 1721-24, p 20). On June 18, 1722, William Winston and Reuben Welch, both of Essex, conveyed to William Skrine, of Richmond Co., their interest, right and title in a tract of 120 acres in the fork of Rappahannock River in Essex Co. (Ibid 1721-24, p 50). At Nov. Court 1723, William Winston presented will of Martha Winston for probate, and it was ordered that Francis Gouldman, her heir-at-law, be summoned to next court to make his objections, if any, to the probate thereof. (Ibid Order Book, 1723-25, p 62 & 88). It is evident from the following deed that soon after the death of his wife Mrs. Martha Winston, William Winston went to Hanover Co. to live. On May 19, 1725, Francis Gouldman of St. Ann's Parish, Essex Co. conveyed to William Winston of St. Paul's Parish, Hanover Co. 300 acres in Essex known as Mehockney, which is now in the peaceful possession of said William Winston by his intermarrying with Martha Gouldman, mother of the said Francis Gouldman, who in her lifetime was possessed of the said land. (Essex Co. Records, Deed Book 18, p 73).

Isaac Winston of Hanover Co.

Isaac Winston of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent, later Hanover

Co., who died Feb or March 1760 was long a prominent resident of that section. He was probably son of Anthony Winston who died in New Kent Co. Dec. 1725. Isaac Winston appears as owning land in St. Paul's Parish, then in New Kent Co. as early as Jan. 1708 (1708/9). His name appears in connection with the land processioning and road clearing in the parish in 1712 and in 1711 he was himself named as processioner of lands. (Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent and Hanover Cos. 1707-1785, p 17, 30, 31 and 92).

In 1720 the Co. of Hanover was erected from the upper part of New Kent and the territory comprised within the boundaries of St. Paul's Parish fell within the Co. of Hanover. From its erection in 1720 until his death in 1760, Isaac Winston was a resident of Hanover Co. As early as Feb. 1721/2, he was a justice of the peace in Hanover Co. and from Oct. 1731 to as late as the year 1744 he is referred as Capt. Isaac Winston (Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish 1704-1785, p 59, 63, 72, 109, 116 and 120). It also appears that Capt. Isaac Winston was a "merchant".

He acquired considerable holdings in land. The fragmentary condition of the Hanover records prevents discovery of any purchases of land in that co., but the Land Patents show that on Sept. 8, 1732 he received a patent for 1736 acres in Hanover Co. on both sides of Beaver Dam Creek (Register of Land Office, Richmond, Patent Book 14, p 471). In Sept. 1735 Isaac Winston Sr (Sr. to distinguish him from a kinsman, son of Anthony Winston who was called Jr.) purchased of James Pirant (son of John Pirant late of Hanover dec'd) 290 acres in Henrico Co. on main run of Chickahominy Swamp near a place called and known by the name of Half Sink. (Henrico Co. Records, Deeds and Wills Part II, p 371).

Isaac Winston died in Hanover in Feb. 1760. Isaac Winston (d 1760) of Hanover married (according to tradition) Mary Dabney and had issues. (Ref. Slaughter's St. Mark's Parish p 173; The Edward Pleasants Valentine Papers, Vol. IV, p 2366 and Genealogy of Isaac Winston and Descendants by E. W. C. Hendrick.

1. William Winston married Sarah Dabney
2. Isaac Winston (b c.1715-20) d 1766) of Hanover and Henrico Cos. Major in Henrico Militia 1751, married Mary Ann Fontaine.
3. Anthony Winston, (b Sept. 27, 1723, d Feb. 29, 1747/8), married Alice Taylor
4. Lucy Winston married (1) William Dabney, (2) William Coles.
5. Sarah Winston married (1) Col. John Syme, (2) Col. John Henry.
6. Mary Ann Winston, married John Coles.

The question arises as to the identity of Isaac, whose son was he? No record so far discovered afford direct evidence of the parentage of Isaac Winston but the reference in Isaac Winston's will to "my cousin Nathaniel" does afford a degree of circumstantial evidence.

It appears by the marriage record of Nathaniel Winston to Jemima Bell on Aug. 15, 1749 that the said Nathaniel Winston was son of Anthony Winston. The fragmentary records of King William Co. prove that there was in 1702 an Anthony, of New Kent Co., son and heir of William Winston, late of the same Co., dec'd. The Register of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co. 1680-1787 (p 73) shows that Anthony Winston, d Dec. 14, 1725. Now there was an Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent Co. living there from 1708-15 and owning lands there. In 1719 it appears that Anthony Winston's orphans were repre-

sented by Isaac Winston at the processioning of lands in St. Paul's Parish. (Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent, later Hanover Co. 1707-1785. Original in library of Theological Seminary of Va.). Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish was evidently dead at this time. In March 1734 Isaac Winston (signing himself Isaac Winston Jr) of St. Martin's Parish, Hanover Co. conveyed to Nathaniel Winston of St. Paul's Parish, Hanover Co. land devised by Anthony Winston (in his will dated in the year 1717) to his son, the said Isaac Winston (see augment on earlier pages).

Thus we have proof that Isaac Winston Jr. and Nathaniel Winston were both sons of an Anthony Winston, who may be identified as Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent Co., who died between 1717 (date of his will) and 1719 (when reference is found to his "orphans" in the vestry records). In 1719 the orphans of Anthony Winston were represented by Isaac Winston (see above). Then Isaac Winston in his will, dated Feb. 6, 1760; probated March 6, 1760, made bequest of negroes "unto my cousin Nathaniel Winston. Now the term cousin was commonly applied to nephews and nieces in Colonial times. The question of the identity of Isaac Winston now assumes this form: was Isaac Winston of Hanover who died in Feb. 1760, a brother of Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish, New Kent Co. who died between 1717 and 1719 and a son of Anthony Winston of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co., who died Dec. 24, 1725 and hence a grandson of William Winston of St. Peter's Parish who died prior to Feb. 1702/3? (See notes explained p 11.) Isaac Winston of St. Martin's Parish, Hanover Co. (son of Anthony Winston who made will in 1717) was clearly called Isaac Winston Jr. to distinguish him from Isaac Winston whose parentage is here under discussion.

Most probable solution is that Isaac Winston was the uncle of Isaac Winston Jr and Nathaniel Winston, hence the brother of Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish who died between 1717 and 1719 and if the deduction be correct that Anthony Winston of St. Paul's Parish was the son of Anthony Winston of St. Peter's Parish, who died Dec. 24, 1725, the inevitable conclusion is that Isaac Winston was a son of Anthony Winston of St. Peter's Parish and grandson of William Winston of St. Peter's Parish who died prior to Feb. 1702/3.

Mrs. Barbara (Overton) Winston (1690-1766) of Hanover born Feb. 5, 1690, d Oct. 30, 1766 of Hanover Co. Will of Mrs. Barbara Winston of St. Paul's Parish, Hanover Co. dated Oct. 6, 1764; prob. Jan. 1, 1767, names two sons John and James.

Earliest records of Mrs. Barbara Winston in extant records is in July 1727 when her name appears as a creditor of the estate of one John English in Hanover. (Hanover Co. Records, Vol. 1733-35, p 21).

The will of Mrs. Barbara Winston (dated Oct. 6, 1764, probated Jan. 1, 1767) was originally recorded in Hanover Co. Court suffering destruction when all of the Colonial records (with the exception of one vol. of Wills, Deeds and Bonds, 1733-1775) were burned (or otherwise disappeared) during the War between the States. However, "a copy" of Mrs. Winston's will, made during the time that her great grandson Philip Bickerton Winston (1786-1853) was clerk of Hanover has been preserved. This "copy" was made some time between the years 1826-1846, which years comprised the term of service of Mr. P. B. Winston as clerk of court, and bears the attestation "copy" Philip B. Winston, C. H. C.)

On Sept. 27, 1729 Mrs. Barbara Winston was issued a patent for 1443 acres of land in Hanover Co. on the South side of the North Anna River, and adjoining the River, the land of Thomas Carr, Jr., 400 acres of which land were patented by Capt. Thomas Carr, of King William Co. and by him conveyed to Mr. Ralph Crutchfield, who transferred the same to Mrs. Barbara Winston. (Register of Land Office, Richmond, Patent Book 13, p 414.) The records of processions of lands in St. Paul's Parish, Hanover Co. first mention the name of Mrs. Barbara Winston as a land owner in Oct. 1731 and her name continues to appear as such in records of processions for 1735, 1739, 1751, 1755 and 1759.

She died Oct. 30, 1766. Was dau. of William and Elizabeth (Waters) Overton of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent Co.

Baptismal name of the Winston she married is not clear. (The Land Patents in the office of the Register of Land, Richmond; the fragmentary records of Hanover, King William and Caroline Cos., the records of Louisa, Essex, Spotsylvania and Middlesex; the Register and Vestry Book of St. Peter's Parish, New Kent and the Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish, Hanover Co. have all been carefully examined for some "light" on this subject, but with absolutely no positive result).

There are two "traditions", however, which give the baptismal name of Mrs. Barbara Winston's husband. (1) A tradition which states that his name was James Winston, (2) one that gives his name as John Winston. While both of these traditions claim an ancient family register as the source of their authority, it is apparent from an analysis of the content of these statements and their divergency in giving the baptismal name of Barbara Winston's husband that whatever may have been the source from which his baptismal name was obtained, it was not obtained from the family register.

An ancient priceless heirloom of family was a book referred to as *Josephus* - in a will given to John - on its pages was kept a family register of Overton, Winston families. It is evident from specific data of births and marriages which have come down in this branch of the Winston family that at least five generations of this direct line were recorded therein: William Overton, the immigrant and his children representing first two generations; John Winston and his children (third and fourth generations) and children of William Overton Winston (fifth). Copy passed to William Overton Winston (1747-1815).

The Josephus was examined by Mrs. L. Payne and Dr. William S. Pryor who both made excerpts during the year 1821. The following copy now in Va. Historical Society, Richmond, sent by Mrs. Charles Ridgely of Springfield, Illinois and stated by her to have been derived from an account compiled from the book called Josephus in Aug. 1821.

In the Va. Mag. of Hist. and Biography Vol. XI, p 307 is a communication from Judge William J. Leake, of Richmond (now dead.) in which he transmits for publication in the magazine the Overton data from the book called Josephus. (Judge Leake descends from William Overton Callis (1756-1814) of Louisa Co. (a descendant of William Overton, the immigrant) and his wife Martha Winston, dau. of John Winston (1724-1772) son of Mrs. Barbara O. Winston). Judge Leake wrote that the data sent by him "is a copy of a copy made by William S. Pryor, (William S. Pryor married Anna, dau. of Benj. Pollard and his wife Mary Todd Winston, dau. of William Overton Winston (1747-1815), in Aug. 1821. -- This Josephus was burned at "Courtland" a few years ago when the house of the late William Overton Winston, decd. "was destroyed by fire."

"The following" wrote Judge Leake "is a copy of the Overton Register copied from the book Josephus."

May not both "traditions" be wrong and may not William have been the baptismal name of Barbara's husband. Louisa County records: On Oct. 28, 1746 John Winston of Hanover Co. conveyed to James Winston of Louisa Co. "all that part or dividend of land that was left him the said John Winston by his father William Winston in his last will and testament the said land lying and being in the north fork of Elk Creek and main of Sedgey Creek in Louisa Co. as by patent bearing date Aug. 17, 1725" (Louisa Co. Records Deed Book A, page 261. The patent referred to is as follows: Aug. 17, 1725 William Winston of Hanover Co., patent for 1000 acres on both sides of the North fork of

Elk and main of Sidgey Creek in Hanover Co. (Reg. of Land Office, Richmond, Patent Book 12, p 244). In 1742 the land fell in boundaries of Louisa Co. (which was created from Hanover). William Winston patentee was a resident of Hanover and his will (referred to in the deed of Oct. 1746) was destroyed with the Hanover records when they were burned in 1865. John Winston, son of William was living in Hanover when he conveyed the land to James Winston. A search in the Louisa Co. records has failed to show anything further about this transaction. Was the John Winston the grantor of Oct. 1746 a brother of James Winston the grantee of that deed? It is not improbable that her son James Winston lived in Louisa for a time and it appears that Barbara owned land near Elk Creek in Louisa in 1743 (see deed of Thomas Wingfield to James Winston (1743)).

The will of Sir Robert Peake, Knight, citizen and Goldsmith of London, dated May 15, 1666 proved May 26, 1667 made requests to cousins James Waters, the son of Joseph Waters, to my Cousin Waters, Relict of Samuel Waters, Skinner, decd; Sir Robert Peake was burried from St. Sepulchre's without Newgate, London, Aug. 2, 1667. (1666?)

Degree of relationship between Waters and Peake families not yet learned. Peake's were also of Northamptonshire.

The name of Anne Waters, widow, living in Cow Lane Alley, Smithfield Precinct, London appears in the lists of communicants of St. Sepulchre's Parish, Without Newgate in 1684 and 1685. Thomas Waters, who may be her son was also living in Cow Lane both years. On June 27, 1700 Anne Waters from Cow Lane was buried--will dated Sept. 29, 1697, proved July 4, 1700 at London.



reported he lost his life in 1647 while attempting to assert his rights.
After their eviction from Walkern the Gorsuch family moved to Weston
the adjoining parish where they also owned property.

The tombstone over the grave of Lewis Burwell, the first of the family in Va. who died Nov. 19, 1653 states that he was "descended from the ancient family of the Burwells of the Co. of Bedford and Northampton in England."

Edward Burwell lived at Marlington Co., Bedford, Eng. (NOTE: No attempt has been made to trace the Burwell family back to Edward Burwell. Keith, Ancestry of Benj. Harrison p 34-38 says: "Edward Burwell Gent (apparently Lewis Burwell's grandfather) was buried at Ampthill Nov. 19, 1620. There was an Edward Burwell named in the 2nd Charter of Va. Co. of London granted May 30, 1609 and Keith is inclined to identify him as Edward Burwell of Marlington, Bedfordshire--the grandfather of the immigrant Lewis Burwell.) JOSEPH WINSTON

Major Joseph Winston, Revolutionary Soldier, was born 17 June 1746 and died 21 April 1815. He was born in Louisa County, Virginia, the son of Samuel Winston and a descendant of William Winston, who emigrated to America about the middle of the seventeenth century. Joseph Winston was a cousin of Patrick Henry. At seventeen, young Winston volunteered under Captain Philips as a ranger to fight the Indians. Captain Philips and Capt. George Moffit United forces, but on 30 Sep 1763, were ambushed and defeated between Fort Young and Fort Dinwiddie. Winston's horse was shot under him and he received two wounds. Concealing himself in the underbrush, while the Indians were off in pursuit of fugitives he escaped on a comrade's back and after three days, during which the two subsisted upon wild roseberries, managed to reach a place of safety.

About 1769 he moved to Surry County, North Carolina, where his career was an uninterrupted success. A devoted patriot, he was a member of the Hillsboro Convention, 20 Aug 1775, which took steps to organize a provincial government. In February 1776 he went on an expedition against the Scotch Loyalists assembled at Cross Creek. Appointed Major of Militia, 9 Sep 1775, he served under Rutherford against the Cherokees, July-September 1776, and also as the ranger of Surry County. The year following, he was a member of the House of Commons and a commissioner to treat with the Cherokees. In 1780 he marched under Col. W. L. Davidson in pursuit of Bryan's Loyalists, and participated in the skirmish on New River and at Alamance. At the battle of King's Mountain, 7 Oct 1780, Joseph Winston commanded a portion of the right wing of the patriot army. The legislature of 1781 voted him "an elegant mounted sword" for defeating Major Ferguson (Walter Clark, The State Records of North Carolina, vol. XVII, 1899, p. 697). In 1800 he was a presidential elector, voting for Jefferson and Burr; twice he served in the North Carolina House and five times in the Senate; in 1793-95 and 1803-07 he was a member of congress. From 1807 to 1813 he was a trustee of the University of North Carolina. On the formation of Stokes County he became a lieutenant colonel.

His home at Mt. Airy, up in the Blue Ridge, "within a squirrel's jump of heaven" was the center of hospitality in his community. He was survived by three sons born at a single birth. An imposing statue was erected on the Guilford battle ground to mark his final resting place, his body having been reinterred there by the Guilford Battle Ground Association. Winston (now Winston-Salem), N.C. was named for him.
