Last year I visited Southampton County Courthouse in Virginia in search of my Job. These are some Deeds I copied. The story goes Job Wright was born 1757 in Southampton Co.Va.. From these documents and others I hope to find out where to go next in search of Job's father, who I also believe to be Job. Ha!

EX-SHERIFF M. N. HAMRICK IS DEAD

PROMINENT OFFICIAL OF COUNTY PASSES

Was 77 Years Old—Served as Sheriff, on School and Road Boards — Was Deacon 25 Years

Ex-Sheriff W. Newton Hanwick, one the foremost characters in the uprailding of Shelby and Cleveland - ounty, passed quietly to rest Friday - vening at the close of day, followog an illness of four year from heart trouble which was followed a week ago by paralysis of the throat. Sher-T Hamrick was prominent in church, colitical and business circles, and his years were unselfish, sympathetic and helpful. He was held in such igh esteem by the citizens of Cieveand that he was called from his farm 'z the Beaver Dam section and elected Steriff, which office he filled with sonor for ten years. For a number of years he served on the school board and here his services again reflected his unselfish devotion to right and astice and his friendship for education. Another recognition of his busibess ability and public devotion came open his election on the board of inghway commission of No. 6 townsnip which office he filled for several vears.

Ex-Sheriff Hamrick was vice presdent of the Shelby Cotton Mills for fully twenty years, having been one of the original stockholders and superntndended its erection. Not only was a prominent and diligent in public offairs, but he was a consecrated 'hristian who served for a quarter of century on the Board of Deacons the First Baptist church, being

hairman of the board for a number t years. His Christian life was active for he was always a regular nurch attendant, charitable, kind and helpful to those in need.

Mr. Hamrick was born in the heaver Dam community of Cleveland county, June 20, 1844 and went with the 17 year old boys to war where his services were all that could be de-· ired from a loyal, patriotic Southern man. After the war he was married 10 Miss Adelaide Holland, daughter et Capt. Gold Griffin Holland, a descendant of Capt. James Holland of aings Mountain battle fame. Capt. fold Griffin was elected to the legisature after the Civil War and Capt. lames was a member of Congress. the wife was a dutiful mother and dested companion who walked with arm in arm through a half cenvary of happiness and contentment.

This is the first death in a family it six sons of whom Ex-Sheriff Hamrick was the oldest. He is survived by live brothers, Sidney, Leander, John H. and Alonzo Hamrick of Cleveland county and Dr. Wiley Hamrick of Gaffney, S. C., also by his wife and the following children: Mrs. W. H. Jennings, Mrs. W. H. Blanton, Mrs. S. O. Andrews, Mrs. Beuna Bostic, Miss Ollie Hamrick, Chief of Police B. O. Hamrick and Grover C. Hamrick,

The funeral was conducted from the First Baptist church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock by the pasto Rev. Dr. J. M. Kester assisted b Revs. G. P. Hamrick and W. A. Mui ray amid a crowd of sorrowing friend and relatives that filled the larg burch and Sunday school auditorium. Not often does a crowd as large as this attend a funeral in Cleveland ' but ExSheriff Hamrick was held in such high esteem throughout Clev and that his many friends wished to pay a last tribute of respect to his memory. The beautiful floral offering was another testimony of the high regard in which he was held for wreath upon wreath bore evidence to his worth and goodness.

EARLY WRIGHT FAMILIES IN RANDOLPH COUNTY

By Willard Heiss, Indianapolis

In the census of 1820 for Indiana there were eleven heads of families in Randolph County who carried the name of Wright. Although they migrated here from various parts of the country, there seems to be a thread of attraction among them that would indicate some remote relationship. After considerable research it would appear that most of these Wrights descend from James and Mary Wright, who were early settlers near Hopewell Friends Meeting, Frederick County, Virginia. They died there in 1760 and 1764 respectively. The following sketch briefly outlines some of their progeny and apparent kinsmen who were among the first residents of Randolph County.

Joshua Wright (son of James and Luce Wright) was born prior to 1775 in North Carolina. In about 1790 he removed with his parents to Jefferson County, Tennessee, where he married Elizabeth ——. They were members of Lost Creek Friends Meeting and from there Elizabeth was granted a certificate to West Branch Meeting, Ohio, in 1809, Joshua having been discowned the previous year. In 1817 they removed to Randolph County and settled south of the present Bloomingsport. He died before 1850.

John Wright (son of Edward and Hannah Wright) was born in 1787 in Jefferson County, Tennessee, His parents had removed there some five years previously from Frederick County, Virginia. In 1801 the family removed to what is now Ross County, Ohio, where Edward Wright died. Soon after, John Wright, with his mother and the rest of the family removed to Highland County. In that county he married in 1816 Nancy Brown and in the following year, with his brother Solomon, came to Randolph County. John Wright was one of the early judges of the county. In 1837 he moved to Whitley County, Indiana, where he died in 1847.

Solomon Wright (son of Edward and Hannah Wright) was born in 1784 in Tennessee. He came to Randolph County with his brother John in 1817 and was living with him at the time of the 1820 census. In 1821 he married Mary Parsons. It is thought that they removed to the northern part of the state also.

John Wright (son of James and Sarah Wright) was born 1774 in South Carolina. About 1780 he removed with his parents to Greene County, Tennessee. There he married about 1796 Margaret Reece for which he was discounted by the Quakers. In 1798 he condemned his marriage, which was performed contrary to Friends discipline, and in 1805 Newhope Meeting gave him and his family a certificate to Miami Meeting, Ohio. They remained in Clinton County, Ohio until about 1818 when they moved to Randolph County and settled west of Winchester. He died in 1850 and was buried at Dunkirk.

William Wright (son of James and Sarah Wright) was born 1790 in Tennessee. About 1808 he removed with his parents to Clinton County, Ohio, where he married Hannah Dillon in 1811 in a Friends ceremony at Centre Meeting. In 1817 they settled in southern Randolph County. After his first wife's death, he married Nancy Maulsby of Wayne County, to which place he then moved. Later he lived in the northern part of the state and finally settled in Delaware County, where he died in 1854.

James Wright (son of John and Margaret Wright) was born 1796 in Tennessee. He removed with his parents to Clinton County, Ohio, in 1805. He married Abigail Starbuck by Friends ceremony in Centre Meeting in 1817, and settled west of Winchester the following year. He is supposedly buried in Randolph County.

Jacob Wright (son of John and Margaret) was born about 1798 in Tennessee. He was one of triplets. He removed with his parents to Randolph County where he married Sarah Wright, daughter of Isaac and Susannah. This was the first marriage recorded in the Randolph marriage records. They went to Vermillion County, Illinois, in the 1830's. It is thought that he may have died in Howard County, Indiana.

Thomas Wright, Senior (son of John and Rachel) was born 1761 in South Carolina. He married first in about 1785, probably in Newberry County, Betsy Voss (or Jay). She died in 1803. He married the second time, but it is unknown whether in South Carolina or after he removed to Ohio in about 1810. In 1819, Thomas Wright and family, along with his son-in-law, John Coats, came to Randolph County. Thomas Wright was one of the three families living in Winchester in 1820. He died in 1835 and was buried in White

occas

River burying ground. His son Thomas was one of the first sheriffs in the county. He died in Iowa about 1850. Children by his second marriage are not known.

Isouc Wright (son of John and Rachel) was born 1764 in South Carolina. He removed with relatives to Tennessee. In 1784 he martied in Greene County (Tenn.) Susannah Haworth. In about 1814 he and his family removed from Lost Creek Meeting in Tennessee to Union County, Indiana. From 1818 to 1822 they lived near Winchester, then moved to Vermillion County, Illinois. In 1841 they came to near New London, Howard County, Indiana, He died in 1844 and was buried in the Honey Creek burying grounds.

The above Wright families were all either Quakers or closely connected with them. The following family does not seem to have such strong ties.

Tucker in his History of Randolph County, Indiana (1882) states that in the fall of 1817 "John B. Wright, David Wright, William Wright... settled from Salt Creek west." "David Wright soon died. He had three brothers — William, James and John B. David was the youngest of the four." And again, "John Wright, blacksmith, who donated land for Winchester, was a brother of David Wright, Sheriff..."

A letter in the English Collection in the Indiana Historical Society written in 1887 by James Wright of Champaign, Illinois, gives some insight about this family.

"John B. Wright (who was my father) was born in Frederick County, Virginia, in the year 1785. His father John Wright was also born and died in Frederick Co. They were of Scotch & Irish descent, and farmers by occupation.

"They were quakers in belief. He was Married to Elizabeth Stevens (my Mother) about the year 1805. My mother was a Pennsylvania woman.

"They left that Cuntry soon after Marriage and came down the Ohio River in a family flat boat with others and landed oposite Highland County ohio and made their way through the thin settled Cuntry to the highland County near Leesburg. He remained there until the spring of 1816. Then Moved to where Winchester Randolph County now is, And bought 160 acres of Congress land, giving 50 acres for the location of the County Seat, My mother died on the 10th Sept 1825.

"In 1829 he sold his farm and in the fall of 1830 moved to Vermillion County III....

"[He] had a limited education in Early life, but was a great reader of books and papers... and became well informed for the time in which he lived. In early life he learned the White smith and blacksmith trade but always carried on farming, he worked in the shop and employed hands to carry on the farm.

"When in Winchester Ind he held the office of County treasurer and some other minor offices..."

It seems singular that this Wright family came down the Ohio River, went directly to Highland County, Ohio, and settled near other Wright families. Ancestors of these latter families had left Frederick County, Virginia, some 70 years previous and settled in the Carolinas. Further, it is remarkable that these sundry families moved again to Randolph County. This short sketch does not include the Wrights who came to Randolph County in the next decade from Clinton and Warren counties, Ohio.

Following is a brief sketch of the four Wright brothers.


John Wright (son of John) was born 1785 in Frederick County, Virginia, and married there in 1807 to Elizabeth Stephens. He removed to Ohio, Indiana, and finally to Illinois. See above. He married as a second wife, Anna Stanfield, and died 1868 in Vermillion County, Illinois.

William Wright (son of John). Does not appear in 1820 census.

James Wright (son of John) was born about 1790 in Frederick County, Virginia. Married to Hannah —. Further unknown.

Dovid Wright (son of John) was born in Frederick County, Virginia, about 1792. Married Rebecca —.
Died in Randolph County prior to 1826.

Tucker in his History of Randolph County, quotes Jeremiah Smith on the subject of the Wright family, as saying, "Whole colonies of them have emigrated westward. If they and all the other descendents of the Wrights who were here in 1818 had remained in the county, there would be little room for anyone else."

buried at the discretion of my Executrix hereafter named, & as touching all such Estate as it hath pleased God to Bless me with in this life, I do give & bestow thereof in ye following manner & form --Viz, First my will & desire is that all my Just & Lawful Debts & Funeral Expenses be paid & discharg'd.

Item, I do give unto my Son William Wright My Gun.

Item, My will & desire is that there may be raised out of my Estate Twenty & one shillings & sixpence for each of my two sons viz, Kelly & John Willis Wright to buy each of them a Gun & to be given to them as soon as they come to the age of one & twenty years.

Item, All ye Rest & Residue of my Estate of what kind & nature so ever I do give & bequeath ye use & benefits thereof unto my Wife, Jane Wright for & during her Widowhood, and afterward to be equally divided amongst all my children. (her Lawful Dowry Excepted)

Furthermore I do Nominate, Constitute & Appoint my Loving wife above'd whole & Sole Executrix of this my Last Will & Testament, In Testimony whereof I have here unto set my hand & seal the Day & Date first above written _____.

Wright is name derived from the Anglo Saxon Wyrhta, meaning industrious, strenuous, skillful. In England the Wrights were knights and baronets, and in America the family produced many governors, senators, generals, authors, inventors, aviators, editors, theologians, fictionists, judges, etc. The name is found in every section where the Anglo Saxons settled. It has been a prominent name in England for centuries especially in Suffolk, Essex, Kent, Warwick and Durham. Kelvedon Hall, Cranham Hall, Wrightsbridge, South Weald, Ropers, in Essex; Bilham House in Yorkshire; and Wright's Park in Scotland are family seats. The Irish branch was established by one who went with Cromwell to that kingdom. Characteristics of the family are truth and honor. "I would sooner accept the word of a Wright than to believe most men on their oath." Mottoes borne by some branches of the Wright family are "Theus Sibi," "Conscia Recti" and "Fortiter et Recter."

These two generations above are given as probable. Sir John Wright below is the earliest certain Wright ancestor. All available evidence, however, would indicate that the minister's son "John of full age" was the Sir John below.

P 38 Do; fin Act Book I, p 17 Somerset House, London, abstract of will, original examined by William Gilbert on January 17th, 1910, there being no registered copy: "In the Name of God, Amen. Olyve Wryght of the parish of Kelvedon, County Essex, sick of body but whole of minde. Soul to God. To be buried in the chancel of Kelvedon Church. To the reparation of that church £4. Ditto South Weald Church 40s. To poor £5 at burial and £5 at the mouths mind. 30s a year for twenty years after my decease to the poor people of Kelvedon and South Weald equally.

"To Katryne my daughter £5. To Richard, Thomas, Reignold, Parnell, and Elizabeth Green 40/ each. To Mary Green 13/4. To Olyffe her daughter 20/ and to every other one of Katrynes children now living 6/8. To Olive, daughter of my son Robert Wright 20/. To Katherine, Dorothy and Thomas Wright, his children, 20/ each. To Joan, daughter of John Wright of Kelvedon, 40/ and to Thomas his son 20/ and to his other two children (not named) 6/8 each. 1488. P 39 Wright Fam (1915): Assuming that John Wright was 21 at the time of marriage, this would be his birth year; and this is in harmony with the claim that "Rev. John Wright had a son John of full age in 1509" when the minister died. Since his father was pastor at Upminster, Essex, it is possible that son John was born there.

1509, May 9. P 37 Do: On the death of his father, John Wright inherited the manor of White Notley which his father possessed. Tradition says that he was the son of an eminent divine of Dagenhams, Essex. Dagenhams, as well as Upminster, were located about five miles south of Kelvedon Hatch. His marriage took place probably very shortly after this inheritance.

1509, June 20. P 10 Do: Arms were granted to him on this date, but little more than a month after his father's death. (Burke's General Armory, p 1139). This would give him a rank but the proper rank does not appear of record and his will simply calls him a yeoman, though yeoman in that day carried the meaning of "land owner. land man, or lesser baron" and did not mean simply "a tiller of the soil." Morant dominates him "gentleman" and as lord of the manor he possessed the right to hold "courts of baron." The origin or beginning of a manor was when the King gave 1,000 acres, more or less, to one of his subjects and his heirs, which tenure is Knights' service at the least. In English law a manor is an estate to which is incident the right to hold certain courts, called courts of baron, and the holder of the manor is called in relation thereto, the lord. The times of our John was before feudalism was extinct, when knights had their tenants and villains, made their own local laws, and held their own courts, of which they were both judge and jury.

1517. P 20 Do: The estate of Henry Roper, pursuivant (herald) to Queen Katherine of Aragon, located in the parish of South Wealde, County Essex, on Brook Street, including the mansion (Moat House) with the place and the mill, was

conveyed by Constance Roper to William Ipgrave. He appears to have sold it to a Mr. Lawrence who in turn sold it to John Wright of Kelvedon Hatch, when it ceased to be called Ropers. "Brook Hall" was the name of it under the Wrights. South Wealde parish contains about 6,000 acres divided into six manors and the uplands. Just when John Wright bought the above property does not appear but it is probable that he lived here prior to his purchase of Kelvedon Manor and earlier (1509) in Dagenhams. "The Moat House stood a little back from and to the left of the road towards London; having been much repaired and partly rebuilt, it is still standing. It was built at a very early date - time unknown - as evidenced by the Norman style of the interior finish, and by its having been surrounded by a moat filled with water for protection against tribes and clans, before stable government. Part of the moat still remains a relic and landmark of feudal or earlier times. It is now (1914) in good repair, its exterior having been modernized by brick of a yellowish color, tile walks, graveled roadway, spacious lawn, shrubbery and flowers, largely roses, conservatory, gardener's cottage and out-buildings; yet it still retains the air of a quaint old, old place, suggestive of the pomp and grandeur of the time of

Knights and ladies, and yet further back to the age of marauders - of attack and defense - to almost unwritten history."

This property remained in the Wright family for some 200 years, it being sold by a descendant in 1721 to William Wheatley of London. Brook street was a small hamlet by the brook at the foot of Brentwood hills being practically a suburb of Brentwood, noted as the scene of one of "Bloody Mary's" tragedies in 1555, when she caused William Brown to be burned there at the stake. St. Peter's Church is a hand-some building with five pillars dividing the nave from the chancel. It is a mile north of Brook street on an eminence; here a rich fund of Wright vital statistics is to be found.

1524–1538. P 19 Do: Sir John Wright purchases Kelvedon manor and erects Kelvedon Hall, according to one authority, indicating that it took 14 years to complete the work. Kelvedon Manor is in Ongar Hundred, parish of Kelvedon Hatch, County Essex. It was on an eminence near the west end of the little Kelvedon church of which he was patron (dedicated to the Virgin Mary, before England renounced allegiance to the Church of Rome, in 1531). On the chancel floor is a large slab, with a brass tablet now much defaced, "To the body of John Wright, lord of the manor and patron of the church () had () sons, and four daughters." The word Kelvedon is derived from the Saxon words "celd" or "keld," meaning spring, and "dun" meaning hill. Kelvedon therefore means Spring Hill. By this acquisition he becomes known as Lord of Kelvedon Manor. It is a fine large brick building some 60 ft. front by 45 ft. back, three stories high, with annex buildings, large stables and gardener's cottage; with large well kept lawn with shrubbery, and a pleasure lake in the foreground. It is interesting to know that the estate is now vested in the Wright family, the owner (1914) being Edward Carington Wright.

1535. P 9 Do: This is the date of publication of the first complete English Bible, the King James

Bible not coming out until 76 years later. Thus the first complete English Bible was printed but sixteen years before John Wright's death. It was the "rough and ready" age of chivalry, before the literary and religious awakening.

1547. P 11 Do: Morant's "Hist of Essex" (1776) says: "John Wright, gent., presented in 1547." In other words "he presented the benefice, the living being 2,070 acres." It was two years later that the first "Book of Common Prayer" was given to the church of England.

1551, Sept. 25. P 37 Do: Abstract of the will of John Wright of Kelvedon Arch., Essex; Register Thomder 117 and Register Bastwick: "In the name of God Amen; John Wright of Kellydon, Essex, Yoeman. Beying in bode feble and weak yet of pfect mynde make my will, etc. Soul to God. Body to be buried within the Chancell of Kellydon Church. To poor mens box 20/. To the parish of Southweld 40/, and to the ten poorest parishes about me 20/ each. To my loving wife (not named) 40 marks by the yere to be paid of my lands by my four sons equally - £6, 13, 4 each. And the best end of my house of Kelvedon Haule at her choice. Also to her my household stuff and 100£ 20 Kyne and a gelding. To each daughter (not named) £13, 6, 8. To every godchild 6/8, and to every godchild of my own children 20/. To Kelydon Strete towards the reparation of the way £3, 6, 8. To mending the way to the Common £3, 6, 8. To the reparation of Geedy Hall Lane 40/. To my eldest son John Wright and his heirs Kelydon Hall, Weldsyde Knights, Hubbards Land with the two houses in Brentwood and Layndon. To Robert Wright and his heirs, Ropers in Brook Street, and house meadow and orchard in Brook Street, Smythes land, Powres wherein now gladden dwelleth with Fyners, Barnecks Land and Webbs. 1587/8, Jan'y 25. Mary Green's husband dies and leaves "To Mary, my wife, all my lands and goods for her natural life, and after her decease my son John Wrighte shall enter in and upon the same."

She was daughter of Robert Green of Navestock, County Essex, England.

1516. P 40 Wright Fam (1915): Robert Wright's birth year at Kelvedon was coincident with the crowning of Charles V the greatest European Potentate of the century, referred to below.

1551, Oct. 5. P 37 Do: On the death of his father, he came into possession of the following properties as stated in the will: "To Robert Wright and his heirs, Ropers in Brook street, and house, meadow and orchard in Brook street, Smythes land, Powres wherein now gladden dwelleth with Fyners, Barneck's Land and Webbs." He was made executor of the will with his brother John

the elder. "Ropers in Brook street" was Brook Hall, the Moate House, which with the lands made up the Manor of Great and Little Ropers. Hence he became Lord of the Manor of Great and Little Ropers. It is probable that Robert was living here at the time if not indeed since 1538 when his father bought and occupied Kelvedon Hall. The moat house was on Brook street in South Wealde parish County Essex.

Great events were taking place on the continent of Europe during these days. The great Charles V (1500–1558), who was wearing the diadem of Charlemagne, ruled over Spain, including Naples, Sicily and Sardinia; Austria, Germany, Flanders and the vast possessions of Spain beyond the Atlantic – a dominion more extensive than that which had obeyed the sway of Alexander or Augustus. In 1552 he was defeated by the Protestant princes of Germany and signed the treaty of Passau by which the free exercise of their religion was secured to the Protestants. In 1555 the principles of mutual toleration were formally sanctioned by the Diet of Augsburg and thus the Reformation gained its first decisive political triumph in Germany.

1560, June 22. P 21 Wright Fam (1913): Robert Wright was named by his mother Olive Wright as overseer of her will with his brother John Wright of Kelvedon and to each of them was left 10s. Furthermore she left to Robert a chest and to John of Kelvedon a table and to John of Wealdsyde a pot.

1587/8, January 17. P 22 Do: Abstract of will of Robert Wright of Brook Street Arch: Essex Register, Draper, Folio 149: "In the name of God Amen: 17 January 1587. I, Robert Wrighte, of Brooke Streate in the parish of South Wealde in the County of Essex, yoeman, whole of Mynde, etc. Doe make my last will, etc. Soul to God and body to be buried within the parish church of South Wealde. To Mary, my wife, all my lands and goods, for her natural life, and after her decease my son John Wrighte shall enter in and upon the same and I appoint my said son to be Executor."

1587/8, Jan'y 25. Do: No witnesses named. He is buried, as per the will, "within the parish church of South Wealde."

1587/8, February 22. Do: Per Act Book 3, folio 64, will is proved by John Wrighte.

1617, Oct. 21. P 22 Wright Fam (1913): Roberdyke Pake Wright was buried presumably in the church yard of St. Peter's at South Wealde, Essex. This year of 1617 marks also the beginning of the end of Sir Walter Raleigh, the typical gallant and hero of England's heroic age. Nevertheless, as heroes often go, he was sent a second time to the Tower of London and, soon after, was beheaded by order of King James.

1546. P 21 Wright Fam (1913): Thomas Wright was born this year or very close to it. He is presumed to have been born in the Moat House or Brook Hall on Brook street, South Wealde, Essex Co., England. His baptism unfortunately does not appear in the records of St. Peter's Church there.

1560, June 22. Olive Wright, grandmother, wills to Thomas Wright, and to his three sisters 20s apiece.

1567. This approximates the year of Thomas Wright's marriage at probably twenty or twenty-one years of age. Coming now to man's estate he would be keenly interested in the courier news of the day connected with young Queen Elizabeth at home and the proud young Philip II of Spain,

ruler now of the dominating Power of Europe. But great as Spain was she was yet a dying nation. Philip in religion relied on the wicked Inquisition, and in commerce he strangled production by putting up a ridiculously high tariff on raw materials and a most absurd prohibition on exports of goods. In politics he was continually at war, so that from every angle he drew the life-blood of a nation which ought to have been strong and great. In this year 1567 he was sending a Spanish army into the Netherlands under the infamous Duke of Alva to suppress a revolt of a people who were resisting the Inquisition by holding enormous field-meetings of protest. The Duke established the "Bloody Council" and before 1573 when he retired he boasted that he had executed 18,600 Ne herlanders in addition to the horrible massacres by which he had half depopulated every captured town.

1587/8, Jan'y 17. P 22 Wright Fam (1913): His father Robert Wright makes will but mentions only wife and son John who after her was to have "all lands and goods," which included Brook Hall and Manor. Notwithstanding this, however, Thomas and wife Roberdyke are reported to have lived in Brook Hall or the Moat House. The vital records would so indicate. No will is given in the Wright genealogies.

1603, Nov. 17. P 22 Do: Thomas Wright was buried today in St. Peter's church yard at South Wealde, having reached the age of about 57.

1564–1642. These 78 years measure the span of the life of the great Galileo and the life of John Wright is practically co-incident to it. Galileo discovered by means of spectacle glasses in a lead tube the satellites of Jupiter, the rings of Saturn and the moon phases of Venus. He was twice carried before the Court of Inquisition to renounce the "heresies" in his "System of the World." He recanted but on rising is said to have exclaimed in an undertone: "It does move for all that."

John Wright and wife Grace are said to have lived at Brook Hall, the Moat House.

1640, May 30. P 22 Do: He was buried at South Weald, probably in the church yard of St. Peter's, where his forefathers sleep.

Having died intestate the administration of his estate was granted to his widow Grace Wright.

P 42 Wright Fam (1913): This was the baptismal day of Thomas Wright who was probably born within a week in the famous Moat House or Brook Hall on Brook street in South Weald, Essex, Eng. The record as found on St. Peter's Church Register reads: "Thomas Wryght ye sonne of John Wryght of Brook street, bapt: 19 Day of Nov., 1610."

1629. Vol. I, p 463 Hist of Conn (1857): Hollister, the author, here says Thomas Wright appears first at Swamscott (now Exeter) in company with Col. John Wheelwright in deed given by the Sagamores. He makes him also a freeman at Exeter in 1640; but this claim hardly harmonizes with what follows. Some student will have to find the harmony, if any, between these claims.

1631. P 77 Wright Fam (1913): "In the ship Susan & Ellen Thomas and his family come to America," says the author; but in the passenger list as shown by Hotten their names do not appear. The family at this time consisted of himself, wife and three children, the youngest being probably not over one year old. The author continues, "In the same ship was Hon. Peter Bulkeley, who was related in some way not mentioned. After the death of his first wife he became one of the first settlers of Wethersfield, Connecticut, with Bulkeley, Boardman, Griswold and Goodrich."

1640. The Boston Transcript of Dec. 6, 1915 says he was "in Boston till the death of his first wife, by whom he had all of his children. His brother Anthony had accompanied him to America but what year they came is not known." Stiles says he came first probably to Watertown, Mass., and that he was of the Massachusetts Court of Assistants before the Colonial Government was established in Boston, being recognized as a man of influence and high standing; but this is confused probably with his cousin Nathaniel Wright of London who was promotor of and assistant of the 1st Gen'l Court of Massachusetts Bay Company before government was removed to Boston. This Nathaniel was father of Dea. Samuel Wright of Springfield and Northampton, Mass. Still another view is presented by the "Genealogy of Judge John Crafts Wright" (1911). The writer says that about this time "Thomas Wright, with others, took

the Oath of Fidelity; thereupon they were recognized by the Crown, to hold property bought from the Indians, from the Church, or from the Earl of Warwick who had induced them to settle in America."

Assuming that the wife died in 1640 it was probably within a few weeks or months when Thomas and the children joined some party making a caravan or ocean trip to the rich valley of the Connecticut at Wethersfield. He at once secured a homestead plot of $3\frac{1}{2}$ acres on the west side of the present High St. "between Robert Abbott, north, and Samuel Clark, south," and erected the homestead. His extensive land holdings are shown in the following condensed statement which covers eight pages of the town record. In the first 20 years in Wethersfield he made over 40 purchases of land most of which were on the Great Island in the Connecticut River, called by the Indians Mannahannock (Great Laughing Place), since known as Wright's Island. He bought up practically the whole Island, a part of which was still held by the family in 1900.

1640/41, Feb'y 11. Vol. I, pp 254-267 L R: "The Lands of Tho Wright: One piece whereon his house standeth, of 3 ac 2 roods, the end against High st; one piece in Great Meadow of 66 ac; 2 ac 2 roods in Pennywise; 7 rods to run 3 miles on east side the River; 7 ac 3 rods in West Field; 7 ac 3 roods in West Field; 5 ac on the Island; 12 ac more on the Island; 1½ ac more on the Island; 1 ac in great Meadow; 5 ac in the Mile Meadow; 6 ac in the Dry swamp; 9 ac in the Dry Swamp." On pp 262-3 there are listed 12 other peices of land bought within the next ten years on the Island; and on p 265 there are 5 other purchases listed on the Island and two in the Great Swamp; page 267 records six other Island purchases. There are 39 parcels in all.

In Vol. I, p 1 T V this quaint ear mark for his cattle appears: "The Earmarke of Thomas Wright is a slit on the near Ear, and under guded of the same eare, wh is cut of onslit of the under sid of the eare all most as far as the bottome of the slit, and whole Eare on the fur Eare."

1643, Sept. 4. Vol. I, p 110 G C: The Wright is on the jury which today hears and disposes of six cases. One report says he was "deputy to the General Court in 1643 and clerk of the same;" but probably this was confused with this jury service. In the same Court he was again on jury duty in March, 1665/6 and in Oct., 1666.

1646/7, Mch. 4. P 158 Do: "In the actio of Sa: Smith pl. agt John Guteridge, Tho: Rite & Sa: Martin defts, John Guteridge and Sa: Martin are to pay the pl XVI Bush: Indian."

1647, May 2. Vol. I, p 261 Man: Thomas Wright is now thirty seven years old. His first wife has been dead about seven years and he concludes to marry again. This time he takes a double widow—Margaret who was first the widow of Hugh Hilliard of Wethersfield and then the widow of Capt. John Elson who had been killed by the Indians in 1637. She made will on January 19, 1670/1 and inventory of her estate was taken Apl. 4, 1671, totalling £82-19-06. Thus she died within a year after her third husband. In her will she mentions the Hilliard grandchildren and the wife of her son Thomas Wright.

1647, May 21. Vol. I, p 160 G C: "In the Ac. of Write pl. against Norton, the pl. is to have the swyne & pay the chardges for the keeping."

1648/9, Mch. 1. P 188 Do: "In perticular Courte in Hartford, Thos. Wright binds himself to the Comonwealth in a Recogniseance of £10 that Benjamin Hilliar shall pay his fine of £10 when it is required, and carry good behavior for the space of one whole year." Benjamin Hilliard was now in fact a step-son and Thomas was standing by like a father in need.

1651, April. Vol. I, p 625 Stiles: Thomas Wright, John Harrison. John Saddler, John Stoddard and John Goodrich – who owned lots in the section bounded by High st., Fort (now Prison) st., and Sandy Lane – executed a written agreement wherin they say their "house lots are surrounded every winter and spring with water" so they "could not have any profit in the middle of their lots." They therefore agree to ditch these lots and share expenses.

1651, May 14. Vol. II, p 22 C C: "Richard ffellows plt contra Thomas Rite defendt in an Action of Debt with the damage of £3-10s. The Jury findes for the plt damage of £3-2s and Coste of Courte."

- 1654/5, Feb'y 20. Vol. I, p 223 L R: Thomas Wright now buys another homestead with barn and 5 acres of land, of Samuel Hale on Back Lane, later called Rose Lane. It was on "lane leading to Michael Griswold's south."
- 1655, Apl. 2. Vol. I, p 45 T V: The Townsmen appoint Thomas Wright on a committee of three "to run the line betwixt Hartford and Wethersfield upon the 2^d of the next weeke."
- 1657, Oct. 7. Vol. I, p 25 L R: He gives to son James "thirtie-two acrs" on the island, and in 1659 to son Thomas twenty acres, and to son Samuel 9½ acres. "Ancient Weathersfield", by Stiles, gives a good history of Wright's Island.
- 1658, Aug. 18. Vol. I, p 161 Stiles: Thomas Wright Sen'r and wife Margaret and son Thomas Jun'r, with our John Deming Sen'r and Richard Treat and others (48 in all), petition the General Court, making protest that they cannot regard Rev. Mr. Russell as their settled and approved minister. In this petition 11 were church members and 37 were non-church members. Thomas Wright Sen'r and his wife were 2 of the 11 church members. The Court advises Mr. Russell to explain and retract a certain ambiguous statement and that they then "walk lovingly together." This did not end the matter, but on the other hand it was kept alive and it finally resulted in many citizens leaving to found a new settlement at Hadley, Massachusetts. While the church of Wethersfield was thus going through the throes of trials and troubles, the Quakers of Massachusetts, who first arrived there in 1656, were undergoing punishment for many outrages committed by them under the Quaker creed "that the inward light was the only infallible guide to religious truth and that all were blind beasts and liars who denied it."
- 1658/9, Feb'y 23. Vol. I, p 57 T V: "The Townesmen for this years are Mr. Hollister, Mr. Chester, Tho Wright senior, Tho Cortice, John Nott."
- 1659, Sept. 5. Vol. II, p 127 C C: Thomas Wright helps to take inventory of estate of Thomas Gilbert of Wethersfield, £189-7-6.
- 1666, Aug. 6. Vol. III, p 29 C C: Thomas Wright Sen'r is witness to the will of John Harrison of Wethers field; inv'y, £929-06-09.
- 1666, Oct. 30. P 56 Do: Thomas Wright was on the jury of a special County Court on a land division at Podunk in Windsor.
- 1668, March 6. P 101 Do: Thomas Wright sells to son Samuel Wright a six acre meadow lot, but apparently forgets it when will is made two years later, and wills to Joseph one half of it which the Court disallows. The will shows that he had already given all of his extensive land holdings to the children except the above meadow lot, and hence the inventory shows much smaller.
- 1669, Oct. 11. Vol. II, p 520 G C, Ptd: "Tho: Wright Sen.," and "Tho: Wright Jun.," are both on the Colonial census list of freemen for Wethersfield. There were only 58 freemen in town, and only 787 in Connecticut, as shown by this roll.
- 1669/70, Mch. 9. Vol. XXI, p 197 C H S: Thomas Wright reports two persons and three bushels of wheat in his house. The end is fast approaching.
- 1670, prob. Vol. III, p 77 C C: "The last Will & Testament of Thomas Wright sen'r of Wethersfield: I doe give unto my Dear wife Margaret, after my Decease, all the provisions (that are for Meat or Drink) now in my possession, & also the use of such Moveables as she shall think needful for her use during her life.
- "My Will is that the Division that I have formerly made of my Land unto my sonns shall stand firme forever, onely in this my will I give unto my sonn Samuell but halfe my six Acre Lott in ye meadow, together wth fower acres in ye Swamp, which he now enjoyes, all which is in consideration of five acres of Land which I had purposed to have given him upon the Island.
 - "I doe give unto my sonn Joseph halfe my six Acre Lott in ye meadow, that is to say, the north side

of ye sd Lott. My will is that after all my debts are paid out of my estate, there shall be an equall division made of the remainder amongst my children.

"I doe allsoe make my sonn Thomas sole Executor of this my will, & doe desire my Loving Freind Samuel Hale sen'r to be helpfull to him herein.

"I doe give unto my dear wife Margaret all the Linnen that I have in my possession that was of her owne spining.

1670, April. This approximates the date of Thomas Wright's death at Wethersfield, and he is there buried; but the grave is unmarked. He reached the age of 60, thirty five of these years being spent in the New World.

1670, Apl. 29. Vol. III, p 77 C C: "An Inventory of the Estate of Thomas Wright taken according to Lawe & prized Aprill 29, 1670:

1670, Sept. 15. P 101 Do: "The Last Will & Testament of Thomas Wright Senr of Wethersfield was exhibited in Court & proved by Thomas Wright Jun'r & Samuel Hale & accepted and ordered to be recorded; only it is ordered that the clause in the Will wherein mention is made of giving to Joseph halfe his six acre lot in the meadow (the north side of the lot) is to be null because it appeared to this Court that part of the lot was, on six March, 1668 sold by the said Thomas Wright to his sonn Samuel Wright."

1857. Vol. I, p 463 Hist of Conn (1857): Hollister, the author, writing this year, says there were now living among his descendants of the name of Wright 2 senators, 3 members of Congress, 3 governors and 2 judges of the Supreme Court. It says also that for some years prior to his death he was a Deacon, but finding no other evidence I do not claim it.

He removed to Middletown and is said to have been the first settler of Portland.

THOMAS WRIGHT JUN'R bp. Aug. 13, 1630 ELIZABETH CHITTENDEN m. June 16, 1657 b. a 1637 d. Aug. 23, 1683, æ 53 d. Feb'y 17, 1675/6, æ 38

1637. P 13 Chittenden Fam (1882): Elizabeth Chittenden was fifth among ten children and was the last probably to be born in England before the family moved to America in 1639 and settled at Guilford, Ct. Thus she was the baby of the ship. For twenty years she lived in this ancient town and was there prepared for her wedding day, from which time her residence was at Wethersfield, Ct.

1660/1, Feb'y 21. Vol. A, p 185 Guilford: The Court says in apportioning the estate of her father who died intestate: "A Childes pt amounteth unto £65-11-00 out of yt estate aiready apprised."

1670/1, Jan'y 18. Vol. III, p 89 C C: Margaret Wright, stepmother to Elizabeth's husband, makes will mentioning Hillyer grandchildren and heirs, but no children by Elson or Wright. She gives "to the wife of my son (stepson) Thomas Wright, the Cowe and if that was not enough for her labor of love," her executors were to give more.

1675/6, Feb'y 17. Vol. I, p 48 V R: "Elizabeth the wife of Thomas Wright aged 38 years or thereabout Deceased febuary the 17th 1675." Sad to relate Elizabeth's death was on the same day that her daughter Elizabeth was born. Nature can give no more intense example of the great truth: "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone; but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit" - John xii, v. 24.

1630, Aug. 13. P 79 Wright Gen (1915): Thomas Wright was the oldest of six children. This baptismal record comes from St. Peter's Church Register, at South Weald, Essex, England, which means that he was born in that town probably during the current month. He was but a one year old baby if his parents did bring him to America in the sailboat Susan & Ellen in 1631. He was with them in or near Boston for some nine years, when he was left an orphan by the death of his mother. In 1640 his father moved to Wethersfield, Ct. Thus Thomas was nine years old, yet Stiles says he received this year from his father a household. It is more likely that this was given around his wedding day and we have so treated it.

1654, May 18- Vol. II, p 49 G C: At a General Court of election held at Hartford Thomas Wright was at age 24 "mayd freeman" from Wethersfield. His brother James was made free at same time. While real freedom was thus being worked out in the New World, this picture of the scandalous conditions in England is shown in the instructions given to a commission appointed by Cromwell, the new Lord Protector, to rid the State Church of notoriously corrupt pastors. They were enjoined to "dismiss all who should be found guilty of profane cursing and swearing, perjury, adultery, fornication, drunkenness, common haunting of tayerns or alehouses, frequent quarreling or fightings," etc. [D'Aubigne's Cromwell, ch IX.]

1657, June 16. Vol. I, p 48 V R, Wethersfield: "Thomas Wright And Elizabeth his wife was maried June 16, 1657." Elizabeth Chittenden, the

bride, was living in Guilford, Ct., her father Major William Chittenden having been a founder of that town. She was born in England and had made the ocean trip at about two years of age. Now she was twenty and Thomas Wright Jun'r, twenty seven, arrives from Wethersfield, probably by boat, to ring the wedding bells. Probably as a wedding gift his father gave him a household on the west side of High street, between William Gibbons' heirs north and John Harrison's heirs south; also 30 acres on the Island. Later his father gave to him and to his brother James all his extensive holdings of land on Wright's Island. There was a Thomas' part at the north end and James' part at the south end. There was a noted fishing place on this Island for salmon and shad. Years later the Island was lost in the river -"a \$10,000 farm gone into the river."

1658, Aug. 17. Vol. I, p 160 Stiles: Thomas Wright Jun'r is among the 38 petitioners, not Church

members, (but probably Society members) who with 11 church members pray the General Court for the ousting of Rev. Mr. Russell, "he having given so great a scandal to the Gospel." His father's name on this petition doubtless helped him to sign it, but nevertheless it shows independence of character and a desire for real integrity in the pulpit, qualities in fact which would stand him in good stead as a constable which in time he was to be.

1662. Vol. I, p 59 T V: "Thomas Wright Jur chosen constable." For five years at least Thomas Wright Jun'r filled this office: 1662, 1667, 1668, 1669, 1679.

1665, Nov. 24. Vol. I, 2d Pt, p 20 P Ct, New Haven: Joane Sheaffe Chittenden Cruttenden of Guilford says in her will: "Lastly my Will is that my son Thomas Chittenden & my son Thomas Wright shall be my joint executors, they giving securitie to the Court."

1666, Apl. 14. Vol. I, p 93 T V: The town ratifies the agreement of the Townesmen with Tho: Wright Junior whereby he is "to beat the drum upon the Sabbath days for the calling the assemblie together, and as occasion is for town meetings, and sweeping the meetting house, mending the doores," &c., and for this the town was to pay three pounds.

1669, Oct. Vol. II, p 520 G C, Ptd: Thomas Wright Jun'r, his father and his three brothers all appear on the freeman's census for Wethersfield – a truly substantial family. Thomas Wright Jun'r was one of the Constables to sign this census return of 58 men.

1669/70, Mch. 9. Vol. XXI, p 197 C H S: Thomas Wright reports having under his roof 12 bushels of "wheat & indean" and five persons. With two children now in the house and their parents, this leaves room for one servant.

1670, Apl. Vol. III, p 77 C C: At the age of 40, Thomas Jun'r assumes the administration of his father's estate under this provision of his will: "I doe allsoe make my sonne Thomas sole Executor of yt my Will, and doe desire my Loving ffriend Samuel Hale sen'r to be helpfull to him herein."

1670/1, Feb'y 23. Vol. I, p 111 T V: "At a Towne Meetting, Tho Wright & Sam:Wright," and three others, "were chosen townesmen for the yeare ensuing."

1670/1, Feb'y 23. P 112 Do: At a town meeting, "the land next Farmington bounds" was divided equally to 76 householders of Wethersfield – probably all the families there. Each lot was to be 26 rods wide and contain 52 acres. Tho. Wright drew lot No. 72 which lot in Oct., 1715 was among the 17 lots of this division that were annexed to the Great Swamp Society of Farmington.

1670/1, Mch. 2. Vol. I, p 303 Stiles: John Strickland of Wethersfield mortgages his loom and gun to Thomas Wright.

1670/1, Mch. 29. Vol. I, p 105 T V: Tho: Wright is named one of a committee of five to "have heareby full power to bargan" for a "towne high way thurrow the short lots to Middletown."

1672/3, Feb'y 17. P 136 Do: "The Fence Verers chosen for the yeare ensueing are Jonathan Smith and Thomas Wright."

1673, Nov. 25. Vol. III, p 134 C C: The Court appoints Thomas Wright and Jonathan Smith Overseers of the estate of Joseph Smith of Rocky Hill whose inventory totalled £441-07-06. This was Thomas' brother-in-law.

1673/4, Jan'y 15. Vol. II, p 912 Stiles: In a vote raised "for a purchase of land from the Indians, which is one halfe penny upon the pound," Tho Wright paid tax of 6s-6d. Distribution of this purchase was made in 1701, 27 years later.

1674, Dec. 22. Vol. III, p 199 C C: Thomas receives payment of debt from the estate of Margaret Wright, his stepmother - "Thomas Wright for charges £11-18-09." This is fair proof that his stepmother spent her last days with step-son Thomas.

1678, Dec. 3. Vol. I, p 156 T V: "Sargantt Robins & Thomas Wrightt was chosin constabells."

1679, June 13. P 158 Do: "These underwritten were chosen Select men to make the list and rates for the year." Thomas & Samuel Wright were two of the four.

1680, Aug. 11. P 167 Do: "At a meeting of the Town Ensign Sam: Wright, Thomas Wright," and two others, "were chosen to take the List of ye East estates of ye Towne."

1681, Dec. 26. P 176 Do: "Thomas Wright," and two others, "were chosen for selectmen for this year." Next year he was elected again and he died in office.

1681/2, Feb'y 27. Vol. IV, p 75 C C: He helps to appraise the estate of John Nott of Wethersfield, £533-15-10. Between now and Dec. 12, 1682 - less than ten months - Thomas Wright assists on the inventories of six other estates.

1683, Apl. 4. Vol. IV, p 69 G C: "These were appoynted for the Grand Jury: Capt. Olmsteed, Samil Bissell, Jonathan Gillett, Steven Heart, Tho Wright," &c.

1683, Aug. 23. Vol. I, p 63 B M D: "Thomas Wright aged deceased August 23:1683." He was 53 years old and died intestate at Wethersfield. The Court record following gives the date one day later. Death was probably sudden since he was still in office as selectman and died without making a will. He had been for seven years without his wife and none of the children were yet married.

No date. Vol. IV, pp 151-2 C C: "An Inventory of the Estate of Thomas Wright whoe deceased In August 24, 1683:

1683, Dec. 6. P 76 Do: "An Inventory of the estate of Thomas Wright was exhibited in Court & approved & ordered to be recorded & the Court grant administration to Thomas Wright, & distribute the estate to Thomas a double portion, to the three sisters equall portion & If either of the children dye before they be of age there portion is to be devided among the survivors, & Samil Wright & Samil

Butler are appoynted to be overseers to assist with their best advice the administrators In the management of his affayres."

1701, Apl. 28. Vol. IV, p 116 T V: In the Five Mile distribution the 114 purchasers of 1674 participated, both living and dead. Though Thomas Wright had been dead for 18 years his claim is respected and his heirs draw for him Lot No. 26, for 216 acres, 108 rods.

1643/4, Mch. 12. Voi. I, p 10 L R: "Mary the daughter of John Stoder and of Mary his wife was borne the 12th of March 1643." Such is the historic announcement of Mary's birth. She was named for her mother Mary Foote. Mary was the first of seven children, all born at Wethersfield. She was almost twenty when she married, but not quite.

1683, Aug. 23. Vol. I, p 63 B M D: "Mary the wife of Joseph Wright aged about 38 years Dyed augst 23: 1683:" On the same page and the same date is recorded the death of her brother-in-law Thomas Wright. She was in fact 39, yet was the mother of seven children all of whom lived to raise families that did her honor. In "Highland Mary" we read:

"But, oh, fell Death's untimely frost, That nipt my flower sae early." 1639. G S R: Joseph Wright was born in or near Boston, Massachusetts, and was probably a baby in arms of less than a year old and without a mother when his father with five young children made the trip to the Connecticut River at Wethersfield. His age of 75 engraved on his gravestone gives us his year of birth.

1660, Nov. 15. Vol. I, p 148 L R: "The Lands of Joseph Wright which was given him by his father Tho Wright senr:" Two pieces are recorded. Then follow two pieces "had by purchase of his father Tho Wright senr" (Apl. 22, 1663). One of the latter included a house on the east side of High street next to the burying ground and the parsonage. He was getting ready doubtless for his wedding day. Before the year was over the knot was tied but they moved twice within three years. as seen by what follows. By trade Joseph was a cooper and became a "man of character and influence - a born leader." He was a man of much ability, pleasant and honorable in all his dealings, and much trusted by his townsmen who continually chose him to officiate in town and church affairs.

1663, Dec. 10. Vol. I, p 3 B M D: "Joseph Wright and Mary his Wife was maryed Decembr

10th in the year of our Lord: 1663." Seven children are recorded directly underneath. The great North American earthquake scared many this year; but there was no disturbance of this wedding day.

1663/4, Jan'y 30. Vol. I, p 78 T V: It was voted to call Mr. Joseph Haynes (son of Gov. Haynes) to be their minister, offering him the house which the committee secured from "Tho Wright Sen'r and Joseph Wright, according to the bargaine made between them." By the "bargaine" the Wrights secured the "town-lot" which included the old Town School house and a dwelling.

1665/6, Jan'y 29. Vol. II, p 114 L R: Joseph Wright now sells the house and school house and the "town-lot" above to Hugh Welles and received in exchange a house on the East side of High St. next to

Gregory Wilterton; and with his family, now increased to three, goes there to live. Eight separate parcels of land are recorded in Joseph Wright's name at this reference.

1665/6, Mch. 20. Vol. I, p 89 T V: "Joseph Wright and Tho Couch were chosen to warne all towne meettings, for all toune occasions for this ensuing yeare."

1666, May 10. Vol. II, p 227 G C: "Joseph Wright and Alexander Keny are p'pounded to this Assembly for freedome."

1667, May 9. P 246 Do: Jos. Wright is one of 30 men who "were sworne." Our Edward Turner and David Sage were of the number. Just what "were sworne" means does not appear; but with little doubt it means that they "were sworne freemen," since most of the thirty are young men of such age.

1668, June 7. Vol. II, p 183 L R: By this time Joseph has five acres on Wright's Island next to Thomas Wright on the north. He owned land also across the river in the present town of Glastonbury. Five parcels are recorded at this reference.

1668, Oct. 29. Vol. I, p 682 Stiles: Joseph Wright figures in the trial for witchcraft of Kate Harrison, having furnished to the witness, as a cooper, a barrel which, with beer in it, burst with a great report. Of course this was Kate's fault!

1669, Oct. Vol. II, p 520 G C, Ptd: Joseph Wright is on the census roll of freemen of Wethersfield, his three brothers and his father being listed also. These five made more than one-twelfth of the entire roll of 58 men. Tho: Wright, one of the brothers, signed the report to the General Court as constable.

1669/70, Mch. 9. Vol. XXI, p 197 C H S: Joseph Wright had ten bushels of wheat and six persons under his roof today. With three children and parents this accounts probably for one servant.

1670, Sept. 1. Vol. III, p 101 C C: The Court declares the clause in his father's will giving "untto my sonn Joseph halfe my six Acre Lott in ye meadow, that is to say, ye North side of ye sd Lott," to be null because the father had sold it on Jan'y 19, 1668 to his son Samuel. In addition to the above bequest, his father made this provision: "My will is that after all my debts are paid out of my estate, there shall be an equal division made of ye remainder amongst my children."

1670/1, Feb'y 23. Vol. I, p 99 T V: Seventy six householders of Wethersfield on the west side of the Great River vote in town meeting to divide among themselves the "land next Farmington bounds." Each lot was 26 rods wide and contained 52 acres. Joseph Wright, like his brother Thomas and Samuel, and uncle Anthony, participated in this division, drawing lot No. 28. See plan in Vol. I, p 741 of Dr. Stiles' History.

1672/3, Feb'y 17. P 136 Do: "The Constables chosen for this yeere are Leonard Dix and Joseph Wright." The office of Constable was not always popular. In Wethersfield for instance, in 1691, seven men were elected constable, but one after another declined the office, paying the fine of 40 shillings each for declining.

1673/4, Jan'y 15. Vol. II, p 912 Stiles: In a rate raised "for the discharge of a purchase of land from the Indians, which is one halfe penny upon the pound," Joseph Wright pays tax of 3s 10d; but the distribution of this purchase was not made till 27 years later.

1679/80, Mch. 11. Vol. I, p 3 rear, B M D: "The ear mark of Joseph Wright is a slit in the of ear and the foer part of the said slitt cut of like a Half crop and this marke he intends to continue to all his creatures."

1680, Dec. 27. Vol. I, p 172 T V: "Joseph Wright & Leonard Dix are chosen Fence Viewers." Joseph Wright served also the next year.

1681, Oct. 10. Vol. II, p 42 L R: "Joseph Wright sold unto John Wekes two Mares one about 8 yrs old a bay Mare with a slitt in one ear with a star in ye forhead . . . alsoe the other a bay Mare 1 year and vantage old with a white between the nigh wills and the near foot whit"

1683, Oct. 11. Vol. III, p 144 G C: "Mrs. Abygail Olcott and Mr. Tho. Olcott, executors to the last will and testament of Mr. Thomas Olcott decased, plaintifes, by way of appeale from the judgment of the Court of Assistants, the 4th instant, contra Thomas Wright, James Wright, Joseph Wright and Jonathan Smith, defendants; which action was an action of the case for that the sd Wright's and Smith did illegally possesse and detaine certein parcells of land lying upon the Island commonly called the great Island which land belongs to the estate of Mr. Thomas Olcott, deceased; to the surrender of the lands with a hundred pownds damage: In which action the jury fownd that the sd Olcotts should pay to the sd Wrights and Smith costs of courts. In this action the Generall Court find for the defendants cost of Court."

1685/6, Mch. 10. Vol. I, p 63 V R: It is now two years and seven months since the death of Mary, the first wife of Joseph. Her younger sister Mercy Stoddard had probably been a faithful and efficient mother to the seven children during the interval and now Joseph takes her for his second consort. She is now 32 while he is 46. Says the record, "Joseph Wright and Mercy his wife was maried March 10th 1685."

1689, Dec. 26. Vol. I, p 213 TV: "At ye same meeting Joseph Wright was chosen packer for ye Toune for ye yeer ensueing." The duties were to inspect and supervise the packing of all meat for shipment.

1689/90, Jan'y 17. Vol. V, p 50 C C: Ensign Samuel Wright, brother of Joseph, says in his will: "I desire my Brother Joseph Wright and my Brother-in-Law Samuel Butler to be Overseers of this my will." The estate totalled £1.082-09-00.

1690, Dec. 23. Vol. I, p 214 T V: "Att this meeting Joseph Wright," and two others, "were chosen haywards." A later name for this office was Pounder.

1691, Dec. 23. P 219 Do: "At a Towne Meeting there were chosen for Toursmen for the year ensueing: Joseph Wright Senr," and four others.

1692, Dec. 30. Vol. V, p 156 C C: Joseph Wright is witness to the will of Ensign Samuel Butler, brother-in-law, of Wethersfield, whose estate amounted to £579-07-00.

1692/3, Mch. 16. P 157 Do: Joseph Wright is appraiser of the estate of Nathaniel Scranton of Wethersfield, £36-17-00.

1693/4, Feb'y 23. Vol. I, p 235 T V: The town voted to distribute lands in the West Division (now Newington & Rocky Hill). The basis was ½ acre to pound of tax in the list of 1693. Distribution was accomplished on Apl. 15, 1695. Joseph Wright Sen'r and the two older boys all drew in Tier No. 2 which was bounded east by the Middletown road as follows: "No. 56 Joseph Wright Senr; No. 43 Joseph Wright Junr; No. 68 Thomas Wright."

1694, Apl. 4. Vol. V, p 68 C C: Joseph Wright is named on the Grand jury of Hartford County and on the same day he sits on the jury of the County Court. He served also in April, 1697; Sept., 1703; and Nov., 1704.

1696, Dec. 28. Vol. I, p 245 TV: "Also Joseph Talcott & Joseph Wright were chosen fence viewers for that part of the meadow fence that lyeth between the Great River & the brook att or near Rocky Hill called Goff's brook."

1697/8, Jan'y 28. P 259 Do: Joseph Wright Sen'r and Joseph Wright Jun'r and Jacob Griswold are among 27 to protest against "the voating away of town lands in small town meetings"....

1700. Vol. I, p 9 C R: The records of the First Church of which he was Deacon say speaking of him: "yt Bro' Wright, Joseph Wright Senr should be helpful in preparing matters for the Ld's Supper."

1701, Apl. 28. Vol. IV, p 116 T V: In the Five Mile distribution of land Joseph Wright drew Lot No. 96 containing 138 acres, 69 rods. This is the Indian purchase of 1674 above, by 114 inhabitants of Wethersfield.

1702, Dec. 28. Vol. I, p 268 T V: "Joseph Wright & John Coleman chosen Constables for the year ensuing. Joseph Wright refuses to take the oath of a Constable. Afterward, both of the Constables sworn, die ditto."

1705/6, Mch. 5. Vol. VI, p 278 CC: Joseph Wright and David Goodrich are chosen from Wethersfield to sit on the Grand Jury for the year ensuing. Both were on the regular jury of this date also.

1706. Vol. I, p 317 Stiles: Joseph gave to his son Thomas his High St. house, next north of the Wilterton place, which had become the parsonage lot.

1707, June 26. Vol. I, p 278 T V: "Att this metting were chosen Deacon Joseph Wright, Deacon Wm Warner," and two others, "a comitte to seat the galleries in the meeting house; also the body of the meeting, or below."

1711/12, Feb'y 14, Vol. IX, p 21 P Ct, Hartford: "In the Name and fear of God Amen. I Joseph Wright of Wethersfield in perfect health and of sound memory, in contemplation of my death do make and ordain this to be my Last Will & Testament in manner and form following:

"Item To my beloved wife Mercy I give twenty pounds in Currant pay of this Colony, and the use of what part of my dwelling house she shall think needful for her and that during her widowhood.

"I give to Joseph Wright, now of Colchester, my eldest son, to him and his heirs forever, 2 acres in Wethersfield Great Meadow which I purchased of Mr. Blackleach; also, five acres of land on the Great Island in Connecticut Great River, within the Township of Wethersfield, bounded east and west on the said Great River, on land of David Goodrich of Wethersfield north, and on land of Jonathan Smith of Glastonbury south.

"To my son Thomas Wright I give $2\frac{1}{4}$ acres of land in Wethersfield Great Meadow, bounded east on the Great River, west on a highway, north on my son Joseph's land, and south on land of John Deming Senr. of Wethersfield; 3 acres in the Dry Swamp, bounded (in part) on land of Deacon Warner and Nathaniel Churchill; also half my pasture, bounded (in part) on land of John Curtis Jr., Samuel Butler, and my son John Wright's land which sometime since I gave him – to him the said Thomas Wright and his heirs forever.

"I have given my son John Wright, by deed of gift formerly, the whole which I designed as his portion.

"I give to my son Jonathan Wright 50 acres of land in the Township of Wethersfield, butting on the Township of Farmington west, on a highway east, north on land of Robert Welles, Jr., and south on land of Major John Chester.

"To my two sons Benjamin Wright and Nathaniel Wright, I give that tract of land which fell to me in the last general division of lands in Wethersfield, to be equally divided between them.

"To Benjamin Wright I give three acres in the Great Swamp in Wethersfield, bounded (in part) on land of my son. Thomas Wright and (in part) on land belonging to heirs of Stephen Chester Jr., dec'd; also five and a half acres in the said swamp bounded (in part) on land of Deacon William Warner, on my own land, and upon land of heirs of Stephen Chester.

"I give to my youngest son Nathaniel Wright 3½ acres of land bounded (in part) on land of heirs of Stephen Chester, on land of my son Benjamin Wright and on land of Nathaniel Boreman; also three acres bounded (in part) on land of Jacob Williams of Wethersfield, on land of Thomas Bunce of Hartford, and on land of Jonathan Smith of Wethersfield.

"I give the whole of what shall remain of my movable estate to my eldest daughter Mary Griswold, to my second daughter Elizabeth Curtis, and to the children of my youngest daughter Sarah Hand of East Guilford deceased – one-third part to each: to Mary Griswold, to Elizabeth Curtis, and to the children of Sarah Hand decd.

"I appoint my two eldest sons, Joseph Wright and Thomas Wright, executors.

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Foreword

This lineage is a collateral and supplement to that of John McCann (1769-1849), as described in brochure entitled "Some Descendants of John Keand of Whithorn, Scotland" (W. R. & R. L. McCann, 1953). Cynthia Rebecca Jones is descended in the fourth generation from John McCann; data on her descendants were not wealable when aforesaid pamphlet was issued; her maternal McCann forcheurs are covered therein; arrangement and nomenclature herein conform to that pamphlet, Cynthia's paternal forcheurs are described in a brochure, concurrently being prepared, entitled "Ancestors and Descendants of John I. Jones in, Mary Ellen Schwartzwelder."

When this project was conscired, intention was to develop only the descendants of the intermarrage of a Wright and a McCannz but our research uncovered a wealth of information pertaining to the Wright foreboars. The data, unfortunately, did not extend conclusively to the original immigrant. Unckily a couple of class, first intimated by Mrs. Frank T. Estill and daughter, Nell Estill Giles, of Smithfield, Texas, and later corroborated by Mrs. Claude S. Williams of Versailles, Kentucky (our thanks to all of them), led to a belief that the full Wright lineage could be ascertained. For the benefit of the Wrights of Bourbon County and elsewhere in Kentucky, we confirmed the class and repeatedly expanded our research and project. Herein we record our findings,

We have drawn heavily on a comprehensive compilation in "The Register" of the Kentucky Historical Society, January, 1935 - Vol. 33, No. 102, p. 78 - an article titled "Wright-Hamilton Families", derived from an ald manuscript, compiled and signed by William Wright of Bourbon County, Kentucky, written in 1863, and passed on through relative William H. Clark to the Misses Hattle P., Lelia B., and Mary E. Clark of Puris, Kentucky, who presented the original to the Kentucky Historical Society. The manuscript was copied, slightly augmented, and contributed to "The Register" by Mrs. William B. Ardery, well-known Kentucky historian, who has aided us immeasurably in supplying valuable notes on the Bourbon County (Kentucky) Wrights.

Ancestors of James Wilson Wright, Sr.

It is our intention to show, by reasonable evidence, that our subject, James Wilson Wright, Sr. (1812-1898) of Bourbon County, Kentucky, descended through a locally well-known Peter Wright (d. 1793) of pre-municipal Covington, Virginia, from immigrant Peter Wright (1635) of Oyster Bay, Long Island. The line of descent, we are convinced, is —

Peter Wright, colonist, of Oyster Bay, L.I.
 Adam Wright, Sr. of Oyster Bay, L.I.

The descent from Peter Wright of Oyster Bay to Adam Wright, Jr. is well documented, and is generally accepted. Likewise, from Peter Wright of Covington to James Wilson Wright, Sr. the above-stated lineage is likewise generally accepted. This dissertation is to marshall facts which will support that Peter Wright of Covington was a son of Adam Wright, Jr. of Oyster Bay. Virginia and Kentucky historians (O. F. Morton, F. B. Kegley, and Mrs. W. B. Ardery, q.v.) have noted that Peter Wright of Covington, Virginia, was a son of Adam Wright; but none has attempted a determination of this Adam Wright and his forebears, whom we now propose to tie to the settlement of Oyster Bay, L.I.

In H. D. Perrine's Wright Family of Oyster Bay, L.I. (1923), the line of descent from immigrant Peter Wright(1), who came from England to Massachusetts about 1635, and who later founded Oyster Bay, L.I., is carried down through son Adam(2), 1650-1696(98), to Adam(3), who did 1749, and whose eight children Perrine lists to be Ruchel, Debarah, PETER, Thomas, James, Reuben, Solomon, and Abigail. The italies and capitalization are for purpose of later identification

of similar marking in the paragraphs to follow,

In O. F. Morton's History of Albuhary County, Virginia (1925), at p. 213, it is stated, "Thomas and PETER Wright were sons of Adam Wright of New England. The first died in 1755 without issue, PETER, who married Jane Hughart, had these children - Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel Martha, Jane, Nancy, Elizabeth, Thomas, James, William, John, Peter, and a daughter whose name is not known." The context in Morton tas well as in other literature) indicates that Thomas, subsequent to 1755, passed out of the picture, although PETER is frequently mentioned in the records. Western Long Island had been settled by the Dutch. The Treaty of Hartford in 1650.

Western Long Island had been settled by the Dutch. The Treaty of Hartford in 1650, establishing the Connecticut River as the boundary between Dutch New York and English Connecticut, extended the boundary line from the west side of Oyster Bay southward to the Atlantic Ocean. Thus, at this early date the great proportion of Long Island was English territory. The Treaty of Westminster, in 1674, extinguished Dutch sovereignty in America; and all of Long Island, in 1755

when Thomas Wright died, no doubt would be classified as New England,

In Wright-Hamilton Families (1935), Mrs. W. B. Ardery says of William Wright (6), 1783-1880, of Bourbon County, Kentucky, (a son of Captain James and Martha Hamilton Wright) that his (William's) "great grandfather, Adam Wright, was a citizen of the New England States. His son PETER Wright was (William's) grandfather," Material in Mrs. Ardery's paper was compiled in 1863.

In F. B. Kegley's Virginia Frontier (1938), under heading "Peter Weight of Jackson River", at p. 371, it is stated "Thomas and PETER Wright were sons of Adam Wright of New England They had a brother James, and sisters, Rachet and Deborah. Thomas died in 1755, no eniddren". It is to be noted that the names of the five brothers and sisters listed by Kegley, and of two brothers listed by Morton, correspond precisely to the names of five of the eight children of Adam Wright (1) of Oyster Bay, L.L., as listed by Perrine; and Mrs. Ardery joins with Kegley and Morton in stating that PETER Wright (4) is a son of Adam Wright of New England.

Although aforesaid several citations clearly substantiate our premises, we have also confirmed our authorities by examining photostatic copies of three wills, which we have copied verbatim into the Appendix hereto, and from which we tabulate on the next page all granulogical data contained in these wills. We conclude therefrom that PETER Wright(1) of Cowington is allowable

descended from Peter Wright (1) of Oyster Bay through the latter's grandson, Adam (2)

Noting the above obvious error in the stating of a son's birth-date that it eight or nine years subsequent to the demise of the father, we consulted the above-cited references only to find mere confusion of dates; and nothing was found to support specifically Perrine in his assigning Thomas (a Westchester miller) to be son of Adam, 27 - our Adam(3). The 195-reference is a copy of a Thomas Wright's will, dated December 4, 1776 and not probated. The 207-reference is a copy of a court order ten years later, wherein the aforesaid Thomas Wright was adjudged insane, and wherein the principal witness affirmed among other things that this Thomas Wright died on the same day that his will was written - i.e. December 1, 1776, which would result by simple arthmetic in Thomas. vs. being born about eighteen years after his father's death. Careful study of these references, which are copied into the Appendix hereto, indicates that Perrine mistook a date (July 8, 1786) of one affidavit to be the date of death of Thomas Wright, the miller; and it now seems clear that the latter was not a son of Adam, 27 - our Adam Wright (3) whose son, Thomas Wright, has been shown to have died in 1755 in Virginia.

The name Thomas occurs frequently in the families of the early Wrights who settled in Massachusetts and other colonies. Of note, one Thomas Wright, a great-great-grandson of Sir John Wright, Lord of Kelvedon Hall, Kelvedon Manor, County Essex, England, with his wife (a daughter of Lieutenant Crambroke of Crambroke Hall, County Essex, England) and five children (Thomas, James, Samuel, Joseph, and Lydia) came to America in 1635 on the Susan and Ellen, settled in Watertown near Boston, and subsequently on death of his wife moved in 1640 to become one of the first settlers and a prominent citizen of Wethersfield (then in Massachusetts Colony, but soon to be Connecticate. This paragraph is condensed from The Wright Family, George W. Wright, Albany, Oregon, 1929, p. 17 and elsewhere therein; five of the quotations below are from same author.

- Anglian Wrights and Some Immigrants

"The Wrights of the Kelvedon branch trace back to Sir John Wright, Lord of Kelvedon Hall County Essex, England, born 1488, died 1551, while those who are of the Kilvestone branch trace their ancestry back to Sir Thomas Wright of Kilvestone Hall, County Norfolk, England. Both of these branches descend from the Old Saxon Wryta Family of Bayeux, Normandy," (Wryhta), like the Latin "faber", means a workman of any kind, especially an artisan in wood or hard material - the millwright of a century ago.

"William Wright of London, England, of the Kelvedon line, son of Lord John Wright, was the first to settle in New England, where he landed near Saugus, Mass, in 1621. Several others of the Kelvedon line came to Massachusetts between 1621 and 1640, among them Thomas Wright, wife, and children (q.v.), and Anthony Wright, his brother; Richard Wright; Samuel Wright; Ed-

ward Wright; George Wright; and others of the Kelvedon branch.'

"William Wright married in England Priscilla Carpenter, sister of Alice (Carpenter) Southworth who was second wife of Governor William Bradford; came on the second ship to New Enghard - the Fortune, July 1621; lived at Scituate, Massachusetts, where he died in 1633, leaving all property to his wife, Priscilla, who married(2nd) John Cooper of Barnstable and removed with him to that place in 1639," - G. & II. Item 2562(a).

"Likewise there came to Massachusetts, Wrights of the Kilvestone brauch, among them Peter Wright, Anthony Wright, and Nicholas Wright, all descendants of Sir Thomas Wright of Kilve-

stone Hall, County Norfolk, England."

"Alice Wright, who was born in England about 1614, of the Kelvedous, came ever in 1635 at age of 21 to join relatives who preceded her.'

"The marriage of Peter Wright and Alice Wright, distant cousins, brought about a union of the Kelvedon line and the Kilvestone line of Wrights in the children."

The Bourbon County (Kentucky) Wrights and their descendants, several of whom are mentioned hereinafter, are of both lineages; but the male strain is Kilvestone; the female strain is Kelvedon.

In 1625, three Quaker brothers, of names Authory, Nicholas, and Peter Wright, are recorded as frying at Saugus (near present Lynn), Massachusetts; and, in 1637, all three are at Saud wich of Plymouth Colony (now in Barnalable County) on the Cape. They are believed to be sous of Nichola: Wright(A) of County Norfolk, England, by his second wife, Margaret Nelson em September 20, 4594), his first wife being Margaret Jeffers of Neatinshed (m. November 15, 4582); but this Anglian descent has been challenged. Parents of Nicholas(A) were Nacholas(B) and Effen Gylbert Wright; she was daughter of William Gylbert, Vicar of Barton Turf, 4517/4534; Ellen in February 18, 4559, obit January 10, 4582, after which Nicholast B), in January 25, 4589 Margerie Alysander, widow of John Ranapoole (obit, July 4, 1588). Parents of Nicholas (B) were Nicholas (C) and Anne Beaupre Wright; she was widow 1578-79.

The three Wright brothers were granted land at Sandwich, Massachusetts, where they remained until 1653. In a division of land dated April 16, 1640, Peter and Nicholas each received $2^{4}\gamma$

acres, and Anthony received two acres. In the spring of 1653 the Wright brothers joined a company of about a dozen families under leadership of Reverend William Leverich for purpose of forming a new settlement on Long Island, to which they journeyed by water in the sloop Desire of Barnstable (John Dickenson, Master) ending the voyage at the new Long Island home-site named Oyster Baye, where they were soon deeded lands by Indian Asiapum (alias Mohensis), the consideration being various utensils plus wampum and peake (small change) of value totalling four pounds sterling. The above notes are from a fascinating genealogy by Howard Delano Perrine, who spent this ty-five years of research to develop ancestry and descendants of *The Wrights of Oyster Bay, L.1.* (1923). Continuing, quoting Perrine, "Peter Wright might almost claim the title of Founder of Oyster Bay'. He was the only one of three original purchasers of the town from the Indians, who actually settled and remained in town. Both Samuel Mayo and William Leverich moved soon thereafter. Of those admitted as associates not one continued there more than ten years except Anthony and Nicholas Wright and Robert Williams." All three Wrights functioned frequently in early colonial Oyster Bay; Peter was a sergeant of the train-band (1652).

Anthony Wright (1) lived and died a bachelor; he was b. in County Norfolk, England, in the first decade of the 17th century; in life, as a blacksmith, he served his townsfolks well; his will

is dated September 4, 1680, probated December 8, 1680, at Oyster Bay.

Nicholas Wright(1) was born in England in or a little before 1609-10. He died at Oyster Bay, L.I. in November, 1682, at age 73. By his wife, Ann (surname unknown), he had nine children-Caleb. John, Edmund, Rebecca, Sarah, Deborrah, Mary (Mercy), Martha, and Tamar.

Wright Generation 1

PETER WRIGHT(1), eldest son, Nicholas(A), Nicholas(B), Nicholas(C), was born in County Norfolk, England, in the last decade of the 16th century, and died intestate at Oyster Bay, L.I., between Feb. 13, 1660 and September 14, 1663. His wife was Alice Wright, a distant cousin, to whom he was married in England prior to 1635; she was probably born in the second decade of the 17th century; and survived her husband to marry Richard Crabbe; she died February 24, 1685 at Oyster Bay, "aged 70 years and upward." Above statement pertaining to Peter Wright(1) has been abstracted from Perrine's Wright Family of Oyster Bay, L.I. Regarding the death of Peter, we note and quote a conflict by George W. Wright of Albany, Oregon - "The records of Wills of N.Y. state that Peter Wright was drowned in 1675 while on a trip to Virginia, probably at the same time as his daughter, Hannah Wright, 'the Devotee', a zealous preacher of the Quaker faith. The records of the Surrogate Court of N.Y., of the date 1675, state that Gideon Wright, who was the oldest living son, was appointed Administrator of the estate of his father, Peter Wright.'' Also in conflict with Perrine, George W. Wright says that Alice Wright, born about 1614 in England, was daughter of William Wright (the sem of Lord John Wright), who arrived in Appoint and the England. son of Lord John Wright) who arrived in America on the Fortune in 1621. Alice, he says, came over in 1635 to join relatives, and was married to Peter Wright in 1637. We continue herein, rather closely in accordance with H. D. Perrine.

Issue - Elizabeth m, 1688 Isaiah Harrison (In Settlers By The Long Gray Trail by J. Houston Harrison, 1935, it is indicated that many Harrisons of old Augusta County, Virginia, descend from this marriage); Peter (probably unmarried); Gideon Jr. m. July or September 5, 1702 Margaret Urquehart, or Urghartt (f. John); Anthony m. September 18, 1702 Mary Rhodes; Silvanus m. Mary Proctor; Hannah m. James Townsend; John m. January 27, 1707-8 Abigail Barker; and Tabiatha m. August 16, 1711 John Brook.

3. Job (sometimes Jos.) Wright(2), b. December 1639; d. September 13, 1706; m. Rachel Townsend who was b. in Oyster Bay and whose parents were John, 1st, and Susannah Harcourt Towsend. Issue - Anthony, m. Elizabeth ————; Keziah m. May 29, 1712 John Burr; Rachel m. September 1, 1715, Thomas Stokes; Hannah m. Robert Townsend of L.I.; Jacob m.(1st) Hannah Townsend of Oyster Bay, and (2nd) 1728 Mary Richardson of Chester, Penna.; and Elizabeth.

7. Sarah Wright (2). b. February 11, 1648; m. Edmund Wright, son of Nicholas Wright.

Mordecay Wright (2), b. October 30, 1649; d. March 20, 1650 in Sandwich.

Virginia; he and his brother, Thomas Wright, in the spring of 1746, migrated to the Virginia frontier: Thomas settled on the Cowpasture River, and Peter settled on Jackson's River, holding extensive lands at mouth of Potts Creek where Fort Young was built in 1756 and where the city of Covington, Alleghany County, Virginia, now stands, Peter Wright in, about 1759 (probably earlier) JANE HUGHART (parents James and

Agnes Jordan Hughart); and their children numbered thirteen - eight daughters and five sons, many of whom are mentioned in Peter's will (dated November 12, 1793 and probated December, 1793 in Botetourt County. Jane survived Peter; her will dated October 24, 1807, is recorded in Bourbon County, Kentucky, July 1823, Book G, p. 105; and in this will it is indicated that her daughters. Rachel Proctor, Agness Clark, Jane Estill, Elizabeth Sprowl, and Martha Estill, had moved into Kentucky, and that daughters Sarah Kimberlin, Mary Smith, and Rebecca Kincaid had remained in Virginia. Elsewhere, in appendix hereto, several notations are made of the Wrights and other early settlers of the Alleghany region of Virginia.

\$3.33) - p. 35. Annals of Bath County, Virginia, by O. F. Morton.

4. Rachel Wright(5), m. 1772 Captain James Estill, who was killed March 22, 1782 in Kentucky by Indians, and about whom much has been written (see Estill Family by Alma L. Wilson, April 1945 The Register of the Kentucky State Historical Society - p. 133). Estill County, Kentucky, is named for Captain James. They had five children and numerous descendants. Rachel m. (2nd) Captain Joseph Proctor, a heroic survivor of Estill's defeat; Rachel could well be described as "the girl who morried two Kentucky heroes"; the name Rachel Proctor appears in the will of Peter Wright(4), 1793, An excellent account of "Estill's Defeat" appears at pp. 29-33 of Glimpses Of Historic Madison County, Kentucky by Jonathan T. and Maud W. Dorris, 1955, Also see p. 48. The entire book is fascinating to read.

5. Martha Wright (5), m. William Estill; they migrated to Kentucky where William died, according to Mrs. Ardery, leaving two sons and a daughter; but, according to both Morton and Alma L. Wilsen, they had moved on to Franklin County, Tennessee. Inasmuch as three Estill brothers m. three Wright sisters, various writers have thoroughly mixed-up which Estill m. "what" Wright. After careful consideration of many statements, we feel that the names and relationships stated in the will of Peter Wright (4), 1793, convincingly support the tabulation herein. For additional data on the Es-

tills, see Appendix hereto.

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6. Jane: or Jennie Wright(5), m. Wallace Estill II who in 1794, with Dr. Christopher Clark and their two families, migrated to Madison County, Kentucky. These Estills subsequently moved on to Franklin County, Tennessee, where Wallace died, in his will disposing of a considerable estate to three sons, four daughters, and six grand-daughters. Elsewhere Wallace and Jane are credited with eight children; one may have died.

7. Agness, or Nancy Wright(5), m. 1789 aforesaid Christopher Clark. Mrs. Ardery in Wright-Hamilton Families gives this name as Nancy - sometime colloquially a pet name for Agnes; but in the will of Peter Wright(4) "Agness Clark" is bequeathed proceeds of residual property; and the will is

witnessed by both Christopher Clark and Agness Clark.

8. Elizabeth Wright(5), m. 1793 John Sprowl, according to Mrs. Ardery - Alexander Sproul, according to Kegley. The spouse's name is variously spelled by different recorders; in his will Peter Wright (4) bequeaths property to his daughter Elizabeth Sprowle.

9. James Wright (5), m. Martha Hamilton whose parents were Andrew and Martha (Kincaid?)

Hamilton (q.v.)

- 10. Thomas Wright(5), a captain in the Revolutionary War from Greenbrier, m. Sarah Henderson in Greenbrier County (now West Virginia); they had at least two children there (Jane and James), though the will of Peter Wright(4) indicates four children in 1793. Thomas(5) and brother James migrated in 1794 with their families to Kentucky and settled in Bourbon County, where James lived until death.
- 11. William Wright(5), m. Rachel Sawyers, "settled first on Potts Creek near the mouth (close to his father on Jackson's River), removed sometime between 1794 and 1800 to Tennessee (near Nashville) and thence years afterwards (in 1818) migrated to Misouri, where he died."

12. John Wright (5), in Botetourt County m. 1785 Catherine Persinger, "removed to Kentucky and thence migrated westerly".

On May 6, 1794, James, Martha, and their nine children ranging in age from sevention

years to a babe-in-arms of five months, perhaps accompanied by brother Thomas and his family, started their month-long trek from Virginia to Kentucky, arriving at Paris in Bourbon County on 7th of June. James Wright had been a captain in the Revolutionary War and an officer in colonial warfare; for military service, he was granted hard on Houston Creek, two nules southwesterly of Paris in Bourbon County which he had visited several times before moving his family there. He was there in 1785 when Bourbon was created from Payette County, then a part of Virginia. In 1785 he built the first log cabin istill preserved; on its land, which had been surveyed in 1776 by Colonel John Floyd, deputy sheriff at Fineastle, Botstourt County, Virginia. To house his large family. Captain James completed in 1792 the brack portion of what is now "Receibegan", the beautiful homestead of Judge and Mrs. William Breekenradge Ardery.

Appendix

The Wright and Other Early Settlers

Augusta County, Virginia

In 1732, sixteen families crossed the Potomac and settled near the present city of Winchester, Virginia. So came John Lewis, to lay the foundation of that yast frontier - a region lying be tween the Blue Ridge and Allegheny Mountains, now well-known as the Valley of Virginia. Augment ed numbers of hardy settlers, largely North-Ireland emigrants of English, Huguenot, and Scotch ancestry, the latter predominating, advancing a mile a month southwesterly up the valley (downward on the map), patented lands and built their first small log-cabin homesteads in the more rugged terrain of what in 1738 was defined as Augusta County, Virginia, where constant Indian hostility and later our War of Independence (1775-1781) slowed the advance. Augusta County "was a priceless domain, and offered high reward to those who braved the terrors of remorseless conflict with the Indians, which its occupancy entailed. But the men who followed Lewis were strong of heart, and no less their wives" - and children. A few intrepid explorers, Thomas Walker in 1750, James Harrod in 1774, Daniel Boone in 1775, and others, braved every hardship to continue the advance in Virginia territory, which then extended to the Ohio River. With the close of hostilities, sons and daughters of the Virginia-frontier settlers, ever increasing in numbers, treked over the mountains and spread upon the Blue Grass Country of Kentucky, which, in 1790, reached a population of 74,000 - a tenth that of parent Virginia - then the largest of the thirteen original states. A decade later, Kentucky's population tripled to 221,000, one-quarter that of top-place Virginia; Kentucky rated tenth in the 21 states and territories covered by the census of 1800.

Boone's "Wilderness Road", in 1775 little better than the hard-packed trail "formed in decades past by migratory herds of buffalo and wandering bands of Indians" or "by mastodons and mammoths over the ages" according to another writer, was the most frequented route of travel by the pioneers advancing from Virginia into Kentucky; and, in rainy weather, the going was really tough. It is of more than passing interest, particularly to a motorist of today, who in a dozen hours whisks over Hwy, 11 in Virginia and Hwys, 25 and 150 in Kentucky, with seldom a thought given to proximity of the famous old trail, over which our robust pioneers consumed a month or more to trek from Augusta to Bourbon. Most alluring of recorded history, tales, and legends of the fabulous trail is Robert Lee Kincaid's The Wilderness Road, Lincoln Memorial Press, Harrowgate, Tennessee, from the cover-flaps of which we quote a few inadequate sentences - "Opechancanough, King of the Pamunkey, closed his eyes in death, a helpless captive after the slaughter of his marauding war party. This defeat of the chief and his Eastern Indians in 1644 began a new period in the development of Virginia colony. It removed the barrier to westward expansion for the English settlement held at great peril and hardship for twenty-seven years. No single trail was more significant in the westward spread of English colonization than the Wilderness Road of Virginia. Tennessee, and Kentucky. It was the first route opened across the Appalachian barrier. From 1775 to 1800 it was the principal overland entry into the limitless reaches of the West. It was the life line which saved the Northwest for the young republic. During the Civil War it was of strategic importance in the movement of armies. During the nineties, the wilderness which it penetrated witnessed an unusual exploitation characteristic of America's industrial development. It is the people who accomplished this historic penetra tion to whom we look. There is the fabulous Abraham Wood, an unknown boy who made himself lord of the seventeenth-century frontier. The Long Hunters left a lore of their own from their exploits in the wilderness. It was on the Wilderness Road that Daniel Boone contributed his gallant exploits to history as trail blazer, guide, Indian fighter, and colonizer," Also interesting as a history of the development of Wilderness Road and other Kentucky roads, is an article in The Filson Club History Quarterly (Vol. 28, No. 8, July, 1954) by Turner W. Allen, titled "The Turnpike System of Kentucky".

Manifold claims have been asserted by various writers seeking to establish the first acttler in the Valley of Virginia. According to William Couper in History of the Shenaudoah Valley.
Vol. 1, Jacob Stover (Stauber), a native of Switzerland who visited the valley in 1729, and who lived
and died in the valley without accumulating a fortune, was the first settler of record; on June 17,
1730 he was granted two tracts of 5,000 acres each - one known as Massanutten on both sides of the
South Fork of the Shenandoah, and the other on the south side of the North Fork. The forks join
near present city of Front Royal. In his foreword to his Chronicies of the Scotch-Irish Settlement
of Virginia, Judge Lyman Chalklee says, "In the year 1745, all that portion of the Colony of Virginia
which lay west of the Blue Ridge Mountains was erected into a county, which was named Augusta.

To present the bare facts has been the purpose of this compiler. Each reader will weave his

own story, with his own coloring and atmosphere." Peter Wright, who died in 1793, was one of the carliest settlers of what is now Alleghany. County, Virginia: he and Joseph Carpenter came from New York in the spring of 1746. In History of Alleghany County, Virginia, O. F. Morton says, "Alexander Dunlap located near site of Goshen (Both County) about 1742. We are told that he was the earliest settler on the Great California, and that no one yet had located any farther west. A few had cabins on the Cowpasture (which parallels the Calipasture, a half-dozen miles westerly) in 1745. These settlers came in 1744, possibly in 1743. Pertaining to Peter Wright and his family, we continue to quote 0, F. Morton (parentheses are by the writers "Peter Wright's survey of 286 acres covered the bottem on which the the principal part of Covington (Virginia) is built. (He added to his halding, p. 17.) In 1792 he divided hard between his sons, John and William. Not many years afterward the Wrights went West. We are told that one of them sold his land to George Sibley for \$500 in cash, a wagan and two horses, and a barrel of whiskey, using the wagon and team to move to the vicinity of Indianapolis. The Peter Wright of 1782 was seemingly the most wealthy man in the vall y" (p. 13). Later, at p. 139, "Peter Weight, the pioneer, kept a tayeru in 1780. James Wright, who purchased from James Gilliland in 1829 a farm on Potts Creek, was not related to the Weights of Covington," "Peter Wright . . . had a grist mill Fort Young was built on his homestead," on 20%, Annals of Bath County, by O. F. Morton) Elsewhere, on p. 92, our authority unet's Howe's Virginia Collections (1833) to wit, "near the home of Mr. John Lewis, there is on the rotalside a large shelving, rock called Peter's Rock where, says tradition, he (Peter Wright) sought shelter in a soowstorm. Here he lay for several days, until the snow was four feet deep," and Morton continues. "According to the late John A. Carlson, the rock is by the side of the read, a mile below Alleghany Station. Wright nearly starved and had begun to chew his moccasins to extract some sustenance from them. But fortunately a deer came struggling through the snow, was promptly shot, and the hunter then went to chewing raw venison." On p. 155. Morton notes that "Peter Wright was a sergeant in Dickenson's Rangers in 1759," (French and Indian Wars: other members of these rangers included Joseph, Solomon, Thomas, and Zopher Carpenter, Thomas Carpenter, Jr., William Hamilton, and Jacob, Abraham, and Phillip Persinger,) "Peter Wright's claim as a soldier in Capt, Christian's Company of Regulars in the year 1760, commanded by Colo, Byrd, is ordered to be certified" (Feb. 10, 1780; Anucls of Southwest Virginia, Lewis Preston Summers, 1929), "During the War for American Independence, the population of the Alleghany area was very small, probably decidedly less than 1000. It is almost certain that nearly all able-bodied men performed more or less militia service, especially against the Indians." (p. 155). "Thomas and Peter Wright were sons of Adam Wright of New England. The first died in 1756 without issue. Peter, who married Jane Hughart, had these children: Sarah, Rebecca, Ratchel, Martha, Jane, Nancy, Elizabeth, Thomas, James, William, John, Peter, and a daughter whose name is not known." (p. 213 - the daughter's name was Mary m. Smyth, according to Peter's will). "The town (Covington) of 1819 was laid off in lots supposed to be 75 by 150 feet, but as the surveying was by compass and chain it was not very accurately don. The name is said to have been in honor of Peter Covington. He was the oldest citizen, and a descendant of Peter Wright," (p. 74). As a hunter, Peter Wright ranged far and wide. In History of Middle New River (1905) David E. Johnston of Phase field. West Virginia, relates "Peter's Mountain was named for Peter Wright, an old backwoodsman who about 1776 explored and lumited along the valleys at its base, in which latter valley the city of Bluefield, West Virginia, is located, and this valley is still called Wright's Valley, for the same Peter Wright, "up. 500. "Prior to the year 1776 one P for Wright, an old hunter, had travelled this val ley known since his day as Wright's Valley, which no doubt led him into the present territory of Tazewell County," (p. 141).

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Various histories and annals of the pioneers of Alleghany and America countries of Various, mention three Higharts, by name Thomas, William, and James (relationship not indicated). Thomas was paid for 50 days service as sergeant (1777) in the Indian warfare; and in 1760 be ostated land on southeast side of Jackson River, near the heldings of Peter Wright (4), he was a colonel in the Revolution, and a justice and sheriff of Augusta; he and George Wilson were streetes for Peter Wright, Jr. (5), executor of the will of Peter (4). William in 1772, purchased a 160 care helding and son; at p. 206 in Morton's History of Alleghany Country, Virginia, the relationships are established

ed, to wit - "James Hughart of the Cowpasture married Agnes Jordon: their children were James, Thomas, William, JANE, and Nancy (Wills, Augusta Co., Va., bk. 4, pp. 30-33). James (Jr.) was one of the original settlers in Williamsburg district in Greenbrier, and descendants are still in that county and Pocohontas. William's descendants are in Kentucky and the West. Thomas (b. about 1729, d. 1810) married Rebecca Estill (b. March 15, 1739 in New Jersey; lineage, Wallace (3), John (2), Thomas (1); and Agnes (Hughart), their only daughter, married Rev. John Montgomery, graduate of Washington College (now Washington and Lee)" - see "Estill Family" by Alma L. Wilson, April, 1945, Register of the Kentucky Historical Society. The Hugharts, like several other Augusta pioneers, may have stemmed from the Oyster Bay colony on Long Island, New York, where the name appears as Urghartt, or Urguehart in a 1702 marriage in Oyster Bay of Gideon Wright (3) to Margar-

et Urquehart Shay, daughter of John.

The name Thomas Wright appears not infrequently in the early records of Augusta County; but care should be observed to distinguish between the pioneer brother of Peter of Jackson River and the latter's son, Thomas(5), a captain in the Revolution, who prior to his father's death in 1793 had moved westward into Greenbrier County, where he married Sarah Henderson and had children, according to Peter Wright's will, and subsequently, in 1794, this Thomas(5) and his family continued westwardly, accompanied by his brother Captain James Wright, into Bourbon County, Kentucky (q.v.). Pertaining to pioneer Thomas Wright, we find a few notations prior to his demise in 1755; apparently Thomas had settled some way up on the Cowpasture - a stream which joins the James River just easterly of what is now Clifton Forge, Virginia, some dozen or more miles from Peter Wright's holdings on site of present-day Covington, Virginia. F. B. Kegley in his Virginia Frontier, at p. 167, states that Thomas Wright, about 1749, was one of eighteen who were to maintain a road on the Cowpasture. At p. 131, Kegley recites that "Further west on the Cowpasture and Bull-pasture were settlements well established in 1751 and 1752", and Thomas Wright is listed among those who petitioned for a road from Wallace Austin's Mill to the road at head of Calfpasture. In Chalkley's Records of Augusta, 1745-1800, at p. 44, it is stated that on May 28, 1751, Thomas Wright among others was granted an order to repair road. Evidently Thomas' district needed roads.

Peter Wright, Jr. (q.v.), who was executor of his father's will (1793 et seq.), was appointed by the Governor of Virginia, in 1821, to be sheriff of Botetourt County. According to Botetourt records, Peter, Jr. married thrice - (1st) May 16, 1797 to Nancy Cook, (2nd) December 27, 1812 to Sarah Persinger (daughter of Jacob, Jr.), and (3rd), about 1845, to Nancy, widow of John W. Middlecoff; this last marriage may be questioned as it is deduced from a Botetourt Court record (28-16 of 1846), Peter Wright to J. W. Middlecoff, a power-of-attorney (acknowledged in St. Clair County, Illinois) reciting the death of John Middlecoff, Sr., bequeathing \$500 to his son, John, and leaving residual to his wife, Nancy, who later married Peter Wright, and further reciting that they had for merly lived in Mason County, Virginia (now West Virginia). In Kegley's Virginia Frontier at p. 455, it is noted that a Peter Wright, in 1783, was in Captain Boller's company of militia; but whether this is Peter, Jr. or his father, Peter of Jackson River, we are uncertain. The father of Sarah Persinger, second wife of Peter Wright, Jr. was an Indianized youth, 6'-4" tall, known as Jacob Persinger, Jr. (but not of Persinger blood), who served as a scout in the Dummore War, and campaigned eighteen months in the Revolution, living a successful life to are ninety, as recorded on three fascinating pages (135-137) of History of Alleghany County, Virgivia by O. F. Morton, who also relates (p. 213) that in later life, Peter Wright, Jr. "was one of three justices who organized Boone County. Missouri in 1830. He was curator of the University of Misseu i and in 1822-26 was a member of the State Legis lature."

The Persinger family of the early Virginia frontier were neighbors of the Wrights and of the Kincaids from Londonderry, Ulster (North Ireland); and a few marriages between these families occurred during the years when the Wrights were habitants of Alleghany County, "Jacob Persing er was one of the earliest pioneers on Potts Creek (which enters the Jackson River from the south at Covington, Virginia), and he had numerous pes—rity. His son Jacob (this may be the Indianized youth, q.v.) died in 1841, leaving eleven children. To his brother, Henry, who preceded him seventeen years, there were born ten." (p. 199, Annals of Bath County, Virginia, Owen F. Morton, 1917). Other Persinger items are noted in Kegley's Virginia Frontier; Jacob Persinger, Dickenson's Rangers, 1757, with Peter Wright (p. 272); Abraham and Phillip Persinger mentioned as two sons of Jacob (p. 277); John Persinger m. Elizabeth Kimberling, 1778 (p. 480); John Persinger purchased, 1801, the John Johnson land, on the river west of George Hanna, Roanoke (p. 530); Jacob (Jr.) Persinger m. Mary Kimberlain, 1778 (p. 480); Jacob Bennett m. Mary Persinger of John, 1800 (p. 541). The Catherine Persinger, who in 1785 married John Wright (a son of of Peter of Jackson River) in Botetourt County, Virginia, was a daughter of Christopher Persinger, who settled at Blue Licks in Alleghany County, Virginia: her grandfather was Jacob Persinger (d. 1774), who went from Rockingham County, Virginia, in 1751, to Greenbrier. (pp. 135 and 144, O. F. Morton's *History of Alleghany County*. Virginia). Kegley, in Virginia Frontier (1938) at p. 371 recites, "Three Persingers, Christian, Phillip, and Jacob went to Greenbrier from Shenandoah Valley about 1751, and a few years later were driven out by the Indians. They seem to have been brothers. Jacob was executor of Phillip in 1760,

and Christian was not living in 1768. County Andrew Hamilton II, a brother of Martha, (3) Martha Hamilton's father was Andrew Hamilton I, as stated, b. in Ireland, d. 1791 in Augusta County, Virginia. The will of Andrew Hamilton II (dated June 14, 1820, probated August 1820 in Woodford County, Kentucky) mentions his wife Isabella (Elizabeth) who survived him, son John deceased with five children (unnamed), sons Andrew, Guy, and Alexander, and daughters Sally, wife of German Bohannon, Nancy, wife of Thomas

Stevenson, and Mary apparently then unmarried.

We also surmise that many a Hamilton of the Blue Grass Country stems from Andrew II; and we at times wonder if the John Hamilton (a son of Andrew 1) whom various historians repeatedly record as "killed by Indians" could possibly be a forehear of the John H. Hamilton (1771-1861) who is buried alongside his wife, Sarah (1763-) in Jacksonville Cemetery, Kentucky, Collaterally there is recorded in Bourbon County, a marriage (August 4, 1810) of John H. Hamilton to Sallie Hamilton, daughter of John Hamilton, who gives his consent; and on the marriage bond the signatories are Jno. II. Hamilton and Benja. Hamilton, the relationship of Benja. not being stated. In Scott's Papers (1953, Ky. Hist. Soc.) at p. 129 it is stated - "Perry, David, dec'd. - (Dist. Ct. Deeds "B", p. 405, 6-22-1799, Fayette Co.) - Hrs: Joseph, Samuel, Betsy, and Sally Perry, his hrs. John Hamilton and wife Sally, late Sally Perry and Betsy Perry of Woodford Co., deed to Edw. Payne of Fayette land in Fayette (Co. Ct. D. p. 149, 10-10-1809)". I ADAM WRIGHT of the east end of the great plains in the bounds of Oyster bay in Queens County on Nassau Island Yeoman being this twenty third day of the fourth Month in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and forty-nine very weak of body yet of perfect mind and memory and well knowing that I must in a short time put of this mortal Body do therefore make and ordaine this Instrument to be my last will and testament in manner and form following first I will and bequeath unto my two Daughters Rachel Wright and Deborah Wright all my houshold Goods within doors of all kinds to be equally divided between them to their own free disposal forever for them to be possessed off immediately after my decease Hem my will is that in some convenient time after my decease that my Executors shall sell and dispose of all my stock of cattle and horse kind and out of the money ariseing my Funeral Charges and the proving of my will to be paid and then my will is that my two Daughters ; forenamed shall have each of them the sum of one pound Ten Shillings out of the remainder of ye money and if any Money be yet remaining that it shall be applyed toward defraying other incidental Charges which may happen to my Executors by means of executing this my said will Item I will what moveable Estate I have other than above mentioned shall be also sold and the Money to be applyed to the defraying and paying my debts Item I will order and direct that my Executors or any of them shall sell and dispose of my house and lands in some time hereafter at their discretion and the money arising therefrom to be disposed of on this wise that is to say all the remainder of my just debts to be paid and then the remainder of the money to be equally divided between my Two youngest Sons Ruben Wright and Solomon Wright and to be paid into them when they respectively conce of age and not withstanding the sale of my house and Land it is my will that my Executors shall reserve and keep this small yard by the house and Nursery of Apple Trees growing therein with the other Apple Trees Westward of the Barn which are to be pulled up and Set in the yard by the house which is to be reserved for the space of eight years and the Appletrees to be sold for the use of my two abovenamed Sons Rubin to have two thirds and Soloman one third and my will is further that in case my Executors shall judge it more advantagius for my farme to be put in the Loan office for money to pay my debts and then the farm hired out for some time then they shall have full power to either Lett or sell the same according as they shall see cause. Hem I will and bequeath the one third part of my Crop of cates growing on the ground to my abovest two daughters to be equally divided between them Item my will is that my two sons, above named shall have each of them a coat and vest out of the peice of Cloth that I have at the fulling mill and my will is that my two Daughters and two sons above named shall have the priviledge to dwell in my house mutill the time called Christmas and to make use of those provisions which I have provided for my families us for their support Hem I will and impower my Executors to put out Both my two Sons above many d to good Trades at the discretion of my Executors and my will and desire is that my son Bubin shall have time and liberty to dress and take care of the Nusery above mentioned in the Scasons of the year for that purpose and that my Sons Master shall be paid for the time he spends out of my Estate during the Term of eight years abovesaid Lastly 1 do hereby Constitute ordain and appoint my trusty friends Thomas Davis of the West Hills John Hewlit of the east woods and Joshua Powell of Bethphage to be my Executors of this my last will and testament fully impowering them or any of them that shall or may take upon them the Executorship to Bargain sell or let out my farm abovesaid and to do perform and execute all other things or things contained in this my last will and Testament as fully clearly and absolutely as if I had executed them myself in my life time and masmuch as I have not mentioned my three Elder Sons Viz: Peter Wright Thomas Wright and James Wright in my Will let it is to be understood I have given each of them a Gun heretofore which is all I can give them and my youngest Daught Abigail Wright which is with my Wife and by her agreement she to take care and provide for her In witness hereupte I have set my hand and seal the day and year above writen Signed Sealed published pronounced and declared by the said Adam Wright as his last will and Testament in the presence of the subscribers before the signing hereof my Will is that incase my son Rubin should die under age that my two Daughter first above named shall have his full portion and if my son Solomon should die under Lawfull age his portion shall be equally divided between my son Rubin and my two daughters Rachel and deborah Wright.

Also I give and bequeath unto my Son Peter the Waggon Now a Making and Six head of the Cattle as leting him have his Choice out of the flock And the Remaining horses Not before Mentioned to be his Property forever. Also I give and bequeath All the Remaining Cattle to be Disposed of at publick Sale and Equally Devided Among Mary Smith Agness Clark Rebecca Kinkead Jane Estill and Rachel Proctor by the Executors of this will. Also I Devise and Will the Remaining part of all my goods furniture And hogs And Sheep Except five of the Sheep Which is to be given to Nancey (colloquially a pet name for Agness--W.R.M.) to be given to my Son Peter and his mother for their use as think fit to Devide left in their hands for their uses while they live together. And I Constitute and Appoint Jacob Parsinger and my Son Peter Wright Executors of this my Last Will & Testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto Sett my hand and Seal this twelfth Day of November in the year of our Lord One Thousand Seven hundred and Ninety three.

The following is quoted from Collections of the New-York Historical Society, 1902, Vol. XI, pp. 195 and 207 --

"In the name of God, Amen. I, Thomas Wright, being in sound mind. I will and order that after a reasonable time after my decease, at discretion of my executors, all my estate, real and personal, be sold, except the homestead wherein I lately lived, and the negro man, "Peet," which is reserved for my wife during the time of 25 years. I also except a negro girl for my wife, and I also leave her all her wearing apparell and effects which she had when I married her. I leave to my daughter Sarah a negro wench "Tamar," and another to my daughter Elizabeth. When my homestead is sold the proceeds I bequeath as follows. To my wife Mary, two shares. To my daughter Elizabeth, two shares. To my daughter Sally, and my sons, Steven and Thomas, each one share. And lastly I leave to my trusty and loving friends, Benjamin Hildreth, Sr., and Thomas Griswold, whom I make executors, the sum of 50 pounds, and also make my wife executor.

"Dated December 1, 1776. Witnesses Caleb Sutton, Joseph Thorne, Elizabeth Drake," Page 195

"On July 10, 1786, appeared before Thomas Tredwell, Judge of the Court of Probate, Caleb Sutton, of New York, being of the People called Quakers, who affirmed that he wrote the will from the direction of Thomas Griswold, and Mary, the wife of said Thomas Wright, who told him that they had talked to the testator before upon the subject. And that during the whole time, both of writing the said will, and of executing it, which was near two hours, the testator appeared to be of insane mind, and he heard him speak but little, but that all he heard him speak appeared to be totally irrational and flighty. And he was very ill and near his end, and he believed that he died the same day the will was wrote and executed.

"It was adjudged that the will was null and void, through the insanity of the testator,

"Affidavit of Elizabeth Wright. That after her father's death she conversed with Elizabeth Drake, one of the witnesses, as to how her father was previous to his death. And she said it was difficult telling, as he did not appear to be in his rational senses for some days before his death, July 8, 1786. (See will of Thomas Wright on p. 195)" - see above. Page 207

The Friends Calendar

Prior to 1752 the tenth month was December; ninth month was November; eighth month was October, and seventh month was September....March was the first month.

Further, the ingenuous descendant should understand "Old Style" and "New Style" dates as well as double dating. But above all, the compulsive modifiers and changers of dates need comprehend the loss of eleven days at the time of the change. The day following September 3, 1752, became September 14, 1752. In Quaker parlance September was Ninth Month.

Friends handled the change of the months thus - London Yearly Meeting issued the following advice which was followed by

all Friends meetings:

"The opinion of the said committee, agreed to by the Yearly Meeting was, that in all the records and writings of Friends, from and after the last day of Tenth Month, called December, next, the computation of time established by the said act (of Parliament), should be observed; and that according to the first day of Eleventh Month, commonly called January, next shall be reckoned and deemed by Friends, the first day of the First Month of the year 1752...."

Prior to the 3rd of the Ninth Month 1752, the following month system was in use.

1st. Month was March

2nd. Month was April

3rd. Month was May

4th. Month was June

5th. Month was July

6th. Month was August

7th. Month was September

8th. Month was October

9th. Month was November

10th. Month was December

11th. Month was January

12th. Month was February

"According to the notes of Dr. Isaac Summner Wright, son of Joshua, son of John and Jemima (Haworth) Wright, the Wright families emigrated from England to Georgia in 1732. General James Edward Oglethrope, who was born in London, England, in 1688, and who was also the founder of the Colony of Georgia, married a Wright in England and when he came to the colony of Georgia the Wright families came also. We are not informed as to the number of the families in this emigration, neither is there anything in Doctor's papers to tell us why some of the Wright families were in South Carolina as early as 1743, however, the writer believes that the reason can very easily be found in the following sentence from Eggleston's history of the United States. Speaking of the Colony of Georgia he says: "The complaints of the settlers became very bitter and many of them left the colony." This occured between the founding in 1732 and the surrendering of the government to the King in 1752.

John and James Wright who married into the family of James Haworth,

son of the Emigrant in South Carolina, were of this same family. We are also informed that Joseph A. Wright, who at one time was Governor of Indiana, was a son of a brother to John and James Wright, but as to whether John and James were the sons of John and Rachel (Wells) Wright or not I do not know."

ORIGIN OF THE SURNAME WRIGHT. By S. Grant Oliphant, A.M., Ph.D.

WRIGHT IS OCCUPATIVE. WRIGHT is a familiar occupative surname. The Anglo-Saxon wyrhta and Middle English wrighte, wrihte, wruhte, wurhte and write, in their widest sense, signified a workman of any kind, but especially an artificer in hard metals. As smith became a general term for a worker in metals and then more specifically the worker in iron, the blacksmith, so wright, when unqualified, came to mean the worker in wood, then specifically the carpenter.

In this sense it was understood in Chaucer's time, as he writes in his Prologue, 614:

"He was a wel good wrighte, a carpentere."

Some idea of its application, however, may be gathered from its many compounds which became surnames, e.g., Allwright (awl), Arkwright, Boatwright. Cartwright, Goodwright (goad), Plowright, Shipwright, Sievewright, Wainwright, Wheelwright, Millwright, Tillwright, etc. The names Cheesewright, Copperwright, Glasswright and Shoewright show workmanship in other materials than wood.

The Hundred Rolls have the surname as Le Wricte and Le Wrytte. In mediaeval records it was frequently Latinized as Faber, both in England and on the Continent.

The Anglo-Saxon wyrhta is literally "a worker," as it is derived from the verb wyrcan, "to work." The Old High German wurchen, Old Norse yrkja, Gothic wuaurkjan, "to work;" Gallic vergo, "work;" Breton guerg, "effective;" Irish do(f)airci, "work;" Greek (v)ergon, "work;" Armenian gorts, "work;" Persian barz, varz, "field labor;" Avestan verezyeiti, "work, labor;" Sanskrit varjati vrnakti, "turn," and vrjanam, "offering" sufficiently represent the many cognates of this word.

PREFACE In compiling and writing this little book, or record, no attempt has been made to have it interesting to any person except those whose names appear herein, their relatives, or friends.

My intention was to begin with the first Wrights that settled in

Dorchester and Somerset Counties, Eastern Shore of the Province of Maryland; thence follow each family through their several branches to the present generation.

The work was first begun nearly twenty years ago, by obtaining information from well-authenticated traditional sources, examining thousands of pages of books and records, writing hundreds of letters, traveling as many miles, and scores of personal interviews.

The work had not progressed far before it was found necessary to abandon the idea of following the branches of a greater portion of the families, on account, mainly, of the failure to interest a sufficient number of the hosts of Wrights to give such information as they had, or could easily procure, for compilation. A few, however, contributed cheerfully, and to them I am very thankful for their assistance.

Owing to the inquiries received from many of the present generation of Wrights, seeking information pertaining to their paternal ancestors, the following plan has been decided upon: that the first part of this book be devoted to the Wrights in general, giving as much information concerning them as I have in hand from their first record known by me after they settled on the Eastern Shore, on and until after the Colonial period, except in a few cases where the information has been obtained, will be continued until more recent years. The second and remaining part, or parts, of the book to be devoted execlusively to the record of Jesse Wright, his paternal ancestors, and his descendants, and also the names of those connecting with this family by marriage.

Great difficulty was experienced by the almost total absence of middle names from the first name that was found on the records until more than one hundred and twenty-five years afterwards. The work was also made very tedious and perplexing by the Christian names of many persons being seldom spelled or used as when first given them in infancy, but an entirely different name used instead of the correct or real one.

The question is frequently asked, is this family of Wrights related to that or the other one. Carefully guarded tradition, as handed down and told by more than one very aged person, is to the effect that there were five brothers that came from England and settled on the Eastern Shore: no one possessing the information could give the names of more than two of the five. And from still another person well versed in the traditions pertaining to the Wrights, ventures the statement that there were seven brothers that left England, five of which located as previously stated, and the other two in Baltimore County.

I am not able to prove conclusively that there were seven, or even five, of the Wrights that were brothers, neither can I gainsay it.

I have information, however, based on facts, showing that John Wright resided in Talbot County in 1698; also did one Samuel Wright in 1704.

William Wright and his brother James settled Dorchester County about 1682.

And Edward Wright settled in Somerset County previous to 1680.

Also that some Wrights settled in Baltimore County about the same time as the other five did on the Eastern Shore. There was great similarity in the Christian names of the descendants of the Wrights of Dorchester and Somerset, also in the names of the descendants of an Edward Wright that settled in Dorchester County, Md., near the line between the states of Maryland and Delaware, many years after the arrival of the other five.

Owing to there being an incomplete and in most cases no record kept in the offices of the various counties, of the licenses inssued for persons to marry, previous to about 1775 or 1780, that character of information could not be given to any great extent any further back.

It can be well said of the Wrights whose names appear in this Preface as having emigrated to the Eastern Shore of the Province of Maryland, that they were manly and of the high type of moral character, adhering strictly to the tenets of the religious faith of their choice, and none of their descendants should think of them without a feeling of pride and satisfaction, of having descended from such worthy and noble ancestry.

Rev. Frank M. Bristol, D.D., paster of the Metropolitan M. E. Church, often called "the President's Church", at Washington, once said that there were many persons that could not follow their family tree far without finding some relative hanging from a limb. It is a pleasure to here state that I have not found where any member of the many families mentioned in this little book has had their animation thus suspended.

CHAPTER I.

"WRIGHTS OF MARSHYHOPE, DORCHESTER COUNTY, MARYLAND. William and James Wright, two brothers, came from England, supposedly from Bristol, about the year 1682, with one of William Penn's Colonies, and settled in the Province of Maryland above Noris Ford* on the Marshyhope Creek, the head water of the North-West Fork River, a tributary of the Nanticoke that extended through that portion of

Dorchester that in 1773 became a part of Caroline County, Md. The Marshyhope extended far beyond Maryland and well up into the Province of Delaware, and the emigrant brothers may have settled far enough up this Creek so that when the line was finally established between Maryland and Delaware they were near the line dividing the two provinces.

The Ship "Welcome," Capt. Cuthbert Greenaway, arrived at Philadelphia in 1682 with 176 of Penn's colonists, but the name of neither William nor James Wright appear on her passenger list. About that time the ships "Sarah and John" and "Bristol Factor" arrived with a large number of colonists. The name "Bristol Factor" is rather suggestive that they may have arrived on her.

The two brothers were finally known as Nicholite or Quaker Wrights, on account of their strict adherence to a very pious and religious sect called Nicholite Friends which had its stronghold in that section of country bordering on the upper Northwest-Fork River and Marshyhope Creek. This sect derived the name Nicholite from a very influential and pious Joseph Nichols, who organized the society which styled themselves friends and called their organization or society "Northwest-Fork Nicholite Friends", and, no doubt, there much similarity between them and Friends. The two Wright brothers were not only co-workers with Mr. Nichols, but became more prominent by making long journeys as preachers to large meetings of The Nicholites' first permanent place of public worship in a meeting house they erected on the banks of what is still known as Quaker Meeting House Branch, a stream flowing into the Northwest-Fork River, near Federalsburg. William and James were not the only Wrights that worshipped here, for also did several generations of their descendants, even after the Meeting House was moved to Piney Grove, about two miles west of Federalsburg, where they continued to worship in the plain old temple that had been made larger to accommodate an increased attendance. Piney Grove was not a more sacred or hollowed spot than that of the old location but more convenient to a greater number of the homes of the devout and faithful.

Of James Wright's descendants, if there be any, no record is known to have been kept. A record, however, has been kept of many of William's descendants and may be traced through some branches down to the present generation; more especially down through the line of his son William, his son John, and his son Peter; and the reader will not follow the branches of his offspring far before being convinced that he was the head of the most numerous families of Wrights on the Maryland and Delaware peninsula.

Naomie Wright is supposed to have been a sister of the brother emigrants and was also a devout Friend residing in Sussex County, Del., near the Marshyhope, who, with Joseph Atkins, also of same county and faith, appeared before the Friends at "Thirdhaven" on the 23rd day, 12th month, 1698, and publicly announced their

intention to become husband and wife. They likewise made the same public declaration on the 30th day, 1st month, 1699, before a Friends' meeting at the house of William Stevens, on Dividing Creek, Talbot County."

James WRIGHT

James Wright, an elder of Hopewell Monthly meeting, was one of the first settlers in that part of Virginia. He was a sober, honest man, grave in manners, and solid and weighty in his conversation. He was diligent in the attendance of his religious meetings, exemplary in humble waiting therein, and of a sound mind and judgment. He was cautious of giving just offence to any one, and was earnestly concerned for the unity of the brethren, and the peace of the church. "He appeared," say his friends, concerning him, "for some time before his last illness, as one who had finished his day's work, and who was waiting for his change." He departed this life Fifth month 15th, 1759, in the 83d year of his age.

"Land-hunting had become almost an obsession for a large segment of the people. Quakers were not immune to the appeal of virgin land, and events in the life of James Wright and his son John indicate that they, too, were addicted to its lure. They and their wives, the grandparents and parents of Charity Wright, were in the midst of this eager search for new land and new homes, and each experience added a new chapter to their migratory life.

We get our first glimpse of James and Mary Wright and their son, John Wright, at East Nottingham in the western part of Chester County, Pennsylvania. It is not known if the Wright family was among the first settlers in that community, but John, the fifth of the eleven children, was born there in 1716. At that time East Nottingham settlement was only twelve years old: it was truly a part of backcountry of Chester County.

The James Wright family left East Nottingham in 1725 and joined with other Quakers in founding a colony on Monocacy Creek, a few miles south of the present city of Frederick, Maryland. Here the family continued to experience the rigors of pioneer life through the first nine years of the history of that settlement. At Monacacy the James Wright family grew from eight to eleven children, but the size of the family did not deter James and Mary from pulling up stakes and striking out for another new frontier.

In 1734 James and Mary Wright, and at least some of their children, joined Alexander Ross, Josiah Ballinger, and a few other Friends in beginning a Quaker settlement at Hopewell, near the present city of Winchester, Virginia. Here James Wright joined John Littler in acquiring 438 acres of land on Apple Pie Creek, five miles north of Winchester. At the time of this surge to the farthest point into the interior of the English settlement, it is not known how many of the children of James and Mary Wright were with them. At least two were married: Mary and her husband Josiah Ballinger were among the first settlers, and it is possible that Hannah and her husband Henry Ballinger were among them. It is assumed that John Wright, at that time eighteen years of age, was with his parents when they moved into Virginia.

When the Hopewell Meeting records were burned, the account of the wedding of John Wright and Rachel Wells must have been obliterated, but since their first child was born in April, 1738, it is assumed that they were married in 1737. It is known, however, that they made their home within the limits of Monocacy Meeting, and it seems

probable that they were married there.

Quakerism seems to have provided a strong moral and religious fiber in the life of James Wright and his family. He was held in high esteem by Friends in Philadelphia Yearly Meeting. He has been characterized as "... a distinguished minister of Friends and with minutes from Hopewell Monthly Meeting traveled widely in the exercise of his ministry." His place in the minds of Friends who were at the center of the yearly meeting may be inferred from the action of the Meeting for Sufferings of that yearly meeting:

He sustained much loss at the time of the French and Indian War and, with his wife Mary, was the object of much concern of the Meeting for Sufferings in Philadelphia which issued instructions that one-fifth of the money sent at that time for the relief of Friends in the ravaged district be lay'd out for the use of our aged Friends James Wright and his wife.

The Clerk of Hopewell Meeting throws some light on the plight of James and Mary Wright. He recorded that "Also our ancient Friend James Wright and wife are much reduced, being driven from their Habitation and unable to labour for a livelihood."

Some historians are inclined to speak disparagingly of the character of the society which settled on the frontier, least one traveling minister of the Society of Friends left a description of the community of Friends in the Fairfax Meeting of northern Virginia which was less than complimentary. Though the cultural level of some of the Quakers in the backcountry settlements could have been low, there is sufficient evidence to suggest that the Wright family stood above that level. The testimonials given above, relative to the position of the leadership and religious stature of James Wright, lead to the belief that he and his family were in a respectable cultural level. Just before leaving East Nottingham, James Wright was appointed by that meeting to write wedding certificates, a position which must be an indication of his educational qualifications.

Being classed as "a distinguished minister of the Society of Friends...who traveled widely in the exercise of his ministry," places him among the spiritual leaders of the Society, and he initiates, in his family, a succession of itinerant ministers in three successive generations in the line of his descent: his daughter Martha Wright Mendenhall; his daughter-in-law, Rachel Wells Wright; and two of his granddaughters, Charity Wright Cook and her sister Susannah Wright Hollingsworth. Much of the history of the Wright family, and much of the spirit and achievements of the family, must have been planted in the mind and life of Charity Wright by her parents and other relatives."

"A good many years ago Willard HEISS gave me the following....It gives the names of children of Thomas WRIGHT:

From the Furnas Collection Book A, page 9 et seq."

"I inscribe the following to my son Isaac H. Furnas. I was born in the state of South Carolina, Newberry district, on the 2nd of the 11th month 1798, my parents names were Thomas and Elizabeth Wright. My father was a son of John and Rachel Wright.

I think my grandfather John Wright was born in Pennsylvania. My grandmother was born in Wales. Her maiden name was Wells.

My mother's maiden name was Jay her parents went from North Carolina to South Carolina, where they died, before I was born. I do not know their given names. My grandmother Jay's maiden name was Vestal.

My mother deceased in the 10th month 1803. I am not in possession of the day of the month that she died.

I was taken soon after mother's death from South Carolina to the state of Ohio, which accounts for my limited knowledge of our familys history, I being then very young. I went with Uncle Isaac Hollingsworth and his wife Susanna my own aunt, she being my father's sister. My father remained in Carolina years after that but I do not know exactly how many years.

He deceased in Indiana the 30th of the 4th 1835 - And was buried in Friends burying ground at White River Monthly Meeting Randolph Co., Ind. near Winchester Town, the County seat. My mother was buried in friends burying ground at Bush River Monthly Meeting. She being a member of the Society of Friends was received at her request.

As also I was received by request at Center Monthly Meeting, Ohio, Clinton County in 1818, near Wilmington the county seat. My grandparents were buried in South Carolina too - I suppose in the same burying place with my mother.

My fathers parents were married in Pennsylvania, from there they moved to North Carolina where for a time grandfather traded in dry goods until by misfortune he went security for the sheriff that failed, which cost grandfather many thousands of dollars. After that change of circumstances they removed to the south where they ended their days. She was a valuable minister and much esteemed by friends to the end of her time in this world. When my mother died she left seven children, I being the youngest except one. The oldest one Gabriel died in Carolina and left a family there. Sally the next oldest 79 years old at this writing lives in Indiana. Susanna the next died in Ohio. Isaac the next died in Georgia and left a family there. Charlotte the next lives in Iowa. I was next. Our youngest brother Thomas Wright died in Illinois. All of us (mother's children) lived to be married and have families..."
