

West Clairmont Mennonite Cemetery -- NW22-072-06 W6



The West Clairmont Mennonite Cemetery is located about nine kilometers north west of the city of Grande Prairie.

The Mennonite Church and cemetery served about fourteen families living in the area at one time.

A cairn, erected by the County of Grande Prairie in 1975, reads:

ZION CONGREGATIONAL CEMETERY -- REMFER
NW13-32-26 W4

The Zion Congregational Cemetery is located thirteen miles west of Three Hills on Highway 583, and two and one half miles north. There is an old building on the property, and only a few graves in the southwest corner. This cemetery appears to have been used for a short time, with the first burial being dated 27 February 1930, and the last one 15 September 1961.

The plot plan for this cemetery is very simple -- two rows of graves, numbering from 1 to 7, south to north.

FATH HILL CATHOLIC CEMETERY -- NW32-014-24 W4

The early Roman Catholic Parish of the Immaculate Conception consisting of about 34 families, was started around 1911, served by Father Beausoliel, who covered the country south of High River by horseback. The church was located on SE05-015-24 W4, the land having been donated by Helen Fath. The cemetery was located less than one half mile down the road on NW32-014-24 W4, on land donated by Robert and Joyce Fath.

The following item (quoted from the 'Champion Chronicle') dated 10 October 1929:

"The removal of the Catholic Church (Church of the Immaculate Conception) from Fath's Hill to Champion, which took place this week, robs the country site of a landmark of many years". The paper goes on to say that the church building was moved to a site just north of Louis Fath's residence.

The building was enlarged, and in 1966 a whole new church was built, with the Parish renamed 'St. Mary's'.

GALLUP FARM CEMETERY (Inactive)
NW18-021-15 W4
Rosemary, Alberta

Location: About 3 miles north of Rosemary, immediately north of Leroy Gallup's house.

History: Before the Rosemary Cemetery was begun, this location was used as a community cemetery. The land originally belonged to Mr. Watson, a relative of the present owner. It is believed that the land was donated for use as a cemetery.

Mr. Henry Tiessen, of Rosemary, has the names of all the Mennonite burials in this location. There are also two non-Mennonite burials here.

There is no existing plot plan for this cemetery. All records are taken from the Rosemary Mennonite Church and a local history book.

SUNNYSIDE ANGLICAN CEMETERY (NE01-055-24 W4)

The abandoned site of Sunnyside Anglican Church is located three miles east and one mile north of the village of Namao (just north of C.F.B. Namao, Edmonton).

Sunnyside Anglican Church and its churchyard cemetery were located on a forty acre plot of land, part of NE 1-55-24 W4, granted under the 'Dominion Land Act', during the tenure of Bishop Henry Allen Gray, (about 1893). The cemetery occupies a small plot, about 2 acres.

On the rest of the property a log building was built, used variously as the Anglican Church, the residence for the rector, (Rev. Rickard?), and the local school (until 1898). This building fell into disuse, collapsed, and the ruins later burned off. Gradually the site became disused and forgotten. Community old timers think that there were 27 or 28 burials in the cemetery.

The cemetery is now heavily overgrown with brush and trees, and forgotten by all but a few. The rest of the property has now become farm land.

During the last fifteen years several efforts at recording this cemetery have been made by members of the Alberta Genealogical Society -- Charles Denney and the late Pearl Greenslade in the years between 1973 and 1980, and more recently members of the A.G.S Edmonton Branch, under the chairmanship of Peter Goutbeck.

The following burials have been identified:

- #1 Annie Laurie Squarebriggs, beloved wife of Dan Squarebriggs. (d. tuberculosis
Also daughter Jennie, age 18, of tuberculosis, d. before 1907.
Dan Squarebriggs ran a grist mill on the Sturgeon River. He is likely buried here, with his wife and daughter.
- #s 2 and 3 Taylor children: died about 1896 and 1897. Children of Mr. and Mrs. George Taylor. (Mrs. Taylor daughter of Charles Brummer, Battleford.) Graves once surrounded by wooden fence.
- #6 Sarah Jane Peters - sister of William Henry Peters
- #7 William Henry Peters
- #8 George Henry Willows - father of Susannah Gibbons; came from England in July 1892 via Kansas and Calgary to visit his daughter.
- #9 Edward Sleap - Travelling piano teacher, well known in the district. Had been a sailor from England, lived with Mr. and Mrs. Gibbons, Sr.
- #10 Charles Francis Cardinell -- lived with Gibbons, a Metis lad who travelled west with them in 1892 after his father was killed in the Ontario woods.
- #11 William Reynolds Gibbons -- born Brocklesby, Lincolnshire, England, arrived in Edmonton 17 May 1892, from Coldwater (w. of Orillia), Ontario; d. 27 February 1893 after surgery.
- #12 Hannah Lucy Reynolds -- daughter of George Alfred and Hannah (nee Gibbons) Reynolds.

Sunnyside Anglican Cemetery -- continued

On a grave marker unearthed in the north east corner of the cemetery in May 1978 two inscriptions appear:

#13 Benjamin Hewitt, d. 19 August 1901, 50 yrs.

#14 Wilbert E. Hewitt, died 08 April 1893, Age 12 yrs 6mos., gun accident.

Remembered but unmarked burials:

#15 Mabel Amella Kibblewhite, age 32, buried 21 October 1917; wife of George Kibblewhite and mother of of William J. Kibblewhite, Kathleen (Mrs. Jack Corcoran of Ardrossan), Theresa (Rose), Florence Gertrude Kibblewhite, and Ruby Audrey (Facey), all of Edmonton. Husband George Kibblewhite is believed buried in the Edmonton Cemetery, near the Mausoleum.

#16 Susannah Gibbons, nee Willows, wife of William Reynolds Gibbons, age 74 yrs, buried 23 June, 1927.

#17 Marianne Hewitt, wife of Benjamin Hewitt, died about December 1902.

#18 Lucy Hewitt, daughter of Jeff and Winnie Hewitt, age 5 yrs., died of scarlet fever circa 1910.

#19 Agnes Hewitt, wife of Ernie Hewitt and sister of John Milligan, died 1911. Note: Children of Benjamin and Marianne Hewitt are: Walter (in South Africa), Jeffrey (father of Lucy), Albert, Edith, Byron, Wilbert (see above), Ernie and Rex.

#20 Clair Goodwin, wife of Archie Goodwin, age 50s, died 01 December 1910. Mother of John Goodwin, d. 1978 or 1979, and 11 others, including Elmer, Menzo, Willie, Maude McHugh, Frank, Rollo and Lea. Came from Wisconsin in 1909. The grave was originally marked by a nail-punched plate mounted on a steel post, (this plate long displaced to another location in the cemetery).

#21 Charles Clark Maxfield, 14 Sept. 1837-January 1919, and his wife

#22 Janet Sudella Maxfield, 09 Sept. 1840-02 May 1895, wife of Charles Clark Maxfield.

#23 Priscilla Sybil Carson, 02 Dec. 1870-31 Dec. 1895, dau. Charles Clark and Janet (nee Sudella) Maxfield, and wife of Joe Carson, mother of Hazel (Mrs. Jim) Portlock.

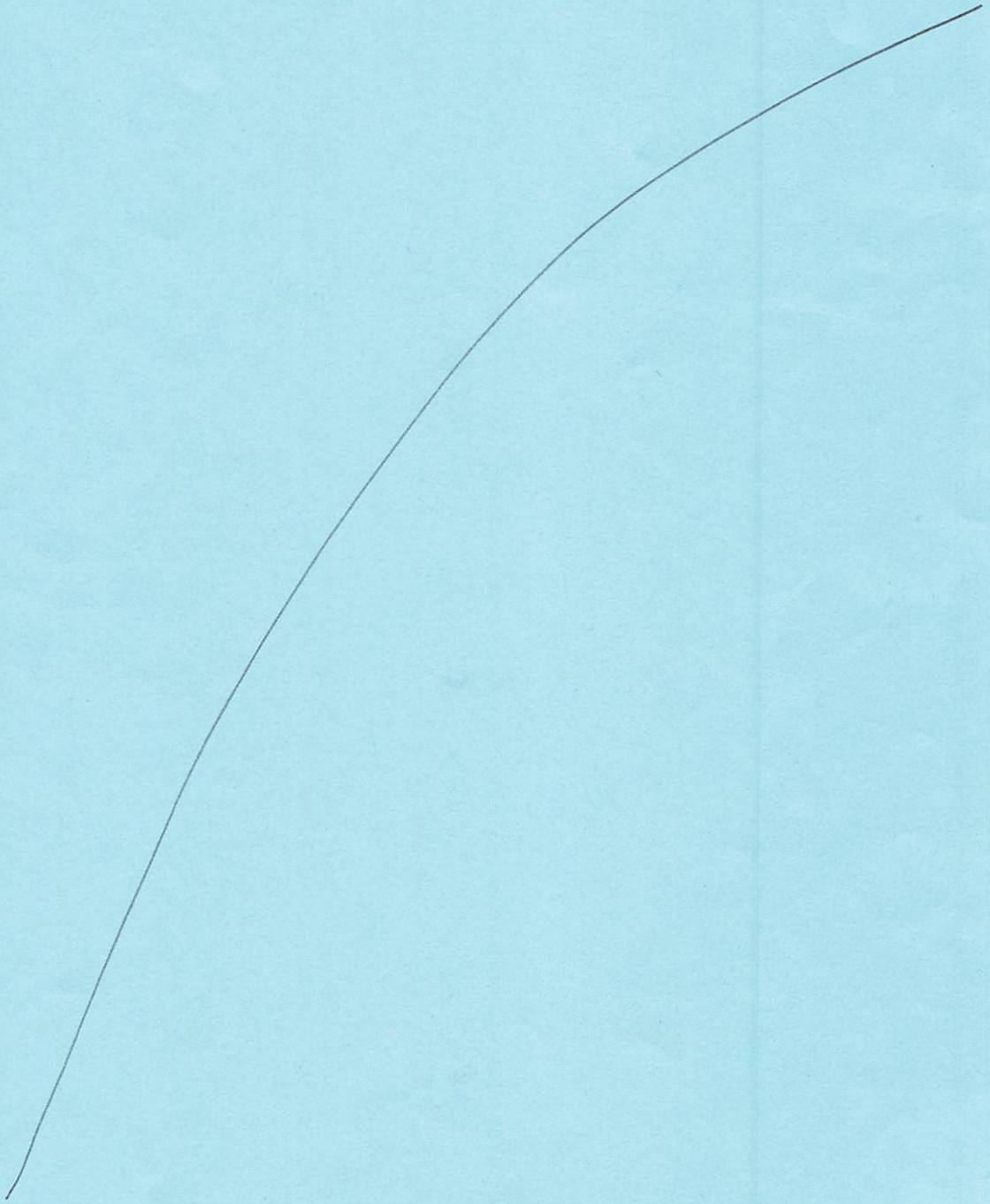

It was first situated where the Airdrie overpass is today; and before #2 highway construction began, the cemetery was moved to the present location, which is approximately one mile south of the town on the east side of Highway #2.

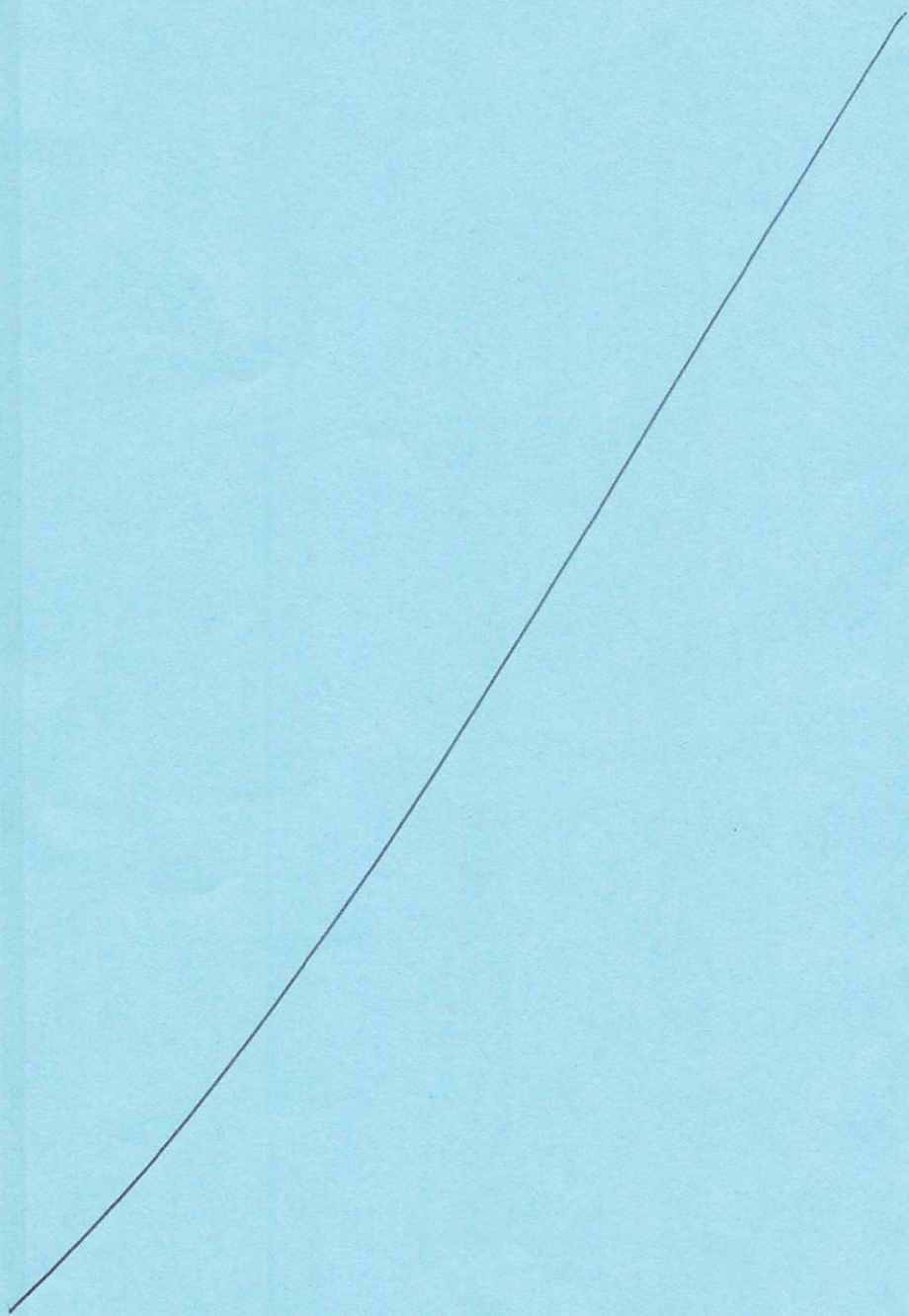

SAME NAMES IN AREA AREN'T CLUE TO ANCESTRY by Strome Galloway

Amateur genealogists often assume that people with the same family name are related, particularly if their ancestors once lived in the same area.

This is nonsense.

People with the same surname living in the same Old Country hamlet five hundred years ago were not necessarily kinfolk.

Their names, even when spelled the same, frequently came from entirely different sources.

In Saxon England every daub-and-wattle village or baronial manor had its millers, carters, smiths and wainwrights (wagonbuilders), to mention only a few trades.

As these occupations became surnames, many a SMITH, or even a SMYTH or a SMYTHE had neighbors of the same name but not the same blood.

CLAN CUSTOM

In clannish Scotland, many a stranger, on moving into the clan area, took the chief's name and became one of the boys. Hence we have MAC DONALDS, MAC KENZIES, CAMPBELLS and CAMERONS galore.

In Celtic Ireland, the same system prevailed.

Thus names like O'BRIEN, O'CONNOR and FITZGERALD were borne by prince and peasant alike.

Sometimes the same name has no connection at all. One Ontario example is LANG. The prominent Kitchener tanning family of LANG is German in origin.

Its founder was REINHOLD LANG, a native of a Rhineland village in southern Germany, who arrived in Upper Canada in 1849.

A few miles north in Bruce County, near Tara, a pioneer family named LANG were natives of County Donegal in Ireland.

Their Scottish forebears were probably among those thousands of Protestants whom King James I and later Cromwell "planted" in the Emerald Isle to cultivate the farms from which Irish Catholic rebels had been expelled.

LANG had been a common enough surname among Renfrewshire farmers for generations.

In both Germany and Scotland the name is not only spelled the same way, but means the same thing.

PASSION PLAYERS

LANG is "long" in both languages. The most famous German family named LANG have for about 200 years been Passion Play actors at Oberammergau.

ANTON LANG played the Christus in 1910.

In Britain, COSMO GORDON LANG, a Scotsman, is best remembered as being Archbishop of Canterbury at the time of King Edward VIII's abdication.

There are FRALEYS and FRALEIGHS scattered all over Ontario.

While some of these may be of English descent, *ley* and *leigh* being suffixes of Anglo-Saxon origin meaning a lea or tract of open pasture land, at least one group of FRALEIGHS were originally FROELICH, a German family name meaning "cheerful".

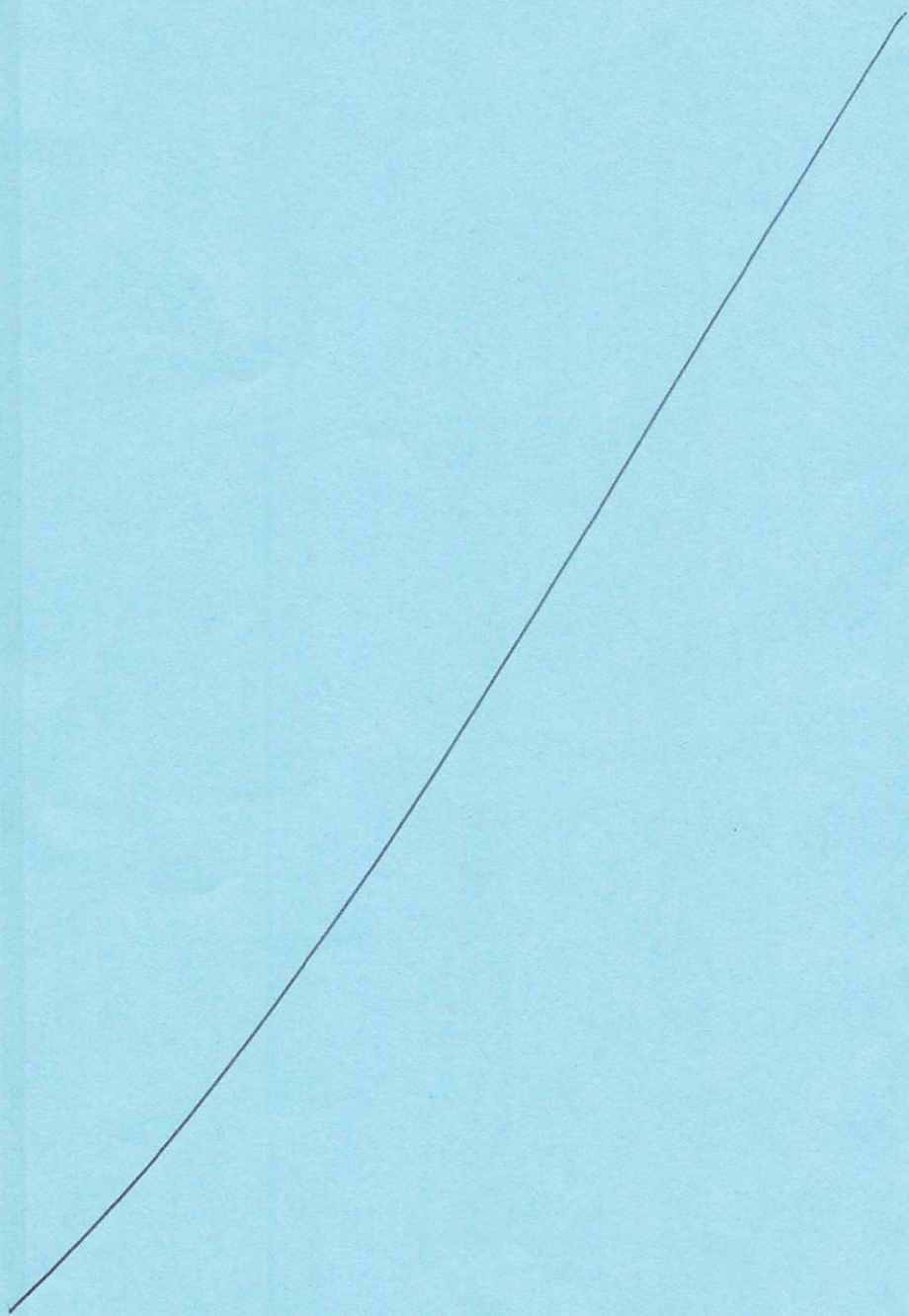
Former prime minister John G. DIEFENBAKER is a member of an Ontario family which helped open up the bush in what is now the beautiful farmland lying between Lake Erie and Georgian Bay.

This family was of Germanic origin. There is a village of DIEFENBACK in Canton Uri, Switzerland.

The name means "deep brook" and a DIEFENBACHER was a "deep brooker", i.e., one who came from that particular Swiss village, or from some similar brookside elsewhere.

DIEFENBAKER's maternal descent is from the BANNERMAN family, Highland Scots from Sutherlandshire. The original BANNERMANS held the hereditary office of standard bearers to the City of Aberdeen.

It can be approached from Highway 1A West of
Cochrane. After crossing Jacob's Creek, the
McDougall Memorial Church is on one's left. The
Wesley Band Cemetery is the next road on the
right up the hill about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile north of the
church. From here one has a beautiful vista
view of the valley of the Bow River.

This property was originally issued to the Mis-
sionary Society of the Methodist Church at the
urging of the Rev. John McDougall, for the pur-
pose of a burial ground. The first burial
was that of his father, the Rev. George McDoug-
all on February 10, 1876.

After the signing of the Blackfoot Treaty #7 in
1877 the Stoney Band became the owner of the
property and in 1888 a survey was made by John
G. Nelson D.L.S., North West Territories.

On January 23, 1889, the ownership was approved
by Ottawa.

This cemetery was recorded by the Calgary Branch
of the Alberta Genealogical Society in June 1976.
The latest burial recorded was Jawn Charles
Poucette in March 1976.

Genealogical Researcher's Group

The Genealogical Researcher's Group was formed in February 1978 to fulfil a need that was showing itself in the numbers of requests received by the Archives, the libraries and by our own Society. These requests were for assistance in tracing some information available in this area. Several members of the Edmonton Branch met to discuss the possibilities of providing this service to people from other provinces and countries. The members decided what areas they were prepared to cover in their research - how far they were prepared to travel away from the Edmonton area to do this research, what costs they would like reimbursement for and what they would like to charge for their time. A general agreement was arrived at and the first requests were assigned.

Our procedure up to date is to have a meeting at which are read the requests and the researcher interested will volunteer to look after that particular request. As chairman of the group, I then write to the person requesting the assistance, explaining the procedure we follow and giving them the name of the person who will be undertaking their request. I relate that the researcher will be contacting them soon and will outline whatever the financial arrangements are to be. These will be strictly between the researcher and the person requesting the service. Up to the date of this writing, we have had some twenty-five letters that have been dealt with in one way or another. If the answer requires referral to some other area or province or for some reason we cannot help, I answer the letter myself. Examples here would be a request for information on an ancestor in New Brunswick the request came from California- I gave the person an address in New Brunswick to write to for the information requested. Another letter came from England trying to locate relatives in Ontario so I sent the information to the Ontario Society. Another letter asked for information from Red Deer and I gave here the name of the city historian to whom she could write. Results have been varied. A number of letters sent by researchers to the persons requesting information are not answered - obviously the people writing are not prepared to pay for the research required to provide the answers they are looking for. One gentleman asking for information turned out to be a distant connection of one of the researchers and provided an extensive exchange of information - no charge of course. A small number only have been pre-

pared to pay for the services so I would not say that much money is to be made from doing this research for others. Our group feels it is providing a much needed service and will continue to do so. It is hoped that the other branches will soon be able to provide this service in their own area.

HIGH RISES IN CEMETERIES

Or through-ways. Why not. In Alberta this could happen since precedents have already been set and the Alberta government has no compunction contravening its own cemeteries act when it suits them.

This is what happened to the people of Seven Persons, a village near Medicine Hat: Around 1906 the Myer family, old time residents of the area, donated an acre of land to the community to be used as a cemetery. It seems likely this was accepted on behalf of the community by the Modern Woodsmen of America but no title was taken. A few years ago the land was sold and Alberta municipal Affairs took title to the cemetery and then leased it to the new land owner to run irrigation machinery through and graze cattle.

This was met with loud protests from the people in the area and the lease was subsequently cancelled but to all intents and purposes all the rights and privileges granted under the lease are still being enjoyed.

Petitions and protest to the Minister of Municipal Affairs have been ignored. It has been brought to the attention of the local M.L.A. and other departments but nothing has been done, which would indicate that there may be political considerations involved.

This is not an isolated incident in Alberta and readers, having moved from the rural scene, would be well advised to keep checking the cemeteries in which they have relatives buried, for they might not be able to find their graves when they do.

Ironically, another department of government, Alberta Culture and Historic Monuments has grants available to small-community groups to repair and fix up neglected cemeteries in their area. In this particular case, it is useless to try and fix up graves because of the use the cemetery is being put, and the graves are gradually becoming obliterated. The new land owner does not take kindly to anyone found in the cemetery.

Research so far has failed to turn up a cemetery plot chart and church records list only a few names of people buried there. Anyone having knowledge of this cemetery would have the grateful appreciation of the writer if they would get in touch with her. Partial records indicate the following names:

WHEN NOT TO RECORD A CEMETERY

The Big Country plain of Alberta is always a challenge. There are few landmarks to guide the traveller and roads criss-crossing at irregular intervals seem to lead to nowhere in particular. Communities that thrived in the early days of this century are erased from the landscape or boast few buildings now. But my husband spent his growing years near Hanna and knows much of that area like the back of his hand.

While visiting Hanna relatives in early April last year we had a couple of free hours on a Saturday morning. What to do. How about taking a look at Sunnynook cemetery fifty Km to the south-east? Good idea. Nice sunny day, slight breeze.

We already knew something about this cemetery, having made copies months before

of burial record and plot plan in the Special Areas offices. We knew that between 1921 and 1968 there were sixty-five burials. And we remembered the plot plan as a sophisticated looking layout entitled "M.D. of Flowerdale at Sunnynook". But those records were at home in Edmonton.

We bought two steno notebooks and felt pens (and apples) and set out east on Hwy #9. Driving south on #36 we could tell the wind had picked up. The road led east on the old road to Rose Lynn and south on the "pole line" past where the hamlet of Halladay once stood. The Sunnynook elevator could be seen ahead.

Just north of the abandoned village we turned east on the dirt road to the cemetery a half mile away. Mud. We got out and surveyed a bad spot and decided against trying it with no help for miles. So we started across the prairie keeping to the high spots, the route being directed by me on foot ahead. We were forced to leave the car mid-way to the cemetery. It was just too wet with runoff water covering the grass everywhere. The wind got stronger and we got colder, dog and I. But after coming that far we had to accomplish something. So Hugh pulled his cap down and I donned a kerchief and we trudged across the mucky field and through a fence to the road by the cemetery. We found the gate laying on the ground and the fence sagging in places. The few shrubs were a sorry sight.

We were surprised to see all the plots marked with iron pegs protruding four inches above the ground. But only a few headstones could be seen. Good. The job shouldn't take long. Hugh started at the south centre and I in the north-east corner and we met in the Catholic section on the west side. Of those sixty-five burials we found only seventeen markers. Some must have been beautiful at one time with ornate fencing around family plots now long neglected.

Chilled to the bone we made haste for the protection of the car. I didn't make it without incident, however. With only a short distance to go, suddenly whoosh! splash! BOTH notebooks were whipped out of the bag I carried and into the water. It took a good part of the drive back to dry all those pages with paper towelling, and even then the notebooks swelled to three times their normal size.

Our writing in hot pink was still very readable. Looking over our work I

noticed the burial of a small boy and wondered who his parents were. "Oh, the names are on the stone but my fingers were just too cold to write them down".

We should have known better than to go in April out there where you can see forty miles in any direction...or as I read in a newspaper, you can see for two or three days. The wind seldom stops blowing with nothing to hold it back.

It was a calm, warm day in mid-summer when we returned to Sunnynook cemetery for the inscription we missed. What a relief to see the gate in place and the fence mended. Somebody cared after all.

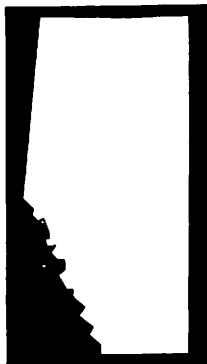

REPORT OF PROVINCIAL
CEMETERY RESEARCH

In 1978 three cemeteries were recorded by Calgary Branch and published in "Relatively Speaking".

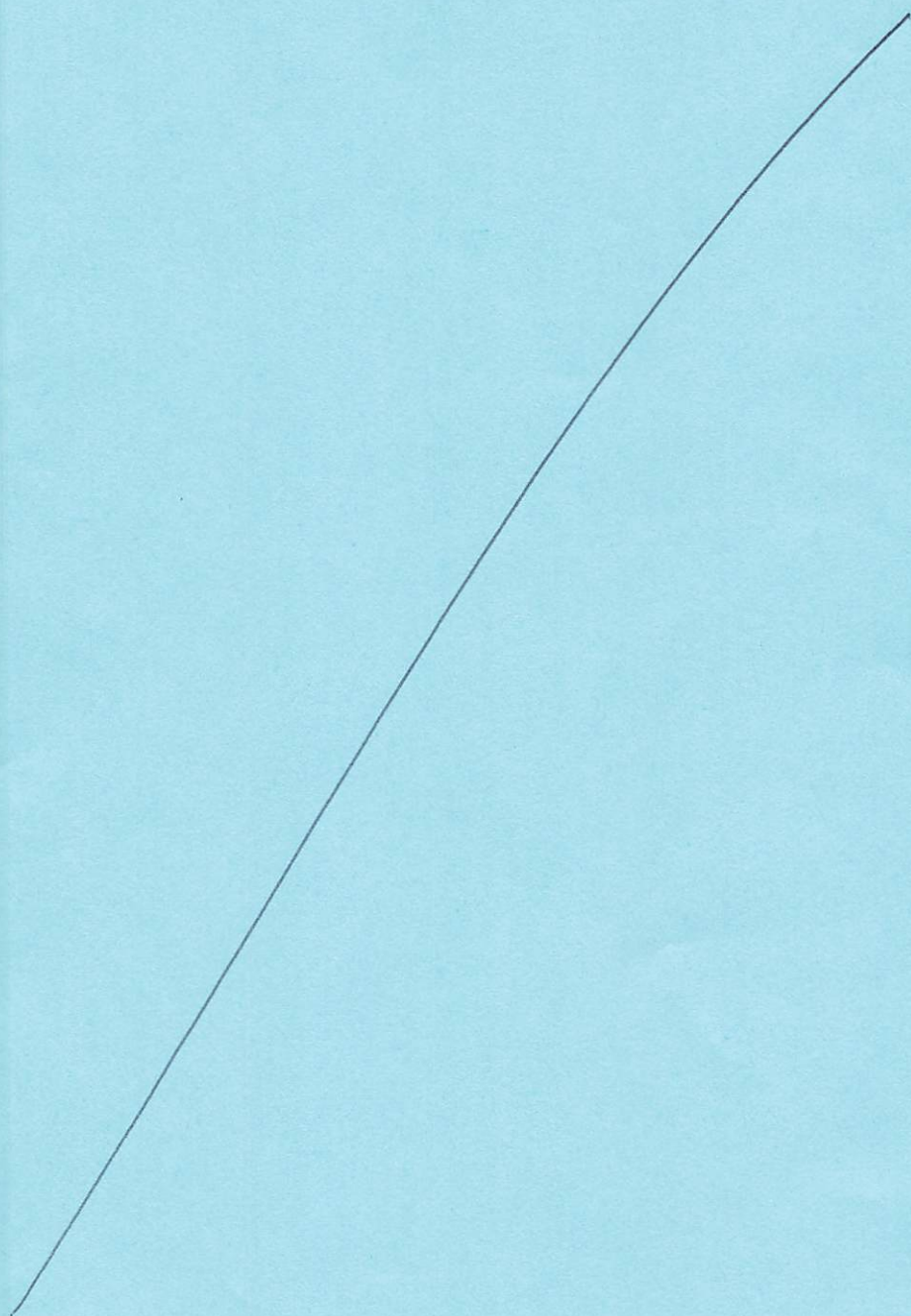
A complete list of cemeteries was supplied to the 3rd Vice-President. Also, Branches received Health Unit maps, lists of area cemeteries, and procedures for recording and publishing.

The cemetery list has grown to 1,594 by addition of 45 burial sites or 206 over the original list.

Cemetery material must be gathered to learn all details possible on early burials. To achieve this, a list is in preparation of depositories of cemetery records in provincial and church archives, county offices and so on.

Although general interest in cemetery research has been shown throughout the membership, co-ordinators have not been appointed in all Branches. It is hoped that these vacancies will be filled in 1979 after the newer Branches have become better established and members acquainted with cemetery recording procedures.

Evarts, the community post office which operated for 66 years ending June 30, 1969 is included in the cemetery name shown in the burial register. In 1905 a cemetery company was formed and two acres of land donated by a Mr. Olsen, so thinks the present Registrar, Mr. O.W. Nielsen of RR#3, Eckville. The burial register in his possession begins in May 1915. Unmarked earlier burials will remain unknown until records can be located. Some names shown on the plot are not listed in the register but are included here on the supposition that they could have been unregistered burials - at any rate those people once resided in the Evarts area. The west half of the cemetery is "free ground" with most graves along the fence. The east half is overcrowded, some graves being between blocks and out of line, necessitating the listing of names here in alphabetical order.

Cemetery recording was completed by H. & P. Greenslade of Edmonton on November 3, 1978 which is also the date of the latest burial. Mrs. Helen Brown.

Drive 1.6 km west on Hwy #11 from the Eckville turnoff, then 6.6 Km south on Sec. Hwy #766 and 1.5 Km east on the gravel road. The cemetery is on the north or left wide, well maintained by the community.

In this list of burials, headstone information is underlined, followed by details from the burial register and the plot plan. Locations given refer to residences and/or places of death.

Sunnynook Cemetery (Inactive... 66 burials)

This 2-acre cemetery was planned for over 1,200 burials but from 1921 to 1968 there were only 66. There was a farm on every half section in the early days but during the depression years most farmers moved away. The smallest blocks are for 6 burials, the next size for 12 and the largest for 24, all numbered from the SE to the SW corner in the first row, west to east in the next row, east to west in the next, and so on. Metal pegs mark the blocks Pagewire fence, tube gate, very few shrubs. Desolate.

Drive east from Hanna on Hwy #9, then south on #36 for 22.8 Km to the Rose Lynn sign, east 6 Km to what is known as the pole line, south 12 Km to the dirt road leading east 0.5 Km to the cemetery. Or from Hwy #1 drive north 32.3 Km on Hwy #36 to the Red Deer River bridge, continue north another 40 Km to the Sunnynook sign, east 13 Km on gravel, north past the ghost town of Sunnynook and east 0.5 Km to the cemetery. 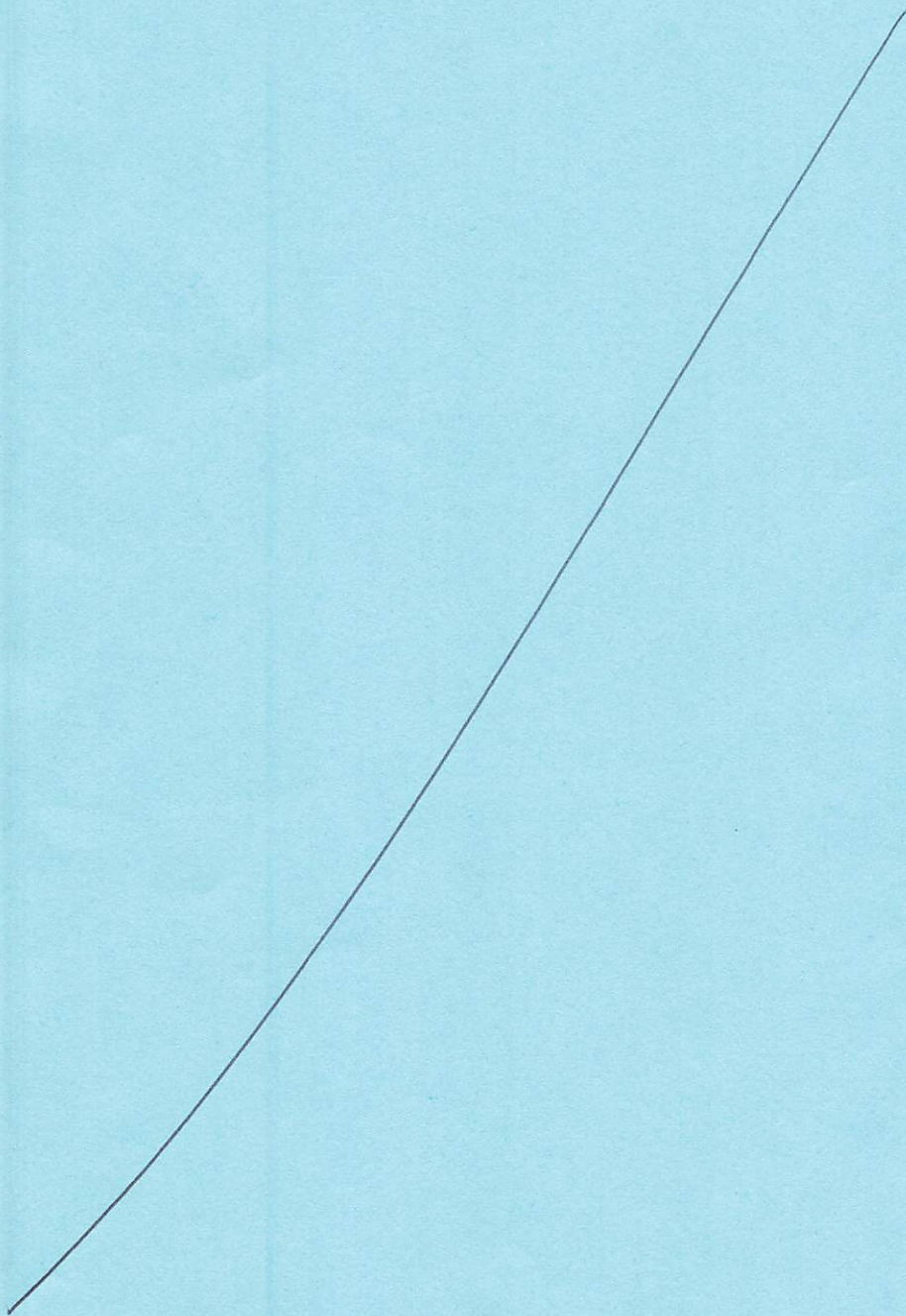

Cliveden War Cemetery Buckinghamshire, England

In the first World War of 1914-1918 Lord and Lady Astor lent Taplow Lodge and part of the grounds of Cliveden to the Canadian Red Cross who built a hospital.

Lord Astor then presented the grounds on which the hospital stood as well as Taplow Lodge to the Canadian Government who in turn agreed to vest the hospital to the National Trust.

In the grounds of Cliveden itself is a small War Cemetery for those who died in the Military Hospital.

A Corner of a Foreign Field

by Pearl Ward Browning

On a recent trip to Ecuador, we stayed in an isolated hotel on the Pacific coast, and I went one day to the nearby town of Ancon in the province of Guayas in search of a dentist.

Ancon was originally an oilfield camp of the Anglo-Ecuadorean Oil Co. The camp dates back to 1920, when a number of workers from England and Scotland were hired to work in the oilfield. They brought their wives and families, and many of them lived there until the company's contract expired, and the Ecuadorean Government took over the oilfield and the camp, in 1975.

After my visit to the dentist (for which, incidentally, he refused to take any payment), I walked around the little town, and down the road past the residential area - little bungalows for the married workers, dormitories for the bachelors, large two-story houses for the executives and a guest house. A few flame trees bloom in the tiny yards of the bungalows, with here and there a rose bush and a few dusty daisies. Apart from that, the streets are dusty and the countryside is desert. The road leads from the town to the larger houses and then to a cliff overlooking the Pacific Ocean. Vultures wheel slowly overhead, very high. The heat is horrendous.

Just outside the town is a small cemetery, surrounded by a high white wall. There is no sign on the gate but it is obviously not a Roman Catholic cemetery - there are no crosses. The graves are all identical covered with a concrete slab with plain headstones. It is the cemetery of the 'Anglos' - the British - those who did not return to Britain in 1975. There are 44 graves, 15 of them are the graves of infants. The

to whom they are more than names and
dates on stone.

(Location of graves according to 'Inside' or SE) (From Fencelines and Furrows, 1967)

The cemetery came into existence in 1919, although no graves were developed until 1921 (the village came into existence ca. 1912). Many of the early graves had only wooden markers to mark their sites. Subsequently, over time, some have rotted and have been misplaced. A children's section (in the southeast along the east boundary) of the cemetery shows that several graves exist (from the grass texture and land contour), however, no markers indicate individual grave sites. There are over 80 graves in the Blackie Cemetery at the time of this writing (June, 1979).

Notes

Pine Creek Cemetery

The cemetery, consisting of 2 acres, is situated on the N.W. 1/4 of Sec. 11, Twp. 22, Rge. 1, W.5. It can be reached from Highway 2 approximately 4 miles south of Calgary. From the intersection of Highway 2 and 22 it is 2 miles south, then after a left turn it can be found a short distance on the right hand.

In 1882 Mr. Edward Robb owned the land and lived on an adjoining section. In 1889 his daughter of 3 years, Edna Roberta, died and was buried on his land. He then gave this portion of his farm for the Pine Creek Cemetery.

Edna Roberta Robb's grave is marked by an iron fence built by the Pratt Brothers, blacksmiths of that time, pioneers who came in 1883. They lived directly west across the Macleod Trail. The DeWinton stopping house was later built on their land.

Mr. Edward Robb left the area in 1899. In 1900 the cemetery was registered as the property of the DeWinton Community.

In 1968 it was re-surveyed and corner markers were put in. Today it is maintained by a volunteer association with Mrs. W. J. Hamilton, Box 33, DeWinton, as president, and Jean Marshall as secretary-treasurer.

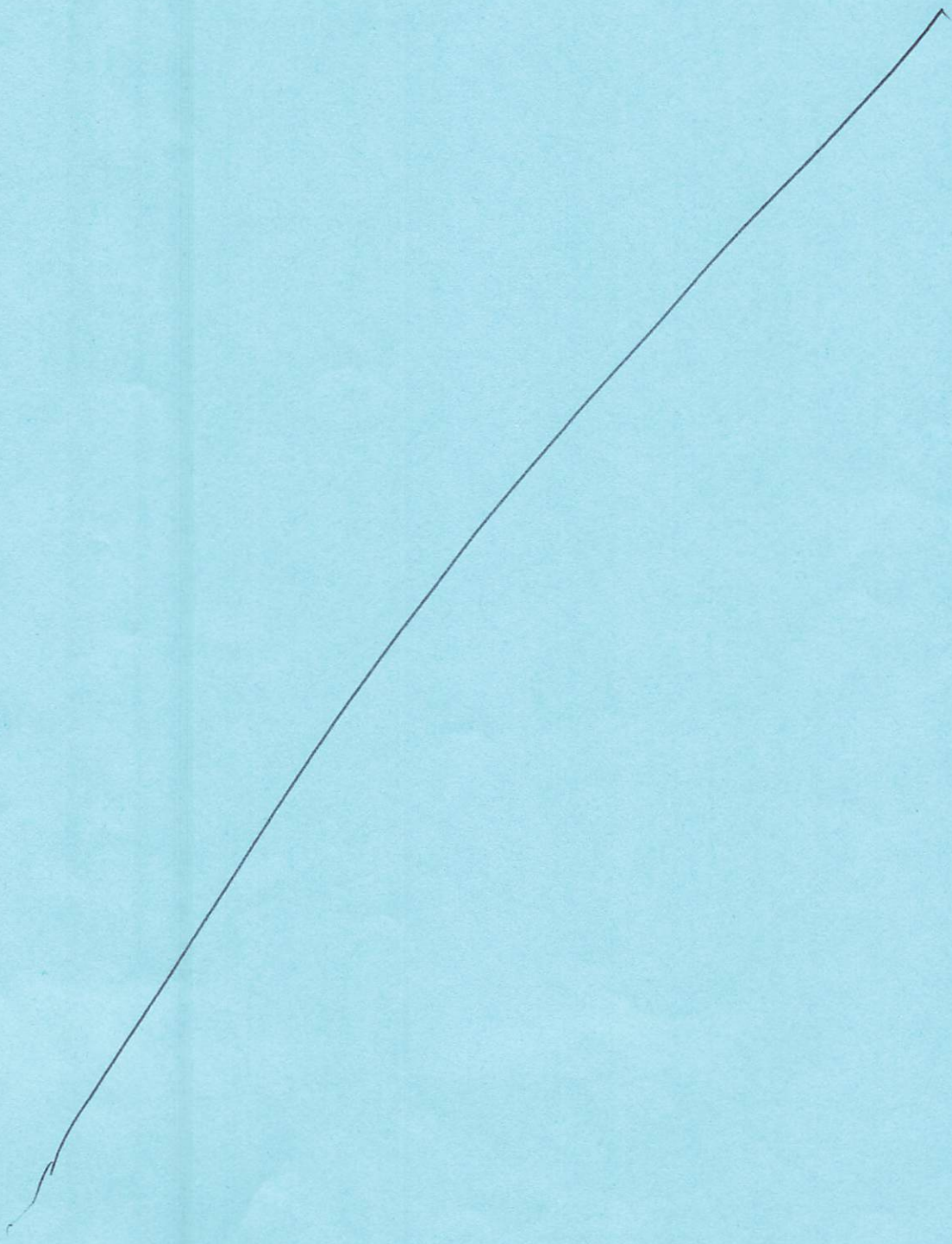

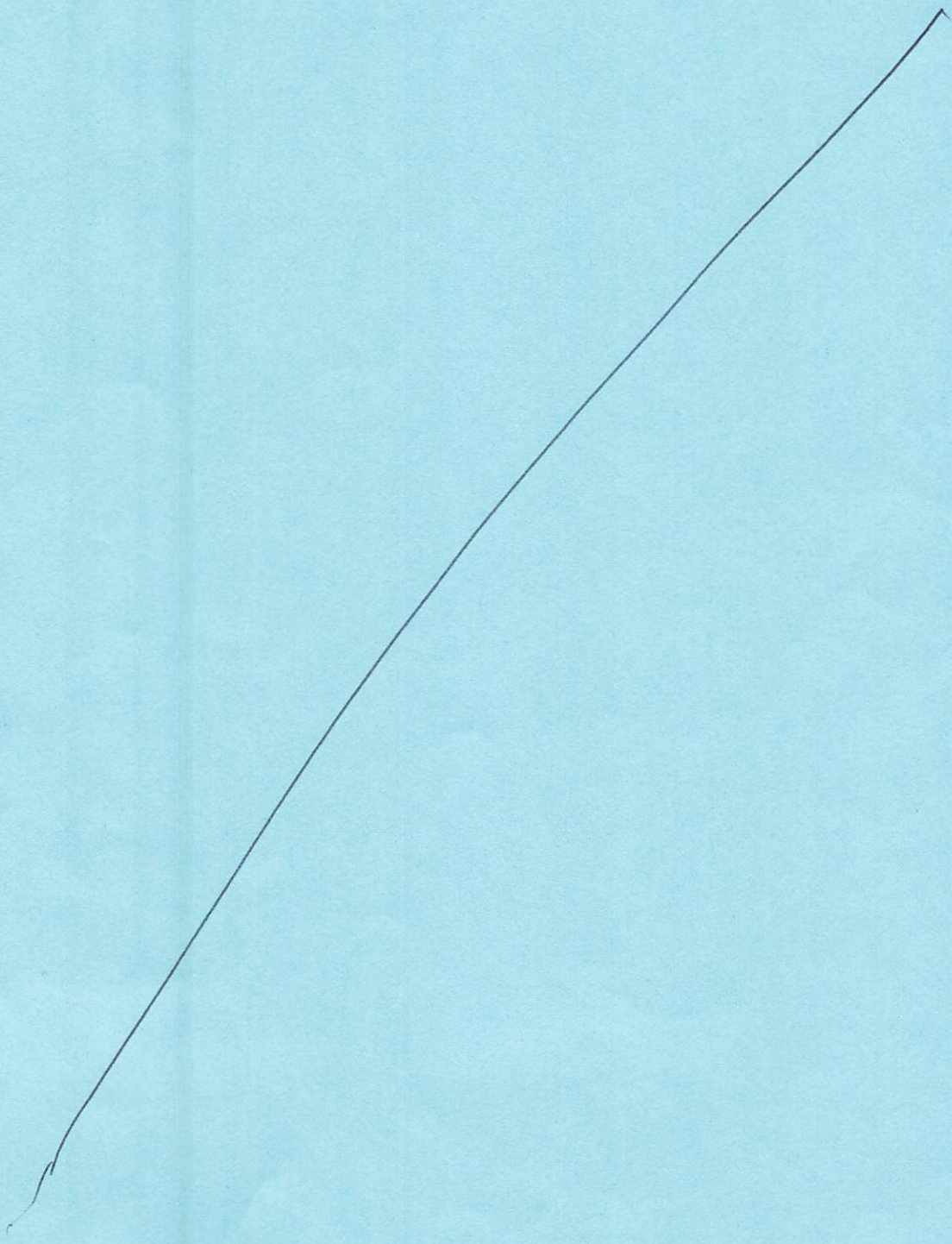

GOSHEN CHURCH AND CEMETERY

by Miss Eva McKitrick

The first settlers came into the area north-west of St. Albert in the early 1890's. A few of them were Protestant families including the McMillans and Timneys from Ontario and the Ryans and others from the United States. As early as 1893 services were held in the homes by passing ministers or student missionaries. Austin McKitrick was to have a service in Miles McMillan's home on February 11, 1894 but his little girl Mabel came down with scarlet fever on the way out from town and lived only a few days. Her father and her grandfather, John Timney, took her on out to the homestead north of Riviere Qui Barre where she was buried until July 1932 when the remains were moved to the Goshen cemetery.

During the summer of 1898 the few Protestant families decided to build a log church. Sam Ryan provided land on the S.E. corner of his homestead. Miles McMillan and sons Dan and Duncan, John Timney and sons John and George, Sam and George Ryan and their father, and a family of McLeods who lived near by set about getting the logs and building the church. Rev. D.G. McQueen of Edmonton was to have dedicated the new building on Sunday, August 27, 1899 but it was too wet and he couldn't get out. Mr. McKitrick wrote in his diary that he held a service in Ryan's house instead. The church was registered with the Presbyterian church, though it served all Protestants for miles around and continued to do so when it became part of the United Church in 1925.

In 1926 the original log church was moved to the N.E. corner of the grounds, a frame kitchen was added to it, and it was used for serving the annual dinners and as a summer home for student missionaries. A larger frame building was brought from St. Albert to occupy the original site. Both are still there though no longer used.

By 1904 more families were added to the congregation, among them the Kellys, Fishers and Goldens, and were soon followed by the Rookes, Woods and Normans, the Fielhabers and Elwoods. Mr. Ryan Sr. soon went back to the States, the McLeods moved away and in time others left the district. But some were left behind in the little cemetery and others were brought back to lie beside their loved ones.

GOSHEN CEMETERY

(SE 1/4 Sec 16 Twp 55 Rge 26 W4th)

Drive 8 miles north and 6 west of St. Albert, or 2 miles south and 2 east of Riviere Qui Barre. The cemetery is on the north side of the road behind the Goshen church. The first burial was in 1900 and the last recorded as at April 29, 1976 was Elizabeth Jane Fisher on November 10, 1971. The cemetery is still being used.

Plots are of 4 graves each and there are 8 plots per row starting in the S.W. corner. As seen on the plot plan, the 1st row numbers from south to north, the 2nd row from north to south, the 3rd row south to north, etc. Dots show the number of graves in each plot.

For graves having no markers, information was obtained from the Registrar Mr. Dave Fisher and other area residents and is shown in square brackets [].

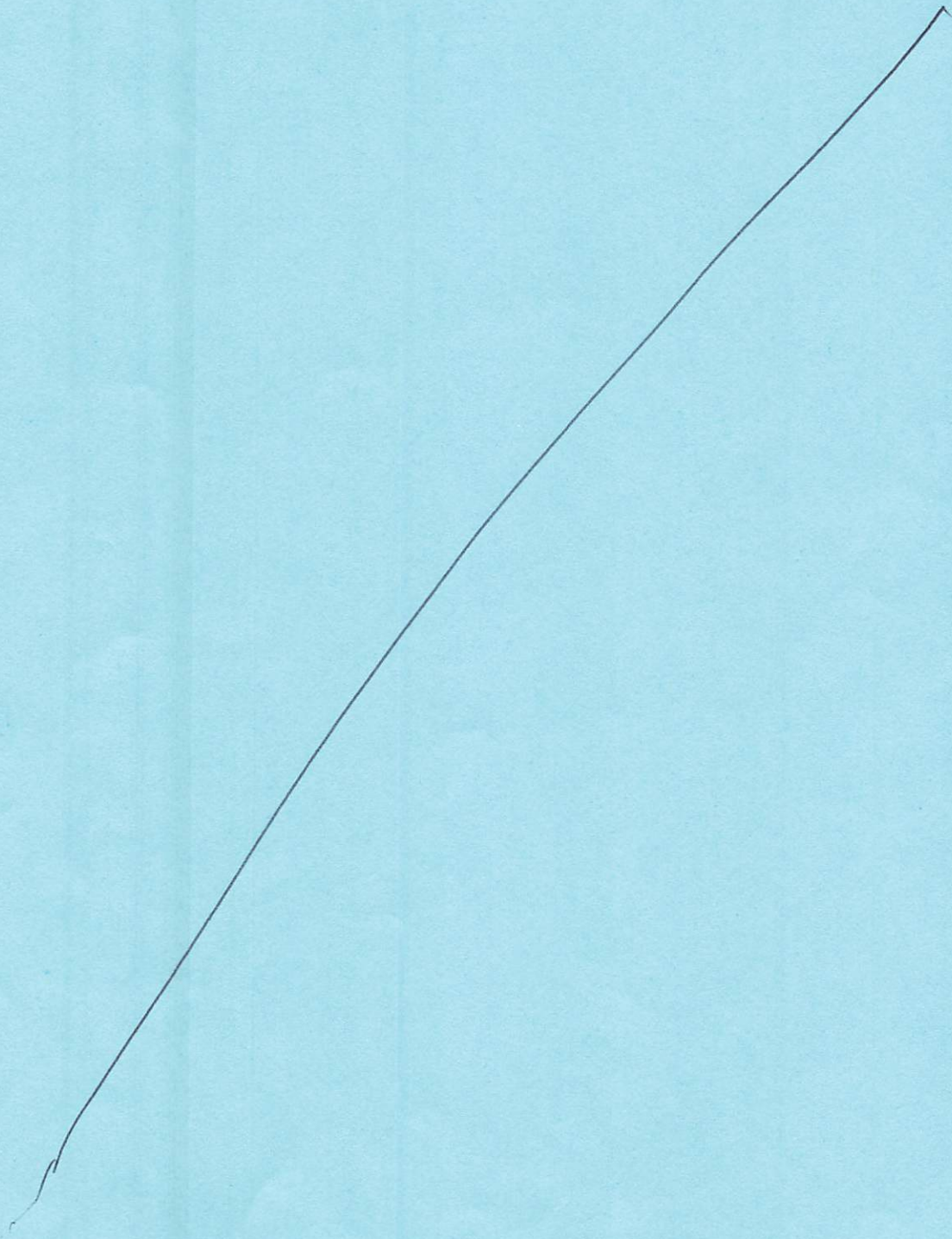

EBEN-EZER LUTHERAN CHURCH AND CEMETERY, BLOOMSBURY
SE Sec.25-Twp.60-Rng.4-W5

A church built in Mellowdale in 1932-33 and located 1/2 mile west of Mellowdale post office, was moved to Bloomsbury in 1939 and relocated on land donated by Mr. Charlie (Carl) Pusch. Two new congregations were formed in 1939 that of Bloomsbury and Naples.

On Sunday, June 8th, 1941 the Evangelical Lutheran Eben-Ezer Church at Bloomsbury was rededicated after extensive alteration and additions to the former building. A new steeple was added and new gothic windows. At the rear of the church an apsis or chancelory was erected with stained glass windows. Inside a new floor was laid and the walls finished with tentest, the ceiling, however, got a new lining of cedar. The old spruce siding was removed and replaced by new California siding, in short the whole church except the roof, was renovated.

The church was a memorial for the late Mrs. Louise Whitman, wife of Mr. Frank Whitman, of Harrisbourg, Pa. U.S.A. The congregation thought this was an appropriate way of honoring the dear dead. Instead of placing the expensive stone on the cemetery, such money was invested into a place where the gospel was preached and the sacraments administered. The Altar of the church was also a memorial dedicated by the Will Tomm family in memory of their departed son, Victor.

The Eben-Ezer Lutheran church congregation was amalgamated with Barrhead in the early 1950's. In 1964 the church was moved to Barrhead to be used as a Christian Education Centre by St. John's Lutheran Church. When the new Lutheran church was built in Barrhead, the Eben-Ezer building was sold and moved out of town.

The Bloomsbury Lutheran cemetery is still honored by being fenced off, however, it is not maintained and is overgrown with trees. There are two graves located in the NE corner of the fenced-off area on the SE Sec.25-60-4-W5. At one time there were wooden crosses, but these no longer exist. It's located 2 miles west and 6 miles north of Barrhead.

The two burials are:

1. ERNEST STARK Dec. 14, 1939-June 22, 1941.

Ernest passed away at the tender age of 1 yr and 7 months at St. Josephs Hospital in Barrhead. He left to mourn his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ludwig Stark, and one sister and one brother. The church records say he died of complications of measles, and the newspaper said he died of pneumonia.

2. A ZUK child.

A picture and story of the Eben-Ezer Lutheran Church is found in the "Mellowdale Memories" history book. Also a picture is found in the St. John's Lutheran Church, Barrhead book, "A Half-Century of Blessings", 1928-1978. Some information was also gathered by talking to people in the area, and news columns in the Barrhead Leader.

Airdrie Cemetery was invaded on June 4, 1977, by a crew of eighteen people, measuring, plotting positions of graves and transcribing inscriptions.

Members of the Alberta Genealogical Society, Calgary Branch, plan to chart, in the future, every graveyard in Southern Alberta. Airdrie was the second one chosen, the first being Wesley Band Cemetery on the Morley reserve.

Problems arose there as there were so many unmarked graves and stones.

The idea behind this project is to build a reference of names and places of deceased persons with all the pertinent facts that can be found for each one.

If anyone in the future is searching for ancestors in this area, the information would be readily available.

Background information of the local cemetery was partly obtained from the Town Office and on Saturday, Mrs. Edwards and Mrs. Lorimer, local residents, were able to help with local information and likes to families. They have both been here a long time and knew many of those buried here.

The land where the cemetery is located belonged to George Hatt, and was obtained when the cemetery was moved to this location around 1910. His wife, Mary McKinnon Hatt, died August 27, 1908, and is now buried here.

Another grave of a Wallace Howard, died 1908, was found. Mrs. Edwards stated that his death was a very tragic affair. He was 12 years old, and had been dragged to death by his horse while bringing the cows home. He was the son of John and Anne Howard, a railroad employee at the time.

These were the two oldest graves found. Another dated 1910, was an Edward Swenson, eight and a half years old, son of A. and E. Swenson.

Johnson Stevenson of the famous Stopping House of pioneer days is also buried here. He lived from August 8, 1850 till June 6, 1913.

The Genealogical Society was started in Calgary in 1974 and has 70 members at the present time. There are 300 in total in Alberta.

Lethbridge has just organized a chapter. There are members in this Calgary Chapter from Banff, High River, Claresholm, to Drumheller areas. They even have one member from Ontario. It is a world-wide organization.

Seven members were the original founders. (of the Calgary Branch) These included Win and Ross Campbell, Dale Alexander, Greg and Mary Osmond, Lloyd Cranston, and Marguerite Boisjolie.

Kay Hymas was the co-ordinator of the work at the cemetery. The area was marked off on a map and then one of six teams was given an area to cover. They worked for approximately five hours to complete the project.

One problem they had was trying to find graves to match two headstones until it was explained that there was none. The stones just sit there, unclaimed.

ROSS CREEK CEMETERY

This cemetery is in the Chipman area, south of Highway 15, on the west side of Secondary Highway 834. The sign reads "ROSS CREEK CEMETERY SINCE 1888".

Henderson's Alberta Gazeteer & Directories for June 1911 and February 1914 say "Ross Creek, a post on Sec. 12 Tp. 53 West of the 4th Mer., in the electoral division of Victoria. Nearest railway and express office Chipman, 10 miles distant. Mail weekly. Population 30. Postmaster J. VanBuskirk. Hallberg, S.A., general store."

Land for the cemetery was donated before 1900 by Samuel Hallberg after five of his children died. He had come to the area in about 1892 and helped build the Ross Creek school before 1900, south of the highway and 3 km. west of the Chipman-Tofield road where it stood until the 1960's when sold for use as a chicken house. There was also a church.

According to Mrs. E.J. Borstad of Edmonton, granddaughter of Samuel Hallberg, the cemetery was closed in the late 1940's but a few years later a burial was approved for a child. Mrs. Borstad supplied most of the information on unmarked graves.

ISOLATED GRAVES

High above the narrows between North and South Wabasca Lakes, within today's village of Wabasca (Twp. 80, Range 25, W 4th) is a lonely grave site. A short, dilapidated white picket fence surrounds a single stone column inscribed on all four sides.

CEMETERY RECORDING -- 1985 STYLE

Good news! -- we have been given a grant to be applied to field expenses incurred in recording cemeteries. The emphasis is placed on, but not limited to, recording those cemeteries established before 1930 -- including those still active, or maintained, and those forgotten or abandoned.

Travelling through our province it is amazing to note just how many small family burying grounds have existed -- used for a time, and then quietly and peacefully forgotten. These deaths may not have been registered, or if they were, much of the information has "slipped between the cracks in the floor", and is not available from Vital Statistics. These cemeteries and "isolated graves" must be recorded soon, before they sink any deeper in the sands of time.

In recording burials -- in big, good looking cemeteries, small country churchyards, or individual burials on hilltops, river banks, etc., we are not being ghoulish and morbid. We are being active historians, preserving the "people history" of our province, doing our part in adding to the bank of research material so necessary for genealogists everywhere.

Isn't that what Genealogical Societies are all about?

For specific details re cemetery recording, please talk to your Branch President, your Branch Cemetery Recording Convenor, the AGS Cemetery Recording Project Co-ordinator, or all three.

OLD PATRICIA CEMETERY

Legal description: NE Section 2-20-13 W4.

Location: 9 miles east of the Duchess-Patricia intersection (N. of the town of Brooks), one mile south and across a prairie trail on Doug Hendrickson's land. There is nothing left to be seen except some sunken plots and a wooden pole marking the spot.

History: The C.P.R. apparently set aside four acres for a cemetery around 1920-22. The Eastern Irrigation District (E.I.D.) was the next owner. It is believed that only six or seven people are buried here -- two or three adults and three or four children. Once it had a fence around it.

The most recent burial was likely that of Mrs. Leah Nunnemaker in 1932.

Source of information: Many people from Patricia area, E.I.D., and the Patricia community history "Spurs and Shovels Along the Royal Line".

GRABURN UNITED CHURCH CEMETERY

WALSH, ALBERTA

N.V. 35-9-1-14

The Graburn United Church Cemetery can be reached by driving east from Medicine Hat on Highway #1, turn south, just before you reach Walsh, onto a gravel road known locally as the Graburn Road. Continue south for twelve miles. The cemetery is located to the left, just before the intersection with Secondary Highway #515. The church still stands on the property, unused.

Land for this cemetery was donated by Henry Krahn, Sr. in 1917. The first burial was in 1917, and the last in 1944.

Following is the story of what can be done with effort, co-operation, and the resources of the community. Mrs. Frieda Hiller, of Walsh, who lives in the Graburn area has written the following report regarding the organization behind the restoration of the cemetery:

"The last regular church service in the Graburn United Church was held in June, 1972. Several special services were held after that. Then, in June, 1977 the congregation held a meeting to decide what should be done with the building and its contents. The meeting decided that the church should be left as a church, as it is considered to be an old and important landmark, containing the memories of many people. The contents were disposed of in various ways with most of the valuable furnishings donated to the Irvine museum.

In the fall of 1977 we applied to the Provincial Department of Culture for a grant to help us restore the church cemetery. We were told that at that time no funds were available. In the spring of 1978 we received a letter from the Department stating that we

could once more apply for a grant for an amount up to \$2,000. The amount of the grant would have to be matched by us.

The fact that we would have to match the grant with money and labor was a disappointment to us since our cash on hand was \$95.78. The previous grants had paid for all expenses provided that local citizens did the work. We decided, however that we would apply and drew up a tentative budget. Our application was accepted in November, 1978, and we received a cheque for \$738.75 as an initial grant with the promise of the same amount upon completion of the project.

It was now up to us to raise enough money to complete the project. We decided that we should have a turkey and ham supper at Peace United Church in Irvine and that we should ask the news media to aid us

in publicising both the supper and the fact that we needed information as to who was buried in our cemetery. We drew up a list of names and dates that we could find. Some of the graves have stones that are still legible, and children, brothers, sister and other relatives were able to give us more names and dates. We also found some old church records, but only a small amount of information was in the books we found.

It seems that some of the books are lost. The early books are written in German, making matters even more difficult. Fortunately one of our members reads German quite well and this helped tremendously. We asked the Medicine Hat News if they would publish our list for us. We were pleased when they sent a reporter and a photographer and then published our list of names, a picture of the graveyard, along with our story of how we needed help in obtaining information.

Our turkey and ham supper on May 6, 1979 was a huge success in spite of the fact that on that day we had one of those late spring snow storms with heavy, wet snow, and muddy roads. Over four hundred people were served at the supper. Many former residents of Graburn attended and visited with old neighbors and friends. Our net proceeds from the supper and donations amounted to \$1640.00

We were now able to build the fence around the

church and cemetery and order the monuments. We had originally expected that about thirty people were buried in this cemetery and had chosen a cairn priced at \$25. Our research supplied us with forty-eight names so the cairn we finally had built cost \$1250.

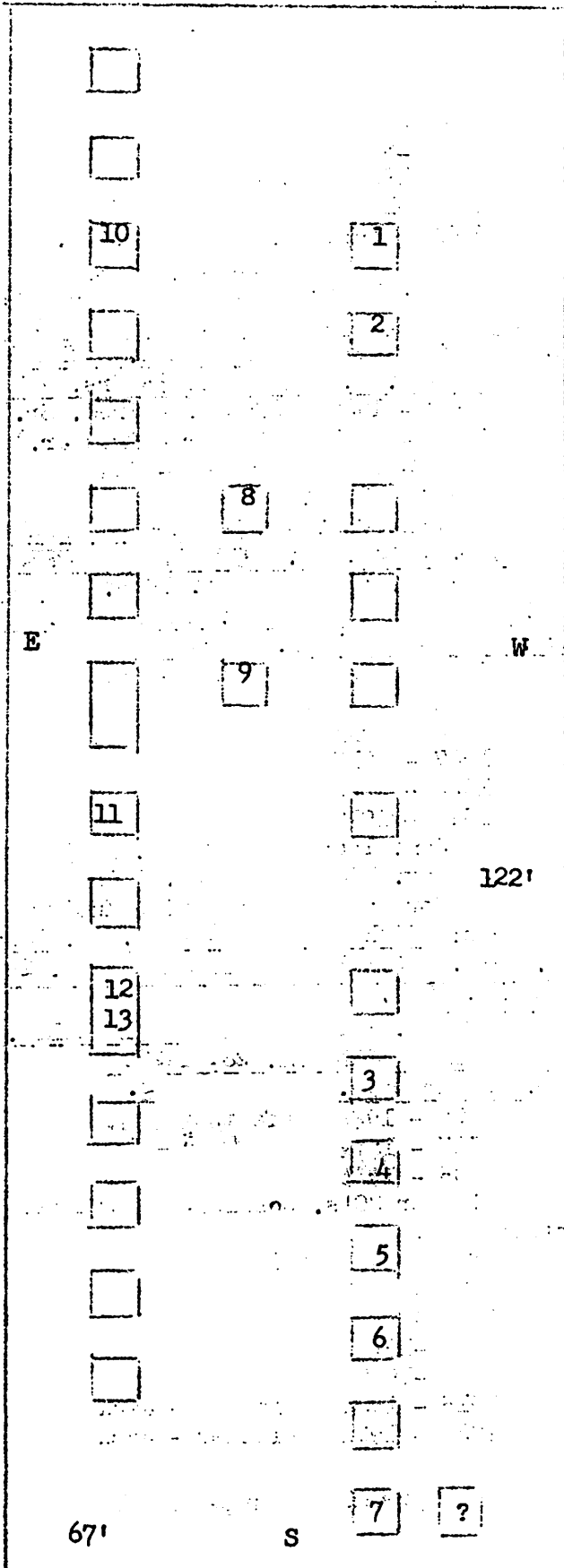
Finding the names and verifying the dates took many hours of phone calls and letter writing but people showed so much interest and appreciation that it made the project worth-while. So many people offered their help with the work and gave us information and their financial help. Donations came in long after the supper. We received one last week. A lady phoned to ask how our project was coming. I told her how successful it has been. Then she sent us \$75.00 with the explanation that since her father was buried here she and her brothers and sisters wanted to do their part and the money could be used for maintenance. All these generous donations meant we did not need the second half of the government grant.

The former members of the Graburn congregation were all helpful in preparing and serving the supper and building the fence. The community spirit that once was part of this congregation was rekindled."

The Graburn cemetery is enclosed by a page-wire fence erected in the spring of 1979. A cairn containing forty-eight names has been erected just outside the north side of the cemetery fence.

No plot plan or burial register has been found. Research undertaken by the community committee, headed by Mrs. F. Heller produced the following information.

This plan is based on headstones and other visible evidence of a grave, such as mounds, etc. One section is said to be reserved for children, but which rows? In the list of burials, headstones information is underlined. Listings are alphabetically arranged.

Only those burials marked with gravestones or markers with names are numbered on plot plan and listings.

This cemetery recording, and the foregoing article re the restoration of the Graburn United Church Cemetery have been submitted by Bea Kusler, Ruby Engler, Rose Braun and Eva Dyck, Medicine Hat Branch, A.G.S.

- It should be added that two sisters of Selma Höök also emigrated to Canada at about the same time. The names of them and their husbands and children were:
 - Hilda Ingeborg Henriksson (her name was "Hendriksen" in the immigration register.)
Her husband was Gustaf Emil Henriksson and their children Edmund Valter and Edit Ingeborg.
 - Sofia (Sophie) Lovisa Hedquist - Her husband was Gustaf Hjalmar Hedquist and their child Hjalmar Alexander H. The two sisters arrived at Quebec August 15, 1907, also by the vessel "Empress of Britain" and they were destined to Kenora. Their husbands had arrived earlier. If any members of the families Henriksson (Hendriksen?) or Hedquist could be found, they might have some information about the Höök family. But I hesitate to start writing to all the Henriksons and Hedquists in Canada.
- I should possibly put some advertisements in Canadian Newspapers, (which ones?)
- I should be very grateful for all informations, ideas and suggestions.

These are all the scanty informations that we have about the elder brother. It should be added that there is a rumor in our family that he should have disappeared or that he and his wife should have divorced.

2. August Leonard Hook was born 27 September 1882. His wife was Selma Viktoria, nee Bergman, born 1 September 1882. August Hook emigrated to Canada in the late autumn of 1907. His wife followed him in the spring of 1908. With her travelled their two children, Karl Leonard Hook, born 14 September 1903 and Anna Sophia Hook, born 23 August 1906. From an old photo it seems that they got at least one more child in Canada. It seems even possible that Selma's mother, Johanna Matilda Bergman, born 1853, joined them there.

According to Canadian Employment and Immigration Commission's Passenger Lists the following information is available: Selma V. Hok arrived by "Empress of Britain" to St. John, New Brunswick, 11 April 1908, together with two children Karl and Anna. Their destination was Kenora, Ontario.

A postcard, with a picture of August Hook, from Selma Hook to my grandmother is dated Kenora, August 1909, and postmailed from Fort William. These are the last real informations we have. For a while we thought that they had moved to Crawford Bay, in British Columbia, but this seems to have been a false track. We have no idea if they stayed in the Kenora area. It seems of course rather possible that they should have moved westward, to Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

III. WHAT I HAVE DONE UP TO NOW

1. I have written letters to persons with (mainly) the family name of Hook, whom I have found in certain telephone directories. To these letters I have gotten several kind answers. I have not yet been lucky to find relatives of ours, but I have received some suggestions and ideas about how to go on my research.

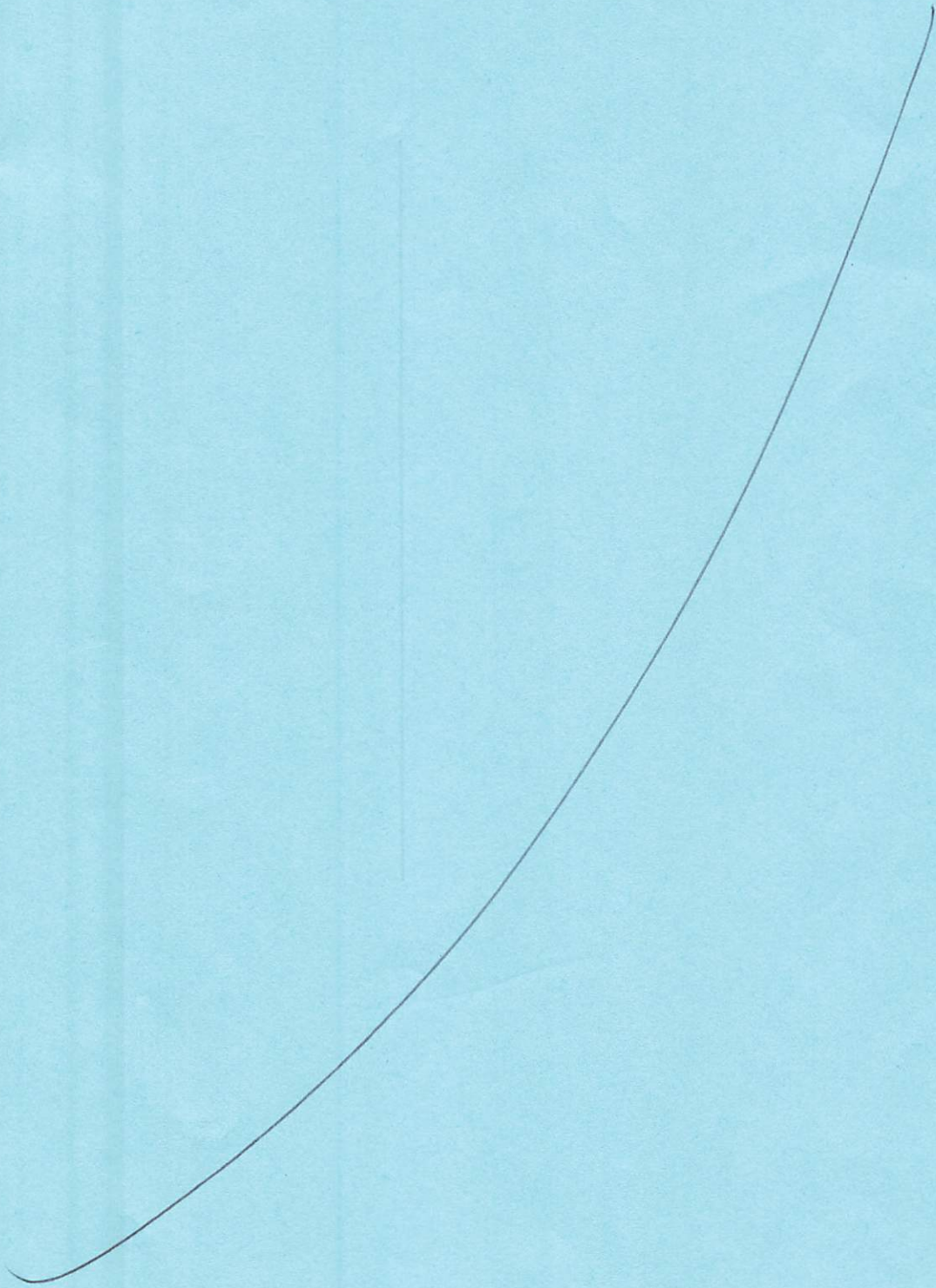
2. I have also written to some Canadian authorities, but as I have understood it, it is not possible to get information from the national registration system in Canada. If this were possible, as it is in Sweden, it should of course be rather easy to trace the brothers and their descendants. But I may be wrong and there may be information possibilities which I do not know about.

IV. WHAT INFORMATION DO WE NEED?

1. It seems to me that if I only find some clue or real trace, it should then be rather easy to follow it up. But up to now I have only had negative results, in spite of the hundreds of letters that I have already sent to Canada.

2. Perhaps there might be some old person in Kenora who has memories of the Hook family and some idea of where they might have moved.

DOWN MEMORY LANE IN COLCHESTER

Review and Index submitted by Mrs. Helen Hiebner

This book is 8½"x11", soft covered and contains 348 pages. Each page is double spaced and typed. It contains three maps, 305 pictures and many family stories. The book, at the time of publication was priced at \$15.00. It is unknown if copies are still available.

Colchester is a small rural community eight miles south east of Edmonton and takes in eighty quarter sections of land or approximately 12,800 acres. Under general history this book contains the following: first land survey of 1882-83, geography of the area, natural resources, early settlement and memoirs, pioneer days, dairying in the early days, industries, early blacksmiths, community activities; community league, hobby fair, 4H Club, agricultural society, Women's Institute, Friendly Circle Club, farm awards, war veterans, 50th and 60th Wedding anniversaries, one store, one post office, rural mail delivery, the old and new Colchester Schools, Clover Bar School Division, brief history of the Bruederfeld Moravian Church, brief history of St. Stephen's Anglican Church, a few poems, and a few historical bills of sale.

The family stories contained within this book are not that genealogically inclined but are informative as to the happenings and offspring.

WAS IT A BRANCH OF THE FAMILY TREE DOWN THE WELL?

Canadian Gilbert Croome came to Stroud last week with a burning question: Why did great-great-grandfather throw himself down a well in Minchinhampton 137 years ago?

The "News and Journal" could not help - the first publication of the Journal was in 1854 - so he returned to Alberta without the answer.

But he did leave behind a message for anyone in the Stroud area who might know to get in touch with him so he add another branch to his family tree.

One of the biggest stumbling blocks has been whether great grandad John Croom was lying about his age when he married widow Eleanor Elliott (nee Freeman), on Boxing Day 1835.

His descendants believe they may have traced his parents but the ages are out by ten years.

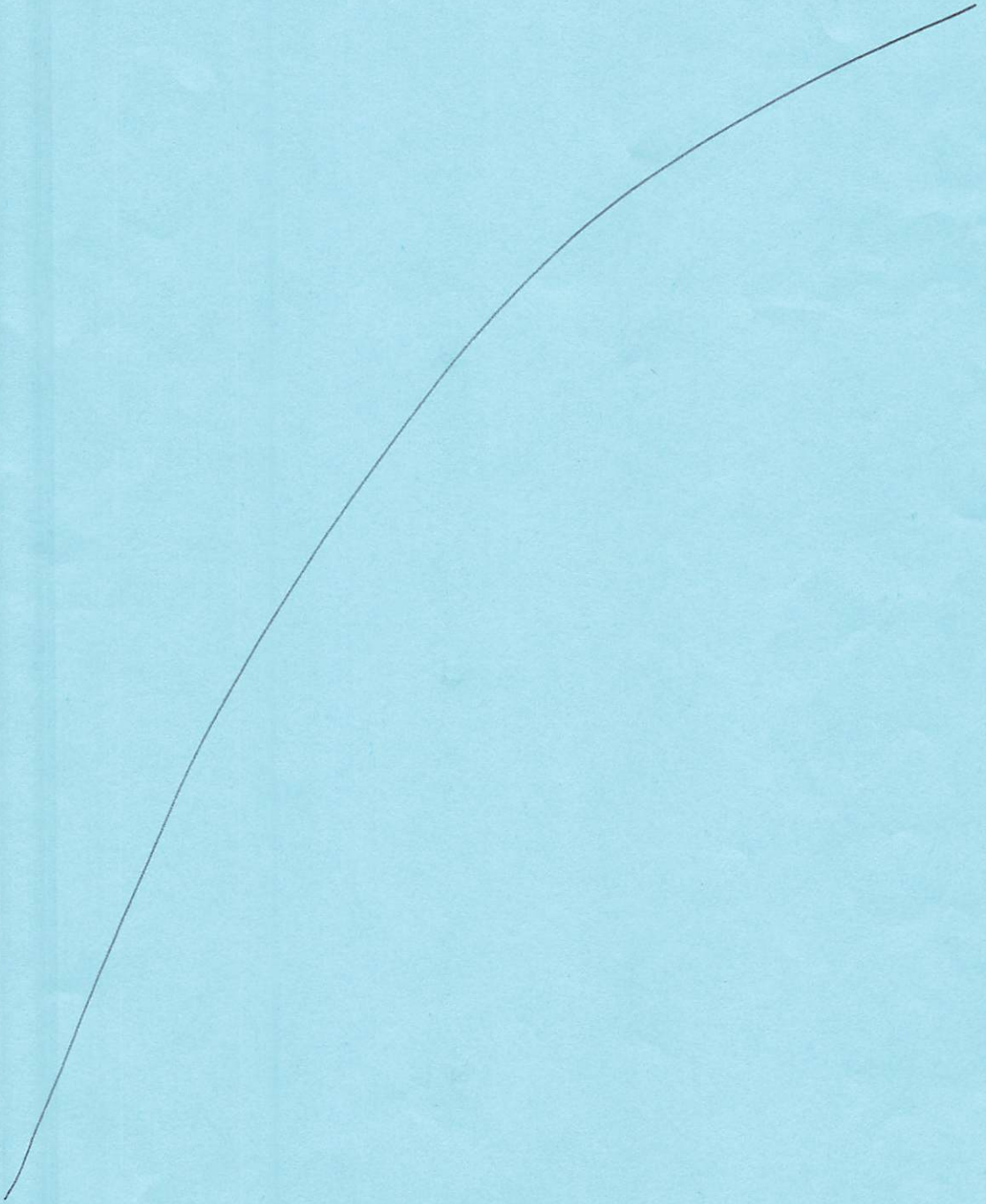
John Croom's death certificate, discovered during their English holiday, states in black and white that labourer John Croom threw himself down a well in the parish of Minchinhampton, and died on June 12, 1844 at the age of 60.

"We think he was lying about his age and was really 70," said Mr. Croome last week. "Trouble is we cannot prove it."

"Perhaps there are some descendants of his wife's still living in the area who may have a diary of the events."

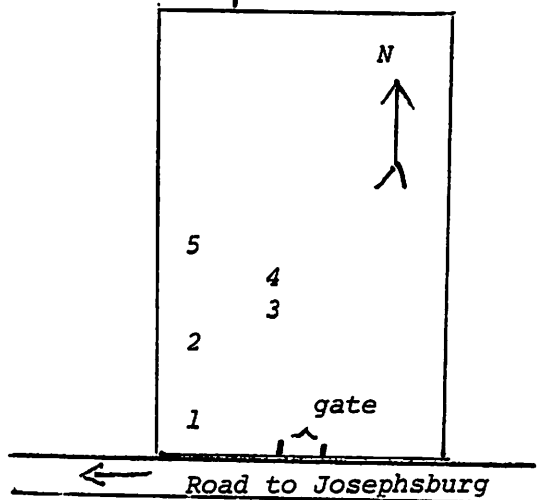

Other information supplied by relatives of those buried in this cemetery (including Mrs. Violet Parry, A.G.S. #128):

This is a family cemetery and only family members are buried here. The first burial in this cemetery, unmarked, is that of James Calvert, aged nine years He died in 1890. May Lundy died in 1917, and

May Lundy died December 14, 1917 and Mrs. Alice Calvert on 8 October 1922.

The land for the east portion of the cemetery was donated by Robert Calvert, and his brother gave a small, adjoining piece from the west quarter-section. There is a fence around the cemetery, but as it is inactive, and without a caretaker, it is overgrown with grass and weeds.

As mentioned on the marker on the grave of Mrs. Alice Calvert, this family was part of a group of about one hundred and fifty families who came west from Parry Sound about 1890-92. "The Fort On The Saskatchewan" by Peter T. Ream lists some of the families of the Parry Sound Colony who settled in this area. The publications "Josephsburg Heritage" and "Lamont and District along the Victoria Trail" contains information about the people of the area.

Norman Calvert, General Delivery, Namao, Alberta has published the Calvert Family History. Mr. Calvert will accept orders for his book which is priced at about \$40.00.

Other cemeteries in the area which may contain related family burials are:

- Reformed Cemetery, Josephsburg -- located at Josephsburg village.
- Bethany Lutheran -- 5 miles east of Josephsburg

- Cavell Cemetery -- 14 miles east and 6 miles south of Josephsburg.

actual marriage records on film and find John Robinson, father -- Archibald Robinson, Residence Ballyalbanah married to Susanna Cochran, widow -- father Henry Price at Ballyeaston in the County Antrim. There were no other John Robinsons married to Susannas for a three year period, nor did any other John have a father Archibald.

Salt Lake also had Ballyeaston Presbyterian Church Records form 1813-1821 on microfilm. A search of these yielded the marriage of Arch'd Robinson 15 June 1819.

Records of the First Ballyeaston Presbyterian Church, the Second Ballyeaston Presbyterian Church, the Ballynure Presbyterian, Ballynure Church of Ireland, and the local graveyards as well as Bond Index, Poll Books, and Hearth Money Rolls contained no further information. A census of Ballyeaston Congregation 1813 in the Public Records Office of Northern Ireland revealed both Archibald and Jenny with their parents and brothers and sisters. Unfortunately, Archibald's mother was widow Robinson.

Now it is back to land records. The Registry of Deeds in Dublin has land records from 1708. Salt Lake has the index to these on film. Will they reveal as much about the Robinsons as those in Ontario did?

I have about eight pages of Robinson marriages, christenings and burials from the above mentioned churches in Antrim. They do not appear to connect with my ancestors. BETHEL BAPTIST CEMETERY -- CAMPSIE

contributed by Peter Goutbeck, A.G.S. #1006

While vacationing last summer, my wife and I came upon a cairn up on a hill overlooking Highway 655, about 12 miles west of Barrhead (on the road to Thunder Lake. We stopped and clambered up to the cairn, where we read the following engraving:

Behind the cairn appeared to be a burial ground -- depressions in the sod, covered over with trees and shrubs, with no sign of grave markers.

A week later, to my surprise, "The Barrhead Leader" printed an article entitled "Graves on the Hill".

"Along the Thunder Lake road, to your left if you're driving west, is the Bethel Baptist Cemetery a cemetery commemorated as the burial place of the Campsie district's first black settlers. It's closed now, and the 13 black settlers that are buried there are at peace

Walker Beaver, 85, was one of those early settlers. Until the cemetery was closed in 1950, he was the caretaker. He told the story of the settlers -- the Tuckers, Butlers, Sneeds, Jacksons, Crawfords, the Courtney Walkers, the Robert Walkers, Lark Smiths, the Ed Smiths, the Risbys and the Lewis's. These people from the United States had been drawn to northern Alberta because of extensive advertising by the Canadian government.

Some of the black families, descendants of slaves, found the land so hostile that they returned home to Oklahoma. But the Beavers stayed. The cemetery land grant was received from the government and the cemetery was laid out in 1912. The Bethel Baptist Church was built in 1912 or 1913. While no racial discrimination was intended, the Bethel congregation was predominately black. Few racial difficulties were encountered.

The cemetery? It's fenced in and the grave stones are buried under bushes and shrubs. Sometime between 1948 and 1950 a cairn was erected to honor those early settlers."

* ST. MONICA'S ANGLICAN CHURCH CEMETERY
MIRROR, ALBERTA

NE 38-40-22 W4

This cemetery is located in Block 50 of the Village of Mirror, on corner of Lake Street and Wade Avenue.

The church was built in 1895, a log building still being used for services. The cemetery has been inactive since 1914. Names on the headstones are those of families who have lived in the area for many years. Since the closure of this cemetery, burials have taken place in the Mirror Cemetery north of the village along Highway #21.

Restoration work was done in 1976 with the assistance of a Government Grant. The old wooden retaining wall was replaced with concrete. Grave-stones were cleaned and those that had fallen apart were cemented together. Some graves have chain fences and some still have flowers growing on them. (This information was supplied by Mrs. Jennie Oakey, of Mirror.

The Cemetery was recorded by W. Jim Allan, of the Edmonton Branch, A.G.S. Recording was done from north to south. Information given is taken from grace markers.

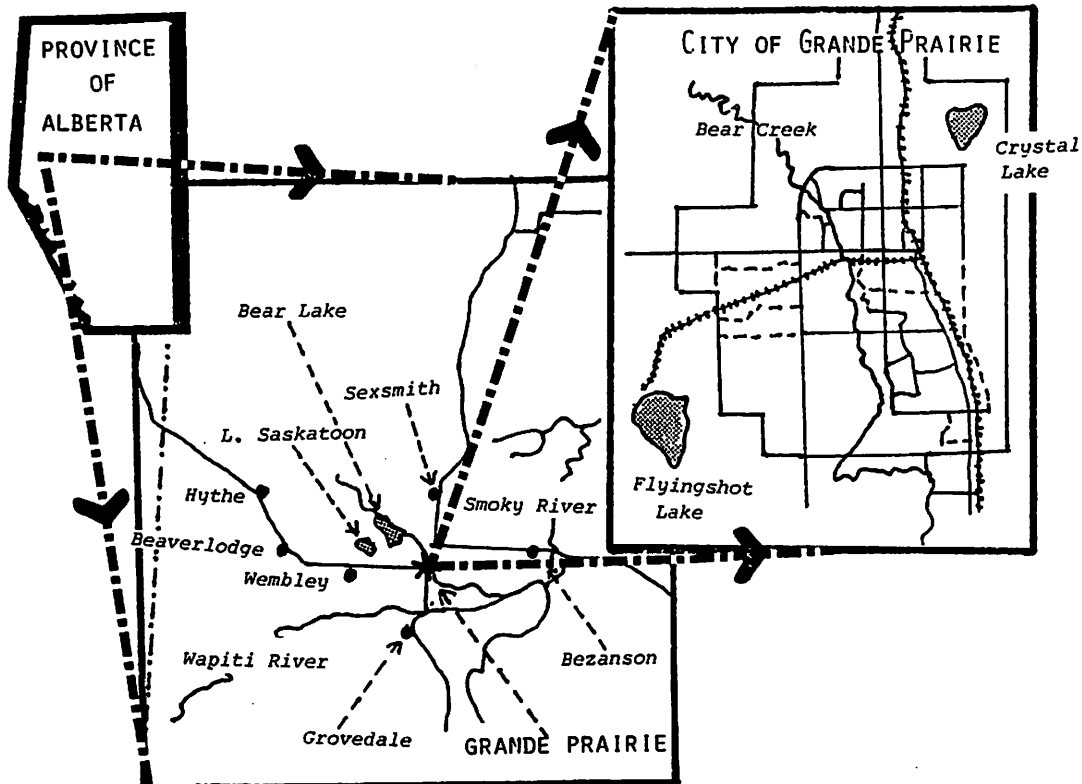

PEOPLE, PLACES AND DATES

IN THE HISTORY OF GRANDE PRAIRIE

From research material contributed by Joan Bowman, A.G.S. #1108



Father Emil Grouard, who called the area 'la grande prairie'; Tom Kerr, who built a Hudson's Bay Trading Post 100 years ago, Pierre Nease, a Metis trapper who built a cabin in what is now the city's south east area, at the turn of the century; Louis Callihoo who camped on the shores of Bear Creek in 1898; Alexander Monkman, on his way to the Klondike passed through the Bear Creek Region in 1899, then chose a trading post site west of Lake Saskatoon.

Then, later, in 1902 Jim McCreight and Ralph Dyer wintered 60 head of cattle, imported from Calgary, in the shoulder-high grass on Bear Creek; adventurers Norman Culp, David and John Esplen, George Moore, and Frank Knutt who arrived in 1903; Charles Nicholson, a packer, who homesteaded on Lake Saskatoon in 1904; Joseph Eudore Germaine and W. E. Roberts, who took land along Bear Creek in 1904 and 1906, respectively. while Harry Clifford was establishing a trading post on Flyingshot Lake.

In 1907 there was the arrival of the surveyors, the Federal Department of the Interior publication 'Canada's Fertile Northland', A.M. Bezanson's book 'The Peace River Trail'.

The year 1910 saw the arrival of names still known in Grande Prairie -- Patterson, Monkman, Forbes, Caldwell, Maklin, Connors, Sproule, Sutherland, McFarlane, Oliver, O'Brien and others.

Grande Prairie became a village in 1914, with its first council William Smith, Sylvester Bowen, and Reeve John Taft; in 1919 it became a town with its council G. A. James, A.D. Wishart and Mayor R. L. Michaelis.

Miss Marilyn Wales was crowned "Queen" in a ceremony in an ice palace during the three days of festivities celebrating the settlement's new "City" status, early in 1958. The New Years baby that year was Roxanne Waldner, daughter of John and Patricia Waldner.

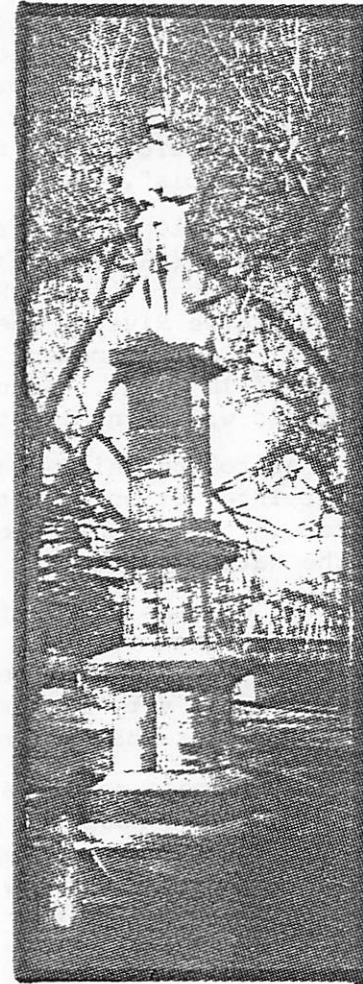

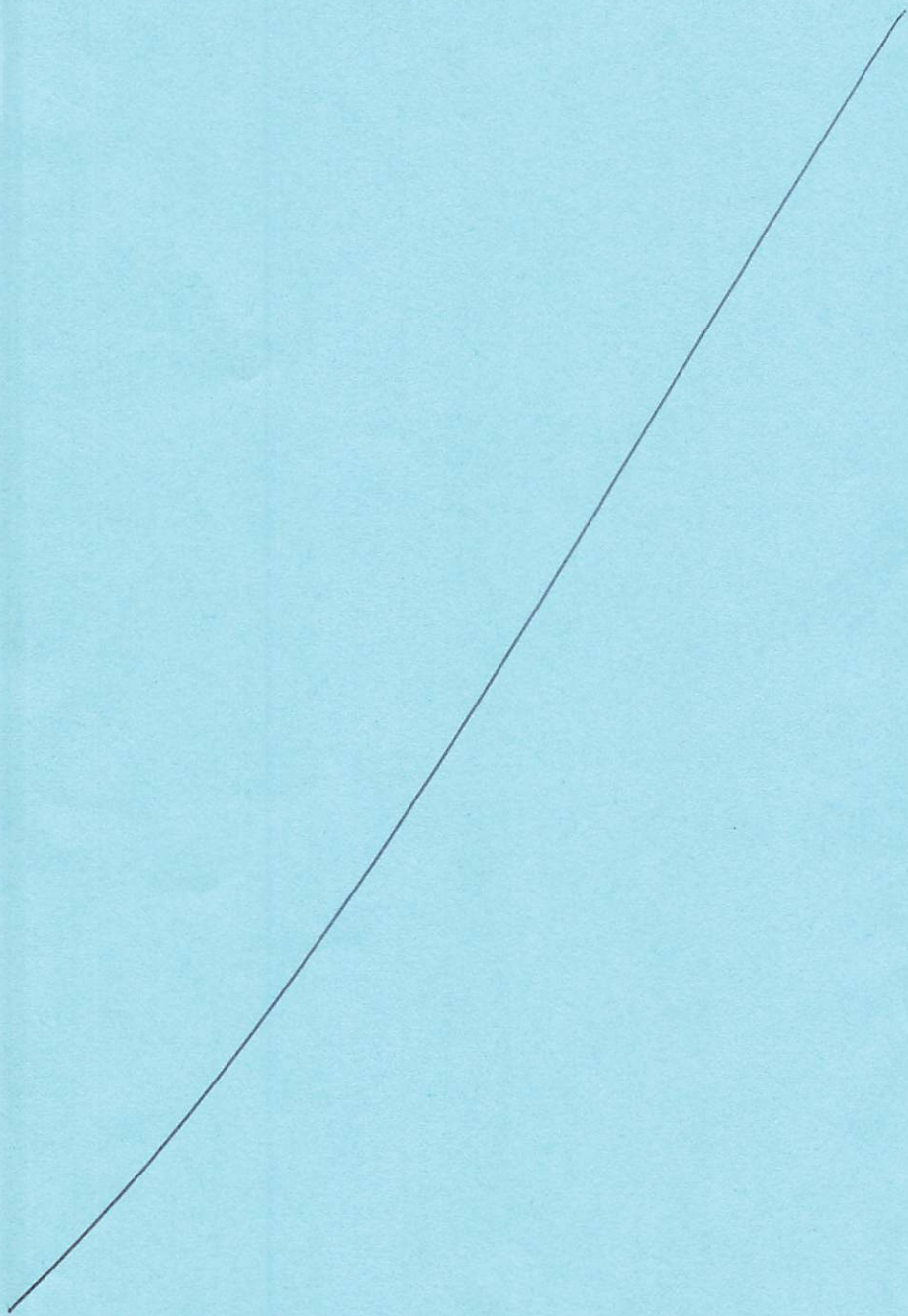

THE HOMELAND CEMETERY

Contributed by Betty Leonhardt - A.G.S. #1010

The Homeland Cemetery, also known as the Tarbuck Family Grounds, is a small quaint spot on a knoll, cradled on three sides by the barren, towering banks of the Drumheller Valley and facing Kneehill Creek, -- the fourth side being the Dunphy Road, passing by the south end, going somewhat east and west. It is situated on land originally owned by John Henry Tarbuck.

It was consecrated by the Anglican Church in 1915 and given the name of "Homeland Cemetery". The first to occupy this quaint little prairie resting place was Grandmother ALICE TARBUCK, in 1915, the wife of John Henry.

Those to follow were:

2. WILLIAM LESLIE PARKINSON, in June 1929. He was the nephew of John Henry Tarbuck's second wife, Agnes.
3. THOMAS BENTHAM in February 1931. He was Agnes Tarbuck's father.
4. MARY JULIANA JUNG in October 1936. She was a little abandoned girl who lived on the creek. Her parents refused her a proper burial, so E.T. Lowen took her to the family cemetery for burial.
5. JOHN HENRY TARBUCK in January 1946. Father and grandfather of all the descendants in the book "Tarbuck History". His headstone reads "John H. 1854-1946".
6. AGNES TARBUCK, in 1948. Second wife of John Henry. Shares headstone with John H. and Alice, 1857-1915.
7. JOHN PEMBROKE LOWEN, who died November 28, 1977. Grandson of John Henry Tarbuck, son of Mary Tarbuck and E.T. Lowen. Headstone reads "Jack Pembroke Lowen, 1922-1977, Royal Canadian Navy 1942-1945".

CASSILS CEMETERY (INACTIVE)

Legal land description: SE 5-19-15 W4.

Location: near Cassils, west of Brooks, Alberta. From Brooks, follow Cassils Road west, cross Highway #36, turn north at first intersection. The cemetery is approximately one mile north on the west side of the road. There is no access by car to this cemetery.

History: very little available. The cemetery had a picket fence, and some pickets are still lying around. It has since been enclosed by the County of Newell, with a chainlink fence and a locked gate. It is bounded on the south, west and north by pasture, and on the east the road. Its size is approximately ninety feet square.

About 200 yards northwest, over a rise, is a smaller cemetery, about twenty feet square, also fenced in. The names of the people buried in the smaller cemetery are included on the joint marker erected in the main Cassils Cemetery by the County of Newell:

OLD PATRICIA CEMETERY

Legal description: NE Section 2-20-13 W4.

Location: 9 miles east of the Duchess-Patricia intersection (N. of the town of Brooks), one mile south and across a prairie trail on Doug Hendrickson's land. There is nothing left to be seen except some sunken plots and a wooden pole marking the spot.

History: The C.P.R. apparently set aside four acres for a cemetery around 1920-22. The Eastern Irrigation District (E.I.D.) was the next owner. It is believed that only six or seven people are buried here -- two or three adults and three or four children. Once it had a fence around it.

The most recent burial was likely that of Mrs. Leah Nunnemaaker in 1932.

Source of Information: Many people from Patricia area, E.I.D., and the Patricia community history "Spurs and Shovels Along the Royal Line".

It was recorded in 1983 by the Wetaskiwin and District Branch, Alberta Genealogical Society, with the help of members of the New Sweden Church, and in particular Ralph and June Swenson.

This cemetery is mentioned in the 1896 records of the New Sweden Scandinavian Mission Church.

Riverside Cemetery was located on the bank of the Battle River, four miles east and eight and one half miles south of Wetaskiwin, on a five-acre plot, part of a forty-acre government grant given for church and cemetery purposes.

At that time the New Sweden and Malmo Covenant Churches worshipped together under the name of the Congregational Church. This cemetery was bought by the Congregational Church around 1894. It was later sold to Oscar Moseson in 1920 for \$3000.

When New Sweden, Malmo and Lutheran Svea Churches established their own cemeteries in the early 1900's, the Riverside Cemetery fell into disuse and many, but not all, of the bodies were moved to other cemeteries. The site is now a cultivated field, being farmed by Roscoe Grant.

According to records kept by K. J. Bjorken and knowledgeable old timers, the following were buried in the Riverside Cemetery:

This cemetery was also recorded by the Wetaskiwin and District Branch, Alberta Genealogical Society, with the help of members of the New Sweden Church, and in particular Ralph and June Swenson. The mailing address is: New Sweden Mission Church, R.R.#2, Wetaskiwin, Alberta T9A 1W9.

It is located four miles east and two miles south of Wetaskiwin, via the paved Stettler Highway. The silver tower of the church is an outstanding landmark in the area, directing one not only to the church but to the beautifully landscaped recreational area adjoining it. The graveyard is barely visible through a backdrop of splendid spruce trees which border the area.

By the year 1892 the homestead land adjacent to Wetaskiwin had mostly been taken. The Swedish immigrants who responded to the enticing quarter section of homestead land for ten dollars down, settled in an area to the southeast of Wetaskiwin, which came to be known as "New Sweden".

The pioneers gathered in different homes to worship and praise God for His blessings. They were not long satisfied to live in a community without a church so they met on the 11th of March, 1894 to consider this need. On May 26th of the same year the first Board of the present New Sweden Mission Church was set up as well as a tentative constitution. There were logs to be had for the sawing and hewing and everyone helped in some capacity. Many hours were put into this church building as it stands today, as strong as ever, not only in structure but also as a symbol of God's faithfulness and goodness in the community.

The first business and church meeting was held in the new building on July 19, 1896. The officers were: Ludwig Peterson, Chairman; John Berg, Vice-Chairman; and K. J. Bjorkgren, Cashier. There was a log addition at the south of the church building used as living quarters for the pastor. In the same year the church called their first pastor, Rev. Linde, who came and served for two years. The church building was used as a school five days a week, one of the first teachers being Miss Spark from Ontario.

Names of the early settlers in the area include: Bergs, L. Peterson, C. Swanson, Bjorkgrens, J. Salds, A. Andersons, E. Petersons, V. Johnsons, C.G. Johnsons, A. Petersons, Billsteins, Palmers, Evansons, Lundstroms, Bergmans, Lydins, Carlsons, Lofgrens, Nelsons, Hedlunds, Sundbergs, E. Anderson, J. Andersons, Engstroms, Doupes, Edlunds, Sundvals and Youngbergs.

The 1896 records mention five acres being set aside for a cemetery out of the forty acre grant land from the government, being the SW 34-44-23-W4 (about six and one half miles south of the present church). This cemetery was used for a time until the present graveyard was laid out east of the church. This first cemetery was called Riverside Cemetery and was located by the Battle River on the northeast corner of the designated land. (Refer to the Riverside Cemetery article in this issue.)

In the New Sweden Cemetery, the lot numbers begin with #19 and end with #60. It is thought that the Riverside Cemetery may have been numbered 1 to 18; otherwise, there seems to be no reason for beginning with #19.

ST. PETER'S LUTHERAN CHURCH AND CEMETERY, NAPLES
SE Sec. 6- Twp.61-Rng.2-W5

In 1939 the Naples Lutheran Church was built on the G. Look farm. The bell for the church was bought from the fire hall at Wetaskiwin. The church, St. Peter's Lutheran at Naples, was dedicated in the summer of 1940. Rev. Wahl served the parish until 1942. Following his service, ministers came from Manola to serve the parish. They were Rev. Krish, Rev. Klingbeil, and Rev. Gnauck.

The first wedding ceremony at the Naples Church was that of Ernest and Hertha Simon in June 1940.

In 1955 the Naples Church was sold to the Vega Lutheran Church congregation. The people of Naples now attend St. John's Lutheran Church in Barrhead. The church still stands at Vega.

The Naples cemetery has two tombstones located in a broken-down, fenced area, which is mostly wild-rose bushes. The broken foundation of the church also remains. It's located 2 miles north, 5 miles east and 6 miles north of Barrhead.

The two stones read as follows:

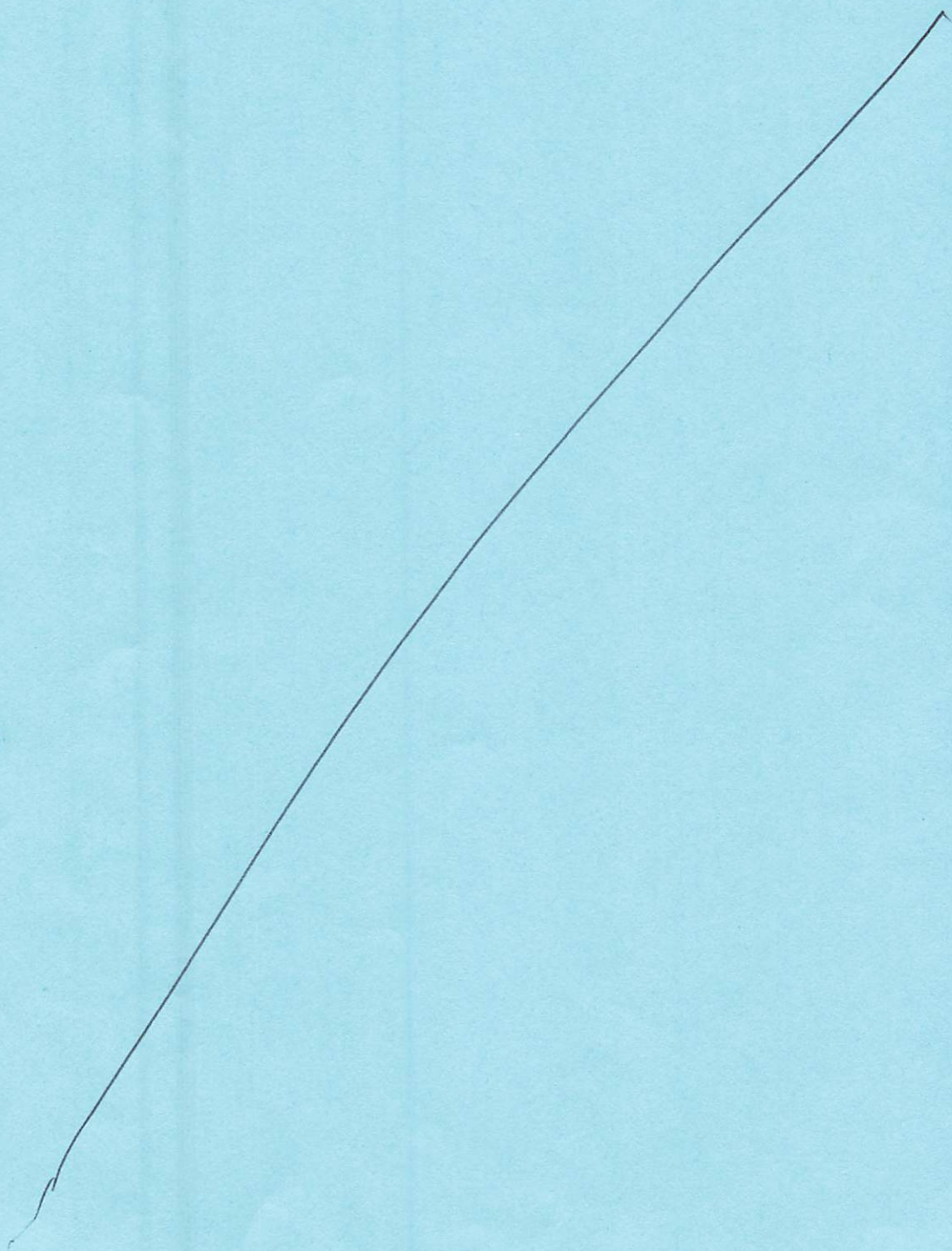
1. In loving memory of Father, FERDINAND LOOK 1872-1939.
(A church record at the Prov. Archives in Edmonton lists a Ferdinand Look born March 4, 1872, who married Emilie Wiese. Emilie was born March 11, 1871.)
2. Baby Vernon KAUS, May 2, 1945 - Jan. 23, 1947.

2.3ISOLATED BURIAL SITES IN BIG COUNTRY

Early settlers in Alberta often buried their dead on their own land without benefit of doctor or clergy. Exact locations of many are not known. In what was known as Big Country, in eastern Alberta, north of the Red Deer River, there are numerous individual graves and small family plots. In 1969 oldtimer N. W. Doran, who has since died, was able to remember some for publication in "This Is Our Land, Vol. 2" which was compiled by J. Blumwell's New Cessford Historians. Exerpts from his report follow.

"Having noticed in the Brooks Bulletin where you are trying to obtain some information re oldtimers or old events in the Cessford District, I might mention a few items, although I lived some distance from Cessford, having homesteaded W $\frac{1}{2}$ 19-25-14 W4 in 1911.

"What interested me was the old graves that are scattered throughout the country; the ones that I know about are between the Bullpound Creek and Berry Creek. Most of these graves are unmarked. I did a lot of riding in between those two creeks in the early years.

"There was a Mr. Ivor Satre who lived on W $\frac{1}{2}$ 28-25-13. He homesteaded early - probably 1911. His father was buried there in 1912, I think, and his mother was also buried there at a later date - probably as late as 1922. Ivor Satre died about 1949, over 80 years of age, and was buried elsewhere.

"A Mr. Berger homesteaded about 1911 on W $\frac{1}{2}$ 20-25-13. His wife, also a son and a baby were buried there. I would naturally think the baby died first; Mrs. Berger and the son died some time later. The son was a boy in his teens, and I think had a very tragic death. It seems to me there was a marker there, such as a 6"x8" piece of upright timber.

"Now, a little further away on SE $\frac{1}{4}$ 1-26-14, there is a grave on the southeast corner of this 160 acres. His name was John Patterson, and he lived about a mile west of the grave on the southwest corner of Section 1. I believe he died about 1912. This grave is unmarked. I have ridden past it many times. John Patterson's son, Robert (Bobbie) died later -- probably about 1919 or 20. I knew him well. He is buried in and "established" graveyard on NE $\frac{1}{4}$ 32-24-14, one half mile east of Bullpound Creek. I know of at least three graves there. I have intentions of putting a stone on John Patterson's grave. I have the white stone, but I have to chisel it.

"Further away yet, on the extreme edge of the south side of NE $\frac{1}{4}$ -26-14 is a well marked grave on my lease. The man's name was Pat Connors, who came in 1910. He died, I believe, in 1912. I was at his funeral. I have erected a large, flat limestone stone about three feet above ground.

I chiseled his name on same and date as far as I knew. I also placed a footstone. Both stones are flat and pure white, very easy to see.

"Now, go further from Cessford, I must be over thirty miles from Cessford, now, so maybe you are not interested. There is an unmarked grave on the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ -25-26-14, in the southeast corner of this quarter. I do not know the name of the person buried there; he died early. No. 36 Highway passes along side of the unmarked grave.

"Further away yet, there are two people buried in a marked grave on the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ 13-26-15, Harry Crawford and George Jones, brothers-in-law. Mrs. Jones died later. I do not know where she is buried, probably Hanna.

"There is a grave, marked at one time, on the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of 13-25-13. A Mr. Hoveland is buried there. This is getting nearer to Cessford. You may have information elsewhere on this grave. I am not sure I have the numbers right.

"I figure it was my duty to write these lines as I knew a lot of people in this area"

In other local histories you will see similar mention of unmarked graves and tiny, abandoned grave yards. Perhaps in later issues some of them will appear for the interest of the general membership.

ST. PAUL'S LUTHERAN CEMETERY

In the year 1909 or 1910, a child of the Christ Kessel family passed away. Since there was no cemetery in the Hand Hills at that time, the child was buried on Sec. 6, T. 30, R. 5, W. 4. The incident brought to the attention of the community, especially the Lutherans settled there, the need for a cemetery. This was an important decision as the new Lutheran congregation made its beginnings in 1910.

Mr. Louis Zimbrick, still unmarried at that time, offered a plot of land for the purpose of a Lutheran Cemetery. He donated part of his homestead on Sec. 15, T30, R16, W4. When the congregation was organized in 1910, the cemetery was registered with the provincial government as "The St. Paul's Lutheran Cemetery". The decision was made for it to be a private cemetery, the responsibility and property of the congregation with no charges for burial. The alternative was for it to be a public cemetery. In that case the government would have taken it over, managing it by appointing a caretaker. Charges would have then been levied to cover the expenses involved in maintaining the cemetery.

There were also people in the area from different denominations, mostly Baptists and Congregationalists, who, without cemeteries of their own, asked permission to have their loved ones buried in the St. Paul's Cemetery. An agreement was reached allowing them to use the north-east corner of the present churchyard.

The agreement was satisfactory at the time. This agreement is why there are a number of graves at that corner of the churchyard, some dated 1918, the time of the great 'Flu' epidemic. The arrangement continued until both the Baptist and Congregational congregations

were organized and their own cemeteries established.

Because the cemetery belongs to the members of the Lutheran congregation, problems have often arisen as to who can and who can't be buried there. Though burial in the cemetery is the right of an active member of the congregation, some special cases have been considered, when the person was known to be a faithful Christian who trusted in his Lord Jesus Christ for eternal life. Still, however, the decision in such cases rests with the congregation but in cases where time is short, the request is usually granted if our local Lutheran Pastor, in agreement with our constitution is willing to conduct the service. There are now 50 or 51 graves in the Cemetery and our prayer is that those who were buried there in faith may share the true riches promised to those who have fallen asleep in the Lord Jesus.

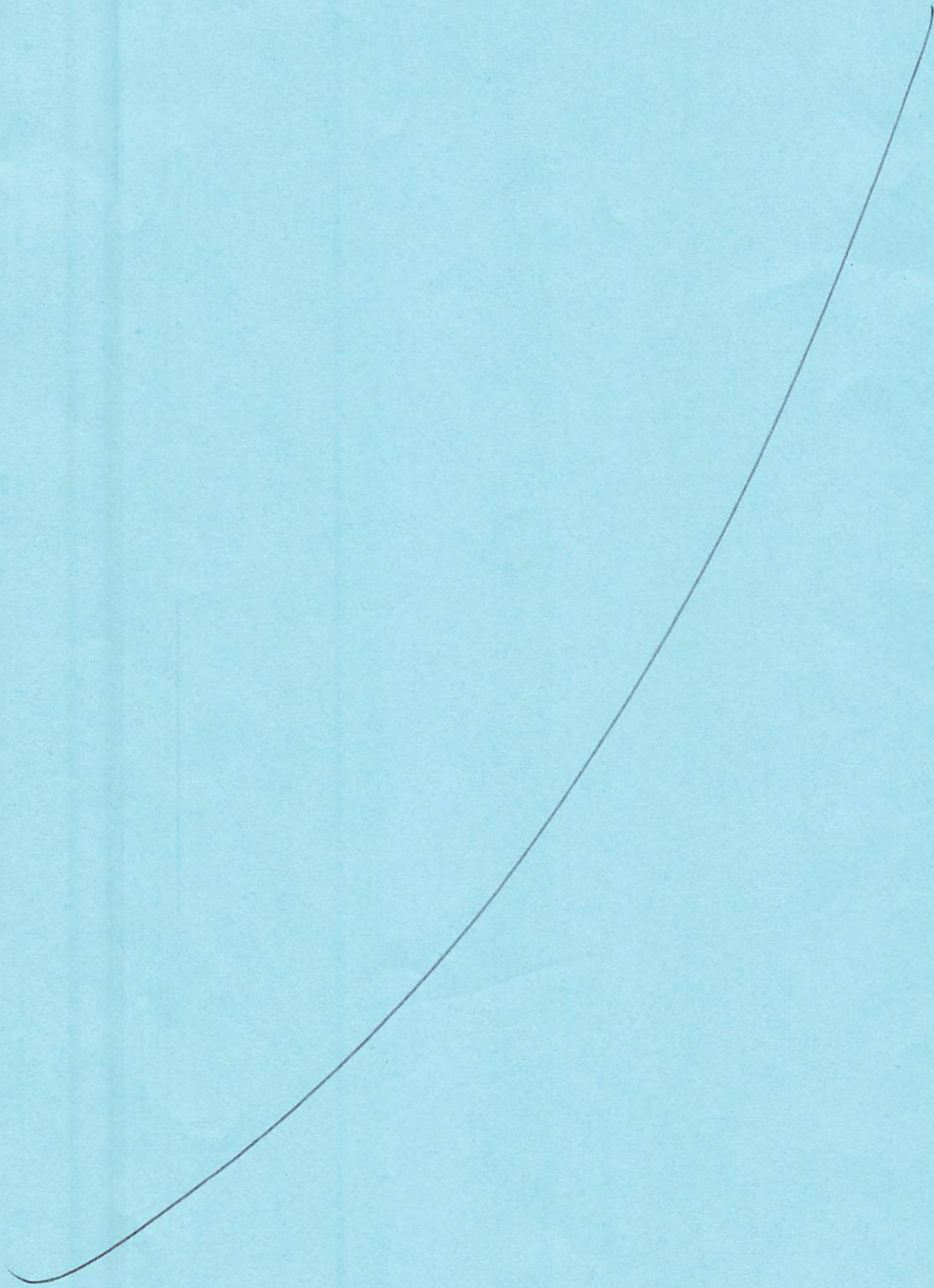
Because of the growing age of the cemetery a special "Cemetery Fund" has been set up to care for those grave sites left unattended. The graveyard has been faithfully maintained by members of St. Paul's since it was first established. As space runs short in the future a special challenge will be where and how the cemetery will expand as the Lord calls his faithful home.

The following description and recording of the grave stones in St. Paul's Lutheran Cemetery has been provided by Mrs. Betty Leonhardt, of Drumheller, Alberta.

The St. Paul's Lutheran Cemetery is located on SE¹₄-15-30-16 W⁴ in the Hand Hills, about 5 miles north of Hand Hills Lake, and is still being used. The Congregation of St. Paul's Lutheran Evangelical Church is celebrating its 70th anniversary this year. No known schematic diagram of the cemetery exists and the deaths have only been written in the church records in the order in which they occurred.

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CROWFOOT MENNONITE CEMETERY

127

For years rumors have circulated about an abandoned cemetery in the Crowfoot area, forty five miles East of Calgary. It had not been registered with the County or the Provincial Government. At this time I am unaware of any plans to do so. Over the years the exact location and how many were buried there was lost and forgotten.

I first became interested in the cemetery, when I read the history book put out by the Makepeace History Society "Echoes from the Past." At this time I contacted people from the area as well as some of those that moved away.

The cemetery is located on NE-26-21-20-W4 approximately a quarter of a mile from the road. The Mennonites first settled in this area in the early 1920's, and by the end of the late 1930's they had all moved away except one family.

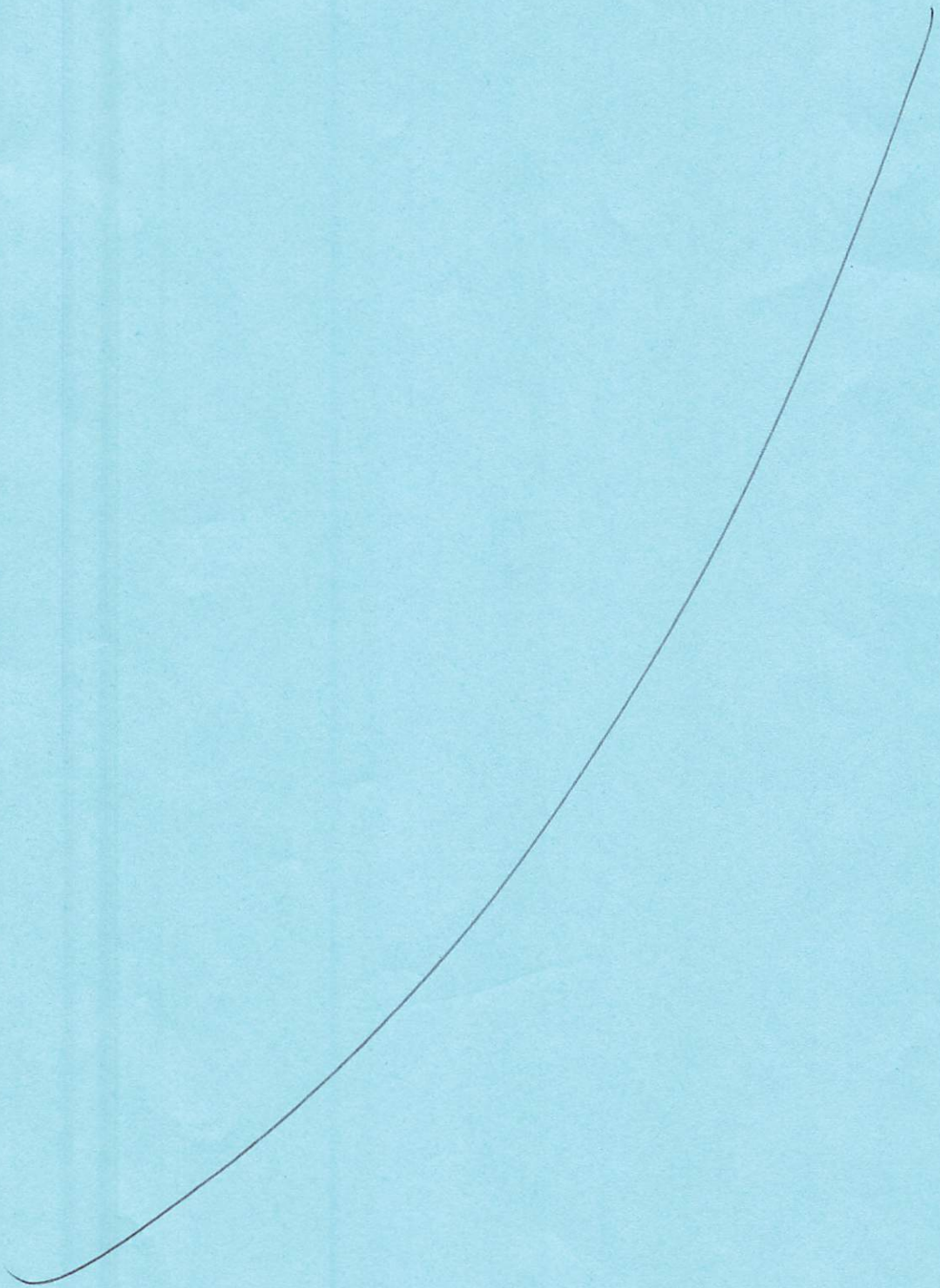
The depression years as well as years of little or no crop including vegetables, was the major factor for them leaving the area. In total there were 19 Mennonite families that lived in the Crowfoot area. There were three colonies in this area of which the cemetery plot and church were located on the Center Farm. From locals and others who lived in the Crowfoot area, I concluded between 18 and 20 people had been buried. When the cemetery was first used it was surrounded by cedar posts and four barb wire strands. The only markers were wooden crosses none of which have survived to this day. The family who now farms the land, the Clark's and Frank Kroeker, grandson of the Pastor of the original congregation, have erected a Cairn.

Title was made 7 April 1915 to Jacob Hohn, Jacob Merkel and Joseph Mohr in "fee simple". These men were members of the Brush Hill German Reformed Church.

The land has been used as a cemetery since 1906, when a small child was the first person to be buried there. The land was donated for this purpose by Mr. Joseph Mohr.

Those buried in Brush Hill Cemetery are the men, women and children who homesteaded the district, who came to a new country and made it into a prosperous district, and thus contributed greatly to the general progress of Alberta. They are now gone, and their families scattered far and wide. In order to help preserve their legacy and the early history of the district, a cairn and bronze plaque have been erected in the cemetery, which states:

Caucasian, Asian, etc.) only diverged from one another in the last 1,500 generations, at the most.

Shoumatoff quotes science writer Guy Murchie: Most geneticists agree that "no human...can be less closely related to any other human than approximately 50th cousin, and most of us are a lot closer. The family trees of all of us, of whatever origin or trait, must meet and merge into one genetic tree of all humanity by the time they have spread into our ancestors for about 50 generations.

They share an ancestor named Richard Morris, a Quaker who lived in pre-Revolutionary New Jersey. Nixon and George Bush are also related: 10th cousins, once removed.

(As an aside, the Mormon Church in Salt Lake City makes use of this device to impress the dignitaries who visit). When a President or world leader or other VIP pays a call on the church leaders, the church sometimes presents the visitor with a genealogy chart to show that he is related to Winston Churchill or Abe Lincoln or Mahatma Ghandi or some similar notable.

Guy Murchie, to each and every one of us: "It is virtually certain that you are a direct descendant of Muhammed....Krishna, Confucius, Abraham, Buddha, Caesar, Ishmael and Judas Iscariot.... The earlier they lived, the more surely you are their descendant."

Shoumatoff: "The political implications of this great kindred are quite exciting. If all of us could be made aware of our multiple interrelatedness, if the same sort of altruism that usually exists among close kin could prevail through the entire human population...(our) differences....would seem secondary."

It's estimated that about 5 billion people are alive in modern times. In the history of the human species about 70 billion to 110 billion of us are believed to have lived at one time or another.

90% of our species passed into oblivion without leaving a record of their names. Only about 6 or 7

billion left any kind of a paper trail. Of those, the Mormon Church has records on 1.5 billion!! Shoumatoff writes, "No genealogical archive is remotely comparable...It is the closest there will ever be to a catalogue for the human race."

The Mountain of Names earlier mentioned in the title refers to a huge nuclear-proof vault full of genealogical records that the Mormon Church maintains in Little Cottonwood Canyon near Salt Lake City. They use these records to perform temple rituals which amount to the baptizing of dead ancestors. Don't worry! They are taking care of your ancestors too!

I hope you enjoyed this and found it as fascinating as I did. While we may not necessarily be our brother's keeper, we surely are his cousin.
