Unlikely Sources: Transcriptions from Petitions in the **Executive Council Records (1816-1825)**

Compiled by Linda Jean Nicholson

Genealogical research of the late 1700's through the mid 1800's records can be a frustrating experience for researchers. The existence of church records and passenger lists is sporadic, newspapers often contain-little information regarding individuals and census records, except in aggregated form, do not exist from 1799 through 1840. While land and probate records may offer researchers some aid, it is common to find no information on an individual between his date of immigration and his listing in the 1841 census. This absence of records is especially prevalent when researching an individual who was neither prominent or wealthy.

An abundance of information is easily accessible for the late 1800's, but research prior to this period takes a considerable effort on the part of the researcher who must seek out seemingly unlikely sources. One such source is the early Prince Edward Island government records. Hidden in the annals of these records - legislative, executive and judicial - is a wealth of information. The majority of these records are at the provincial archives and consist of publications, microfilm and documents.

The next few pages are transcriptions from a small section of one of these groups of records - Petitions to the Executive Council. The majority of petitions presented to the Executive Council were made by individuals. However, some group petitions were filed and all which were submitted from 1816 to 1825 are transcribed below. It is recommended that an examination be made of the original document when utilizing this information in research.

Several recently published articles which relate to genealogical sources in government documents are listed on page 21 of this newsletter.

That a number of your Petitioners have been long resident in that Royalty and have been put in possession of Land as and for their respective Lots which they have settled upon and cultivated.

That your Petitioners who have recently obtained Grants of Pasture Lots never have been put in possession and are thereby prevented from cultivating the same.

That a number of People are desirous of becoming settlers in that Royalty but are prevented from applying to your Excellency in council for Grants owing to the incorrect state of the Plan now in the Surveyor Generals Office.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency with the advice of His Majestys Council will be pleased to order His Majestys Surveyor General to take a Survey of Prince Town and Royalty and make a Plan thereof so as to allow each settler to enjoy his own improvements undisturbed. 



Tea at Peter's Road, Lot 63

From the Presbyterian and Evangelican Protestant Union newspaper, 27 July 1882, page 3:

"The above tea was a grand success for a country place. About 1,500 persons of all denominations, were present. Over \$ 730.00 was realized, about \$ 200.00 were raised by the sale of a fine and large supply of cakes as we have ever saw at any one Tea heretofore. These were contributed by R. Catholics as well as Protestants. It was very nice to see so many R. Catholics also friendly patronize the Tea by their attendance and purchasing of cakes, while a Catholic and a Protestant - A.C. MacDonald, Esq. and J.M. Aitken, Esq. sold them by auction. - A fine new church, partially built, will by the proceeds of this Tea be about completed. It is a good large size, of the most improved style of architecture, and is a credit to the settlement. Mr. Angus McFadgen is the contractor.

Islanders Away

Naturalization Records at the National Archives in Waltham, Massachusetts.

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Following is a listing of records of PEI natives with a surname beginning with the letter "A" who applied for American citizenship in the records of the U.S. District Court in Boston between 1906 and 1926. The information was transcribed from microfilm reels at the National Archives in Waltham, Massachusetts. These films are often unclear, and thus many of the certificate and petition numbers in the following transcript contain question marks. Also, incorrect spellings of place names remain as they were found in the microfilm.

In the case where certificate and petition numbers are not complete, be certain to include all information on the individual. The archives staff will not perform extensive research. But they will provide information over the phone or through the mail if the information desired is brief and easily obtainable.



The Seduction Act Records of 1876-1924

Genealogists have often been faced with a dearth of information surrounding the situation of unmarried mothers and their children. Surviving records which were produced when women sued for damages under the 1876 Seduction Act may help to fill this void. The Seduction Act of 1876 (39 Vic. Cap. 4) introduced procedural changes with regard to actions taken against men for damages arising out of the birth of children out of wedlock. Under 1852 legislation such cases were tried by a judge and jury. This practise was changed in 1858 with revised legislation stating Justices of the Peace would hear and determine the woman's suit with the hearing of the cause being conducted "in as private a manner as the circumstances of the case shall admit of".

Documents created under the Seduction Act of 1876 include a series of petitions sworn before a judge of the Supreme Court which named the father of the child, and when approved by the judge, were directed to Justices of the Peace who would hear and determine if damages would be levied against the alleged father. Under the act the plaintiff could be awarded as much as two hundred dollars. The 1924 "Children of Unmarried Parents Act", stipulating that a Provincial Guardian appointed by the Lieutenant Governor was to gather information on all children of unmarried parents, repealed the 1876 Seduction Act.

The files of petitions from 1876 through 1888 are arranged chronologically by the year of the petition (not by the year of the child's birth). There are no petition files for the years 1800 through 1883. Petitions include the name and location of the woman and the name of the man she alleges to be the father of her child. Many of the early cases also give the date of the birth and the sex of the child though children's names are not supplied.

The transcript of a typical petition follows: "Mary Ann Welsh of Montague, Single Woman maketh oath and saith on or about the 28th day of April 1887 this deponent was delivered of a female child, and that James O'Brien of Montague is the father of the said child and this deponent suspects that unless the said James O'Brien, give bail for his appearance or to answer the damages sustained by deponent in respect of said child, he will endeavor to evade service of final execution in case the same shall be awarded against him."

Many of the petitions have this general format, but there are variations of the oaths which contain additional information. For example, the petitions of William Sanderson, a Justice of the Peace in Georgetown, usually included the name and occupation of the father of the woman and the occupation of the alleged father as well as other details. The petition files may also contain correspondence between Justices of the Peace and judges of the Supreme Court with the Justices of the Peace nominating certain individuals to adjudicate a certain case or asking for clarification on a certain woman's eligibility under the Seduction Act and so on.

A sample of the information contained in the petition filed of 1876 through 1878 follows (petitions of 1879 and 1884-1888 also contain approximately 20 petitions per year). More complete information is available from the documents and may include the full name of the woman, where the oath was sworn, the local Justice of the Peace who administered the oath, the father of the woman, the alleged father's occupation, community and Lot number, and other details. The accuracy of some surnames as given in the table is certainly questionable. The researcher may be able to glean more accurate information from examining the documents.



The 1876 Seduction Act records also consist of application forms contained in three record books for the years 1892-1923. These applications, unlike the early petitions, rarely contain the date of birth nor the sex of the child. Information in the record books includes the date of application, name of the woman and her location, the alleged father's name and his location, and the name of the person or persons assigned by the judge to hear and determine the case. Two of the record books contain approximately 200 cases with Judge Hazard's volume of 1920-1923 containing only 18 completed forms.

Researchers should be cautioned that the applications to the court and the early petitions contain allegations by the woman as to who was the father of her child. These documents do not contain the judgments of the Justices of the Peace who adjudicated these cases. In any case, the Seduction records of 1876-1924 may provide the researcher with the clues or answers to what would otherwise remain an unsolvable family mystery.


Since the early Seventies when I first saw the reprint of Meacham's 1880 Atlas I have been working on the story of my maternal ancestors, most of whom arrived on PEI in the early 1800's; some first in Tryon, Lot 28 and many "up West", but most of them finally settled in or near Kildare, Lot 3, Prince Edward Island (PEI), Canada. At first I called it a "genealogy" but as I came more familiar with what that term meant it became clear that using true genealogical standards would limit the story to types of proof that would necessitate leaving out interesting parts of the story that seemed clearly true but were based on circumstantial evidence. Accordingly, I'll call it a "history story" and try to make reasonable arguments to justify any parts for which I don't have original source documentation. I hope readers will not be too critical of some of my broader leaps of faith.

One of the first steps I took was to collect as much vital record data as possible and input it on a computer Filer Program with eight data fields. This allowed me to sort the information in several different ways and thereby detect reasonable relationships, that would not otherwise be evident, among persons on different parts of the Island.. Unfortunately it required that the use of common spelling of surnames that were spelled in a variety of ways in the records. For the most part I have retained that common spelling throughout this narrative, but have tried to justify my assumptions that the different names were those of the same family.

The amount of space devoted to each name, except "Mackie" does not reflect my consideration of their importance, but simply the amount of data I could find out about them. I have written more about the Mackies in my unpublished, Some Descendants of Patrick Mackie and Mary Myers, but have found little about the Myers', for example and much about others. Ann Isabel Ahearn was my gr.gr grandmother so the Ahearn name is not that close to me genetically but I have written a lot about the Ahearns because I found a lot, and because theirs is an interesting story. In fact the searching for information, analyzing it and theorizing about it to build a reasonable story about my forebears is the most enjoyable part of this whole endeavor.

The story starts with a family chart on the first page that is an end product, to this point. It is shown at the beginning to give readers an overview. There is also an appendix with a cadastral map of Kildare, and a key to the abreviations that are used, primarily in the several charts that are included.

Mackie Surname

Patrick Mackie (6), "Paddy" to us, in addition to running a large farm in St.Roche, PEI skippered the schooner Maggie Macbeth which sailed primarily between Tignish Harbor and Chatham or New Castle, New Brunswick, on the Miramichi River.

(Incidentally Mackie was most often spelled Mackey in those days. Edward MacLysaght in his book, The Surnames of Ireland says that it is not a "Mac" name at all but an "O" name and the O'Mackeys [O'Macdha]) stem from Ballymackey, Tipperary.)

I had assumed that, like many others on the western end of the Island (and since Paddy sailed there) the Mackies had immigrated via the Miramichi River area of New Brunswick. As a result much of my early searching for his forebears was fruitlessly pursued in that province.

When Fr. Claude Shea, Pastor of St.Simon and St.Jude parish in Tignish correctly interpreted the name Bridget "Shreenan" listed as Patrick's (12) first wife on parish records and informed me that "Shreenan" was a "Monaghan" name it opened new doors for me. He told me large group of Irish from County Monaghan had settled in the Kelly's Cross area in the 1840's so my search took a new direction.


Records in the Basilica at Charlottetown show that Fr. Malachy Reynolds officiated at the marriage of Patrick Mackie and Bridget Shreenan in 1841. Fr Reynolds didn't list the names of parents of the couple or location of the wedding but I feel certain that this Patrick was the son of another Patrick Mackie listed on the 1841 census of Lot 28, near the Monaghan settlers. He lived in Tryon with a family of six, two of whom were over sixty years old (Pat & his wife Mary Myers?). His family consisted of; one male under sixteen, two over sixteen and one female over sixteen.



This is the area of Lot 3, PEI that many of our forebears first setled in the 1820's and thirties. The two farms of Peter and William Whelan near the shore straddling the O'Rourke Rd.(the one in the middle extending from the shore into Lot 2.) was first leased to James Phelan(sic) in 1830. He married Ann Isabel Ahearn. Just below this are farms that had been those of Michael and Patrick Cahill who had married Bridget and Catherine Mackie. The farm further up O'Rourke Rd listed under the name of Silas Raynor had been that of Patrick Mackie II who had died in 1870. Unfortunately the Mackies tended to be rebels and didn't bother with the legality of leases. The Mrs Kinch at "Kinch's Corner" is Mrs Lawrence Kinch. The Patrick Mackey at the top is not in the direct family line. He is related but I don't know how.

One noticeable mistake which because evident during this project were the errors commonly made by census takers. A number of census takers "wandered" outside their assigned lots. Families enumerated and recorded as residing in one lot were actually living in an adjacent one. This has been noted in the Lot 65/31 and in the Lot 57/58 areas and may have happened elsewhere. Many of the 1901 enumerators could not perform simple mathematics! An individuals age plus their year of birth should equal the year of the census, keeping in mind the census was taken in the spring of 1901. However, in 7.3% (7,600) of the numbers don't add up. The most common error is one of ten years. The birth year appears to be the information recorded incorrectly. Generally, ages appear to be correct when compared to the other members of the family. We have not corrected these errors as the project has endeavored to produce an accurate transcription of the primary documents.

We have spent considerable efforts to ensure accuracy in data entry, but are aware that some errors will have occurred. The purpose of these publications and databases are as finding aids. It is strongly recommended that the original documents and other sources be consulted to confirm the information.

According to the 1901 census, there were approximately 2,700 surnames in use in the Province. The ten most common surnames have been tallied below. Not surprising, as with the 1891 census, the most common surname on P.E.I. in 1901 was still McDonald with 4,652 individuals bearing that name.

Lot 11 Report of Inspectors Craswell and Anderson circa 1856

by William M. Glen CG(C) & Elizabeth A. Glen CG(C)

The following report was found in the P.E.I. Public Archives and Records Office, on the microfilm of Lot 11 leases and related documents. The document was after the title packages for Lot 11 and before the Lot 12 leases. It was undated, but the warrant of payment in the 1856 Journal of the Legislative Assembly, Appendix K, number 1025 recorded James Craswell and Alexander Anderson being paid for the inspection of Lot 11. They were paid the considerable sum of 32 pounds, 10 shillings and 10 pence. Text of the whole document has been reproduced below, the schedule contains only the tenants' names and the acreage of land they were occupying. (The original schedule also includes the total value that the individual farm rent should be and the amount currently being paid.)

Report of the Commissioners appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council to inspect and value certain lands on Township No. 11 and are as follows.

According to instructions we commenced inspecting the land and farms leading to Welch Town, bordering on the east side of Foxley River, Welch Town, and the northernmost point, of the Township, fronting on Cascampec Harbour commonly named Hardys Island, also the large extensive marsh attached thereto, This Island contain about forty acres of good dry land fit for cultivation, covered with hard and softwood.

This small Island is situated, and from the opening of a New Harbour through the Sandhills more convenient to its approach, offer a most excellent stand for a fishery establishment, there being a good channel up to the west front on the Foxley River, which forms a cover, and make a good harbour sheltered from the North East Storms. The large marsh attached to the Island contain eighty acres, appear to be fast going to destruction for the want of fencing, draining and the commissioners feel safe in stating, if this marsh where let to careful and improving tenants, bound to fence and drain, it may yet be made to yield crops of hay fully to compensate for the trouble and expense.

Welsh Town consists of a house and barn, occupied by John McPhee being the Ferry Point to Cascampec about one hundred acres of land most of which appear good - The narrow skirt of land between Welsh Town and the next farm, held by James Brundige is inferior - The other farms on the same side Foxley River up to the residence of the Hon. James Warburtons are generally good.

Proceeded to the point of the Narrows, on the East Boundary inspected the large marshes and lands attached to them belonging to the Township. The Marsh at the point of narrows have been a very fine one, but fast approaching to ruin, quite a common, no fence around it, this marsh if properly fenced and judiciously drained, may yet be made a fund of wealth to the industrious farmer, as on viewing one of a similar description, occupied by Phillip Gain it being fenced and drained for the last two or three years assume a very improving appearance yield good hay. The lands attached to these marshes are inferior, large tracks of marsh between those named, are too far gone from neglect ever to be restored to pay for improving them.

The first farms in that shore are tenanted by George Luke on the one, and Phillip Gain on the other side of Youngs Inlet, both good lands, Widow Collings - James Bulger - and William Inglis are next adjoining, to Inglis Farm is a marsh which having been fenced and drained for some years have become a valuable acquisition to him, the quality of those, and all the other farms will be shown in the Schedule attached to this report.

Proceeding along the shore of the narrows towards the South Boundary line, we came to the large marsh called Cranberry Marsh, that also is in a ruinous state, and lying to common, this large marsh may yet by industry and care be made to give a fair return for the outlay necessary to improve it.

The farm on the south boundary line, occupied by Michael Ramsay, fronting on the north branch of Little Channel River have on its front a shipyard, a vessel is now building of three hundred tons; inspecting through the different parts of the Township that is settled, we find some farms of second class, as will also be shown on the schedule.

In travelling through the woods on the south boundary line from the Barlow road, East, down to the Tide way, we ascertained there to be a good mill site, unoccupied, capable of being tenanted, on the brook that empty into the north branch of the Little Channel River, being the only mill site on the Township we can recommend having sufficient water to drive a mill, the land adjoining are second quality.

The boundary line between Lots Eleven and Twelve, from Barlow road to Western road, is studed with small tracks of hardwood, spruce, mixed wood, and spots of swamp.

In travelling through the Township, East side of the western road by four different directions, we found the land to consists of sections very fine hardwood, small hills fine growth of spruce, spots of mixed hard and soft, large dry spaces of hemlock, pine, spruce and the stumpage of which may be considerable / with here and there a narrow swale of very superior ash, the soil of which is rich and fertilizing, there are also some fine cedar swamps, where the Western Boundary line crosses the western road there is large track of burnt land running along the line through to the head of the Rivers, at the north boundary stake and across to Alexander MacDonalds at the head of Rachael River, only first of this is fit for cultivation, the other is good for pasture. From the North Boundary Stake, bordering on Portage River there is a superior marsh, which cut annually, twenty or thirty tons fine hay, in the occupation of John Hughes, the land adjoining this marsh, is partly fit for croping, but in general what we have gone through, the greater part is dry and fit for settlement, equal in quality to the lands already settled.

The land on the west side of the Western road, is part damp, the greatest portion is covered with hardwood, skirted on the back line with a fine grove of cedar poles, several good farms on that part of the Township not taken up The West Boundary line adjoining Lot Ten, which we consider to be incorrect/ have been run by Bruce Stewart, Esq. Proprietor of Lot 10/ at the place of commencement it go in on Lot 11 several chains from the original boundary, then running south one mile and half, where the line strike the Western Road there a jog is made, at right angles on Lot /11/ thirteen chains and forty links, from that it proceeds again, on a south course, until it meet the South Boundary line, taking from Lot 11 several hundred acres of land, for further particulars respecting this line we beg to refer you to the Hon. James Warburton.

In the event of the government purchasing the Estate, we beg to suggest before disposing of any of the wilderness lands, if roads were opened from the Western road leading through the woods, to the settlement at Warburtons road, in such parallel lines and situations as would show the best localities for settlement, it would enhance the value of the property, facilitate its settlement, and make convenient communication for the tenantry to other parts of the Island.

The road and water communication of the Township is convenient, and good for shipping produce, etc. vessels of considerable burden can load alongside of the Canadian Bridge and boats of large size at many places at the Township shores.

We have after a careful personal inspect of the lands on Township No. 11 (more particularly from the general opinion that the greater part was unfit for cultivation) come to the opinion that 4250 acres of the settled

lands, named in schedule first class, may realize 10 shillings per acre, about 1280 acres, second class, settled, 7 shillings 6 pence per acre, which most probably will both be resold to the present settlers as early as arrangements can be entered into; about 3000 acres of wilderness land first class 7 shillings 6 pence - 2000 second class 5 shillings. The remainder inferior though not valueless - Also large tracks of marsh which if divided and sold, or let with wilderness farms may effect sales earlier and more advantageously.



Charlottetown Guardian, Friday, 9 August 1907, page 8:

The following extract from a letter received from Miss Marion Brehaut, by her sister Mrs. Cory Steeves, Summerside, in reference to the accident briefly referred to in the Guardian Wednesday morning, shows what a miraculous escape she had from a terrible death. After referring to her visit to the Lake of the Woods Flouring Mill with a party of friends she proceeds, "We spied one of those endless chain elevators. You step on to a ladder and up it goes, pausing at each floor for persons to get off. The ladder goes up over a large wheel at the top and comes down on the other side. To remain on too long means that you will go over the wheel and come down head foremost. And that is what I did ten days ago and I am still alive to tell it. Thinking there was another floor above me I stayed on the elevator. When I discovered my awful mistake I gave one scream and fainted. Dr. Bordman and Miss Waddell (Charlottetown) had gone up first. Hearing my screams they rushed to the landing and as I was falling past, Dr. Bordman caught at my dress to try and stop me. That effort saved my life, for instead of falling sixty feet the jerk at my dress swerved me and I landed on the next floor instead of into a mass of revolving machinery below. I fell forty-eight feet. When they picked me up they thought I was dead but he doctor said I was breathing and they carried me on a stretcher to Keewatin Hospital. On examination they found that my left arm was broken, my head badly cut and my back injured. They took me to Winnipeg next day and when I became conscious I was back in my own room in the hospital. For two days I was very low but since then I have gained surprisingly."

Miss Brehaut's many friends will be pleased to learn that later letters tell of continued improvement and that she will in all probability be none the worst for her terrible experience.

Lest We Forget: Those Gallant Islanders Who Fought and Died in the American Civil War

On November 11 of each year, Prince Edward Islanders pay their respects to native sons, servicemen, who died during a number of savage wars fought overseas during this century. But, Island-born soldiers and seamen fought and died in a great war on this side of the Atlantic Ocean, too.

The American Civil War took place during the 19th century (1861-1865), and to this day remains as North America's bloodiest conflict. Over three million servicemen participated in the 'War Between the States' – 2,213,400 wore Union blue, and 1,003,600 donned Confederate gray. More than 660,000 Yankees and Rebels died during the war – almost one in every five (20.51 per cent). A sobering statistic to say the least. Because medical knowledge was limited in the mid-1800's, the majority of Civil War deaths (over 500,000) were attributed to disease, and not only on the battlefields. Dysentery put many a young soldier, on both sides, in a grave. Sterilization by boiling water wasn't even common knowledge at the time of the Civil War. Army surgeons had nothing to curb infection for wounded soldiers, as penicillin had not yet been invented. Those soldiers fortunate to be released from an army hospital in good health, had good luck rather than good management to thank. Ignorance of nutritious food for the men of the opposing armies also added to the high mortality rate, along with unsanitary camp conditions, pesky insects and poor weather.

Island Surgeon

The medical staff was just as vulnerable to disease as the soldiers. Dr. James Wightman of Lower Montague, P.E.I., served as an assistant surgeon with the 2nd Mass. He was assigned to Aquia Creek Hospital after the Battle of Chancellorsville in May of 1863. The twenty-one year old doctor died of typhoid in Washington, D.C. on June 15th 1863. He was buried in St. Andrews Point Pioneer Cemetery, P.E.I.

Decades before the industrial North and agricultural South eventually took up arms against each other, there were bitter difference of opinion among the states on both sides of the Mason-Dixon Line. State rights and the abolition of slavery were the major issues. Aristocratic Southerners - chiefly the well-to-do plantation owners – didn't want to relinquish what they proudly referred to as their "way of life". And they were willing to go to war to defend their ideals!

As always, down through history, rich men make war. . . young men fight, and die. Both the North and South paid dearly in wartime 'flower of their youth' casualties. The war came to an end in April of 1865, with the surrender of Confederation armies to U.S. Army Commander, General Ulysses S. Grant.

Over 500,000 foreign-born soldiers and seamen served in the ranks of both Union and Confederate armies. These men came from England, Scotland, Ireland, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Switzerland, Germany and Canada. An estimated 50,000 Canadians participated in the American Civil War – and Prince Edward Islanders were among them!

In 1861, the population of Prince Edward Island was 80,857. Possibly as many as 300 Island sons fought in the Civil War. The majority of these Islanders took up arms for President Abraham Lincoln's U.S. Army, but some also sided with Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederation States of America.

Why did Prince Edward Islanders fight in the American Civil War? Reasons, naturally, vary. Some had already moved to the States to find employment, and were living there when war broke out; some because they had friends and relatives in the States; others may have gone simply for the romance and adventure sometimes associated with war. Another lure was money. A U.S. infantry private was paid \$ 13 per month, a tidy sum in those days. Bounty money offered by the U.S. government to new recruits (after conscription proved unpopular) was \$ 300 for three years, a seductive figure. Bounty enticements ranged as high as \$ 1,500 in some western American locales.

Islanders served in all branches of the service during the Civil War – infantry, artillery, cavalry and navy.

Drummer Boy

At least one Prince Edward Islander was a drummer boy – John J. Clooney of Charlottetown. Too young to carry a musket, Johnny joined the 2nd Mass. Infantry, Co. D. He enlisted as an apprentice musician on May 24, 1861. Johnny became a prisoner of war near Fort Royal, Virginia on July 18, 1862, but was paroled and returned to duty on October 22, 1862. He deserted on February 22, 1864 and enlisted elsewhere.

Served in the Navy

William Connell (U.S.S. Wabash), Samuel L. Crawford (ship's carpenter, U.S.S. Mississippi), Alex Dewar, William Matheson (U.S.S. Princeton), Isaac McColliff [MacAuliff?] and Robert Wisener (U.S.S. frigate Commodore) were some of the known Islanders who served with the U.S. Navy during the Civil War.

Island Rebels

Two Islanders served in Confederation cavalry units – Lieutenant Alexander MacIntosh of Birch Hill (Col. Buchell's 1st Texas Cavalry, Co. B) and James Machon of Murray Harbour (2nd Louisiana Cavalry, Co. K).

MacIntosh was wounded and taken prisoner late in the war and was released at its conclusion. He settled in Port Lavaca, Texas, and resided there until his death in 1883.

The only other known Prince Edward Island born rebel was Sargent Robert Alder MacLeod of Bedeque 925th South Carolina Infantry). MacLeod, who lost his right arm in battle, served under Confederation generals Pierre T.G. Beauregard and Robert E. Lee.

Artillery

David Moreton (2nd Mass. Heavy Artillery, Co. H), Henry McKenzie (3rd Mass. Heavy Artillery, Co. A), and Sargent Maurice O'Connor of Kildare (5th Maine Light Artillery, Co. C) handled the big guns for the Federal Army.

Moreton, a schoolteacher, enlisted on July 30, 1864, and mustered out on September 3, 1865.

McKenzie, listed as a seaman, enlisted on December 29, 1862. He was promoted to corporal and transferred to the Navy on May 7, 1864.

O'Connor, a three-year veteran, returned to Prince Edward Island seven days after the war ended. He died in 1929 and was buried in Alberton Sacred Heart Cemetery.

Horse Soldiers

Prince Edward Islanders who served with the U.S. Cavalry included:

- Michael Cummings (4th Mass. Cavalry, Co. F).
- Sargent Peter Dewar of Montague (died August 1864).
- Benjamin Huestis of S.W. Bedeque or Middleton (private, 1st Iowa Cavalry, Co. G). He died at the age of thirty-seven of chronic diarrhea at Little Rock, Arkansas, in the summer of 1862.
- Neil C. MacEachern of Canoe Cove (6th Michigan Cavalry), a South Shore schoolteacher who served three years.
- Donald MacFadyen (1st Mass. Cavalry, Co. A), occupation listed as farmer. He enlisted at the age of twenty-one on August 24, 1864, and mustered out on June 26, 1865.

Highest Ranking Islanders

Two of the known highest-ranked Islanders in the United States Army during the Civil War were Lieutenant-Colonel Frederick Cooper of Charlottetown (7th New Jersey Infantry Volunteers) and Captain William Rufus Black of Searletown (4th Mass. Infantry, Co. F). Lieutenant-Colonel Cooper fought in one of the premiere battles of the war at Fredericksburg, Virginia on December 13, 1862. It resulted in a decisive Confederate victory for General Robert E. Lee, the South's revered commander.

Died From Battle

Islanders faced the deadly shot and shell in just about every major battle of the war. Some didn't survive.

- Archibald Buchanan of Charlottetown (19th Mass. Infantry, Co. K). Died as a result of wounds at the Battle of the Wilderness on May 10, 1864.
- James Campbell (3rd New Hampshire Infantry, Co. D). Died as the result of wounds at Laurel Hill, Virginia on October 7, 1864.
- Thomas Inglis Gardiner of Lower Bedeque. Killed at Baton Rouge, Louisiana on August 5, 1862.
- Alexander Grant of Charlottetown (18th Mass. Infantry, Co. A.). Killed in action at Sharpsburg, Maryland on September 17, 1862 at the age of twenty-two.
- Sargent John J. MacDonald of Fairfield (28th Mass. Infantry, Color Bearer). Killed in action during the Battle of Secessionville on James Island, South Carolina on June 16, 1862.

- Murdock Nicholson (7th New Hampshire Infantry, Co. G). Enlisted at the age of twenty-three as a substitute on September 30, 1863. Killed in action at the Battle of Olustee, Florida on February 10, 1864.
- Orderly Sergeant George E. H. Parkin of Charlottetown (3rd New York, Co. C.). Died of wounds on Monday, May 15, 1862, following the Battle of Williamsburg, Virginia on May 5th. He was nineteen years of age.
- J. J. Pollard of the U.S. Army of Tennessee, commanded by General William T. Sherman. Died in Chattanooga, Tennessee on May 24, 1864, as a result of a mortal would received at the Battle of Resaca, Georgia (May 15). He was nineteen years of age.
- Colin Shaw of Elliot River (11th Mass. Infantry). Died at the age of thirty from the results of wounds sustained on July 2, 1863, during the Battle of Gettysburg.
- James Stewart of Brackley Point Road (Private, 1st Pennsylvania Rifles Volunteer Infantry, Co. D). Died as a result of wounds in the Battle of Sharpsburg, Maryland.
- Sargent Peter Welsh of Charlottetown (Color Bearer, 28th Mass. Infantry, of the famous Irish Brigade). Wounded in the arm at the Battle of Spotsylvania, Virginia on May 12, 1864 and died of infection on May 28, 1864.

Died of Disease

Other native Prince Edward Islanders who died of disease in the Federal service during the war were James Jesse Baker of Central Bedeque (of fever, January 16, 1863) and Dan McKinnon of Goose River, Lot 42. McKinnon was wounded at Chesterfield, Virginia on May 14, 1864. His wounds were healing while he was cared for at Hammond General Hospital in Maryland. Then diarrhea set in and he failed rapidly. He died at the age of twenty-one on July 17, 1864.

Prisoners of War

Prince Edward Islanders also became inmates at Civil War prison camps.


- William Cox (2nd Mass. Infantry, Co. G). He enlisted at the age of twenty-five on May 30, 1864. He was a prisoner of war in Atlanta, Georgia from August 22, 1864 to December 14, 1864, when he was paroled. He mustered out on July 4, 1865.
- John Wightman of Lower Montague (28th Mass. Infantry). Age 23 years. He was wounded in hand at the Battle of Spotsylvania, Virginia on May 12, 1864, taken prisoner, and moved to Richmond, Virginia.
- Josiah MacLeod (U.S. Army of Tennessee). Participated in the Battle of Shiloh, Pittsburgh Landing, Tennessee on April 6th to 7th, 1862. He was captured and taken prisoner at Corinth, Mississippi.



The funeral will take place on Sunday next, at 2 p.m., when the friends and acquaintances of the deceased are respectfully invited to attend.

Examiner 29 Jan 1849: *Died*: On Wednesday, the 17th inst., at York River, Mr. Conrad Younker, in the 77th year of his age. The deceased was a native of Germany and has resided on this Island for a period of 65 years.

It is thought that there are three underground vaults, as well. One is said to hold the remains of a famous shipbuilder of Charlottetown, as well as three other family members.

Please see the biographies page for biographies of some of the many people known to be buried here.

From the names listed there, we can readily see what a treasure trove the Elm Avenue Cemetery is. It is a demographer's, social studies student's, historian's or genealogists "jack pot". Here, we can study the dates and places of emigration, the numbers of young children who died at various ages, the number of women who died young - some in childbirth, and others from illnesses for which no miracle drugs existed, such as whooping cough, pneumonia, tuberculosis, diphtheria, scarlet fever, and even measles. We may also learn of the many who contributed so much to our beginnings and culture.

This small, hallowed plot of land should be declared a historic site where one might go to immerse ones self in our Island's history, and to learn about our own families history.

The Elm Avenue cemetery today is a disgrace to visit, and has been for many years. It is overgrown, neglected, a repository for garbage; the dense bushes and overturned stones shelter some of our local derelicts, who scatter their empty bottles and other wastes about. Over the years, some of the backyards of adjoining properties have encroached on its fringes.

Vandals have overturned and broken many of the headstones. Each year, many stones have been destroyed, so it is doubtful if one sixth of the stones described in the 1947 transcript still stand, yet we hear nothing about any arrests of these offenders. Where are our police, our city officials, and our local provincial representatives who should have seen fit many years ago to have this cemetery declared a historic site?

Generally, the excuse given is that it is the property of St. Paul's Anglican Church, so that is the church's responsibility. Let us be fair: St. Paul's was the only Protestant Church for all in the early days, so the clergy from there performed all Christian burials for all denominations across the Island. Therefore, it should be the responsibility of all Protestant churches to help maintain this cemetery in a respectful manner, so that it could be another site tourists to this province could be encouraged to visit. Indeed, in 1904-1905, all Protestant Churches subscribed to its upkeep; however, except for occasional grass cutting little else has been done in the last 90 years.

Something must be done to honor these early settlers and our ancestors whose remains rest here.

Historians, genealogists, Charlottetown officials, parliamentarians, and Island Citizens must all do something to make this forgotten spot a place of beauty, and one that shows our respect to these early settlers. If we do not, the remaining stones will all be gone, and then this spot will be a target for business development, stores, fast foods, Laundromats or other commercial buildings. Soon, too, it will be forgotten like the first Protestant Cemetery which was located somewhere in downtown Charlottetown, and all our early History will be lost forever. It is up to us!

Prominent Burials in the Elm Avenue Cemetery

Biographies by Orlo Jones CG(C), 1997, 1999.

David and George Allan - Died as very young children in 1847 and 1843. They were the children of George Allan, a stone cutter, who may have worked on the construction of Province House.

Frances Elizabeth Alley - Died Sept. 1869, age 20, and her husband, Thomas Alfred Alley, who died in Mar. 1869, age 29. Thomas, an architect was the Superintendent of Works at the military compound at Brighton. The old Thomas Alley House is the present home of the Canadian Red Cross.

Samuel Bagnall - A United Empire Loyalist, died in Apr. 1810, age 65. He fled to the Island in 1787 from New York. He became a deputy sheriff and a jailer, and later, the Sergeant at Arms, as well as being a cabinet maker by trade.

Jabez Bernard - Immigrated from England in 1809. He died in 1851, age 71, after serving as a carpenter on the Island for almost 50 years.

William Bain - A bricklayer, who worked on Province House. He lost his son, William D. in June 1863, age 23.

Helen Bayfield - Daughter of Admiral Bayfield. She was an artist and died in 1867.

Prominent Burials in Elm Avenue Cemetery (continued)

John Charles Binns, Esq. - Lived on Kent St., and was an attorney. He later moved to "Binsted" in the Royalty, and died in 1870, age 62. He was the son of Charles Binns, who was a member of what was called the "Escheat Party", under William Cooper. Charles was a lawyer who died in 1847 at the age of 83, while his wife, Elizabeth, died the following year at 62 years.

George Birnie – He was a son of Alexander Birnie, of the firm Birnie and Waters, London, merchants who operated a business on the Island from 1810 until 1841. At this time, the buildings were put up for sale, but there were no buyers. His son, George built a large warehouse on the property, and began the Phoenix Foundry, which operated until 1850. George died in 1863, age 77. His wife, Magdalene, died two years later at age 76. She was a daughter of the famous John Stewart of Mt. Stewart.

Samuel Braddock - A United Empire Loyalist and a member of the House of Assembly in the election called by Gov. Patterson in 1774. He lost his third daughter, Hannah, in 1831, aged 28.

Commander John Beazely – He owned the property where the Provincial Exhibition Grounds are now located. He lost his wife in 1850, at age 49, while he died some time after this.

John Brecken - A United Empire Loyalist, arrived here from Sherbourne in 1784 with his wife, Ann, who died at the age of 82 in 1811. John became a merchant in Charlottetown and owned a business, John Brecken and Company. He was elected to the House of Assembly in 1785. Prior to 1826, he left his business to his grandsons, and he sailed for England, where he died. His grandson, Ralph, was a merchant and exporter; he was elected to the House of Assembly and became Speaker of the House in 1812. He was a Lieutenant in the Militia, and a Justice of the Peace. He became a leading spokesman for the tenantry in the Assembly. His bride was Matilda Robinson, a daughter of Lt. Col. Joseph Robinson. Ralph died in 1813, and Matilda in 1842, age 65. It was one of Ralph's sons-in-law who established the Macdonald Consolidated School in Mt. Herbert.

Alexander Brown - Master of the newly founded Grammar School in 1825, then assistant master of the Central Academy, and later Master of it. His teaching career spanned 20 years. When a Board of Education was formed in 1844, he was one of the five chosen to serve on it. He was buried here, his widow, Catherine Ellen, died in 1868 at age 68. They lost their daughter in 1865 at the age of 12.

William Butcher - A builder and carpenter, emigrated in the 1820's from England with his wife, Mary, who died in 1878, age 73. He died in 1877, age 78. Their son, Mark, was the famous Island furniture-maker. Mark married Margaret Theodota, who died in 1848, age 37.

Benjamin Chappell - The Island's first Postmaster, and the founder of Methodism here. Died in 1825, age 76, leaving us a diary that gives great insight into early island life.

Phillips Callbeck - A Lt. Col. of the Militia, Attorney General, and Speaker of the House of Assembly. He had the dubious honor of being one of the two captives taken in Canada by American privateers in the American Revolution. When Col. George Washington decided to invade Canada, his ships set out to destroy any ships carrying supplies from England to Canada. Two American privateers sailed into Charlottetown Harbour, and seized Callbeck and Thomas Wright, and took them back to Col. Washington, who set the two prisoners free with a letter of apology. When Phillips Callbeck died in 1790 at the age of 46, a stone merely marked P.C. was set in place to mark his grave, intended only as a temporary marker. The Assembly voted 20 pounds to have a proper monument made in London as a testimony of its esteem. This was soon forgotten, and the monument was never ordered. Finally, Senator Catherine Callbeck's grandfather, William, had a proper stone set up for his ancestor.

Hon. George Coles – He and his wife, Mary, lost two babies, Mary Jane in 1846 at 14 mos., and a son, William Haines in 1847, at 8 months. Hon. George served as premier of the province and constantly spoke on the land issue. He was leader of the opposition at the Charlottetown Conference and became best known for being one of the Fathers of Confederation. George's parents, James and Sarah were buried here. James was a native of Somerset, England, and a member of the "Established Church", and a resident of Charlottetown for over 50 years. He died in 1861, age 78, and his wife, Sarah died in 1857, age 71. James and Sarah's eldest daughter died in 1873, at age 60.

Christopher Cross - A devout Methodist rests here, too. He held weekly prayer meetings at his home in the 1830's. At these meetings one often heard loud responses of "Amen" or "Pray on Bretheren". Mr. Cross owned a parrot which also echoed these responses. In the summer, Mr. Cross used to put the parrot out on the front porch where it learned some new expressions during a rather heated election campaign. At the next prayer meeting the parrot hurled out some of his new, rather unsavory language instead of the customary responses. This was the Cross's parrot's last performance at a prayer meeting.

Kezia Davies - In 1852, a "melancholy accident" occurred when Kezia, wife of Benjamin Davies, was baking a cake over the kitchen fire, and, while removing it from the fire, she accidentally brushed against the burning logs and her dress ignited. She immediately dashed up two flights of stairs where her screaming brought a servant who tried to smother the flames, but a frenzied Kezia rushed downstairs and across the street, where Mrs. Duchemin and her daughter extinguished the fire - but not "until every particle of clothing was entirely consumed" and she was dreadfully burned. She died at age 33.

James Davis - A painter and hotel keeper buried two wives, Julia in 1854, aged 42, and Margaret Jane Anderson in 1870 at 55.

Col. Thomas Dawson - An early Methodist lay-preacher, who traveled to various parts of the Island rests here.

Cemeteries

Introduction

By Dave Hunter

The following history of the Elm Avenue Cemetery, is written by Miss Orlo Jones CG(C), a lady well known and respected by both on and off Island researchers for her many years of service as genealogist for the Prince Edward Island Museum and Heritage Foundation. Orlo completed courses in Genealogy from Brigham Young University, and was a charter member of the Genealogical Institute of the Maritimes. She retired from the PEIMHF on July 31, 1988, and still maintains an active interest in Prince Edward Island's history and genealogy. Our thanks to Orlo, not only for this history, but also for the many years she has devoted to the Island, the preservation of its heritage, and to helping those researching their families.

Charlotte Parish Cemetery or The Elm Avenue Cemetery

Orlo Jones, CG(C), 1999

A small cemetery on one of Charlottetown's busiest streets is said by some to contain more history per square foot than any other part of P.E.I., yet it is neglected and overgrown, with a diminishing number of intact gravestones each year.

We know that an earlier Protestant burial ground did exist to serve the military establishment, and others that lived during the earliest years of our history. By now no records remain, and no one knows the site of where it once was, although Lorne Callbeck believed it was "in the block now contained by Queen, Richmond, Pownal, and Grafton streets." He also stated that this first burial ground was neglected after the "new" one opened on Elm Ave., which we now know as a portion of University Avenue. Eventually, buildings were erected on the site of that early cemetery, and it was forgotten.

When Samuel Holland was appointed by King George III to survey British North America, he started in 1764 by surveying the Island of St. John, which he divided into three counties, and each of these into parishes of 100,000 acres. Each parish had a designated town site, as well as land set aside for a church, and glebe for the support of the clergy. In Queen's County, the parish was named Charlotte Parish, and the town Charlotte Town, after Charlotte, consort of King George III. Of course, the church was to be the "Established Church", which was the Church of England, however, the earliest church, St. Paul's could not be consecrated because it was used by Protestants of all denominations, as was the Charlotte Parish Burial Grounds or Cemetery.

This site of land was deeded to St. Paul's Anglican Church on October 11, 1826, and consecrated October 15, 1826 by the Right Reverend John Inglis, the third Anglican Bishop of Nova Scotia (who had been given Episcopal jurisdiction in Prince Edward Island by his Letters Patent from the crown the year before), and was for the use of all Protestants. This was understandable, since there were only one hundred and fifty families in the entire Island when Governor Patterson arrived in 1770, and most of these were in three pockets - Malpeque/Darnley, Georgetown, and the St. Andrews/Tracadie area. Charlottetown consisted of only 2 houses. By 1788 the number had grown to 40, and by 1830, the total had exploded to 350!

It is said that the first burial was Isabella, wife of George Bell, Sgt. Of the 21st Grenadiers, who died 11 Aug. 1779 at the age of 24. Benjamin Bremner wrote that there were other burials in the cemetery before the land was formally granted to the Anglican Church; and the transcription of gravestones in 1947 confirms this.

The first resident Anglican clergy, Rev. Theophilus Desbrisay arrived in 1775 to find there was neither a church, nor a place for him to live. He was the only resident Protestant clergy here for approximately 20 years, and he served all Protestants and some Roman Catholics, as well.

We have no accurate records of all the burials here before its closure by law 1 January 1874. According to Lorne Callbeck in "My Island, My People", the last burial was for Mrs. Archibald MacNeill in the sepulchre in Dec. 1872. A photocopy of an undated and unidentified list of burials in Charlotte Parish is on file, but there is no knowing whether or not it was complete, nor knowing the time frame it was supposed to cover. The first transcription of the gravestones in this century was done in 1947 by Elsie Cambridge, a descendant of Col. John Hamilton Gray, who recorded a total of 597 stones at that time; however, even at that date many graves had no markers, and one of these was a plot outlined by iron bars with stone pillars at the corners.

"An Act Respecting Conditional Sales of Chattels" (59 Vic., Cap. 6, 1896.), contains instructions for filing a copy of the receipt note, hire receipt, order, or other instrument evidencing the bailment or conditional sale given to secure the purchase money, with the prothonotary or deputy prothonotary of the county in which the bailee or conditional purchaser resided. The prothonotary or deputy on receiving a copy of the written instrument was to file and register it and enter the information into an index book. The series consists of numbered (3 to 2,679) conditional sales registered in Queen's County between the years 1899 and 1930 and eleven volumes of indices. This series sub-divides into two sub-series: Conditional Sales – Queens County, and Indices to Conditional Sales.

Title based on contents of the series.

Sub-series descriptions to follow.

Subseries 1: Conditional Sales - Queens County. 1899 to 1930. 72 cm.

This subseries consists of a numbered series (3 to 2,679) of conditional sales registered in Queen's County under 59 Vic., Cap. 6, 1896 and subsequent amended and revised acts relating to conditional sales. Some documents in the series are missing. The conditional sales consist of a cover page with the names of the buyer or conditional purchaser and of the bailor, vendor, or manufacturer, and date of registration by the prothonotary of the Supreme Court or deputy prothonotary for King's and Prince Counties. Most are entitled "Lien Note" or "Lien Agreement". A receipt, order or some other written instrument detailing the goods involved and the conditions of sale and payment form the rest of the document. The conditional sales are arranged in consecutive numeric order.

Title based on contents of the subseries.

Material deposited with the Public Archives and Records Office prior to 1972.

Subseries 2: Indices to Conditional Sales. 1897-1958. 90 cm.

The indices consist of alphabetical listings by bailee's surname and by year. Entries include serial number, date of filing, name of bailee, residence, name of bailor or vendor, and nature of instrument. Most of the written instruments are described in the entries as "Lien Order", "Lien Agreement", "Lien Note", "Sales Contract", or "Wholesale Contract". The conditional sales indexed within the Kings and Prince County indices, Volumes 7-11, are not held at the Public Archives and Records Office. Volumes 10 and 11, Prince County, are entitled, "Index of Lien Notes and Agreements".

Title based on contents of the subseries. The indices are arranged by county and chronologically within county. Queens County, Volume 3, includes a copy of the 1940 "Conditional Sales Act". Original volume numbers are indicated in square brackets.

Volumes 1 to 6 are water damaged and require conservation.

Series 12: Sessional Papers. 1836-1958. 83.5 cm.

This series consists of documents filed with the prothonotary's office which pertain to the proceedings of the court and include jury summons (both Grand Jury precepts and Petit Jury venires), special jury lists, Grand Jury reports and presentments, and sessional files containing court expenses, correspondence concerning jurors being excused from jury duty, dockets, and lists of potential jurors. This series subdivides into five subseries: Jury summons; Special Jury Books; Grand Jury Presentments and Reports; Sessional Files; and Grand Jury Returns – Tavern and Store Licenses. Title based on contents of the series.

Subseries 1: Jury Summons. 1774, 1785, 1795, 1809, 1823, 1836-1844, 1873-1934. 36 cm.


This subseries consists of files containing precepts to summon grand juries and venires to summon petit juries for particular terms of the Supreme Court. The precepts as prescribed in legislation are signed by the prothonotary and instruct the sheriff of the county in question to summon either twenty-four men for the Grand Jury or forty-eight for the Petit Jury. Most precepts have the list of names of the potential jurors attached and the sheriff's signature declaring he has completed the summons as instructed. When the Supreme Court began having regular sittings in Prince and King's counties (1834 and 1835 respectively) precepts were issued to the sheriffs of all three counties for the summoning of grand and petit juries for each court term in each county. File three 1809 also contains a list of Justices of the Peace. The files are arranged chronologically with the file listing indicating the county or counties' precepts and venires included in each file.







Prominent Burials in Elm Avenue Cemetery (continued)

The Purdie Family - Another early Island family. James Purdie was a merchant, and around 1846, bought a large house on the corner of Water and Pownal Streets from Samuel Cunard, of Halifax. This house is said to have been the first house in Charlottetown to have been lighted with gas. Elizah and Ann Purdie lost two young daughters, Lydia, aged 9, and Sarah, age 4.

Coundouly Rankin - A Major in H. M. 8th Regiment of Foot. He was a member of a new political society called the Loyal Electors in 1806, which exerted considerable force in the selection of members for the Assembly. He died in 1852, aged 77, and his daughters, Jessie M., aged 25, and Mary A. age 16, both died 19 Oct 1850.

Col. John Ready – He arrived here from England in 1824 to serve as Lt. Governor, a post he served for 7 years until he resigned. He was one of the Island's most popular Governors, for he was gentle and genial and arrived with no entrenched views on controversial issues. This way, he was always able to steer an acceptable course. He visited all parts of the Island, and worked very hard to improve agriculture. While here, the Ready family lost their daughter, Susan in 1827 at the age of 18.

Charles Douglas Smith - Perhaps the Island's most unpopular Lt. Governor was His Excellency Charles Douglas Smith who became the Island's 4th Lt. Gov. in 1813, a post he served until 1824. He was hated as he was stubborn, undiplomatic, often rude, and he considered the local people with scorn. Things deteriorated to the point where the people requested that H. M. the King recall Smith, which was done in 1824. Smith's wife, Frances Carpenter, died at the age of 57, and was buried here. Her tombstone was erected by her 12 children. It appears that she did not return to England when her husband was recalled in 1824, and she lived until 182 [sic]. There is an apparent transcription error in the 1947 Cambridge transcription, since, according to it, she would have been born one year after Smith's recall.

Isaac Smith - A Yorkshire man, and an architect along with his wife, Jane, and younger brother, Henry immigrated on the Valiant in 1817. Isaac left his mark on a number of local structures, but he is best remembered for "Fanningbank", and "Province House". In 1848, he became the Travelling Agent for the Nova Scotia British and Foreign Bible Society, but he returned regularly to the Island until his wife, Jane died in 1856 at age 63. Four years later, he remarried a Nova Scotian lady. He retired to Midland, Nova Scotia, where he died in 1871 after a long illness.

John Stewart, Esq. - Of Mt. Stewart was a very colorful man, and at times, a very influential one. He was appointed Paymaster of H. M. Forces, and a Collector of Quit Rents. He is remembered for his account of P.E.I. He also was the founder of the community of Mount Stewart. Governor Patterson described him as "a very intemperate young man", and hence, he became known as "Hellfire Jack". His wife, Mary Ann died in 1832, age 46, and he in 1834, age 76. John was a søn of Chief Justice Peter Stewart, who died in "Rosebank" in November 1805, age 80. Peter had served in the capacity of Chief Justice for 25 years. Ironically, his grave is near that of his bitter opponent, Phillips Callbeck.

Mary (Boggs) Tremaine - Wife of Richard Tremaine, and daughter of Dr. James Boggs, of Halifax, died in 1860, age 81. Mary and husband Richard had children, Dr. Lawrence Tremaine, and Thomas Boggs Tremaine, who became a merchant. Benjamin Bremner, in "Memories of Long Ago", wrote that Thomas Boggs Tremaine had owned and operated the Southport Ferry, a side-wheel paddle boat run by a team of horses on a treadmill. He died in 1864, age 59, and his wife, Elizabeth Allen in 1858.

Agnes Watts - Wife of James Watts, died in 1842, aged 60. Her husband, James, lived until 1860 when he was 74. James was a native of Stirling, Scotland, and had the contract for the stone work at Province House.

Charles Welsh, Esq. - Died in October 1873, age 76. His son, Charles Thomas, died in 1870, age 36. His son, William, became a M. L. A., and was a partner in the firm Welsh and Owen, builders of several large commercial buildings.

David Wilson - A Charlottetown merchant who lived in the "West End House", which was located where "Beaconsfield", the home of the Prince Edward Island Museum and Heritage Foundation now stands. When James Peake bought the property, he offered the house for sale. It was moved to the east side of West Street, and is now known as number 18, according to Irene Rogers in "Charlottetown, its Life in its Buildings". David's wife, Grace, died in 1845, age 39, and their second son, David Wilson, in 1849, age 11. Their daughter, Mary Ellen died in 1830, aged 6 weeks.

Hon. George Wright - He was Surveyor General of the Island and a member of H. M. Council for 28 years, and during 5 different periods administered the Government of this Island. He died in 1842, age 62. He was a son of Thomas Wright, who was with Samuel Holland when the first survey of this Island was made.

Phoebe Wright - Widow of Hon. George, she was a daughter of the late John Cambridge. She died in 1851, age 71. Charles Wright was a brother of the Hon. George, and he was one of the surveyors asked to correct former surveys. In 1809, by an act of assembly, he established a meridian line to regulate all future surveys. This line is shown by survey markers at Victoria Park. Charles died in 1868, age 51, but his son, also named Charles, built the house that today is known as the "Stamper Residence". He was a line agent for Lady Wood, a daughter of Lt. Gov. Fanning.

Nathan Wright - Another well known name in early Charlottetown, and one of builders of Government House. He was a carpenter and house joiner, and was co-owner of the firm, Smith Brothers and Wright. Nathan died in 1862, age 81, and his baby son, Matthew died in 1858, age 2.

Cable Head School

Research into education reports to the Prince Edward Island government discovers that the Cable Head School is first mentioned in the School "Visitor's" Report of 1850. John Ross included in his King's County Report the following:

CABLE HEAD SCHOOL.

Examined Feb. 26. – No. present, 23. – No. on Register, 26.

"This school has been in operation since last April. The principal part of the children are in elementary branches. Reasonable progress had been made by those that have attended somewhat regularly. The most advanced are reading the New Testament, which they can do fluently.

A few are acquainted with Arithmetic as far as Compound Multiplication, and have been getting instruction in writing for a short time."

Cable Head School was one of twenty-seven schools operating in King's County at that time. The teacher in the Cable Head School in 1850 was Michael Dinn. In the 1852 report Michael Dinn was again reported as being the teacher with the number registered being nineteen. In the 1853 report the Cable Head School is not mentioned and Michael Dinn was reported to be teaching at Souris Line Road.

In the 1855 report John McCormack was the teacher at Cable Head with the number registered being fifty-six (twenty-seven boys and twenty-nine girls). In the 1856 report John McLeod was the teacher with the number registered being fifty-seven. The "Visitor" made the following comment that year:

"This school has not benefited by the change in teacher during the year; no development of the children's minds attempted."

It is noted that usually several additional schools were opened in the county each year. Sometimes a school might be closed for a year; this may have been because no teacher was available. It was noted in one report that of thirty-four schools operating in the county, eleven were of frame construction and twenty-three were of log construction.

The above information would seem to indicate that the Cable Head School first came into being in 1849.

Islanders Away

Islanders in the 1818 Census of Cape Breton, Part One

In 1935, the Public Archives of Nova Scotia published "Holland's Description of Cape Breton Island and Other Documents". This book was number two in a series and was compiled by Archivist, D.C. Harvey.


Appendix A in this publication contains the nominal census rolls of Cape Breton taken in 1811. Much like the 1798 census of Prince Edward Island, this census has minimal information regarding the inhabitants. Appendix B contains the 1818 census rolls of Cape Breton. The information collected by the census takers during this census was more in-depth than the 1811 census. Questions included name, age, time on the Island, country, country of parents, situation, trade, married or single, and number of children.

There were fourteen separate areas enumerated in the census of 1818: Ship Harbour Gut of Canso; North End of the Gut Canso; From Balhache's Point in the gut of Canso to Grand Judique; District of Port Hood; Broad Cove; Margarie – Broad Cove; District of Cheticamp; South end of the Gut of Canso; Lower Settlement River; District of Louisbourg; Cabarouse Bay; Division of Baddeck; District of Little Bras D'or; and St. Andrews. D.C. Harvey comments in his introduction to the Appendices that, "Both returns are incomplete, particularly in regard to settlement on the east coast of Cape Breton Island, including the new capital of Sydney."

Islanders or children of Islanders are enumerated in six of the fourteen areas recorded in this census, with seventy-nine such entries. While it would be space saving to list only those recorded as having been born on P.E.I. or whose parents were born on P.E.I., it would be an injustice to those desiring to utilize this information for research. Neighbors not listing P.E.I. in their entries could potentially be the father, brother, uncle or cousin of those who do. Thus, we are printing the complete census for the six areas in which Islanders are found.

Newspapers

As genealogists, we commonly utilize newspapers as a resource for locating vital records. While finding a death notice or obituary may supply us with a previously unknown date or location, newspapers can offer much more than vital statistics. Articles published in newspapers dealing with local history or past events assist in setting the stage of the world in which our ancestors lived. Editorial Committee member, Linda Harding, has spent many years studying Island newspapers and has submitted copies of articles with historical significance for publication in this newsletter. In the next several issues of our newsletter, we will be reprinting several of these articles.

Century-Old Letter of Islander Abroad

[Reprinted from The Charlottetown Guardian, 21 March 1938, page 5.]

Found among the papers of the late Mrs. O.H. Robinson, Charlottetown were some old letters of historic interest, including the following written in 1822 by James D. Haszard from Providence, Rhode Island to his younger brother, George in this Province. Mr. Haszard returned the following year to establish the Prince Edward Register, the Island's first newspaper, bringing with him the type which he purchased in New England. Rhodes Gardiner, referred to in the letter was the grandfather of Mr. Charles Gardiner.

Providence, Rhode Island July 26, 1822

Dear Brother:

Rhodes Gardiner returns to the Island by whom I take this opportunity of writing, you will have the pleasure of receiving his wife, who goes with him, he has been to New York, he returned last April, he was sick there sometime in the Hospital, but has perfectly recovered. You will receive in a letter to Mr. Davies, which I write with this, many little things, which I here omit for the sake of brevity. How do you get on in business, is there anything doing on the Island? I hope you are now capable of inflicting and writing me a letter. If you are not I am really ashamed for you, but I trust any suspicious that I may entertain on that subject may be unfounded. You are to me bound by the nearest and dearest ties of nature. I am your elder brother and should be your advisor, therefore, I hope and trust that anything which may fall from me will strictly observed. Your future prospects and happiness is a concern to me, which while you conduct yourself as you ought, as far as I am able I will always give you my assistance. George, let me entreat you above all things, to acquire knowledge and learning, for they must be the basis of your future fortune, let not one moment escape without making some good use of it, examine and commence with yourself and say whey you catch yourself idle "what am I now doing" that will be a benefit to me; Observe Dr. Franklin's maxima, and advice and you will be sure to proper in the world. Read history and make yourself acquained with the customers, manners, government, etc. etc. of the people of the world, and of which Prince Edward Island forms so small a part. You may have occasion to travel, and it is my desire you should in proper season. You will then make but a poor figure if you do not store yourself with necessary knowledge. As soon as I can get once settled in my business, which I hope fortune will soon bring about, so that we may be enabled to do something that will make us independent, and afford us a genteel living, I should then wish you to visit this country for various reasons: You must consider that you are now entering upon the most interesting, conspicuous and arduous scenes of the theatre of the world, therefore, the part must be well acted or you will be hissed. Be careful and circumspect in all your actions, for principally upon your behavior, virtues and abilities your

future happiness and prosperity must depend. We daily see the rock upon which many a one has split, their bark shivered to pieces, and foundered, involving all who are concerned in ruin. For God's sake, let us avoid these rocks, which we may strike upon if we do not keep a good look out and take reason for our helm. Conceive what a pleasure it would be to me to say "my brother is a prudent, steady, intelligent, active, enterprising young man, whose desires and chief aim are that of maintaining an unsoiled name and character, and suppose I said it to a young lady would she not desire to be acquainted with this character? Miss Abbey Watson, a second cousin, I told her I intended to recommend her to you she is fourteen and handsome, you will have a good fortune. You must qualify yourself before you think of advancing. Now since there are so many advantages to be reaped, spare no pains; the time that you spend in lounging and negligence if spent properly, may be the means of making your fortune.

I hope everything is taken proper care of, for it is for your interest as well as mine. See that the grove is not trespassed upon, carrion and other things of perishable nature are under cover.

When you write arrange it with others who may write so that I may not have a bundle of letters together, and then not have any again for some time. Let Mr. Davies, Bell, or other friend, write once a month by the packet others again once a fortnight by forwarding to the care of Mr. Clark, Merchant, Halifax.

You would be surprised to see the elegant buildings, etc.., here and the number of vessels, people and curiosities. I can hardly as yet decide or foresee what luck may turn up in my favor. I had a great desire to return with Rhodes, but under existing circumstances, I can do better here than at home. Could I raise the means of getting my types, etc., I would return immediately, but as I cannot, I think I shall remain here the ensuing winter, by which I will be enabled to lay something by. In case I should not manage it otherwise, I should like to sell the Mill Stream and Yankey Hill Land also Pasture Lot 194. Make enquiry whether I can have a purchaser. I have agreed for a press in Halifax, I have seen the type foundry in Boston, where they make good type.

I am engaged in an office in Providence, printing the Laws, etc., and make Nine Dollars per week, having the preference of work. Mr. Miller, the proprietor is a very agreeable friendly man with whose family I board. There are twelve hands employed in the office and two presses continually a-going, it really seems a house of industry. They print the Farmers and Manufacturers Journal twice a week, the Religious Intelligencer once a week, with a great variety of job and book printing, they have also a book store and bindery.

I have the pleasure of visiting a number of the first families in Providence, who are really agreeable and kind. A great many of the gentry here have made their properties by their own industry - indeed every body seems to be employed in some business or other, both the poor and rich, and an industrious reputable mechanic is not here slighted because he works, no, he is met by the wealthiest men and treated with the greatest politeness and affability.

I saw your father last week, at North Kingston, twenty-four miles from Providence, he was very well, he is keeping a small store there was a nephew, William Cole. William is shortly to be married, he has been published three times. The customs relating to marriage are very different from what they are with us. All are married by a License, out here, they are three times published in the Church.

I must now conclude with my love and respects to all relations and friends, wishing them, individually every happiness and remain. Yours &c James D. Haszard

P.S. I also send home religious papers to Mr. Evans. Keep a strict eye towards your sisters, and if they are paying their attentions to them, let them make known their intentions to you, which they will not hesitate in doing if they are honorable; If not dismiss them with spirit and them know that you are their guardian.

Islander Writes From Rhode Island 116 Years Ago


Providence, Rhode Island November 9th, 1822

Dear Brother

I wrote Mr. Davies a few days since, Answering several questions which he suggested, and informing him that I should not return this fall, for sundry reasons therein stated which were among them, my inability to purchase types for the want of funds sufficient and I am in very good health, and spirits though Providence and many sections of the United States are sickly to an alarming extent, and it has been the dispensation of Providence to bereave us of one of our cousins, Sarah B. Coles, who departed this life 14th ult. of the typhus fever, her brother, William Coles, lies ill of it now. Mr. Miller, my employer and his mother-in-law are also very ill, but the latter is in a convalescent state. As it may be some information and Rhodes Gardiner likely having some knowledge of the persons. I mention them who died during the last month in North and South Kingston, Mr. Chadsey, Mr. Helms, Mr. Chaplin and Mr. Legars, all his wife's relations as far as I have heard are well, I have not seen them this some time.

In New York the yellow fever has abated, and the people are returning to their habitations, which were deserted during the rage of the epidemic. Thirty to forty are dying in New Orleans, twenty-five to thirty in Baltimore and in proportion in many other places in this Union and neighborhood. I cannot feel sufficiently thankful to the bounty of Providence during this awful mortality in preserving me from its languishing and fatal effects. The cold weather now advancing will and has already checked its virulence.

I received a letter from Cousin Charlotte Rind, who informs me that William has been married nearly four years since. His wife died

The Purdie Family - Another early Island family. James Purdie was a merchant, and around 1846, bought a large house on the corner of Water and Pownal Streets from Samuel Cunard, of Halifax. This house is said to have been the first house in Charlottetown to have been lighted with gas. Elizah and Ann Purdie lost two young daughters, Lydia, aged 9, and Sarah, age 4.

Coundouly Rankin - A Major in H. M. 8th Regiment of Foot. He was a member of a new political society called the Loyal Electors in 1806, which exerted considerable force in the selection of members for the Assembly. He died in 1852, aged 77, and his daughters, Jessie M., aged 25, and Mary A. age 16, both died 19 Oct 1850.

Col. John Ready – He arrived here from England in 1824 to serve as Lt. Governor, a post he served for 7 years until he resigned. He was one of the Island's most popular Governors, for he was gentle and genial and arrived with no entrenched views on controversial issues. This way, he was always able to steer an acceptable course. He visited all parts of the Island, and worked very hard to improve agriculture. While here, the Ready family lost their daughter, Susan in 1827 at the age of 18.

Charles Douglas Smith - Perhaps the Island's most unpopular Lt. Governor was His Excellency Charles Douglas Smith who became the Island's 4th Lt. Gov. in 1813, a post he served until 1824. He was hated as he was stubborn, undiplomatic, often rude, and he considered the local people with scorn. Things deteriorated to the point where the people requested that H. M. the King recall Smith, which was done in 1824. Smith's wife, Frances Carpenter, died at the age of 57, and was buried here. Her tombstone was erected by her 12 children. It appears that she did not return to England when her husband was recalled in 1824, and she lived until 182 [sic]. There is an apparent transcription error in the 1947 Cambridge transcription, since, according to it, she would have been born one year after Smith's recall.

Isaac Smith - A Yorkshire man, and an architect along with his wife, Jane, and younger brother, Henry immigrated on the Valiant in 1817. Isaac left his mark on a number of local structures, but he is best remembered for "Fanningbank", and "Province House". In 1848, he became the Travelling Agent for the Nova Scotia British and Foreign Bible Society, but he returned regularly to the Island until his wife, Jane died in 1856 at age 63. Four years later, he remarried a Nova Scotian lady. He retired to Midland, Nova Scotia, where he died in 1871 after a long illness.

John Stewart, Esq. - Of Mt. Stewart was a very colorful man, and at times, a very influential one. He was appointed Paymaster of H. M. Forces, and a Collector of Quit Rents. He is remembered for his account of P.E.I. He also was the founder of the community of Mount Stewart. Governor Patterson described him as "a very intemperate young man", and hence, he became known as "Hellfire Jack". His wife, Mary Ann died in 1832, age 46, and he in 1834, age 76. John was a søn of Chief Justice Peter Stewart, who died in "Rosebank" in November 1805, age 80. Peter had served in the capacity of Chief Justice for 25 years. Ironically, his grave is near that of his bitter opponent, Phillips Callbeck.

Mary (Boggs) Tremaine - Wife of Richard Tremaine, and daughter of Dr. James Boggs, of Halifax, died in 1860, age 81. Mary and husband Richard had children, Dr. Lawrence Tremaine, and Thomas Boggs Tremaine, who became a merchant. Benjamin Bremner, in "Memories of Long Ago", wrote that Thomas Boggs Tremaine had owned and operated the Southport Ferry, a side-wheel paddle boat run by a team of horses on a treadmill. He died in 1864, age 59, and his wife, Elizabeth Allen in 1858.

Agnes Watts - Wife of James Watts, died in 1842, aged 60. Her husband, James, lived until 1860 when he was 74. James was a native of Stirling, Scotland, and had the contract for the stone work at Province House.


Charles Welsh, Esq. - Died in October 1873, age 76. His son, Charles Thomas, died in 1870, age 36. His son, William, became a M. L. A., and was a partner in the firm Welsh and Owen, builders of several large commercial buildings.

David Wilson - A Charlottetown merchant who lived in the "West End House", which was located where "Beaconsfield", the home of the Prince Edward Island Museum and Heritage Foundation now stands. When James Peake bought the property, he offered the house for sale. It was moved to the east side of West Street, and is now known as number 18, according to Irene Rogers in "Charlottetown, its Life in its Buildings". David's wife, Grace, died in 1845, age 39, and their second son, David Wilson, in 1849, age 11. Their daughter, Mary Ellen died in 1830, aged 6 weeks.

Hon. George Wright - He was Surveyor General of the Island and a member of H. M. Council for 28 years, and during 5 different periods administered the Government of this Island. He died in 1842, age 62. He was a son of Thomas Wright, who was with Samuel Holland when the first survey of this Island was-made.

Phoebe Wright - Widow of Hon. George, she was a daughter of the late John Cambridge. She died in 1851, age 71. Charles Wright was a brother of the Hon. George, and he was one of the surveyors asked to correct former surveys. In 1809, by an act of assembly, he established a meridian line to regulate all future surveys. This line is shown by survey markers at Victoria Park. Charles died in 1868, age 51, but his son, also named Charles, built the house that today is known as the "Stamper Residence". He was a line agent for Lady Wood, a daughter of Lt. Gov. Fanning.

Nathan Wright - Another well known name in early Charlottetown, and one of builders of Government House. He was a carpenter and house joiner, and was co-owner of the firm, Smith Brothers and Wright. Nathan died in 1862, age 81, and his baby son, Matthew died in 1858, age 2.

Patriot 18 Jan. 1899

A friend of The Patriot sends us the following from Vernon River Bridge: The ship Polly arrived here in August, 1803, with about 600 emigrants from the Highlands of Scotland. They spread themselves near the French Village Belfast. These settlers were brought out by the Earl of Selkirk, who remained with them for nearly two months. A little more than a year afterwards he paid them a visit and was satisfied with his plans, Rev. Dr. McGregor visited the Island in 1806 and several times up to 1819. The first place of worship was built at Pt. Prim in 1825, through the influence of Dr. McAulay. Dr. McGregor's first sermon in Belfast was on the Laodicean Church, the second on the Prodigal Son and the third on Phi. 111, 13-14 all in Gaelic. Rev. John McLennan arrived there in September, 1823. He was a native of Ross shire. After nearly thirty years of faithful service he left Belfast for his native land and died in Kilchrenan on the 11th February, 1852. His successor was Rev. Alex. McKay, who was inducted on the 23rd of August, 1855. On the 25th of May, 1859, Mr. McKay left for Salt Springs, N.S. On the 31st of August, 1859, Rev. A. McLean came to Belfast, and left for Hopewell on August 14th, 1877, after 18 years service. Rev. A. S. Stewart came on the 25th of March, 1879, and left in January, 1887. His successor, Rev. A. McLean Sinclair, was inducted on the 16th May, 1888.

Islander 5 Feb 1864

Died: At his residence, in Charlottetown, this morning, Friday, the 5th inst., after a lingering illness, borne with submissive resignation to the Divine Will, William Douse Esq., in the 64th year of his age. The deceased was a native of Devises, Wiltabire (Wiltsbire), England, and emigrated to this Colony in early life. He was elected to the House of Assembly in the year 1832, and represented Queen's County for a period of 26 years, during which time he held the extensive Agentine of the Earl of Selkirk and Robert Montgomery, Esq., in this Island, with satisfaction to his constituents, and the respect of the numerous tenantry. He leaves a Widow and eleven children to deplore the loss of an affectionate and kind husband and father. The funeral will take place on Monday next, at 3 o'clock, p.m. Friends of the deceased are respectfully invited to attend.

Islander 5 Feb 1864

Died: On the 19th December last, at her residence, Brudnell River, King's County, of a short and painful illness, which she bore with Christian fortitude, Christy, the beloved wife of Donald Stewart, and youngest sister of the late Donald Stewart, of the Harbour's mouth, Lot 48, age 72 years. The deceased was a native of Perthshire, Scotland, and emigrated to this Island in 18__.

Islander 30 March 1866

Died: On Friday, the 16th inst., of Brooklyn, Lot 61, after an illness of 8 days, Mary Vaughan, beloved wife of Mr. William Compton, in the 84th year of her age. She was a native of Chester, Nova Scotia. She is sincerely and deservedly lamented by a large circle of friends and relatives, by whom she was beloved and respected, as well, for her Christian character, as for her untiring of all skilful attendence on the sick and suffering of all classes of her acquaintance, among whom she laboured successfully for many years, retaining her faculties, to the last. Deceased was the mother of 12 (13) children, and has left 112 grand-children, and 42 great-grand-children.

The 1871 Colonial Census, with the exception of Lots 34 and 36, has not survived. The following list was found in the 1870 Journal of the Legislative Assembly and may serve as a partial substitute. The list appears in the order in which it was originally printed.

The "Plan No." refers to the landlord's designation of the parcel of land. The "Holding" designations were: Free meaning the land was free hold (i.e. owned by the individual); 1st, 2nd, 3rd or 4th meaning the land was leased and the number describes the quality of the land (1st being the best land).
