Until 1911 the Roman Catholic Church was part of Portugal's national government. Portugal adopted the Gregorian calendar in 1582 as did all Roman Catholic countries.

An earthquake in Lisbon in 1755 destroyed many of the records stored there at the time, but some survived the damage. Others that exist there today had not yet been sent to Lisbon at the time of the quake.

tugal is the American-Portuguese Gene-Portugal is famous for its explorers of alogical and Historical Society, Inc., check the nearest LDS branch library for holdings of microfilmed records from Portugal.



PORTUGUESE MIGRATION TO THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS--1878--1913



USING CITY DIRECTORIES IN RESEARCH

City Directories are an often overlooked research tool. They can provide an address, occupation and often whether a person is a widowwidower.

I have recently been tracing a great uncle and his family through the Vallejo City Directories of the 1950s, 60s,70s and 80s.

In following the same families over a 30 to 40 year period, I have found their new addresses, when a husband or wife has died and most of the time their business or occupation. If the directory is fairly new, you not only have an alphabetical listing of names but the street listings. When checking the street listings, you can see if other relatives have inherited the property or relatives are living together.

The City Directory came in very handy while I researched in Salt Lake City for my husband's Italian family. His family resided in New York City in 1910 BUT New York State is NOT one of the states that was soundexed for 1910!! How to find someone in New York City?! First I found the family in the City Directory and THEN I went to the Enumeration District Films for New York City, 1910. I found the address, 444 E. 115th St. on the Enumeration Film, it gave me the Enumeration District number for THAT address. then I went to the actual Census Film booklet for New York City and found out where THAT ED was on the film.

One of the best things about City Directories is that they were published frequently. In the 20th Century they may even have been published yearly in the larger cities. My friend, Linda Fonville, was tracing her family in New York this last summer and saw a City Directory for 1865 in Cayuga County!

City Directories for the larger

cities usually only have the name and address of the male of the household. The Directories in the smaller towns usually have the head of household, his wife in parenthesis and his occupation and address.

Most Public Libraries have the City Directories for their own town while many have them for towns close to them.

The Family History Library in Salt Lake has many old City Directories on microfilm and they can be ordered from your local FHC. Look under your state, your county then Directories.

Cheri Mello states that the New Bedford MA City Directories from 1903 to about 1910/11 have a listing of Marriages, Deaths and Births for the year prior to publication in the back of the book. I don't know if this is an isolated case or if other cities on the East Coast did likewise. Has anyone seen this in any other town's Directory??

AGLL is putting many City Directories on microfiche and they will eventually become available for purchase.

Sutro Library in San Francisco has over 10,000 City Directories in book form, microfilm and microfiche. (see Critico Livro for more info)

DEATH RECORDS AND WILLS IN THE OLD COUNTRY

Four years ago I learned the importance of wills for further research. I had gone back as far as I could go (early 1600s) and I wanted to know more about two ancestors. A genealogist researched the wills in the archives for me and took me back four generations.

Wills made or not made are noted in the death record. Very few records omit this. They gave instructions for funerals. Wills are in the archives (or should be unless lost) and most were made by notaries. Farmers, shoemakers, tailors and others made wills.

Death records tell us more about our ancestors than other church records, giving us a glimpse of them, often showing us their station of life in the community. Here are the poor, the slave, the man of means, the vagabond. We learn their ages; often their places of birth; single, married or widowed; their residences (some lived miles away from the parish church); sacraments received; often place of burial in the church; masses and prayers said; wills made and other comments by the priest.


Prior to the 1830s (some churches into the 1900s) people were buried in the church. Some records record exactly the place of burial—next to the spiral staircase, in the main chapel, in the family grave. Some earlier records have burial charts. Often noted in the margin was the amount paid for the grave. "Gratis" was also a margin note and the record stated the person was buried without charges.

In Sao Bento Church, Terceira, there are many missing years in the baptism and marriage records. I could go back no further with two ancestors, Manoel GONCALVES LEONARDO and Joana GONCALVES. Recently researching the "obitos" I learned Manoel was about 87 years at his death, had a nickname, "short monk", and lived in the area above the chapel of Sao Luis (now a parish church) several miles UPHILL from Sao Bento Church. What must that road to Sao Luis have been like in 1727? Manoel was buried in grave 20 near the crossbeam of the screen on the Carreirinha (a road) side. Joana died in 1730, about 70 years, and the priest notes her husband's nickname. She was buried in her brother's, Manoel SIMOES, private grave, next to the screen on the Epistle (left) side. Her brother died in 1734. His will provided 50,000 reis for his funeral. Then most people paid 150 reis for burial.

Apparently Manoel & Joana did not leave a will. Her brother's will needs to be researched to learn more of her family. It's possible Joana has a dowry. Dowries were contracts and are in the archives. Joana intrigues me and...

THE GREAT VOTING REGISTERS OF CALIFORNIA

All of us have encountered the 1900 Census' Column that asks about "citizenship." If you read "NA" in that column it means that your Ancestor was already a Naturalized Citizen by 1900. Now, where do you look for the Naturalization place & date? That's where the Great Voting Registers come into play.

I will be writing about the Voting Registers of the State of California but all states have or have had records of their voters. Check the Family History Card Catalogue under your State name and then under Voting records/registers. You should also check the Research Outline for your particular State to see if there is information on the availability of voter registration info.

Several years ago the Genealogical Societies of California decided to index the Great Voting Registers of 1890 for EACH COUNTY in California to help take the place of the destroyed 1890 Federal Census. All counties have finished the project except San Francisco and Los Angles, which are VERY large.

What type of info can you find on these records, you ask? First you will be given the name of the voter, his age, possibly a physical description and his occupation/business. He was asked his native country, his DATE of Naturalization (month, day, year) and in WHICH COUNTY & STATE the naturalization took place. There is also a listing of the Postoffice address, whether he could read, write and physically mark a Ballot! If he was disabled there is a listing of the nature of the disability.

Most counties in California have voting registers available for the period 1890--1900. MANY of these Registers have been microfilmed by the LDS Church and are available to order from your local Family History

Centers.

You can see in the sample on page 17 #2194, Frank BROWN had already anglicized his name by the time he applied for Naturalization. There may be some indication of name change on the actual Naturalization Papers but probably not on any prior to 1906.

Once you have the actual Naturalization date and place you write to the County Recorder/Clerk for that county and request ANY AND ALL papers relating to YOUR specific ancestor's Naturalization. You may want to call the County Clerk's Office ahead of time to ask about cost. As we know, records prior to 1906 are not as complete as later records but you still need to request a copy for your research files.
