California held its first Constitutional Convention in Monterey in 1849, with forty-eight delegates from ten districts. Their first duty was to divide the new state into counties. They named twenty-seven original counties, of which Reading was one. It occupied all the territory now included in Shasta, Modoc, Trinity, the greater part of Siskiyou, parts of Lassen and Tehama. Maps were inaccurate, so they had little conception of the vast acreage within the boundaries they set. It was first called Reading after Pierson B. Reading, one of the earliest pioneers of Northern California.

A committee report in January of 1850 brought attention to some of these difficulties. Some changes were made, among them a name change. Reading County was hereafter known as Shasta County.

After several changes, the boundary lines were finally fixed in 1855 by Peter H. Burnett.

The present spelling and form was determined by the California legislature, as it had been subject to many spellings and decisions. The name Sastise was given the mountains by Peter Skene Ogden in 1827, probably from the Indian tribe at its base. Some of the various spellings given were Shastika, Shastasla, Susty, Tcheste, among many others.

Trappers and cattlemen were the early trail builders in this territory, having traveled through as early as 1827 Among these early adventurers were Jedehiah Smith, (believed to be the first American to set foot on its soil), Peter Skene Ogden, Joseph B. Chiles, Alexander, McLeod, Michael La Framboise, Warren Langford Hastings, Ewing Young, Gale and Walker, Peter Lassen, Burnett and Pierson B. Reading. Mt. Lassen was subsequently named after Peter Lassen and Burnett became the first governor of California.

Gold it was that made California a state, and gold was the real beginning of Shasta County, discovered by Pierson B. Reading in March, 1848 on a bar in Clear Creek about twelve miles from the present town of Shasta, then known as Reading Springs.

In less than five years after the discovery of gold, Shasta became known as one of the important counties of the state.

Indians were among some of the early troubles besetting the settlers. It has been said that there are more native tribes and subdivisions of tribes and more different Indian languages in the state of California than any other state in the union. Some of the northern tribes were Penutian, which included the Maidu, Miwok, Constanoan, Yokuts and Yanes. Then there

were the Wintus, who were among the largest and most peaceful of the tribes. Add to these the Hat Creeks, Pits, Patwins, Zozi, and the Modocs.

Shasta City (Reading Springs) was the county seat until 1888, when it was moved to Redding. Shasta is the oldest town in the county, founded in 1850 and holding the second charter in California in Masonry. There was some dispute between San Francisco and Shasta over who held the first charter. It was settled with Shasta accepting number two and Tehama holding Number 3. The Masonry background of Shasta is given by some as the reason it didn't go the way of so many "ghost towns" of the gold rush days. A fire destroyed the first official records of Shasta County in 1853. Records since then are intact however.

Bennoni Whitten became the first school teacher in April, 1853, with sixteen pupils of various ages.

The Chinese migration to the northern gold fields started in 1848, with two men and one woman, and grew to almost 12,000 by the spring of 1852. Except for the seven women, all the rest were men and boys. In 1853, more than 1,000 Chinese passed through Shasta on their way to the Trinity mines within a two week period. Through prejudice and taxation, they were driven from the mines, some to work as house servants and farm labor, as they were forbidden to work in the mines. Many later helped to build the railroads through Northern California. In January, 1886, they were completely driven from the area.

One of the customs of the Chinese, strange to the white man, was their practice of sending the bones of their countrymen back to China. Nearly every body was identified by birth place, and it is told that in some cases the principle cargo of a steamer was coffins bearing Chinese bones.

The early roads and trails of this great northern country were, of course, very primitive, and mule trains (sometimes having as high as seventy or eighty animals) were the main way of transporting goods and supplies to and from the mines. Wagons too, were used for transportation where possible. The roads were quite narrow and when one wagon had to pass another on the trail, the drivers cheerfully got down and started unloading and dismanteling the smaller and lighter of the two. They then carried it over the other wagon, reassembling and loading it before continuing on their respective ways.

So great was the call of gold during the gold rush days that ships lay at anchor in San Francisco Bay unable to leave because the crew had gone gold digging, many times changing their names and occupations. Some of these sailors remained and helped to build the north state.

Among the many mining communities in those early days were Big Bend of Pit River, Bully Choop, Castle Peak, Whiskeytown, Harrison Gulch, Horsetown (Reading Bar) Arbuckle, Igo-Ono, Copper City, Iron Mountain, Old Diggings, Churn Creek, Middle Creek, Clear Creek, French Gulch, Backbone Creek, Dog Creek, and Bully Hill.

It is interesting to note how some of these towns or mining communities came by their names.

Eagle Creek became Ono in 1883, when a Baptist preacher, Reverend William Kidder, suggested the name, taking it from the Bible where the "Plains of

al din

Ono" are referred to. A few of the earliest settlers of this town were the Stephen R. Hubbards, the Whulocks, and the Parkers. All arrived before 1853 and took up squatter's rights.

Piety Hill became Igo in 1873. It came by its name because a little boy, Mr. McPherson's small son, always wanted to go with his Daddy and kept saying, "I go," "I go," "I go."

Buzzards Roost, thus named because you could always find men draped over the hitching post from over inbibing.

Whiskeytown was named because a barrel of whiskey broke loose from a mule on a pack train and burst open, spilling its contents in the creek, thus Whiskey Creek and subsequently Whiskeytown. A post office was established in 1856 by the name of Whiskey Creek, which was the original name of the town, but later the postal authorities rejected this name and substituted the name of Blair in 1881. Later yet, it was changed to Stella, and once again to Schilling, in honor of J. R. Schilling, postmaster and innkeeper Dignified as these names may be, none of them stuck with the old residents. Whiskeytown was Whiskeytown and so it remained. When a dam was later built by this name, the original site of Whiskeytown was covered by the backed up water. The cemetery and post office were moved to a drier area. President Kennedy dedicated the Whiskeytown dam just three months before his assassination.

Other towns that didn't just become "ghost towns" were Baird, which had the first federal fish hatchery in California, and was established in 1872 by Mr. Livingstone Stone. Salmon canning was one of the early California chief industries and the fish were first canned here. Baird is now under 400 feet of water at Shasta

Kennett and Copper Town were also covered by water. Kennett was named in 1884 by the Central Pacific Railroad for Squire Kennett, a stockholder. It boasted a thriving copper smelting, a shipping center with a population that grew from a mining hamlet with a score of people to an industrial city with 2,500 population in a decade, and then was buried under acres of water that formed the reservoir behind the present site of one of the largest dams in the world, Shasta Dam.

Bully Hill and Heroult and Delaman are also covered by the waters of Shasta Dam.

Thus, time goes on and progress continues.



Two Douglas County Cemeteries

FONDER CEMETERY

The Fonder Cemetery (sometimes called the McMurdo cemetery) is located in Douglas County, Colorado, on a knoll along the east side of Parker Road (State Highway 83) south of the town of Parker. (Figure 1) It is adjacent to the High Prairie Farms subdivision between the North and South Pinery Parkways. The ceme-



tery is owned and maintained by the Parker Area Historical Society. There are 15 known graves (readable markers), nine unknown graves (unreadable markers), and four probable graves (likely burial depressions) in this cemetery. The oldest marker is dated 1871, and the last interment (cremains) took place in 1955.



The Fonder name is associated with the cemetery because its earliest known burial was that of Hubert Fonder, who was born in France. Eventually becoming a miner in the Central City area, he married Miriam Donegal in 1862. Miriam Fonder was the first schoolteacher in Douglas County. During the Civil War, after Hubert enlisted in the Second Colorado Cavalry (Eayre's Independent Volunteer Artillery Battery), Miriam signed on as a laundress and traveled with her husband during part of his military service. In 1865 they homesteaded near Cherry Creek between Parker and Franktown, where Hubert sold shingles and ran a dairy operation. Mr. Fonder was killed when a horse kicked him in the head in 1871. Mrs. Fonder, with four children and another on the way, buried him at the cemetery that would eventually bear his name. (Figure 2) In 1880, Miriam relocated to the Western Slope where she lived with her married children during her later years; she died in 1927 at age 91 and was buried in the Rosebud Cemetery in Glenwood Springs.

No other Fonders were buried at the Fonder Cemetery, although the name lives on in the area with the construction of Fonder School in 1884; the rhyolite stone building is still standing a half-mile from the cemetery on the west side of Parker Road and currently serves as a utility building for the local water and sanitation district. The cemetery

does contain the remains of Miriam's oldest sister, Martha D. Barker, and her 11th baby (also named Martha), both of whom died in childbirth in 1879 and who are buried in a fenced plot next to Hubert.

The McMurdo name is associated with the cemetery because the McMurdo family occupies the largest fenced plot. (Figure 3 right) In 1869 George and Wauchope McMurdo came to this country from Scotland with their four sons and daughter. They eventually settled in the Cherry Creek Valley between Parker and Franktown in 1873. Five other members of this family were buried in this cemetery, including their son David and his wife Anza whose cremains were brought here from



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California in 1940 and 1955, respectively (Figure 7, page 5). An unsigned and undated letter, probably written by a daughter of David and Anza, mentions that the first burial in the cemetery may have been an infant and that a "Granny Sparks" was also interred there, but so far there has been no confirmation of this.

Unfortunately, many of the tombstones are of coarse-grained sandstone or soft conglomerate and have, therefore, badly eroded or chipped away. Several are merely stone stumps ranging in height from two inches to almost twelve inches; some of these stones would be mistaken for footstones except that smaller stone fragments (probably true footstones) lie a few feet away.

The study of this cemetery has provided examples of the value of earlier transcriptions. For instance, today the badly worn stone for Elizabeth Koch (Figure 4) tells us that she was born in 1810 in an Austrian town beginning with the letter K and that she died sometime in the 1870s. But we find in Lela McQueary's 1952 transcription that the town was Kainthen and that the year of death was 1874; the year of death is corroborated in a 1980 inventory by the DAR. Also, both McQueary's and the DAR's inventories give the age at death for John McMurdo (49 years), information that may have been overlooked because its lettering at the bottom of the tombstone had disappeared below ground level over the years. Moreover the handmade, knife-carved wooden marker for Z. T. Bryant was found near the cemetery in the 1960s and was placed in its current location (in a protective plexiglass case) by the Parker Area Historical Society; we know Bryant was interred somewhere in this cemetery because Ms. McQueary had an entry that reads "Bryant, Z. T. (Old board marker)."





The confusion is probably because of the difficulty in reading the name ("Warly" is confirmed by other transcribers). This stone is next to an almost identical yet completely unreadable stone (Warm's or Warner's?).





ALDERMAN-STARK CEMETERY

Atop a forested hill in extreme southeast Douglas County, Colorado, lies the privately owned Alderman-Stark Cemetery (Figure 13). There are five marked graves and probably some unmarked graves, as indicated by a rock enclosure that is divided into two areas where burials doubtless occurred (there are no existing markers in the enclosure).



The cemetery is named for the Alderman and Stark families that homesteaded along East Cherry Creek in southeast Douglas County in the 1870s. The Aldermans originally came from New Jersey by way of Illinois, and the Starks came from Pennsylvania and Tennessee. Both families were of Scottish-Irish-

In 1882 Newton B. Alderman, son of James and Adelia Alderman, married Ida Stark, daughter of James and Sarah Stark. Their first two children were Minnie and James Grant Alderman. In 1887 Ida died giving birth to a daughter; she was buried in what came to be known as the Alderman-Stark Cemetery under a headstone (Figure 14) that reads "Ida Stark / Wife of Newton B. Alderman / 1863 - 1887." Hers was the first known burial there; her father was buried there three years later and her mother was laid to rest there in 1916. Ida's daughter was named in honor of her mother, and she grew up to become Ida Alderman Bailey. She died in St. Louis in 1918 and her remains were brought here for interment in the family plot (Figure 15).

James Grant Alderman married Arla Ivy Halley. According to a family history written in 1989 by their son Nelson, "Arla gave birth to two daughters who died at birth. They are buried in unmarked graves on the Alderman Homestead property" (presumably in the Alderman-Stark Cemetery).

In 1889 Newton married Georgia Sutphin, a schoolteacher who had come from New Jersey. Newton was buried in the Spring Valley Cemetery, which is also in southeast Douglas

County. (He gave some of the land for this cemetery and was instrumental in its development.)




